The House bill would lower the training and service age to 181/2. book form a specialty. R. D. Dun- Whether that figure will stand up during the debate is open to question. All sides concede that the bill is in for heavy going.

The question of the cost of the nation's defense effort is beginning to trouble many members-but not enough of them.

Two recent tests discouraged advocates of economy. Sen. Dirksen (R-Ill.) sought to defeat a bill to provide \$240 million annually to states for local health unit work. One third of that amount will be million would have to be provided by the states. Economy advocates numbered 35 when the roll was called. But 38 senators said the program was needed, so it passed. The 23 absent senators could have made

a difference. In the House, the first appropriation bill went through with 161 members absent on the final vote. On earlier, and more important, votes as many as 300 of the 435 members did not vote. When it came from the House appropriations committee the bill providing funds for the Treasury and Post Office departments carried a total of almost \$3 billion. The committee reduced it only about 1 per cent below the

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
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
