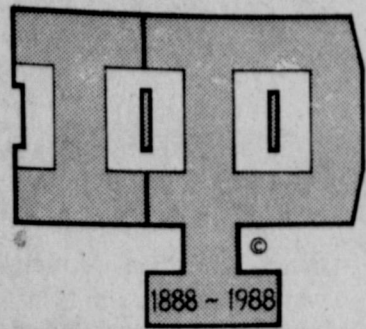

Activities are planned for community's youth

There's going to be a lot of fun for a lot of people in the 100 block of East Cash this weekend.

As part of the city's Summer in the Park program, a street dance will be held Friday night for Iowa Park High School students, and Saturday will be "Beach Day."

Appropriate foods prepared by the Iowa Park MuleSkinners will be served at both events.

The street will be roped off from Friday night through Saturday.

Starting at 8 p.m., music provided by John Vincent of KNIN Radio will be played for students, until midnight.

The dance is sponsored by the City of Iowa Park, in cooperation with the high school Student Council.

Hamburgers and hot dogs with iced tea will be prepared by the MuleSkinners. Hamburgers will be \$1.50, hot dogs \$1 and tea 50-cents.

Starting about 9 a.m. Saturday, city crews will begin converting the street into a beach, complete with sand.

Between 11 a.m. and 4 p.m., events will be held in sand castle building, frisbee throwing, water balloon fights, tug of war (over mud pit), kids volleyball, kids wading pool, hoola-hoop contest and a casting contest with rods and reels.

Sand castle building will feature different categories for judging, including creativity, largest and smallest.

There will be two separate categories in frisbee throwing for each contestant, including time aloft and distance thrown. Each contestant will be allowed two throws.

Two contestants in the water balloon fights will toss a water-filled balloon back and forth, taking a step backward between each throw. The couple with the balloon intact at the greatest distance will be the winners.

Categories for the hoola-hoop contest will be for longest time in action and the person to hoola the most hoops.

No hooks will be used in the casting contest. Target will be an

innertube, and distance will be the key.

Between 11:30 a.m. and 2 p.m., the MuleSkinners will be serving a "Polynesian Feast," complete with chicken, beef, all kinds of vegetables and sauces and oils.

The meal will be \$5 per plate and 50-cents for tea.

City still tops in tax receipts

Iowa Park continues to lead all Wichita County communities in sales tax collection increases for the year.

May's check from the state comptroller's office was \$16,378.34, an 8.52-percent increase over the same month last year.

For the year, Iowa Park has received \$70,491.05, and that is 8.49-percent more than \$64,973.31 reported in 1987.

Burkburnett has an increase of 5.59-percent and Electra is up 3.07, but Wichita Falls is a minus 7.40.

Holiday is enjoying a 67.40-percent increase over the same period last year, having received \$27,616.

May's checks represent taxes collected by monthly filers in March and quarterly filers for the first quarter that were reported to the comptroller's office by April 21.

Three more charged selling drugs here

Three more arrests were made by Iowa Park police during the past week, as they continue to mop up on information gained by an undercover agent investigating drug trafficking here.

The first arrest was made Thursday, when Darrell Jay Walker, 28, turned himself in to police. He was charged with delivery of a controlled substance, and turned over to the sheriff's department.

At 4:37 Friday, Iowa Park police took Richard Allen Young, 27, into custody on Seymour Highway in Wichita Falls. Also charged with delivery of a controlled substance, he was taken to county jail.

Two hours later, Argie Keith Gould, 28, was arrested at his home

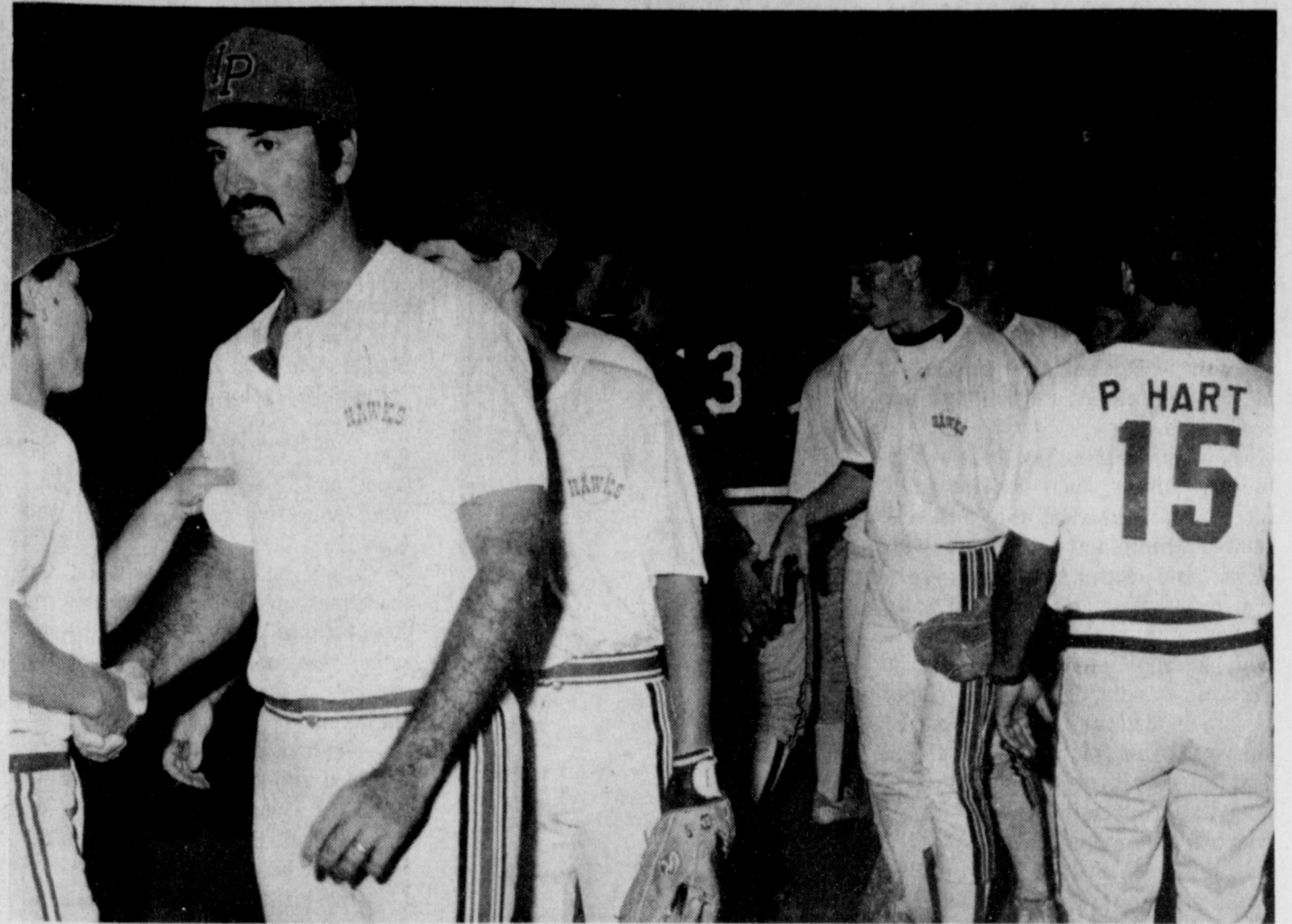
Spraying for ticks urged

An Iowa Park woman is encouraging her neighbors, as well as the entire city, to spray for ticks in the yards after her grandson became infected with Rocky Mountain spotted fever.

Lou Dormier, who lives at 1013 Louisa with her grandson Steven Trahan, said the youth has been treated and now appears to be clear of the problem, and has no after effects.

The nine-year-old third grade student at Bradford Elementary began having headaches and fever Thursday.

He was taken to a doctor, but the tick fever is difficult to diagnose, she explained. Late Saturday, when his temperature reached 104 degrees, she took him first to Bethania Hospital,

Hawks repeat as champs Meet Clyde Monday for bi-district

Iowa Park and Clyde are tentatively scheduled to hold a one-game bi-district baseball playoff Monday evening in Stephenville, according to Coach Daryl Frazier.

The Hawks won their second consecutive district title Tuesday at Bridgeport.

Frazier, after talking by telephone yesterday afternoon to the Clyde coach, said the game is slated for 5 p.m. at Tarleton State.

Tickets will be sold at the gate, \$3 for adults and \$1 for students.

Clyde was runner-up to Abilene Wylie in Dist. 3-AAA. Wylie will take on Bridgeport in a best-of-three series, with games being played at home.

Iowa Park knocked Clyde out of the playoffs last year in a three-game series.

The Hawks are Dist. 4-AAA champions, a baseball designation unlike other sports which are 6-AAA.

Iowa Park and Bridgeport each won halves of the district schedule, and had to face off Tuesday at Bridgeport to determine the conference

champion.

The Hawks turned the trick with a 7-4 decision, avenging a 6-5 loss to the Bulls last Friday.

With Billy Kenyon on the mound, the Hawks twice had to come from behind to retain their title.

Kenyon struck out seven batters, fewer than in most of his games, but he hit a towering two-run homer in the second inning that tied the score at 2-2.

Bridgeport took advantage of Kenyon's lack of control in the bottom of the second to get back into the lead, 4-2.

After walking three batters (he was having trouble adjusting to a low mound and all the throws were high), a single advanced two Bulls across the plate.

But he solved the problem from that point on, and the hosts were held scoreless the rest of the game.

Iowa Park racked up three runs in the third frame, with Craig Rickman leading off on a single, followed by a ground rule double by Jeff

Huff. Jimmy Nicholson, facing a new pitcher, doubled to score both runners, and he scored when Kelly McClure doubled.

Shannon Bernstein's single scored Duggins in the fifth, and Dan Fannin, who had a single in the sixth, was brought home by a Jerry Flesner double.

The same two teams squared off Friday at Bridgeport in a game that had nothing to do with the district standings, but wound up the regular season.

It was a 6-5 loss for the Hawks, but the greatest loss was of junior first baseman Pete Armstrong, who was injured and lost for the season.

Armstrong had left the base and, standing in the base line to catch a wild throw, the runner hit him.

The injury reportedly is torn ligaments in the left elbow, and a series of therapy sessions had been scheduled to assist his recovery.

Frazier took Armstrong, hurt in the second inning and the Hawks in the lead 1-0, to the hospital, leaving the team in the care of assistant coach John Hoelter.

In the sixth inning, and the Hawks trailing 3-6, an official ejected Hoelter for a comment he made in a huddle with his players.

Playing without a coach, the Hawks almost pulled off their rally, falling a score short of tying it and two from winning.

Chamber to honor local old-timers

One of the highlights of Iowa Park's 100th birthday celebration will be the presentation of certificates to the oldest resident, longest resident, and other resident categories.

Directors of the Chamber of Commerce, during their monthly meeting Monday, voted to have the certificates printed for presentation during the annual Whoop-T-Do, which will be held Oct. 15.

Residency is defined as in the current Iowa Park Consolidated Independent School District.

Directors specified, however, that recipients must attend the program in person to receive their certificates.

Certificates will be presented to residents of the district who have lived here as few as 25 years, then jump to 50 years, 60, 70, etc.

Directors also approved a proposal to sponsor a scrap metals firm to set up here sometime in the future to accept aluminum cans, brass and copper. The Chamber will receive a per-

centage payment from the firm. Bulbs to replace those burned out in the community's Christmas light decorations will be purchased by the Chamber, it was voted.

Also approved was a proposal to once again participate in Fallsfest in Wichita Falls June 17-19 with a booth promoting the community.

Chamber President Robert Palmer pointed out that the centennial bumper and window stickers are available to be sold by other organizations in the community, on a commission basis.

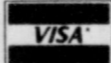

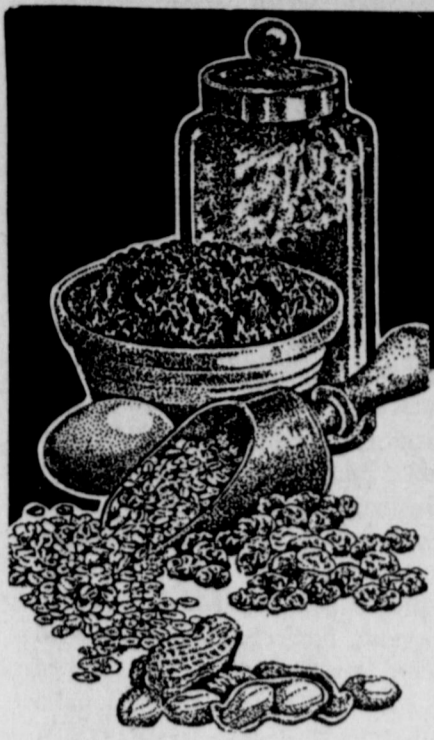

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Cook of the Week

Almost everyone wishes she could be a good enough cook to be able to throw a dish together without using a recipe and have friends and relatives rave about her cooking expertise.

The Leader staff found such a cook and after months of hounding have encouraged Carmen (Mrs. Eddy) Lambert, to put her "guesstimations" down on paper.

Carmen was born in San Pedro Chuauihula, Mexico, and moved to the United States, Crowell to be exact, when she was eight years old. Being a native of Mexico and learning to cook from her mother and grandmother, whom she describes as "excellent cooks," Carmen's cooking tendencies lean toward Mexican food.

The recipes she submitted this week make an entire Mexican dinner, from the tacos to the side dishes and garnishes. Carmen does warn, however, that since she uses the "dump method" of cooking, when preparing these recipes, they should be tested for saltiness and spiciness according to individual taste. She also suggested using fresh garlic in all the recipes that call for it for better taste.

She said she does use recipes for most American dishes and for any new dishes that she is trying, although she prefers sticking with her tried and true "dump method."

Carmen and her husband of 12 years, Eddy, moved to Iowa Park eight years ago from Vernon, and have nothing but good things to say about "The Town of Friendly Living."

Carmen said, "We really like the people here. It is a hometown feeling." She added that the town is like a big family and take care of their own.

Carmen worked as a secretary for TV Cable of Iowa Park until they relocated to Burkburnett. She then leased the building that housed the cable company and opened Video Library. Carmen celebrated her business' three-year anniversary in February. Eddy is employed at Siemens in Wichita Falls.

In her spare time, Carmen enjoys oil painting, selling some and doing others as gifts. She is a member of Christ The King Catholic

Church and of a volleyball team in Iowa Park.

AVACADO DIP

2 avacadoes - ripe
1/2 small onion, diced
1 jalapeno pepper, diced (fresh)
1 small tomato, diced
1/2 tsp. lemon juice
1/2 tsp. chili powder
Salt to taste
1/3 cup cilantro if desired
Mash avacado and mix all ingredients. If you prefer a hotter dip, add more chopped pepper. Serve with chips.

MEXICAN RICE

1/2 large onion, chopped
1 large tomato, chopped
1 tsp garlic powder (fresh is better)
1 Tbsp. cumin powder
2 Tbsp. salt
2 cups water
1 small can peas, optional
Blend the above ingredients in a blender.

In skillet, heat 3 tablespoons of vegetable oil and add 1 cup uncooked long grain rice. Fry over a medium heat and stir constantly until light brown. Add the blended sauce and cover. Cook about 30 minutes on low heat.

TACO GREEN SAUCE

2 tomatoes
5 fresh jalapeno peppers
1 chopped clove garlic
2 Tbsp. salt
Wash tomatoes and peppers and place in saucepan with 2 cups water. Boil until peppers are olive green and the tomato peel is falling off. Drain water and save. Pull the tomato peels

off and place tomatoes, pepper, chopped garlic and salt in blender. Add 1/2 of water saved and blend to desired consistency. If more spiciness is desired, add three or four more jalapeno peppers.

BEEF TACOS

1 tsp. black pepper
1 lb. hamburger meat
1/2 small onion, chopped
1 cloved garlic, chopped
1 tsp. cumin powder
1 small can tomato sauce
1 Tbsp. salt
15 corn tortillas
1 cup vegetable oil

Brown hamburger meat with onions, garlic and salt. Drain grease after meat is done. Add cumin, tomato sauce and one tomato sauce can of water. Cover and simmer over medium heat, stirring occasionally.

In skillet, heat vegetable oil over medium heat. When hot, drop tortillas in for a few seconds, only to make tortillas soft. Fold and place to the side. Do all tortillas like this. Drain extra oil and place tortillas in long cake pan. Fill with meat. Cover with foil and place in oven preheated at 350 degrees and bake 10 to 15 minutes.

Garnish with chopped lettuce, tomato, onions and cheese (Monterey Jack is best)

HOMEMADE REFRIED BEANS

2 cups cooked pinto beans
2 Tbsp. bacon drippings
In skillet heat bacon drippings until very hot. Add beans and a little juice. Cook until boiling and mash beans up while stirring. Save these overnight.

When ready to use:
Place two tablespoons of bacon drippings in skillet. Get drippings very hot and add mashed beans. Stir and add water as needed. Cook about 10 minutes and keep stirring until very hot.

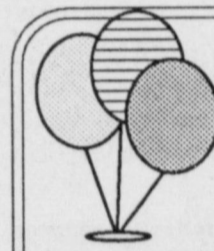
Reading program begins June 1

Insect Bites

The best protection against insect bites is prevention. Following these steps will reduce your risk of getting bitten:

- Wear shoes outdoors.
- Don't wear perfume, or bright flowery prints outdoors.
- Don't eat sweet foods like watermelon or ice cream outdoors.
- Be aware that gardens, orchards and garbage areas attract insects.
- Always have an insect sting kit available.
- If you are allergic to insect stings, wear a "Medi-Aler" tag.
- If fleas are a problem, vacuum infested rooms and spray with a flea killer. Treat animals according to instructions from your vet.
- When at home, or on the road, make sure you have plenty of insect repellent available.
- For ticks: avoid brush areas and check skin and clothing thoroughly. If a tick bites, put a drop of kerosene, benzene, or gasoline on the head of the tick. Wait 20 minutes. Then with tweezers gently pull the tick off.
- If you will be traveling overseas, check with you pharmacist, doctor, or local U.S. Public Health Service. Some insect bites can cause serious or even fatal reactions, and you need to be informed and prepared.

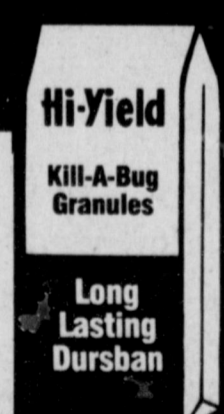
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As I See It...

Midwestern State University has announced plans to strengthen their entrance requirements by initiating a unit requirement in addition to the regular graduation rank and ACT/SAT scores. Minimum units to be accepted were set at 4 years of non-remedial English and 2 years of non-remedial Mathematics. MSU does not consider "below grade level" high school courses such as Correlated Language Arts, Math for Consumer Affairs, or Informal Geometry as sufficient to meet the non-remedial standard.

The academic council has also

decided that MSU will admit under provisional/advised admission any student who has graduated above the 40th percentile but failed to meet one or both of the unit requirements scheduled to go into effect with the summer terms of 1988. This transitional period will allow the current high school Seniors (1988) an opportunity to enter MSU with a remedial course (High School) if they meet the other MSU entrance requirements. Future MSU Freshmen will need non-remedial courses in order to be accepted.

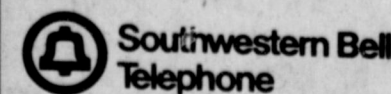

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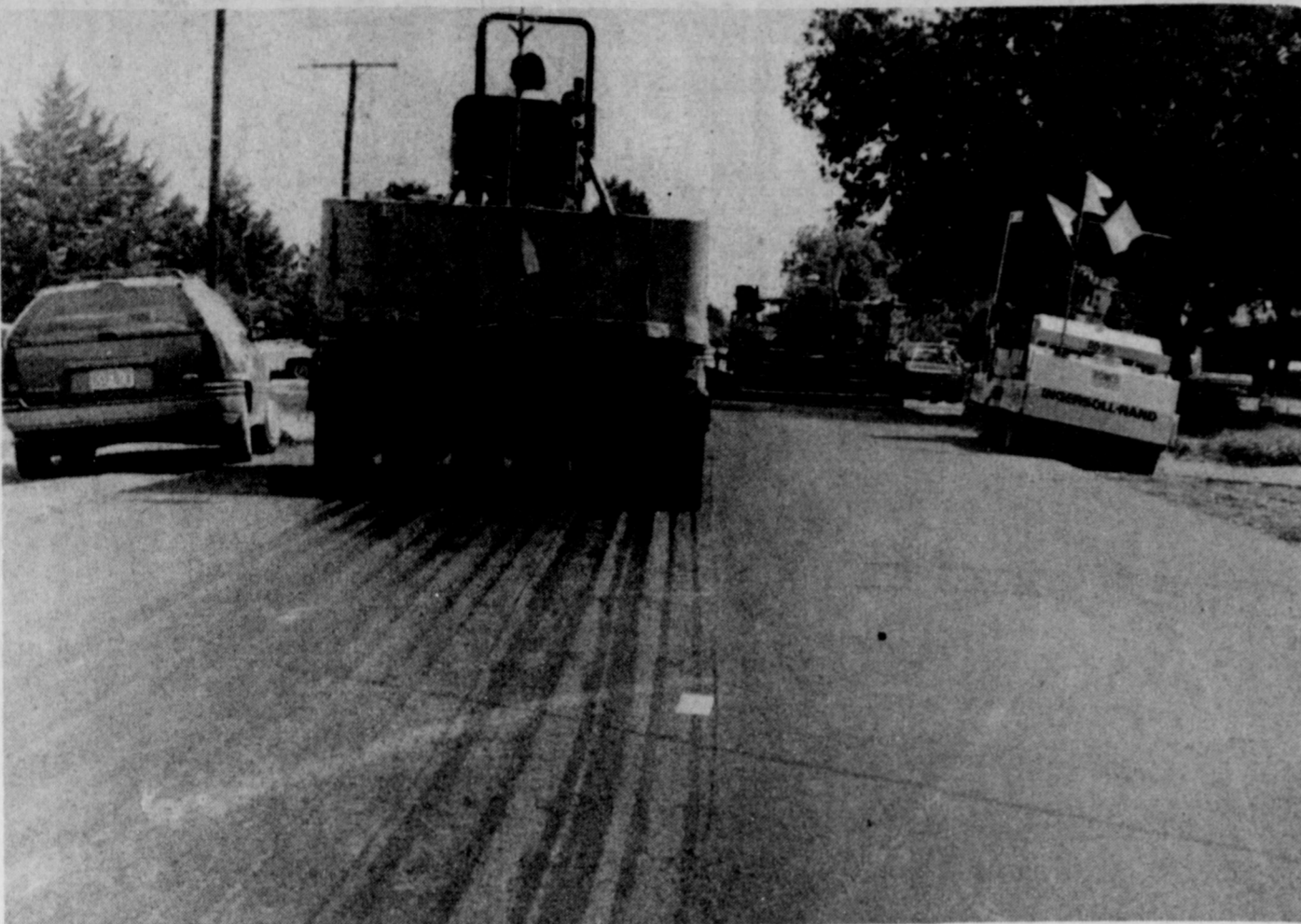

Her doctoral dissertation was Rings of Language in Robert Browning's "The Ring and The Book."

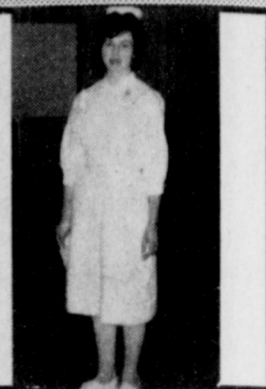

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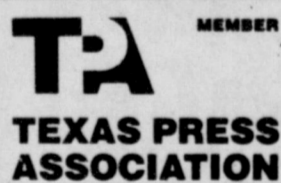

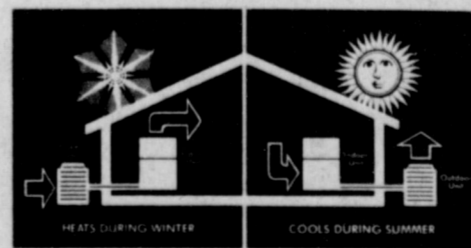

Netters bow out in quarterfinals

Iowa Park's tennis stars lost out in the quarterfinals of the state University Interscholastic League tournament in Austin, but to champions.

The boys' doubles team of Bill Chandler and Marc Johnson dropped their hard-fought match to the eventual state champs from Gilmer.

And Jenny Bowerman, making her second appearance at state in as many years, lost to the three-time state singles champion from Spring-

town. "We were disappointed they didn't go any further than they did," said Coach Dick Wineinger, "but we're real proud of them making it this far."

He made the point that there are several hundred who start out the spring season, but only eight get as far as state in their respective classes.

Johnson and Chandler appeared on their way to winning the first set

when they broke Gilmer's service in the seventh game and went ahead 4-3.

But Chandler was unable to hold his service in the following game, and Gilmer tied the count at 4-4.

Then Johnson, normally the strongest server of the two, lost on his service two games later and Gilmer took the set 6-4.

The Iowa Parkans, in the second set, broke Gilmer's service in the first game and later held a 3-1 lead. But Johnson again lost service and the count was tied at 4-4.

When the teams went to 6-6, a 12-point tie-breaker was called. And once again, the Hawks appeared the stronger, leading 3-1. But Gilmer finally won out 8-6.

Both Tim Tividad and Jason Clemens of Gilmer were left handed, and their services presented a different action on the ball than the locals were used to, Wineinger said. That possibly was the biggest problem the state champions posed in the match.

Gilmer went on to defeat the Rockdale team 6-3, 6-2 in the semi-finals, and then shot down the team from Cameron in the finals 1-6, 7-6, 6-4.

Bowerman had the misfortune of drawing Springtown's Amy Ryan in

the first round. Ryan, a senior, was attempting to earn her fourth state title.

The Springtown star knocked off the Lady Hawk with apparent ease, taking the set 6-love.

But Bowerman settled down in the second set, and gave Ryan all she could handle.

The Iowa Parkan won her first serve of the second set, knotting the score at 1-1, but lost her second serve.

She pulled closer, however, by breaking Ryan's next serve, and then tied the count at 3-3 by holding her serve.

However, Ryan won the next three games and match, 6-3.

Ryan advanced to the finals by beating Kelly Nolan of Hardin-Jefferson 6-3, 6-0.

The Springtown star's hopes were dashed in the finals Saturday, however, by Nancy Terrell of Marble Falls, 6-2, 6-3.

It was Terrell who unseated Bowerman as the reigning Region One singles champion a couple of weeks earlier.

Terrell lost only one game in the state tournament before facing off with Ryan.

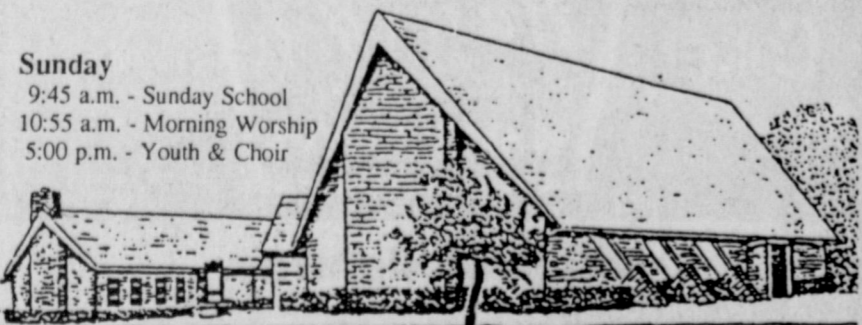
