

# Fanned blaze burns Gilmore barn, tractors

Winds measured in excess of 55 miles per hour caused considerable damage over the area Tuesday, but the rains that preceded it were welcomed by area farmers.

Most serious damage reported was a fire at the Junior Gilmore farm, on the southeast corner of the "Y" at FM 368 and 367, shortly after 1 p.m.

Winds are believed to have whipped an electrical line to the barn, causing it to short and ignite the blaze.

Volunteer firemen were helpless in their effort to extinguish the raging fire, but were able to keep it from spreading in the pasture to the east.

# Leader to print early next week


Because next Thursday will be Thanksgiving Day, and a postal holiday, the Leader will be published a day early.

Besides the loss of the barn were its contents, which included more than 2,000 bales of hay and two tractors. Some saddles and a fertilizer spreader were saved, however.

A 70-foot ham radio antenna tower was felled by the winds at 405 West Valley, owned by Gregory Ross. The tower, erected some three years ago, was insured, Ross said. It fell within the Ross back yard and did not damage anything else.

A highline pole was broken off at the ground on Third Street, just north of Magnolia, and a metal storage shed at a home on Lanelle was blown from its base and into a neighbor's yard. It's contents were not disturbed, it was reported.

Some roofs received minor damage from the strong winds, and trash was scattered from roll-out carts that blew over.

Prior to the winds reaching their highest levels Tuesday, small hail fell over the city. No damage was reported from the pea-sized stones.

The hail was accompanied by .05 of an inch rain. That, added to the .81 measured Friday night by Virgil Woodfin, raised the city's rainfall total for the past week to .86.

# 12 arrested in same house

It wasn't a planned part of the "Be Drug Free Week" that started Friday, but Iowa Park police arrested 12 persons, all in the same home, on possession charges.

Acting on an informant's tip, police obtained a search warrant to go into the house at 304 East Pecan and

went to that address at 9:30 p.m. Chief Alan Sheffield said he was surprised when the number of adults in the house equaled his group, which included eight from the local department and four county deputies.

Arrested on charges of possession of a controlled substance, methamphetamine, a felony, were: Carl Leon Robertson, 39; Robert Ira Cash, 17; Richard Alan Foster, 33; Robert Lloyd Chester, 20; Terry Lee Drake, 36; Lloyd Glen Drake, 33; Dawn Elaine Drake, 30; Judy Gail Robertson, 27; Emma Clide Foster, 33; Philip Page Gann, 42; Carl Leon Robertson Jr., 18, and Fletcher Christine Cash, 21.

Also in the house were three children, two male and one female, all believed to have been under seven years of age. They were turned over to a relative not living at the address.

Chief Sheffield said he had only expected five or six people to be there when they served the warrant.

Though the inside and outside of the house was littered with items believed to have been stolen, officers were able to identify only one piece of equipment that definitely had been taken in Wichita Falls, a commercial electric blower valued between \$200 and \$750.

Charged with the theft of the blower were Cash and the senior Robertson.

Also found in the house were other drugs, including marijuana and a heroin substitute, and a large quantity of new and used needles, as well as two hand guns.

Five or six parole violation warrants were out on some of those arrested, and among them were histories of some 20 burglary charges, 12-15 drug violations, seven thefts and a "host of other charges, including traffic." The group was transported in different cars at 1:19 a.m. to county jail, where most of them remained as late as yesterday.

Considerable interest has been expressed by law agencies, including two different corporate security offices, according to the chief. He said a number of charges could result in the future, but refrained from listing any.

The investigators, upon entering the house, not only found people sleeping on couches and on the floor, but numerous items stored in open spaces, such as two console television sets, a large quantity of painting equipment and tools, two truck radios, and a large stash found in the attic of power tools.

A computer search of identification numbers found on the items failed to turn up any stolen reports, however, other than the blower.

The occupants had been in the house about two months. Water service was connected Oct. 6, according to city records.

With the arrests of so many persons, as well as finding so many different items believed to be stolen, police spent a lot of time over the weekend doing paperwork.

Sheffield estimated manhours spent Saturday and Sunday doing the paperwork amounted to more than 40.

One other unrelated drug arrest was listed on the police blotter.

Officers stopped Thomas Craig Cannon, 23, of Wichita Falls, Wednesday of last week while riding a motorcycle.

It was first determined he was wanted on an outstanding warrant from the sheriff's department, and then was found to have a container of methamphetamine in his pocket.

He was placed under arrest and transported to county jail.

# City asks Corps for floodplain help

The city of Iowa Park is asking the Army Corps of Engineers for help to reduce or eliminate the floodplain that has created a problem for residents of an area in the northeast part of town.

Mayor Tim Hunter this week sent a letter to Col. Frank Patete in Tulsa, asking for the assistance.

Residents in the floodplain are restricted on how they can develop their property, because of an ordinance adopted in 1982 by the city.

Adoption of the ordinance was required in order for all homeowners in the city to qualify for federal flood insurance.

Property owners have complain-

ed to the city, and also met with representatives of the Federal Emergency Management Agency, concerning their plight.

In some cases, mobile homes were allowed to be moved into the area, but not required to conform with requirements of the ordinance.

Since that time, however, the city has begun doing a better job of code enforcement, and that was when the homeowners became frustrated.

The letter Mayor Hunter sent to

"In an effort to best protect its

ty within the floodplain area, while allowing them to utilize their property to a fuller extent, the City of Iowa Park desires to take necessary steps to either reduce or eliminate the floodway areas within its corporate city limits. Discussions with the Federal Emergency Management Agency have focused our efforts toward attempts to revise the Flood Insurance Maps for our community. We do not believe that error falls with the Corps of Engineer documentation, rather we feel that efforts such as channelization and dredging should be pursued. As mayor of the City of Iowa Park, I am requesting that the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers evaluate the Gordon Creek flood area under Section 205., the small projects program, to determine what if any actions our community can take to better serve the residents within this area.

# Annexation begins of Lake Iowa Park

The first in a series of hearings was held Monday by the city council to annex Lake Iowa Park into the city limits.

The addition, once completed, will enlarge the city's territory by more than 436 acres of land.

Public hearings on annexation are scheduled Nov. 28 and Dec. 5.

Aldermen approved an ordinance that prohibits on-street parking in the 1000 block of First Street, and also gave their approval to demolish a house at 610 E. Bank. Unoccupied, it

fails to meet building code standards.

The structure to be cleared by the city is owned by John Paul Jones. Aldermen were told that all attempts to contact the owner were unsuccessful and mail was returned stamped "moved, left no forwarding address."

A resolution approved by council members exempts two police cars from being required to use exempt license plates, so they can be used in certain undercover activities.

A proposal that the city complete its project of constructing the new Chamber of Commerce building was also approved.

Iowa Park school trustees will hold a called meeting at 7:30 p.m. Tuesday in the administration building.


Among the topics to be covered, according to the agenda, are accepting resignations and employing new personnel.

The city received a check in the amount of \$17,436.07 this month, raising the year to \$164,489.78.

For the year, Iowa Park has received 15.38-percent more from sales taxes than through this date in 1987.





Sections 123.423 and 123.424 of the Domestic Main manual says the law exempts certain bona fide fishing contests -- why, I don't know -

-- and state-operated lotteries.

So, in a few paragraphs, you have it why we can't -- for at least another 18 months -- write a nice story about your non-profit organization raising funds through a raffle.

around the structure, with a limited expenditure of \$3,200.

During a discussion of that project, plans were shown on how the former Chamber office would be converted for use by the Public Works Department, and the council was told the office now used for that purpose would eventually contain all municipal court records.

A boring machine, which will permit city crews to install water lines under pavement without cutting the surface, was also approved by the council. Cost was set at \$4,955.

An administrative change in the police department was approved, and will result in a supervisor being on duty on all three daily shifts.

Chief Alan Sheffield said the change would cost the city no more than \$500 a year.



Too much enforcement To The Editor:



# Texans pay less for local telephone service

Southwestern Bell Telephone customers in Iowa Park and across the state pay less for basic residential local telephone service than most customers across the nation, according to a recent study by the Federal Communications Commission.

"In Iowa Park, residential oneparty customers pay only \$8.80 per month which is about the same as the price of a large pizza," said Dan Adams, area manager. "Or, on a daily basis, the basic rate here is 29-cents per day for a service that's always available, providing contact with friends, relatives and emergency services," he said.

Nationally, the average monthly rate for basic residential service is \$12.19. In Texas, residential service rates range from \$8.15 to \$11.05 per month depending on the size of the local calling scope.

Rates quoted in the FCC study include only rotary dial, unlimited calling, one-party basic service. The monthly rates do not reflect federal subscriber line charges, state and local taxes, long distance, custom calling, touch-tone or other optional services.

Southwestern Bell subscribers in Texas also have a lower-cost option available to them. Economy service, available throughout most of the state, allows 25 outgoing calls and unlimited incoming calls, for half the basic charge.

"We don't sacrifice service to achieve lower rates," Adams said. "Customer satisfaction levels in Texas are at record-high levels."

The company's customer surveys show that 96 percent of those customers questioned say they are satisfied with their telephone service.

"The survey demonstrates our employees' dedication to hold down costs," said Adams. "We're proud of our service and the value our customers receive for their hard-earned dollars."

The FCC study compared basic monthly residential telephone rates in 95 cities. The rates range from a low of \$6.60 in Fort Dodge, Iowa, to a high of \$23.39 in Huntington, West

Six Texas cities included in the study rank near the lower two-thirds of the 95 cities surveyed nationwide. The Texas cities, where each ranked in the survey, and the basic monthly residential rate for each: Houston-57 (\$11.05); Dallas-67 (\$10.40); Fort Worth and San Antonio-both 69 (\$9.85); Corpus Christi-78 (\$9.10), and Brownsville-81 (\$8.80).



# Tips offered for Christmas mailing

Aerobics instructors regularly remind their students to keep their tummies "tight" and "tucked."

The same advice applies to preparing holiday parcels for mailing.

All that's necessary is choosing sturdy cartons or boxes, and sealing them smoothly and tightly with the proper tape. Padded mailing bags work well for small items.

Don't wrap cartons in bulky brown paper or tie them with string or twine. The paper can tear and the twine can get tangled in the mail processing equipment.

Using paper and string isn't necessary if you're using proper boxes or cartons. If you feel a need to wrap and tie a box, that may be a signal that you don't think the box is sturdy enough to begin with. Get another one instead.

Parcels should be sealed with a type of tape designed for sealing packages: pressure sensitive, nylon-reinforced kraft paper or glass-fiber-reinforced pressure sensitive. Don't use cellophane or masking tapes because they're not strong enough.

Correct addressing is as important for parcels as for letters. If the box has been used before, be sure first to remove all old labels and addresses.

The top of the package should show the name of the person to whom you're sending it, their house number and street, and the apartment number, if there is one. The last address line should contain the city, state and ZIP Code -- and be sure to use the Zip Code.

Code should be in the upper left corner. Please use smudge-proof ink.

Preparing the inside of the package or box is as important as preparing the outside. The contents should be cushioned carefully with crumpled paper, with foam shell or air-pocket padding that is commercially available. Don't leave any empty space in

Before you seal the package, it's also a good idea to enclose a slip of paper showing the name and address of the person to whom you're sending it. Although it doesn't happen very often, parcels can get damaged so the outside address can't be read.

Finally, if a package contains irreplaceable valuables, send it by Registered Mail.





Of course, none of this was allowed to happen. Don't worry; God worked it out in other ways. As I said, I'm okay. If sorrow were possible here, I would feel sorry for all who never knew me."



AN ORDINANCE OF THE CITY OF IOWA PARK, TEXAS AMENDING THE CODE OF ORDINANCES AT SECTION 1-7 INCREASING THE MAXIMUM FINES ALLOWED FORCERTAIN VIOLATIONS OF THE CITY CODE.

Whereas, it has been determined that in certain instances the previously allowed maximum fine of \$200 for violations of City ordinances is no longer a sufficient deterrent to violators; and

Whereas, the State of Texas has allowed general law cities to increase their maximum fines to as much as \$2,000 in some

NOW THEREFORE BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY OF IOWA PARK that:

Section 1-7 of the Code of Ordinances is hereby amended to read as follows: Sec. 1-7. General penalty; continuing violations.

Whenever in this code of in any ordinance of the city an act is prohibited or is made or declared to be unlawful or an offense or a misdemeanor, or whenever in such Code or ordinance the doing of any act is required or the failure to do any act is declared to be unlawful, where no specific penalty is provided therefor, the violation of any such provision of this Code or any such ordinance shall be punished by a fine of not less than one dollar (\$1.00), nor more than one thousand dollars (\$1,000); provided, however, that where the offense is one for which a penalty is fixed by state law, the penalty for such offense shall be the same as fixed by state

Each day any violation of this Code or other ordinance of the city shall continue shall constitute a separate offense unless otherwise provided.



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
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
