Glen Mitchell named local superintendent

Glen H. Mitchell, who has served the past eight years as superintendent at Henrietta, was named Tuesday night by the Iowa Park school board to succeed Harold Cowley.

Cowley earlier this year submitted his resignation after accepting the superintendent's position at Talco.

Mitchell received a three-year continuing contract, effective July 1, at an annual salary of \$52,000. Included in the motion to hire him were provisions to pay him \$300 monthly for in-district transportation, hospitalization and life insurance premiums paid, and a \$3,000 moving expense.

The new superintendent is a 1951 graduate of Breckenridge High School. He received his Bachelor's Degree in 1955 from North Texas State Univ., and his Master's in Education in 1958 from Texas Tech Univ.

He taught eighth grade two years and then was a counselor one year at Brownwood, became principal at Henrietta in 1961 where he remained until 1967.

After serving as superintendent of schools at Howe and Wilson, he returned to Henrietta eight years ago.

Mitchell and his wife, Willa, have three grown children. He is a member of the First Baptist Church of Henrietta, where he is a deacon and Sunday school teacher. He is also a Lay Renewal Coordinator and state director of Texas Baptist Men.

A past president of Region Nine Texas Association of School Administrators, Mitchell is a member

of the Henrietta Chamber of Commerce, Kiwanis Club and Clay County Drug Awareness Council.

MITCHELL 'EXCITED'

Mitchell said by telephone yesterday afternoon that he was excited about coming to Iowa Park, because of the academics, personnel and community.

He admitted he had only a brief time to meet central staff, administrators and trustees, but he looks forward to working both in the school and community.

The new superintendent said he will be spending more time here in June, preparing next year's budget as well as meeting more educators and acquainting himself with the campuses and community.

Trustees reject request to fire administrator

In a marathon meeting, that lasted well beyond midnight, Tuesday, Iowa Park school trustees gave salary increases to all administrators, approved purchase of a computer for the tax office, and rejected a parent's request to fire the high school's assistant principal.

Action on administrators' salary hikes was taken following hiring of Glen Mitchell of Henrietta as new superintendent. Harold Cowley recommended the new salaries, all to be based on 12-month contracts instead of 11 or fewer months, and an explanation that the proposed figures were in line with equal and smaller area schools.

The new salaries, which include local bonuses, are: Robert Palmer, assistant superintendent, \$45,000; Richard Davis, high school prin-

cipal, \$42,000; Jimmy Alsup, junior high principal, \$40,000; Ron Woods and Kenneth Davis, elementary principals, and Don Ickles, high school assistant principal, \$38,000 each.

Two bids were received in response to advertisements for the purchase of a computer to be used at the tax office. One was \$14,344, not including an estimated \$5,000 for software, and the other was \$34,545, including software.

Though tax collector Allen Shewmake recommended the higher priced bid, board members directed him to look at the other offering at least five days to see if it would do the job he needed.

Shewmake had told the board the CPS bid was from a firm that specializes in tax work, has a tried and proven program, and is

compatible with the county tax appraisal's computer. He said the other bid offers a program yet to be written, is not proven, and the time element to get information fed into the computer for next year's billing is short.

The motion approved by the board was for Shewmake to make his own decision on which unit to buy, after he had studied the proposed program and lower-priced hardware.

In an earlier meeting, Shewmake said the use of a computer in his office would pay the purchase price in two and a half years through personnel savings, as well as increase proficiency and accuracy.

PARENT'S REQUEST

During a personal appearance by Dorothy Cates, who complained

her daughter's paddling at high school was unjustified and too harsh, trustees were asked to fire assistant principal Ickles.

She also asked that a document of the situation be placed in his records, as well as documents of "caution" in the records of Cowley, Palmer, Wendell Allen and Nancy Young.

Mrs. Cates stated her daughter, a senior, and three other female students were caught away from campus at noon April 24. Rejecting an option to stay after school an hour, the girl accepted "two licks from Ickles."

The parent alleged her daughter was bruised nine days by the force of the paddling.

Two of the other three girls also took paddlings and the third elected to stay after school, she said.

After some 40 minutes of discussions, board members unanimously supported Ickles' action, stating it was taken in total compliance with school policy.

Mrs. Cates said she was unsatisfied with the response and stated, "This leaves me no choice, I will have to take it to a different level."

OTHER BUSINESS

Trustees accepted a bid of \$4,885 to rework and seed with grass the east end of the berm at Hawk Stadium and a bid of \$14,383 for new bleachers at the junior high field, but rejected a bid for adding dirt on the field at Hawk Stadium.

The engineering firm is to determine five measures to relieve saturated soil under the turf during rainy periods such as last fall.

A strong possibility exists, based on pre-enrollment of kindergarten students, that as many as four additional classrooms may have to be built at Kidwell Elementary.

Principal Ron Woods said 30 more students have pre-enrolled than at this time last year, and with an increase in special education students coupled with state-mandated maximum of 22 students per teacher, the additional space is a real possibility.

Trustees are to take another look at the situation at the June meeting.

Board members approved a proposal to lease high school concession stands to parent organizations, relieving administrators from the responsibility of overseeing those areas.

The football concession will be given to the Band Boosters and basketball concession to the Iowa Park Booster Club.

Band director Greg Miller asked the board to consider budgeting for new high school band uniforms next year, explaining the 11-year-old uniforms are beginning to deteriorate rapidly.

He said the old uniforms were purchased for approximately \$220 each, and present prices are approximately \$100 more. Those high school uniforms still usable would be used by the junior high, which has the same basic design.

Board members gave Miller permission to pursue information on the proposal, but did not vote on a purchase request.

Resignations were accepted from: Jane Cowley, high school business; Cheryl Roth, teacher aide; Rita Reeder, special education; Carol Wilson, second grade, and Vida Roberts, tax office secretary.

Hired were Brenda Clark, Bradford library aide; Judy Silvers, school nurse, and Tim Clark, junior high athletics.

Reassignments approved were Julie Ross, from junior high to part time secretary at the tax office, and Jean Johnson, who withdrew her resignation as math teacher at the high school.



Mrs. Raymond Good brought a horticulture specimen to the meeting. Mrs. Lee showed members a "Live Oak Society" news-


paper with a picture of the largest live oak tree in the world. She said that the society encourages the planting of the trees and saving their acorns.

Landrum West Inc. of Burkburnett has filed first production figures on four new oil wells in the Wichita Regular Field. The Nos. 13L, 14L, 18L & 23L Hugh Reilly showed combined potential to make 221 barrels daily.

The operator has 2,115 acres leased, with drillsites in the L.C. Denison Survey, A-55, and the D.L. & B. Co. Survey, five miles southwest of Burkburnett.

The wells will produce from perforations ranging from 750 to 1,640 feet into the wellbore. Total drilling depths were 1,470, 1,450, 1,705 and 1,450 feet, respectively.

No. 13L location is 1,340 feet from the east line and 180 feet from the

north line of the lease.

No. 14L is located 485 feet from the north line and 230 feet from the east line of the lease.

No. 18L location is 3,620 feet from the east line and 2,535 feet from the south line of the lease.

My hat is off to two Iowa Park businesses that have really made fine contributions to the business district of the community.

Light shed on silver cup

The silver loving cup pictured in The Leader two weeks ago is still a mystery, but Tom Corridon provided some answers. The cup bears the inscription, "October 14, 1914, Iowa Park, Texas" and the Latin phrase, "thus always shine brightly."

Mr. Corridon recalls that the R.D. Cole Manufacturing Company of Newman, Georgia constructed the steel tanks for oil storage at the Wichita Valley Refinery. This refinery, built in 1914 on the site where Wal-Mart and Park West Shopping Center are now located, was the first in Wichita County.

According to Mr. Corridon the tanks were constructed like the tanks the company customarily built for water storage with the caulking on the inside. When a seam leak developed, it was necessary to clean the tanks with steam and leave them open for a few days in order for the gases to escape and allow a man to go inside to recaulk.

Wichita Valley Refining Company, capitalized at \$30,000, sold to Walker Consolidated Refinery and later to Texhoma Refinery who closed out the operation.

The beautiful cup was given to the city of Iowa Park by Mrs. Edwin Cole of Birmingham, Alabama because the town name is on it. It will be on display in the new Tom Burnett Memorial Library.

City leads county in sales tax gain

Iowa Park is running way ahead of other communities in Wichita County on percentage of sales tax collection increases over the previous year.

The city received a payment of \$14,447.16 for the period ending May 3, considerably above the \$12,184.98 received for the same month last year.

For the year, Iowa Park has received \$61,355.73, which is 18.42 percent greater than the \$51,813.53 reported in 1984.

Burkburnett is running the closest to Iowa Park in gain, 17.13 percent. Wichita Falls is next with 5.65 percent and Electra 1.90.



Annual wheat tour to start in Electra

The Annual Wichita County Wheat Tour will be held Friday. The wheat crop looks extremely good, and producers from across the area will have an opportunity to view the latest work on varieties, fertility, reduced tillage, seeding rates and a plot on a new seed treatment for wheat.

The tour was planned a couple of weeks ago by the crops committee, headed by Larry McAlister. It will begin with breakfast at the Westward Ho Restaurant located on Highway 287 in Electra at 7 a.m.

This year's breakfast is being sponsored by Monsanto Chemical Company, Texoma Agricultural Products and Dupont Chemical Company. Representatives for these three organizations are Jorge Menocal - Monsanto, Ralph Harvey - Texoma Ag. and Gerald Hobson - Dupont.

After breakfast, the tour will begin with a stop at some variety, fertility and seeding rates planted by the Lalk brothers of Electra. Varieties will be discussed by Dr. Al Alexander, area agronomist from the Research and Extension Center near Lockett, and Emory Boring area entomologist from Lockett.

The second stop will be at the no-till wheat plots located on FM 368, north of Iowa Park. These were planted with four no-till drills back in October. Fred Dwyer of Iowa Park is responsible for working with the crops committee on these plots.

The third and final stop will be at the variety plots located on Highway 287 and Rifle Range Road near Iowa Park. These plots were planted by Freddie Daume in October. They look good with a lot of varietal differences.



Mock disaster drill is realistic experience

Volunteer fire fighters from Iowa Park joined representatives Monday from other departments in the county, as well as active and reserve military personnel, Red Cross volunteers, ham radio operators and representatives from the Texas Forest Service to practice for an event they hope never takes place.

A mock tornado disaster at the Wichita County Mounted Patrol Arena on FM 369 was the drill, and some 70 volunteer adults and children served as "victims," complete with fake blood, broken bones and complicated situations. The drill also coincided with the delivery of a mobile disaster command center, donated by the

Texas Forest Service. The unit is equipped with radios, a telephone, antenna tower, generator and other equipment which has been developed over years of fighting major forest fires.

Training in the use of the mobile center was accomplished by three representatives of the Service.

"This sharpens response forces so when the real thing comes down, we will have had some practice," commented Sidney Smith, county Civil Defense coordinator.

Trustees hire teacher, reinstate senior trip

Holliday school board Monday night approved the hiring of six personnel for the 1985-86 school year, and agreed to reinstate the traditional senior class trip.

After meeting in closed executive session to discuss personnel, trustees returned to open session to approve the hiring of six teachers, and to accept the resignation of vocational agriculture instructor Cal Gaulden.

Hired were Houston Petty, high school band director; Eddie Wolsch, high school social studies and foreign languages; Lonna Bartley, high school English and journalism; Leslie Vann, assistant vocational agriculture teacher; Chester Jones, middle school math; and, Sandala Downs, elementary special education teacher.

Trustees last month approved the hiring of Mikki Phillips as elementary special education teacher, but Phillips is relocating elsewhere next school year along with her husband. Both are currently teaching in the Iowa Park schools. Downs will fill the vacancy left by Phillips.

The board approved Gaulden's resignation effective April 30, two months before his current contract was to expire. During the board's April meeting, Jim Bob Wallace was elevated to Gaulden's former position, and Vann hired to fill Wallace's former role. Gaulden will be going into private business.

In a personnel-related matter, the board approved \$2,000 as the amount to be paid to career ladder teachers on Level 2, as recommended by the career ladder committee. They are: (High School) Tommie Lofland, Bill Higgins, Jim Bob Wallace, and Peggy Wallace; (Middle School) Karla Wallace, and Doris Jones; (Elementary) Evelyn Timms, Debbie Gove, Cozette Marek, and Donna Reynolds.

SENIOR TRIP BACK

Board members, after meeting Monday night, approved the annual Senior Class Trip, with the participating class leaving on a

Friday, and returning on Sunday for a three-day affair.

Trustees formerly planned to phase the trip out, giving seniors this year a three-day trip, then one-day trips next year followed by two Saturday trips. Reasons for initially phasing out the trips included the excess number of days away from school, and disciplinary problems during the trips in the past.

OTHER BUSINESS

The board terminated the homestead exemption beginning next fiscal year, set the school calendar for the 85-86 school year, selected the student-athletic insurance, approved use of the campus grounds north of the high school for Little League use, and agreed to repave the parking lot.

The 20 percent homestead exemption for homeowners ages 65 and over was terminated because of rising financial concerns among board members. For two years the homestead exemption was enacted giving a 40 percent exemption,

then lowered to 30 percent last year, and 20 percent this year.

Students will begin class Sept. 3 for the 1985-86 school year, according to the approved calendar. Spring break will be March 10-14, two days will be given during Easter holidays for a short break (to be used as bad-weather days), and May 30 will be the final day of the school year.

The board selected All-American Life Insurance Co. as the policy holder for the student-athletic insurance next year.

The board also approved use of the campus grounds north of the high school building to be used as practice fields for the Holliday Little League baseball and football teams.

With the stipulation that Archer County Commissioners agree to the motion, the board agreed to pay not to exceed \$4,950 for materials only to pave the parking lot on the campus.

Also, board approved the purchase of a new 71-passenger bus for the next school year, costing between \$22,000 and \$24,000.

Vernon takes title

The Hawks played tooth-and-nails type ball with Vernon's Lions through four innings Friday afternoon at Hoskins Field in Wichita Falls, but Lion pitcher Travis Taylor maintained a tight grip on Iowa Park batters while leading an 11-hit barrage enroute to an 8-2 win and District 5-AAA baseball championship.

Vernon, now 12-8 going into the state playoffs, utilized Taylor's three-for-four performance at the plate to its advantage along with two-for-four contributions from teammates Kirk Wooten and Chris Thomsen off of losing pitcher Robert Adams with Van Hedrick at relief through less than one inning.

Coach Daryl Frazier's often productive hitters managed a mere four hits in 25 at bats against Taylor, as the Lion ace maintained good control in all seven innings with a good backup performance from the other starting eight for Vernon.

Adams displayed a good amount of control through six innings, but coach Frazier opted to use senior hurler Van Hedrick at the start of the last inning with the Hawks trailing 2-4. The first inning was a pitching

duel between Adams and Taylor, with neither team finding the bat, but, in the second, Thomsen lined a hard shot down the third base line, scoring Taylor, who had previously walked, giving Vernon a short lived 1-0 edge.

Iowa Park responded with a lead-off single by Shawn Price, and the first baseman advanced to second when Taylor walked Jeff Huff. Adams flied out to left, and Ray Sefcik grounded out to the pitcher forcing Martin at third. Rocky Martin lined to left-center to score Huff and Sefcik with two outs, giving the Hawks their only lead of the game 2-1.

Vernon tied the game at 2-2 in the fourth with the help of two Hawk errors, as Tybus advanced to second following a single and subsequent throwing error by the Hawk third baseman. Thomsen then grounded to Hedrick at short, but the ball deflected off the Hawk's glove into left field, scoring Tybus. Excellent defensive plays by Huff, Rickman and Martin kept the Lions from going ahead in the fourth.

The Lions went ahead 4-2 in the fifth inning on a two-run double by Taylor to left, scoring Terry Taylor and Wooten, and Vernon added the four insurance runs in the final frame to notch the victory.

Bathroom basics for conserving water

Do you like to take long, hot showers? How about long, luxurious bubblebaths in a tub full of water? Well, those relaxing moments may make you a water hog and are probably costing you money as well, both in water and energy cost.

The bathroom may be the smallest room in the house, but that's where most of a family's water use takes place -- about 75 percent actually. Nearly half of a family's water use flushes the toilet, but another 30 percent is used in bathing.

There are several ways to save water in the bathroom, and because much of the water used in the bathroom is hot water, it is one place where conserving water can also help you save energy.

A typical shower without a water saving shower head used five to 10 gallons of water each minute, so try to keep the length of your showers to around five minutes. A kitchen timer can be used to remind you and other members of your family when it's time to turn the water off.

Turning the water off while you soap up or shampoo also saves water

and energy. Some shower heads have a cut off button so that you can shut off the water temporarily without turning off the water faucets. This allows you to maintain the preferred water temperature without keeping the water running while you shampoo. If your shower head does not have a cut off button, you can purchase a flow cut off valve which can easily be installed onto most shower heads.

Some shower heads have water saving flow restrictors built into them which limit the amount of water which can flow through the shower head.

Sales tax drops

Holliday's sales tax rebate check from the state comptroller's office in Austin for the month of April signalled the first drastic decrease for a comparable period the prior year.

The city's check for a period ending May 3 was for \$6,828, more than 12 percent less than the \$10,906 received by Holliday for the same period in 1984. Net payments for 1985 are close to \$5,000 less than for 1984, \$35,321 compared to \$40,312 taken in last year.

Megargel was the only other Archer County entity aside from Holliday to show a decrease, with the neighboring community showing almost 10 percent less on its check.

On the other hand, Archer City showed an eight percent gain, leading Windthorst, Scotland and Lakeside City, who also showed slight gains.
