The regular plan, which is not for students who do not intend to enroll in college, will require 25 credits for graduation. Students graduating under this plan will not be prohibited

Postal rate going up; new stamp to be sold

For persons wishing to purchase the new 22-cent first class postage stamp that goes into effect Feb. 17, the new "D" series stamp will go on sale locally Monday.

According to Postmaster Ken Turman, letters weighing up to one ounce will be mailed with a 22-cent stamp beginning Feb. 17. An additional 17-cents will be required per ounce up to 12 ounces, above which the letter will be "priority mail" and will cost whatever the distance to the address is.

Postcards will be 14-cents and stamped envelopes will be 27-cents

First class postage is only part of the Postal Service's rate increases. Others include:

Insured Fees - minimum insured

(up to \$25), goes from 45-cents to 50-cents; \$50 from 85-cents to \$1.10; and the maximum insurance will be

Money Order Fees - Up to \$25, the fee is 75-cents. From \$25.01 to \$700, the fee is \$1. The maximum money order is raised from \$500 to \$700. Fees are actually lower than before for over \$50, Turman said.

Express Mail - Up to two pounds, \$10.75 delivered; \$8.60 from post office to post office, a service available only to certain larger post

Permit Mailings - regular thirdclass: Basic 12.5-cents, 5-Digit 10.1-cents; Car-Rt 8.3-cents; nonprofit: Basic 6-cents, 5-Digit 4.9-cents and Car-Rt 3.4-cents; yearly permit fee up from \$30 to \$50.







As I See It....

I'm going to suggest to Mayor Tim Hunter and the others who are planning the "think tank" session next Thursday that they have an alternate location for the meeting.

Everyone I've talked to has indicated an interest in the meeting and what can possibly come from it. If as many people attend, to voice their suggestions and awareness of need to improve our community, who have indicated they will, the city's council chambers meeting room won't be large enough.

There is a growing awareness of need to improve not only our image in the business community, but throughout the city as a whole.

What this think tank is for is to, first recognize our problems, secondly how they might be corrected, and third how to finance them.

Joe Thompson, publisher of the newspaper at Electra where work is underway for image improvement, made a point while speaking here this week that made real sense.

He said, "You can live in a town all your life. . . love it. . . and yet not be aware that its appearance is going down. It all happens so gradually that you don't see it as others do who don't live there."

He suggested we should all, with open minds, drive over our community and look at it as if we had never been here before, or at least had been away for many years. Look with a critical eye, comparing what you see with other communities you think are attractive.

Certainly, everyone is hoping the think tank session won't turn into a gripe session. Not all solutions offered will be workable, or maybe not adequate. But it's a starting place.

Business people here should have heard a speaker we listened to last week at the mid-winter meeting of the Texas Press Association.

A marketing and advertising expert, he suggested businesses should cater more to their customers. It was his suggestion that business people fix up their places, attractively, offering the idea that people don't entertain in a dirty, unkept home. So their businesses shouldn't be dirty or unkept.

He also made the point that the buying public has changed over the years, but most business habits haven't.

Coupling the Hawks' Friday night win and Vernon's loss, Iowa Park won the first half of Dist. 5-AAA play and is thus assured a place in the state playoffs.

And while the boys are doing well, the Hawkettes have made a complete turnaround and are undefeated through three games of their second half district schedule.

But the boys started off the second half of their schedule on the wrong foot, losing on their home court Tuesday to fast-improving Decatur, 50-60.

Two weeks ago, the Hawks beat the Eagles 49-42 in the Decatur gym. Incidentally, it was Decatur that aided Iowa Park's first-half win, because the Eagles shot down Vernon Friday night, 65-62.

Iowa Park hosts Vernon at 7:30 tomorrow night. The Hawks edged the Lions 57-56 at Vernon in the first round. Tuesday, the Hawks make their final scheduled road trip, to Springtown.

The Eagles jumped on the Hawks early, taking a 15-8 lead in the first quarter and then outscoring the hosts 16-9 in the second quarter to lead

31-17 at the half.

Coach Earnie Reusch's squad showed they could fight back, narrowing the score to 10 points, 31-41, with 1:05 remaining in the third period. But they fell behind by 16 in the fourth and could never get closer than 10 points.

Reusch told the players they were just not mentally ready to play Decatur.

Mark Copeland and Stephen Biddy led Hawk scorers with 14 each, and Joey Bates had 10.

Friday's game at Bridgeport was close through the first half, as the Hawks held only a 26-19 lead at the half. But they extended that to 42-29 by the end of the third quarter, and went on to win 58-45.

Bates had 20, Biddy 14 and Copeland 12.

HAWKETTES ROLLING

After winning their final first-half game Jan. 18 here against Springtown, the Hawkettes have been rolling.

They opened the second half schedule with a revenge win over Bowie, at Bowie, and Friday defeated Bridgeport 52-48 and Tuesday won 53-47 over Decatur.

Coach Teresa Beckham, who has taken over the duties of Ray Sefcik since his heart attack, said the Hawkettes' turnaround was primarily their realizing they hadn't been playing to their capability.

Decatur also led through the first half here Friday, 18-12 and 32-26. But Iowa Park came roaring back to lead 44-43 after the third period.

The Hawkettes assured their win when Lisa Selby scored six of the team's final seven points in the final five minutes, and the team fought back efforts by the visitors to narrow the score and win the game.

Holloway, who sank only two free shots, finished the game with 20 points. Selby had 12.

The Hawkette games here tomorrow and Tuesday at Springtown both start at 6 p.m.







Wichita 76th in production

The sale of crude oil and natural gas from Wichita County wells made an important contribution to the county's economy in 1983 and accounted for \$145-million of the \$38.3 billion wellhead value of Texas petroleum last year.

In its annual survey of the economic impact of oil and gas industry operations in the significant producing counties of Texas, Texas Mid-Continent Oil & Gas Association reported that the county ranked 76th among Texas' 254 counties on the basis of the value of its marketing petroleum production. The production figures included condensate and casinghead gas.

The county's wells produced 4.9-million barrels of crude oil, valued at \$144.5-million, and 228-billion cubic feet of natural gas, valued at \$512,984. Owners of royalty in the county received \$18.1-million as their share of the output, the Association

The chairman of the Association. J.C. Walter, Jr., of Houston, said: "These figures give evidence that again last year the petroleum industry was of great importance to the economies of those counties throughout the state with significant production.'

In addition to paying property taxes to cities, counties, and school districts, producers in the county supported state government through production tax payments estimated at \$6.7-million, according to the Association survey. Crude oil taxes amounted to \$6.6-million, while natural gas levies totaled \$38,474.

Based on Texas Employment Commission figures, some 4,100 oil and gas industry employees in the

county received wages of about \$94.6-million in 1983

In the search for new petroleum reserves in the county, oil and gas producers spent a reported \$75.6million in the drilling of 515 wells, including four wildcat, or exploratory wells. This effort resulted in the successful completion of 324 oil wells. although some \$28.1-million was lost in the drilling of 191 dry holes. As of April 1, 1984, there were 8,578 oil producing wells in the county.

Krick, Inc. of Texas, 748 Vella load, Palm Springs, California 92264 has filed an application with the Texas Department of Water Resources for a State permit to conduct weather modification operations to change or attempt to change the natural development of clouds for the purpose, objective, period and by the method summarized hereinbelow.

2. Irving P. Krick, Inc. of Texas has a valid Texas weather modification license that was issued in 1972 and renewed each subsequent year, most recently on October 9, 1984.

The purpose of the weather modification operation is to increase rainfall to affect and benefit rangeland and agricultural interests of the clients. The period of the permit is for one year from about March 1, 1985 with options for continuing the program during similar periods beginning about March 1 of 1986, 1987 and 1988.

4. The proposed weather modification operation is to be conducted for and on behalf of Cotton County Services, Inc. (Route 1, Randlett, Oklahoma 73562) and Comanche County Weather Modification Association. Inc. (Security Bank and Trust. 501 C Avenue, Lawton, Oklahoma 73501). The proposed weather modification operation is to be carried out in both an "operational area" and a "target area" to cause the intended effects to occur only in the target area. The operations area is that area described as the Texas counties of Archer. Baylor, Clay, Foard, Hardeman, Knox, Wichita and Wilbarger, as well as the Oklahoma counties of Caddo, Comanche, Cotton, Grady, Jackson, Jefferson, Kiowa, Stephens

The area to be affected by the proposed weather modification operation is the target area. The target area is that area described as the Oklahoma counties of Cotton. Tillman and Comanche

7. The methods and materials to be used in conducting this operation are summarized herein: a licensed cloud seeding meteorologist/technologist will use standard meteorological analyses, forecast techniques, observations, and plume dispersion models to initiate the release of the seeding particles, silver iodide crystals, from a network of ground-based genera-tors at a time calculated to affect the formation of cumuliform clouds. The Texas Water Commission shall, if requested by at least 25 persons hold a public hearing in the area where the operation is to be conducted prior to the issuance of a permit. No public hearing will be held on this application unless a request for a hearing is made within 30 days of the date of the first publication of this Notice.
