
Two County Schools Receive State Recognition

A telegram was received this week from the State Department of Education at Austin placing the Eula school of Callahan County on the list of a state acredited high school Eight units of affiliation were granted the school which will enable the district to maintain a nine months term and pay the superintendent on a twelve months basis in the future.

Plans are under way by the Eula school board to make the school a fully accredited school of sixteen credits by the close of the next school year. The district has an enrollment of 240 scholastics. Cottonwood school of this county

also received a certificate placing the school on the list of permanently accredited rural schools of the state.

Out of a total of eleven schools of Callahan County, six are accredited schools.

900,000 pounds of salvage and scrap for war materials during thel ast six months, according to C. F. Wilson, supervisor of stores. This figure 's a.iditional to the nundreds of thous. ond of pounds turned into production channels lest year.

M1. Wilson has been named by the War Production Board as administrotor of salvage and scrap for Lone Star Gas Company, Lone Star Gasoline Company, Community Natural Gas Company and Texas Citizens Gas Company.

Mr. Wilson's responsibility is to see that materials, obsolete or otherwise not serviceable, are gathered throughout the various Lone Star System companies and sent to junk dealers so the materials can reach war production mills as soon as possible. These items include iron, steel nonferrous scrap metals, and rags, paper, fittings, valves, stoves, ranges etc. The salvage is sold only to authorized dealers, and the materials ore delivered to dealers by the local company oficers.

"While we have never allowed our scrap moterials to accumulate over a long period," Mr. Wilson said, "we are making a special effort to get present scrap to war production plants immediotely. All of ou remployees are constantly on the alert to cooperate with the WPB in the war salvage campaign."

Schooling of Texas children m suffer heavily if gasoline is tended to Texas.

That's the conclusion to be dra from study of a school tax surv just recived here. The survey, co piled from reports of independe school districts and official sta records, show that last year 1 troleum and its products bore perc ent, of virtually two-fifths the total cost of schooling Tex boys and girls.

Or o put it another way, two o of every five Texas school childr were educated last year throus taxes on the Texas petroleum indu try and on gasoline. A otal of 604 000 Texas boys and girls out of th stat6e's scholasti6c po6pulation 1,539,006 had their entire school e penses paid by petroleum and pet leum product taxes last year.

The report, compiled by Texa Mid-Continent Oil and Gas Asso ciation statisticians from figures of tained from independent school dis trict tax collecors and from stat officials, shows \$91,754,249 we spent for educating Texas school children last year. Of this amoun \$23,254,172 was paid by the Texa petroleum industry in State and le cal taxes used for school purpose An additonal \$12,384,568 was pa for chools in gasoline taxes by in dividual Dexas motorists, makin a total of nearly \$36,000,000 from petroleum and its principal produc Not only gasilene toxes but als oil taxes would be seriously affect ted by rationing, it was pointed ou as Texas oil output would drop eve lower if the farket for Texas gase line were cut further.

Of the average per-pupil school cost of \$59.62, oil and oil produc taxes paid \$23.25.

Instead of wating until the last two or three weeks of servation practices, work should be completed in plenty of TIME to earn maximum payments this year, Mr. Farmer explained.

Practical conservation practices which may be carried out during the next few weeks include terracing, furrowing, contouring, building tanks and reservoirs and planting nonlegumious green manure or cover crops.

Failure of Callahan county farmers to carry out extensive soil-build ing practices not only will result in loss of soil fertility but will seriously hinder food and feed production in the war program.

"Conservation aways has been a sound forming policy. This year it's a wartime necessity," the Chairman said.
