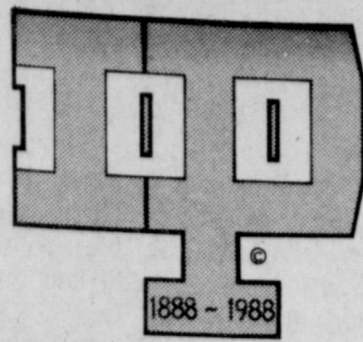

Building permits top \$1.40 million for year

Repairs to roofs damaged by the March 1 hail storm continue to add to the city's building permit total.

Permits issued during May were for \$271,891, which brings the year's total to \$1,413,342.

Permits issued in March were for \$417,798, and \$454,036 in April.

May's permits, as was the case the previous two months, were mostly for "repairs," which primarily is for roofing.

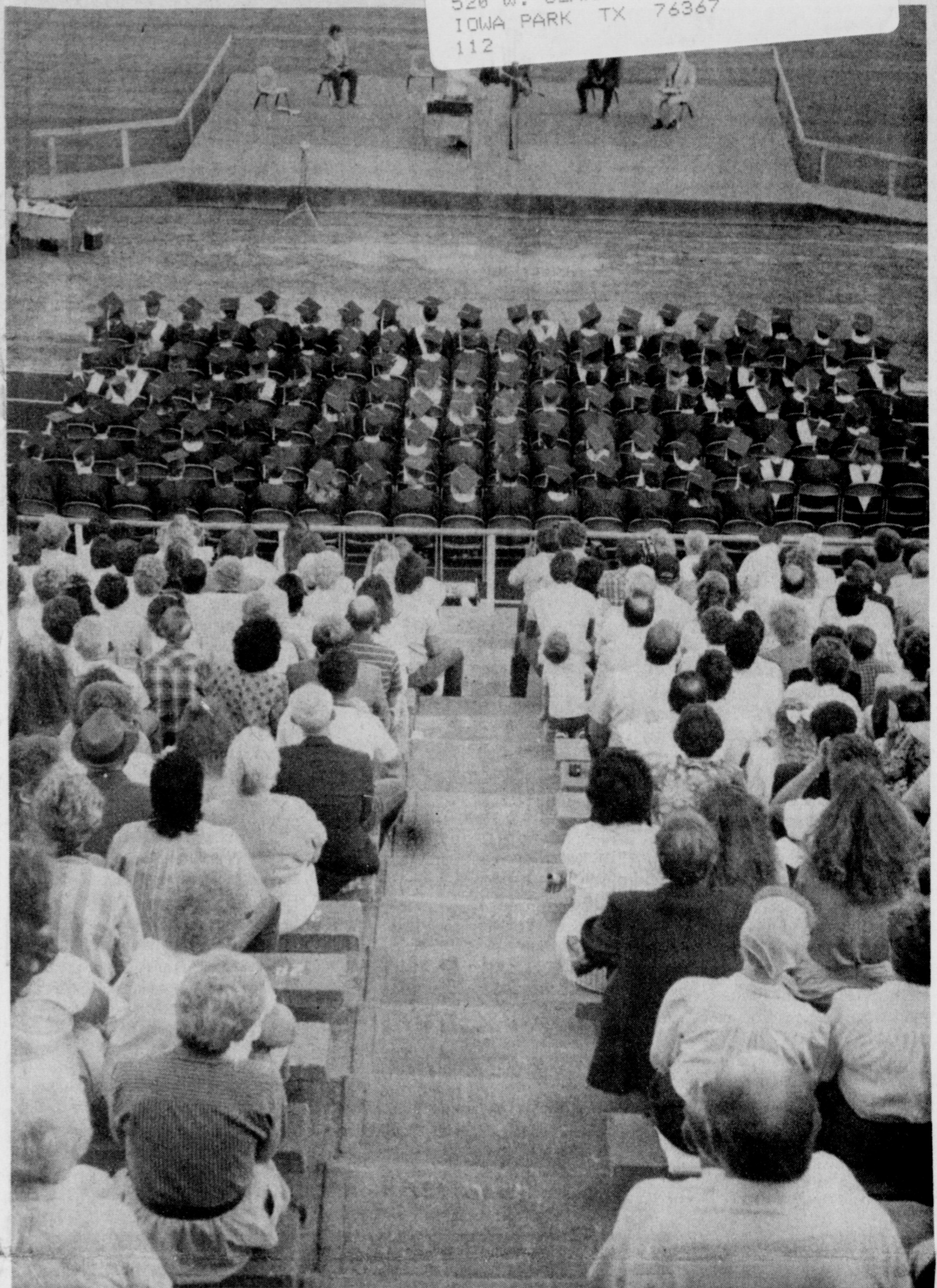

Vandals attack windows

Iowa Park Police received three complaints of objects being thrown through windows during the past week.

The windshield of an automobile in the 1300 block of Mockingbird was reported broken Thursday morning, as well as the dash being kicked in, according to the report.

The following day, an object was reportedly thrown through a front window of a home in the 600 block of East Cash.

And Tuesday, the windshield of an automobile parked in the 1100 block of W. Louisa was reported to have been shattered.

Three arrests were made during the same period by police.

Sandra Kay Bernal, 33, was taken into custody at 9:27 p.m. Wednesday of last week on West Highway and Colorado on warrants issued by the Wichita Falls DPS office, for speeding and failure to appear.

Shortly after midnight Friday, Carl Leon Robertson, 40, was arrested on a charge of driving while license was suspended, and transported to county jail.

James Edward Williams was taken into custody at 6:51 p.m. Friday in the Wal-Mart parking lot when police were called to investigate a

fight underway. Williams was charged with disorderly conduct.

Police are investigating a reported theft of a hand gun taken Saturday from a display case at Wal-Mart.

Officers assisted sheriff's office personnel when called at 4:26 a.m. Sunday to Country View Mobile Home Park, on the east side of town,

where a man committed suicide with a hand gun.

Det. Chris Pearson confirmed yesterday that the district attorney's office had dropped a charge of indecent exposure against Woodrow Lloyd Blackerby, 33, of 709 N. Yosemite. The charge was filed April 26.

Third Street rebuilding to get underway Monday

Third Street will be closed off to traffic Monday morning from Magnolia to Texas, so work can begin on rebuilding the surface, according to James Barrington, city administrator. The asphalt surface will be removed and replaced with concrete. In addition, curbing will be installed

from Magnolia to the existing curbing, Barrington said.

Construction is to be completed by August, so traffic will not be interrupted when Kidwell Elementary opens for the fall semester.

Third Street was selected as this year's major street project by the city council, based on the pavement's condition and amount of traffic it carries.

The city has a policy of annually selecting a major street rebuilding project and funds it with revenue from sales tax receipts.

Council retreat slated Saturday

Members of the Iowa Park city council will hold their annual goal-setting retreat Saturday at Lake Kickapoo, according to Mayor Tim Hunter.

Starting about 10 a.m., aldermen will meet with individual department heads to receive proposals for equipment, projects, manpower and other topics which, if approved, would be figured into the 1988-89 fiscal year budget.

Council members also will discuss projects for consideration next year and years in the future.

While projects are discussed, no final vote is held in a planning meeting such as Saturday. Any action on topics and goals discussed would have to be taken during a regular meeting of the council.

1.25 measured here Wednesday

Just about everyone, with the exception of wheat farmers and custom combine crews, was happy about the rainfall the area received Tuesday afternoon and evening.

Iowa Park's official measurement was 1.25, taken at the waste water treatment plant south of town.

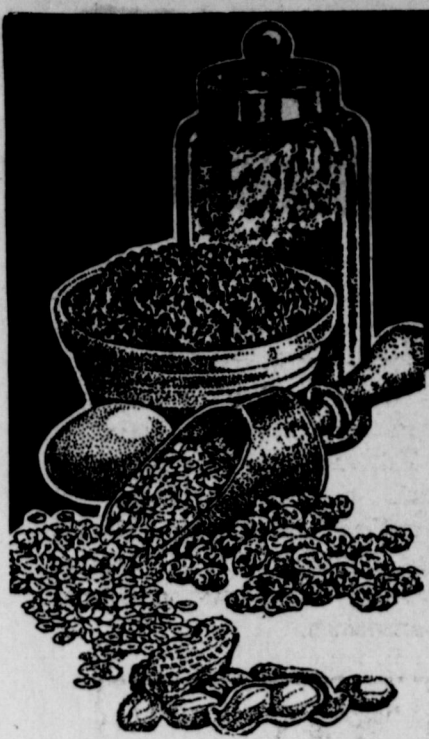
An even inch was measured by Joe Tom Collins at his home just north of Kamay. That figure was reported in several other areas.

Some of you know him as the Mayor of the City of Iowa Park, and some of you know him as the good of farm boy who grew up in Iowa Park, but we at The Leader know him as all these things as well as an excellent cook.

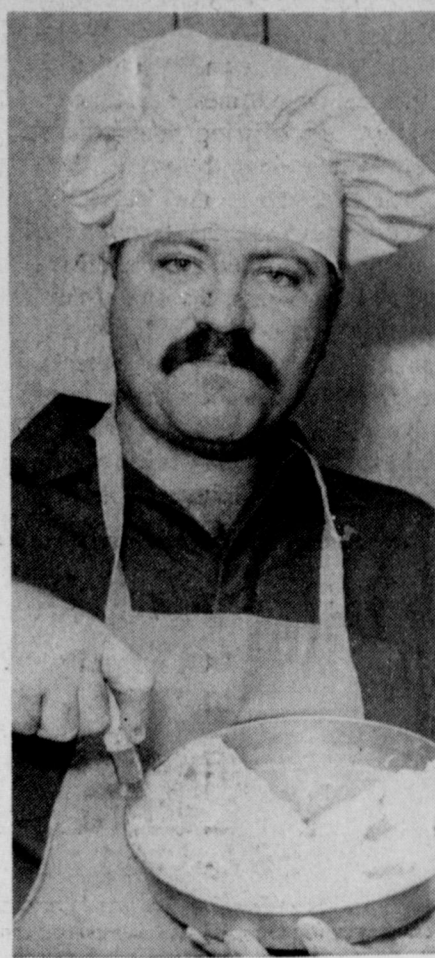
Referring of course to Tim Hunter, this hometown boy - made Mayor - made cook, has his hand in many things, with one of his favorites being good cooking.

Listening to Hunter talk about his cooking, other's cooking or just cooking in general is like listening to a homespun tale - another thing he is proficient at - telling stories.

He says he started cooking with his grandparents at the age of seven or eight, and learned a good many tricks of the trade from them. His interest intact, he continued to help cook throughout his younger years for family get-togethers.

He took his ability and interest with him to college where he and some fraternity brothers, who also had a place in their hearts for good food, shared recipes from their "parts of the woods."

Tim said it was at this time his culinary abilities began to broaden. During spring break, he and his friends would go to the coast, cook

out on an open fire and get recipes from "beach bums." While he lived in Arkansas, he had the opportunity to try some backwoods dishes such as opossum and squirrel and dumplings.

Authentic foreign dishes became a passion to him after traveling to Old Mexico and attaining some recipes from good cooks there. This prompted Tim to begin collecting cookbooks, about 75 to date, among them authentic Greek, French and Mexican cookbooks, and trying out new dishes.

Hunter says he does about half the cooking at his house, but maintains that his wife, Phyllis, is a good cook in her own right.

All of this cooking, experimenting and collecting has made a man who says he'll eat anything, try anything. He likes a variety of foods and makes most of his dishes from scratch.

Not the quiet, shy type by any means, Hunter is happy to be dealing with people.

Every year, he does cooking demonstrations for the home economics department at Henrietta schools. And every year since it began, he has entered the Okra Cook-Off at the Whoop-T-Do festivities, and each year won the showmanship award.

Tim was raised at Wichita Valley Farms and went to school in Iowa Park. He was graduated from East Texas State Univ. with a degree in agriculture education. After being in the poultry industry three and a half years in Arkansas, he came back to Iowa Park and managed the Texas A&M Experiment Station until it closed.

Tim and his sister Tammy opened their own business, Hunter's Farm and Home, in February.

Having served on the city council since 1982, he was elected Mayor in 1984.

Tim and his wife of 11 years have two children Ky, eight years old, and Lindsey, four years old.

COWBOY POTATOES

1 slice bacon (per person), diced
1 med. potato (per person), diced
1 onion, chopped

Fry bacon and onion, add potatoes. Cover and cook until done. Add one can cream of mushroom soup. Bring to a boil; add 1/4 lb. diced cheese. Salt and pepper to taste. Serve at once.

MEXICAN PORK CHOPS

8 pork chops
1 can Italian zucchini
1 small can creamed corn
1 small can whole kernel corn

Brown chops and drain. Arrange chops in casserole dish. Pour other ingredients over the top, stir and simmer 20-30 minutes, covered. This dish has a unique flavor. Serve with salad and baked potatoes.

CAJUN PORK ROAST

2 tsp. black pepper
1 1/2 tsp. salt
1 tsp. white pepper
1 tsp. ground red pepper
1 tsp paprika
1 tsp dried thyme leaves
1/2 tsp. dry mustard
1-4 lb. boneless pork loin roast
3 Tbsp. butter
1 Tbsp. vegetable oil
1/2 cup finely chopped onion
1/2 cup finely chopped celery
1/2 cup finely chopped bell pepper
1 Tbsp. minced garlic

Thoroughly combine the seasoning mix ingredients. Place all ingredients except the roast in a large skillet. Saute about four minutes over high heat, stirring occasionally. Cool. Meanwhile, place roast in a baking pan, fat side up. Make several deep slits in the meat with a knife to form pockets. Stuff the pockets with some of the vegetable mixture, then thoroughly rub vegetable mixture over entire roast by hand. Spread leftover mixture on top and sides. Bake uncovered three hours at 275 degrees, then at 425 degrees until dark brown on top and meat is white in the center, 15 to 20 minutes.

FRESH PEAR SWEET PIE-DOUGH COFFEE CAKE

Dough:
1/2 lb. softened butter
1/2 cup sugar
2 large eggs
3/4 tsp. baking powder
1/2 tsp. vanilla extract
1/2 tsp. almond extract
1 1/2 cups flour

Filling:
6 cups peeled and chopped pears
3/4 cup sugar
2 Tbsp. butter
2 Tbsp. water
1 tsp. vanilla extract
Glaze:
1/2 cup powdered sugar
About 2 1/2 tsp. milk, in all

Dough
Combine the butter, sugar, eggs, baking powder, vanilla and almond extract. Beat on low speed with

mixer a few seconds to blend, then on high speed until light and creamy, about four minutes. With mixer still running, add flour by spoonfuls until blended.

Reserve one cup of dough for the topping. Spoon the remaining dough into a greased 11X7-inch cake pan, spreading the dough evenly over the bottom and up the sides of the pan.

Filling

In a large skillet, combine pears, sugar and 2 Tbsp. butter. Place over a medium heat and cook until mixture is browned and fairly dry, about 35 minutes. Turn heat to low

and add 2 Tbsp. water and vanilla, stirring well. Cook about three minutes. Remove from heat and spoon mixture onto dough, spreading the filling out evenly. Then drop

scant teaspoonfuls of the reserved batter close together over the top of the filling, making about four rows across and about six rows down.

Bake at 350 until cake is done and dark golden brown on top.

Glaze

Place sugar in a small bowl. Stir in 2 tsp. milk, mixing a few seconds, just until smooth. Immediately drizzle over the hot cake. Let sit 30 minutes before cutting.

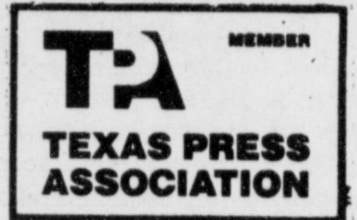
C.L. Thompson, zone chairman of District 2 E-1, presented the club with a second place achievement award which it won in Division Two.

After months of cussing and discussing, the U.S. Postal Service has decided to raise the price of postage. Beginning April 3, it will cost you 25 cents to mail a letter and 15 cents to send a "penny" postcard.

Even at a quarter a letter, the U.S. Mail is still a bargain. For a quarter you can send a letter anywhere in the country and it will arrive in a few days. You can't call long distance for less than a quarter or make a trip to visit someone on a quarter's worth of gasoline.

The purpose of the U.S. Postal Service, when it was founded by Benjamin Franklin, was to provide national mail service for individuals and businesses. In fulfilling the job of delivering first class mail there is no better organization in the world than the Postal Service.

Over the past decade, the Postal Service has become the delivery boy for tons of "junk mail." As you sort through the mail that arrives in your box each day, count how many pieces of mail you are expecting; letters from relatives, bills, newspaper and magazine subscriptions, checks and other letters. Compare that to the pieces of bogus contest offers, get-rich-quick schemes, sweepstakes propositions and other promotions.

If you weigh the mail you want versus the mail you didn't request, most of the time the "junk mail" stack will tip the scales in its favor.

Finally the post office has recognized that they are giving a bargain ride to the "junk mailers." Before the price increase, a mailing house could send a sale flyer to your house for the ridiculously low price of 8.3 cents each. That was a little more than a

third of the price of a first class letter.

After studying the problem, the Postal Service found that the laws of economics apply to mail, too. The increases in the volume of mail handled by the post office, 160-billion pieces this year, was caused by the increase in the number of pieces "junk mail" in the system.

If a product is under priced, as was "junk mail" delivery, more businesses will take advantage of it. As a result more and more "junk mail" clogged the offices of the postal system each year.

The good news in the postal rate increase is that the "junk mailers" will have to pay more to have their unsolicited mail delivered. It will cost a minimum of 10.1 cents for those mailers to use the postal service.

That is just 40 percent of what first class mail costs, but hopefully the new increased price will cut down on the number of pieces of "junk mail" that clog our mail boxes each day.

It appears that a group of rocks could stall the Hudspeth County site for the Texas low-level waste repository.

The Hudspeth site was preferred over a preliminary site in Andrews be-

cause the former had already been studied and the latter had faulty cliche.

According to an Associated Press story this week, an archaeologist, employed by El Paso county as part of a multipronged effort to block construction of the repository, has found that the site contains prehistoric examples of rock art that would be endangered if the site is chosen.

According to David Batcho of the consulting firm of Batcho & Kaufman of Las Cruces, N.M., the site was sacred to people living there 900 to 2,000 years ago. He told commissioners that if a repository and access road to the Hudspeth county site are built, the area could be more accessible to vandals who could destroy the primitive art.

Most of the sites are prehistoric petroglyphs, or pictures carved or etched in rock. Some are pictographs or paintings.

According to the archaeologist, the paintings and etchings portray action scenes and mythological characters. "These are not mere peckings and scratchings," Batcho said. "These people had artistic talent."

The county plans to nominate the rocks to the National Register of Historic Places.

The Texas waste agency was about to choose the Hudspeth County site 60 miles east of El Paso last summer but El Paso county filed suit to block the decision.

The article didn't say whether or not any of the paint had been tested for freshness.

Tax suites filed

Iowa Park school district and city tax office filed 10 delinquent tax suites last week and will file another 10 this week, according to Allen Shewmake, tax collector.

He said he anticipates some 60 suites to be filed at the rate of 10 each week.

"All delinquent tax payers were mailed notice and given 30 days to make payment or other arrangements and the 30 days are not up," Shewmake said.

State law mandates court costs and attorney fees be added to the tax owed, as well as specifying interest on the unpaid amount.

Penalty and interest charged for May is 13 percent. That increases to

15 percent in June and continues to 34 percent in August, with an additional one percent added each month thereafter, Shewmake explained.

The first of three delinquent properties will be sold on the courthouse steps the first Tuesday in June and others will be sold as soon as a "Notice of Sale" is posted by the county sheriff.

"The sale of one's property is our last resort when all other methods have failed," Shewmake said. "We hate to sell one's property but in most cases the owner does not want the property or can not get a clear title. However, the owner may pay the tax before the sale and save his or her property."

There's no way of knowing how many people attend Iowa Park High's graduation exercises each year in Hawk Stadium, because people are not counted when they enter.

But my feel of the audience Friday night was that the count was the highest ever to attend one in the facility. And I've been at every one of them in that stadium.

Not only was it the largest, in my opinion, but possibly the best mannered as well.

Had the weather not cooperated, there possibly would have been a lot of disappointed relatives and friends. The seniors were issued only seven tickets each for them, had the event been moved into the auditorium.

An event has been taking place down on the Gulf Coast at Ingleside Point, near Corpus Christi, that has been followed by literally thousands of people.

It was the shipping out of the world's largest oil drilling platform, nicknamed Bullwinkle, that required three years to construct. Let me give you a few figures about this monster.

As it floats on a barge past a building in Port Aransas, those on the seventh floor will have to look up another 320 feet to see the top of the structure that's actually lying on its side!

Standing up, the Bullwinkle, a mere 50,000 ton mass of steel parts, would look down on the world's tallest building, the Sears Tower in Chicago.

When installed in 1,350 feet of water, Bullwinkle will stand 1,615 feet tall, still 161 feet higher than the Sears Tower.

The barge on which the monster was floated, to a point 350 miles east of Corpus Christi and about 150 miles southeast of New Orleans, was constructed by a firm in South Korea and was too large to float the Panama Canal, so it had to make the long trip around South Africa to reach its destination.

The barge itself is 853 feet long and weighs 50,000 tons.

To load Bullwinkle onto the barge required a network of cranes,

ed the coast line for miles and miles.

According to the Port Aransas newspaper, thousands of people lined the coast, both on-shore and off-shore in boats, to watch the huge convoy make its way out into the Gulf last week.

I imagine it was a sight they'll be telling the grandchildren about. I was just sorry I wasn't there with them.

Denver City knocks Hawks out of playoffs

Iowa Park's Hawks were dropped from the state playoffs at the regional level Saturday, 6-3, by the Denver City Mustangs.

But the game was close enough that it was not decided until the final out, as the Hawks had two runners on bases with only one out in the seventh.

Trailing 6-3 in the bottom of the final inning, Craig Rickman walked, but Jeff Huff struck out. Then Jim Nicholson walked, bringing Billy Kenyon to the plate.

Kenyon, who slammed a home run in the district championship game at Bridgeport, hit a high infield popup for the second out.

Jimmy Duggins lofted a long, high fly into left field, but the fielder was able to get under it, not only to make the play but ending the game.

And the Hawks season. Kenyon went the distance on the mound for Iowa Park, striking out six, walking six, and giving up nine hits. Eight of the hits were singles, but the other was a seventh-inning home run.

Denver City scored two runs in each of the first two innings, but only one of them was earned.

After retiring the first two batters in the first inning, Kenyon walked the third batter, and the fourth singled. The lead runner advanced to third when an in-time throw was dropped by Kelly McClure.

Then the fifth batter singled a hard shot past shortstop Jimmy Duggins, scoring the two runners. Kenyon struck out the final batter.

In the bottom of the first inning the Hawks made a strong showing, connecting with the pitches, but each hit by Rickman, Huff and Nicholson

was to an infielder, forcing out runners.

In the second, Denver City's lead batter walked, as did the third after the second hit a fly to Dan Fannin in right field. The fourth batter struck out, but the fifth loaded the bases with a single.

A high fly into an extremely strong wind was then misjudged by Fannin, who dropped the ball. Two runs scored, but the third runner was out at home plate.

Duggins led off the second inning with a walk, but McClure hit into a double play. Terry Sitgraves walked and Shannon Bernstein singled, but the side retired when Fannin hit a fly to right field.

Denver City stranded two runners on bases in the third inning, and Rickman doubled to lead off the bottom half. He advanced to third on a sacrifice fly by Huff, but Nicholson and Kenyon both hit balls right to the gloves of fielders to retire the side.

In the fourth, the Mustangs got the leadoff on base with a single. He was followed by an out, but the third batter singled, scoring a run. The side was retired, however, on a double play by Sitgraves who fielded a hit, tagged the runner and then threw to first base.

That was the first of two double plays by Iowa Park.

After the leadoff Mustang struck out to open the fifth inning, Kenyon gave up two consecutive singles. But the side was retired when Danny Tatom fielded a grounder, threw to Sitgraves at second for a force out, and he relayed the ball to Kenyon at first for the double.

The Hawks mounted their rally in the fifth. After Fannin flew out,

Rickman and Huff singled. Rickman scored on a Nicholson single, and Kenyon's double scored both Huff and Nicholson. Duggins then hit a fly to center field and McClure lined out to the first baseman.

The Mustangs stranded three runners on bases in the sixth inning without scoring.

Sitgraves led off the inning with a walk, and Denver City changed pitchers. Bernstein attempted a bunt, but the ball popped up and the pitcher was able to field it, wheel and throw out Sitgraves at first. Fannin made the third out with a line shot to first.

Denver City was to take on Waco Robinson Tuesday at Abilene. The winner of that game will play the winner of the Bridgeport and LaVega game, which also was scheduled Tuesday, at Everman, for the Region One title and a trip to the state tournament at Austin.

Frazier may ban games day after graduation

Hawk baseball coach Daryl Frazier may not want to schedule a playoff game the day following senior class graduation.

As happened last year, Iowa Park lost out at the Area level the day after his senior players had received their diplomas.

In both games, Hawk followers felt their team should have won.

Saturday's 6-3 loss to Denver City ended the Iowa Park season with a 19-7 record, and a second consecutive District and Bi-District championship.

"We probably had as much talent as any Iowa Park team has ever had," Frazier reflected.

"There were times we didn't play as a team. That was our main drawback. When we did play as a team, we were unbeatable.

"I was real proud of the kids. They did everything that was asked of them. And with a few breaks here and there, they'd still be playing," he said.

Supporting his statement about his team's talent, Frazier pointed out the 1988 squad had the highest batting average of any Iowa Park High

team, the lowest earned run average, and the most wins.

Four permanent wall plaques recognize each year's outstanding players.

This year's recipients are: Billy Kenyon, both Most Valuable Player and Outstanding Pitcher; Leading Hitter, Jimmy Nicholson, and Golden Glove, Craig Rickman.

FmHA rule change told

Proposed rules, which could assist hundreds of farmers who are behind on their Farmers Home Administration loans, were issued May 23, according to state director Lynn Futch.

The new regulations will carry out portions of the Agricultural Credit Act passed by Congress in December. "There will be a 30-day comment period and additional time for any appropriate changes before the regulations become effective," Futch said.

One of the changes would allow FmHA to reduce the delinquent debt of certain borrowers to help them stay in business. There are approximately 5,000 delinquent borrowers in

Texas, many of whom should be assisted with the program once implemented.

In related actions, the agency also issued proposed regulations to:

- * make it easier for farmers or their families to lease or buy back homesteads that have been lost through foreclosure or conveyance;
- * set up a program to help members of minority and socially disadvantaged groups to purchase farmland and develop an outreach program to carry it out;
- * establish a new administrative appeals unit distinct from the rest of the agency to handle borrower grievances;
- * certify and participate in state mediation programs.
