County Pioneers Reunion Will Not be Held This Year

At a meeting of the officers of the Callahan County Pioneers' Association held at the court house Friday afternoon of last week it was decided to not hold the annual reunion this year, due to war emergency, many old settlers possible not being able to attend due tire shortage.

The reunion of Belle Plain College Ex-Students is also deferred for this year—the two reunions being held jointly.

Roy Kendrick, president of the Association, presided; W. P. Brightwell, vice-president, was also present.

Mrs. L. L. Blackburn urged that while it was deemed best to defer the reunion that all give some thought and attention to the museum of pioneer days. This museum is located in the County Library and all citizens are urged to contribute to it—either gifts of relics of pioneer days or loan them to the museum. The relics are displayed in a glass case which is kept locked. Bring household furniture, old dishes, branding irons, etc.

Allred Asks Home Folks To Aid In Soldier Voting

James V. Allred, candidate for United States senator, has appealed to the families and friends of service men in every county in Texas to inform them of their right to vote in the party primary and to make that right effective.

Texans in the armed forces of the nation this year can maintain a voice in the operation of their government," Former Governor Allred declared.

The State Democratic Committee after hearing arguments from Allred and others, has adopted a resolution permitting our soldiers to vote.

The next step, Allred observed, is to see that the service men know of that right and that the correct procedure is followed. Those on the home front must aid in doing this part of the job, he said.

Service men must write their county clerk at home, asking for an absentee ballot, the letter accompanied by a poll tax receipt or affidavit that the poll tax was paid. The ballot must be filled out in the presence of a notary or summary court officer or adjutant and returned to the county clerk. Period for absentee voting in the July 23 primary is July 5-22, or not more than 20 nor less than three days before the election.

WILLIAM STEAKLEY APPOINTED TO CIVIL SERVICE JOB

William L. Steakley of Oplin, who has been employed at the South Houston NYA War Work Center shops, recently was appointed by the Civil Service Commission to Ellington Field near Houston, as an airplane mechanic at \$125 a month, according to information received here this week.

Steakley applied for NYA work through the United States Employment Service, which agency later assisted in placing him with the Field. He was assigned to the South Houston NYA Center where he obtained work experience in the shops and attended related information and training classes taught by instructors furnished through the Pasadena Public Schools and the State Board for Vocational Education.

Boyce House Opposes Pensions For Legislators

Big Spring, July 9—Opposition to pension for State legislators was expressed today by Boyce House, Tarrant County newspaperman, who is a candidate for Lieutenant Governor.

"Public office should not be regarded as a private snap", said House. "The public owes no special consideration to a man just because he has been elected to the State Senate."

"A Senator should realize that the people have the power to turn him out in any election and if a man doesn't wish to take this risk, he shouldn't run for office. Senators are paid by the public for their services and when their terms end, the taxpayers owe them nothing more."

"I am opposed to pensions for State legislators."

Two County Schools Receive State Recognition

A telegram was received this week from the State Department of Education at Austin placing the Eula school of Callahan County on the list of a state accredited high school.

Eight units of affiliation were granted the school which will enable the district to maintain a nine months term and pay the superintendent on a twelve months basis in the future.

Plans are under way by the Eula school board to make the school a fully accredited school of sixteen credits by the close of the next school year. The district has an enrollment of 240 scholastics.

Cottonwood school of this county also received a certificate placing the school on the list of permanently accredited rural schools of the state.

Out of a total of eleven schools of Callahan County, six are accredited schools.

Lone Star Gas Co. Collects Salvage

900,000 pounds of salvage and scrap for war materials during the last six months, according to C. F. Wilson, supervisor of stores. This figure is additional to the hundreds of thousands of pounds turned into production channels last year.

Mr. Wilson has been named by the War Production Board as administrator of salvage and scrap for Lone Star Gas Company, Lone Star Gasoline Company, Community Natural Gas Company and Texas Citizens Gas Company.

Mr. Wilson's responsibility is to see that materials, obsolete or otherwise not serviceable, are gathered throughout the various Lone Star System companies and sent to junk dealers so the materials can reach war production mills as soon as possible. These items include iron, steel nonferrous scrap metals, and rags, paper, fittings, valves, stoves, ranges etc. The salvage is sold only to authorized dealers, and the materials are delivered to dealers by the local company officers.

"While we have never allowed our scrap materials to accumulate over a long period," Mr. Wilson said, "we are making a special effort to get present scrap to war production plants immediately. All of our employees are constantly on the alert to cooperate with the WPB in the war salvage campaign."

Gasoline Rationing Will Affect School Funds

Schooling of Texas children may suffer heavily if gasoline is rationed to Texas.

That's the conclusion to be drawn from study of a school tax survey just received here. The survey, compiled from reports of independent school districts and official state records, show that last year 1,539,006 had their entire school expenses paid by petroleum and petroleum product taxes last year.

The report, compiled by Texas Mid-Continent Oil and Gas Association statisticians from figures obtained from independent school district tax collectors and from state officials, shows \$91,754,249 was spent for educating Texas school children last year. Of this amount \$23,254,172 was paid by the Texas petroleum industry in State and local taxes used for school purposes. An additional \$12,384,568 was paid for schools in gasoline taxes by individual Texas motorists, making a total of nearly \$36,000,000 from petroleum and its principal products. Not only gasoline taxes but also oil taxes would be seriously affected by rationing, it was pointed out as Texas oil output would drop even lower if the market for Texas gasoline were cut further.

Of the average per-pupil school cost of \$59.62, oil and oil product taxes paid \$23.25.

Revenue from these sources have aided the State Tax Board to cut the State school ad valorem tax rate to its present 16 cents, less than half its constitutional maximum of 35 cents per \$100 valuation.

While oil and oil products bear two fifths of the cost of Texas public schools, they pay an even larger part of general state taxes. Last year, the Texas Mid-Continent report shows, the Texas petroleum industry paid 55 per cent, or well over half, of all State business on property taxes. If sales taxes are included, petroleum and its product bore 62 per cent, or close to two thirds, of all State taxes.

Drivers License Must Be Renewed

All Texas Operator's License that have not been renewed since October, 1941, must be renewed by November 1, 1942. All those who fail to renew their license will have to stand an examination by a Driver's License Examiner before they can obtain a new license.

These license may be renewed at the Sheriff's office in Baird, or by Mike Cook in Cross Plains.

Due to the fact that there is a shortage at the present time of Driver's License Examiners, there will not be an examiner here in Baird until some graduates can take over and that will be for about a month.

Those of you who wish to get new driver's license, commercial operator's, or chauffeur's license, or have commercial operator's or chauffeur's license renewed can go to the Driver's License Examiner in Coleman or in Abilene until we get an examiner here. You will be notified when we can take care of this.

Bascom Giles Makes Formal Announcement

Bascom Giles, Commissioner of the General Land Office, made his formal announcement yesterday for re-election. In reporting on his conduct of that important constitutional state office, he pledged continued honest, efficient, and faithful service to the people.

Soon after becoming Commissioner of the General Land Office, Mr. Giles submitted a number of recommendations to the Legislature that he had advocated in his campaign, which body put his recommendations into law. His outstanding accomplishments are the passage and administration of a law which ended vacancy racketeering and title clouding and gave the good-faith claimant or home owner, a prior right to purchase the land when a vacancy is discovered; and the creation of the School Land Board to administer the public school lands of Texas. Commissioner Giles is chairman of this board and a member of the Board for Lease of University Lands; throughout his service there has not been a dissenting vote on either board. He has served on the School Land Board with two Texas governors and one attorney general.

Commissioner Giles secured the passage of a law to increase the down payment on new purchases of school lands from one-fortieth to one fifth. Another law he advocated was the extension until 1951, of the payment of principal on lands that had been previously sold, thus assuring the school fund a long-time steady income. The laws passed on his recommendations have made it possible for Commissioner Giles to increase the Public School Fund to more than \$75,000,000.

Commissioner Giles has compiled new state abstract volumes for publication, the first time since 1878; and instead of 62 cumbersome volumes, the 406,000 titles are compiled into eight compact volumes, each one complete for a district of the state.

Commissioner Giles said that he had received hundreds of highly complimentary letters commending him for the prompt and efficient service being rendered by the General Land Office which, he said, is in a large measure due to the efforts and ability of his employees. "I invite you who have not done business with the Land Office during my administration to ask any of the 200,000 who have as to the character of service we are rendering," Commissioner Giles said.

COTTON INSECT CONTROL—

Many Cotton raisers in Callahan County are planning to dust their cotton to control insects very soon and many would like to dust but have no machinery. This machinery can be purchased and is available in this section.

J. C. Shockey, County Agriculture Agent of the A and M College Extension Service says that before any dusting is done the producer should be sure that the insects are present in the cotton. Four community-wide Demonstrations in the control of cotton insects have been given by the Callahan Agent in the past two weeks and he suggests that any other communities wanting this demonstration should contact him soon.

In making examinations for the fleahopper the producer should begin when cotton is old enough to produce squares. Five points should be used to make the examination in the field. The producer can either examine 100 terminal buds at each of the 5 points or make 100 sweeps with a net at these designated places.

If 15 to 25 fleahoppers are found in either case, the cotton should be dusted with finely ground sulphur using 12 to 15 pounds per acre.

The dusting should be continued every 7 days as long as the infestation is this heavy. The net is made by using a broom handle 2 1-2 feet long attached to a stiff wire loop 16 inches in diameter. A funnel shaped bag of dork colored cloth 24 to 30 inches deep should be attached to the wire loop.

The Fleahopper is a very small light brownish, green insect and very hard to distinguish without catching.

In examining cotton for the Boll Weevil, locate points in the field as for the fleahopper and examine 100 squares on consecutive plants and if 10 squares are punctured in this 100 examined, the cotton should be dusted with Calicum Arsenate, using 4 to 6 pounds per acre.

If both Sulphur and Calicum Arsenate is used, mix one part Arsenate to two parts sulphur and dust 12 to 15 pounds per acre. All dusting should be done when the wind is not blowing.

The Boll Weevil and Fleahopper are enemies of the cotton plant that if controlled will enable the Cotton Producers to make more cotton to supply our Armed forces with Oil and many other materials.

News From AAA Office

There are fourteen reporters in the field checking compliance and all soil-building practices, starting July 1st, J. Lester Farmer, Chairman Callahan County AAA Committee, and this week, Callahan Co. farmers will have three times more money for soil-building work this year than in 1941.

The soil-building allowance for the county under the 1942 program is approximately \$33,162, as compared with \$26,451 under last year's program. Shifting a portion of AAA payments, which formerly were made for seeding within special allotments accounts for the increase.

Shortage of labor, equipment and machinery probably can be off-set if conservation practices are started earlier than usual. Instead of waiting until the last two or three weeks of the program year to carry out conservation practices, work should be completed in plenty of TIME to earn maximum payments this year, Mr. Farmer explained.

Practical conservation practices which may be carried out during the next few weeks include terracing, furrowing, contouring, building tanks and reservoirs and planting non-leguminous green manure or cover crops.

Failure of Callahan county farmers to carry out extensive soil-building practices not only will result in loss of soil fertility but will seriously hinder food and feed production in the war program.

"Conservation always has been a sound farming policy. This year it's a wartime necessity," the Chairman said.

FARM THE CONSERVATIVE WAY

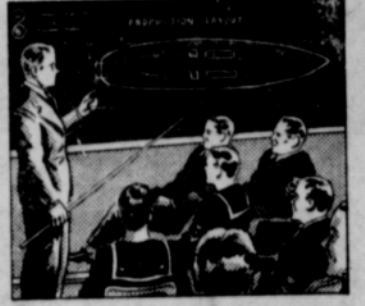
