Voters to decide on trustees, mayor, aldermen and home rule

Saturday is election day on the local level for Iowa Park area voters. The school district will be deciding among four candidates which two will serve. Voters residing in the city will have much more to decide, however. They must make decisions on a mayor and two aldermen, as well as whether they want a new city charter and those they want to serve on the charter commission.

Polls will be open from 7 a.m. until 7 p.m. There will be two polls for city voters and three for those voting in the school election. Kidwell and Bradford schools will serve both city and school voters, with the railroad track being the divider for city voters to determine which poll to use. The third school poll is at the Valley View school campus, in the metal building. Winners in both the school and city

elections are decided at-large, with those receiving the greatest number of votes being declared winners. Two newcomers are opposing the incumbents for seats on the school board. Jerald Brown and Rex Wells are seeking reelection, while Marilyn Hale and Virginia Klinkerman are running for the same seats. Two candidates for mayor are listed on the city ballot. They are Tim Hunter and Freddie Simmons.

Hunter is completing his first year as city alderman, and elected to run for mayor when Charlie Lee decided to call it quits after he had served one year in that post. Simmons has never served on the council, though he ran for alderman last year. A write-in campaign for Buck Voyles as mayor was initiated last week. He is retired after serving more than two decades as county commissioner.

asked if they want a commission to frame a home rule charter. In each of the previous referendums, the issue was approved, but when the final charter was completed and offered for adoption, they were voted down. Iowa Park has always operated under a general laws charter. One of the major issues available under home rule, which is not permitted under general laws charter, can permit the city to initiate annexation of land not in the city. Annexation is not automatic in home rule, but can be if the commission includes it and the charter is approved by the voters.

whatever the citizens want as a document of government, so long as it does not conflict with state and federal laws. The general laws charter was drafted by the state. Below the referendum question on the ballot is a list of 15 charter commission candidates. They were selected by the city council from a list of several dozen. The commission will commence its effort to draft a new charter if the majority votes "yes" in the referendum. If the majority votes "no", the commission will not function.

Like the school board, there are four candidates for two alderman seats, with both incumbents being challenged by newcomers. Incumbents George Hammonds and Bud Thompson are being challenged by Don Decker and Bud Mercer. Hunter's position as alderman will have to be filled by appointment, if he is successful in his bid for the mayor's seat. He does not have to give up his position as alderman to run for mayor, according to the city charter, and would retain the position if he does not win the mayor's race. Under the general laws charter, annexation can be considered by the council only if the property owners petition to be taken into the city. Other changes which have been included in one or more charters drafted here include the ward system of representation, providing for a city manager form of government, and changes in the number of council members. Home rule charters can include

Members of the proposed charter commission, as they appear on the ballot, include Dolores Hamilton, Susan Streich, Faye McAllister, Jerry Williams, James Edwards, Don Decker, Terry Davis, Margaret Soell, John Brown, Donald Hill, L.W. Meetings next week relate to elections

Both the city council and school board meetings next week will partially be concerned with the results of Saturday's elections. An official action following every election is to canvass the votes to verify accuracy in count. Then those successful in the election are sworn into office. In Monday's meeting of the council, which is to begin at 7 p.m. in council chambers, after the winners are sworn in, there could be some other activities relating to the election.

If alderman Tim Hunter is successful in his bid for the mayor's position, the council will have to appoint someone to fulfill his year remaining as alderman. Of course, if he is not elected mayor, no appointment will be necessary. Following each election and the school board undergoes reorganization. At Tuesday's meeting, which is to begin at 7:30 p.m. in the administration building, board members elect a president, vice president and secretary.

Council members will also select from among themselves a delegate to serve on the Friends of the Library board. Two personal appearances are on the city agenda. Developer Bill Swan will seek a contract to pave the 700 block of West Louisa, and D.A. Hill will ask the city to abandon a section of right of way on which a house was built several years ago and has never been platted nor taxed. Aldermen will consider a resolution authorizing the city administrator to enter into a contract with Don Daugherty for architectural services in renovating the Burnett home for use as a library.

Student participation slumps in UIL event

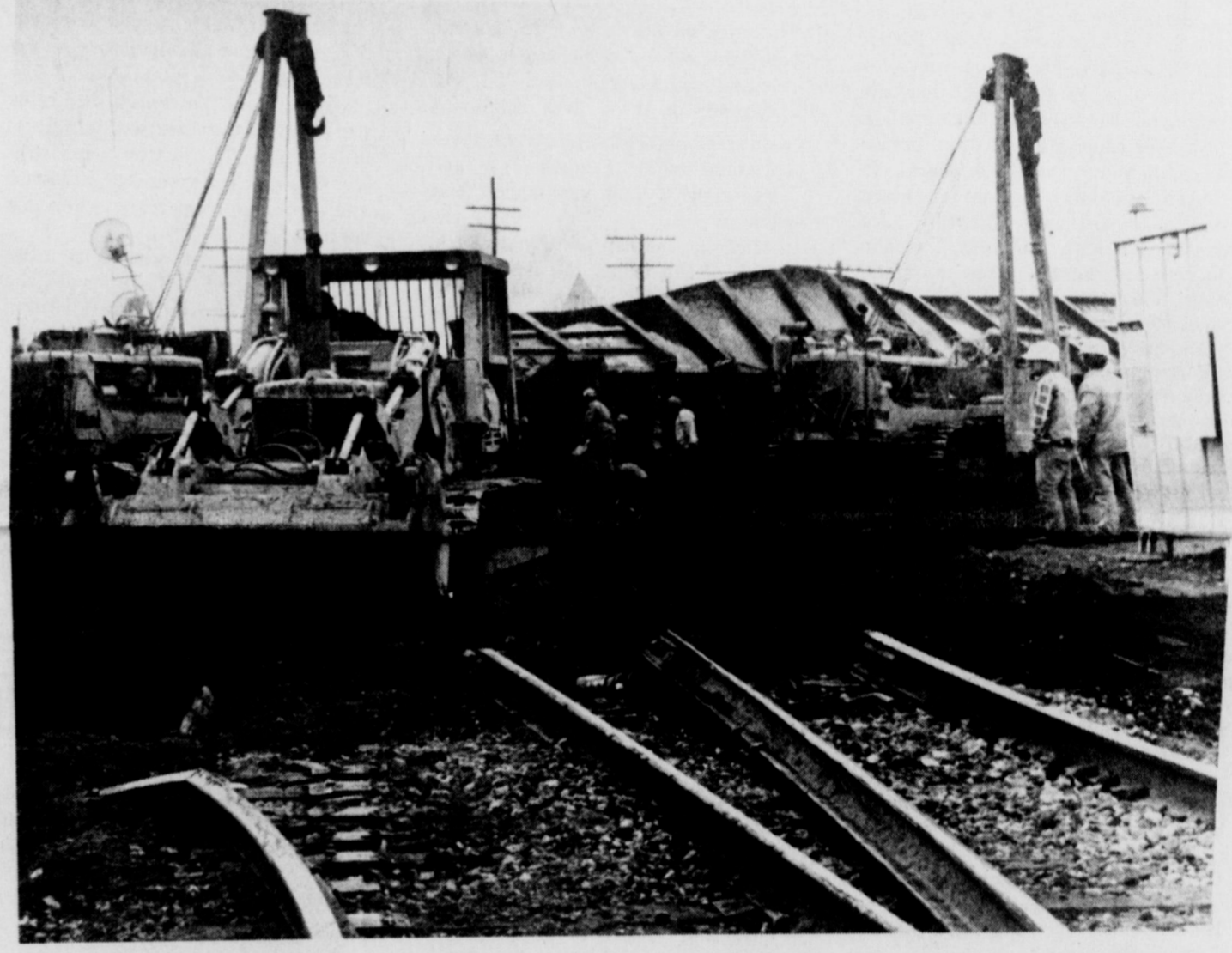
High school principal Bob Dawson didn't even try to hide his disappointment in his school's performance Friday in the Dist. 3-AAAA University Interscholastic League Literary contest at Vernon. Iowa Park has for decades, regardless of UIL classification, placed third or higher, and often won the contest. But this year, only two students qualified for the April 14 regional meet at Denton, and neither won a first place. Lana Swan placed second in typing and Melissa Hatcher was third in spelling and plain writing. No students from Iowa Park signed

up to compete in a couple of events, and many who had registered 10 days prior to the meet changed their minds before the day of competition. "Of course, this is strictly a volunteer thing, they can't be made to participate," Dawson said. Emphasizing he does not believe the lack of participation or failure for more to place was a reflection of the quality of education students receive in Iowa Park High, he said it appeared to be that the better students are so involved in other activities they just don't have time to compete in the literary events. "I think they just try to do too much," he said.

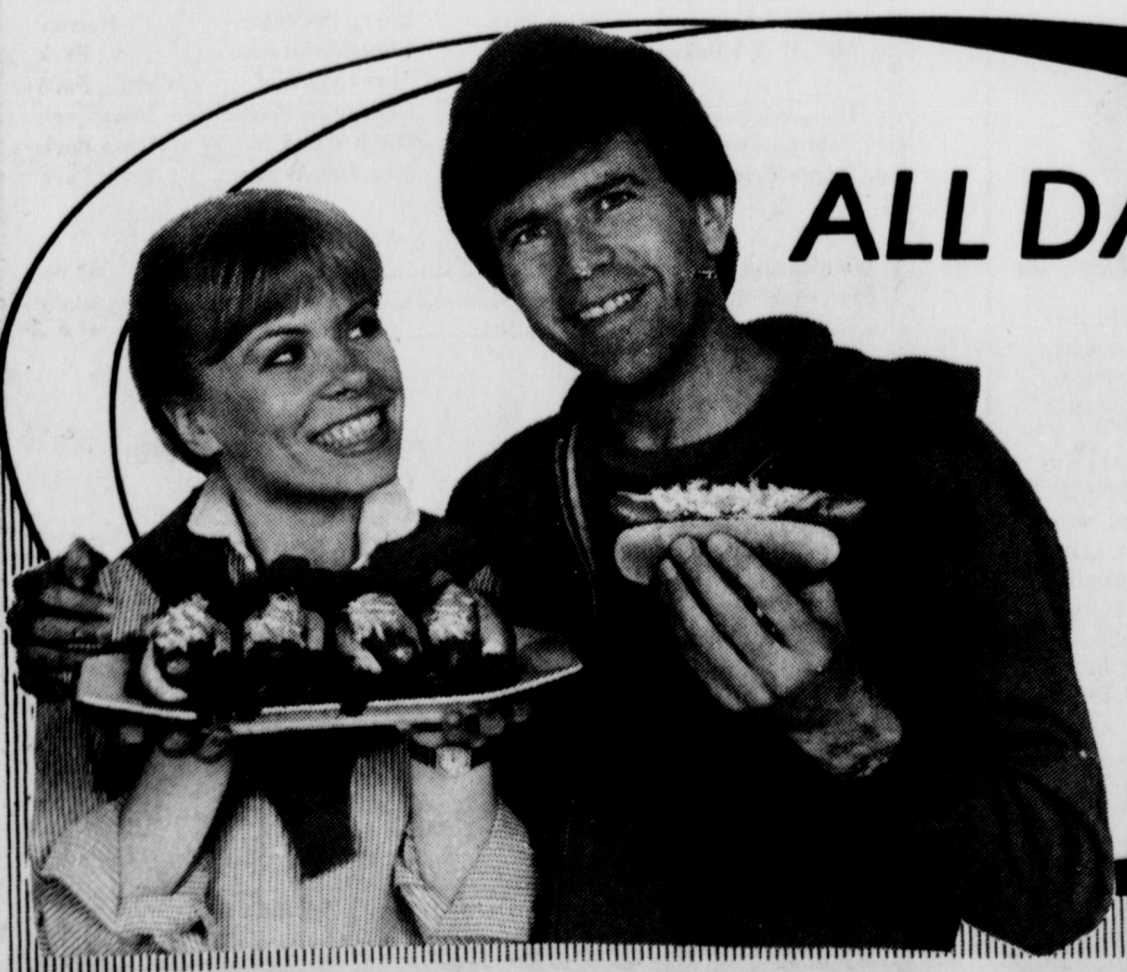

As I See It.... By **BOB HAMILTON**



Would you believe they're already gearing up for the 1990 census?

That's right. Public hearings are underway, with meetings planned for every state in the union.

Texas' meeting will be held next Tuesday in the Dallas Art Museum. Co-sponsors with the U.S. Department of Commerce Bureau of the Census are the Dallas Regional Office of Texas Data Management Program and office of the governor. And this is in cooperation with the North Texas Chapter of the American Statistical Association, Texas Association of Community Action Agencies, Texas Association of Counties, Texas Association of Regional Councils, Texas Economic and Demographic Association, Texas Library Association, Texas Municipal League and

Texas State Chamber of Commerce. Now that's a heady list of sponsorship!

On the agenda are offerings for public comment on: population items and issues; housing items and issues; geographic issues; data products and services issues; and census outreach issues.

"These meetings will enable the bureau to inform users of the census and general public about early 1990 planning and provide them the opportunity to tell the bureau about their information needs for the next census," commented regional director of the Census Bureau, John E. Reeder.

And Census Bureau specialists will be on hand at each public meeting to describe current planning, answer questions, and record local suggestions for bureau study.

Among the things the Bureau wants to know, according to advance information on the meeting, is "What new or unusual applications were tried with information from the 1980 census?"

I think all this is fine. We need to know how many commodes are in working order in each of our homes, how many computers there are, how many people have jobs to contribute to the financing of the household, and so forth.

But one thing that seems to be missing from the agenda: how does the Bureau plan to make sure each and every household in the nation is reached in the coming census, and how does the Bureau plan to finally reach a point of accuracy in head count?

I don't know how much advanced planning there was before the 1980 census, but having talked to more than two census workers, I found there was confusion among those who were hired to count heads and not a whole lot of determination to do a complete job.

Industries, businesses and governmental planners all need the sideline information sought in the census taking. It's against the law not to completely fill out the forms, in case you didn't know.

But I think the original goal of the effort taken every decade, at a cost of billions of dollars, should be first and foremost, I think when the counting is completed, we should know exactly how many people live in Iowa Park, Wichita County, Texas and the United States.

We certainly didn't learn it in 1980, 1970, and I doubt 1960.

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Letter to the Editor

Consumer Protection Week is April 23-29. Last year 72-million Americans spent \$40-billion shopping by mail and benefited from the many good products offered by reputable companies. However, millions of dollars were lost to swindlers offering unbelievably good deals that sounded too good to be true - and were.

The following are several actual case histories for frauds that you may have seen ads for: There was the "Super-reducing Slim Skin" which promised users that they would lose 14 inches in 25 minutes. You put on a one-size-fits-all suit and exercise vigorously for 10 minutes, then relax for 15 minutes. You then attach your vacuum cleaner to the leg of the suit, turn it on, and presumably suck 14 inches out of the suit and off your body. It is estimated by the Inspection Service that 50,000 people purchased the item for \$14.95 each.

Have you seen ads offering you an opportunity to earn \$400 to \$600 per month in your own home stuffing envelopes? In this swindle, you receive information for your money telling you to place similar ads in other publications to get new victims involved. Work-at-home schemes usually victimize the homebound, elderly or handicapped.

Businesses, as well as individuals,

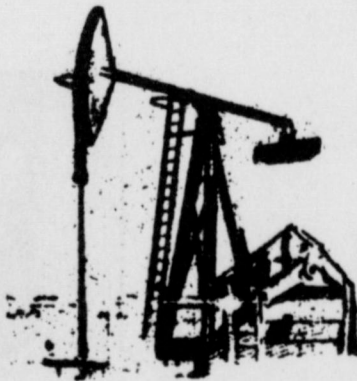
can be taken in by mail fraud. False billings can steal money from a company that doesn't verify each bill against goods and services received. Business persons, like private citizens, can be victimized by mail fraud artists who use a perfectly legitimate service - C.O.D. Recently in California, two brothers ages 15 and 19 were making an estimated \$100,000 per week. When apprehended, the 19-year-old was sitting in the seat of his Mercedes doing his homework, and his brother was upstairs also doing his homework. Their employees were busy on the telephone following a typical procedure:

A telephone salesperson will call and tell you that you've won some fantastic prize. All you have to do is purchase some advertising material - usually pens - ranging from \$40 to \$200. You are told the company gives prizes because one million dollars has been set aside as advertising. The prize offered always is supposedly of greater value than you must spend, and their reasoning usually makes sense. When your C.O.D. package arrives, it cannot be opened until paid for, and the Postal Service cannot refund the money because it is obligated to pay all but service fees to the company. Once opened, the package can contain anything from broken sheetrock, to an order form for more pens, or it could even contain the pens promised, but usually a lesser quality than expected. The real kicker is the prize which is always far less than represented. A vacation can be a reserved camper spot or some other prize that is of little, if any, value.

The Postal Inspection service is trying to prosecute these swindlers, but the numbers of them coupled with costs of money and time of prosecution, and the speed with which these operators can close down in one location and reopen under a new name in a different location makes prevention the most effective solution. If a deal sounds too good to be true, it probably is.

No matter what our economic or educational background, age or sex, there is a mail fraud scheme designed to promise to meet our wants.

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Police initiate program helping senior citizens

A Senior Citizens Involvement Program has been initiated by the Iowa Park Police Department that works directly with the senior citizens of the community. The program, according to Iowa Park Police Chief Tom Fenley, is believed to be unique for this area, being designed specifically and exclusively for the senior citizen.

The program, initiated in January, with monthly meetings with the participants at The Friendly Door in Iowa Park, has been coordinated by Officer Tom Stephens. Stephens has presented films and talks concerning a variety of subjects of interest to the senior citizen, including how to avoid being swindled out of money by "con men," ways to minimize physical assaults and injuries, and suggestions for protecting property.

Chief Fenley said "Officer Stephens has been involved with the program from the beginning, having volunteered, expressing his concern for the age group that the program is designed to reach and help. I think that he has done an outstanding job with the program. He has presented several timely programs already, with plans to have future programs on the senior citizen and safe driving, and pedestrian safety."

"We believe our program is unique," stated Chief Fenley. "Other local law enforcement agencies,

notably the Wichita Falls Police Department, have several programs that reach the senior citizen, but I think ours may be the only one in the area that is exclusively for this segment of the population. We have had some problems obtaining appropriate literature, simply because there apparently is not a great deal of such material requested."

Fenley added, however, that the Wichita Falls Police Department has been very helpful in the local program, with the loan of films and other materials.

The Chief added, "We expect the program to continue to be successful. The people at The Friendly Door have indicated that the program is helping to fill a need, one that perhaps has been overlooked in the past. Our senior citizens deserve just as much assistance from the police as any other citizen, possibly even more. We are very proud that this program has been well received, and hope to be able to make it even more successful."

The next program at The Friendly Door will be next Thursday at 1 a.m.

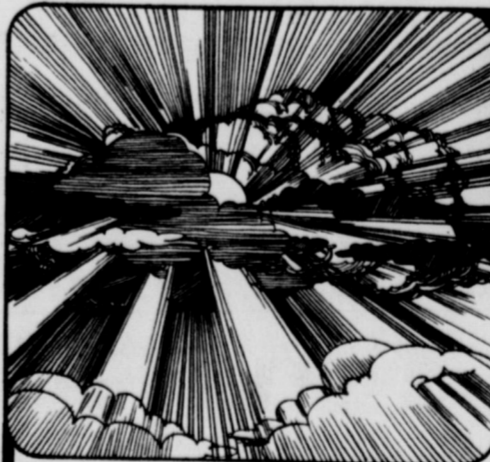

Cook of the Week

Apples figure prominently in American desserts and have since colonial days. However, when the first colonists came to America they longed for the orchard-grown apples in England because they were a milder-flavored fruit than the grapes, cranberries, wild raspberries and blackberries that they found here. In England, they had eaten them out of hand but mainly in making "pyes", puddings, puffs and fritters.

They used sweeteners in the English cooked fruit concoctions, but the acid tasting fruits of the New World required much more sweetening. Sugar, which had greater sweetening power than either West Indian molasses or New England's honey or maple syrup, was scarce and expensive.

By 1629, John Winthrop, the governor of Massachusetts, had English apple trees in the Salem area, and by 1634 the orchards had been established in many parts of the state. By the middle of the 18th century, the fruit was turning up in London fruit stalls and in the West Indies. New England's apples also traveled westward across North America through the good offices of that barefoot and tree-planting visionary Johnny Appleseed, who was actually born John Chapman in Boston around 1775.

Apples soon became the favorite filling for pies and increased in popularity as oven-baking facilities improved until they are the all-time fruit favorite today for pies and many other desserts to compliment the rest of the meal.

The Rosy Apple Dumplings, one of Mrs. Michael Sellers' recipes for this week, attests to the versatility of the fruit.

ROSY APPLE DUMPLINGS

2 1/2 cups flour
1 tsp. salt
1 3/4 cups sugar
3/4 cup shortening
1 1/2 tsp. cinnamon
3 apples
4 tbsps. butter
1 tsp. cinnamon candies
Combine flour and salt in bowl; cut in shortening until particles are the size of small peas. Add about seven tablespoons of water gradually, tossing with fork to form a soft dough. Roll out on floured surface to a 10x15 inch rectangle; cut into five-inch squares.

Combine 3/4 cup sugar and cinnamon in bowl. Peel apples, cut in halves and remove cores. Place apple half in center of each pastry square with cavity up. Sprinkle about two tablespoons sugar mixture over apple half. Fold each corner of pastry to center; press four corners together to seal. Place in casserole two inches deep. Combine butter, remaining one cup sugar, 2 cups water and cinnamon candies in saucepan, bring to a boil. Stir until sugar is dissolved and candy is melted.

Pour syrup over dumplings. Bake in preheated oven at 400 degrees 20-25 minutes or until golden brown.

CHILI-CHIP CASSEROLE

1 lb. ground beef
1 cup chopped onion
1 pkg. chili seasoning mix
1-6 oz. can tomato sauce
4 cups corn chips
1 lb. can pinto beans
2 cups grated Cheddar cheese
Brown ground beef. Stir in onion, chili seasoning mix, tomato paste and 3/4 cup water; simmer for 10 minutes. Place 2 cups corn chips in 2-quart casserole, spoon 1/2 beef mixture over chips. Place 1/2 cup beans over beef mixture. Sprinkle with 1 cup cheese. Add remaining beef mixture and remaining beans. Place remaining corn chips over top; sprinkle with remaining cheese. Bake in 350 degree oven 30 minutes. Uncover, bake 10 minutes longer.

SOUTHERN PECAN PIE

3 eggs
3/4 cup sugar
1 cup dark corn syrup
1/2 cup melted butter
1 cup pecan halves
1 tsp. vanilla
1 9-inch unbaked pastry shell
Beat eggs thoroughly with sugar, dash of salt, corn syrup, vanilla and butter; add pecans. Pour into pastry shell. Bake in 350 degree oven 50 minutes or until knife inserted in center comes out clean.

FRESH PEACH COBBLER

1/2 cup butter
1 cup all-purpose flour
2 tsp. baking powder
1 1/2 cups sugar
3/4 cup milk
4 or 5 large peaches
1/2 cup water
Melt butter in baking dish. Mix

flour, baking powder, 1 cup sugar and milk; pour into baking dish. Peel and slice peaches; arrange over batter. Sprinkle remaining 1/2 cup sugar over peaches. Pour water over peaches. Bake in preheated 350 degree oven 50 minutes.

MICHELLE'S CHOCO-PEANUT FUDGE

1 12 oz. pkg. semi-sweet chocolate pieces
1/2 cup smooth peanut butter
3 cups sifted confectioners' (powdered) sugar
1/2 cup milk

Melt chocolate pieces in top of double boiler over simmering water. Remove from heat. Blend in peanut butter, then beat in powdered sugar and milk until smooth. Spread in a buttered 8x8x2 pan. Chill at least 1/2 hour or until firm. Cut into 1-inch squares. Cover and store at room temperature.

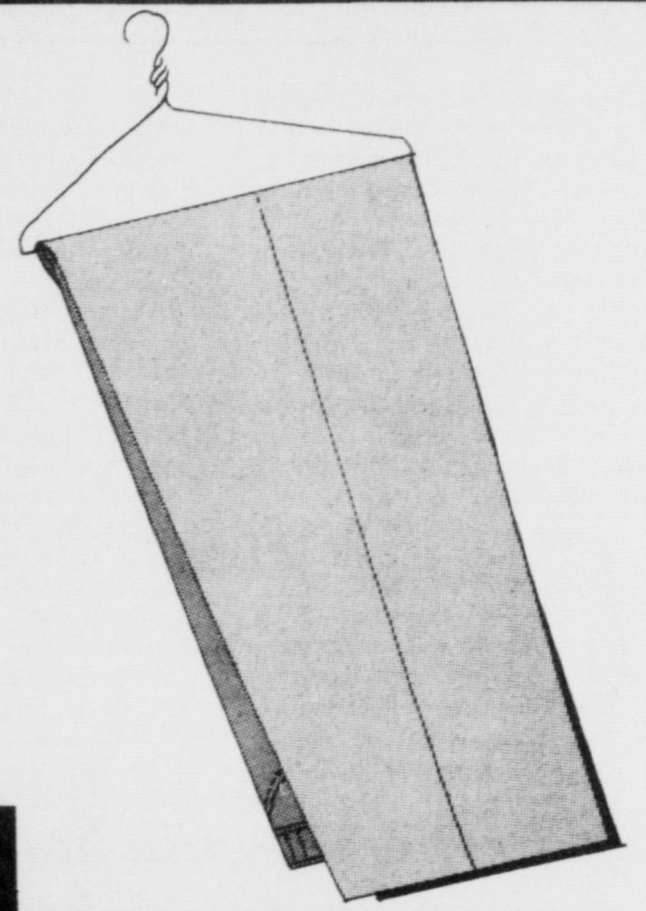

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Bermudagrass needs fertilizer

As temperatures begin to warm up, bermudagrass will begin to break dormancy. The first signs of this are seen when small shoots of green growth appear from underneath the dead brown grass on top. With this break in dormancy, coastal bermuda producers will need to fertilize their grass to give it a beginning growth boost.

I have been getting about 5 calls per day over the past week concerning fertilization of coastal. One such caller was Derold Choate of Wichita Falls. He has 70 acres of coastal and was wondering when would be a good time to begin spring applications of fertilizer.

Also, he needed some idea as to how much of what type fertilizer was

best. Just to be sure, I talked him into taking a soil test. This way he will have an accurate measure of the kind and amount of fertilizer his grass will need.

Producers not wishing to take a soil test need to remember that each ton of 12 percent crude protein forage contains approximately 40 pounds of nitrogen, 15 pounds of phosphorus, and 40 pounds of potassium in addition to secondary and micro nutrients.

Also, cattlemen need to keep in mind that approximately half of the annual forage supply for the beef cow should be 10 to 12 percent crude protein. The remaining portion can be 9 percent crude protein.

With this being the case, producers will need about 150 to 200 pounds of nitrogen, around 8 pounds of

phosphorus, and possibly 40 pounds of potassium per acre during the year to make enough high quality hay or produce enough grazing for a heavy stocking rate. Water during the growing season will also be necessary for good growth of coastal.

With this in mind, producers can apply an 80-80-40 rate of fertilizer in the spring time as growth begins, and then after each cutting or grazing period of 4 to 5 weeks, apply around 60 pounds of nitrogen per acre. This nitrogen can be applied in several forms, but ammonium nitrate(33-0-0) seems to take the hot weather of summer better and has the least amount of nitrogen loss to the air.

Producers should make some occasional checks on their coastal patches the next few weeks. In most years, the first application of fertilizer will need to be applied around mid-April.

We have soil testing information and also some pamphlets on coastal bermuda production. If these are needed, contact the County Extension Office at 766-0131.

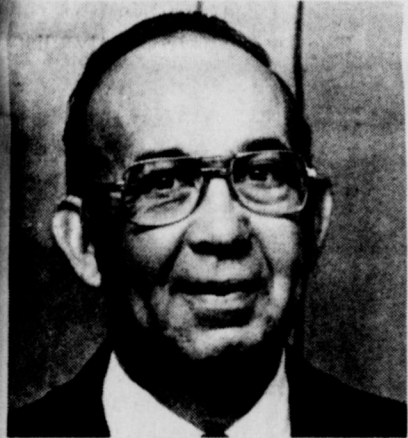

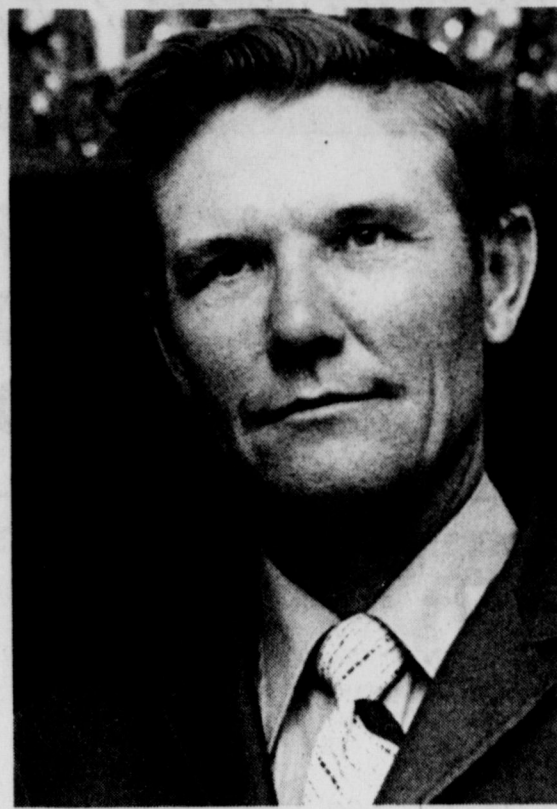

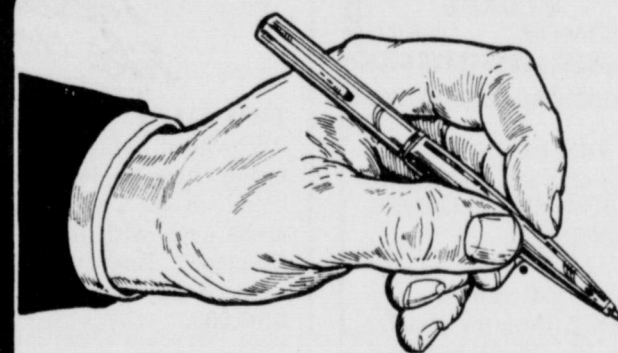
