Two Iowa Parkans die in storm-related accidents

While the most severe storm of the winter, which began Tuesday of last week and finally let up Monday, was little more than an inconvenience to local residents, tragedy struck in two unrelated highway accidents away from here.

Ronnie Feltman, an employee of the highway department, was killed in a mishap on US 287 south of Wichita Falls on Wednesday, and Friday, Robin Morris, the former Robin Ann Whiteacre, died in a two-vehicle accident near Nocona.

Both were members of the Iowa Park High School graduating class of 1977.

Feltman, a nine-year employee of the highway department, was riding with another employee in a sanding truck when a part of the equip-

ment malfunctioned.

When the truck was stopped, the Iowa Parkan got out and, apparently while attempting to correct the problem, was crushed beneath the truck's bed when it was lowered.

Mrs. Morris was accompanying her husband, who was a driver of an ambulance owned by Scott-Morris Funeral Home of Nocona, as he was transporting a hospital patient to Nocona from Wichita Falls. A friend of the patient was also in the vehicle.

About 10 miles west of Nocona, the ambulance apparently skidded out of control on ice and was broadsided by an oncoming 18-wheel truck.

The driver was the only occupant to survive, though he reportedly remains in critical condition.

Precipitation began falling Tuesday of last week, initially as a drizzle and then turning into sleet, until the ground was covered with five inches of sleet and snow.

Temperatures turned to freezing Tuesday and did not rise above 32 degrees until Monday. Lowest temperature reported by the weather station in Wichita Falls was four above zero.

Driving became almost impossible for many residents, and very few accidents, other than sliding into ditches, were reported, but there were no injuries.

Iowa Park police received a few calls of hit-and-run cases, mainly on Thursday.

Schools were closed Thursday and

Friday, and started late Wednesday, Monday and Tuesday. Twice buses attempting to pick up students were stuck in ditches after sliding off the road, but no damage or injuries resulted.

Because US 287 was extremely slick from the frozen precipitation, numerous accidents were reported in the area.

Two trucks were involved in wrecks as late as Monday. The first was a minor rollover in the median near the Johnson Road exit, when driver H.B. Miller of Decatur lost control.

The second was that afternoon at the Huntington Road overpass, where a double trailer rig jackknifed and almost struck the pillar on the west side. Driver Dennis Edward Wacek of Salemore, Org. was uninjured but damage to the vehicle was extensive.

Drivers of pickups were virtually unable to move most of the period, if they had no weight in their beds to create some traction. Some resorted to loading them with snow, some used bricks and old tires, while a few even carried large loads of baled hay.

A large portion of the north side of the city experienced a period of no water pressure Friday evening. The Johnson Road water tower had to be drained so pressure could be relieved while workers repaired a major line break on Magnolia, about a block east of Johnson Road.

Pressure was returned to normal during the evening, however. Several

residents had called plumbers believing their water had frozen, reported Monty Britt.

The storm cost the city about \$3,000 in labor and materials, according to Mike Price, public works director.

Crews began attempting to clear business area streets Wednesday, and spread sand on non-highway intersections throughout the life of the ice.

Highway department crews took care of the old highway, now known as Loop 370.

Pickup of trash was difficult for the city, because of drifted snow and wet alleys. Collection trucks have had to go out early in the mornings frozen. But pickup schedules are expected to be back to normal by Friday.

There have been no problems for curbside pickup of roll-out containers.

A dedication service for the new Faith Baptist Church sanctuary was to have been held Sunday, but has now been postponed until sometime in March, according to Rev. Jerry Miller, pastor.

Virgil Woodfin measured five inches of frozen precipitation at his home, and when melted down, he had .54 of an inch moisture. That, when added to the .22 he measured by Wednesday morning, brought the total moisture from the storm to .76 of an inch.

Landfill dispute may be settled this week

The long-standing dispute between the city and property owners at the sanitary landfill could possibly be ended this week.

Council members voted unanimously Monday night to offer Mrs. Mable Karstetter and family \$57,456 for a 53.7-acre tract southwest of town which is currently being used for a landfill.

The contract has been drafted and forwarded to Mrs. Karstetter's attorney for acceptance.

Under the terms of the contract, according to City Administrator James Barrington, the amount is offered in a lump sum and does not itemize anything.

Trustee meeting moved to tonight

The school trustee meeting that was scheduled to be held Tuesday was reset for 7:30 this evening in the administration building, according to Supt. Glen Mitchell.

Trustees will hold an executive session to consider extension of the superintendent's contract, as well as other "personnel matters."

January traditionally has been the month trustees act on the contract of the superintendent.

A preliminary budget report for the 1988-89 school year will be presented for trustee consideration. It was requested by board chairman Jimmy Howell at the last meeting, because funding of new classrooms at Bradford Elementary is to yet be arranged.

Besides considering two policy changes, trustees will act on the annual performance report.

But if accepted, Mrs. Karstetter's suit against the city and a counter suit by the city to take the land by eminent domain would both be dropped, and settle all claims.

Mrs. Karstetter had charged the city had caused the death of some cattle and also taken top soil from the site. The city had never accepted responsibility for the cattle, but did acknowledge having taken some soil, though disputing the value stated in the suit.

The acreage included in the purchase offer is about one-third of the property leased by the city from Mrs. Karstetter. If the contract is accepted, the lease contract on the balance of the property would be void.

A vote of the council on the issue was taken following a 20-min-

ute executive session with the city's attorney, Jay Cantrell.

Aldermen accepted a bid of \$3 per acre for a grass-grazing lease at both Lake Buffalo and Lake Iowa Park, submitted by Denny McCarthy.

He was the only bidder on Lake Iowa Park, and was the highest of two bidders on Lake Buffalo. The other bidder was Charlie Helms, who offered \$1.50 per acre.

No action was taken on a proposal to revise the city's electrical code, though a study by the electrical commission will be made and recommendations made in the future, Barrington told the council.

Janet Hill was recognized by Mayor Tim Hunter as the city's Employee of the Month.

Five vie for JP post

Five names will be on the March 8 Democratic Primary ballot for Place 3 Justice of the Peace.

Candidates will be Wendall Bean, Eddie French, Tommy Key, Vincent Rains and Bill Robinson.

County commissioners' court decided that the winner would serve the balance of 1988 by appointment, and then take office in January 1989 to fulfill the other two years of Virgil Hill's term.

But until an appointment is made, either after the primary or if necessary a runoff, this precinct will not have a Justice of the Peace.

Commissioners called all five of the candidates to the court house Monday for interviews, but decided to

not make an appointment at that time. Precinct 3 Commissioner Gordon Griffith was out of town when the interviews were held.

Only those voters in Voting Precincts 32, 33 and 60 will decide the outcome of the position which was vacated by Judge Hill, who resigned for health reasons.

Of the five candidates, only Robinson has been a candidate for elected office previously. He lost in a runoff to Hill in 1970.

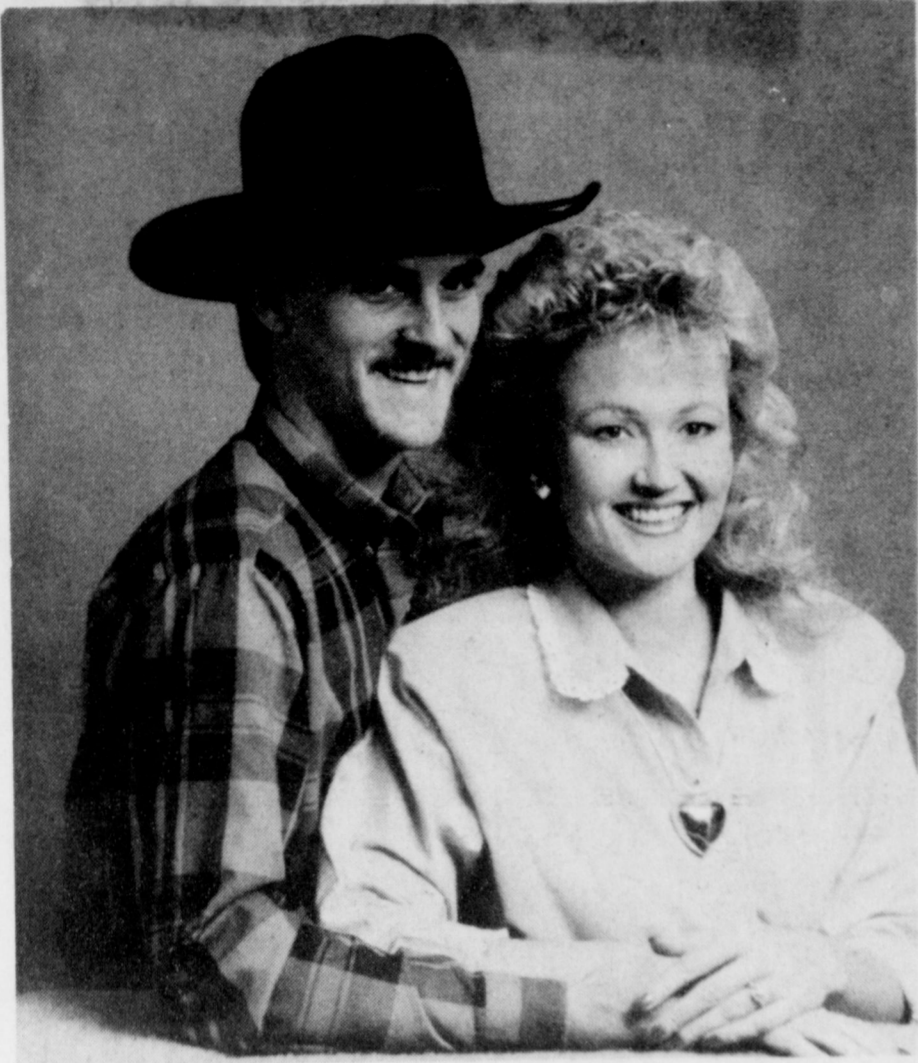

The couple will exchange vows March 12 at St. Paul Lutheran Church in Wichita Falls.

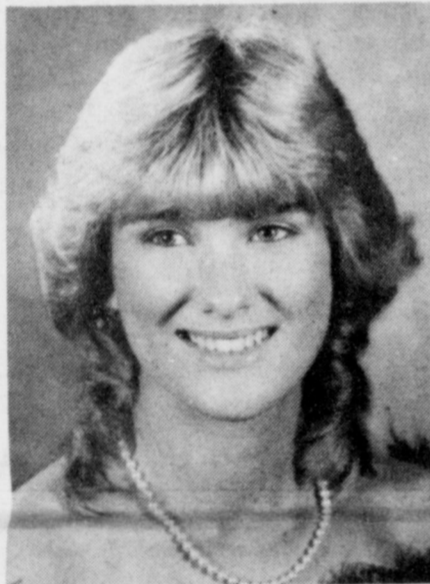
Shower fetes bride-elect

Crowley, whose job is to investigate reports of abuse to the elderly or disabled, presented a slide presentation "A Time To Mourn." An Adult Protective Service Hotline is available for anyone wanting to

report elderly (65 years plus) people who might be abused, neglected, or exploited. The number is 1-800-252-5400.

An average of 20 referrals a month are received in a 22 county area with offices in Wichita Falls, Vernon and Abilene, he said.

Cook of the Week

One of Mrs. Crowley's recipes, Stuffed Cabbage, was her grandmother's, who is Hungarian, and had to be translated to English from Hungarian before it could be used. She also gave recipes of her sister-in-law for True Irish Soda Bread, and mother-in-law for rum cake and cranberry salad.

She grew up in Wichita Falls, graduated from Notre Dame High School and attended Midwestern State Univ. She is employed as a case worker for Family Self Support for the Texas Department of Human Services (TDHR). Her husband of 11 years, Rick, is also employed by TDHR as an Adult Protective Service Specialist. The couple have a daughter, Kathleen, four years old.

STUFFED CABBAGE (can be doubled or tripled)

- 1/3 lb. ground veal
- 1/3 lb. ground beef
- 1/3 lb. ground pork
- Grind and mix meats together.
- 1/4 cup rice per lb. meat (soak in hot water)
- 1 small can sauerkraut
- 1 medium head cabbage
- 1 small can tomato sauce
- 1 med. onion (chop, saute in margarine with salt and pepper)

1. Core cabbage, (blanche) steam cabbage in boiling water; hold with big, long-handled fork, use prongs to remove leaves, dip in cool water.
2. Saute onion.
3. Sprinkle rice and onion on meat mixture and mix.
4. Cut core part off and roll leaves up with 1/4 cup meat.
5. Line bottom of pan with large cabbage leaves.
6. Layer cabbage, tomatoes, meat rolls. Will layer several times.
7. Pour sauerkraut and juice over top to cover rolls, pour on tomato sauce.
8. Cook 2 hours, medium heat with lid ajar.

SHRIMP DIP

- 1 cup mayonnaise
- 1/4 cup catsup
- 1 Tbsp. Worcestershire sauce
- 1 tsp. garlic salt
- 1/2 tsp. chili powder
- 1 small onion, chopped
- 1 small can shrimp
- Blend in blender (or with electric mixer) all ingredients except shrimp. Add shrimp, blend, refrigerate and serve.

SCAMPI

In shallow pan over low heat melt 1/2 cup butter, add 2 Tbsp. Worcestershire sauce, 1/4 cup sherry, 1 or 2 garlic cloves, 3 Tbsp. lemon juice and 1 Tbsp. sugar. Mix well.

Arrange 1 1/2 lb. raw, peeled shrimp in a single layer (9X13 pan).

Spoon sauce over shrimp and broil at 400 degrees 8 minutes. Remove from broiler and let stand 15 minutes.

Sprinkle 1/4 cup minced fresh parsley over shrimp. Broil at high heat 3 minutes.

Spoon over hot cooked rice and sprinkle with Parmesan cheese.

PEG CROWLEY'S CRANBERRY SALAD

- 1 pkg. fresh cranberries
- 1 cup sugar
- 1 cup marshmallows
- 1 cup Tokay grapes
- 1 cup pecans
- 1/2 pt. cream, whipped
- Grind cranberries, cover with sugar and refrigerate overnight. Next day add seeded grapes cut in small pieces, chopped pecans, marshmallows and whipped cream.

BROWNIE DROPS

- 2 pkgs. Baker's sweet chocolate
- 1 Tbsp. butter
- 2 eggs
- 3/4 cup sugar
- 1/4 cup flour,
- 1/4 tsp. baking powder
- 1/4 tsp. cinnamon,
- 1/8 tsp. salt
- 1/2 tsp. vanilla
- 3/4 cup chopped pecans

Melt chocolate and butter over hot water. Stir until melted. Cool.

Beat eggs until foamy and add sugar, 2 Tbsp. at a time; beat until thickened. Blend in chocolate. Add all except nuts and vanilla, blend. Add remaining ingredients.

Drop onto greased baking sheets. Bake at 350 degrees until "set," about 8 to 10 minutes.

PAT CROWLEY'S TRUE IRISH SODA BREAD

- 4 cups flour
- 1/2 cup sugar
- 1 1/2 tsp. baking soda
- 1 tsp. baking powder
- Pinch salt
- 2 cups buttermilk
- (Variations: add raisins and sugar, or butter.)

Soft dough to knead. Spread out in round shape to two inches thick. Cross on it with knife. Grease pan, bake at 350 degrees 45 minutes, checking often.

PEG CROWLEY'S RUM CAKE

- 1 pkg. Duncan Hines Butter cake mix
- 1 lg. pkg. instant vanilla pudding mix
- 1/2 cup tequila or bourbon whiskey
- 1/2 cup water

4 eggs
1/2 cup buttery-flavor Wesson Oil
1/2 cup chopped pecans (or more)
Mix together first six ingredients. Oil and flour tube pan. Scatter pecans evenly over the bottom of pan. Pour in batter and bake one hour in 350 degree oven.

SAUCE

- 1 cup sugar
- 1 stick margarine
- 1/4 cup tequila or bourbon whiskey
- Boil 3-4 minutes and spoon over hot cake. Let set 30 minutes, then remove from pan.

Three bandmen going to region

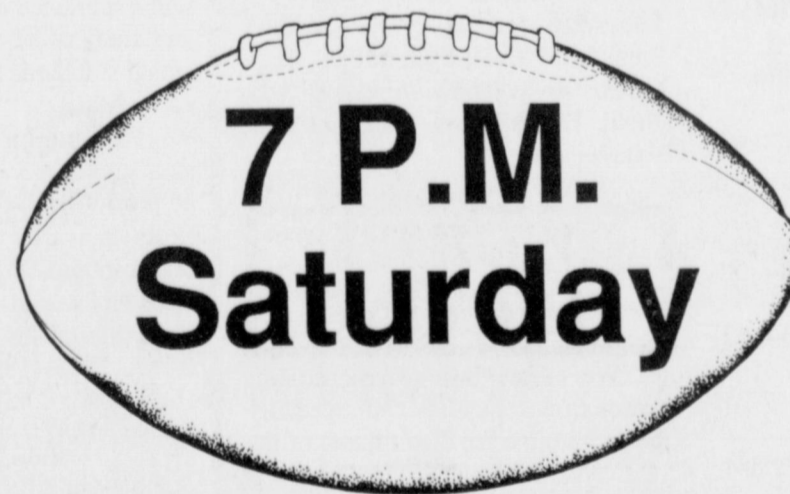
Iowa Park High School Band Director Greg Miller will accompany three musicians to the Regional Band Clinic and Concert Saturday in San Angelo.

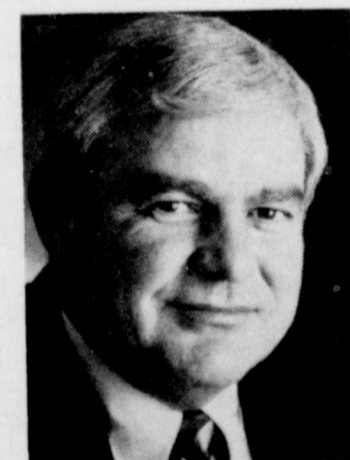

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As I See It...

If you didn't get out on the streets and highways during the big winter storm, you really missed something.

You missed seeing one of the biggest collections of idiots ever on public display.

And every one of them was sitting behind the wheel driving a vehicle.

Now, one doesn't have to be an expert to drive on road conditions as we had them. But some common sense is a big help.

First and foremost, drivers of four-wheel-drive vehicles apparently believe they can go anywhere, at any speed they wish, because that danged thing was made for such conditions.

True, they can get untracked from a standing start with little or no problem and, true, they probably have a little better handle on control.

So what do they do? Man, they get out there and drive at the posted speed limits.

They apparently never thought about stopping. Four-wheel-drive has no better stopping capability on ice than a two-wheel-drive vehicle. Believe me.

The biggest kick I have each time we have ice on the streets is watching someone floorboard their gas pedals when they're apparently unable to untrack.

Power overcomes anything. If those spinning wheels don't get the vehicle moving, they just keep it up until the ice is melted underneath so they can get on pavement.

Though I didn't make any resolutions for the New Years, I made a couple during the bad weather.

One is to make a collection of ice scrapers and keep them in the trunk of my car. I wore mine out trying to chip away the ice that had locked down my windshield wipers, and couldn't find one in any local store Saturday.

The other is actually one I've been promising myself more than 30 years, but just never got around to it.

I'm going to buy myself some really warm footwear, probably these newfangled "moon boots."

I've always wanted some good, warm footwear to wear while walking the sidelines at football games late in the season. But, I just never got around to it.

And when my two pairs of boots soaked up all the water they could, all I had to wear was lowcuts. And those aren't much help when the snow is five inches deep.

I suspect most people are like me. When my feet are cold and damp, I'm about as miserable as I can get.

Oh, there's one other promise I made that relates to cold weather. I'll never wait until the day before a major winter storm hits to order wood for our fireplace. That's just too late, and I burned all we had left before the snow had melted.

After all, when you've got freezing feet from standing at your car an hour chipping away at ice on the windshield, you want to get into the house and stoke up a good, warm fire.

Iowa Park, Holliday sales tax checks up

Iowa Park and Holliday are among a host of Texas cities showing a huge increase in sales tax rebates this month.

But Bob Bullock, state comptroller, warns the increase is a fluke.

"Last year, we received a late sales tax report of about \$2.3-million from a large statewide corporation, so January 1987 allocations were seasonally smaller. That's why this year's increase appears to be so large," Bullock said.

The statewide increase is 10.6 percent.

But Iowa Park's increase is reported at 141.79 percent and Holliday's 74.99.

Bullock did not name the "large corporation," but added, "This year's increase is also due to the wider tax base enacted by the legislature and the slow but steady healing of the state's economy."

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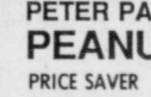
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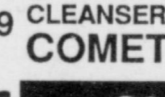
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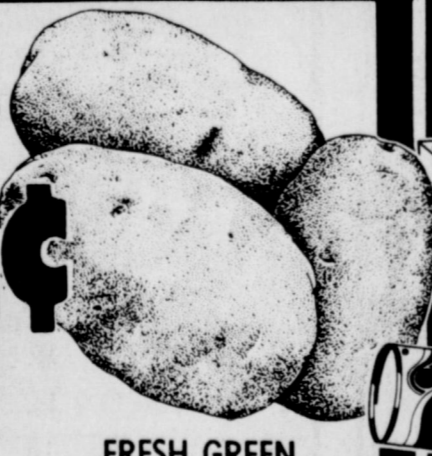

AREA OIL & GAS NEWS

Pumping 139 barrels of oil per day, the No. 3-E Chicago was completed in Wichita County's K-M-A Field by Sage Energy of Midland.

Drillsite is three miles north of Kamay.

The well was drilled to 4,178-ft. total depth and will produce from perforations in the Ellenburger Formation, 4,088 to 4,151 feet into the wellbore. The well also made 129 barrels of water per day.

The location is in a 95-acre lease in the Robert Moses Survey, A-246. Drillsite is 430 feet from the north line and 330 feet from the east line of the lease.

Two new producers have been brought on line in the Wichita Regular Field, with Atapco of Midland as the operator.

Located two miles southeast of Clara, the wells are designated as the No. 32-A H. Reilly and the No. 36-A W. W. Viles. The Reilly well is in a 2,100-acre lease in the L.C. Dennison Survey, A-55, while the Viles is in a 171-acre lease in the J. Waldschmidt Survey, A-570.

The Reilly well pumped 40 barrels of oil per day from perforations in the Gunsight Sand Formation at 1,627 to 1,636 feet into the wellbore. Total drilling depth was 1,720 feet.

The Viles well pumped 50 barrels of oil daily from perforations in the Upper Gunsight Formation at 1,528 to 1,535 feet into the hole. It bottomed at 1,750 feet.

The Reilly well is located 875 feet from the south line and approximately 1,500 feet east from the southwest corner of the lease.

The Viles is located 1,250 feet from the most southerly south line and 150 feet from the most westerly east line of the survey.

The No. 60 S.M. Daniels has been finished by F.T. Felty of Burkburnett.

It is a developmental well in the Wichita Regular Field, four miles southeast of Burkburnett. Drillsite is in a lease in the H. Hastie Survey, A-99.

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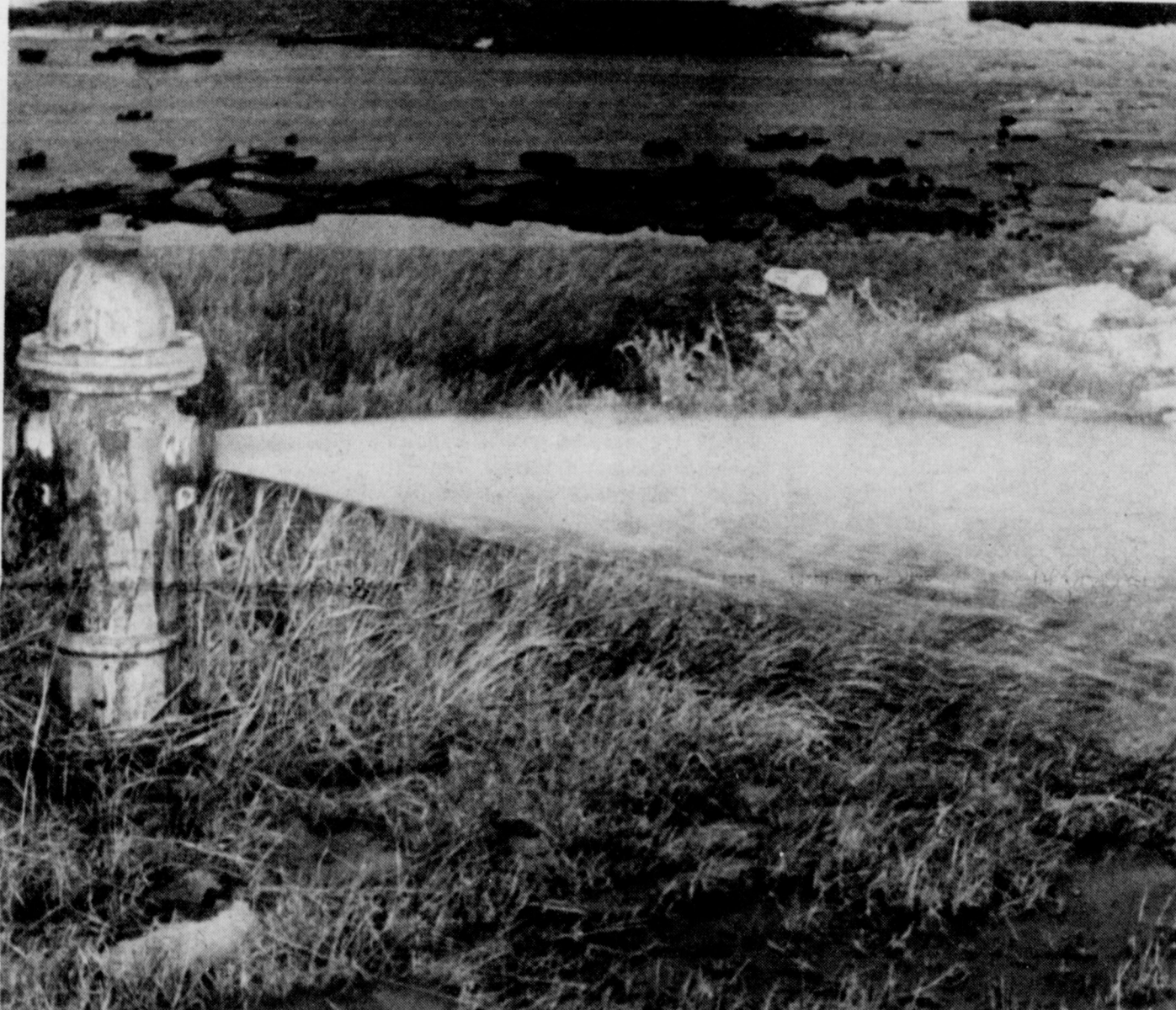

Another Springtown player, lineman Audie King, made the first defensive team.

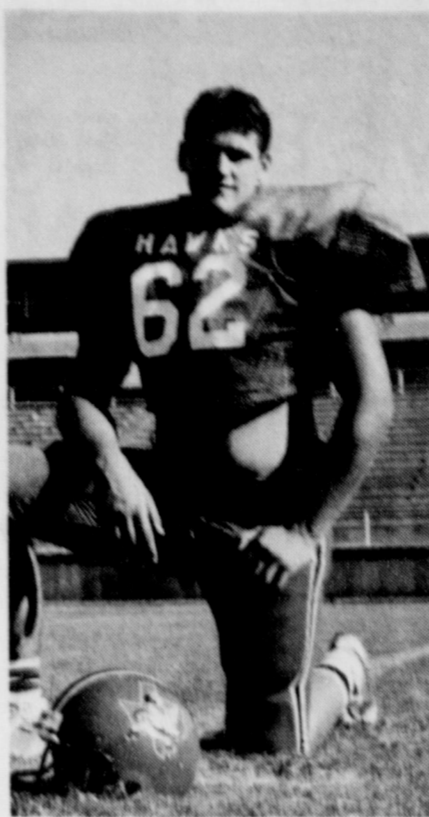

Truckers given reprieve on new regulation start

Implementation date for trucking safety regulations required by Texas House Bill 908 has been rescheduled to be effective Sept. 1, 1989 by the Department of Public Safety, according to Director Leo Gossett.

The 1984 federal motor safety act requires that all states be in substantial compliance with federal interstate trucking regulations by October of that year.

"Due to the large number of commercial drivers affected by these new regulations and the economic impact on the transportation industry in Texas, I have decided to delay the starting date of the regulations," said Col. Gossett.

The rules required by HB 908 are similar to federal interstate trucking regulations. However, the rules will affect commercial drivers and trucks driven between destinations inside Texas.

Driver hours, log books, mandated medical examinations and safety

equipment will be affected by the regulations.

"Our license and weight troopers have been conducting programs to explain the rules and respond to questions from Texas commercial drivers about the new regulations," Gossett said.

"However, these changes are substantial and more time will be required to be sure all are aware of and comply with the changes," he added.

Gossett also said the DPS has been contacted by a large number of Texas legislators regarding the adverse impact of the regulation changes which are coming at a time when Texans are working hard to turn around an economic downturn.

Making NEWS

Everyone likes to read about his special interest, group or team in the community newspaper. You may be planning a benefit or other social event that needs the support of your local newspaper. Perhaps you would like to express your views or respond to the views of others.

This guide will give you the basics of dealing with your local editor, so that you can "get your story out" in the fastest, simplest way. It is a guide that will answer your basic questions about how news makes it to print, how to contact your newspaper and how to present your story. We offer this guide in the interest of working together to keep the community informed.

WRITING

Use your simplest English. Never use fancy wording or terms that only a member of your club would understand. Watch the newspaper to learn its style. Most important, be honest, impartial, accurate and brief. Never use a quote unless it is direct and accurate, and always identify your sources.

Remember that there can be different writing styles for different parts of the newspaper. Use "I" only in letters to the editor or opinion columns. Give more description in feature stories. Keep your news writing to the point, with the most interesting and important information first.

PICTURES

Editors are always seeking good picture opportunities. If you think your story merits a photo, talk to the editor about it. If a newspaper photographer cannot make it to your event, take one yourself and include it with your story or release.

Always try for action, rather than posed, pictures. If little Jane Doe, for example, has been presented an award for volunteering at the local hospital, a picture of Jane at work is much better than one of the mayor presenting her with an award. Write the outline, or description, of the photo on a separate piece of paper rather than the back of the photo, and list names left to right.

THE OPINION PAGE

When you write letters to the editor, always include your name, address, affiliation (if any), and phone number. As a matter of accountability, and to protect the newspaper from irresponsible letter writers, newspapers rarely publish a letter without this information. If you have an opinion, remember that the opinion or editorial page is considered the property of the public; it's your page, so feel free to use it. Editors appreciate receiving your views for this page.

WHAT'S NEWS?

Editors choose their news according to the importance of an event to their communities. A fire, a crime, or an accident is important—but so is the award your club gave last week. Club elections, new projects, unusual actions, social events, milestones, athletic events, benefits that need public support, and member participation in local, national or world events are all of interest to your community newspaper editor.

PUBLICITY BASICS

Only one person from your organization should be in touch with the newspaper.

It is often said there are three rules of journalism: accuracy, accuracy, and accuracy. Write everything down, check the spelling of names and never trust your memory.

Get your story to the newspaper as soon as possible. Know the newspaper's deadlines. Whenever possible, let the newspaper know about an event before it takes place.

Use creativity. If you have an idea for a feature story, suggest it. Newspaper editors appreciate fresh ideas.

Never try to obtain publicity by pressure of friendship or business connections.

PACKAGING

Your newspaper sees a constant barrage of paper. You're already one step ahead if your news release or story is obviously local. However, remember that the typical editor must make quick decisions regarding newsworthiness. As a newspaper reader you know that your reading decisions are based first on the headline, and then on the first paragraph of the news item.

Give the most important information first. Be sure to give the "who, what, when, where and how" of the story right away. Background material should come last.

Include the name of the contact, the group, and a phone number at the top of the page for quick reference.

When submitting a story to your local newspaper, type it double-spaced on one side of 8½-by-11-inch paper. Start about one-third of the way down the paper on the first page and leave ample margins. Number your pages. When you're done, type this symbol: # # #

DEADLINES

Pre-planned events should always reach the editor's desk well before the last-minute rush. Learn your newspaper's deadlines, and keep as far ahead of them as possible. It is always best to stop by or call the newspaper office after the last issue has been published, rather than just before the presses roll. Remember that there will be times when an editor or reporter is simply too close to deadline to talk to you.

MAKING NEWS

Chances are, if you follow deadlines, concentrate on accuracy and maintain a good relationship with your editor, your organization will make the news and your information will make it out to the community.
