Sunday, police arrested Larry Wayne Fortner, 35, on a warrant from Smith County charging him with theft by check. He was released to county deputies.


A resident in the 1300 block of Westridge registered a criminal mischief complaint with police last Wednesday that someone had damaged his pickup.

Iowa Park lost in a rain-shorten-


ed game Monday, 7-5, to the Colts, Wichita Falls city champions. Coy Thompson pitched for the locals.

According to the American Cancer Society, one out of ten women in the United States will develop breast cancer sometime in her lifetime. It is currently estimated that over 37,000 women die each year as the result of breast cancer.

Ninety percent of breast cancers are diagnosed by women or their physicians finding a lump in the breast. Women who are diagnosed with a lump large enough to feel have a 50 percent five year survival rate. A woman who is diagnosed as having breast cancer by mammography before a lump can be felt, has a 97% five year survival rate and 90% 10 year survival rate.

The Mobile Breast Cancer Detection Unit will be in Iowa Park, on Tuesday, July 26.

The American Cancer Society has established guidelines for mammography in asymptomatic women. (Women who have no symptons of disease). Those guidelines have been adopted by the American Academy of Family Physicians, American College of Obstetricians and Gynecologists, and The American

College of Radiology. Those guidelines are:

1. 35-40 years of age - One baseline mammogram.
2. 40-50 years of age - A mammogram every 1-2 years depending on breast type and risk factor.
3. 50 years of age and over - An annual physical examination and annual mammogram.
4. Asymptomatic women under 50 years of age with significant high risk factors should be examined at appropriate intervals. These risk factors include previous breast cancer and family history of cancer.


5. A symptomatic woman should have a mammogram at any age when she experiences a mass, nipple discharge, skin changes or unexplained breast pain.

A screening mammogram is an x-ray of the breast using extremely low dosages of radiation (usually comparable to dental x-rays) and is designed to find very early cancers.

A femal technologist who is highly trained in mammography will perform the examination.





Organizations and churches are also asked to have their histories put in written form and turned in.


An edition of this size is not put together in a week or two. We're starting now, and need your input as soon as possible.

Burkburnett is an oil town through and through. When you drive down its streets, you see all around the evidence of historic oil production, from the remains of steampowered drilling rigs to fences made out of steel pipe and sucker rods.

So frenzied was the exploration, drilling and production at Burkburnett in its heyday in 1918-19 that the town was recreated years later in Hollywood as the setting for the famous "Boom Town" motion picture staring Clark Gable and Spencer Tracy.

Just north of the intersection of East 9th Street and North Avenue E on the north side of present-day Burkburnett stands a two-story white frame farmhouse. It doesn't look particularly impressive, and it's not identified by any historical markers. It was here, nevertheless, on S.W. Fowler's farm, that the Burkburnett Oil Field was discovered in 1918, starting one of the most famous of all Texas oil booms.

In summer 1918 S.W. Fowler had become discouraged by drought conditions that had shriveled his cotton crop away to almost nothing, and he had decided to leave Wichita County for greener fields elsewhere. His wife, however, wasn't ready to

Mrs. Fowler had observed oil production in other areas of Wichita County, most notably around Electra about 20 miles away. When her husband broached the idea of moving, she disagreed. "I believe there's oil under our land," she stated, "and I won't agree to dispose of the farm until a test is drilled.'

Consequently S.W. Fowler asked several of his friends to meet with him at a Burkburnett cafe to discuss the possibility of their jointly drilling a test oil well on his property. Fowler agreed to provide the site for the well plus \$500 in cash, and W.D. Cline volunteered to contribute an idle cable-tool well drilling rig, his own personal services and those of one of his "tool pushers." Two other men, one of them Fowler's brother,

When the teamsters started hauling in rig materials, the first wagon bogged down in deep sand about 50 yards before reaching the proposed well site. Since Mr. Fowler didn't expect to find any oil on his property anyway, he declared, "Oh, well, unload'er here." The site was located about 1,000 feet north northeast of the farmhouse. From her vantage point at the house, Mrs. Fowler could watch the daily drilling progress. Her husband hoped that she would be satisfied.

Down the well went. A few signs of oil appeared a little below 1,600 feed depth, but no one thought very much about it. So convinced was everyone that another dry hole would result that no scouts from the major oil companies even bothered to investigate the test. Neighbors exclaimed, "Fowler has gone crazy." The minds all changed, however,

on the morning of July 26, 1918. While the Fowler family was still asleep, driller "Red" McDonald ran into their yard from the well. To the amazement of the family, he proclaimed, "The well came in big during the night, and she's filled the 800-barrel tank and the 1,400 barreler too." He added, "Now the oil is running down the cotton rows."

At 1,734 feet underground, the Fowlers had struck it rich, and so had the whole town of Burkburnett. Within days the sleepy little Red River community became an incredible boom town. The Wichita Weekly Times on Aug. 2, 1918, noted, "To say that Burkburnett presents a busy scene does not begin to express the conditions in that little city, where all is activity and where the main street is thronged with visitors."

Hordes of outsiders bustled down Burkburnett streets, while rooming houses, hotels and private homes were unable to accomodate the crowds. Gusher after gusher increased the feverish business deals. The newspaper reported, "Oil companies are being formed on the sidewalk or in the middle of the street."

As a result of the Fowler Farm discovery, Burkburnett became a forest of derricks, with some of its town lots supporting two and even more rigs. Lots leased for as much as \$1,000 plus royalties.

S.W. Fowler and his family remained in their two-story farmhouse another five years, but in 1923 he succeeded in moving away. This move, however, was as a wealthy man. He purchased a ranch between Fort Worth and Weatherford and lived there to a ripe old age. R.B. "Bob" Helton of Wichita Falls became his acquaintance in these later years, and he told me that "Mr. Fowler died at age 105 and was actively riding horseback at age 102. I met him the first time when he was 102."

In telling the story I almost forgot to mention that the bogged-down freight wagon was the reason for S.W. Fowler's sudden riches. The initially proposed test well site 50 yards beyond the actual location was outside the oil-producing zone, and had the well been drilled where Fowler had first intended, it would have been a dry hole.

Worth Quoting

It is almost embarrassing to watch night after night the coverage of the Winter Olympics. The United States competitors are given a big build up before each event and, with a few exceptions, they finish well out of the first three places.

I know that the Olympics are not supposed to be a contest pitting nation against nation in the race for the highest medal count, but it would be nice if we could win one once in a

The thought occurred to me one night, while watching the U.S. bobsled team finish 28th or something, that we are competing in the wrong sports at the Winter Olympics. Each of the sports, downhill skiing, figure skating, speed skating, bobsled, and all the others, all have their cultural roots in Europe. They've been skating in Holland, skiing in Norway, luging in Switzerland and curling in Sweden for centuries.

What we need are some new winter sports that would have their roots in the American culture. For the consideration of the Olympic committee here are a few suggestions:

PARKING LOT ICE DANC-ING - Each contestant is given two fully loaded grocery bags and must travel across a frozen parking lot to a waiting car. Each contestant must wear leather soled shoes with no spikes or blades. Points will be given for originality, grace and style. Bonus points for proceeding to the car with door keys in hand. Falls will deduct points, unless they are of highly original and amusing nature.

DOG COAXING - A team will consist of the contestant and his dog. Each team will stand inside a door and outside the wind will be blowing at least 30 mph and the temperature will be below zero. The object is to talk the dog into going outside for a morning constitutional. Points will be based on the total time it takes for the dog to pass through the door. Points will be deducted if the owner loses patience and boots the canine through the doorway.

NEWSPAPER SPRINT - Clad only in a bathrobe and slippers, the contestant must run across a yard covered with three feet of snow and find two newspapers in the yard.

Points will be awarded for the fastest total time to find the papers and return to the starting point. Points will be deducted for returning with an old newspaper left by the contestant the previous day.

THERMOSTAT WRESTLING-(Mixed Couples Only) One team member attempts to turn the heating thermostat up while the opposite team member turns the thermostat down. The winner is decided when either the thermostat breaks or one team gives up in desperation. The loser must pay the gas bill for the remainder of the winter.

These simple contests would add some life to the Winter Olympics and give Jim McKay entirely new material for his commentary. Also, it would give Americans a good chance to bring home the gold in these new

Carl Rowan, a black, liberal newspaper columnist, has written many times about the need for tighter gun control laws in this country.

W.R. Grace reports increase in earnings

W.R. Grace & Co. announced last Thursday in New York second quarter results which are strongly ahead of the period year.

Income from continuing operations for the quarter increased by 62 percent. Net income for the same period, which included the results of discontinued operations, soared 91 per-

Grace is the parent company of Cryovac.

The advance was led by the company's world-wide specialty chemicals business. All of Grace's other business lines -- health care, energy and general business -- contributed to the improvement.

For the second quarter ended June 30, income after taxes from continuing operations totalled \$58,231,000, or 68-cents per share, compared with \$35,986,000, or 42-cents per share, in the second quarter of 1987, an increase of 62 percent.

Net income in the same period of 1988, including results of discontinued operations, was \$64,368,000, or 76-cents per share, versus \$33,777,000, or 40-cents per share for the 1987 second quarter.

Sales for the quarter rose to \$1,447,009,000, up 26 percent from 1987. The sales gain was due in part to the consolidation of National Medical Care in 1988.

For the first six months of 1988, after-tax income continuing operations was

\$96,883,000, an increase of 103 percent from the first half of 1987.



Operating out of Tyler, Helmer iploration has revealed plans to fill the No. 1 Proud Estate: rockreide in Wichita County, a vildeat to be spudded about four miles north-northwest of Electra.

It will be a 4,999-ft, maximum test, with drillsite in a 40-acre unit in the Waggener Colony Subdivision, Block 189, 350 feet from the north line and 330 feet from the west line of the block.

Dallas-based Marshall Energy has filed for permit to drill the No. 3 M.Bank in the KMA Field, Wichita County, two miles west-southwest of Kamay. The 4,000-ft. venture is in a 98-acre lease in the W.H. Spillers Survey A-258. It is 4,328 feet from the south line and 350 feet from the west line of the survey.

Tom Swanson of Electra has given up on his efforts to make a producer out of the No. 13 Burnett "F", a developmental bid in the Wichita Regular Field, Located two miles south of Fowlkes, the well was spudded on May 8 and probed to a dry bottom at 2,000-ft. TD. It will be plugged and abandoned.

West Landrum of Burkburnett has abandoned two undrilled locations in the Wichita Regular Field, about 5.5 miles southwest of Burkburnett. The wells had been designated as the No. 67 and 68 Reilly "L". They had both carried permit for 1,900 feet of hole making.

Tri-core Oil and Gas of Irving has filed for permit to drill the 1201 Kelly in the Wichita Regular Field, three miles north-northeast of Clara. Location is in a 228-acre lease in the Specht Colony Subdivision, Lewis Powell Survey A-242, It is 4,150 feet north and 1,025 feet east of the centerpoint of southeast corner of section 19.

Total drilling depth is projected

Atapco Inc. of Midland has staked locations for a total of six developmental wells in the Wichita Regular Field, from four to five miles southwest of Burkburnett.

The wells will be known as the Nos. 64 through 69 Reilly "A". Projected total depths range from 1,750 to 1,950 feet. They are in a 2,100acre lease in the J. Ellis, L.C. Dennison and SPRR Surveys. The first three wells are in the Ellis Survey, the next two in the Dennison and the final well in the SPRR Survey.

Drilling operations have been concluded at a wildcat venture in Hardeman County, about 2.5 miles south of Chillicothe. Cranford Operating has bottomed its No. 1 Oscar B. Hampton at a depth of 8,518 feet after spudding the well on May 21 of this year. No details on commercial prospects have been disclosed.

Madison Oil of Wichita Falls and Michel Halbouty of Houston have started making for the No. 1 Georgia-Pacific Unit in the Quanah Field, Hardeman County, about three miles north of Quanah. The well will be seeking pay in the Chappel Formation and carries permit for 9,000 feet of hole.

Storm damage reported near Valley View Monday

Several reports of damage were noted, including that of a roof being torn off a home, after spotted showers apparently produced strong winds near Valley View around 8:30 Monday evening.

Ronnie Cravens, fire chief of Kamay Volunteer Fire Department, said a home on Hacker Road, south off FM 1206, had "the roof rolled back" after the strong winds hit the area. He said the storm produced varied amounts of rain in the area and water was standing on Hacker Road and in a nearby cotton field.

A utility pole belonging to TU Electric and also located on Hacker Road was damaged during the storm, leaving some Valley View residents without electricty for up to three and a half hours.

The same storm evidently took the roof off a storage shed and damaged an electrical pole behind a mobile home on FM 1206, and broke high line wires on an oil lease off FM 258, according to Cravens.

Cravens believes the damage was caused by straight winds, and ruled out the possibilty of a tornado.
