After reporting 93.74-percent of the school's taxes for the year have been collected, and 93.04-percent of the city's, tax collector Allen Shewmake presented trustees with a list of delinquent taxpayers and explained the status of suits filed, agreements for pay-outs and other situations concerning delinquent payments.

The board accepted the lowest of five bids on a pickup truck purchase, of \$12,374.50 from George Davis Chevrolet of Wichita Falls.

Following that action, board members heard a recommendation offered by Robert Palmer, assistant superintendent, to purchase a used truck from Bill Robertson. It is a 1982 Ford "in exceptionally good con-dition," for a price of \$4,500.

The trucks will be used to replace trucks with 108,461 and 163,508 miles, it was explained.

Trustees accepted Supt. Glen Mitchell's recommendation to pay Level Two Career Ladder teachers \$1,500 and Level Three \$3,000.

Also approved by the board was a request to use a school bus to transport gifted and talented students, with their parents, to see an Egyptian exhibit; adopted a list of books recomended by the textbook committee; approved the district improvement plan; approved the 1989-90 school calendar, and also a request by the Red Cross to use school facilities in case of a disaster.

## City to make concession stand improvements

Though the cost was far less than other items on their agenda Monday night, the council devoted considerable time to decide to fix up the concession stand at Burnett Field.

Following an inspection by the county health department, a list of several requirements was required to bring the stand up to the department's standards, in order for foods to be served from the facility.

Cost estimated to meet the standards was \$1,500. But the problem is, the council has a long-range plan to develop a multiple-field softball facility sometime in the future, if a government grant is made available.

The debate was whether spending the money on the structure would be worth it.

Without bringing the facility up to meet the department's codes, no foods or drinks other than canned drinks and prepackaged foods would be served, aldermen were told.

A motion to have the work done passed, but not unanimously, as Alderman Bud Burch voted against it.

The council voted to accept the lowest of three bids submitted to build a structure at the sanitary landfill, which will house the heavy equipment used there.

Larry Hartmangruber was the successful bidder, at \$10,082.

Aldermen also accepted a bid by Southwestern Equipment to repair one of the trash collection trucks, at a cost of \$9,900, well under \$12,000 that was budgeted.

The council agreed to provide sewer service to an area in the east part of town, providing the cost would not exceed \$5,000.

In agreeing to provide a small lift pump, manhole and lines, five homes that have not previously had sewer service will be served, and ser-

vice to five other homes will be improved, aldermen were told.

The area to be served is north of East Highway, at Saratoga and

Aldermen agreed to abandon an alley right of way in Block 172 of the Original Townsite, with the provision that utility easement is to be

Also approved for abandoment was a portion of the street right of way in the 700 block of N. Victoria. This has been an on-going project to achieve alignment of the right of way to correspond with earilier abandon-

The fee charged for a master electrician's testing was increased from \$50 to \$85, the same as is charged by Wichita Falls.

Administrator James Barrington explained the test is administered during a six-hour period, and someone must be in the room at all times during the testing. He said the cost was actually greater than the city was being paid by those being tested.

Council members set a limit of \$8,000 to repair a leak on the city's 16-inch water transmission line between here and Wichita Falls, which has reportedly developed a leak at Kavorik Road.

Repair will not only require the replacement of a portion of the line, but encasing it and repairs to the road which must be cut.

Also approved was a revision of the city's animal control policy.

The change now provides for the control officer to return a captured animal, if the owner can be identified, to the owner, along with a verbal warning on the first offense.

same animal or not, provides for a written warning to the owner, and an automatic fine will be issued for the third offense. An exception is made, that if a

complaint is lodged in a case, the

control officer's discretion can allow a citation on either first or second offense.

Cats, as well as dogs, are now included in the control policy. They must be kept on the owner's property or on leash.

Bates, who has experienced bad health and undergone some three heart bypasses during the past few years, plans to retire. He has owned the firm since 1973.

# Worth Quoting

Whether we like to admit it or not, we in this community live in a somewhat isolated and sheltered enclave that escapes many of the big problems that cause concern elsewhere. Yet we are part of the society in which we live and all problems eventually affect us. At the present time there are many problems, but the Texas Research League says that all of the ingredients necessary to create an economic disaster for Texas are present in the state's public education. Just combine the following: a dropout rate as high as 45 percent for Hispanic and 34 percent for black students, lower achievement test scores for those who stay in school and graduate and a higher dropout rate in college for disadvantaged students.

Allow these ingredients to leaven for 20 years. Then mix with a public school system where the majority of students are black or Hispanic and bake in an economy that requires increasingly higher levels of education, and you have a recipe for disaster. The implications of this recipe are frightening. Unless action is taken now, there will be a shortage of skilled workers in the future. It will become necessary to import skilled professionals to meet the requirements of a highly technological economy. At the same time there will be a great deal of unemployment or underemployment for these uneducated citizens. If this happens, Texas will take on the characteristics of a third world economy.

To keep this from happening, the school dropout rate has to be improved. The reforms of HB 72 attempt to raise the level of education by emphasizing basics and cutting back on activities that do not contribute to learning. But apparently the problem is harder than was first thought. Students continue to drop out of school and leave without the educational tools they need to make any sort of decent living. Studies show that 90 percent of the inmates in the state prison system are high school dropouts and this should tell us something. There is a strong move under the new Texas Department of Commerce and the new Texas Chamber of Commerce to attract new business to this state. In years past a large pool of unskilled labor was a plus but now it is a minus. Business has little need for the pick and shovel crowd. It demands some skill and training.

Texas cannot be proud of its record in public education. This state ranks 44th among the 50 states in its ability to retain students until they graduate. We have a graduation rate of less than 65 percent and this is worse than New Mexico, Oklahoma, Arkansas and Kansas, our neighboring states. It ranks with Mississippi and Georgia, however.

Why do students leave school before they graduate? The League has done considerable research and finds that there are several factors. One is being two or more years behind grade level. Being pregnant causes dropouts. Students coming from a family where the mother or father was not in the home when the youth was age 14 leads to a dropout. A student coming from a home where the father dropped out of school is also likely to drop out. Students who know little about the labor market or the need for education are likely to drop out because they view school as distasteful

and something to avoid as soon as possible.

Race has something to do with it. Hispanic youth tend to drop out earlier because there is less parental pressure to keep them in school and often they feel that they must get "on their own" and make their own living. Black students drop out for much the same reason. Both groups drop out because there is no pressure from parents or family to stay in school until they finish. White students who drop out also find this one of the main factors in staying in school and finishing.

At one time the public schools operated under a grant of authority from parents, "in loco parentis" whereby the school teachers and administrators could discipline students as though they were their own. This grant of authority has largely disappeared. Part of this is because parents no longer have the same degree of control over their children. Another reason is that stripped school authority, especially in the field of discipline. If a student feels that he can come and go as he wishes without punishment, he just may elect to drop out permanently, and many do. The causes of the dropout rate are many, and so must be the remedies. It looks like a long road ahead to cure

Last week's column commenced with an observation on Jesse Jackson's drive to change the designation of his people from black to African-American. The concept has since gained the endorsement of a sizeable number of leaders who have African blood in their veins. Most notable aspect of the endorsement is that those mentioned are of extremely

light complexion. For one I have always deplored specific racial references, in no small part because they are anywhere from misleading to just plain wrong. No better case in point can there be than acceptance of the terms Anglo and Hispanic.

First consider Anglo. The word refers to the English people, whether they are born in the island nation or not. An Anglo is one who is of English blood and not one of mixed nationality or race. Chech, Germans, Irish. Part of those nationalities or races or not, are not Anglos. Here someone will seek to fault me, pointing out the origins of the island people. Suffice that very few among us who call ourselves Americans can truly claim to be Anglos.

Basically, the same rule applies to Hispanic, one whose language, people and culture derive from Iberia. In the case of people from Central and South America, a true Hispanic is as rare as a true Anglo in the United States. Fahrenback in "Fire and Blood," and later Alan Riding in "Distand and Neighbors" tell us that perhaps one percent of the people in Mexico are truly Hispanic. Primarily Latin-American ties to Spain come

only from language and religion. What then are the real differences between that dividing line of people in America, north and south? There is a rule, although a very broad one. In North America the people have in the past at least, been of varying nationalities while in the South the div-

isions have been racial. In the North then the people are mostly Cacausian while those in the South have intermixed with the true natives. Their Cacausion blood comes mostly from Spain, but Spanish blood flows in lesser degree than that of the region's native Indian. In addition there has been an injection of no small amount of African and Asiatic influence, particularly the former. As a result than the term mestizo applies to virtually everyone south of the Rio Grande River which divides the United States and Mexico. Mestizo is of Spanish origin and meaning the same thing are the terms Euruarian, half-breed, mulatto, sambo, hybred and crossbreed, among a host of others.

During my years in South Texas I have observed that our neighbors to the south have alternating and changing preferences for words used to describe themselves: Mexican-American, Hispanic, Latino, to name only the first to come to mind. Often I have known them to be rather emphatic in their preferences.

"Vista," a magazine insert in a number of Sunday newspapers shows an evident preference for Latino, Hispanic and sometimes brown. Published in English, the magazine is upbeat, stressing the successes of the people it serves. I found particularly interesting a piece by Nancy Velez-Carlo titled "Decline in Letter Writing Robs Us of Our Heritage and Warmth." I sympathize with her viewpoint and she makes it beautifully. However, it is my experience that the majority of the Spanish speaking people in this part of the U.S. can neither read nor write the language. Evidence is in that there have been countless attempts to launch Spanish language newspapers without success. On the other hand Spanish language radio and television stations

If I have somehow digressed from my original theme which is in essence what should we call ourselves, let me then return with a single question: Might it not be most appropriate that we define ourselves by the simple color words? Red, white, black, brown, yellow? Not totally accurate, I confess, but still more honest than hyphenated descriptives.

After showing the presentation entitled "Conserve and Preserve Our Underground Water," Isbell stated that the main goal of his agency is to bring soil erosion under control in the state of Texas.

Sediment that washes into our streams and lakes is the state's largest pollutant, killing fish and ruining lakes.

He said that the answer to preventing erosion lies in terracing the land, irrigating conservatively, land leveling, and the protection of the land when not in cultivation. He tolm members that land control will reduce erosion and present flooding, and one way his agency is accomplishing this is by developing the state's water sheds.

Isbell concluded by passing out pamphlets to the group and stating that conservation is the solution to pollution.

Following the program a business session was held, conducted by Mrs. Robert Illingworth, vice president.

Mrs. John Clapp, conservation chairman, announced that the top 21 conservation posters, with the theme of "Tree Conservation," made by the first grade students at Kidwell Elementary School would be on display at the school during Public School Week, then taken to the Tom Burnett Memorial Library to be on

display there through the end of the
