Limping Hawks gear up for improving Indians

The Hawk coaching staff has been shuffling players all week in preparation for tomorrow night's game at Haskell, which will be the final non-conference contest of the schedule.

While the coaches are filling slots opened by injuries, they're concerned about the Indians who appear to be improving as the season progresses and apparently have an explosive team similar to Stamford.

He will be a question mark to see action.

Tackle Charles Perry has seen action only on offense since the season opener, when he injured a foot. And another senior, Kendall Hill, has not been in uniform since the Breckenridge contest, sidelined with a back injury.

Haskell's Indians have shown improvement as the season progressed. They lost the first two games to powerhouses Munday, 2-20, and Electra, 0-37, before defeating Seymour 20-7 and Quanah 21-13.

That win over Seymour caught the Hawk coaches' eyes after Friday night's 7-6 win over tough Holliday, because the Eagles gave the Hawks all they could handle in the first half of their game.

Haskell is not a large team, physically, but is quick and mixes its offense with both runs and passing. Only one player on the roster is listed above 195 pounds, and that's tackle

Joseph Perez, 228.

Workhorse of the Indian backfield is fullback Robert Ivey, who uses his 185 pounds to good advantage.

HAWKS RATED

While the undefeated Hawks are still not rated among the top 10 AAA teams in the state by the Associated Press, the Harris Rating Report had them in a tie for third place last week.

Harris rates Daingerfield tops with a power rating of 176, and Littlefield second at 169. Then comes Iowa Park, Navasota, Kermit, Crockett and Vernon, all at 165, with Gladewater, Sweeny and Midlothian rounding out the top 10 at 163.

Local musician selected for All-American Band

Phillip Clements is not only the first from Iowa Park, but the first from the entire north Texas area to be named to the McDonald's All-American High School Band.

The 17-year-old senior, who was born the first year the honor band was organized, was notified by Western Union Saturday, and public announcement was made by Warren Boone, owner and operator of McDonald's restaurants in Wichita Falls.

He is one of two high school musicians from Texas selected for this year's band, and will play the sousaphone.

His friends will have an opportunity to see him on television, if they look closely. The band's first appearance will be in the nationally televised Macy's Thanksgiving Day Parade in New York City, then the Fiesta Bowl Parade Dec. 29 in Phoenix, and on New Year's Day, the Tournament of Roses Parade in Pasadena, Calif.

The All-American Band was made up of outstanding young musicians. The band consists of 105 students, two from each state and the District of Columbia, plus one member each from the Virgin Islands, Puerto Rico and Guam.

Members are selected from thousands of nominees, on the basis of a recorded performance and personal background, by a panel of distinguished music educators.

Phillip, son of Mrs. Francine Clements, began studying music in the sixth grade, playing the alto saxophone. He switched to the tuba in junior high.

City's meeting agenda could be a marathon

Monday's meeting of the city council could be a lengthy marathon, with 16 items listed on the agenda, but the school board meeting slated Tuesday will apparently be brief.

Highlighting the council meeting, which is to begin at 7 p.m. in council chambers, are resolutions dealing with the demolition of the burned-out building in the 100 block of west Cash and another which would allow Cryovac to remain outside the city yet make payments in lieu of taxes.

ORDINANCES:

* Amending the code to provide for an increased fee for examination to qualify for an electrician in the city;

* Amending the electrical code to allow romax in apartment houses;

* Adopting "updated service credit" for employees participating in the Texas Municipal Retirement System;

* Abandoning a 15-foot strip of right of way adjoining the east side of Block 60, original townsite.

RESOLUTIONS:

* Ordering the demolition of a structure in the downtown business district formerly known as "Jim's Market";

* Authorizing the city administrator to enter into an agreement with the city of Wichita Falls to retain the services of Fred Ray Mount to dispose of the bodies of dead animals within the city of Iowa Park;

* Authorizing the mayor to enter into an agreement with Cryovac for designation as an industrial district, non-annexation, payment in lieu of

taxes, and contracted water rates.

CONSIDER BIDS:

* A bid for the purchase of a fire truck;

* Bids on a used EMCO trash truck;

* Authorizing city administrator to advertise for bids for the sale of the property north of city hall;

* Authorizing city administrator to advertise for bids for the purchase of a police car for delivery during January, 1985;

* Authorizing city administrator to request proposals for comprehensive insurance.

ADMINISTRATOR'S REPORT:

* Report on Mainstreet teleconference at MSU on Sept. 18;

* Discuss priorities for street improvements to be performed under terms of the interlocal agreement with Wichita County;

* Discuss the franchise agreement with the Cable TV company;

* Authorize the city administrator to enter into a maintenance agreement with CPS for computer hardware.

SCHOOL BOARD

School trustees, when they meet at 7:30 p.m. Tuesday in the administration building, will discuss a proposal to change the election policy from voting for members at large to voting by place.

* Will consider bids for the sale of lots owned by the school for Building Trades class projects.

Additionally, proposals for correcting problems of the track in Hawk Stadium will be discussed, as well as a report by Supt. Harold Cowley on last weekend's Texas Association of School Boards meeting.

Grocery store closed, sold

Mike's Thriftway Store was closed to business Monday morning, and apparently is in the process of being sold.

A letter of "Bulk Transfer Notice" was received by numerous supply and sales businesses yesterday from the Wichita Falls law firm of Short and Martin, announcing the pending transaction.

Owner Mike Robertson said Monday morning he was closing the store for "a complete remodeling and restocking" and would be open again in about two weeks.

However, the notice, written by

Bruce Martin, said B&R Supermarket, Inc. of Tulsa was in the process of purchasing the business, which was formerly White's Auto Store and later White's Super Store.

A "schedule of property and list of creditors can be inspected at the Law Offices of Short & Martin, 1105 9th Street, Wichita Falls," stated Martin.

"The estimated total of the seller's debts is \$74,799.72," according to the notice. "The transfer is made in an attempt to pay existing debts and said debts are shown in the Bulk Transfer Notice."

They described the wheat fields around Soochow and told how the grain was harvested by antiquated methods, according to methods in this country. They said that people were not interested in modern machinery because it would deprive so many people of work.

The tourists visited one commune, the Children's Palace for talented children, a silk factory, visited hospitals and saw how acupuncture was given to one patient. They found the museums in Shanghai of fascinating interest and were impressed with Quilin in its dramatic setting and Canton on the Pearl River.

Mrs. James and Mrs. Smith described Hong Kong as a tourist paradise. After eating Chinese food they were delighted to find a McDonald's Restaurant and feast on a hamburger served American style. They also had suits fitted and custom made while they were there.

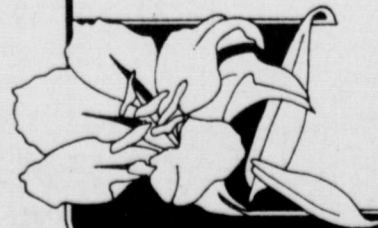

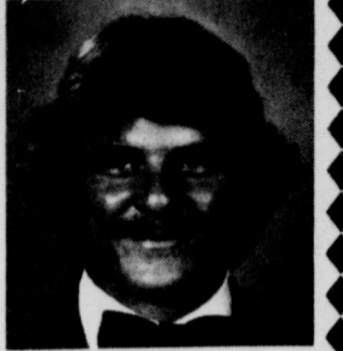
Concluding the speaker said, "Prayer will enable God to unlock the spiritual realm - the only power that can save the human race from

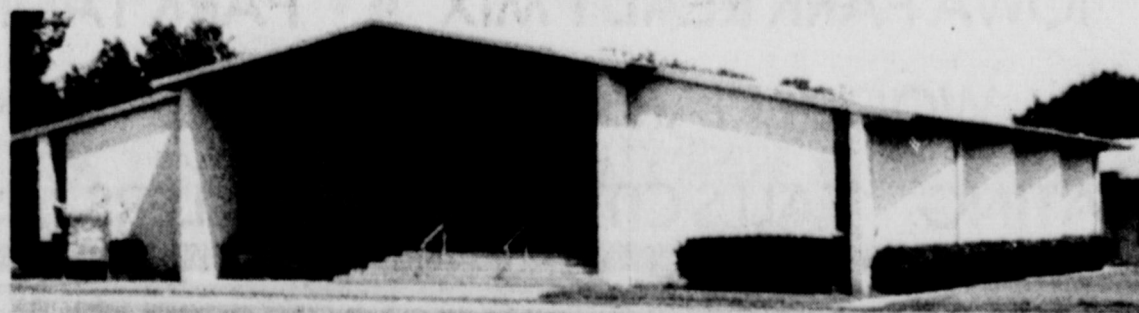
