Vernon, Boyd join **Iowa Park in 6-AAA**

There were only a couple of changes in Dist. 6-AAA for the next two years announced yesterday afternoon by the University Interscholastic League in Austin.

Iowa Park will remain in the district along with Bowie, Bridgeport and Decatur, but will be joined by Vernon and Boyd.

Boyd moved up from Class AA, while Vernon, a former member of

the district with Iowa Park, moved down from Class AAAA.

Breckenridge has been moved to Dist. 7-AAA, the conference with Abilene Wylie and Ballinger. Going with the Bucks will be Graham.

The realignment had been a closely-guarded secret by the UIL and was not made known to anyone until 3:15 p.m. Wednesday.

Schools will have two weeks in which to file either protests or request changes with the UIL, and no school is permitted to sign a contract with another Texas school for any

UIL event until Feb. 25.

After that time, the districts are established for a two-year period.

The maximum and minimum enrollment figures used to determine Class AAA membership were changed from the previous biennium.

Schools with enrollments ranging from 300 to 749 were placed in AAA. The previous year enrollment was 285-714.

Information of the realignment was phoned to the Leader by Supt. Glen Mitchell, who was in Austin attending a state-wide meeting of school administrators.

Lights to be bought for city hall park

The city's commitment to improve city hall park was continued in Monday's council meeting, when a proposal to advertise for lighting fixtures was approved.

Seven fixtures, including two on towers and the other ground-level, are estimated to cost \$8,000.

In other business, aldermen passed four amendments to building code ordinances and increased the city's monthly contribution to the fire department, but took no action on a proposal to make one-way streets of the roadways by Bradford Elementary.

A major part of the money to pay for the park lights came unexpectedly, Administrator James Barrington told the council.

Barrington said the lights may, or may not, cost as much as has been estimated.

Because of a loophole in the city ordinances concerning inspections, contractors have seldom called for a final inspection by the city after construction is completed.

"...No person shall lath, seal or in any manner conceal any construction until such person has been informed that such has been approved by the building inspector," has been added onto the ordinances concerning construction.

In all cases, the contractor is responsible.

Aldermen were offered a proposal to continue contributing \$500 monthly to the Iowa Park Volunteer Fire Department, but change the funds to which it is made.

MSU prof challenges Chamber

Iowa Parkans were challenged to "care, share and be daring," by Dr. Arthur Beyer when the Midwestern State Univ. professor spoke Saturday night at the annual Chamber of Commerce banquet.

Recipients of the Chamber's annual awards were Dr. Erwin Soell, "Outstanding Citizen of the Year." Mrs. Ida Mae Lehman, "Outstanding Senior Citizen," Jim Gotcher, "Outstanding Educator," and Denny Mc-Carthy, "Outstanding Agriculturist."

Additionally, State National Bank was presented the second annual "Outstanding Business Award."

Dr. Beyer, keynote speaker of the evening, told the audience, "If you will care, share and be daring, you will have a good future in this wonderful city....because it will be in good hands."

He spoke of the relationship between Iowa Park and Midwestern State, pointing out 346 Iowa Park High School students have graduated the university, and read a list of more than two dozen Iowa Parkans who are either members of the MSU faculty or employed at the institution.

With the knowledge of support for football played by student athletes here, he quipped that residents should be interested and support the resurrection of football at MSU.

game in 34 years," he said.

Robert Palmer, president of the Chamber, served as master of ceremonies.

He pointed out the banquet was the first in a long series of observances of Iowa Park's centennial, noting the official logo on a poster above the head table and placemats on the tables with historic photographs.

Palmer also recognized a long list of county and state elected officials who were in attendance.

Entertainment was provided by Dave Bridgers, who played the piano during those attended ate their steaks prepared by the Iowa Park Mule-Skinners, and the Show Choir from Iowa Park High.

H.M. Nipper needed a lot of time to list the highlights of service performed by Dr. Soell, prior to announcing the recipient's name.

The former Air Force officer who moved here in 1960 has served in such capacities as mayor, president of the Chamber and continues to serve on the board of directors. member and president of Nortex Regional Planning Commission and a long-time director of the Industrial Development Commission.

He was a soloist and later director of the choir at Trinity Lutheran Church in Wichita Falls, and a member of Wichita County Farm Bureau.

He was a major force in obtaining the land for the present post office, as well as attracting two major firms here, Cryovac and Wal-Mart.

A former member of the Lions Club, he has served as president of the local Rotary Club and is always out mornings and evenings on holidays as he works on the Rotary project of displaying the American flag.

Professionally, he is a partner in Park Clinic, and is a past president and state delegate for the Wichita County Medical Society.

Mrs. Lehman's award was presented by Bob Hamilton, who said her 78 years had been devoted to rais-

ing her family, serving others as a volunteer and through her church.

The widow of the late Rex Lehman retired after 20 years employment at Wichita General Hospital, but continues serving others through her nursing home ministry and visiting shut-ins.

She was a 4-H Club leader 23 years, and was recognized by Texas A&M Univ. for her work in 1973. She also was recognized in 1964 by the Altrusa Club as the Outstanding Citizen of Wichita County.

Mrs. Lehman, a member of the Church of Christ, has been involved in the past in the Parent-Teacher Association, American Red Cross and March of Dimes, to name a few.

She is presently a teacher for World Bible Schools as a correspondence instructor with approximately 30 students throughout the world, mostly in foreign countries.

George Collins, who made the Outstanding Educator award plaque presentation to Gotcher, said his close friend was the most innovative educator he knew.

Gotcher, who was a teaching assistant at MSU at the age of 20, holds two bachelors degrees from that institution, political science and education. He also earned his masters' in political science, and has begun work during the summers on his master's in education.

A member of Iowa Park High School faculty since 1975, he has taught evening classes 11 years at Vernon Regional Junior College, and for the past three years on evenings when not instructing VRJC students, he has taught for Wayland Baptist Univ.

Gotcher, who holds teaching certificates in political science, history and economics, wrote the IPHS social studies teaching manuals in government, economics, American history and geography.

McCarthy, according to longtime friend Barry Mahler, who presented the Outstanding Agriculturist

He refused to turn in his badge to Chief Alan Sheffield, who was in the room, but instead tossed it onto the desk in front of Administrator James Barrington, and walked out.





Mrs. John Rentschler discussed "The Aging of America" giving statistics to show that the number of people over 60 in America was increasing annually. Concentrating on the over 60 population in Texas, she said that the projection for 1990 was more than 2.4-million, and more than three-milliion by the turn of the century.

Mmes. C.L. Metz, Riley Thompson, D.O. James and Howard Marlar gave topics to show how the elderly can be protected from abuse, neglect and exploitation by educating them to avoid swindles, credit card scams, pigeon drops and bank examiner schemes. Their discussions showed that elder abuse has risen 150 percent since 1983, with 110,000 incidents occurring each year, with many others going unreported.

In stressing the importance of reporting elder abuse cases, they said it is not only a moral and legal responsibility to report but it is required by law.

Cook of the Week

January is candy month and it is fitting that Barbara (Mrs. Cletys) Stiles shares two candy recipes with the Leader readers the last week in January 1988. One recipe is for divinity candy and the other is for cinnamon candy.

Cinnamon is one of the most popular spices today and it has been for many years. About 2700 B.C., the Emperor Shen Nung made in a treaty the first known reference to cinnamon.

Gourmets support the fact that cinnamon is a native of Ceylon. The Dutch East India Company grew rich on spices, and the most profitable one was cinnamon. The Dutch inaugurated the cultivation of the spice in the eighteenth century. The cinnamon trees which they established are still proudly displayed to tourists. If they arrive by sea, they can smell the frangrance several miles before they make landfall.

The rich, velvety flavor of the spice gives it an important place among the world's seasonings in such familiar dishes as English Apple Pie, American Cinnamon Buns, Danish pastry, and more exotic dishes like South African milk soup, Indian curries, and Chinese five-spice powder.

The two Western countries which remain most devoted to the spice are England and Spain. The latter puts it in chocolate and cocoa and into almost limitless number of dishes.

Mrs. Stiles was graduated from Empire High School near Duncan, Okla. She and Cletys moved to Iowa Park from Irving 11 years ago and bought what is now Country View Mobile Home Park east of the city and operated it one year. He has been employed at Cryovac 10 years. CINNAMON CANDY

- Powdered sugar 1 1/2 cups light Karo corn syrup
- 1 cup water
- 3 3/4 cups sugar
- Red food coloring

1 tsp. Lorann brand cinnamon flavoring (liquid) Sprinkle a 24-inch piece of

heavy duty aluminum foil with powdered sugar.

Mix syrup, water and sugar in large heavy saucepan. Stir over medium heat until sugar dissolves. Boil without stirring until temperature reaches 310 degrees or until drops of sugar form hard and brittle threads in cold water. Remove from heat. Carefully add flavoring and coloring and stir. Pour mixture onto foil. Allow mixture to cool and then break into pieces and store in airtight containers. Makes about 2 1/4 pounds.

PISTACHIO PUDDING SALAD

1-3 3/4 ounce box Pistachio Instant Pie and Pudding Filling 1-20 ounce can crushed pineapple 1 medium carton Cool Whip 1/2 to 1 cup chopped pecans

Mix the pudding and the pineapple. Do not add liquid and do not drain the pineapple. Add Cool Whip and pecans. Add whole pecans on top, if desired. Quick and easy dessert. Chill before serving.

1 small can English peas 1 small jar pimientos 1 chopped onion and green onion 1 chopped green pepper In large bowl, combine above ingredients. Drain and set aside.




2 1/2 cups sugar 1/2 cup light corn syrup 1/4 tsp. salt 1/2 cup water 2 egg whites (room temperature) 1 tsp. vanilla 1 cup chopped pecans

Make on a sunny day. If it is cloudy, you can use a bright light over the egg whites.

Mix sugar, syrup and water in saucepan. Stir and cook until sugar dissolves and mixture comes to boiling, using medium high heat. Do not stir as you let mixture come to hard ball.

Note: "I use a candy thermometer and when temperature is about 2 marks from the hard ball stage. beat the egg whites to very stiff peaks. If necessary, you can set the syrup aside while you finish beating the eggs, then reheat it to hard ball stage."

Pour the syrup over the egg whites and beat as long as you can with the mixer or until mixture begins to lose its gloss. Add vanilla and pecans and stir. Spoon out onto wax paper. If mixture is hard to lose its gloss set it in a pan of cold water and stir it. Add more chopped pecans or whole pecans, if preferred.

The Federal Trade Commission (FTC) estimates that American consumers lose \$1-billion a year from the deceptive peddling of goods and services over the telephone.

The National Association of Attorneys General (HAAG), the FTC and others are taking steps to battle telemarketing fraud.

Southwestern Bell Telephone Company is also concerned about the issue. They would like to pass along some information that can help you handle telephone sales calls and protect yourself from possible fraudulent calls.

The telephone company has no control over who uses the telephone, but you have the choice of talking with the person or simply telling them, "Sorry, I'm not interested."

As you receive telephone sales calls remember this simple rule: "If it sounds too good to be true, it probably is."

The great majority of companies involved in telemarketing are reputable firms which use the telephone to sell quality goods and services. However, there are companies which are involved in telemarketing fraud.

According to the FTC and NAAG, telemarketing fraud is the use of telephone communications to fraudulently promote goods or services.

Fraudulent sales callers use phony prizes, cheap products and high-pressure sales tactics to defraud Americans.

Telephone hustlers attempt to sell goods and services such as investments in oil and gas leases, rare coins, gemstones, "free" vacations and substandard office supplies.



4. If you don't want to get another call from that company, ask the person to take your name off their list.
