of speech and freedom of the press as
guaranteed by the First Amendment
adopted in 1791 must concern
everyone. "As a ceitizen of a free
world, you must realize that freedom
of speech has only been a reality in
America since the 18th Century (the
age of reason). It came about because
the masses were no longer largely
illiterate. because the ideals of
democracy were beginning to form,
the power of church and state had
begun to erode and because scientific
inquiry characteristic of the period by
its very nature requires freedom of
ithought and expression,. she said.
She continued, dealing with
freedom of the press in time of
national security, press coverage of
criminal cases, and the relationship
between the government and the
press. She said newspapers and
related organizations have started relaed organizations have started
group called the First Amendmen Congress in an effort to overcome some of the negative feelings dealin with the media. "Its' creed reads, in part: If we
journalists voluntarily do journalists voluntarily do our jobs in
such a way that people respect us and our conduct, we'll see fewer threat to the public's right to know. We

## Genealogy research fun, educational - Watson

Mrs. Eari Watson gave a program on genealogy for the Philia
Study Club Monday evening. She was introduced by Mrs. Thomas Johnson. Mrs. Watson said she started her own genealogy research knowing only five last names of her ancestors
and showed club members of her and showed club members of her
current list that dates back to Civil War times. She said some ancestors might be hard to trace, especially if they were not raised by their own parents, and another problem
commonly commonly encountered is a change
over the years in the spelling of over the
names.
Mrs. W
Mrs. Watson explained the change in spelling was sometimes due to the fact that the spelling did not fit the
pronunciation of the name Other pronunciation of the name. Other
names were changed by officials at names were changed by officials at
Ellis Istand when the immigrants reached America when names could have been translated from the mother tongue into the English counterpart, spelling changed to fit the pronunciation of the name, or
immigrants were given their last immigrants were given their last
names according to their occupations or skills.
Mrs. Watson stated that the 1790 census was the first taken in the
United States, and United States, and only names of the
heads of family were taken on the heads of family were taken on the
censuses until 1850 . Even then, the censuses until 1850. Even then, the
women and children were listed by name, not numbers of each sex living with the heads of family. The speaker remarked that a
heritatary legacy is something to heritatary legacy is something to be
shared only with siblings. Each shared only with siblings. Each name
is unique and interesting to find out about, and it is very important for the sake of medical records. She suggested that club members write
down things about their ancestors for down things about their ancestors for preservation because it was like
"writing your own history." She said "writing your own history." She said
that a good method would be to keep a complete journal of the family's daily activities.
Mrs. Watson said that Mormons
are very good at keeping daily are very good at keeping daily
journals and preserving for the journals and preserving for the
future. She mentioned that their work had been very helpful to others who are interested in genealogy and that they have microfilmed many county records all over the world.

## Finnell urges plan's defeat

## State Rep. Charles Finnell last

 week urged defeat of proposed plans (PEPPRA) contained in HR 5143 int roduced by U.S. Rep. Clay of Mo., in Congress.Rep. Finnell, chairman of the Texas House Committee on Retirement and Aging, pointed out in a telegram to that the State of Texas already regulates public pensions. Texans are proud of the sound actuarial condition of their major public pension funds fiduciary standardstution's strong fiduciary standards and funding
requirements. Finnell noted.

Federal rules would unnecessarily preeempt many of the State Constitution's protections, he said.

There is no federal crisis justifying additonal federal expenditures and
bureaucracy that would be neessary bureaucracy that would be necessary
under HR 5143, known as the Public Employee Pension Plan Reporting and Accountability Aet.
State government can and will protect the interests of its taxpayer
and employees by assuring sound and employees by assuring sound
well-run public pension systems without federal controls, Finnell said. Rep. Finnell noted that Texas eachers and other public employee have emphatically stated in the pas that they do not favor such federal
regulation. Legislation similar to HR 5143 was introduced during the las session of Congress. An outpouring of
public opposition, with a great deal of it coming from Texas, prevented the passage of the proposed regulatory legislation at that time.
