Hawks to regional after long absence

After a 29-year absence, Iowa Park's Hawk basketball team will be playing in the regional tournament.

Coach Earnie Reusch will lead his Dist. 5-AAA champs into the coliseum at Texas Tech Univ. in Lubbock tomorrow evening, where they will meet the Seminole Indians at 7.

Not since 1956 has Iowa Park had a team in the regional. The Hawks, with starters Doug James, Harvey Klinkerman, Thurman Payton, Randall Price and David Sewell, made it all the way to Denton that year, but lost on the first game.

The other two Class AAA teams in the tournament this year are Dimmitt and Gatesville. Class AA teams are also having their regional tourney this week in the same gymnasium.

Seminole and Dimmitt are perennials at the regional, and both have won state championships.

The Indians defeated Floydada Tuesday in the area game, 90-48, to

extend their season record to 28-2. Iowa Park stands at 19-9. Coach George Byerly moved this year to Seminole from Snyder.

Seminole, starting four seniors and a junior, lost in bi-district the past two years. The Indians won state in 1979, and the following year lost to the eventual state champ, Abernathy, at the regional.

Dimmitt, 22-9, meets Gainesville, 20-8, at 8:30 tomorrow evening. Dimmitt defeated Brownfield 66-37 in the area game Tuesday to advance to the regional, while Gatesville dumped Decatur 61-53.

Dimmitt's Bobcats won the state championship in 1982 and '83, but last year lost by two points in Austin to the eventual champion. That team two years ago had a perfect 38-0 record and four players named to the all-state team.

Seminole's two losses were to Waco High and a lone conference setback to Slaton. Terry Bailey, tallest player on

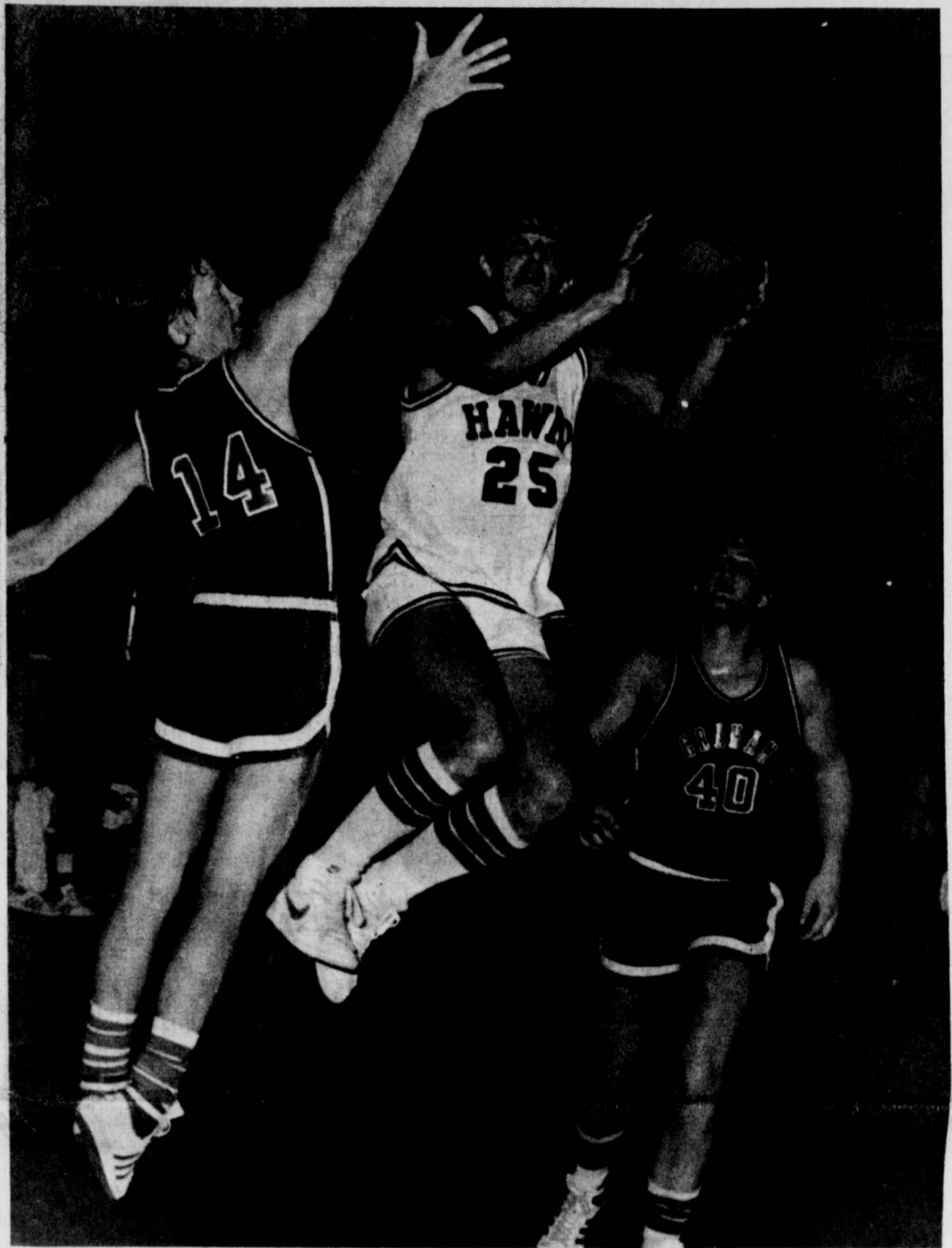
the team, racked up 32 points in the Indians' win Tuesday over Floydada.

The Hawks count primarily on their defense, and have established a record of winning close games. That is apparent by the fact they are averaging 55.6 points per game, while giving up an average of 53.9.

Tech's coliseum is located immediately west of its football stadium, separated by a large parking lot. For those fans unfamiliar with Lubbock, the easiest route to the campus, when entering from the east, is to take the loop north, exit on University Avenue, turning south and continuing that direction until they reach the stadium.

Ticket price information was not available yesterday, according to Bob Dawson, IPHS principal.

The Class AAA championship game will be played at 3 p.m. Saturday between the winners of Friday's two games.

City sales tax tops in county

Sales tax receipts took a big jump in January, according to a report from the state comptroller's office. Iowa Park's check of \$17,579.95 was some \$4,500 greater than the check for the same period last year. For the year, the city has received 27.11 percent more money than the first two checks received in 1984: \$27,846.93 as compared with

\$21,907.21. Compared with the other communities of the county, Iowa Park is experiencing the greatest gain. Wichita Falls is a plus 8.85 percent over 1984, Burkburnett plus 6.32, and Electra is a minus 6.17 percent. February checks represent taxes collected on sales made in December and the fourth quarter, and reported to the comptroller's office by Jan. 20.

Iowa Park wins bi-district, area

WARNING: If you have a weak heart, can't stand excitement and loud noise, Iowa Park Hawk basketball games are not recommended for your health. Talk about close! Just check the last three games of the Hawks. They beat Decatur in the district championship playoff, 64-60. . . but in a triple overtime.

Thursday, they won bi-district by defeating Graham 45-41. But there was only a one-point difference with 12 seconds remaining on the clock, when Graham missed a free shot that would have tied the score.

Then Tuesday, they edged Lampasas in the area playoff, 51-50, but the Badgers missed a free shot that would have tied the score with 12 seconds remaining in the game, and then missed a field goal attempt in the final three seconds.

The Hawks took on Lampasas Tuesday night in Mineral Wells' Ram Dome for the area title and a ticket to this weekend's regional tourney at Lubbock. Long known for its noise level, the Dome lived up to its reputation with large crowds supporting both teams. The fans kept up their noise because the lead changed hands or the score was tied with almost every field goal sunk.

Lampasas center Darren Wilkinson, who scored 17 points in the game, gave the Badgers a 47-43 lead with 2:24 remaining in the game. But Ray Sefcik sank three free shots and Mark Copeland a layup to put the Hawks ahead 48-47 at the 1:41 mark.

The lead was extended to 50-47 on a pair of Van Hedrick's free shots with 44 seconds remaining, but that was narrowed to one point 10 seconds later. Stephen Bidy slowed down the game at that point, and drew a foul with 17 seconds on the clock, sinking the first but missing the second, for a 51-49 lead.

Lampasas quickly took the ball down court, where under the basket Joey Bates slipped and fell underneath a Badger with the ball, giving the player a pair of shots from the charity line. With 12 seconds showing on the clock, he hit the first, but missed the second, making the score 51-50.

Copeland was then fouled, but missed his attempt with nine seconds remaining. Lampasas got off a shot just inside the center line. The ball was short and caught by another Badger. But before he could get the ball off, the final buzzer sounded.

The Badgers led at the end of each quarter, 12-9, 26-24, and 36-35. So intense was Iowa Park in its defensive play, Steve Johnson was charged with fouling a Badger who was attempting a shot from outside the center line at the end of the first half.

Bates brought cheers from Hawk fans in the second quarter, when he caught an offensive rebound, fell over a Badger's leg, landed on his back in the free shot lane, and put the ball through the hoop from his prone position.

Bates and Jerry Allen led Hawk scoring with 14 points each. Sefcik had 10, Bidy five, Copeland four, and Hedrick and Scott Young two each. **GRAHAM GAME**

"We finally broke the ice on bi-district," beamed Coach Reusch after the final buzzer sounded Thursday evening at Hirschi High gymnasium, where the bi-district contest with Graham was played. He felt it was significant, because his teams of 1981 and '83 had made it no further than bi-district.

Trailing 20-21 as the second half started, the Hawk defense set to work stealing the ball so often, the Steers seldom got the ball over the center line.

And when the period ended, Iowa Park held a 40-28 lead, having outscored Graham 20-7. But that's when it got interesting. The Hawks started missing shots, turning the ball over and drawing

fouls, and with 3:33 remaining in the game, Graham trailed by only three points. From 1:22 until 41 seconds showing on the clock, Hedrick, Bidy and Allen missed opportunities to score six points at the foul line, and came away empty handed.

Graham sank two free shots in the following 34 seconds to narrow the margin to 42-41, and could have tied the score twice but missed the second attempts on two trips to the line.

Bates got the rebound after the second miss, and was immediately fouled. He calmly sank both with seven seconds showing on the clock. Graham called time out with four seconds remaining, and when the Steers started to put the ball back in play, Bates tipped it into Hedrick's hands.

The senior guard was fouled, and sank his first shot to give Iowa Park the final lead, 45-41, with one second remaining. Bates finished with 12 points, Sefcik 10, Allen eight, Hedrick seven, Copeland four and Bidy and Young two apiece.

The victory gave Iowa Park a 3-1 record over Graham this season.

Mrs. David (Diane) Robnett filed last week as a candidate for the city council. A newcomer to city politics, she joins incumbents Johnny Coker and George Hammonds on the April 6 ballot.

Bob Goodknight, an unsuccessful candidate for the school board in the past, filed yesterday for place three on the board.

She said the author, an American who married an Englishman and lived in England, was inspired to write the poem in memory of the Battle of

Dunkerque and as a tribute to British heroism. She said also that Susan, the young woman in the story, could well have been the author because she was an American, married an Englishman, lived in England and lost her husband during World War I. When her only son marched off to war during World War II, she questioned whether England was worth the sacrifices.

Miss Kidwell described the poem as a whole as a remarkable picture of England and the English spirit seen through American eyes. She summarized with, "It brings vividly to us the fact that we are bound to England—we adore the stamina and courage of English people; we are proud of our English ancestry; and we will always be there to defend our mother country."

The program was climaxed with a slide presentation, "A Recent View of England," shown by Mrs. Erwin Soell. They were taken during the summer of 1984 when she and Dr. Soell went to Birmingham, England to attend the International Rotary Convention and later toured places of interest throughout the country.

The social hour featured an old-fashioned tea party. Members sat at tables appointed with Wedgwood china, decorations typical of England and napkins brought back from the mother country. With their tea, they

were served scones, other English foods, and desserts of cookies and candy purchased in England.

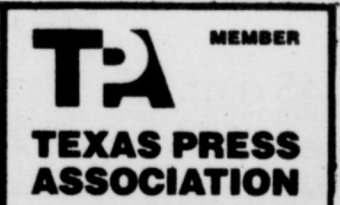

FmHA adding to staff to handle loan processing

The Farmers Home Administration will hire additional temporary employees to help process farm loan applications in Texas FmHA State Director J. Lynn Futch said this week.

"The new temporary employees will include both loan specialists and clerical staff."

"We will begin hiring the extra staff immediately," Futch said. "The new employees will be temporary. They will serve for four months to help with the seasonal loan peak and to process loans for hundreds of farmers who have requested a review of their debt situation to see if they qualify for the new debt restructuring program."

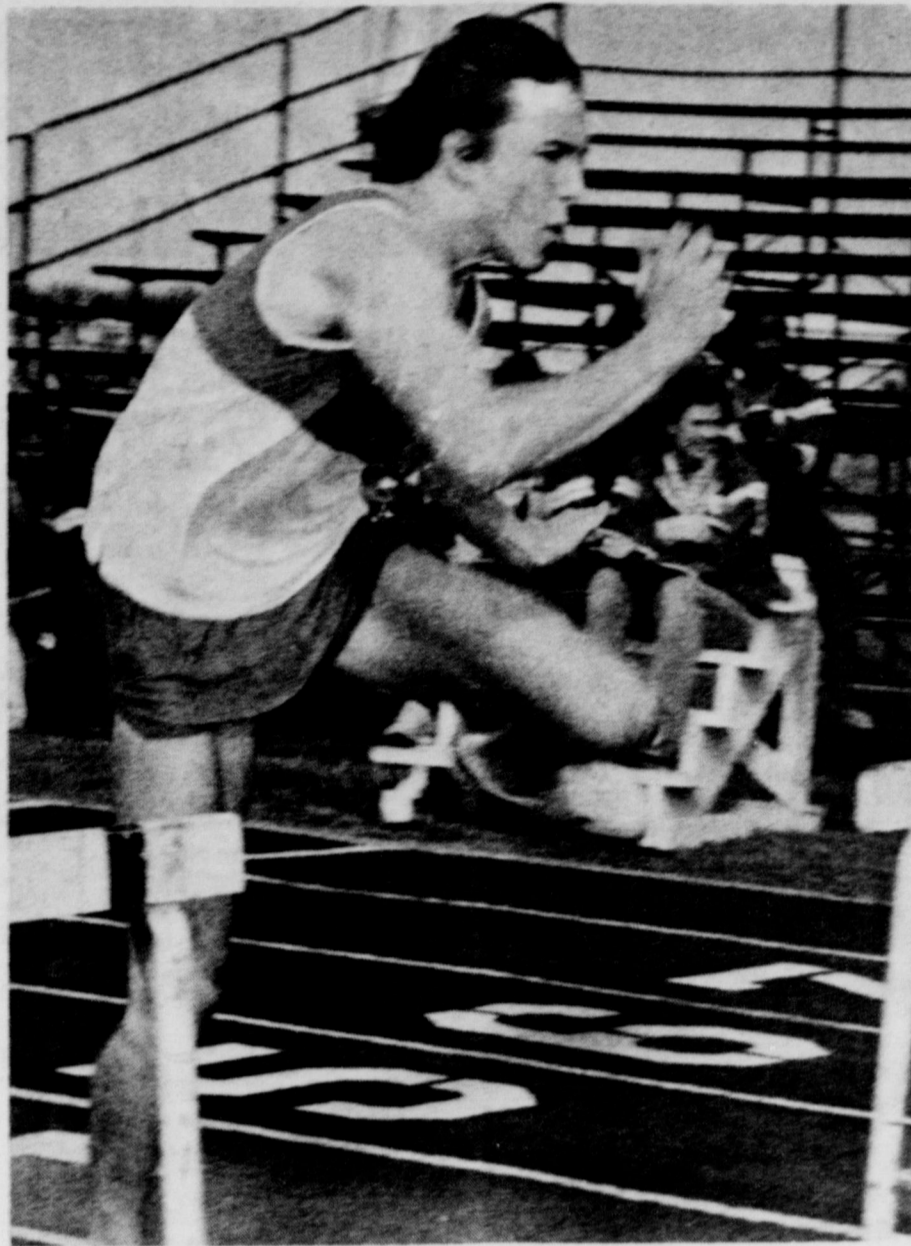

Under the new program, farmers who are having trouble meeting their FmHA payments, may have their loans rescheduled or have up to 25 percent of their loans, up to \$200,000 set aside for five years with no interest. Farm loans held by commercial banks and other lenders that are classified as "problem loans," can be reduced by ten percent in exchange for an FmHA guarantee.

"We already know where qualified potential staff people are," Futch said, "and we hope to put them to work as soon as possible. Most of them are familiar with our loan processing requirements, and a minimum of new training should be required."

The additional personnel will be assigned to FmHA offices where the work load is greatest," Futch said.

RELIEF FOR PERSISTENT ITCH ONLY FOURTEEN STEPS AWAY

Dry skin - a common wintertime problem - is the most frequent cause of pruritus, according to dermatologists. Here's the consensus advice on how to get relief for pruritus-caused itch skin:

1. Use a humidifier in your home.
2. Don't bathe or shower more than twice a week [for severe skin problems].
3. Bathe in cool or lukewarm water.
4. Wear cotton [not wool or synthetic fabrics] next to the skin.
5. Use a bath oil, cornstarch, or colloidal oatmeal in the tub.
6. Use a nonalkaline skin cleanser rather than soap.
7. Pat, don't rub, skin with a towel.
8. Use skin-soothing lotion, cream, or ointment.
9. Switch to milk soap for laundering clothes.
10. Avoid eating heavily spiced foods.
11. Apply moist, cool compress to affected areas.
12. Avoid antihistamine and anesthetic creams, lotions, or ointments.
13. Avoid scratching.
14. Avoid stress or learn to relax.

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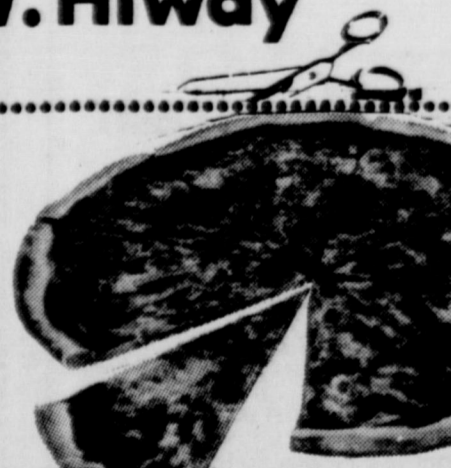

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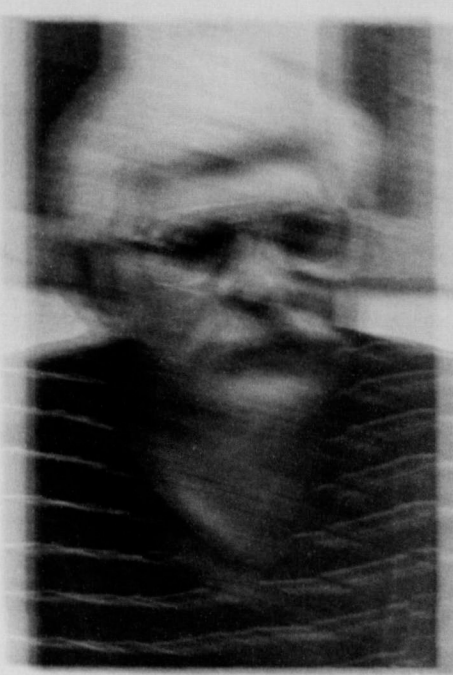
