Early budget figures show school funds short

Preliminary figures indicate Iowa Park schools "... won't get enough monny to make the payroll."

That's what Harold Cowley, superintendent of schools, said yesterday. But he's still not through with his calculations and ready to meet with his board of trustees for a budget work session.

As late as Monday, Cowley was receiving new interpretations from the state on how to figure salaries under the new ladder program.

He said he hopes to have the board members together late next week to work on the budget, indicating if he doesn't have more changes in interpretations he should be ready for the session.

Will there be a tax increase this year?

Cowley, as does about every district administrator at this point in the budgeting process, hedged and said it was up to the board members. But he indicated an increase would apparently be necessary in about three years, and it would be a decision of the board whether to take it all at once or over a period of time.

The board has yet to accept the certified tax rolls, and until it does, working on the budget is still a lot of guesswork. The rolls are in Cowley's hands, however, and it appears Iowa Park district has lost almost \$28-million in oil values alone, compared with last year.

An interpretation the superintendent received this week changed his figures considerably. It dealt with teachers in the 10 to 19 year experience range. Most of those teachers were given two-step increases, instead of one.

The average salary increase for 10-month contract teachers is \$2,410 per year. Increases range from \$1,750 minimum to one who received a \$3,984 increase.

Cowley said the district, in his opinion, is morally obligated to pay all teachers in the district the \$1,800 above state base, because they had already signed their contracts for the 1984-85 year. The salary is paid "above state base."

After applying all the reform bill's formulas to the budget study, Cowley's figures indicate the local

district will receive \$2,308,894 from the state.

The budget adopted for the 1983-84 year called for revenues from the state to be \$2,528,731, but that included all expenses for the West Wichita Co-op and was before the new salary was set.

The superintendent had to use the anticipated revenues from state for the past year, rather than the actual figures, because final payment for the year past is not expected until late September.

Other than a work session on the budget, Cowley said he does not anticipate asking board members to meet until their regularly-scheduled second Tuesday, Aug. 14.

He expects to use that meeting as the required public hearing on the proposed 1984-85 budget, which would allow him time to complete the document by the Aug. 20 deadline.

The tax rate is not set by the district trustees until after the budget is approved, so it could also be at that meeting that the public will first hear what its taxes will be for the coming fiscal year.

Delayed council meeting rescheduled for tonight

Unable to seat a quorum Monday night, the Iowa Park city council meeting was rescheduled for 7 this evening in council chambers, according to Administrator James Barrington.

A couple of aldermen had already known they would not be able to attend Monday's meeting, and an emergency developed for another, reducing the required number of

members to transact business.

Barrington said yesterday morning he felt sure a quorum would be present tonight.

A public appearance is scheduled by Curtis Lightfoot, manager of Triangle Ranch, who will request permission to purchase raw water from Buffalo Lake to replenish stock tanks on the west side of Goetze Road.

The council will consider bids for sale of a tract of land and also a home to be moved.

The land purchase was requested by Darrell Jolly, who wants to replat adjoining lots he owns, making them larger for development. Because the property, in Garden Valley, is city-owned, it must be put up for bids to the public, rather than selling directly to an individual.

The house to be sold for removal is at 902 W. Highway, known to many as the Overbey House. It was purchased several years ago by the city, with a plan of someday opening Fourth Street from Van Horn to West Highway.

Barrington will request authorization to review professional liability insurance and also insurance on the city's garbage trucks.

He will also report on a budget workshop held last week and he plans to discuss with the council a proposal to enter into an agreement with the county to do certain paving projects in the city.

The administrator says the county has a similar agreement with Burkburnett, for which the county is paid for materials and labor.

Rehab Center Auction set

The Crippled Children's Livestock Auction Committee is rounding up the livestock, merchandise and cash to make this 16th annual auction the best one yet. Joe Parker, general chairman, is counting on it!

All proceeds benefit North Texas Rehab Center for treatment of handicapped children and adults. Through the years 219 persons have been treated from the Iowa Park area at the Rehab Center.

Stanley Williamson, Iowa Park, is auction chairman for Wichita County.

The famed Light Crust Doughboys will play old favorites during the silent auction from 11 a.m. to 1 p.m. and again at the regular sale from 4 to 6 p.m. Lunch will be available for purchase. A \$5 door charge will be made for the evening auction and barbecue dinner.

The auction is unique in that ranchers, farmers and businessmen not only donate to the auction, they're right back at the sales to buy.

All merchandise is either new or antique. There is no "junk," Parker said.

There are handmade afghans, crafts, tools, garden sprayers, sports equipment, binoculars, dolls, blue jeans, men's and women's boots, building supplies, television set, Chief Crazy Horse and Kodiak hunting knives, plants and almost every imaginable item to be auctioned.

W.T. Chamber opposes gas bill

Strong opposition to the proposed "Natural Gas Market Policy Act of 1984" has been voiced by the West Texas Chamber of Commerce. Also known as the House Energy and Commerce Committee Natural Gas Bill, H.R. 4277 is an attempt to "recontrol" the natural gas industry, according to the WTCC.

"By imposing a two-year price freeze on all price escalator clauses in the gas decontrolled on January 1, 1985 and July 1, 1987, the measure effectively reimposes price controls on the category of gas decontrolled by the Natural Gas Policy Act" said Dan Mendell, III of Midland. Mendell chairs the chamber's Mineral Resources Committee.

"In addition," continued Mendell, "these provisions overturn clauses in thousands of existing gas sales contracts, resulting in changes to all parties involved and uncertainty as to the price paid for almost 50 percent of the nation's gas supply."

Man arrested Saturday on year-old rape charge

Iowa Park police made four arrests during the past week, one for aggravated rape, two for driving while intoxicated and another for public intoxication.

William Earl Kent Jr., 19, was arrested at 11:30 a.m. Saturday at a local convenience store on a charge of raping an Iowa Park woman July 17, 1983.

He was taken before Justice of the Peace Arthur B. Williams in Wichita Falls, who put him under \$20,000 bond, and turned over to county authorities.

John Edward Hays, 17, was arrested at 2:42 a.m. Friday in the 500 block of East Washington on suspicion of driving while intoxicated.

He was transported to Wichita Falls Police Dept., where he refused to take a breath test, and Judge

Williams later set his bond at \$500 and he was placed in county jail.

At 11:43 p.m. Saturday, Kenneth Wayne Tuggle, 43, of Corpus Christi, was arrested in the 100 block of East Highway, also under suspicion of DWI. Officers from the DPS transported him to Wichita Falls for breath test and he was turned over to county authorities for detention.

Officers responded to Beall Auto Parts at 3:40 p.m. Monday, with the understanding there was a fire. But through a miscommunication, they were responding to a "fight" and took James Elliott Todd into custody on a public intoxication charge.

Todd allegedly attacked Sam Fairchild inside the business. Todd posted a \$49 bond on the filed charge. Mrs. Lilian Holcomb told police July 18 someone had taken a vacuum

cleaner and cannister from her garage at 706 E. Highway. It was valued at \$225.

Showers miss, area dust-dry

Where's the rain?

That's what residents of Iowa Park have been asking all through 1984.

While some isolated areas have received some nice showers recently, Iowa Park is almost dust-dry, according to measurements of the Texas Experiment Station, southeast of town.

Some areas west of here, like Electra, measured about half an inch precipitation Tuesday. Iowa Park received only .16 during the entire past week, from two showers.

That gave the community .96 of an inch for all of July, and brought the year's total to 8.45.

The community is 7.51 inches below last year's precipitation, 15.96, but the area is 8.78 inches below the 58-year average of 17.23 inches.

Iowa Park received 26.39 inches throughout 1983, and that was below the average, which is 29.41 inches.

Curry, Thomas nuptial vows are exchanged here Saturday

At the invitation of Mr. and Mrs. Bill Curry, a large host of relatives and friends assembled at the First Baptist Church Saturday afternoon to witness the solemn recitation of marriage vows by their daughter, Jo Ann, and Richard Brian Thomas, son of Mr. and Mrs. Richard Thomas of Farmers Branch.

The officiating minister was Rev. Kenneth Flowers, pastor of the First Baptist Church at Brownfield, a former pastor of the Iowa Park First Baptist Church.

Escorted to the altar by her father who presented her in marriage for her parents, the bride was a beautiful portrait of loveliness in her formal wedding gown of white silk organza, Wedgewood lace, Chantilly lace and Schiffl embroidery. The fitted bodice covered with Chantilly lace featured a high neckline over a scooped sheer yoke embellished with embroidery, seed pearls and sequins. A small gathered ruffle of Chantilly lace outlined the yoke in front and back. The long fitted sleeves of the Chantilly lace were cuffed at the wrists with a miniature ruffle of the lace.

The full skirt was designed to capture attention with a Chantilly lace apron effect front bordered with ruffled Wedgewood lace caught at the waistline in the back over multi ruffled tiers of lace. The tiers alternated with gathered ruffles of silk organza, each ruffle lifting in the back toward the waist and cascading to a semi-cathedral train.

For her headpiece, the bride chose a tiara cap covered with Chantilly lace outlined with a row of pearls to secure her waltz length veil edged with a gathered ruffle of lace, the ruffle fitting into the ruffles on the skirt of the gown.

Band practice in two weeks

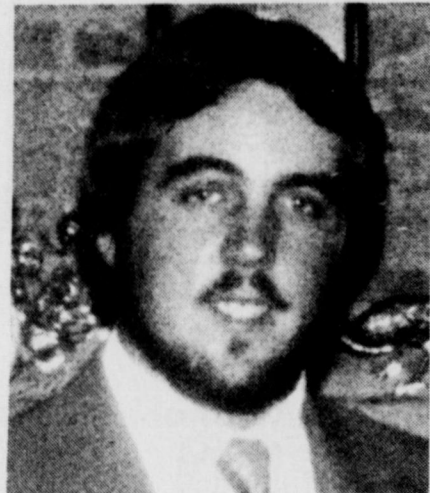
When the Hawk Band starts practicing, can the opening of school be far behind?

As I See It.... By **BOB HAMILTON**



I never look forward to covering an event when I know there's going to be a big bunch of news people, especially national television crews, on hand.
 But I felt it was worth subjecting myself to their particular brand of snobbishness and inconsideration, Tuesday when Vice President George Bush made an appearance in Wichita Falls.
 I should have known the local and regional TV people would adopt the same attitudes when they were pitted with their "big brothers."
 The press area in Wichita Falls Activity Center was a circus, both in the room where Bush made his talk to the public and again in a very small room which was used for a press conference following the address.
 At the invitation of no one, I climbed on a platform which gave cameras an angle to shoot the vice president, above the heads of a standing audience. When cameramen and their assistants weren't walking or turning in front of me, others were brushing against me, moving from one point to another.
 Not one "Excuse me" was ever offered.
 As the official party's press coordinator was explaining the conference room was small and each news unit would be permitted only one cameraman, you should have heard the howl. "We work in teams," one union TV man was heard to say, adding "We're national network."
 The room in which we crowded for the press conference was so small, there were only nine seats for reporters. Added to those news people were the cameras, their operators, all the security people, press aides and then some room for Bush, and it was easy to see why the restriction of people.
 But I got a chance to ask Bush two questions that have been burning in

my mind several weeks.
 "Where's the five-cent-per-gallon gasoline tax congress levied for highway repairs?"
 "It's supposed to be going to the states," Bush responded.
 I mentioned to him that our own legislature had set the same amount of tax for the same purpose, and wondered if the Texas politicians had done it because they weren't getting the money from the feds.
 Also, I mentioned that reports had circulated that Tip O'Neil, speaker of the house, might have tied up the fed money until he got a pet project approved for his state.
 Bush smiled, and said he didn't think the speaker would do anything like that. I wasn't convinced.
 After another question had been

posed about how the Republican administration planned to handle the \$200-billion deficit, I asked if he had any figures as to what percent of the deficit was built-in by laws passed by earlier actions of congress.
 He agreed a major part was built in, but admitted he had no percentage figures he could give. And he added the administration was working hard to cut those built-in increases that were not law, only policy, when they were not needed.
 "Is Texas important in this year's general election?", Bush was asked.
 Many states are, but he termed Texas as a "national battleground" this fall. I take it that we'll be seeing a lot more of him, Pres. Reagan and the Democratic Party candidates between now and November.

Ticks cause problems, and aren't particular

One of the most aggravating pests of Texas is now causing some woes to residents in Wichita Falls and the surrounding area. This is the tick, and he is not selective on who's dog or yard his residence is being set up on.

Mrs. Arga Bright has ticks in her yard and around her house, and she feels they may be spilling over from her neighbor's yard. I have gotten some callers telling me that they are so bad that they are "crawling under the peeling paint on their houses." When they start doing this, a severe problem is present and if not corrected, it will only get worse.

I think to better understand the tick situation and how to deal with it, home owners need to know some things about the tick itself. First, there are two types of ticks, hard and soft. Hard ticks are what we are having trouble with. The most common species of hard ticks that I have seen is the brown dog tick. These are, in most cases, reddish-brown and are 1/8 to 3/16 inch long. They feed almost exclusively on dogs and attach to the ears and between the toes.

The females of this tick lay their eggs on the ground. These hatch and the young climb on vegetation and wait for dogs, rodents or man to come by so they can attach themselves.

After attachment and a blood meal, they will drop to the ground, change into nymphs, and then try to get on another host. This is done until the tick becomes full grown.

As I mentioned, ticks will also attach themselves to man. These should be removed as soon as possible because disease organisms will not be transferred until the tick has fed from two to eight hours.

Always remove the tick with its mouthparts intact. Hasty removal can leave the mouthparts and increase the chances of subsequent infection. To relax the tick for removal, touch it with a hot needle or a few drops of camphor, alcohol, turpentine or kerosene. The best method for removal is to grasp the tick firmly with tweezers and remove it slowly with a steady pull. Most of the time, this will work in removal of a tick.

Now, to what most home owners want to know, "How do I get rid of ticks?" Well, light infestation in buildings can usually be controlled with a household residual spray like Ficam W, Dursban, Baygon, or Resmethin. Be sure and treat cracks around baseboards, windows and door casings.

To control severe infestations indoors, remove the pet from the house and make repeated applications of the above mentioned insecticides at

two to four week intervals. On the pet itself, use a dip like Dermaton-2 or some of the other commercially prepared dips. Remember the dog and his sleeping quarters must be treated at the same time.

In the yard, the best results that I have seen have been with formulations of Dursban or Diazinon. As an alternative, Sevin or Baygon can also be used. Sprays, dusts or granular formulations can be used. Some good reports have been given to me on the granular formulations. Diazinon and Dursban will also control ants, cutworms, chinch bugs and white grubs in the home lawn.

Remember thorough treatment of all areas is necessary to control these Texas sized tick problems.
