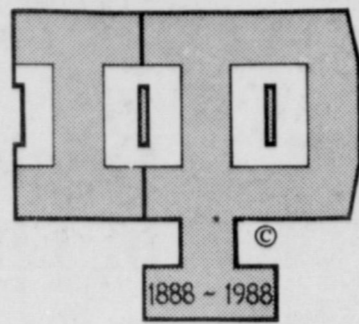

## WINDSTORM

### Fanned blaze burns Gilmore barn, tractors

Winds measured in excess of 55 miles per hour caused considerable damage over the area Tuesday, but the rains that preceded it were welcomed by area farmers.

Most serious damage reported was a fire at the Junior Gilmore farm, on the southeast corner of the "Y" at FM 368 and 367, shortly after 1 p.m.

Winds are believed to have whipped an electrical line to the barn, causing it to short and ignite the blaze.

Volunteer firemen were helpless in their effort to extinguish the raging fire, but were able to keep it from spreading in the pasture to the east.

Besides the loss of the barn were its contents, which included more than 2,000 bales of hay and two tractors. Some saddles and a fertilizer spreader were saved, however.

A 70-foot ham radio antenna tower was felled by the winds at 405 West Valley, owned by Gregory Ross. The tower, erected some three years ago, was insured, Ross said. It fell within the Ross back yard and did not damage anything else.

A highline pole was broken off at the ground on Third Street, just north of Magnolia, and a metal storage shed at a home on Lanelle was blown from its base and into a neighbor's yard. Its contents were not disturbed, it was reported.

Some roofs received minor damage from the strong winds, and trash was scattered from roll-out carts that blew over.

Prior to the winds reaching their highest levels Tuesday, small hail fell over the city. No damage was reported from the pea-sized stones.

The hail was accompanied by .05 of an inch rain. That, added to the .81 measured Friday night by Virgil Woodfin, raised the city's rainfall total for the past week to .86.

### FOR DRUG POSSESSION

## 12 arrested in same house

It wasn't a planned part of the "Be Drug Free Week" that started Friday, but Iowa Park police arrested 12 persons, all in the same home, on possession charges.

Acting on an informant's tip, police obtained a search warrant to go into the house at 304 East Pecan and went to that address at 9:30 p.m.

Chief Alan Sheffield said he was

surprised when the number of adults in the house equaled his group, which included eight from the local department and four county deputies.

Arrested on charges of possession of a controlled substance, methamphetamine, a felony, were: Carl Leon Robertson, 39; Robert Ira Cash, 17; Richard Alan Foster, 33; Robert Lloyd Chester, 20; Terry Lee Drake, 36; Lloyd Glen Drake, 33; Dawn Elaine Drake, 30; Judy Gail Robertson, 27; Emma Clide Foster, 33; Philip Page Gann, 42; Carl Leon Robertson Jr., 18, and Fletcher Christine Cash, 21.

Also in the house were three children, two male and one female, all believed to have been under seven years of age. They were turned over to a relative not living at the address.

Chief Sheffield said he had only expected five or six people to be there when they served the warrant.

Though the inside and outside of the house was littered with items believed to have been stolen, officers were able to identify only one piece of equipment that definitely had been taken in Wichita Falls, a commercial electric blower valued between \$200 and \$750.

Charged with the theft of the blower were Cash and the senior Robertson.

Also found in the house were other drugs, including marijuana and a heroin substitute, and a large quantity of new and used needles, as well as two hand guns.

Five or six parole violation warrants were out on some of those arrested, and among them were histories of some 20 burglary charges, 12-15 drug violations, seven thefts and a "host of other charges, including traffic."

The group was transported in different cars at 1:19 a.m. to county jail, where most of them remained as late as yesterday.

Considerable interest has been expressed by law agencies, including two different corporate security offices, according to the chief. He said a number of charges could result in the future, but refrained from listing any.

The investigators, upon entering the house, not only found people sleeping on couches and on the floor, but numerous items stored in open spaces, such as two console television sets, a large quantity of painting equipment and tools, two truck radios, and a large stash found in the attic of power tools.

A computer search of identification numbers found on the items failed to turn up any stolen reports, however, other than the blower.

The occupants had been in the house about two months. Water service was connected Oct. 6, according to city records.

With the arrests of so many persons, as well as finding so many different items believed to be stolen, police spent a lot of time over the weekend doing paperwork.

Sheffield estimated manhours spent Saturday and Sunday doing the paperwork amounted to more than 40.

One other unrelated drug arrest was listed on the police blotter.

Officers stopped Thomas Craig Cannon, 23, of Wichita Falls, Wednesday of last week while riding a motorcycle.

It was first determined he was wanted on an outstanding warrant from the sheriff's department, and then was found to have a container of methamphetamine in his pocket.

He was placed under arrest and transported to county jail.

## City asks Corps for floodplain help

The city of Iowa Park is asking the Army Corps of Engineers for help to reduce or eliminate the floodplain that has created a problem for residents of an area in the northeast part of town.

Mayor Tim Hunter this week sent a letter to Col. Frank Patete in Tulsa, asking for the assistance.

Residents in the floodplain are restricted on how they can develop their property, because of an ordinance adopted in 1982 by the city.

Adoption of the ordinance was required in order for all homeowners in the city to qualify for federal flood insurance.

Property owners have complained to the city, and also met with representatives of the Federal Emergency Management Agency, concerning their plight.

In some cases, mobile homes were allowed to be moved into the area, but not required to conform with requirements of the ordinance.

Since that time, however, the city has begun doing a better job of code enforcement, and that was when the homeowners became frustrated.

The letter Mayor Hunter sent to Col. Patete stated:

"In an effort to best protect its

citizens from losses of life and property within the floodplain area, while allowing them to utilize their property to a fuller extent, the City of Iowa Park desires to take necessary steps to either reduce or eliminate the floodway areas within its corporate city limits. Discussions with the Federal Emergency Management Agency have focused our efforts toward attempts to revise the Flood Insurance Maps for our community. We do not believe that error falls with the Corps of Engineer documentation, rather we feel that efforts such as channelization and dredging should be pursued. As mayor of the City of Iowa Park, I am requesting that the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers evaluate the Gordon Creek flood area under Section 205., the small projects program, to determine what if any actions our community can take to better serve the residents within this area.

"If I or any of the City staff can be of any assistance to you please feel free to contact us."

Diane Leatherwood, FEMA representative, said in a meeting she attended here last week, that the Corps has programs to assist in clearing out channels that contribute to flooding.

## Annexation begins of Lake Iowa Park

The first in a series of hearings was held Monday by the city council to annex Lake Iowa Park into the city limits.

The addition, once completed, will enlarge the city's territory by more than 436 acres of land.

Public hearings on annexation are scheduled Nov. 28 and Dec. 5.

Aldermen approved an ordinance that prohibits on-street parking in the 1000 block of First Street, and also gave their approval to demolish a house at 610 E. Bank. Unoccupied, it fails to meet building code standards.

The structure to be cleared by the city is owned by John Paul Jones. Aldermen were told that all attempts to contact the owner were unsuccessful and mail was returned stamped "moved, left no forwarding address."

A resolution approved by council members exempts two police cars from being required to use exempt license plates, so they can be used in certain undercover activities.

A proposal that the city complete its project of constructing the new Chamber of Commerce building was also approved.

The proposal was to construct

parking, sidewalks and curbing

## Ducks Unlimited topic of Optimist program

Mike Price, president of the local chapter of Ducks Unlimited, gave the program for the Iowa Park Optimist Club recently.

Price began by giving the history of Duck's Unlimited, saying that the organization began 50 years ago after a large drought killed most of the duck population. He said three men in Chicago then began a Ducks Unlimited chapter to preserve and repopulate the ducks.

Ducks Unlimited is a non-profit organization with a membership fee of \$20 per year. Memberships fees are used to purchase land and waterways for the breeding grounds for the ducks.

Price stated that Ducks Unlimited will match or double any money collected to buy and improve

land and waterways in the United States for ducks and geese. He cited that the State of Texas sold over 1-million duck stamps last year, and said that the organization will donate up to twice that amount to preserve ducks in Texas.

During the business, a letter from the Wichita Falls State Hospital was read giving a list of things needed for Christmas. Some items on the list include socks, handkerchiefs, hats, underwear, dress pants, sports shirts, coloring books, cigarettes, robes and makeup.

Ed Anderson gave a report on the Youth Appreciation Banquet to be held Saturday evening. Richard Davis will be the speaker at the banquet, which annually honors 16 outstanding Iowa Park High School students.

## City's sales tax receipt increase highest in county

Iowa Park continues to show a whopping increase in sales tax receipts, according to a release this month from the state comptroller's office.

The city received a check in the amount of \$17,436.07 this month, raising the year to \$164,489.78.

For the year, Iowa Park has received 15.38-percent more from sales taxes than through this date in 1987.

Though the other cities of the county have increases over last year, none is as great as Iowa Park's. Burkburnett is 3.4 percent over this time last year, Wichita Falls 4.31 and Electra 5.63 percent.

Holliday also has a significant increase over last year, 25.89 percent, after receiving \$6,650.12 this month to raise its total to \$58,323.71.

November's checks represent taxes collected by monthly filers in Sep-

tember and taxes collected by quarterly filers in July, August and September.

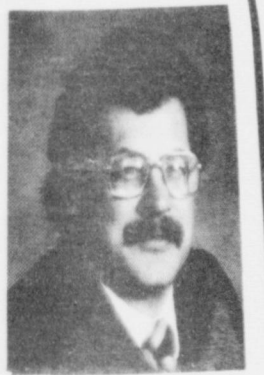

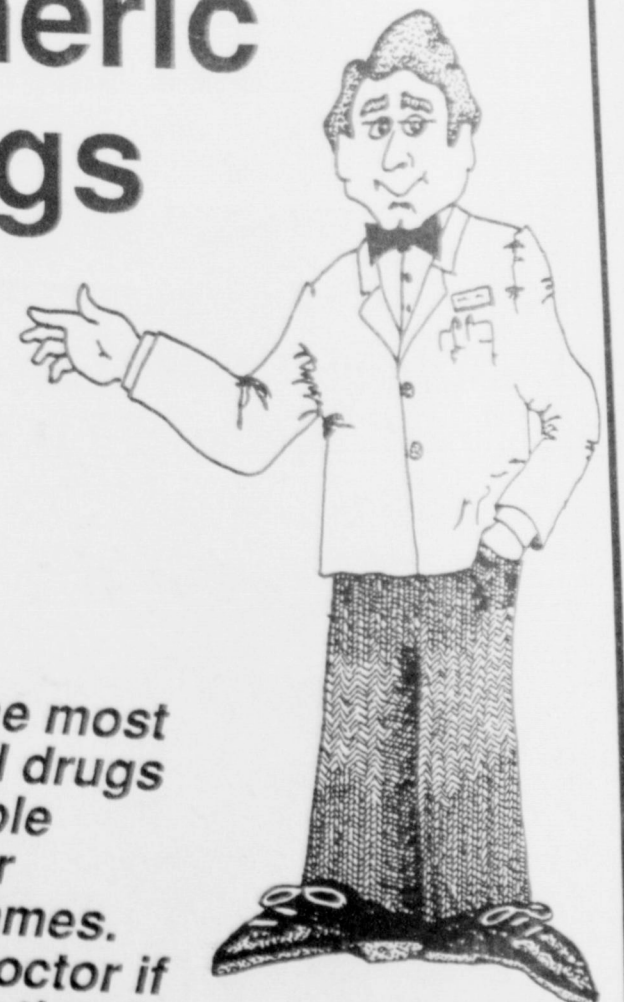

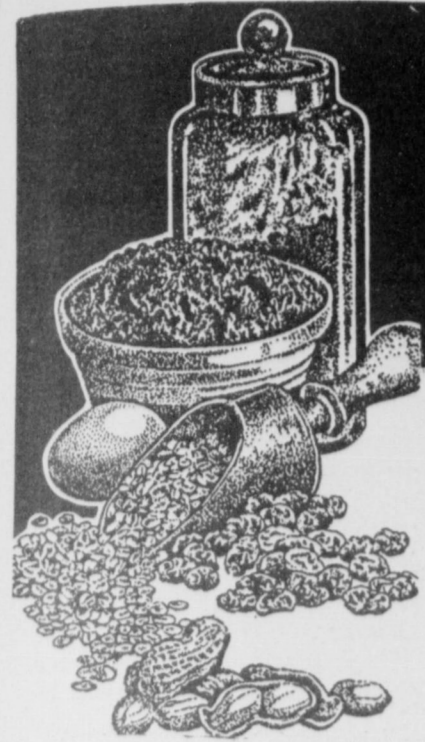

## ONE PAN STEAK, POTATOES AND GRAVY

Round steak  
5 potatoes  
1 onion, chopped  
Salt  
Pepper  
1 can cream of mushroom soup  
Cut steak up into medium size chunks. Salt, pepper and flour steak and brown with onions in a pressure cooker in two tablespoons Crisco. Cover with water and pressure cook 10 to 15 minutes. Add cubed potatoes, cover with water and cook another 10 minutes. Remove meat and potatoes. Add mushroom soup to broth and serve.

If you had damage or not Tuesday, count your blessings it wasn't any worse.

- An empty building costs:
\* \$125,000 in sales at that location
\* \$15,000 in salaries
\* \$6,000 in rents
\* \$5,600 in business profits
\* \$875 in property taxes
\* \$13,400 in non-real estate loan demand
\* \$58,500 in property values
\* \$3,400 in utilities
\* and \$2,000 in advertising revenues.
The figures were calculated by a

Washington, D.C., real estate consulting firm based on a small town building sitting vacant for one year in a town's business district. Seeing these figures brought to mind the recent loss of Powell Supply Co. from our Main Street. It hurt a lot of people. Other businesses suffered from it. And it subtracted from our city and school tax rolls.

Dave commented that standing by and watching businesses fold is something Pittsburg can not afford. And I might add, neither can McGregor!

He pointed out that an exchange newspaper earlier in the year had run a cartoon by a student depicting a small boy and his mom walking past a boarded-up store. They were carrying sacks full of items with names of a large discount store in another town. The mother exclaimed: 'Oh, what a shame, another store closed. I don't know what's going to happen to our little town.'

When I read that I remembered the cartoon came from The Mirror. One of Rosemary Falls' students drew it, following a discussion of problems that arise when people do not trade at home.

Dave concluded: 'The next time we shop at home first, we might want to make a point to look the merchant in the eye and tell him or her we appreciate the jobs, the taxes and the faith they have invested in the community. It beats telling them we're sure sorry to hear they're closing.'

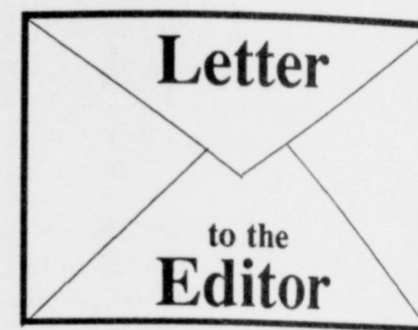
around the structure, with a limited expenditure of \$3,200.

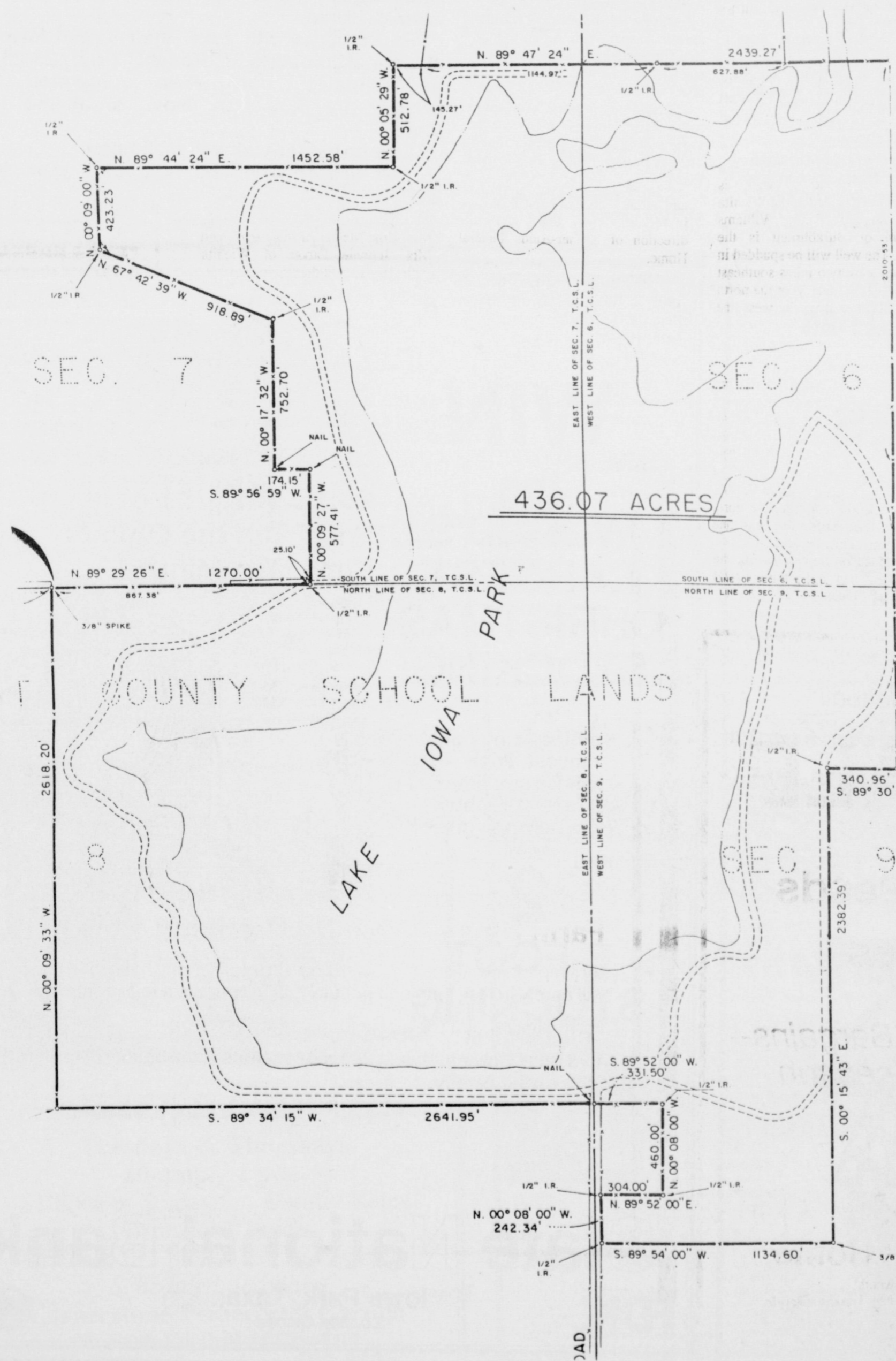
A boring machine, which will permit city crews to install water lines under pavement without cutting the surface, was also approved by the council. Cost was set at \$4,955.

The Lottery Clarification Act, passed by both the House and Senate and now awaiting a presidential signature, may -- after all these years -- end some hard feelings by charities towards newspapers.

The postal service defines a lottery as any activity that involves a prize, a chance and a consideration.

For the layman, the ladies quilt society raffling off the prize quilt is a lottery.

Replacing the ticket price with the word "donation" does not erase the "consideration" factor of a lottery.

An offer requiring that a consideration be paid for a chance to win is a lottery.

Bingo games, casino gambling and raffles are some examples of activities that normally involve all three of these elements.

## Texans pay less for local telephone service

Southwestern Bell Telephone customers in Iowa Park and across the state pay less for basic residential local telephone service than most customers across the nation, according to a recent study by the Federal Communications Commission.

"In Iowa Park, residential one-party customers pay only \$8.80 per month which is about the same as the price of a large pizza," said Dan Adams, area manager. "Or, on a daily basis, the basic rate here is 29-cents per day for a service that's always available, providing contact with friends, relatives and emergency services," he said.

Nationally, the average monthly rate for basic residential service is \$12.19. In Texas, residential service rates range from \$8.15 to \$11.05 per month depending on the size of the local calling scope.

Rates quoted in the FCC study include only rotary dial, unlimited calling, one-party basic service. The monthly rates do not reflect federal subscriber line charges, state and local taxes, long distance, custom calling, touch-tone or other optional services.

Southwestern Bell subscribers in Texas also have a lower-cost option available to them. Economy service, available throughout most of the state, allows 25 outgoing calls and unlimited incoming calls, for half the basic charge.

"We don't sacrifice service to achieve lower rates," Adams said. "Customer satisfaction levels in Texas are at record-high levels."

The company's customer surveys show that 96 percent of those customers questioned say they are satisfied with their telephone service.

"The survey demonstrates our employees' dedication to hold down costs," said Adams. "We're proud of our service and the value our customers receive for their hard-earned dollars."

The FCC study compared basic monthly residential telephone rates in 95 cities. The rates range from a low of \$6.60 in Fort Dodge, Iowa, to a high of \$23.39 in Huntington, West Virginia.

Six Texas cities included in the study rank near the lower two-thirds of the 95 cities surveyed nationwide. The Texas cities, where each ranked in the survey, and the basic monthly residential rate for each: Houston-57 (\$11.05); Dallas-67 (\$10.40); Fort Worth and San Antonio-both 69 (\$9.85); Corpus Christi-78 (\$9.10), and Brownsville-81 (\$8.80).

ATAPCO of Midland has revealed plans to drill a total of three wells in Wichita County Regular Field, two miles southeast of Clara. All three carry 1,950-ft. total depths.

The wells will be known at the No. 75-A H. Reilly, No. 76-A H. Reilly and No. 79-A H. Reilly.

Location was in an 873-acre lease 2,340 feet from the south line and 1,830 feet from the west line of the W&NW Survey.

Burnett Oil of Fort Worth has given up on its efforts to make a producer out of the No. 1 J.W. Porter. It was a wildcat try in a Hardeman County location. The location was 7.5 miles southeast of Medicine Mounds. Drillsite was in a 640-acre lease 2,730 feet from the north line and 1,130 feet from the west line of the H&TC Survey. Cal Jeter of Wichita Falls has given up on his efforts to make a producer out of the No. 6 McDonald. It was a developmental try in the Wichita County Regular Field. The location was eight miles south of Iowa Park. Drillsite was in a 160-acre lease 1,000 feet from the north line and 1,150 feet from the east line of the Denton CSL Survey.

Spudded on September 30, the well had reached a dry bottom total depth of 1,840 feet.

# Tips offered for Christmas mailing

Aerobics instructors regularly remind their students to keep their tummies "tight" and "tucked."

The same advice applies to preparing holiday parcels for mailing.

All that's necessary is choosing sturdy cartons or boxes, and sealing them smoothly and tightly with the proper tape. Padded mailing bags work well for small items.

Don't wrap cartons in bulky brown paper or tie them with string or twine. The paper can tear and the twine can get tangled in the mail processing equipment.

Using paper and string isn't necessary if you're using proper boxes or cartons. If you feel a need to wrap and tie a box, that may be a signal that you don't think the box is sturdy enough to begin with. Get another one instead.

Parcels should be sealed with a type of tape designed for sealing packages: pressure sensitive, nylon-reinforced kraft paper or glass-fiber-reinforced pressure sensitive. Don't use cellophane or masking tapes because they're not strong enough.

Correct addressing is as important for parcels as for letters. If the box has been used before, be sure first to remove all old labels and addresses.

The top of the package should show the name of the person to whom you're sending it, their house number and street, and the apartment number, if there is one. The last address line should contain the city, state and ZIP Code -- and be sure to use the Zip Code.

Your own return address and ZIP

Code should be in the upper left corner. Please use smudge-proof ink.

Preparing the inside of the package or box is as important as preparing the outside. The contents should be cushioned carefully with crumpled paper, with foam shell or air-pocket padding that is commercially available. Don't leave any empty space in the box.

Before you seal the package, it's also a good idea to enclose a slip of paper showing the name and address of the person to whom you're sending it. Although it doesn't happen very often, parcels can get damaged so the outside address can't be read.

Finally, if a package contains irreplaceable valuables, send it by Registered Mail.

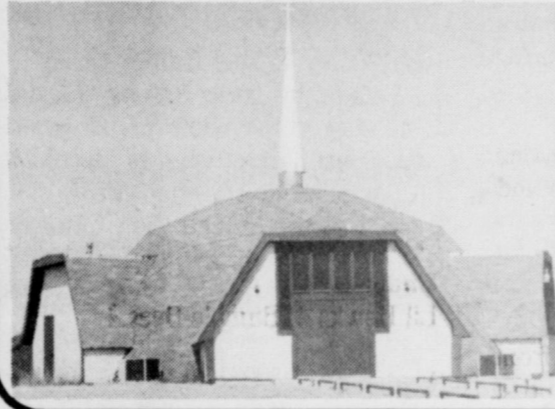

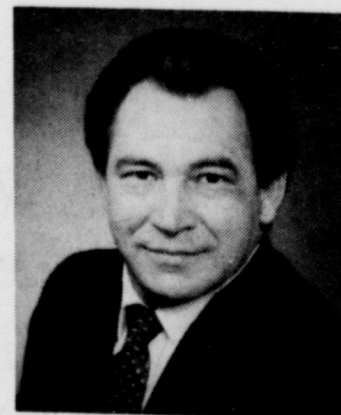

## Paducah vs. Muenster here Friday in playoff

Hawk Stadium will be the site of an area playoff game Friday between two Class A schools, Paducah and Muenster.

Kickoff will be at 7:30 p.m., and tickets will be \$4 for adults and \$2 for students.

This will be the second straight year for the Paducah Dragons in the

playoffs, even though they come to town with a 5-5 record.

Paducah, returning with last year's leading ball carrier in the state, was knocked out in the quarterfinals in 1987 by Munday, with a 13-1 record.

For the Muenster Hornets, this will be their first time in the playoffs under Head Coach Bill Jump, who moved down from Oklahoma in 1987 and suffered through a 3-7 season. His club advances this year with a healthy 9-1 record.

Paducah beat Crowell 20-0, fell to powerhouse Munday 29-6, and then finished up the season with wins over Knox City, 27-22, and 38-6 over Turkey Valley.

With 24 returning lettermen, Muenster won its first five games of the season, Collinsville 27-9, S&S 19-13, Nocona 21-6, Gunter 22-6, and Lindsey 20-17, before falling 19-14 to Valley View.

The Hornets then edged Era 7-6

and walked over Petrolia 40-7, Alvord 40-0 and Windthorst 14-0, to earn a spot in the playoffs.

The Dragons have only three players over 178 points to block for Hurd. They are center Bill Guggisberg, 198, fullback Michael Evans, 202, and freshman center Justin Nash, who tips the scales at 267.

Muenster has some size with which to counter, including Bill Thornhill, 195, and a pair of underclassmen: sophomore Brad McDaniel at 205 and freshman Sam Walterscheid at 220.

The teams will play here as the guests of the Iowa Park schools and Chamber of Commerce.

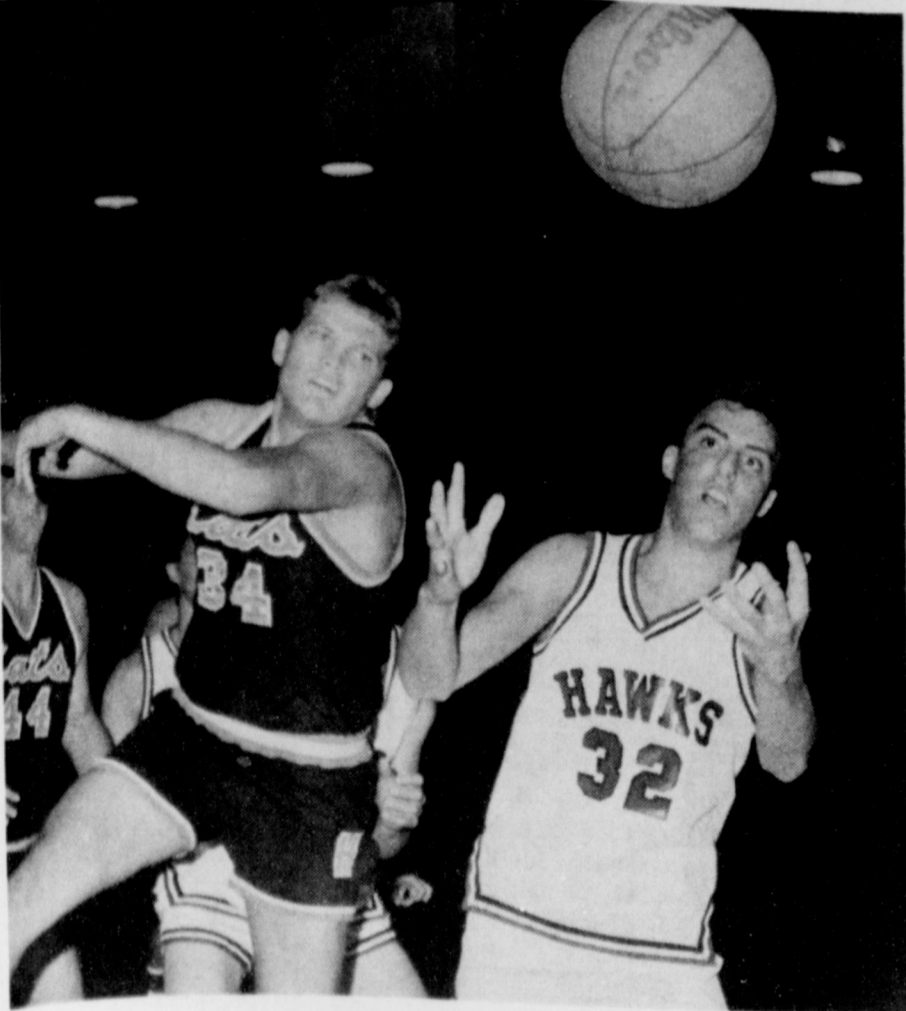

Ordinance No. 584 AN ORDINANCE OF THE CITY OF IOWA PARK, TEXAS AMENDING THE CODE OF ORDINANCES AT SECTION 1-7 INCREASING THE MAXIMUM FINES ALLOWED FOR CERTAIN VIOLATIONS OF THE CITY CODE.

Whereas, it has been determined that in certain instances the previously allowed maximum fine of \$200 for violations of City ordinances is no longer a sufficient deterrent to violators; and

Whereas, the State of Texas has allowed general law cities to increase their maximum fines to as much as \$2,000 in some instances.

NOW THEREFORE BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY OF IOWA PARK that: Section 1-7 of the Code of Ordinances is hereby amended to read as follows:

Sec. 1-7. General penalty; continuing violations. Whenever in this code of in any ordinance of the city an act is prohibited or is made or declared to be unlawful or an offense or a misdemeanor, or whenever in such Code or ordinance the doing of any act is required or the failure to do any act is declared to be unlawful, where no specific penalty is provided therefor, the violation of any such provision of this Code or any such ordinance shall be punished by a fine of not less than one dollar (\$1.00), nor more than one thousand dollars (\$1,000); provided, however, that where the offense is one for which a penalty is fixed by state law, the penalty for such offense shall be the same as fixed by state law.

Each day any violation of this Code or other ordinance of the city shall continue shall constitute a separate offense unless otherwise provided.
