## Vernon, Boyd join Iowa Park in 6-AAA

There were only a couple of changes in Dist. 6-AAA for the next two years announced yesterday afternoon by the University Interscholastic League in Austin.

Iowa Park will remain in the district along with Bowie, Bridgeport and Decatur, but will be joined by Vernon and Boyd.

Boyd moved up from Class AA, while Vernon, a former member of

the district with Iowa Park, moved down from Class AAAA.

Breckenridge has been moved to Dist. 7-AAA, the conference with Abilene Wylie and Ballinger. Going with the Bucks will be Graham.

The realignment had been a closely-guarded secret by the UIL and was not made known to anyone until 3:15 p.m. Wednesday.

Schools will have two weeks in which to file either protests or request changes with the UIL, and no school is permitted to sign a contract with another Texas school for any

UIL event until Feb. 25.

After that time, the districts are established for a two-year period.

The maximum and minimum enrollment figures used to determine Class AAA membership were changed from the previous biennium.

Schools with enrollments ranging from 300 to 749 were placed in AAA. The previous year enrollment was 285-714.

Information of the realignment was phoned to the Leader by Supt. Glen Mitchell, who was in Austin attending a state-wide meeting of school administrators.

## Lights to be bought for city hall park

The city's commitment to improve city hall park was continued in Monday's council meeting, when a proposal to advertise for lighting fixtures was approved.

Seven fixtures, including two on towers and the other ground-level, are estimated to cost \$8,000.

In other business, aldermen passed four amendments to building code ordinances and increased the city's monthly contribution to the fire department, but took no action on a proposal to make one-way streets of the roadways by Bradford Elementary.

A major part of the money to pay for the park lights came unexpectedly, Administrator James Barrington told the council.

Jim Haddox, an intern working

in city hall, retrieved \$5,000 from the state comptroller's office no one knew about, but which belonged to Iowa Park. The check was received last week.

Barrington said the lights may, or may not, cost as much as has been estimated.

Because of a loophole in the city ordinances concerning inspections, contractors have seldom called for a final inspection by the city after construction is completed.

"...No person shall lath, seal or in any manner conceal any construction until such person has been informed that such has been approved by the building inspector," has been added onto the ordinances concerning construction.

In all cases, the contractor is responsible.

Aldermen were offered a proposal to continue contributing \$500 monthly to the Iowa Park Volunteer Fire Department, but change the funds to which it is made.

Presently, \$200 is put into the department's retirement fund, and

## MSU prof challenges Chamber

Iowa Parkans were challenged to "care, share and be daring," by Dr. Arthur Beyer when the Midwestern State Univ. professor spoke Saturday night at the annual Chamber of Commerce banquet.

Recipients of the Chamber's annual awards were Dr. Erwin Soell, "Outstanding Citizen of the Year," Mrs. Ida Mae Lehman, "Outstanding Senior Citizen," Jim Gotcher, "Outstanding Educator," and Denny McCarthy, "Outstanding Agriculturist."

Additionally, State National Bank was presented the second annual "Outstanding Business Award."

Dr. Beyer, keynote speaker of the evening, told the audience, "If you will care, share and be daring, you will have a good future in this wonderful city...because it will be in good hands."

He spoke of the relationship between Iowa Park and Midwestern State, pointing out 346 Iowa Park High School students have graduated the university, and read a list of more than two dozen Iowa Parkans who are either members of the MSU faculty or employed at the institution.

With the knowledge of support for football played by student athletes here, he quipped that residents should be interested and support the resurrection of football at MSU.

"Be sure to put MSU football on your list. After all, we haven't lost a

game in 34 years," he said.

Robert Palmer, president of the Chamber, served as master of ceremonies.

He pointed out the banquet was the first in a long series of observances of Iowa Park's centennial, noting the official logo on a poster above the head table and placemats on the tables with historic photographs.

Palmer also recognized a long list of county and state elected officials who were in attendance.

Entertainment was provided by Dave Bridgers, who played the piano during those attended ate their steaks prepared by the Iowa Park Mule-Skinners, and the Show Choir from Iowa Park High.

H.M. Nipper needed a lot of time to list the highlights of service performed by Dr. Soell, prior to announcing the recipient's name.

The former Air Force officer who moved here in 1960 has served in such capacities as mayor, president of the Chamber and continues to serve on the board of directors, member and president of Nortex Regional Planning Commission and a long-time director of the Industrial Development Commission.

He was a soloist and later director of the choir at Trinity Lutheran Church in Wichita Falls, and a member of Wichita County Farm Bureau.

He was a major force in obtaining the land for the present post office, as well as attracting two major firms here, Cryovac and Wal-Mart.

A former member of the Lions Club, he has served as president of the local Rotary Club and is always out mornings and evenings on holidays as he works on the Rotary project of displaying the American flag.

Professionally, he is a partner in Park Clinic, and is a past president and state delegate for the Wichita County Medical Society.

Mrs. Lehman's award was presented by Bob Hamilton, who said her 78 years had been devoted to rais-

ing her family, serving others as a volunteer and through her church.

The widow of the late Rex Lehman retired after 20 years employment at Wichita General Hospital, but continues serving others through her nursing home ministry and visiting shut-ins.

She was a 4-H Club leader 23 years, and was recognized by Texas A&M Univ. for her work in 1973. She also was recognized in 1964 by the Altrusa Club as the Outstanding Citizen of Wichita County.

Mrs. Lehman, a member of the Church of Christ, has been involved in the past in the Parent-Teacher Association, American Red Cross and March of Dimes, to name a few.

She is presently a teacher for World Bible Schools as a correspondence instructor with approximately 30 students throughout the world, mostly in foreign countries.

George Collins, who made the Outstanding Educator award plaque presentation to Gotcher, said his close friend was the most innovative educator he knew.

Gotcher, who was a teaching assistant at MSU at the age of 20, holds two bachelor's degrees from that institution, political science and education. He also earned his masters' in political science, and has begun work during the summers on his master's in education.

A member of Iowa Park High School faculty since 1975, he has taught evening classes 11 years at Vernon Regional Junior College, and for the past three years on evenings when not instructing VRJC students, he has taught for Wayland Baptist Univ.

Gotcher, who holds teaching certificates in political science, history and economics, wrote the IPHS social studies teaching manuals in government, economics, American history and geography.

McCarthy, according to long-time friend Barry Mahler, who presented the Outstanding Agriculturist

award, is known for his outstanding cattle, as well as his service to the community.

He is a charter member of the Wichita County Young Farmers, which sponsors both the Iowa Park 4-H and FFA Stock Show as well as the Wichita County Livestock Show, and is the 1988-89 president of the Iowa Park Booster Club.

Stanley Williamson, chairman of the board of directors at State National Bank, accepted the Outstanding Business Award. Cryovac was the initial recipient of the honor in 1987.

## Robber shoots Iowa Park man

An Iowa Park man, James Nicholson, was shot in the mouth Tuesday night when an armed robber held up his business, Nicholson's Country Store, in Wichita Falls.

Another man sustained superficial wounds in his shoulder in an armed robbery at K&C Oil Co. by the same man just 25 minutes earlier. A .22-caliber semi-automatic pistol was used in both incidences and no money was taken from either.

According to a source at the Wichita Falls Police Department, the assailant demanded money from Nicholson, then shot him without giving him time to respond.

Nicholson, who was employed at Scobee's Mini Mart in Iowa Park 8 years, was listed in fair condition at the Wichita General Hospital Wednesday afternoon.

There is a suspect in both cases. Police are looking for a black man who was wearing a dark jogging suit at the time of the robberies.

## Police officer turns in badge

Sgt. Tommy Adams, the senior member of the Iowa Park Police Department, submitted his resignation Monday night, following the regular meeting of the city council.

Adams, who has been on the department six years, told the council he was resigning immediately, but did not give any reasons, saying only that he could no longer "serve with pride."

He refused to turn in his badge to Chief Alan Sheffield, who was in the room, but instead tossed it onto the desk in front of Administrator James Barrington, and walked out.

# Abuse of the elderly a 'growing problem'

"Stop Elder Abuse," the special project of Carol Silvas, president of the Texas Federation of Women's Clubs, dominated the theme and topics Thursday afternoon in the program presented for the 23 Study Club in a meeting held at the First Presbyterian Church. Mrs. John Mollett and Miss Frances Park were the hostesses.

Mrs. C.E. Birk, program leader, set the mood for the program by stating that the incidence of elder abuse in the county is a "national disgrace," and that the abuse of older Texans is a serious and growing problem.

Mrs. Homer Blalock gave an introductory reading, "Did She Die or Was She Killed?," a story of an 83-year old woman who lost her "nest egg" savings by cooperating with one who claimed to be a bank examiner. She died two months later, diagnosis: heart failure.

Mrs. E.F. Soell discussed "What the Law Says," stating that the 68th

Texas Legislature passed a law authorizing protection for the elderly and disabled through the Texas Department of Human Resources. She encouraged people who know of someone who is being abused, neglected or exploited to report it to the nearest DHS office or call the toll Adult Abuse Hotline number.

Mrs. John Rentschler discussed "The Aging of America" giving statistics to show that the number of people over 60 in America was increasing annually. Concentrating on the over 60 population in Texas, she said that the projection for 1990 was more than 2.4-million, and more than three-million by the turn of the century.

Mmes. C.L. Metz, Riley Thompson, D.O. James and Howard Marlar gave topics to show how the elderly can be protected from abuse, neglect and exploitation by educating them to avoid swindles, credit card scams, pigeon drops and bank examiner schemes. Their discussions showed that elder abuse has risen 150 percent since 1983, with 110,000 incidents occurring each year, with many others going unreported.

In stressing the importance of reporting elder abuse cases, they said it is not only a moral and legal responsibility to report but it is required by law.

Mrs. Joe Singer was in charge of the business which was highlighted by the election of officers for 1988-1990. The slate included Mmes. China B. Smith, president; E.F. Soell, vice president; R.M. Thompson, secretary; Lowell Short, corresponding secretary; Frances Park, treasurer.

# Cook of the Week

January is candy month and it is fitting that Barbara (Mrs. Cletys) Stiles shares two candy recipes with the Leader readers the last week in January 1988. One recipe is for divinity candy and the other is for cinnamon candy.

Cinnamon is one of the most popular spices today and it has been for many years. About 2700 B.C., the Emperor Shen Nung made in a treaty the first known reference to cinnamon.

Gourmets support the fact that cinnamon is a native of Ceylon. The Dutch East India Company grew rich on spices, and the most profitable one was cinnamon. The Dutch inaugurated the cultivation of the spice in the eighteenth century. The cinnamon trees which they established are still proudly displayed to tourists. If they arrive by sea, they can smell the fragrance several miles before they make landfall.

The rich, velvety flavor of the spice gives it an important place among the world's seasonings in such familiar dishes as English Apple Pie, American Cinnamon Buns, Danish pastry, and more exotic dishes like South African milk soup, Indian curries, and Chinese five-spice powder.

The two Western countries which remain most devoted to the spice are England and Spain. The latter puts it in chocolate and cocoa and into almost limitless number of dishes.

Mrs. Stiles was graduated from Empire High School near Duncan, Okla. She and Cletys moved to Iowa Park from Irving 11 years ago and bought what is now Country View Mobile Home Park east of the city and operated it one year. He has been employed at Cryovac 10 years. The couple has rental property here and the first of this year started Montgomery Mattress Co. with their son, Steve, in Wichita Falls where they make brand new mattresses from the springs.

Barbara worked for a time at Barbour Ins. Co. She now works for the mattress business when she is needed. She is a member of First Baptist Church. She has a fascinating hobby of collecting key chains, and she also likes to sew and read.

In addition to Steve, the Stiles have a daughter, Connie Honea, of Iowa Park.

### CINNAMON CANDY

Powdered sugar  
1 1/2 cups light Karo corn syrup  
1 cup water  
3 3/4 cups sugar  
Red food coloring  
1 tsp. Lorann brand cinnamon flavoring (liquid)

Sprinkle a 24-inch piece of heavy duty aluminum foil with powdered sugar.

Mix syrup, water and sugar in large heavy saucepan. Stir over medium heat until sugar dissolves. Boil without stirring until temperature reaches 310 degrees or until drops of sugar form hard and brittle threads in cold water. Remove from heat. Carefully add flavoring and coloring and stir. Pour mixture onto foil. Allow mixture to cool and then break into pieces and store in airtight containers. Makes about 2 1/4 pounds.

### PISTACHIO PUDDING SALAD

1-3 3/4 ounce box Pistachio Instant Pie and Pudding Filling  
1-20 ounce can crushed pineapple  
1 medium carton Cool Whip  
1/2 to 1 cup chopped pecans

Mix the pudding and the pineapple. Do not add liquid and do not drain the pineapple. Add Cool Whip and pecans. Add whole pecans on top, if desired. Quick and easy dessert. Chill before serving.

### SHOE PEG CORN SALAD

2 cans white shoe peg corn  
1 can French-style green beans

1 small can English peas  
1 small jar pimientos  
1 chopped onion and green onion  
1 chopped green pepper

In large bowl, combine above ingredients. Drain and set aside.

### DRESSING

3/4 cup sugar  
3/4 cup vinegar  
1/2 cup vegetable oil  
1 tsp. salt  
1/2 tsp. celery seed or stalk celery

Blend all ingredients in saucepan and bring to a boil. Allow to cool. Pour over vegetables. Chill overnight or for several hours.

### STRAWBERRY AND PRETZEL SALAD

2 cups pretzels  
3/4 cup melted butter  
3 T. sugar  
1 large package strawberry jello  
2-10 oz. packages frozen strawberries  
1-8 oz. pkg. cream cheese  
1 cup sugar  
1 large container Cool Whip

Cover bottom of 13X9 pan with pretzels. Melt butter and sugar and pour over pretzels. Bake at 400 degrees 8 minutes. Cool 25 minutes. Prepare jello with 2 cups of boiling water. Add jello and refrigerate. Jello should not be firm.

Mix cream cheese with sugar. Fold in Cool Whip. Spread mixture over pretzels. Spread strawberry mixture on top and refrigerate.

### DIVINITY

2 1/2 cups sugar  
1/2 cup light corn syrup  
1/4 tsp. salt  
1/2 cup water  
2 egg whites (room temperature)  
1 tsp. vanilla  
1 cup chopped pecans

Make on a sunny day. If it is cloudy, you can use a bright light over the egg whites.

Mix sugar, syrup and water in saucepan. Stir and cook until sugar dissolves and mixture comes to boiling, using medium high heat. Do not stir as you let mixture come to hard ball.

Note: "I use a candy thermometer and when temperature is about 2 marks from the hard ball stage, beat the egg whites to very stiff peaks. If necessary, you can set the syrup aside while you finish beating the eggs, then reheat it to hard ball stage."

Pour the syrup over the egg whites and beat as long as you can with the mixer or until mixture begins to lose its gloss. Add vanilla and pecans and stir. Spoon out onto wax paper. If mixture is hard to lose its gloss set it in a pan of cold water and stir it. Add more chopped pecans or whole pecans, if preferred.

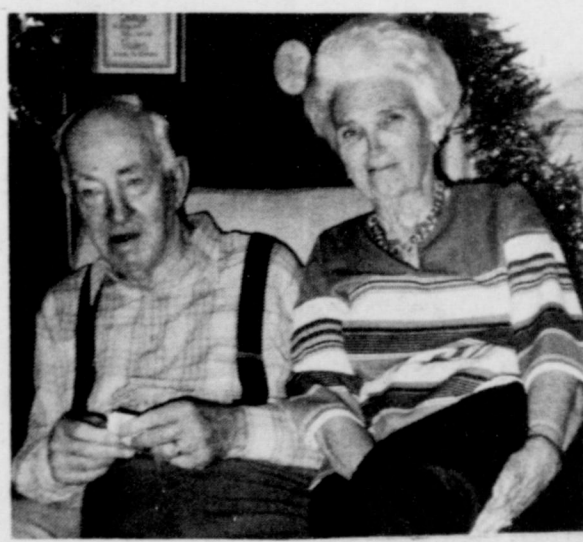

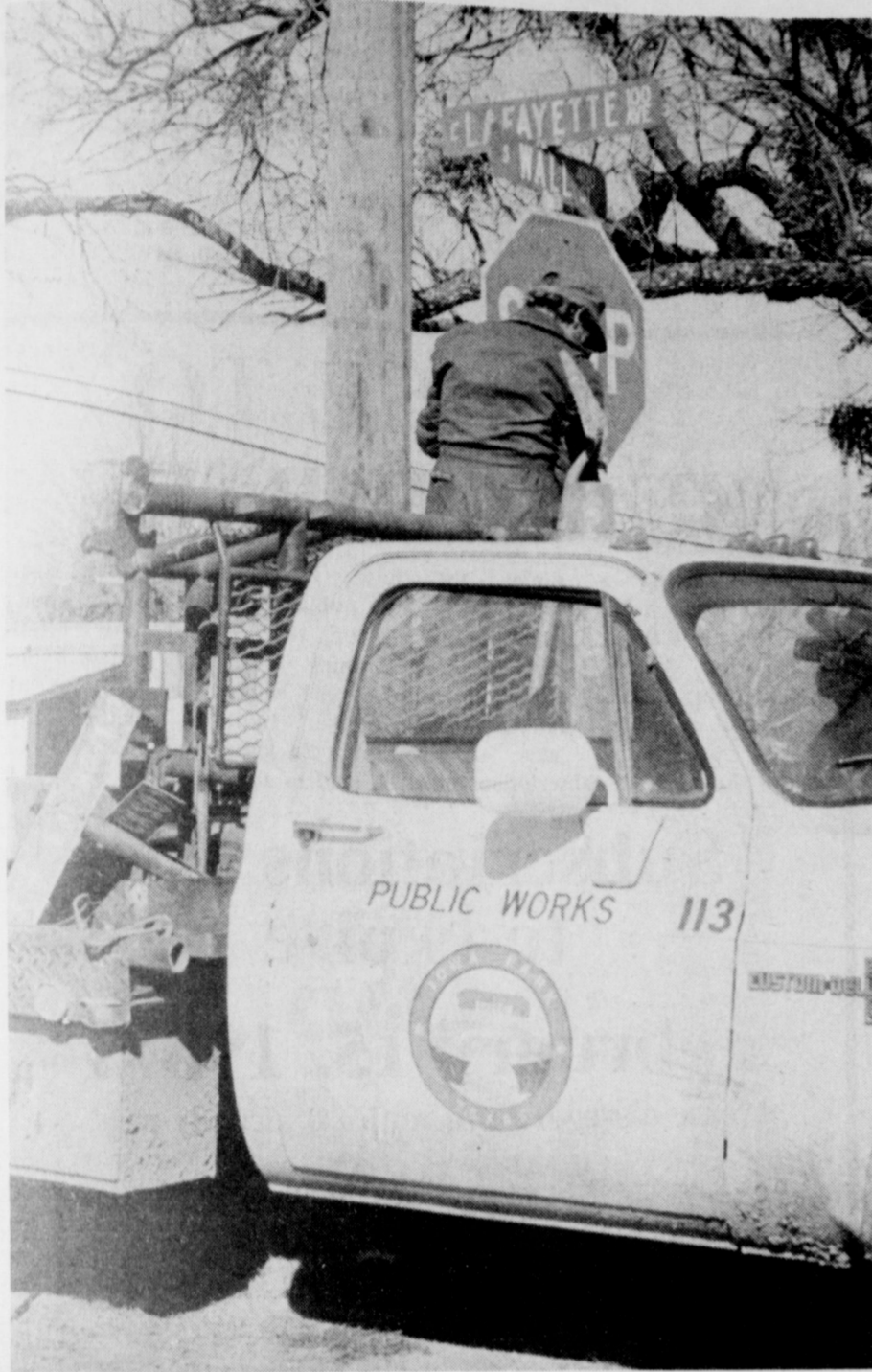

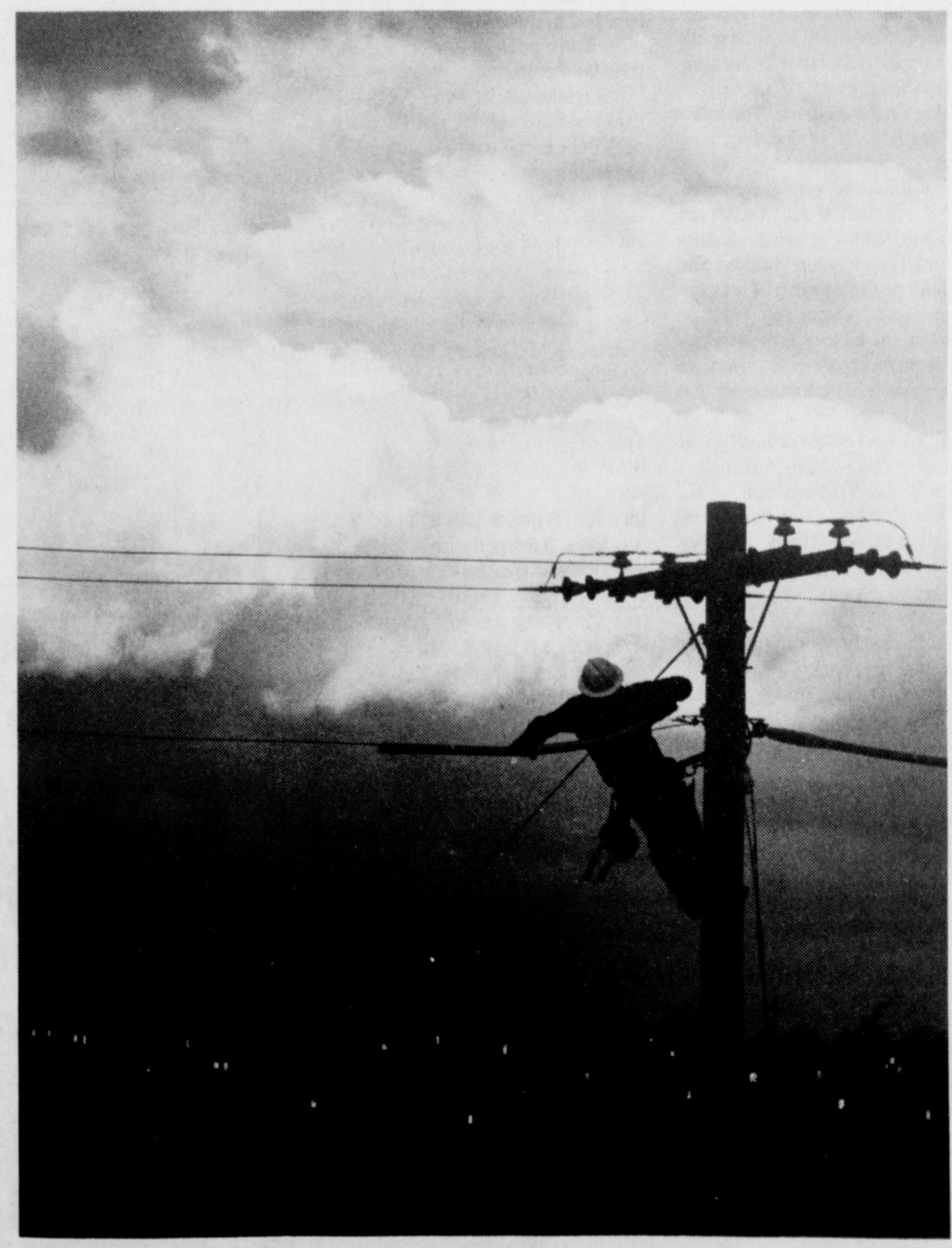

\$300 for unrestricted use, such as buying equipment.

The proposal was to switch the funds going to the two accounts.

The council indicated the unrestricted fund should not suffer, because department representatives would just have to make additional requests for funds through the year.

So aldermen voted to continue making a \$300 payment for the retirement fund, and increase the unrestricted fund amount to \$300.

Barrington told the council that school superintendent Glen Mitchell had asked that the city consider making Texowa and Diamond streets one-way during school hours, primarily because several students use the paved roads to walk to and from the campus.

During a discussion on the issue it was pointed out that work would be in progress the next several months on Wall, which would add to the confusion of drivers.

When a sidewalk was proposed, it was determined there would be a considerable expense someone would have to pay, and none of the property other than the streets in that area were even in the city limits.

# AREA OIL & GAS NEWS

Mobil Producing TX & NM has bottomed five developmental wells in the Wilbarger County Regular Field, and has called for completion tests.

The well designated as No. 180 Sumner Frances is located four miles east of Harrold, 1,854 feet from south line and 992 feet from west line in the H&TC A-346 Survey. The total depth is 2,150 feet.

Designated well No. 181 Sumner Frances has a total depth of 2,150 feet and is located four miles southeast of Harrold 2,090 feet from the west line in H&TC A346 Survey.

The No. 182 Sumner Frances is also located four miles southeast of Harrold, 2,371 feet from south line and 1,960 feet from west line in the H&TC A-346 Survey, with 2,150-ft. as its total depth.

Mobil has bottomed its No. 183 Sumner Frances at 2,150 feet and this well is located four miles southeast of Harrold, 2,550 feet from south line and 2,675 feet from west line in the H&TC A-346 Survey.

Completion of drilling operations at the No. 191 Sumner Frances shows this well to be bottomed at 2,150 feet. The well is located four miles southeast of Harrold, 2,168 feet from south line and 556 feet from the east line.

A possible production interval has been perforated at the No. 1 Wallingford in the Vernon Sharp Field, Wilbarger County, five miles east of Vernon. The well's target is pay in the Cester Formation. Elwood Co. is the operator.

An unsuccessful deeper pool wildcat has been braced as a dry hole and will be plugged and abandoned in an 80-acre lease 6.5 miles north of Quanah in the C&MRR A-552 Survey. in Hardeman County.

The well was designated as the No. 1 Tabor Unit #1, with EP Operating of Dallas as the operator. It was taken to 8,650 feet total depth with no commercial shows.

# TELEMARKETING FRAUD: How to protect yourself

The Federal Trade Commission (FTC) estimates that American consumers lose \$1-billion a year from the deceptive peddling of goods and services over the telephone.

The National Association of Attorneys General (NAAG), the FTC and others are taking steps to battle telemarketing fraud.

Southwestern Bell Telephone Company is also concerned about the issue. They would like to pass along some information that can help you handle telephone sales calls and protect yourself from possible fraudulent calls.

The telephone company has no control over who uses the telephone, but you have the choice of talking with the person or simply telling them, "Sorry, I'm not interested."

As you receive telephone sales calls remember this simple rule: "If it sounds too good to be true, it probably is."

The great majority of companies involved in telemarketing are reputable firms which use the telephone to sell quality goods and services. However, there are companies which are involved in telemarketing fraud.

According to the FTC and NAAG, telemarketing fraud is the use of telephone communications to fraudulently promote goods or services.

Fraudulent sales callers use phony prizes, cheap products and high-pressure sales tactics to defraud Americans.

Telephone hustlers attempt to sell goods and services such as investments in oil and gas leases, rare coins, gemstones, "free" vacations and substandard office supplies.

## PROTECT YOURSELF

To protect yourself or your business from telemarketing fraud, keep the following tips in mind.

Remember, however, even these tips are not a guarantee against being deceived by a fraudulent caller. These suggestions are provided by the United States Office of Consumer Affairs and the FTC.

1. Be extremely careful in giving your credit card number over the phone.

2. Be cautious if the caller says an investment, purchase or charitable donation must be made immediately. Ask that information be sent to you.

3. Ask who is in charge of the company or organization represented. Get specific names and titles.

4. Ask for the address and telephone number of the firm calling you, be extremely cautious if the caller won't provide that information.

5. Ask if it is possible to obtain the names and phone numbers of satisfied customers in your community.

6. Check with your state and local consumer protection offices and Better Business Bureau for information on the organization.

7. Be wary of offers for free merchandise or prizes. You may end up paying handling fees greater than the value of the gifts.

If you believe you have been victimized by a fraudulent telemarketer, report the facts to your State Attorney General or the Federal Trade Commission.

Many people enjoy receiving telephone calls at home offering them information about products or services that they may need or want. But the choice is yours.

When you receive a telephone sales call:

1. Find out who is calling.

2. If you think you may be interested but want to know more, you can ask the caller to mail information about the offer or charity.

3. If you are not interested, interrupt the caller and say so.

4. If you don't want to get another call from that company, ask the person to take your name off their list.

If you want to reduce the number of telephone solicitation calls you receive from national companies, put your request in writing and send it to: Telephone Preference Service, Direct Marketing Assn., 6 East 43rd Street, New York, NY 10017.

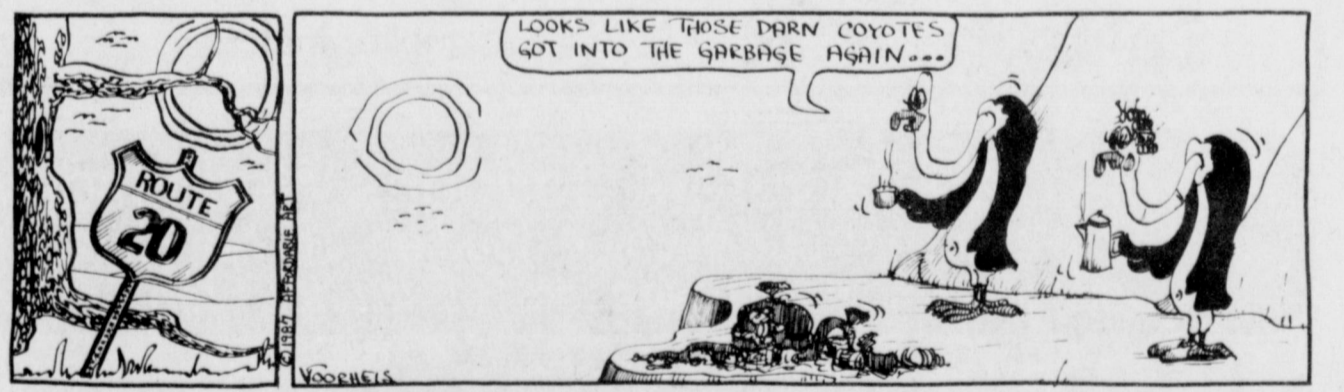
