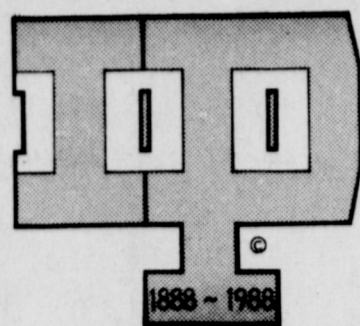

Four vehicles damaged by criminal mischief

Four cases of criminal mischief involving vehicles were reported during the past week to the Iowa Park Police Department.

Two complaints were filed Friday morning by owners. A car in the 100 block of James Drive had been egged and one in the 900 block of E. Pasadena had writing on it.

The owner of a vehicle on Surrey Circle reported to police at 2:20 a.m. Sunday that tires on his vehicle had been punctured.

About noon the same day, the owner of a vehicle parked at Colonial Heights Apartments said his windshield had been shattered.

Articles of men's clothing and a

pair of sunglasses were reportedly taken in a burglary at 900 S. Colorado, police were told Tuesday.

Kevin Rowe, who filed the report, said someone had entered the house through an airconditioner hole. Value of the articles was set as less than \$70.

Linda Gilmore, 521 W. Alameda, told police Tuesday afternoon two unidentified females had assaulted her daughter. A report was filed.

A criminal trespass suspect was arrested Thursday of last week. He was Cody Barnett, 17, charged with illegally entering the swimming pool

at the high school the previous day.

Barnett was alleged to have been in the pool when another man, Dale Patrick Church, 19, was arrested inside the fence. Barnett ran from the area, police said.

Like Church, after the charge was filed, Barnett was transported to county jail.

School, city leaders to meet

Iowa Park school trustees will hold a called meeting this evening, and the city council will hold a regular session Monday.

The board will open its meeting at 7:30 in the administration building, according to an agenda posted

Monday by Supt. Glen Mitchell.

Monday's council meeting is to begin at 7 p.m. in council chambers.

On the trustee agenda are:

1. Accept/reject the Bradford Elementary School addition;
2. Adopt/reject attendance policy for Iowa Park High School;

3. Adopt/reject school board policies

(a) College Concurrent Enrollment

(b) Academic Achievement Class Rankings

4. Adopt/reject proposed length of school day for each campus during the 1988-89 school year.

A public appearance has been requested by Beverly Bohannon, regarding houses in the floodway and floodplane of the East Alameda area.

City Administrator James Barrington said the area is affected by overflow from Lake Gordon, and has been designated as a floodplane area by the federal government.

Another public hearing will be held on the proposed annexation of a 28-acre tract of land, known as the Wigley Addition.

The council will be asked to authorize the city administrator to purchase computer hardware and software, replacing the existing computer, and enter into financing arrangements on behalf of the city.

Barrington is also to make a report on a voluntary bicycle registration program to be sponsored by the police department.

Registrations would be entered in the computer to facilitate return of bicycles found abandoned.

Building permits continue to mount

Building permits issued by Iowa Park city hall through the first seven months of this year have almost doubled the total for 1987.

Most of the July permits, 41, were for repairs, most likely more of the roofing work from the March 1 hail storm.

But the permits also included four new homes, a mobile home, and the balance additions and alterations.

The \$238,419 in permits issued during May raised the year's total to \$2,114,380. This is compared to the 1987 total of \$1,241,496.

The previous three months' building permits were primarily repairs for the hail damage. They included: June, \$462,619; May, \$271,891; April, \$454,036, and March, \$417,798.

Land bought to attract new industry

The Industrial Development Corporation, a wing of the Chamber of Commerce, is about to make a major push to attract a new industry to the community.

A 20-acre tract of land has been purchased on the US 287 access road, on the north side between Pacific and Johnson, which will be offered as a site, according to H.M. Nipper, president of the IDC.

The land, which has been cleared of mesquite brush and soon will be fenced, was purchased from Donald Boley and Associates.

Located slightly over three-tenths of a mile west of FM 368, or Pacific, the tract has 751 feet of frontage and extends approximately 1,190 feet to the north.

Nipper said a mailing list of some 250 potential industries, not necessarily manufacturers, will be mailed a package of maps and data concerning the community.

A similar project of the IDC was successful in attracting the Cryovac plant to Iowa Park.

A buffet held a similar flower arrangement with candles as accents.

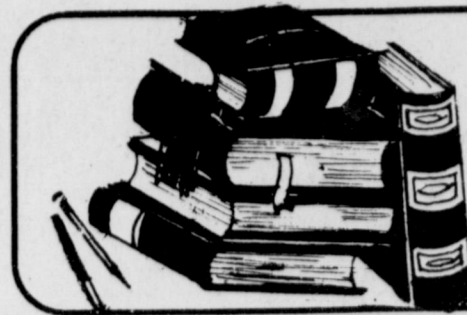

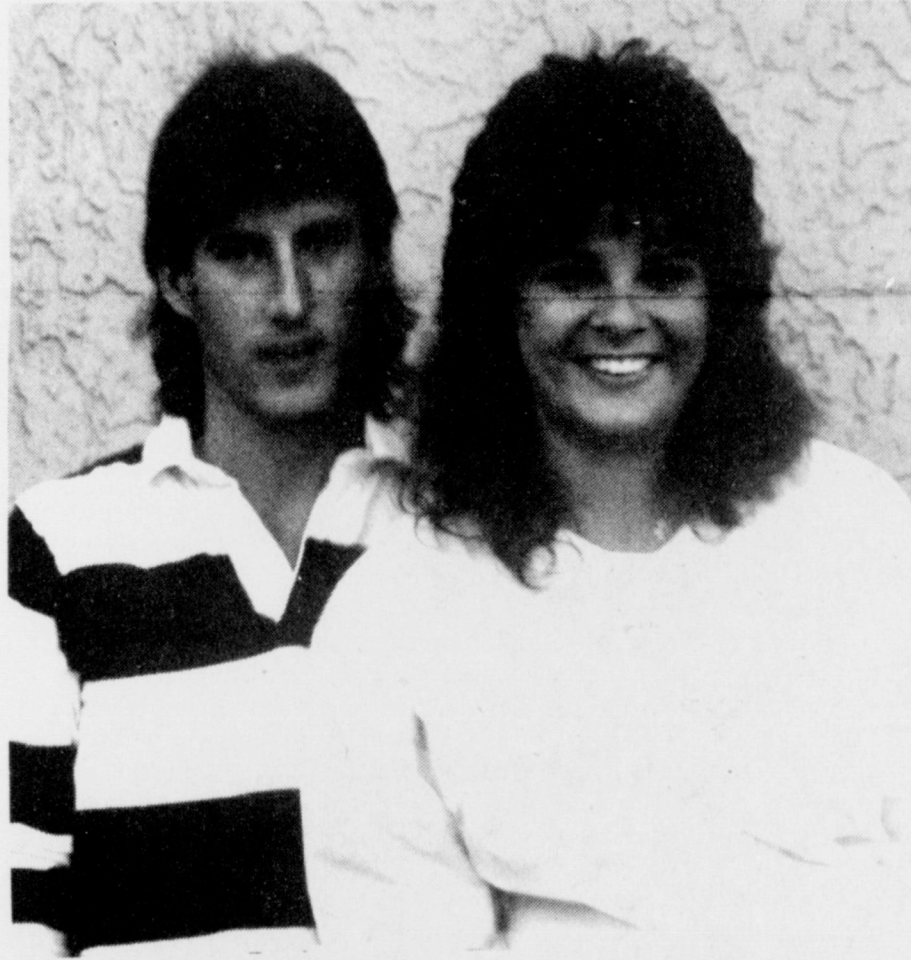

CHOCOLATE MAYONNAISE CAKE

1 cup mayonnaise
1 cup sugar
1/4 cup cocoa
2 cups flour
2 tsp. baking soda in 1 cup warm water
2 tsp. vanilla
Mix mayonnaise, sugar and cocoa. Alternate soda water with flour and beat until smooth. Add vanilla. Bake in greased 9X13 pan 30 minutes at 350 degrees.
Note: Mixture will be thin. Very moist cake. Serve with ice cream, whipped cream or plain.

A-B-C BRUNCH

1 lb. bacon
1-20 oz. can sliced apples, drained
2 Tbsp. sugar
2 cup shredded cheddar cheese
1 1/2 cups Bisquick mix
1 1/2 cup milk
4 eggs
Cut bacon into four pieces; fry until crisp and drain. Mix apples and sugar. Spread in greased 12X7 1/2X2 baking dish. Sprinkle with cheese and bacon. Beat remaining ingredients and spread on top. Bake uncovered at 350 degrees until knife inserted comes out clean, 30 to 35 minutes.

STUFFED CUCUMBER

1 cucumber
1 Tbsp. catsup
1 Tbsp. chopped chives
3 oz. cream cheese
1 rounded tsp. mayonnaise
Assorted round crackers or bread
Peel cucumber approximate diameter of cracker. Cut off one end of cucumber. Core cucumber with flexible knife. Mash cream cheese, catsup, mayonnaise together. Add chives. Stuff cucumber; wrap in plastic. Chill well.

When ready to serve, slice 1/4-inch slices and place on cracker.

LEMON CORNMEAL COOKIES

1 cup margarine at room temperature
1 tsp. grated lemon peel
1 1/2 cup flour
1 cup sugar
2 egg yolks
1 cup yellow cornmeal
Mix margarine and sugar well. Add egg yolks and lemon peel. Stir in flour and cornmeal. Wrap in plastic in logs and chill three to four hours. Roll and cut out circles. Bake at 350 degrees on ungreased baking sheet eight to 10 minutes or until edges are brown. Makes three dozen.

MESQUITE FLOUR

Snap dried bean pods. Grind in blender. Sift out black bean kernels. To use in cornbread and tamales. Use equal parts cornmeal and mesquite flour. Tasty.

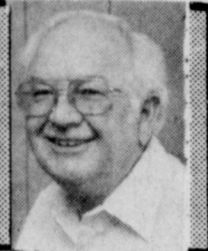

Iowa Park administrators and athletic directors have been wondering why the school's share in gate receipts from football games played at Springtown were so slight, in com-

parison with other schools. Each school, according to the contracts signed, is to share in the gross receipts from ticket sales, after the cost of officials is deducted.

But a portion of an article in the July 28 issue of the Springtown Epigraph may have provided the answer.

The paper's story was announcing reserved and season tickets, which this year will be: "reserved tickets - \$21; season tickets - \$28.80 and box seats - \$120."

But the point that caught the reader's eye was a paragraph stating, "All the money received from the sale of reserved and season tickets prior to the season are retained by Springtown ISD. Tickets sold the week of the game must be divided with the visiting team. Superintendent Conny Martin encourages everyone who can to purchase season and reserve seats before the first football game."

The article specifically states that all money from tickets sold before game date is retained by the district, and not shared with the visiting team, which is apparently in violation of the contract with Iowa Park.

Iowa Park's share of the 1985 game played at Springtown, after officials were paid, was \$999. Last year, Iowa Park received \$2,054.

But in 1986, when Springtown played in Hawk Stadium, the visitors received \$3,795.

Iowa Park superintendent, Glenn Mitchell, was out of town last week and not available for comment this week, but assistant superintendent Robert Palmer said he felt sure the Springtown administrators would be contacted concerning the statement in that paper.

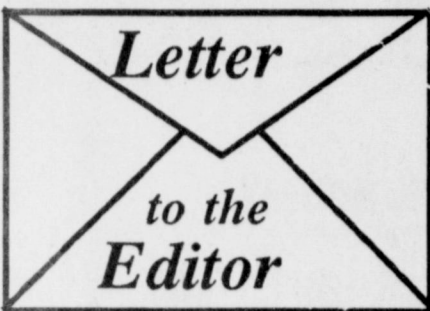
The homecoming is open to former students, teachers and parents of those school.

As governor of Massachusetts, he has been quoted as saying, "I don't believe in people owning guns, only the police and military, and I'm going to do everything I can to disarm this state."

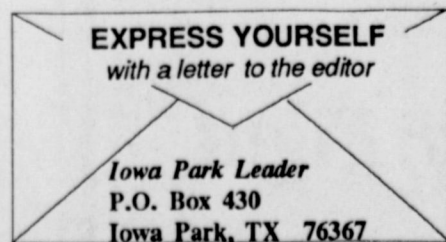
I suppose we could expect as much from a liberal northeasterner from the same state where such an attitude has been championed by Senator Edward Kennedy.

The trip cost about \$1,800, of which the student said he had raised most of it and the rest was paid by his parents.

Now that he's back, he plans to go out for football starting next week and also play in the fall soccer league on weekends, which he has been doing in the past.

Conley is a 1985 graduate of Iowa Park High School.

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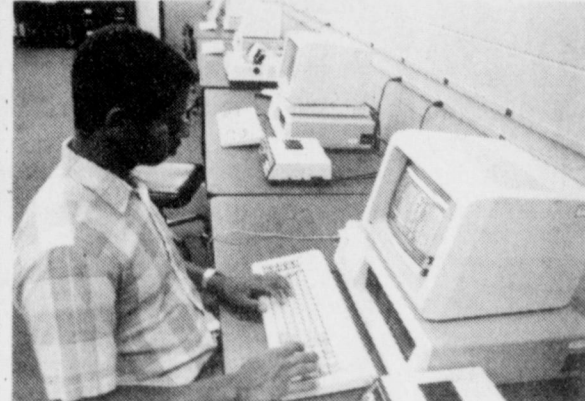

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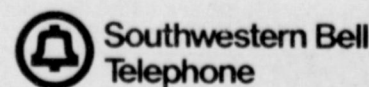

The Hawks, under the guidance of new head coach Len Williams, will be working out in shorts until Friday of next week and then will put on full pads.

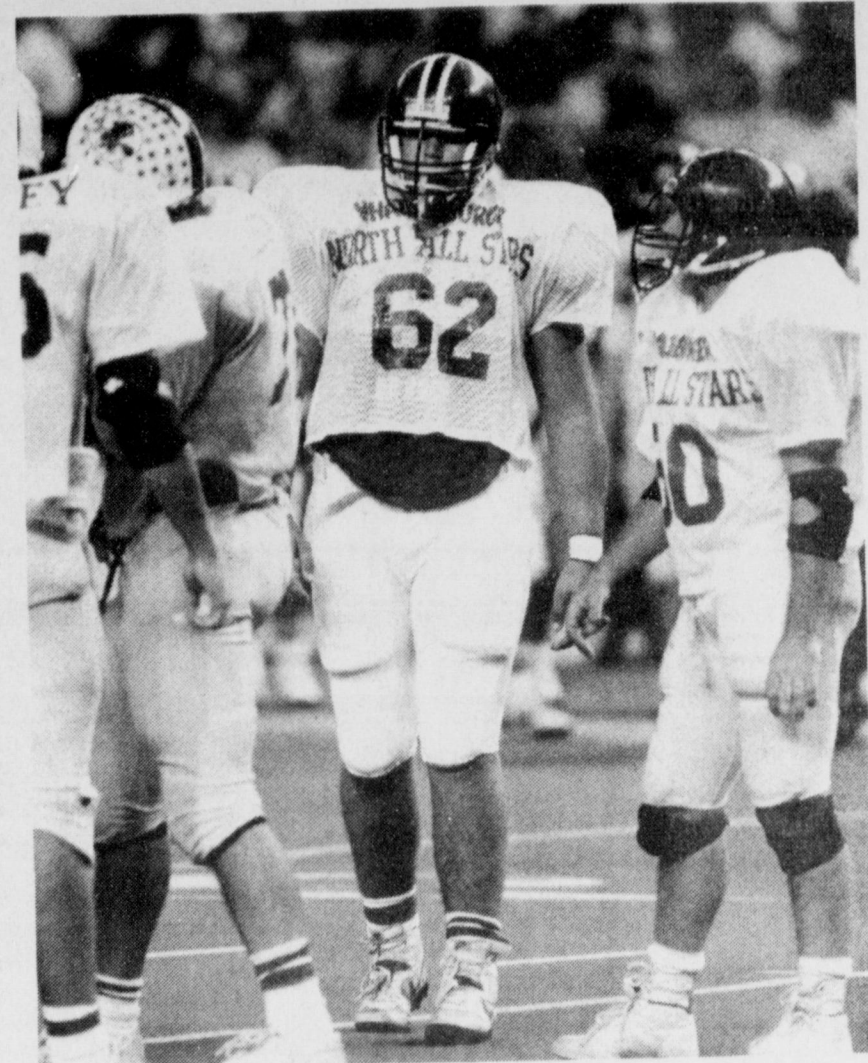
Two-a-day sessions will be 7:30-9:30 in the mornings, and 6:30-8:30 in the evenings.
