TESCo has new name

A new corporation identity, "TU Electric," as well as a new logo, is being adopted company-wide by Texas Utilities Electric Company.

Texas Utilities Electric Company was formed in 1984 by the merger of Texas Electric Service, Dallas Power and Light, Texas Power and Light and Texas Utilities Generating Companies.

The four became divisions of the new Electric Company, retaining their historic names.

A number of functions performed by the four divisions have been consolidated, and organizational changes are continuing in order to eliminate duplication and improve efficiency.

Use of a single name for all four will help bring about further cost savings and efficiencies in serving customers, according to a TU Electric press release.

The transition to company-wide

use of the new identity and logo and the phasing out of the division names will be gradual.

In many instances, the new name and logo will be applied only when existing material and equipment is replaced. Therefore, it is expected to be a matter of years before all signs, vehicles and uniforms will be changed.

TU Electric serves more than two-million customers, or about one-third the population of Texas.

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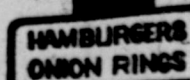
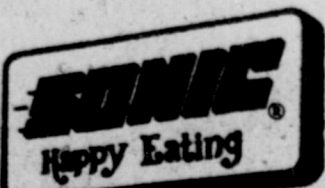

Adams All-State

Post season honors continue to be heaped on Iowa Park's Robert Adams.

In an announcement over the weekend by the Texas Sportswriters' Association, the senior was named to the first defensive and second offensive All-State teams.

The 5-10, 210 Adams was the only player from Dist. 6-AAA to be named.

But Holliday had two players on the Class AA teams.

Along with Adams were two other Hawks, David Meissner, in the defensive secondary, and guard Jimmy Kirkhart, offensive interior line-man.

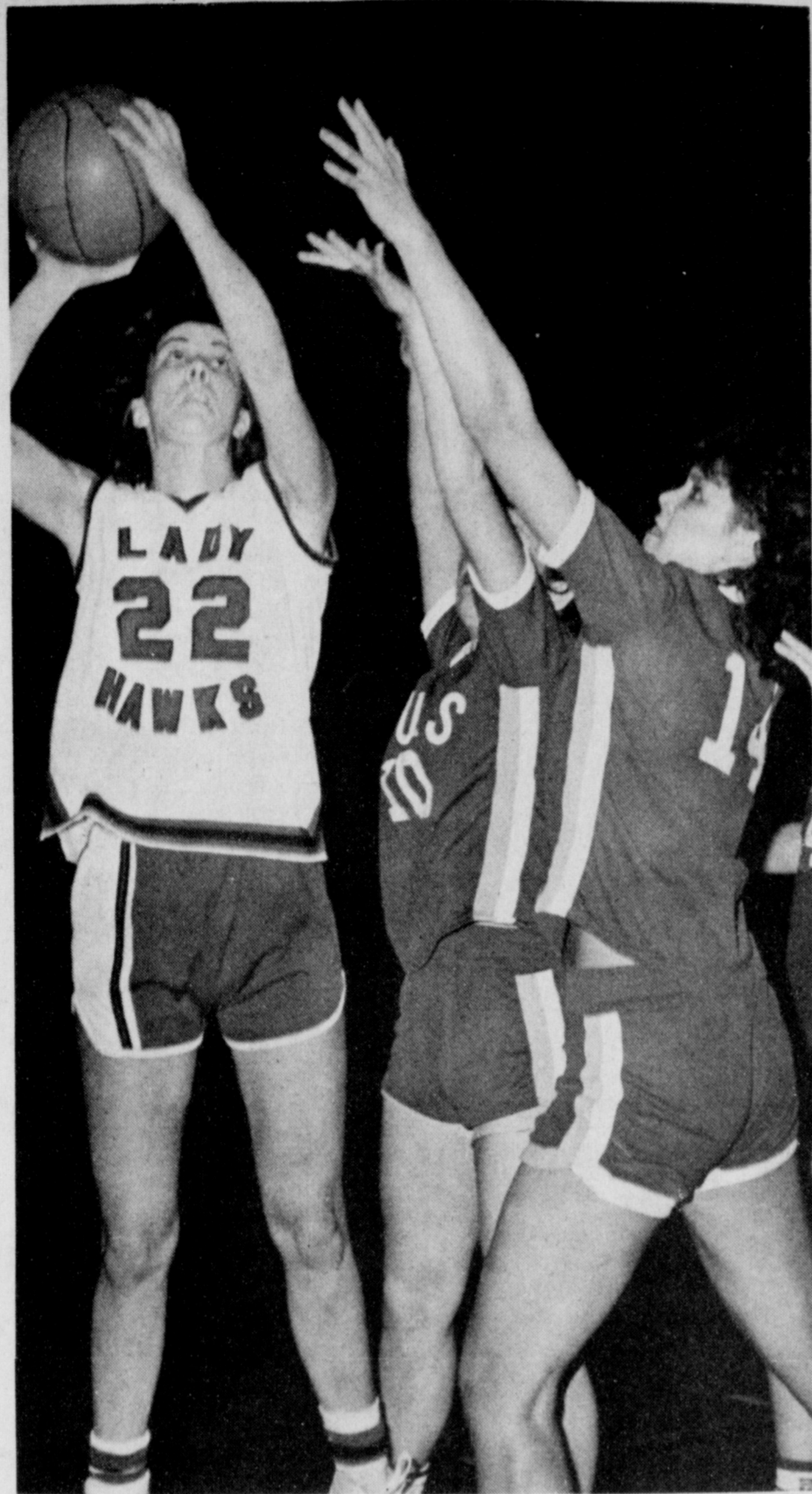
Meissner is a senior and Kirkhart a junior.

Lady Hawks post first district win Tuesday

Iowa Park now has a 1-2 Dist. 6-AAA record, and an opportunity to even it at 2-2 Friday night when the girls travel to Bridgeport.

The team will then make up the game with Jacksboro Saturday, that was postponed from last Friday due to bad weather conditions.

The Jacksboro game will finish the first half of the district schedule.

Tuesday, the Lady Hawks will begin their second half schedule by hosting Decatur, 53-39 winner in the first round.

The Breckenridge game looked like it might be a carbon copy of the

Decatur game, because Iowa Park was held to only two points in an entire quarter of play.

Iowa Park jumped to a 14-5 lead by the end of the first quarter against the Lady Bucks. But the visitors narrowed the score to only 16-11, when Lori Allen was the only local to put points on the board, thanks to a pair of charity tosses.

Iowa Park came back in the third quarter, however, and established a comfortable, 31-19 lead before entering the final frame.

Breckenridge rallied to trail by only seven points with 2:42 remaining in the game.

Allen led Iowa Park scoring with 12 points. Laurie Espinoza and Wendy Trantham each had 10.

Iowa Park now stands at 7-11 on the season.

Two each were scored by Cassi Beall, Rachael Reed, Melody Gray, Lisa Wiggins, Michelle Roberts and Kelly Grider.

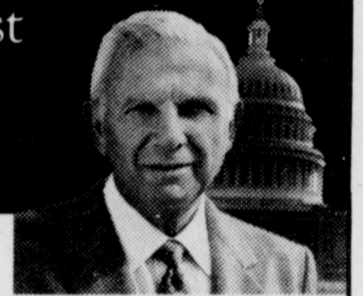
Leading the Eighth Grade's 35-22 win was Chasity Sims, who scored 15 points.

Hawks open district with win over Breck

Lack of competition since Jan. 9 apparently didn't hurt the Hawks, as Iowa Park tallied 49 points in the first half here Tuesday against Breckenridge, and went on to win their first Dist. 6-AAA game, 85-59.

Iowa Park hadn't played since the final non-conference contest against Burk Burnett, primarily because of Friday's district opener at Jacksboro being postponed by a winter storm.

But more conference action will be coming in quick order, as the Hawks will travel Friday to Bridgeport, play their makeup game with Jacksboro Saturday, and then host the state-ranked Decatur Eagles Tuesday.

Saturday's game at Jacksboro will follow the Lady Hawks' game, which is to start at 6:30 p.m.

Both the Hawks and Buckaroos were applying aggressive full court presses throughout the first half, each with a measure of success in the opening period which ended 20-15 in the Hawks' favor.

Iowa Park jumped out to a 12-3 lead, but the Bucks rallied to a brief, 13-12 lead before the Hawks took command.

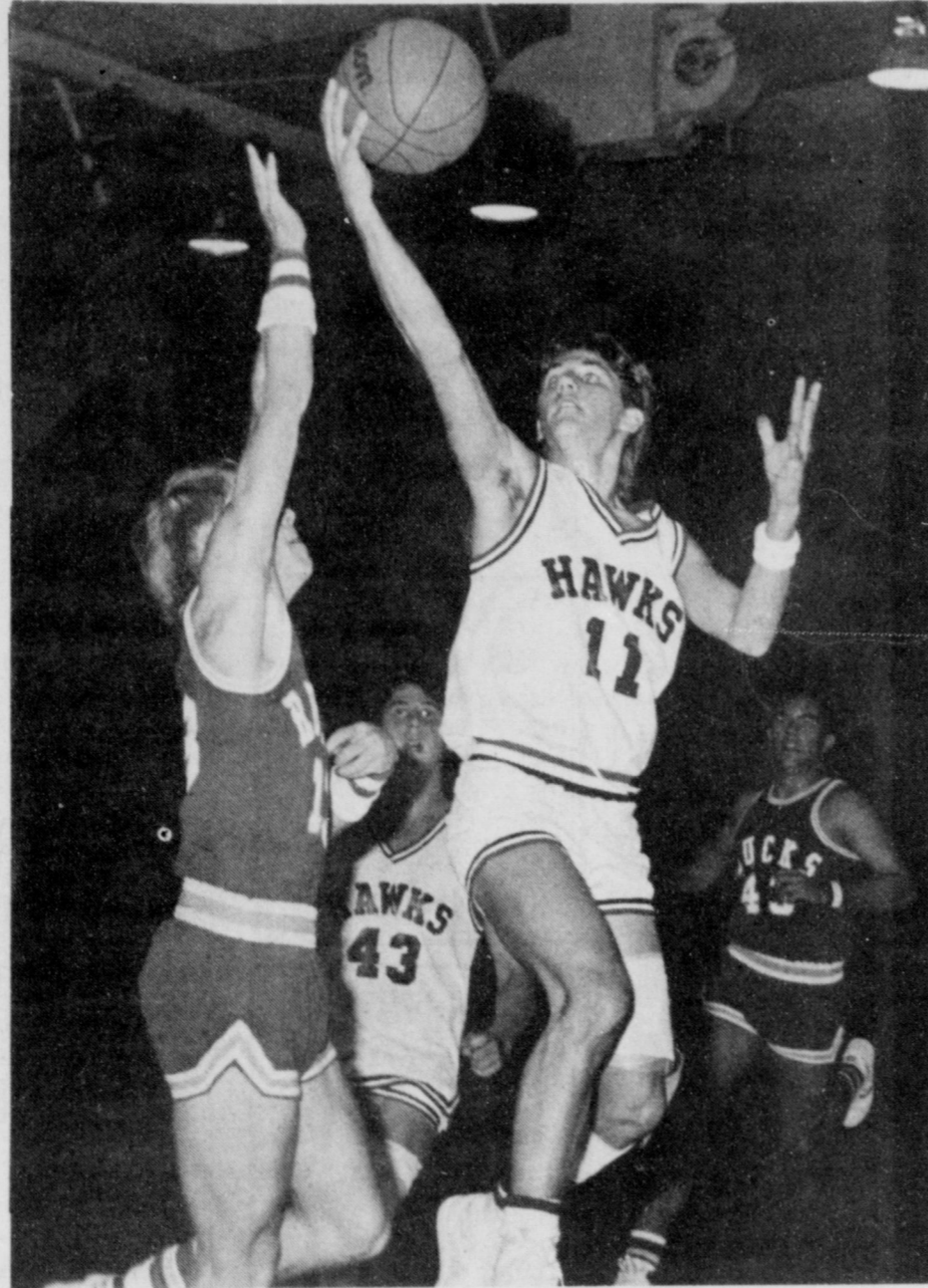
That command was spelled with

a capital "C" in the second period, during which Iowa Park outscored the visitors 29-12, and led 49-27 at the midway point.

Bill Chandler racked up 20 points, primarily on fast breaks. Brad Huff followed with 17, Sean Robinson scored 16, mostly in the second half, and Marc Johnson finished with 11.

The Hawks are now 1-0 in district play and 7-5 for the season.

Freshman and Junior Varsity games are slated today and Saturday. The teams will travel to Breckenridge today, where the first game is slated to begin at 6:30. Saturday, both clubs will host Bridgeport, and the first game is slated at 1 p.m.

Iowa Park High School senior Scott Davis is among 60 finalists for the Fina Academic All-State Football Team.

The selection was based on his academic achievements and his participation and leadership in school and community activities.

He is a candidate for selection as one of 11 members of the Academic All-State Team. Each member will receive a \$2,000 college scholarship.

Davis is a four-year member of his school's Student Council and president of Fellowship of Christian Athletes. He won the star greenhand award and was parliamentarian in FFA. He also was in the cast of the Iowa Park entry in the UIL one-act-play competition.

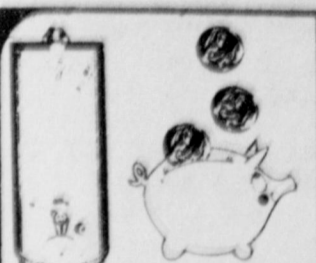

Area survives harsh winter storm

The winter storm that began here Friday night and continued to effect the area through Wednesday brought almost everything in the community to a standstill.

No reports of injuries resulting from the numerous minor vehicle accidents were reported, and the most serious event possibly related to the weather was heavy loss caused to two mobile homes by fire in the Kamay area.

Electric service to homes both in and surrounding the community was experienced, primarily Saturday. This caused the city to put into action its Emergency Preparedness Plan and call for the opening of the junior high gymnasium as a shelter.

A drizzle which dampened the area Friday began freezing that night, and residents awoke Saturday morning to find vehicles, lawns, trees, houses and everything left out of doors covered with about an inch of ice.

Sleet fell most of the day, and that evening an uncommon thunderstorm with lightening produced a heavy downpour of snow pellets and more sleet.

The heavy ice coating on electric lines, accompanied by winds, caused some lines to break. Most of those were in rural areas.

But a major line west of Iowa

Park, between the two highway rest stops, was snapped. It caused service to a major portion of the city and areas to the west to be cut between two and four hours.

Local utility manager, Wayne House, said he could not confirm a truck striking a pole caused the outage, which had been reported. But it was the cause of service outage to all homes north of Alameda and west of Victoria, he said.

Electric service in the Valley Farms area and other isolated rural areas was also disrupted.

House said he and Eldon Dowell worked until almost 5 a.m. Sunday to get service back on line over the area, and they were called out more Sunday.

Snow followed the sleet and snow pellet fall later Saturday night and continued through much of Sunday, covering the area with a blanket of three to four inches, some of it drifting.

City and state crews began early Saturday sanding intersections and other dangerous areas.

City workers used heavy equipment to clear as best they could the main business areas, erecting large piles of snow and ice.

But dangerous driving conditions, caused by the layer of ice

being covered by the snow and then being packed by vehicles, continued through most of Tuesday and into Wednesday.

Trees and posts still held their coatings of ice as late as yesterday, despite the warming sun Tuesday and Wednesday.

New threat of driving danger in the evenings was caused by the melting snow and ice being frozen when the sun went down and temperatures reached well below the freezing mark.

Schools were not affected by the storm Monday, because the day had already been set aside as a teacher work day and no classes scheduled. Last week was the end of the fall semester.

Classes resumed Tuesday, but the start was delayed an hour and a half, and again on Wednesday. All bus routes were covered without any problems, other than delays, according to Robert Palmer, assistant superintendent.

A fire during the early morning hours Saturday caused an estimated \$20,000 in damage to a mobile home owned by Ward Brumbelee.

Members of the Kamay Volunteer Fire Department battled the blaze on Hogue Road, east of Kamay. It was believed to have started by the hot water heater.

Throughout the period of bad

street and road conditions, employees of the city actively assisted motorists who were stuck.

But that practice was ended Wednesday morning, according to James Barrington, city administrator.

Barrington explained the action

was taken when, on numerous occasions, owners of the vehicles complained about how the vehicle was extracted and resulting damage to the vehicles.

Because of the complaints and the potential of damages, the administrator said all such assistance would

no longer be available.

Barrington complimented the cooperativeness and speed of school personnel in opening the junior high gymnasium after being asked Saturday night, but he could not say whether anyone ever used it.

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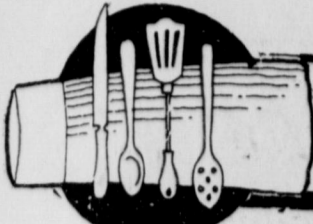

Mix butter, sugar and vanilla thoroughly. Measure by dip-level-pour method or by sifting. Blend flour and salt; sift in. Mix in nuts. Chill. Heat oven to 400. Roll into one-inch balls. Place on ungreased baking sheet. Bake 10-12 minutes. While warm, roll in powdered sugar. Cool. Roll in sugar again. Makes about 4 dozen cookies.

1/4 c. brown sugar (packed)

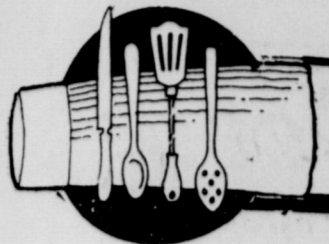

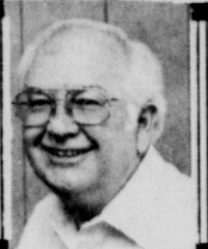

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As I See It... By BOB HAMILTON



High school principal Richard Davis reminded me the other night of how fast time flies.

He pointed out that today is the 17th anniversary of the high school building has been occupied.

I hadn't thought about it. But recalling, I remember it was to have been opened for use at the beginning of the 1969 fall semester, but not all the work had been completed. So the big move from the old W.F. George Building didn't take place until Jan. 22, 1970.

Davis, Carol Venhaus and Robert Sumner are the only teachers who have been there through all these years.

Earnie Reusch was also there when it opened. But he spent a few years at Andrews.

Yessir, time does fly!

Hope you made it through the big winter storm all right. It was a tough one.

My beloved fireplace saved the day, or rather Saturday night, for us. And it made staying inside two full days much more pleasant.

This is not the time to be raising prices, by any business, due to

the area's economy. But that's exactly what I'm going to have to do.

Effective Feb. 1, a year's subscription to the Leader, in Wichita and Archer Counties, will be \$10, plus 63-cents tax. Elsewhere in Texas, the annual price will be \$12, plus 75-cents tax. Outside the state, a subscription will be \$14 per year, and no tax is levied.

Also effective Feb. 1, the price of a single copy on the news stand will be 27-cents, plus 3-cents tax, for an even 30-cents.

Now let me try to explain why all this is coming about.

First of all, our subscription price is lower than any newspaper I know of in this part of the country.

And at the same time, we have absorbed numerous cost increases in printing, supplies and postage. We had a postage increase this year of almost 100 percent alone!

It has developed that the burden of paying for publication of the Leader has shifted primarily onto the shoulders of our advertisers.

This is explained by the fact that it costs .1786 cents per copy just to print a 16-page paper. A local subscriber, at \$8 per year, has paid only

.1923 cents for a copy.

Atop this comes the postage, the handling of circulation data, changes of address, and so on.

And none of this includes just the cost of operating a newspaper, which includes salaries, utilities, taxes, building and maintenance, insurance, contributions to worthy projects, equipment, etc., etc.

And, we reasoned that a customer purchasing a single copy off the news stand would just as soon pay 30-cents as he would 27-cents.

Yes, the tax on 25-cents is now 2-cents, with the "temporary" tax increase involved by the state.

We were supposed to have gone up on our sales tax both for annual subscriptions as well as single copy sales here at the office, but didn't. Again, we absorbed the increase. But we could only do it temporarily.

We hope you still find our rates for annual subscriptions as well as single copies a bargain. Many have told us we were too cheap, to which I responded "Inexpensive, not cheap."

We encourage your understanding and continued support, and pledge to do all within our power and ability to produce for you a better newspaper in the future.

Iowa Park School Scene

All information prepared by Iowa Park School Counselors.

Periodic evaluation of student's progress is a necessary part of the total school program. This testing helps the teachers to know which overall areas they need to stress, and helps in planning curriculum for Iowa Park students. The individual test results give teachers and parents helpful information about each student's progress.

The Comprehensive Test of Basic Skills (CTBS) is given to all students in grades K-12. This is an achievement test which measures skills in reading, spelling, language, and math. Science, social studies, and reference skills are also tested above the primary level. Scores on this test, which is administered in March of each school year, indicate both national and local percentiles. Iowa Park students have consistently scored above grade level on the overall CTBS scores for each grade tested.

In conjunction with the achievement testing, students in grades two, four, and six are given the Test of Cognitive Skills (TCS).

This instrument emphasizes measurement of abilities of a relatively abstract nature that are vital to success in an educational program.

During the 1985-86 school year, the Texas Education Agency (TEA) instituted a new assessment program, the Texas Educational Assessment of Minimum Skills (TEAMS). This program, mandated by House Bill 72, measures minimum basic skills in the areas of mathematics, reading, and writing in grades 1, 3, 5, 7, 9 and in mathematics and English language arts in grades 11/12.

The commissioner of education has designated two weeks in February when the assessment instruments will be administered for grades three, five, seven, and nine. The first grade test will be administered in April. The exit level instrument will be administered again in May.

All of these tests are sent off for computerized scoring, and when the reports are returned to the schools, copies of the scores are sent home to students and parents. Parents should feel free to contact their child's

teacher or counselor if they have questions concerning the scores.

Students at Bradford and Kidwell Elementary Schools will be learning lifetime fitness and healthy lifestyles through the upcoming Jump Rope for Heart special event. This event is being sponsored by the American Alliance for Health, Physical Education, Recreation and Dance, and our school to benefit the American Heart Association.

The money raised by the Jump Rope for Heart event will allow the American Heart Association to continue to provide educational programs and materials at no cost to your child's school; and even more important, it will ensure the continuation of the research efforts to combat cardiovascular disease and stroke. At the January 14 school board meeting, Joe Singer, a director of the American Heart Association, presented the Heart Treasure Chest Kit to the school for use in the elementary schools.

At Bradford this event will be held January 26, 27 and 28 during regular P.E. classes. An official sponsor form has been given to students to enable them to acquire pledges. Pledges will be based on each minute the student jumps. Example: If the student jumps for 100 minutes and a pledge of five cents per minute is given to your child, the sponsor should donate \$5.00. Children are encouraged to collect pledges from family and friends only, and not door to door. The money turn-in date for Bradford students is Wednesday, February 18, allowing time after the Jump Rope for Heart dates for the students to collect all pledges. All money must be turned in P.E. class at school on that day. In order to ensure the safety of your child, please convert all cash and coins to a check or money order before your child turns in his or her collections.

At Kidwell only second graders will be participating, and dates and further information for second graders will be announced at a later date.

Men turning 26 this year reach important milestone

The Selective Service System has announced that men who will reach their 26th birthday in 1987 are reaching an important milestone.

Beginning Jan. 1, 1987, men who were required to register with Selective Service in 1981 will be turning 26. Selective Service does not have the authority to accept registrations after age 26.

By failing to register before turning 26, a man will have permanently forfeited his right to certain benefits, including student aid, job training and federal employment.

In addition to these federal benefits, some states require registration for state student aid, entrance to a state supported college or university,

state employment and permission to practice law.

Many of the 25-year-olds who have still not registered may be unaware of the requirement or do not understand the importance of the obligation to register.

Some may even have served in the military but failed to register either before entering the armed forces or after leaving active duty.

Others may have been institutionalized or incarcerated at the time of their 18th birthday and not realized that they were required to register if released prior to age 26.

For those men born in 1961 who have registered, 1987 also marks the year that ends their eligibility for selection for induction under present law, should there be a return to the draft.

Over 17-million men, age 18 through 25, have registered with Selective Service since registration was reinstated in 1980. These men comprise over 97 percent of those required to register.

Men age 18 to 25 who have not yet registered still have a chance to avoid risk of prosecution or loss of benefits by registering promptly at any post office.

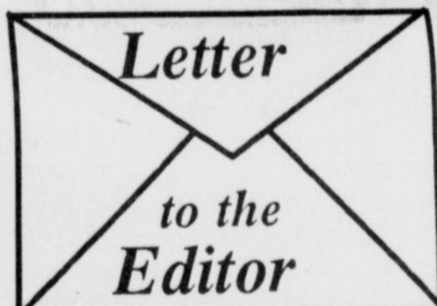
Failure to register is a felony punishable by a fine of up to \$250,000, up to five years in jail, or both.

Area oil, gas report

The No. 26 T.J. & J.L. Waggoner "A" has been finaled by Hale-McDonald.

It is a developmental well in the Wichita Regular Field, five miles north of Kamay. Drillsite is in a 100-acre lease in the M.A. Willis Survey, A-547.

Daily potential of three barrels of oil was posted with the Railroad Commission. Water production totaled 20 barrels per day. The well went to a 1,389-ft. bottom, and production will be from perforations in the Cisco Sand Formation, 814 to 816 feet into the wellbore.

The well is located 190 feet from the south line and 3,400 feet from the west line of the survey.

Jeraco Fuel has revealed the plugging and abandonment of the No. 1 Warren, a developmental well in the Wichita Regular Field. The well was located 4.3 miles southwest of Burkburnett in a 122-acre lease in the W.J. Smith Survey, A-678.

The well was spudded early in February of last year, and probed to a dry bottom at 1,650 feet.

Location was 287 feet from the north line and 225 feet from the east line of the survey.

Testing for potential is underway at the No. 10 Bickley "A" "1986-2D", a developmental well in the Wichita Regular Field. Tex-Oil Drilling & Exploration is the operator. The well is located 2.5 miles northeast of Electra in a two-acre lease in the C&MRR Survey, A-594.

The well was spudded Oct. 21. It was bottomed at 2,000 feet and plugged back to 1,550 feet.

Drillsite is 1,651 feet from the north line and 295 feet from the west line of the survey.

Testing for potential is scheduled at the No. 3 Dickinson, a developmental well in the Wichita Regular Field, with Tri Core Oil & Gas as the operator.

The operation is located three miles north-northeast of Clara in a 79-acre lease in the Specht Colony S/D Survey, Blk. 19. The operation was spudded Dec. 13, and has been bottomed at 1,837 feet.

The well is located 4,250 feet from the south line and 750 feet from the east line of the lease.

Williams Petroleum has hung the "dry hole" sign on the No. 1 Burnett Oil, a developmental well in the Wichita Regular Field. Drillsite was two miles southeast of Fowlkes in a 160-acre lease in the SA&MG Survey, A-430. The well was spudded Dec. 3, and bottomed dry at 1,050 feet.

Drillsite was 1,890 feet from the north line and 2,490 feet from the west line of the lease.

Phillips Petroleum has completed a work-over operation in the Wilbarger Regular Field, 12 miles southwest of Harrold. The well is designated as the No. 285 Waggoner Ranch Batt "4", and is located in a 320-acre lease in the H&TC Survey, Sec. 45, Blk. 4.

The well pumped 11 barrels of oil per day from perforation in the Canyon Formation, 2,560 to 2,570 feet into the wellbore.

The same operator originally completed the well July 20, 1975, and the total depth was 3,800 feet. Phillips plugged the well back to 2,650 feet.

Location is 660 feet from the south line and 2,050 feet from the east line of the lease.

No commercial shows have been logged at the No. 2 W.T. Waggoner Estate "AV", a developmental well in the Wilbarger Regular Field. Drillsite is 12 miles south of Harrold, with the W.T. Waggoner Estate as the operator.

The operation was spudded Dec. 12, and has been bottomed at 4,808 feet.

The well is located 800 feet from the south line and 1,225 feet from the east line of the lease.

Pumping 103 barrels of oil per day, plus 147 barrels of water, the No. 2 Parker "B" Unit was completed in the Swartz Field, Hardeman County, by Trio Operating.

Drillsite is five miles northeast of Quanah.

The well was drilled to 9,058-ft. total depth and plugged back to 6,068 feet. It will produce from perforations in the Palo Pinto Formation, 5,884 to 5,900 feet into the wellbore.

The location is in an 80-acre lease in the W&NW Survey, A-420. Drillsite is 567 feet from the south line and 1,195 feet from the west line

of the lease.

EP Operating of Dallas has filed for permit to drill the No. 1 Santa Fe Unit, an 8,500-ft. wildcat well 4.5 miles south of Medicine Mounds. Location is in a 40-acre lease in Hardeman County's H&TC Survey, A-148. The well will be drilled 80 feet from the north line and 350 feet from the west line of the lease.

Rep. Finnell takes oath

State Rep. Charles Finnell assembled with other Texas lawmakers Tuesday of last week to take his oath of office.

The first order of business in the 70th regular session was the reelection of the Honorable Gib Lewis, a Fort Worth businessman, to his third term as Speaker of the House of Representatives. Lewis was expected to wait until Thursday before appointing legislators to their committee assignments.

Finnell, who serves the nine-county 80th District, retains his office on the third floor of the West wing of the Capitol. However, Finnell's Austin office number has changed to 512-463-0526.

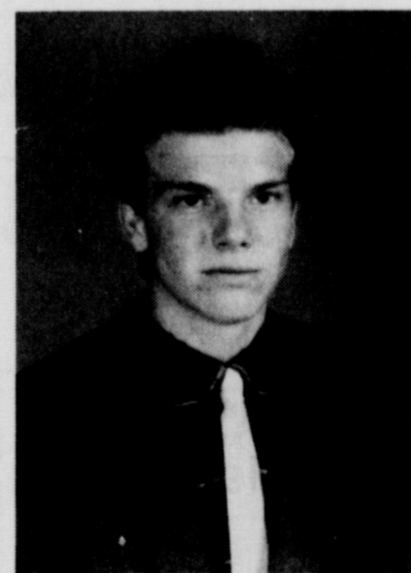
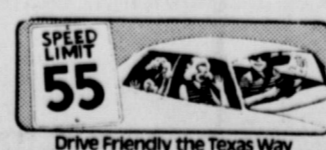
A poultry clinic will be held at 7 p.m. today at the 4-H Auditorium in Wichita Falls.
