The hummingbird is the smallest bird on earth; some species weigh no more than a dime. It has the highest rate of metabolism (at rest, about 50 times faster than man's) and thus must consume enormous amounts of nectar to avoid starvation. Not adapted for night feeding, it must stretch its food stores from dusk to dawn. J.F. Hood of Fort Worth has revealed plans to drill a 2,000-ft. developmental well in the Wichita County Regular Field. The operator has a 40-acre unit located 1,400 feet from the south line and 175 feet from the west line of the O. Farish Survey, A-383. The venture has been designated as the No. 1 Preston with drillsite seven miles southwest of Burkburnett.

The No. 57 Cunningham, a 2,000-ft. developmental well, is scheduled to be drilled in the Wichita County Regular Field. Tom Swanson Oil of Electra is the operator. The well will be spudded in a 340-acre lease 3,756 feet from the north line and 1,991 feet from the west line of Block 13, H&GN Survey, A-146. Drillsite is 1.5 miles southwest of Fowlkes.

F.T. Felty of Burkburnett has abandoned two undrilled locations in the Wichita County Regular Field, three miles south-southeast of Burkburnett. The wells were located in a 120-acre unit, 150 feet from the north line and 150 feet and 750 feet from the west line of the R. Hornsby Survey, A-97. The wells had been designated as the Nos. 2 and 4 L.K. Holman, respectively.

Three undrilled locations have been abandoned by James & Henderson of Iowa Park at drillsites two miles southwest of Iowa Park in the Wichita County Regular Field. The ventures had been designated as the No. 27 T.L. & S.B. Burnett and the Nos. 28 and 29 T.L. & S.B. Burnett Estate. The locations were in a 120-acre unit in the H&GN Survey, A-435; 1,770 feet from the south line and 1958 feet from the west line; 1,600 feet from the north line and 1,358 feet from the west line; and 1,000 feet from the north line and 3,450 feet from the east line of the survey, respectively.

Plug-and-abandon orders were issued for the No. 18 Burnett "D", a developmental venture of Williams Petroleum of Burkburnett in the Wichita County Regular Field. Spudded Jan. 14, the well had reached 1,000-ft. total depth. Drillsite was two miles southeast of Fowlkes, 1,170 feet from the north line and 2,055 feet from the east line of Block 4, SA&MG Survey, A-430.

West Landrum of Burkburnett has given up on his efforts to make a producer out of the No. 1 Dickinson. It was a developmental try in the Wichita County Regular Field. The location was one-half mile west of Clara, 1,091 feet from the south line and 790 feet from the west line of Block 3, Specht Colony Survey. Spudded Jan. 24, the well had reached 1,887-ft. total depth.

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Drillsite has been staked for the No. 6 Rainwater, a 5,100-ft. developmental well in the Rainwater Field, Wilbarger County. The operation is located six miles west-southwest of Harrold in a 640-acre unit, 2,000 feet from the south line and 1,500 feet from the west line of Section 19, Block of the H&TC Survey, A-376. The operator is JHR Corp. of Plano.

The No. 1 Rape "A" has been given a "dry hole" label by Phillips Petroleum of Oklahoma City. Located 1.5 miles south of Farmers Valley, the well had been spudded Oct. 4. It was located 1,037 feet from the south line and 1,900 feet from the west line of Section 47, Block 16, H&TC Survey, A-422. The well had reached 8,500-ft. total depth.

Paul DeCleva Inc. of Wichita Falls has bottomed its No. 2 Moore at a depth of 8,268 feet at a wildcat location in Wilbarger County and has called for completion tests. The well is located one mile west of Farmers Valley in a 225-acre lease, 2,097 feet
