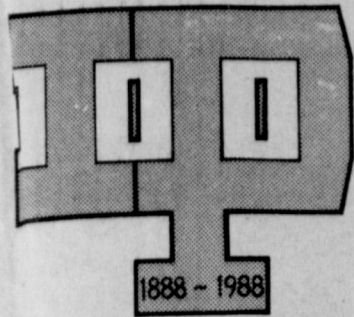

## Thieves wanting rototillers

Somebody is stealing things out of season. Iowa Park police received complaints the day before and the day after Christmas that a thief had taken rototillers. The first report was from the 300 block of E. Pecan and the second from the 1300 block of Mockingbird. In both cases, the equipment was used and in the back yards of homes. Two other thefts also were reported during the past week. A set of tools, valued at \$210 was taken from an unlocked room in a garage in the 900 block of E. Bank, police were told Monday.

Christmas day, a resident filed a complaint that someone had taken a 50-foot string of outdoor Christmas lights from the front yard of a home in the 1300 block of Emma. An attempted theft was thwarted Tuesday, when police picked up a juvenile attempting to shoplift, and was taken home to his parents. Police arrested William Perry Roberts, 55, Thursday of last week on local warrants, and he was transported to county jail, according to the police blotter. As is the case every Christmas season, officers answered numerous

calls to residents where domestic disturbances were reported.

Iowa Park students are to return to their classes Tuesday morning, just in time to begin preparing for their six weeks exams. The current six-week period will end Jan. 19, according to the school calendar.

# Top stories of 1988 reviewed

The year 1988 was chuck full of major news events, many of them centered around the community's 100th anniversary.

Various programs at organization meetings and in the schools centered on the centennial, and the observance reached its climax with the annual Whoop-T-Do, which was on the same day, Oct. 20, as the city's plat was recorded in 1888.

Sharing the headlines with the centennial was weather. During the first quarter of the year, weather stories dominated news, as several weather related fatalities were reported. Then, on the first day of March, a hail storm struck the area and the vast majority of homes and businesses in Iowa Park had to be reroofed.

Other major news events included:  
\* a house explosion that killed one person;  
\* a new head football coach was hired, and suffered through a 1-9 record;  
\* the Chamber of Commerce got a new home;

\* Iowa Parkans became aware that drugs are not a big city problem, as local police made numerous arrests for possession throughout the year;  
\* a petition calling for the firings of both the city administrator and police chief was withdrawn;  
\* and residents in a floodplain area of the northeast part of town are seeking relief from an ordinance that severely restricts what they can do with their homes, if indeed they will even be allowed to remain where they are.

The following is a month-by-month review of the major news stories during 1988, as reported by the Iowa Park Leader.

### JANUARY

Wintry weather greeted the new year. After an ice storm struck between Christmas and New Year's, another followed the first week of 1988, and an Iowa Park man, Ronny Feltman, 29, was killed while working with a highway department sanding crew in Wichita Falls. Two days later, Robin Morris, the former Robin Ann Whiteaker, was killed in another weather-related two-car accident near Nocona. Both were 1977 graduates of Iowa Park High School. Rev. Kenneth Laird became pastor of Iowa Park Church of God. Donna Gibson and Alicia Forsyth were named to the All-State Choir. Texas Tech Univ. head coach Spike Dykes was guest speaker for the annual Hawk Football Awards Banquet. Jim Cummings and Gregg Young were named to the All State football team by the Texas Sportswriters Association. Wayne Williams was named "Fireman of the Year" by the Iowa Park Volunteer Fire Department. David Baugh resigned his position as head football coach and athletic director of Iowa Park High, after earning a 49-25-4 since assuming that position in 1981, to go to Snyder. School trustees approved a plan to construct four additional classrooms at Bradford Elementary. The Hawk basketball team set a new single-game scoring record by beating Jacksboro 119-66. Award recipients at the annual Chamber of Commerce banquet were Dr. Erwin Soell, "Outstanding Citizen of the Year," Mrs. Ida Mae Lehman, "Outstanding Senior Citizen," Jim Gotcher, "Outstanding Educator," Denny McCarthy, "Outstanding Agriculturist," and the State National Bank for the "Outstanding Business Award." An Iowa Park man, James Nicholson, survived being shot in the mouth by an armed robber at his business in Wichita Falls. Gregg Young accepted a football scholarship from Texas A&M Univ., and was red-shirted in the fall.

### FEBRUARY

After the University Interscholastic League changed the makeup of Dist. 5-AAA for the third time, Iowa Park was joined by Decatur, Bridgeport, Bowie, Graham and Vernon. Following a tense situation at Colonial Apartments, where shots had been fired in one of the units, a 38-year-old man was charged with public intoxication. Area residents experienced more ice and winter weather during the first week of the month. Greig Moers replaced Jeff Crabbe as manager of human resources at the Cryovac plant. The post office began closing its business window on Wednesday mornings to "...help reduce the Federal deficit." Rebuilding of South Wall, funded by the state, was commenced. Successful Mart head coach Len Williams was selected from a field of 70 applicants to succeed David Baugh as head coach here. Iowa Park Recreational Activities Center observed its 10th anniversary. Jack Railsback, a resident of Pleasant Valley and claims officer at Sheppard AFB Office of the Staff Judge Advocate, was recipient of the Air Force's Outstanding Civilian Career Service Award.

### MARCH

The first day of the month was marked by a tremendous hail storm that caused some \$2-million in damage to roofs of homes and businesses, and several thousands more to vehicles. A tornado funnel in the same storm threatened the Kamay and Kadane Corner area, but did no damage to homes. Bill Robinson defeated four other candidates for the Precinct 3 justice of the peace office vacated the first of the year when Virgil Hill retired; voting was in the south's first "Super Tuesday" election. Iowa Park High's mock trial team, composed of Markita Savage, Chris Blalack, Jenny Salan, Steve Catlin, Sheri Cravens and Jana Coltrane, won in regional competition and advanced to the state meet. More than 500 athletes competed in the second annual Iowa Park Lions Club Hawk Relays, brav- ing chilled weather. Lori Allen, Marc Johnson and Jimmy Duggins were named to the All-District basketball teams. In its initial team tennis competition attempt, Iowa Park High netters qualified for the state tournament, and finish- ed ninth. Commuters were handicapped when FM 369 was closed to traffic for the bridge to be rebuilt and widened over Wichita River. George Howell and LaDonna Chandler shared the coveted Herdsman Award at the annual Iowa Park Project Show. The Friendly Door held its annual bazaar. Along with the rest of the nation, Iowa Parkans began paying 25-cents to mail a first class letter. In observance of its 25th anniversary, Wal-Mart gave the Iowa Park Volunteer Fire Department a \$1,000 check for its Toys for Tots Christmas project.

### APRIL

Iowa Park High's boys' and girls' tennis teams dominated the Dist. 5-AAA tournament and won both titles, advancing to the Region One tournament. Karie Davis and Andy Jacobi were recognized by the 23 Study Club as the year's Outstanding Senior Girl and Boy. An Iowa Park man was arrested after beating his wife with a baseball bat. The A Cappella Choir of IPHS earned the coveted Sweepstakes award in University Interscholastic League competition for the ninth consecutive year. Residents banded together to make the community's annual Clean Up Week another success. Two boys and five girls qualified for the Region One track meet: Kerri Dorner, Stacy Boren, Christy York, Shanna Weaver, Angie Turner, Sean Rowe and Scott Goodknight. Tama McDowell was installed as president of District Six, Epsilon Sigma Alpha. The Hawk Band earned its fifth consecutive Sweepstakes in UIL competition, and the Junior Hawk Band its first in nine years. After an extensive study, the city council deter-

### MAY

Iowa Park police made the first of several drug possession arrests when they took a man and woman, ages 28 and 27, into custody. Iowa Park native Jim Jenkins was named vice president of Carl Albert Junior College at Broken Bow, Okla. Karen Whisnand, Erna Mahler and Robert Palmer were honored at the Texas Soil and Water Conservation Region Five Awards Banquet in Mineral Wells. At the regional tennis tournament, the boy's doubles team of Marc Johnson and Bill Johnson placed first, and Jenny Bowerman finished second in girls' singles and all advanced to the state tournament in Austin, where they were eliminated in the first round of play. Sheri Cravens was named valedictorian and Lisa Cook salutatorian of IPHS Class of '88. Only one contest developed in both the city council and school board elections, and Sheri Kennedy won her first bid to become a trustee, while incumbent alderman Bud Burch was re-elected. Martha Dudley did not choose to seek re-election on the school board, and ended 11 years as a trustee, which was preceded by seven years as secretary to the superintendent. Adam Cantwell placed third in accounting competition at the state UIL literary meet. The Hawk baseball team repeated as district champion, and beat Clyde in bi-district, but lost to Denver City in Area play. Valedictorian and salutatorian of Iowa Park Junior High were Marcy McCarthy and Brandy Curtsinger, respectively. Work was completed on the rebuilding of South Wall. Parents, faculty and friends of the graduating class assisted in entertaining graduates at an all-night lock-in party at the school following graduation exercises.

### JUNE

Workers began a project to rebuild Third Street. The city council held a day-long goal-setting retreat at Lake Kickapoo. Iowa Parkan Jay Yeakley followed his father's (Alton) footsteps and was graduated from the Department of Public Safety academy, to be assigned at Jacksboro. The city developed a pair of sand-surface volleyball courts on its land just off Fourth Street, and became an instant success as leagues were formed. Twenty-three members of the IPHS Class of '63 held a reunion here. George Howell was named recipient of an \$8,000 Houston Livestock Show scholarship. James Race became the new Wichita

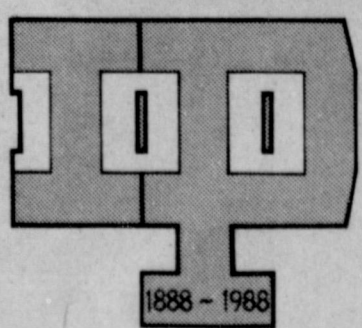
### JULY

The city council began a process to annex the 27-acre Lake Iowa Park, which would not be completed until the first month of 1989. Volunteer firemen stayed at their posts all day July 4th, so they could answer the frequent calls to extinguish grassfires set by fireworks. Attending the International Lions Club convention in Denver were Kenneth Via, Iowa Park Lions Club, and Jim Sliger, C.L. Thompson, Herb Adcock and Sam Hunter of the Evening Lions Club. Iowa Park city council adopted a resolution that chastised the county commissioners for not paying their fair share of firefighting by volunteer departments of Iowa Park, Burkburnett and Electra. Iowa Park Lions Club adopted a vacant lot in the 100 block of West Park, to plant grass and improve its appearance, as the organization's Centennial project. Catlin's Quick Change opened. Loretta Sheffield was named recipient of the Frist Humanitarian Award at Red River Hospital in Wichita Falls. Fire destroyed the Carl Fulfer home on Coleman Park Road. The city council wanted to know how citizens felt about prospects of constructing a community center, held a "straw vote" on utility bills, and determined from response it was not wanted. Iowa Park's 10-year-old baseball all star team defeated Graham to claim that tournament's championship for the second consecutive year. The 13-year-old all stars were knocked out of the sectional tournament at Sherman.

### AUGUST

The Industrial Development Corporation, a wing of the Chamber of Commerce, purchased a 20-acre tract of land on the north side of US 287, in a major push to attract a new industry here. Fire damaged a portion of Kidwell Elementary building where a crew was resurfacing the roof. Wal-Mart was recognized by the area director of Special Olympics, for having raised a \$400 donation to the project. Two members of the championship Hawk baseball team, Billy Kenyon and Craig Rickman, were named All-State. School trustees approved a five-cent tax

## Former resident's writing is winner

Sonya Birmingham, who has in the past written articles for the Iowa Park Leader, has received the Oxbow Award for western literature given by the Ozark Creative Writers.

The award was presented Oct. 7 at a banquet, attended by Arkansas governor Bill Clinton, in Eureka Springs, Ark.

The novel, *Texas Breed*, is set in 1857 at Fort Mason near Fredricksburg, Tex. The book, written in third person, dual viewpoint, pivots around a half breed scout's rescue of a woman kidnapped by Comanches.

Mrs. Birmingham, presently living in Burleson, was born in Wichita Falls. She is the daughter of Col. H.T. Tucker, USAF, retired and Cordie Lehman Tucker, a former Iowa Park resident.

During her childhood, Mrs. Birmingham went to grade school several years in Iowa Park.

After finishing high school in California, she attended Colorado Women's College in Denver and Pepperdine Univ. in Los Angeles.

In 1961 she married Milton D. Birmingham, an Air Force officer. As an Air Force wife, she has lived in states from coast to coast, and in the Philippine Islands, Germany, and Greece.

During 1973 she wrote a travel column for the Leader while living in Germany.

Her other interests include oil painting, which she had taught, travel, and collecting books. She is the mother of a daughter and son.

## Mac Reeves recognized

Mac Reeves has been named Outstanding Member for 1988 by the Wichita County Young Farmers.

Announcement of the selection was made recently during the organization's Christmas party.

Also recognized was former high school vocational agriculture teacher George Brandt, who was presented a plaque in recognition of his contribution to the youth of Iowa Park.

Rex Lehman, a well-known Iowa Park farmer and cattleman, died in 1981. He had been an Iowa Park resident 52 years, coming here from Hamilton in 1929 with Mrs. Birmingham's mother and grandmother.

In 1936, he married Ida Mae Stowe, who still resides here. His son, Garland, and his family are also Iowa Park residents.

Mrs. Birmingham has dedicated the manuscript to Rex Lehman's memory and the vivid frontier spirit she believes he exemplified.

Mrs. Birmingham is a member of North Texas Chapter, Romance Writers of America; Central Oklahoma Romance Authors, and Johnson County Creative Writers. Her love of history and reading led to her interest in writing westerns and historical romances.

Her favorite classic American writers are Jack London and Pearl Buck, her favorite western writer is Elmer Kelton.

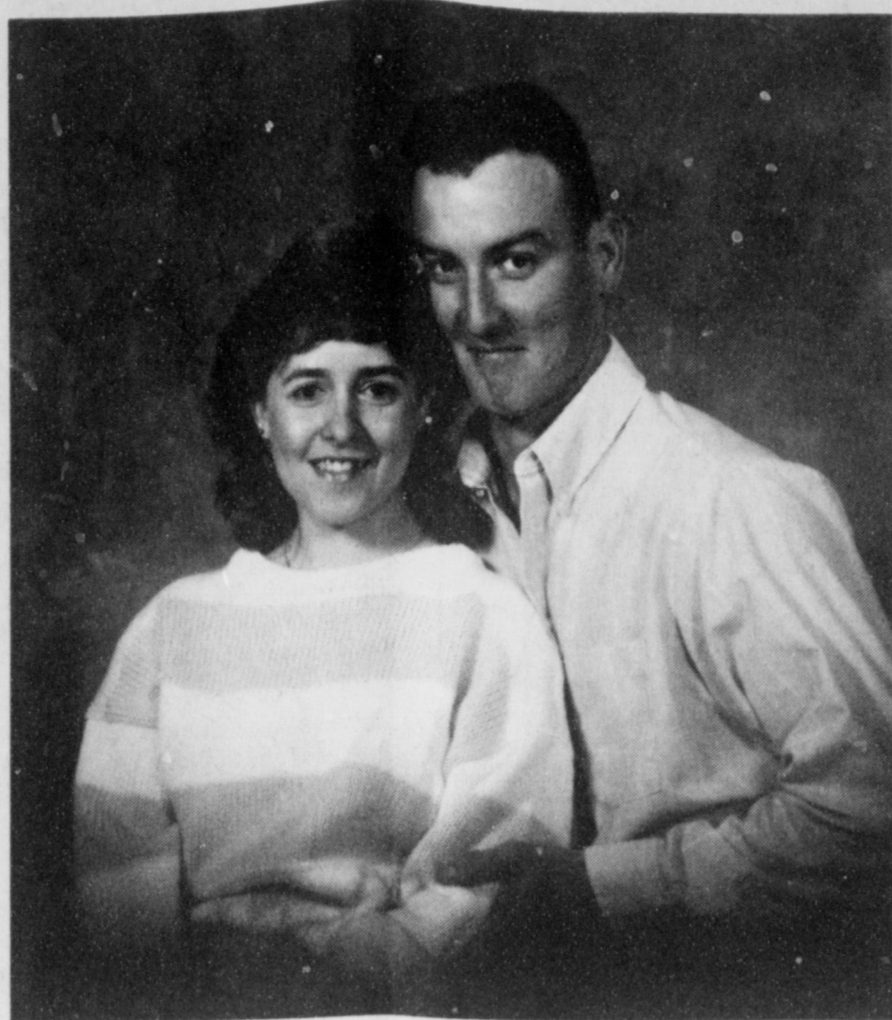

She believes western readers like herself enjoy the color and fantasy escapism fiction offers. She has completed one romance set in France in 1778, and is currently working on a European romance in addition to *Texas Breed*.

At the Eureka Springs conference, another of her books, *Angel of the Slopes*, was awarded first place in the historical romance category. Altogether it has won two firsts and one second place in nationally advertised contests in Louisiana, Arkansas and Texas.

The humorous romance which is set in Colorado in 1885 centers around the adventures of an Irish immigrant's daughter. It is currently entered in the Golden Heart Contest, the largest romance contest in America, and is being reviewed by a literary agent.

## Grant funds training of area's unemployed

Midwestern State Univ. is again the recipient of a grant to fund a program to help individuals who have lost their jobs due to the area economic condition.

The grant is in the amount of \$73,000 in addition to the existing contract of \$58,000, making the total project funding \$131,000.

Job Training Partnership Act (JTPA) Title III program implemented at MSU is designed to help people find employment who have been hurt by the economy.

Joining MSU in implementing the program are Texas Employment Commission, North Texas Private Industry Council and Nortex Regional Planning Commission.

Midwestern's original program was scheduled to be completed by Dec. 31, but will be extended six months.

Participants will be offered a variety of services. Free workshops held at MSU will provide participants with information on subjects such as career goals, stress management, financial planning, family relations and starting a business.

In addition to workshops, participants will attend a job search seminar, held through Texas Employment

Commission and will provide participants with job seeking skills, help them develop a resume, and give them job placement assistance.

Each participant will also receive career counseling. A counselor will work with participants to help them explore their interests and options.

The program is open to people living in a 12-county region, including Wichita, Archer, Montague, Clay, Baylor, Wilbarger, Young, Foard, Hardeman, Childress and Cottle counties.

To be eligible, a person must have been laid off from his/her job and be eligible for unemployment benefits or have exhausted unemployment benefits but is still unemployed.

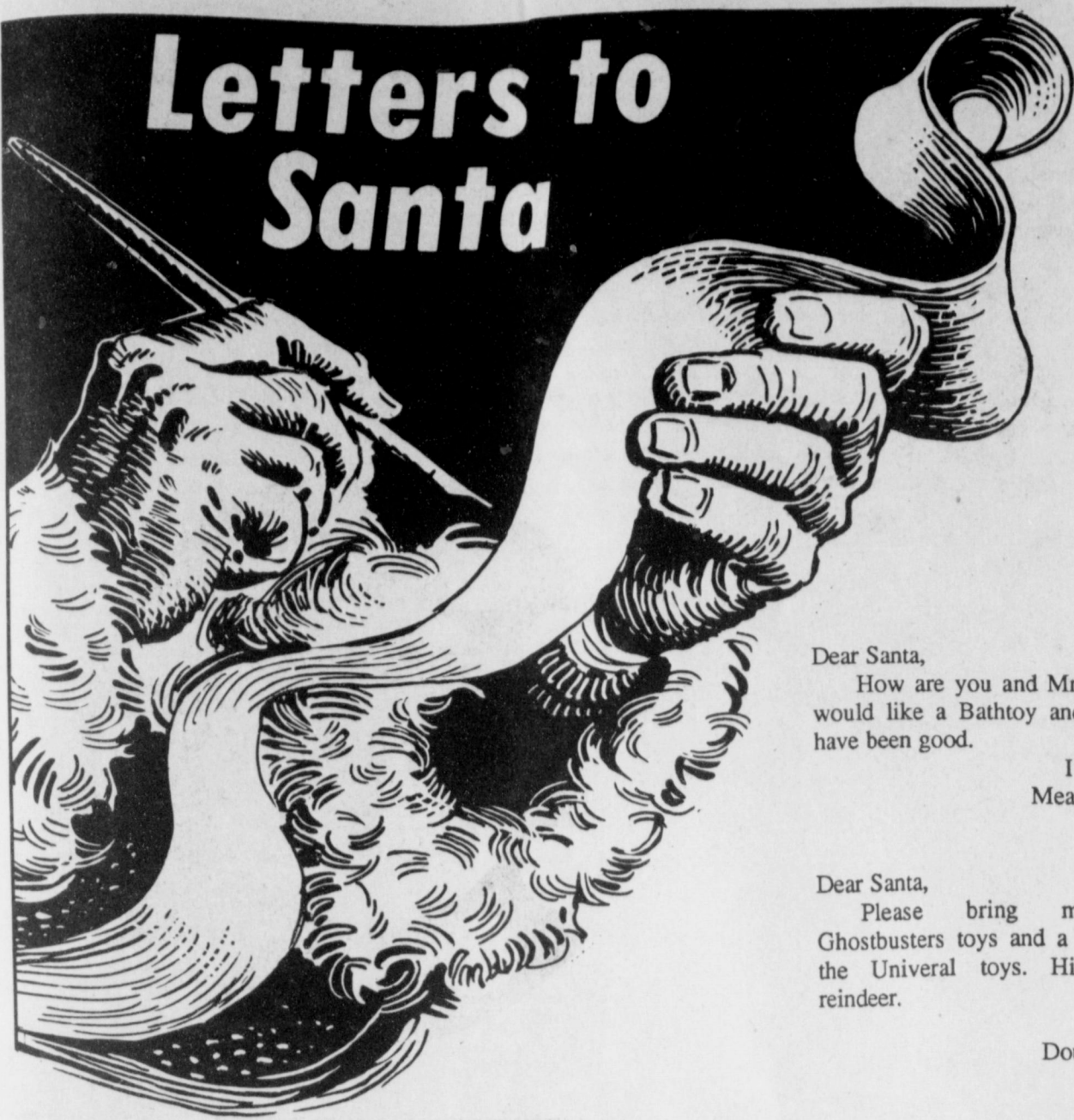

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# Worth Quoting

Throughout history the younger generation has had to listen to tales about the good old days as related by their elders. When I was young my parents and grandparents talked about how tough it was in their day when they had to get along without such conveniences as indoor plumbing, electric lights and automobiles. It was beyond my comprehension to understand how anybody could live under primitive circumstances such as these.

My generation grew up in the Great Depression and if we don't watch ourselves we are apt to be telling our children and grandchildren how tough it was in those days. To be honest about it, though, nobody my age has publicly yearned for the good old days because they weren't all that good. Looking back, it is hard to believe the prices. The Herald has a Past Perryton page which digs out items from 50 years ago. The youngsters who look in the 1938 files simply cannot believe that in that year in Perryton you could sit down to a meal of a chicken fried steak, mashed potatoes, green beans, bread, English peas, cherry cobbler for dessert and all the coffee you could drink for only 35 cents!

Hamburgers were a dime and Cokes a nickel for as many years as I can remember. Kids could go to the Ellis Theatre for 10 cents and their parents could go for 35 cents. A fine new house could be built for \$3,500 and I remember riding with my parents on a Sunday afternoon when they usually drove by a large brick home in the west part of town, a magnificent structure which reportedly cost \$10,000!

These low prices lasted quite a while. What most people of this generation fail to remember is how cheap the wages were, too. Men were supporting families on a salary of \$25 a week and a person who made \$300 a month was considered in the upper crust. At the end of my sophomore year in college I ran out of money and had to lay out a year to try and save up enough to resume my education. I got a job as bookkeeper at the First National Bank in Perryton at \$60 a month and considered myself fortunate to get it. From that salary I did save enough to make another start at college and went to Austin faced with the very real necessity of finding a job to work my way through school.

After nearly two weeks of fruitless searching and applying, I got a job at the Leigh service station on South Congress at 25 cents an hour. Later I moved up the pay scale until about a year later I was station manager making 50 cents an hour. That doesn't sound like much but it was enough to finance my college education, support me sufficiently, and I was able to buy my first automobile on what I saved from my job without having to borrow any money.

Of course during this time when I worked long hours at the service station, put in extra time as a sports writer for the Daily Texan, there was not much time for social affairs and even if I had the time I didn't have the money, so the last couple of my college years went by without much social life. The education I got from learning how to make a dime, and spend only a nickel, has stood me in good stead ever since those days, however.

When I went off to college you could get room and board for \$30 a month and that included three meals a day except Sunday night when you were on your own. It also included maid service and you had your bed made, linens washed and rooms cleaned for the \$30 a month. This sounds incredible today, but it's the way it

was. In those days we didn't know much about inflation. It was not until the postwar years of the late 1940s that prices began to skyrocket and people who had money to buy land, a house, car, anything of value, saw it rise rapidly in price. Eventually we came to think that prices would always go up, and for the most part, they have. We have had to adjust.

I imagine that 40 years from now people will talk about the good old days we're enjoying right now. They will remember paying only \$15,000 for a car and \$90,000 for their first house and back then you could get a dinner for not much more than \$15. Hardly anybody thinks of 1988 as the good old days but just give them time. Eventually this will be a page out of history and lots of folks will have fond memories of how good we are having it right now.

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# AREA OIL & GAS NEWS

Ellis Survey, A-75; 3,850 feet from the north-north line and 125 feet from the middle of the north-east line of the L.C. Dennison Survey, A-55; and 660 feet from the north line and 1,800 feet from the east line of the J. Ellis survey, A-75, respectively.

JPR Petroleum Operations of Whitehouse has revealed plans to drill a 2,000-ft. developmental well in the Wichita County Regular Field. The operator has 90 acres leased, with drillsite 2,503 feet from the north line and 1,910 feet from the east line of the Seale & Morris Survey, A-393, and has designated the venture as the No. C-3 W.T. Waggoner Est. "X." Drillsite is three miles south of Electra.

A new oil producer has been brought on line in Wichita County Regular Field, with Atapco of Midland as the operator.

Located two miles southeast of Clara, the well is in a 2,100-acre lease approximately 1,700 feet from the south line and 1,000 feet from the west line of the southwest corner of the J. Ellis Survey, A-75, in the L.C. Dennison Survey, A-55. It is designated as the No. 79-A H. Reilly.

It pumped 52 barrels of oil per day plus five barrels of water.

The well bottomed at 1,750 feet and will produce from Gunsight formation perforations 1,540 to 1,550 feet into the hole.

At a location two miles southeast of Clara, Atapco of Midland has finalized a new oil producer in the Wichita County Regular Field.

The well is located in an 80-acre lease 1,240 feet from the south line of Block H in the W&NW Survey, A-421.

A new oil producer has been brought on line in the Wichita County Regular Field, with Atapco of Midland as the operator.

increase, elevating the rate to 81-cents. The city council was asked by residents in the northeast part of town to purchase their houses, which are located in an area determined by a federal government agency as being in a "floodway." Playing in all star football games were: Gregg Young, state coaches' association; John Wood and Jim Cummings, Greenbelt Bowl, and Jim Kirkhart, Oil Bowl. Marc Johnson accepted a scholarship to play basketball and tennis at York College of York, Neb. Construction was begun on the new Chamber of Commerce building. Natural gas exploded, killing Mrs. Phares Lemond, seriously injuring her husband and destroying their home at Emerald and Wall. Fire, suspected set by an arsonist, destroyed the landmark Valley Farms Community House.

homecoming football game at Hawk Stadium, a lengthy, commercially-produced fireworks display, funded by the city, was also a part of the Centennial observance. Tiffany Gray was crowned Homecoming Queen. The Chamber of Commerce moved into its new building, across Wall Street from City Hall, and turned its former office over to the city. 120 volunteers participated in the CROP Walk.

**SEPTEMBER**

Trustees adopted the 1988-89 school year budget at \$5,778,767. Holiday trustees adopted a tax rate of 89.92-cents per \$100 evaluation to fund a \$2,730,063 budget. Competing his first year against adults, Bill Perry Jr., 15, won two championships at the American Outboard Federation meet at Pineville, La. Robert Wilcox began his 41st year as public address announcer for varsity football games at Hawk Stadium. Iowa Park city council adopted an 84-cent tax rate to fund a budget of \$2,607,000. Iowa Park schools reported an enrollment of 1,872 pupils on the third day of classes. A local student, Donnie Watson, was stabbed in a fight that developed behind the stands during halftime of the Iowa Park and Hirschi junior varsities, but the injury was not fatal. Mr. and Mrs. Willie Kinnett were robbed at knife point in their home, but not injured. All Occasions was burglarized by an individual small enough to squeeze through a restroom window. But a burglar used a different technique to enter Louis Jewelry, knocking out the front glass door. Area firemen held their annual convention here. From Hurricane Gilbert, Iowa Park received 5.27 inches of rain. Students, Young Farmers and FFA Booster Club members began construction of new pens at the school farm. After several earlier rejections, the city council finally approved the 911 emergency telephone budget. The council received a petition calling for the firings of the city administrator and police chief, but the document was later withdrawn after complaints by signers that the final document was not what they had signed. Pam Johnson was named director of the Recreational Activity Center, replacing Betty Merriman, who resigned.

**NOVEMBER**

Burglars took approximately \$6,000 worth of personal possessions from the Carl Catlin home. Homeowners who live in the floodplain area in northeast Iowa Park met with representatives of the Federal Emergency Management Administration, but heard little they didn't already know. What was believed to have been a record turnout of voters at the local general election polls generally agreed with the rest of the state on national, state-wide and area candidates. Jason Meisel was awarded the Eagle rank in Boy Scouts. The Hawks, under new head coach Len Williams, suffered a 1-9 season football record, worst since 1977. Iowa Park schools, with the support of businesses and community leaders, observed "Be Drug Free Week." A dubious record was set the second week of the month when police arrested 12 adults in the same house, all on drug possession charges. Fire, fanned by 55 mph winds, burned the Junior Gilmore barn on FM 368, which housed several hundreds of bales of hay, tractors and other heavy equipment. Hawk Stadium hosted the area playoff game between Muenster and Paducah, with Muenster winning 31-0. Jamie Hatcher was elected District FFA Sweetheart. Among the new Christmas lights purchased for public display were several to adorn the Tom Burnett Memorial Library, and the annual lighting ceremony was held at that site. Trustees accepted the resignation of the school nurse, and will attempt to use the services of the county health department for the balance of the year. Trustees also hired for the first time a teacher to instruct "English as a Second Language" course.

**DECEMBER**

A Wichita Falls man was killed in a three-vehicle accident at an early morning hour on FM 367, just east of Bridwell Road. The school had to hire a firm to dispose of 484 containers of hazardous chemicals stored at the high school. Polly Spruiell retired after working 29 years at the ASCS office. Tommy Key announced the sale of his business, City Cleaners, to a Wichita Falls family, and its new name is Nobby's City Cleaners. Building permits issued by city hall through November had amounted to \$2,691,408, mostly for roofing repairs created by the Mar. 1 hailstorm. Foods collected by the Ministerial Alliance was distributed to 104 families in the community. Iowa Park schools received an "outstanding" report following a visit of the state accreditation team.
