As I See It....

Bless his heart, there should be more people in this country like 71-year-old Stephen Manhard of Foster City, Calif.

I read in a trade publication recently about the former proofreader, copywriter and advertising manager who has become a watchdog of the print media and founded the Society for the Preservation of English Language and Literature (SPELL).

Manhard likes to read, but when he finds a mistake in either spelling or grammar, he sends the publication a "goof card" pointing out the error.

Maybe someone ought to go him one step farther and have a similar program for the air media, radio and television.

I'm the first to point out the fact I must be one of the world's poorest spellers. But thank goodness, with a staff like we have here, very few of my goofs ever get into print.

In fact, I'm so proud of our newspaper and its lack of both spelling and grammatical errors, I've often thought of holding a contest to see who could find the most errors in an edition.

Granted, some mistakes do get into print. But I'd ask you to compare the Leader with most other newspapers. Including "Brand X" to the east.

Manhard is fed up with such errors as "it's" for "its," "their" for "there" and "between you and I" for "between you and me."

I cringe when I read or hear someone mix terms, such as referring to business as "they" and discussing something that happens somewhere else while using the term "come."

"The Ford Motor Company had a major increase in auto sales in February. They sold twice as many cars that month as they did the year before."

Ford Motor Company is a singular

term, "they" is plural.

"When you're in Dallas you should eat at Bill's. People who come there know they can get a good meal."

That would be fine if the speaker is in Bill's. But if the speaker is in Iowa Park, talking about Bill's in Dallas, the reference should be "people who go there..."

Some of the most common and flagrant errors which keep cropping up in the print and broadcast media, Manhard says, are:

* Misuse of personal pronouns -- "I, me, he, she, him, her, we, us" -- and the growing use of "myself" to avoid deciding whether to use "I" or "me";

* Misuse of apostrophes -- "it's" when it should be "its" and vice versa, and in plural words (ads reading "Tomato's 49c a lb.") and

* Confusion between homonyms such as "sight" for "site"; "tail" for "tale"; "capitol" for "capital"; "pedal" for "peddle" and "breaking" for "braking."

I see the same mistakes as the expert grammarian. And I feel as he, that the letdown is at home, in the school, and the runaway misuse of words in the print and air media.

I don't believe parents correct their children around the home. I don't believe non-English teachers support the English teachers, either on written works or oral usage. And I've already commented on what the media is lacking.

Every community should have a SPELL chapter. And I nominate Stephen Manhard as a saint of the English language. He is, "ain't" he?

Holiday sales taxes increase

Apparently reflecting a resurgence of oil field activity, Holliday's sales taxes are running 28.48 percent above the first four months of 1983, according to the state comptroller's

office. April's check of \$10,906.42 elevated the year's receipts to \$40,453.78, well above the \$31,377.42 received for the same period last year.

Lakeside City has received \$5362 so far, a 131.92 percent increase. Other Archer County cities showing increases are: Archer City, 22.18%; Windthorst, 18.56% and Scotland, 8.98%. Megargel is .21% less than this time last year.

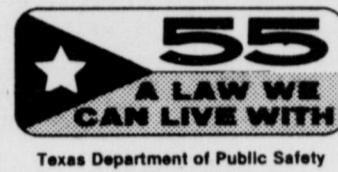

Cook of the Week

We are fortunate to have Paula (Mrs. Wayne) Evans for the Cook of the Week because she shares some of her good-sounding German recipes with us. She and her husband, who is a major and nurse in the Air Force, have recently returned from a four-year stay in Germany.

German foods have a tremendous influence on American cooking. The United States national favorite, the frankfurter, can be traced to the German sausage. Hamburger, a second United States favorite, was developed in Hamburg, Germany. Most German foods tend to be generally bland and are suitable to the American taste.

German lunches or dinners consist of several courses. Mrs. Evans said that she and her husband enjoyed eating in the restaurants where there was an elegant, formal atmosphere, the tables covered with linen cloths and set with fine china and silver.

Each region of Germany has its culinary specialties. Pork, fresh or cured, is the number one meat favorite and veal is second in popularity. The country has 300 different kinds of sausages, a wide assortment of variety meats, and different kinds of fish. Sauerkraut is typically German and other vegetables widely used are potatoes, cucumbers, asparagus, mushrooms and tomatoes.

The cakes and pastries of the country are unsurpassed, and the pastry shops offer a rich variety of fancy cakes; however, fresh fruit, a fruit compote, custard and pudding are popular desserts.

Many Germans eat five times a day. Breakfast is a hearty meal, and in midmorning a second breakfast is served. The noon dinner is the largest meal. In late afternoon coffee is served with little sandwiches, cakes or tarts, and a simple meal is served in the evening.

Mrs. Evans was graduated from Columbus, Ga. High School and received a degree in nursing from

Columbus College. While she and her husband were in Germany, she worked at the 97th General Hospital in Frankfurt. Her main hobby is aerobic dancing.

Paula and Wayne have a 10-month-old daughter, Sarah.

KALBSSCHNITZEL NATUR MIT CHAMPIGNONS UND RAHMSSOSE
[Veal with mushrooms and cream sauce]

6 veal cutlets, a little more than one pound each
1 pound fresh button mushrooms, simmered in butter, lard or vegetable oil
1 rounded teaspoon flour
1/2 pint sour cream
3 lemons
2 bunches parsley

Preheat oven 150. Wash and dry cutlets; pound ten times on each side with tenderizing hammer. Salt and pepper and squeeze lemon juice on both sides. Melt lard in pan and fry schnitzels until done; as they are done place in oven to keep warm. Just before last schnitzel is done, add

well-drained mushrooms and flour to pan, stirring flour well into melted lard so that it browns. Remove schnitzel from pan. Turn fire very low; stir sour cream into pan, stirring well to dissolve crust from bottom of pan. Bring to a simmer; the sauce will be very light brown. Place schnitzels on pre-warmed plates garnished with lemon wedges and parsley. Pour sauce with mushrooms over schnitzels.

WIENER SCHNITZEL
[Breaded Veal]

6 veal cutlets - 3/8" thick
2 eggs
3 cups bread crumbs
2 lemons
3 small firm tomatoes
2 bunches parsley

Wash and dry schnitzels. Pound about 10 times on each side with tenderizing hammer; salt and pepper both sides. Beat eggs in bowl, salt and pepper and beat well with fork.

Heat lard in pan. Dip schnitzel in egg on both sides, then in bread crumbs until thickly covered. Fry in pan on medium high heat. When outside is golden brown, reduce heat and continue frying until done. Garnish with tomato, lemon wedges and parsley.

KARTOFFEL SALAT
[Potato Salad]

3 lbs. potatoes
1 1/2 cups soup stock
1 large onion
4-6 strips bacon
1/2 cup salad oil (not olive oil)
2 tablespoons vinegar
Salt and pepper

Wash and cook potatoes until done but still firm. Peel and mince onion; fry bacon until crisp and drain. Peel potatoes while still warm and slice 1/8" thick. Add bacon, minced onion, oil and vinegar, hot soup stock, salt and pepper to taste. Let marinate one hour. Serve hot.

HAMMELFLEISCH MIT GRÜNEN BOHNEN
[Lamb with green beans]

2 1/2 lbs. tender lamb
6 strips bacon
1 medium onion
3 lbs. green snap beans or three #2 cans cut string beans
2 lbs. potatoes
4 tablespoons fresh savory, chopped
1 garlic clove

Wash meat and cut into 1" cubes. Cut bacon crosswise into 1" long strips; dice onion. Fry onion and bacon with garlic clove until brown; remove from pot. Discard garlic and fry lamb cubes until brown on all sides, adding lard if necessary; remove from fire. Peel potatoes and cut into large chunks. Clean beans and cut in 1/2 lengths. Add all ingredients to pot and add 1 1/2 pints cold water; bring to a boil. Cover and simmer slowly 1-1 1/2 hours. Salt and pepper to taste.

KARTOFFEL PUFFER
[Potato Pancakes]

2 lbs. large potatoes
1 onion
2 eggs
1 teaspoon salt
Lard or shortening to fry
Peel potatoes. Finely grate the potatoes and mix with other ingredients. Drop by spoonful into hot fat. Form thin cakes and fry until crisp.

RUDESHEIMER EIS-KAFFEE
[Schnap Ice Coffee]

Place 2 scoops of vanilla ice cream in tall coffee cup or glass; add 1 1/2-2 oz. brandy and fill cup/glass with cold sweetened coffee.

Top with whipped cream and sprinkled chocolate. Serve with a straw.

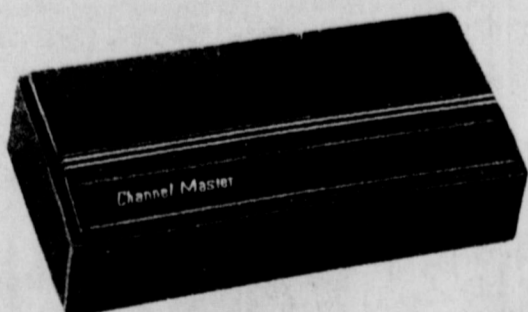

Holliday to apply for federal grant

The Holliday city council Monday entered into a contract with Governmental Services Agency of Dallas to handle an application for a Community Development Block Grant from the federal government.

Council members voted approval of the contract after discussing the issue with David Lewis, representative of the Dallas firm. Lewis is to submit a planning grant application.

Holliday thus seeks a share of the \$901,000 in block grant funds which will be available next year in the Nortex Regional Planning District area.

The Dallas firm has been successful in seeking grants for neighboring communities such as Electra and Vernon, Lewis said.

Also approved was a proposal to engage Kerry Maroney of Biggs and Mathews Engineering in Wichita Falls to handle various projects for Holliday. Maroney does similar work for Iowa Park.

He is to let bids for the city's sewer project, which are to be opened at 10 a.m. May 21 at the Biggs and Mathews office in Wichita Falls.

Maroney also recommended the city wait until next winter to hold an inspection on the new water tower. He explained the tower would have to be completely drained and reasoned

such an inspection should be done when water consumption is less than summer time. The council agreed.

Following an executive session, Mayor Mike Parker discussed hiring

of an animal control officer, who will be paid \$3.85 per hour. Names of applicants were not revealed.

Council members voted to increase water department employee Tony Wood's salary from \$3.75 to \$4 per hour.

Also approved were insurance premiums covering city structures, liability and vehicles.

Don Talley said the coverage of structures and liability would be \$2,560 for the coming year, up \$214 over last year. Vehicle insurance premium was increased \$529, to \$2,526.

During Mayor Parker's report, he said the annual rabies clinic will tentatively be held May 26 at city hall, where a \$1 fee for license and the vet's fee will be charged. He also reported the city was not funded this year for a community development grant, but mentioned Vernon had received \$25,000.

The mayor also reported Holliday's ambulance had answered 14 calls during April, and transported all 14 patients to hospitals.

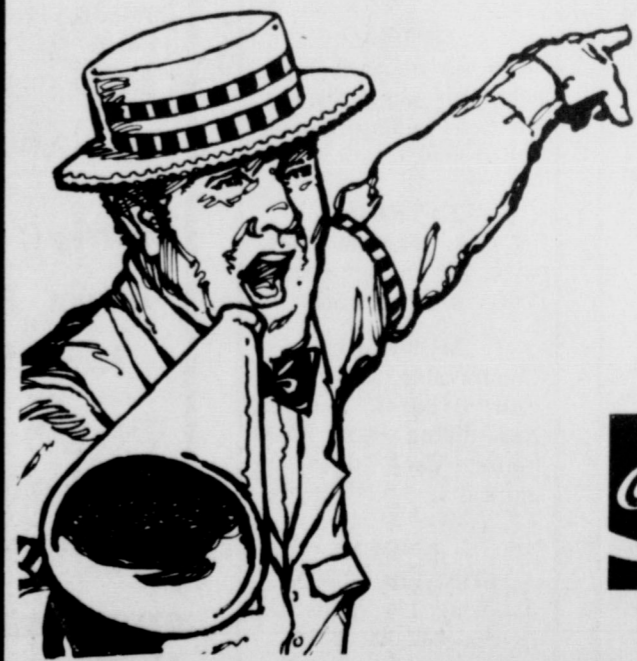

WORM CONTROL FOR GARDENS

There is no reason for allowing loopers and other worms to ravage the leaves on cabbage, cauliflower, broccoli, Brussels sprouts and other plants in the garden. Dipel dust, which is available in a one pound shaker can, is very effective in controlling worms.

Mrs. Betty Watson of Iowa Park, used Dipel dust for worm control in her garden, especially on the cabbage type plants. For some reason, cabbages tend to attract worms.

Dipel is a bacteria rather than a toxic chemical. The bacteria spreads a disease among the small worms giving control. There is no harvest restriction. This is a safe material causing no problems to the environment. The disease is not contagious to man.

Dusting once per week during the peak worm season enables Mrs. Watson to harvest cabbage heads free of insect damage.

There is an easier way to mesquite sprout control than carrying a 3 gallon sprayer around on ones back. The results are better too.

Four cc's of Velpar squirted at the base of a mesquite sprout gives good control. This chemical is metered in cc's which calls for carrying only a small quantity of chemical by the applicator.

Elwood Haynes of Punkin Center is treating about 20 acres of mesquite sprouts using Velpar. He carries only a gallon jug of chemical which is equipped with an automatic metering hand gun. Application is easy and fast.

The mode of action of Velpar is through the roots. Rainfall leaches the chemical into the soil where it is picked up by the mesquite roots. A good rain is needed before results can be seen.

AREA OIL & GAS NEWS

Wilbarger County's Fumner Field gained a new producer when J.N. Huber Corp. of Oklahoma City completed the No. 1-U Condon, five miles west of Doans.

The well indicated ability to pump at the rate of 30 barrels per day. It was taken to a 6,720-ft. bottom and will produce from a set of perforations in the Strawn formation, 6,435 to 6,438 feet into the wellbore.

The operation is in a 320-acre lease in the H&PC Survey, Sec. 22, Blk. 15. The well is 660 feet from the north line and 660 feet from the west line of the lease.

M.C. Kuykendall of Electra has filed for permit to drill the No. 14 T. Watt, a 2,700-ft. developmental well 16 miles south of Vernon. Location is in an 81-acre lease in the Wilbarger Regular Field, H&TCRR Survey.

The well is 330 feet from the east line and 800 feet from the north line of

the lease and 1,925 feet from the south line and 2,375 feet from the west line of the survey.


A 4,500-ft. developmental well is planned by Ken Ellis Oil Co. of Wichita Falls at a drillsite nine miles west of Kamay, Wilbarger County. The location is in an 89-acre lease in the H&TCRR Survey, Sec. 35, Blk. 6.

Well's designation is the No. 1 Anceil "X". It is in the Anceil Field.

The well is 530 feet from the north line and 330 feet from the east line of the lease and the survey.

An 8,600-ft. wildcat well is planned by Kadane Oil Co. of Wichita Falls at a drillsite six miles southwest of Chillicothe, Hardeman County.
