The Seacrest, a 351 -foot drilling ship owned by Unocal, a cas capsized based energy company, was Gay which

"The eye of the typhoon passed directly over the Seacrest," Unocal spokesman told United Press International. "This caused very rapid and violent changes in wind and sea conditions resulting in the capsizel."
