Local store robbed, two brothers charged

Two young men were placed in Wichita County jail under \$10,000 bond each Thursday morning after being charged with the aggravated robbery of Quikie Food Store at James Drive and FM 368.

Elmer James Nathaniel Altom, 24, and John Jackson Altom, 22, were arraigned before Justice of the Peace R.L. Stewart. The brothers listed their residence as Longley Road, sometimes known as "River Rat

Road."

Shortly after 10 p.m. last Wednesday, two males with bandanas over their faces entered the store and confronted the clerk, Ann Casterline, with a weapon believed to be a sawed off shotgun.

After locking her in a storage room, the men left with an undetermined amount of cash, in the form of rolled coins.

Police were alerted at 10:18 by Scott Chunn, who had gone to the store, found it unattended and then located the clerk.

368, which is about a mile from Longley Road.

The trooper gave chase and the pair continued traveling south toward Holliday at a high rate of speed. County sheriff deputies joined as the caravan passed through Holliday and westward toward Seymour.

At Dundee the riders attempted to turn off the highway, but lost control, and were apprehended.

No money was found on either man, and a bank bag found reportedly did not match the description given officers by the store clerk.

Local, county and state officers immediately converged at the location. They at first believed the bandits had left the scene in a pickup, but a neighbor near the store told them of hearing a couple of motorcycles in the alley about the time the robbery occurred.

A Department of Public Safety unit spotted two men on one motorcycle near the Wichita River bridge on FM

Other charges are expected to be filed against the Altom brothers. One possibly will be on unauthorized use of the motorcycle, which reportedly was taken from Wichita Falls.

The Quikie was robbed a little more than two years ago, and some nine months later an attempted robbery was thwarted by the attendant, who chased a young man from the premises.

Contract awarded for library work

With the city council's action Monday night, work to renovate the Burnett home into a library is to commence within 30 days, with completion expected in September.

The council acted on the recommendation of the Friends of the Library, which met last week to review the five bids received and hear explanations from Mayor Tim Hunter and Nell Stokes-Moser from Don Daugherty Architects.

Nathan Phillips Construction of Wichita Falls was the low bidder, with a base bid of \$317,816. Highest bid was \$457,700.

One of three alternates was also accepted. The parking lot, to be located west of the structure, was an additional \$43,089, making the total for the project \$360,905.

Alternates of chairs for the upstairs meeting room and a flag pole

were rejected.

City administrator James Barrington told the council there was approximately \$400,000 to pay for the project. Donations and grants account for \$380,290 and \$6,650 more is on hand from the sale of the old hotel land. Another \$14,600 is pledged, which would make the total available, when all is collected, \$404,539. But that does not include interest earned on the deposits, Barrington added.

Also during the Friends of the Library meeting, officers were elected for the coming year, most of whom were re-elected. They include Frances George president, Lita Watson vice president, Bobbie Shaw treasurer, Linda Escue secretary and Lavena Harlin publicity chairman.

Brothers face traffic charges

Two area brothers were arrested early Sunday morning for separate traffic offenses, according to the Iowa Park Police Department blotter.

The Department of Public Safety dispatcher at 1:32 a.m. requested local units assist a DPS trooper in his pursuit of a 1970 model pickup.

The local unit joined the chase on FM 368, and at 1:43 the pickup stopped at Valley View, where Larry Fulfer was taken into custody by the trooper.

At 4:26 a.m., according to the blotter, Steven Wayne Fulfer was arrested by local police for driving while license was suspended, and transported at 6:30 to the county jail.

Two juveniles were arrested at 4:06 p.m. Tuesday on charges of shoplifting candy at a local convenience store.

Man charged with arson

Harold Weaver has been charged with arson, following a Mar. 8 fire at his 906 Dossia home.

Weaver turned himself in at the Iowa Park Police Department at 8:04 a.m. Thursday after being notified of

He was taken before Justice of the Peace Arthur Bea Williams in Wichita Falls where he was placed under a \$4,000 bond and turned over to the county jail.

Weather topic of residents

High winds Saturday night and heavy rains accompanied by the threat of a tornado Sunday evening made weather the main topic of backyard and coffee shop discussions.

Iowa Park was warned to take cover shortly after 6 p.m. Sunday, when a spotter from the volunteer fire department saw a tornado funnel in a cloud near the intersection of FM 368 and Rocky Point Road, southwest of the city.

Rains Saturday and Sunday

dumped from two to three inches over the area, with the Experiment Station recording 2.67 inches.

Some roof damage was reported Saturday, when winds estimated at greater than 60 miles per hour swept the area. Part of a roof built onto a mobile home southwest of the city was heavily damaged.

Power interruptions were frequent Saturday and Sunday. The post office was forced to remain closed until about 9 a.m. Monday, due to a power failure.

Streets main topic of council meeting

Streets, their opening, closing and improvements, highlighted Monday night's meeting of the city council.

A heated discussion developed over a proposal to close half the 600 block of West Louisa, but it climaxed with the council's approval of closing it.

Proposed by Christ the King Catholic Church, which owns both north and south sides of the half block and sought the closing because a new church building is planned on the site, the safety of members was the primary reason for the request.

Pastor Patrick Burke explained the present building would later serve as a Sunday school facility, and the danger of children having to cross a street to the new church could be avoided by the closing.

William Thompson, who said he bought his home at 616 W. Louisa a

year ago, complained the street's closing would result in a reduction of his property value and said he wanted his taxes reduced if it were closed.

Pastor Burke pointed out the growth of the church's membership, to some 200 since the facility was built, and predicted an even greater growth once the new church was constructed.

At one point in the discussions, Frank Guyette said that Andy Arrington, who owns the property along Louisa to the west, had offered not to contest the street closing if the church would deed one of its western lots to him.

Arrington immediately corrected the statement, saying the offer was made by his son, not himself.

At another point, Arrington asked Pastor Burke if he had not invited the church to participate in the paving of the street when he (Arrington) had paved his part.

Burke responded that he would not enter in a project if it were not in accordance with city requirements, indicating the paving Arrington did did not comply with the paving ordinance.

An ongoing street project that has been discussed at several earlier meetings is the proposal to pave East Garden.

Developer Ray Townsend said he wanted to pave the street so he could build homes, and since his discussions had begun before the city passed its ordinance requiring all new streets to be of concrete, he wanted to do it with asphalt, meeting the former minimum standards.

He said he had bids of \$20,412 to build the street with asphalt, and approximately \$24,000 with concrete. Aldermen voted to pay the difference to have the street paved with concrete, but limited its part to \$4,000.

Parade Saturday to signal Little League season start

The annual Opening Day Parade for Iowa Park Little League Baseball gets underway at 9 Saturday morning in front of the junior high school, president Jimmy Duggins said.

Twenty-four teams representing six divisions will be featured in the parade, Duggins said, in addition to a drum and bugle corps, clowns, floats, and assorted parade entries.

The Color Guard and Drum and Bugle Corps from Sheppard Air Force Base will provide the tempo for the traditional parade, however, for the second consecutive year, the junior high and high school bands from Iowa Park will not participate.

High school band director Greg Miller Wednesday said he and the junior high director will be in Jacksboro with the Beginner's Band, to participate for the second year in the Beginner Band festival. Miller said the bands didn't attend the parade last year for the same reason.

PARADE ROUTE

According to Duggins, the parade, led by fire trucks from the Iowa Park Volunteer Fire Department, will travel west down Cash St. to Yosemite St., turn north down Yosemite to Park St., parading down both sides of Park, then west towards Parkwest Shopping Center, ending in front of B&R Thriftway Store.

A tentative list of participants in Saturday's parade includes the

representatives from Sheppard, the Clown-Arounds, Wichita County Mounted Patrol, Cub Scouts, Girls Softball, Whoop-T-Do Kings and Queens, Little Miss Mickie Guy, and an assortment of antique cars.

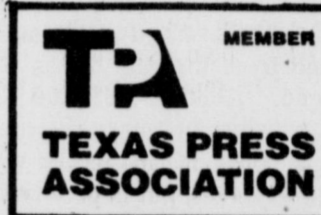

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Cook of the Week

Diane (Mrs. David) Robnett is a perfect example of the "busy person who gets the job done." She is one of the busiest persons in the community, yet she manages to "Put first things first" - her church, home and family.

A graduate of Munday High School, she attended Abilene Christian Univ. two years and was graduated from Draughon's Business College. A member of the Church of Christ, she is supervisor of the elementary Bible department there and is a life member of Kidwell PTA.

NANA'S WHOLE WHEAT BREAD
(One of Mrs. Robnett's grandmother's recipes)
1 yeast cake, dissolved in 2 cups lukewarm water

Mix:
3 cups white flour
2 T sugar
2 tsps. salt
Let rise until "bubbly."
Mix:
1/2 cup brown sugar
3 T shortening
1/2 cup hot water

Cool to lukewarm and mix with bubbly sponge dough. Add 3 cups whole wheat flour. Knead and put in bowl; let this mixture rise to double in size.

Grease two bread pans; shape dough into loaves, put in pans and let rise again until double in size. Bake at 350 degrees 50 minutes.

COPPER CARROT PENNIES

2 lbs. carrots
1 medium green pepper, chopped
1 medium onion, chopped
1 can tomato soup
1/2 cup salad oil
3/4 cup sugar
3/4 cup vinegar
1 tsp. dry mustard
1 tsp. Worcestershire sauce
Mix and bring to boil the soup, salad oil, sugar, vinegar, dry mustard, Worcestershire sauce. Peel, slice thin and boil the carrots until tender, but not soft. Pour sauce over vegetables and let marinate overnight. Add salt and pepper to taste, if desired.

PUMPKIN-CRANBERRY BREAD

3 1/2 cups flour
2 tsps. baking soda
1 tsp. salt
1 T. pumpkin pie spice
3 cups sugar
1/2 cup salad oil
4 eggs
3/4 cup milk
1 #2 can plain pumpkin
2 cups fresh cranberries, rinsed, drained and cut into halves.
1 cup chopped pecans, if desired

Sift together dry ingredients and stir to blend. Reserve enough flour to dredge pecans and cranberries in to keep them from sinking to bottom of loaf. Stir in remaining ingredients and blend well. Do not overbeat, just blend well with spoon or mixer.

Pour into four greased and floured 7 1/2 x 3 1/2 x 2 1/4 loaf pans. Bake in preheated oven at 325 degrees about 1 hour. Cool in pans 5 minutes, then

unmold. Cool on rack thoroughly, then wrap each loaf in plastic wrap. Let "season" overnight at room temperature or freeze, depending on how long you intend to keep it. If using right away, do not refrigerate - tastier when served at room temperature.

ITALIAN SPAGHETTI

Mix:
Onion powder or flakes
1 #2 can tomatoes
1 basil leaf
4 bay leaves
1.8 oz. can tomato sauce
Salt, pepper, oregano, garlic salt to taste
Add: 1 1/2 lbs. ground beef and simmer this mixture about 1 to 1 1/2 hours. Pour over cooked thin spaghetti and serve. Add grated cheese, (Cheddar or Parmesan) as desired.

STRAWBERRY SALAD

[large recipe]

1. Melt 1 1/2 sticks oleo and pour over 2 2/3 cups pretzels which have been crushed. Bake in rectangular pan for 10 minutes at 350 degrees. Cool well.
2. Mix: 2 cups Cool Whip
8 oz. cream cheese
1 cup sugar
Spread over pretzels.
3. Dissolve 1 pkg. strawberry Jello in 2 cups boiling water. Add 1 large pkg. frozen strawberries and small amount of pineapple juice or 1/4 cup water.
Pour over other layers and chill. You may want to add 1 small can crushed pineapple and omit the extra juice.

100 delegates attend district P-TA conference

Approximately 100 delegates attended the Dist. 13 Parent-Teacher Association spring conference held Tuesday at First Baptist Church.

Highlights included talks by state vice president Mary Sharp and reading specialist and child develop-

ment expert Dr. John Hill, and a banquet honoring life members, as well as workshops on various topics.

Sharp advised the members the state organization is working for the passage of legislation which would return the minimum age limit to purchase alcoholic beverages to 21, and a law banning beer and alcohol commercials on television.

She also pointed out a need for local P-TAs to encourage activities for students attending prom dances in the spring, keeping them from getting drunk and killing themselves while driving.

With all the pressures heaped on teachers by HB 72, the Texas school reform bill passed last summer, P-TA members should give their support to the professionals, Dr. Hill stated.

Television personality wrong

A great number of area residents look to the air media, radio and television, for information when threatening weather is present. For that reason, those in the media need to be more current in their reports, and must be more accurate.

The take-cover alert sirens were sounded early Sunday evening, when a funnel cloud was spotted just southwest of the town by a trained, qualified observer.

Shortly afterward, a "weather man" appeared on the Channel 6 screen, acknowledged the sirens were being sounded in Iowa Park, and added that it was a mistake and there was no threat to the community.

The individual had not checked with the dispatcher at Iowa Park Police Department before making the statement. Nor had he monitored the local radio channel to

hear Fire Chief Danny Skinner report seeing a funnel cloud in the area of FM 368 and Rocky Point Road and instruct the dispatcher to sound the alarm.

Residents can be assured that the trained spotters of the local fire department will not give the alarm unless the community is threatened. And the alarm is not sounded unless one of two persons of authority, the police chief or fire chief, give the go-ahead.

And when the sirens sound the tornado alert, it is time to take cover. It is not the time to call the police station or go to one's television set to verify the danger.

We need the services of our weather spotters and should believe it when the alarm is sounded. What we don't need is some television personality damaging the credibility of our alert system with second-hand inaccurate information.

How dare the Jews of Israel, the United States and other nations kick up a fuss over Pres. Regan's planned visit to a German cemetery!

The Israelis have no stronger ally in the world than the United States. This nation has stuck its neck out in the United Nations in support of Israel on issues that even I had problems understanding. We've sent billions and billions of dollars in economic aid to that country when, obviously, we couldn't afford it.

There is no question the Jews suffered at the hands of the Nazis during World War II. It's established, documented and continuously reminded to us almost daily, over 40 years later.

Smith is seeking seven people who will each put down \$10,000, or 10 people who will put down \$7,000, and go on a note for the balance of the project. They would become part owners.

I still believe that a golf course would go over here and be a big asset to the community. But this is one of those situations where I can't put my money where my mouth is.

I hope someone does.

Saturday was supposed to be the climatic day for Clean-Up, Fix-Up Week in Iowa Park. But, like a few years ago, it was a total bust.

The week was well received by local residents, who took advantage of the free dumping at the landfill and calling the city crews to pick up tree and brush trimmings.

But only one group volunteered to work in public areas. A group of girls, I believe they were Blue Birds, cleaned the park at City Hall, but it wasn't on Saturday.

Oh, well, like the farmers say. Maybe next year.

No one likes to have pressure put on them, and I feel the same way.

If you want this newspaper to cover an activity, do not call us and tell us that Brand X or a television crew will be here for something and you thought we'd like to be there too.

Any project we feel warranting coverage, when we have someone available, will be covered by this newspaper. I don't care if NBC, Life and the Washington Post will be at an event, this staff will decide what and what not to cover.

And if we're called to be told about outsiders coming here for an event, why weren't we told first?

That's a bunch of sour grapes on my part. But I'll guarantee you, this newspaper has more at stake than any other news organization to do our part. We're here to grow or die with our community. And we understand that, better than anyone else.

street improvements in the 500, 600 and 700 blocks of East Lafayette and 400 block of South Hawthorne, Penn and Alcott, was approved.

The unpaved streets are proposed to have a rock covering and ditch work done to make the streets passable when it rains. If ultimately approved, the owners of the property along the listed streets would share in the costs.

Other business and reports during the meeting included:

- * approved an ordinance providing for a penalty to defray costs of collecting delinquent taxes;

- * authorized the administrator to advertise for proposals for accounting and auditing services;

- * authorized advertising for sale several surplus items;

- * discussed payment arrangements for a new fire truck;

- * discussed valuations and fees for building permits for metal storage buildings, and instructed the administrator to have a proposal for the next meeting;

- * heard Andy Arrington say he would petition for annexation a tract of land in the south part of town so he could receive water and sewer service;

- * heard the administrator report on a leak in a ground storage tank built in 1980 and actions being taken to locate the source of the leak;

- * and heard the mayor say he was already paying his own way to attend the Sen. Ray Farabee day in Austin and if anyone else wanted to attend, he should pay his own way.

The final item on the agenda was a closed session to discuss resumes for the public works director and establishing dates for interviews.

Three applicants will be interviewed May 5, it was announced following a 42-minute executive session.

Finnell committee completes budget

Rep. Charles Finnell, voting with other members of the House Appropriations Committee, approved a proposed two-year state budget (H.B. 20), which provides \$36.4-billion to continue necessary operations of state government and to aid local governments for the 1986-87 biennium.

The committee has "labored since January 21 to produce a lean and austere budget, but one Texans can live with," Finnell stated. "This has been the closest examination of the state's budget in its 150 year history."

The regular session of the 69th Texas Legislature is scheduled to adjourn May 27.

The superintendent's job became open in January when Harold Cowley said he would take a similar position with another school district July 1.

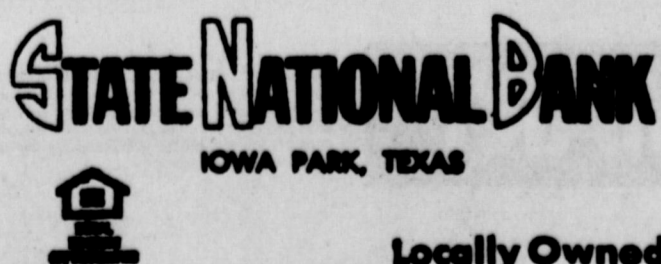

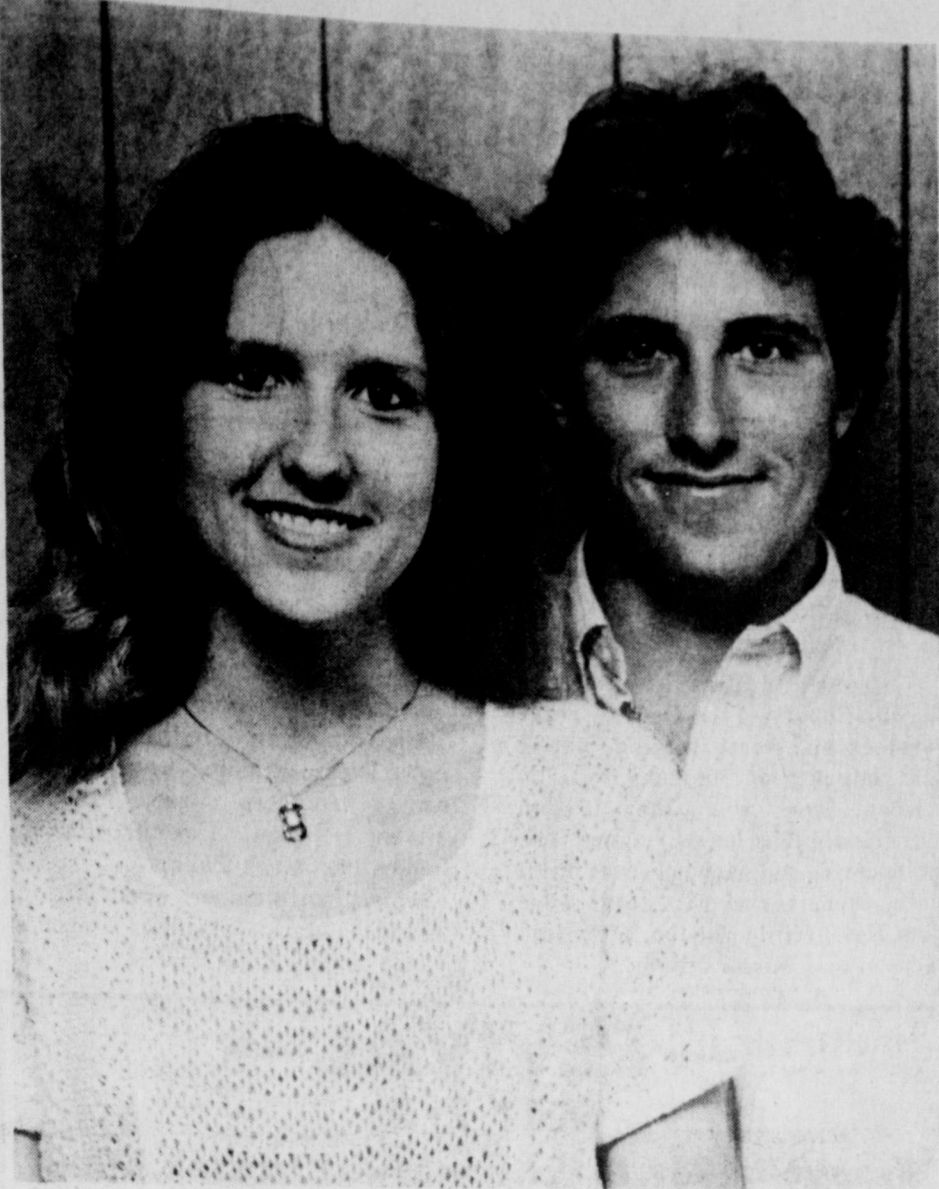

Five qualify for regional meet; boys 2nd, girls 3rd in district

Iowa Park's varsity track teams placed second and third in the Dist. 5-AAA track meet Saturday at Bridgeport, and qualified five individuals for the regional meet next week at Odessa.

The Hawks placed second with 89 points and qualified Brett Hale, Scott Weaver and Charles Perry for the Odessa meet.

Placing third in the team standings, the Hawkettes qualified two athletes, Cindy Clanton and Laurie Espinoza, for the regional.

Both Vernon teams ran away and hid from the rest of the two fields, with the boys amassing 211 points and the girls 232. Bridgeport girls finished second with 157.

Hale won the 3,200 meter run in 11:15.78, to emerge the only Hawk winning an event. He was also fourth in the 1,600 meters.

Weaver had his problems, trying to

get his steps down in the long jump. But on his final attempt, he soared 21-2, placing him second. He was fifth in the 100 meters.

Perry advanced to regional by placing second in the discus to Vernon's Robert Graf, the defending Class AAAA state champion. The Hawk strong man had a toss of 164-5/4, next best to Graf's 185-8/4.

"It's a darn shame that we have three of the state's best shot putters in this district," commented Vernon head coach Leo Brittain, after seeing Perry finish third in that event.

Perry heaved the shot 52-11/4, behind Vernon's Mike Chism's 58-11/4 and Bowie's Blanton, 57-5.

Clanton won the girls' high jump with a leap of 5-2.

Espinoza qualified in the 3,200 meters with a clocking of 13:19.

1-AAA meet at Odessa's Ratliff Stadium May 4. All five Iowa Park athletes will compete in a qualifiers' meet Saturday afternoon at Vernon, as a tune-up for the regional event.

Saturday was a bitterly disappointing day for three Hawks who figured to advance to the region.

Because of a misunderstanding of the rules, two field event hopefuls tired themselves by entering the 400 meter preliminaries that was scheduled the same time they were competing in the high jump and pole vault.

Coach Barry Lucy said it was his understanding that those who left the field events to run in preliminaries could return to the same heights they left, and resume jumping after a 10-minute rest. But the tournament umpire ruled they had to resume competition at whatever height the bars were when they returned.

Stephen Biddy had cleared six feet in the high jump before he ran the preliminary. The bar was at 6-2 when he returned. Though he was able to clear it, along with three Vernon jumpers, it took three attempts.

The winning height was 6-2, shared by all four jumpers, but Biddy had more misses and on that basis finished fourth.

Kendell Hill had cleared 11-6 in the pole vault when he ran the preliminary. The bar had been raised to 12 feet when he returned, and though he has cleared 12-6, he was too tired to compete, and consequently missed out on second place, which was 12-6, and finished fifth.

Phillip Davis was leading the pack by some two yards in the high hurdles, but fell when he hit the third from last barrier. He still recovered and finished fourth with a 16.16 time. But he apparently would have run his first sub 15 second race, had he not fallen, and won.

Others earning points for the Hawks were: Clint Loggins, 6th in the discus and 5th in the shot put; Danny Forman, 5th in the high hurdles; David Meissner, 6th in the high hurdles, 5th in the intermediate hurdles; Scott Davis, 6th in the 100 meters; Brad Huff, 4th in the 3,200 meters; and Hill, 4th in the 400 meters.

The sprint relay, composed of Weaver, Morath, Biddy and P. Davis, placed 4th with a 46.35, and the mile relay team of P. Davis, Meissner, Forman and Hill placed 3rd, 3:34.79.

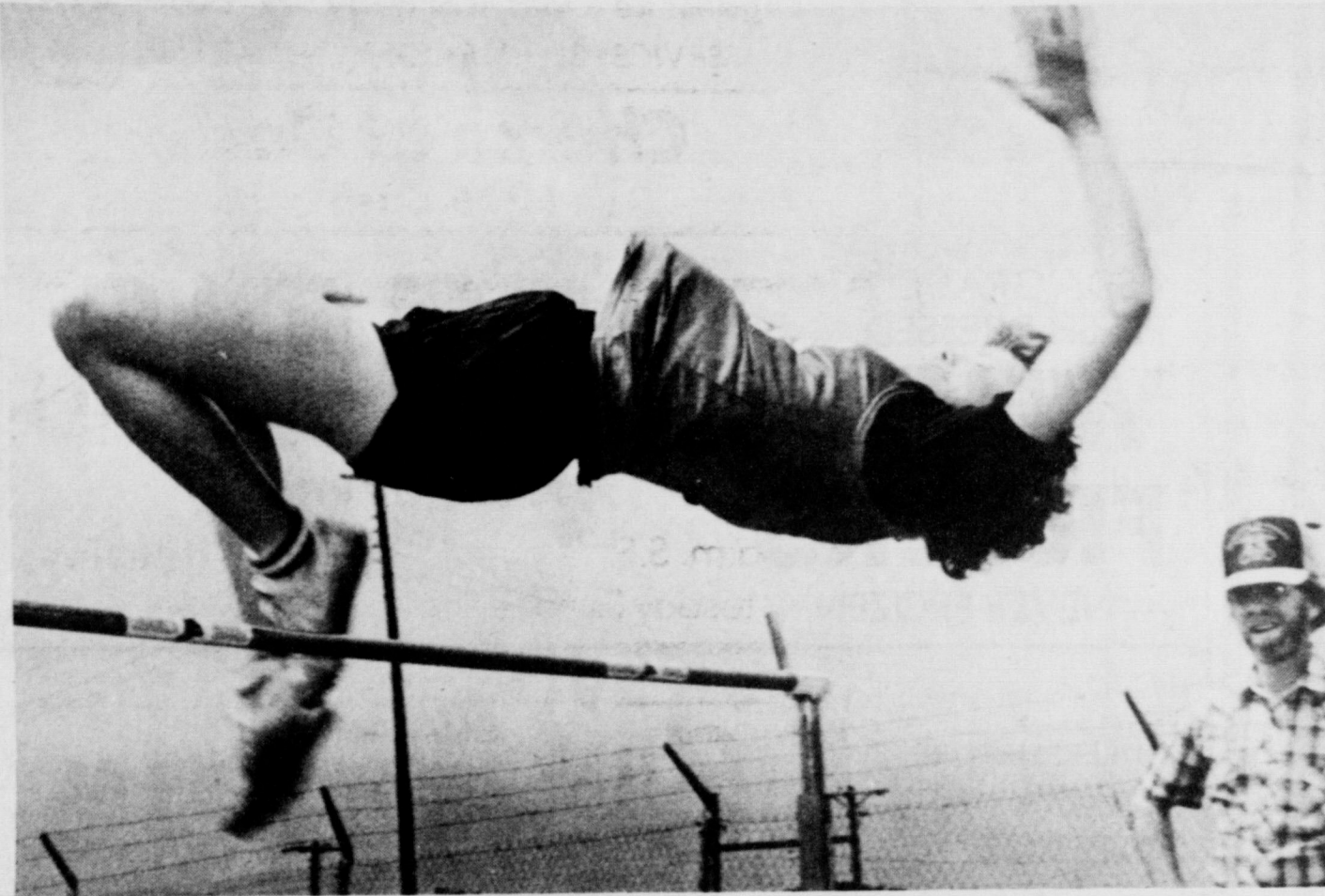

Administrator likes challenge

Holliday city administrator Gary Jones, hired by the city council in March, is already knee-deep in

projects left by his predecessor Jim Hamill. As if that wasn't enough, the easy-going, 49-year-old retired Army

major is planning to instigate a number of projects on his own in the near future.

"I guess I like the challenge this position offers," the second city administrator in Holliday's history said recently. Jones was responsible for finalizing plans to begin work on the \$160,000 water improvement grant project, which started up Friday, and, at the same time, welcoming new members to the city council while familiarizing himself with their personal desires.

The administrator's immediate goals, and distant plans, appear to be both reachable and productive for Holliday. "I want to see some of the streets repaired, to clean out the ditches in town to drain the water better and avoid flooding, and to get people on septic tanks switched over to the sewer lines, and to get the new water lines in place," he said. For the distant future, Jones said, "I want to get a master plan formulated, to get a good zero-base budget for the city, and to get some money to pay for repairs badly needed."

Jones was able to work well with Hamill during the transition phase, since both are longtime friends that grew up in the same community. Born in Kamay, Jones attended his first 12 grades at Valley View, as Hamill did. Jones enlisted in the Army, serving two tours in Vietnam as a helicopter pilot, and managed to obtain a degree in Aeronautical Science at a Daytona, Florida college, while minoring in Business Management.

After the service, Jones worked as a helicopter pilot for drilling companies, transporting crews to rigs located offshore. In 1982, Jones was hired to serve as city manager in Electra, a position he held for one year.

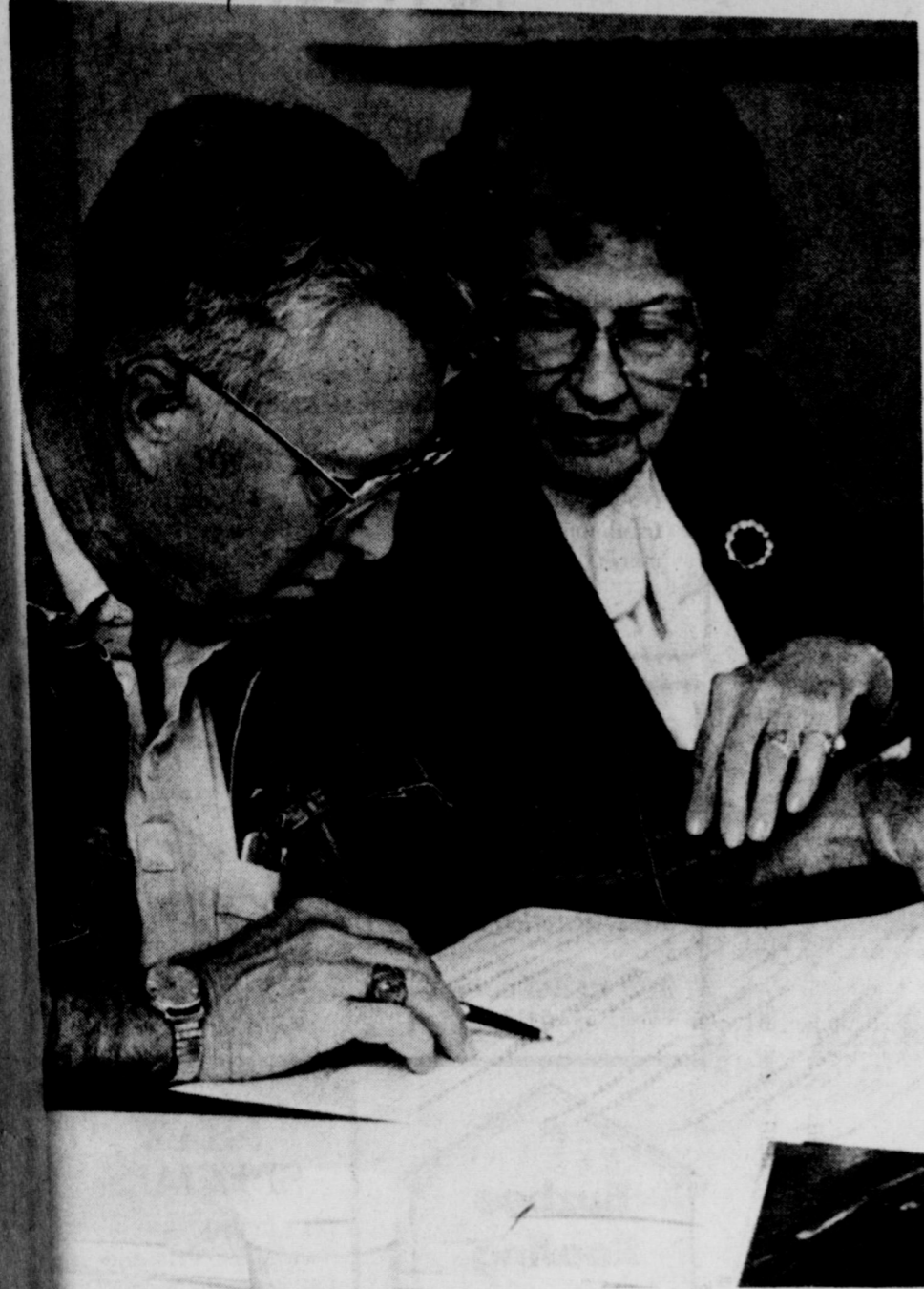
Married to wife Shirley, the couple have two children, Gary and Kellie. Both children are grown and living in Austin, Jones said, but he and his wife still reside at Lake Kickapoo.

At the last meeting of the Holliday city council, it was decided to enlist Governmental Services Agency to help the city in its application for yet another Community Development Grant, which the administrator says will help upgrade the sewer system

and to finally end the use of septic tanks in the town.

"As for the project, where we've come to now can be directly attributed to the work of Jim Hamill, and Biggs and Matthews, represented by Kerry Maroney," Jones stated. "Also, David Lewis of Governmental Services Agency has been a great help to the city, and will help us in the new grant application for sewer repairs."

Being familiar with both Holliday and many of its residents has already proven to be an asset for Jones. And, with his courteous nature and common-sense attitude, it shouldn't take long for the townspeople to approve of his efforts.

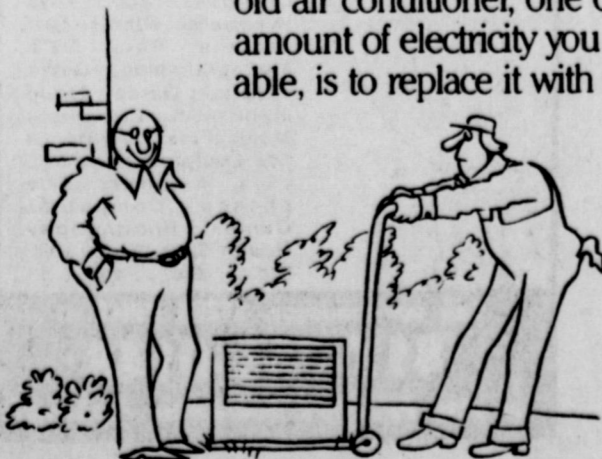

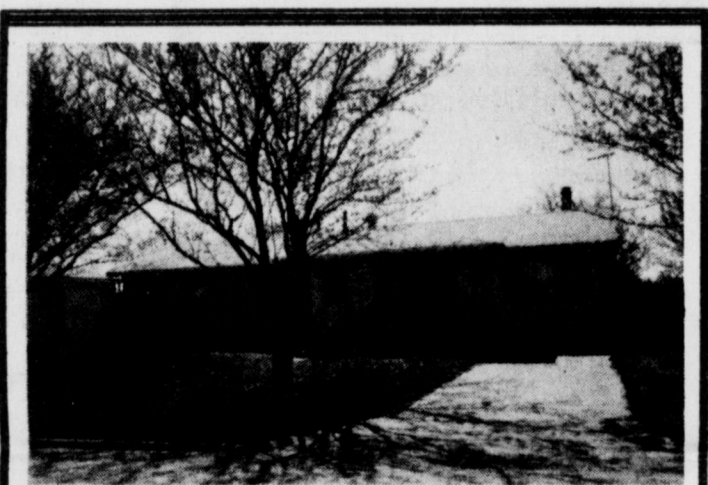
