the stove, apparently igniting the blaze. Russell, who was assisted after leaving the house by his wife and Detective Tommy Adams, was credited with slowing the fire's progress until volunteer firemen arrived. Damage, other than smoke, was limited to the kitchen cabinets.

Two church burglaries reported over weekend

Heading the list of activities for Iowa Park Police Department were the vandalism and burglary of two churches, and two motorcycle accidents.

Also keeping officers busy were numerous cases of criminal mischief, a man shooting a pistol during early morning hours and an attempted suicide.

Investigation reports have not been completed concerning break-ins at First Baptist Church and Pacific Ave. Missionary Baptist Church, because lists of items taken haven't been turned in by the pastors.

However, it has been learned that office doors at First Baptist sustained heavy damage by the intruders sometime Saturday night. File drawers were emptied, in an apparent search for money.

In the church's kitchen, all refrigerators were emptied and their contents, including raw eggs, splattered on floors and walls. Microphones and an IBM typewriter, as well as three checks made out to the church, are reportedly missing.

The Pacific Ave. church reportedly lost its portable speaking system to the looters.

ACCIDENTS

Work being done on US 287, where asphalt has been removed by a roto-tilling machine, is being blamed as the cause for two motorcycle accidents.

The first took place at 5:10 p.m. last Wednesday, when Dan Milam, 40, lost control at Johnson Road and Expressway and wrecked his two-wheeler.

Milam was treated and released from Park Clinic. His vehicle sustained an approximate \$250 in damage.

The more spectacular of the two accidents took place shortly before 1 p.m. Monday, just east of the Pacific Ave. overpass in the east-bound lane, when an Oklahoma man and his young son were thrown from their motorcycle.

Jonathan Ballou and his son, Lyle, about 10, of Duke, Okla., were traveling east when they reportedly attempted to pass an automobile and lost control on the two-inch incline where the asphalt has been removed.

The couple was picked up 153 feet from where metal marks in the pavement were apparently made by the motorcycle when its wheels left the pavement.

The elder Ballou was apparently airborne 114 feet, as indicated by fragments of currency imbedded in the pavement, an indication he hit on his right hip and his pocket and billfold ripped, exposing the bills to the surface.

Another imbedding of currency was found 24 feet beyond the first finding, possibly indicating he flipped in the air after first contact.

Both riders were wearing helmets that showed heavy scratching, possibly saving them from death or more serious injury. They were reportedly traveling faster than 55 MPH at the time of the accident, according to one eyewitness.

As it was, however, both were treated and released from Wichita General Hospital, according to a hospital spokesman. Damage to the motorcycle and equipment was not estimated.

Criminal mischief cases reported to police during the week included: pickup window being shot out by a BB gun while parked in the 200 block of West Pecan Friday; vehicle window broken while parked in the 600 block of West Coleman Sunday; and tires slashed Sunday on Surrey.

Police responded at 2:09 a.m. Saturday to apartments at 1000 Mary Dr. when a complaint was reported of a man walking around with a holster on his hip and firing a pistol.

Officers arrested Mark Joseph Ruskin, 30, on a charge of public

intoxication and confiscated his pistol and shells.

A 30-year-old man was taken into protective custody at 8:14 a.m. Sunday, after the man had reportedly attempted to commit suicide.

Officers reportedly found that the man had attempted to cut blood vessels and hang himself before they arrived. He was placed in Wichita State Hospital for observation.

When they responded at 3:51 p.m. Monday to a location in the south part of town on a reported "family disturbance," police learned through investigation that both the man and woman were wanted on warrants in Wichita Falls.

Nathan Davidson, 26, and Carol Defate Davis, 19, were turned over to officers from the Wichita Falls Police Department for transfer to that city.

Jeff Watts told police someone had stolen a spare tire from his pickup while it was parked between 10:15 and 11:15 p.m. Thursday at 610 E. Lafayette.

Two abandoned boys' bicycles were picked up by police Thursday afternoon from Kidwell Elementary playground for keeping until owners claim them.

Trustees approve low bid for stadium work

School trustees, in a called meeting Thursday evening, accepted the lowest of five bids for work to drain the high-level subsoil water table at Hawk Stadium.

Rutledge Plumbing's bid of \$24,328 was accepted. Highest bid ranged to \$74,750, according to school board minutes.

Included in the bid were installation of 4,450 feet of four-inch perforated pipe and gravel backfill and 16 concrete area inlets.

Work is to begin within 10 days of board action, with completion within 20 consecutive days.

Turf on the high school football stadium has, during various years since its construction in 1970, suffered because of salt water rising

to a level that it stands in areas, killing the grass.

While a drainage system was installed during construction designed to carry away water from rains, it was not intended to accomplish what the new installation is designed to do.

Another action taken by the board at the meeting was to approve a resolution authorizing Assistant Superintendent Robert Palmer's signature on Public Law 81-874 documents.

School officials reported Tuesday that work to correct erosion on the east berm of Hawk Stadium had been completed. The area was levelled, new dirt put in place and covered with hydromulch, to give the area a needed cover of turf.

Dolores and I attended the Texas Press Association's summer convention over the weekend at Austin, and it turned out to be a most informative and enjoyable event.

How many groups, other than stockholders of major oil corporations, would you guess could attract T. Boone Pickens Jr. of Amarillo to be

a speaker? The Mesa Petroleum board chairman had a problem making his appointment, however, when a friend died and he had to attend a funeral Friday morning. But we wanted to hear him, so we postponed lunch for more than 350 persons from 12 noon until 2:30, so he could fly in and make

his talk. In a nutshell, Pickens, who was graduated about eight years before Dolores from Amarillo High, thinks most major corporation hired officers do a lousy job and that is why he and his firm make so many takeover offers. Well, he did admit his group makes a few million eventhough few takeovers work.

And then there was the Saturday luncheon speech by Kent Hance, who said he shouldn't be counted out as a candidate against Mark White for governor in the next gubernatorial race. His talk was carried by most newspapers of the state over the Associated Press wire service.

Burka allows that Phil Gramm and the mayor of San Antonio are the future of politics in Texas. "Mark White represents the immediate past," he quipped.

About the attorney general, who by the way crashed our informal barbecue dinner Friday evening without invitation, Burka commented, "Mattox image as a fighter overshadows his image as a sleeze."

You may recall I took exception to a comment written by Burka in his magazine concerning school reform, when he said the taking of taxes from rich school districts to help poor districts, like one in San Antonio that sued the state, was a good thing.

I asked him how he figured a district with a 45-cent tax rate ought to get money from another with a higher tax rate was a good thing. He admitted he couldn't remember and didn't know. Though he said he would give me an answer later, he never did.

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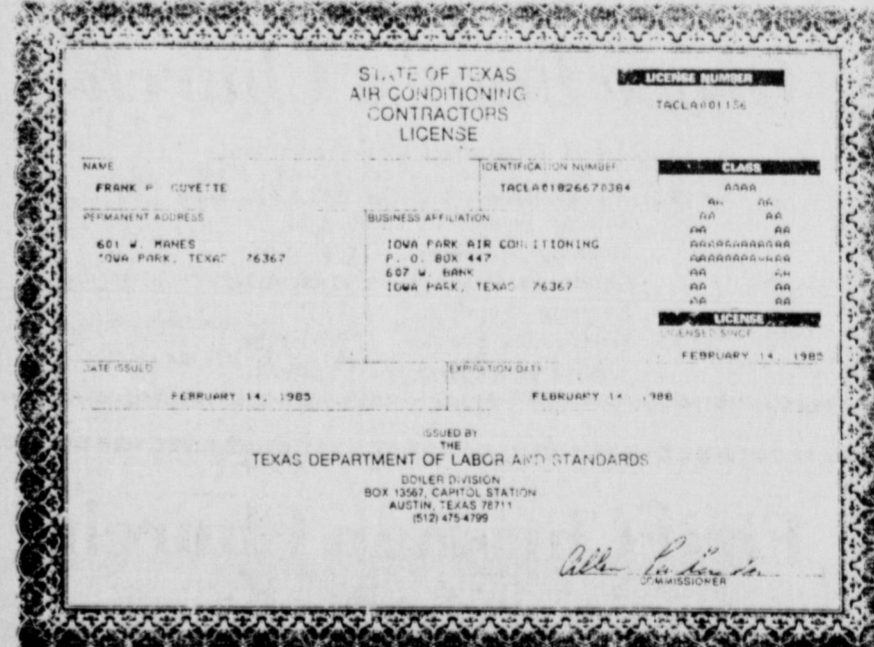

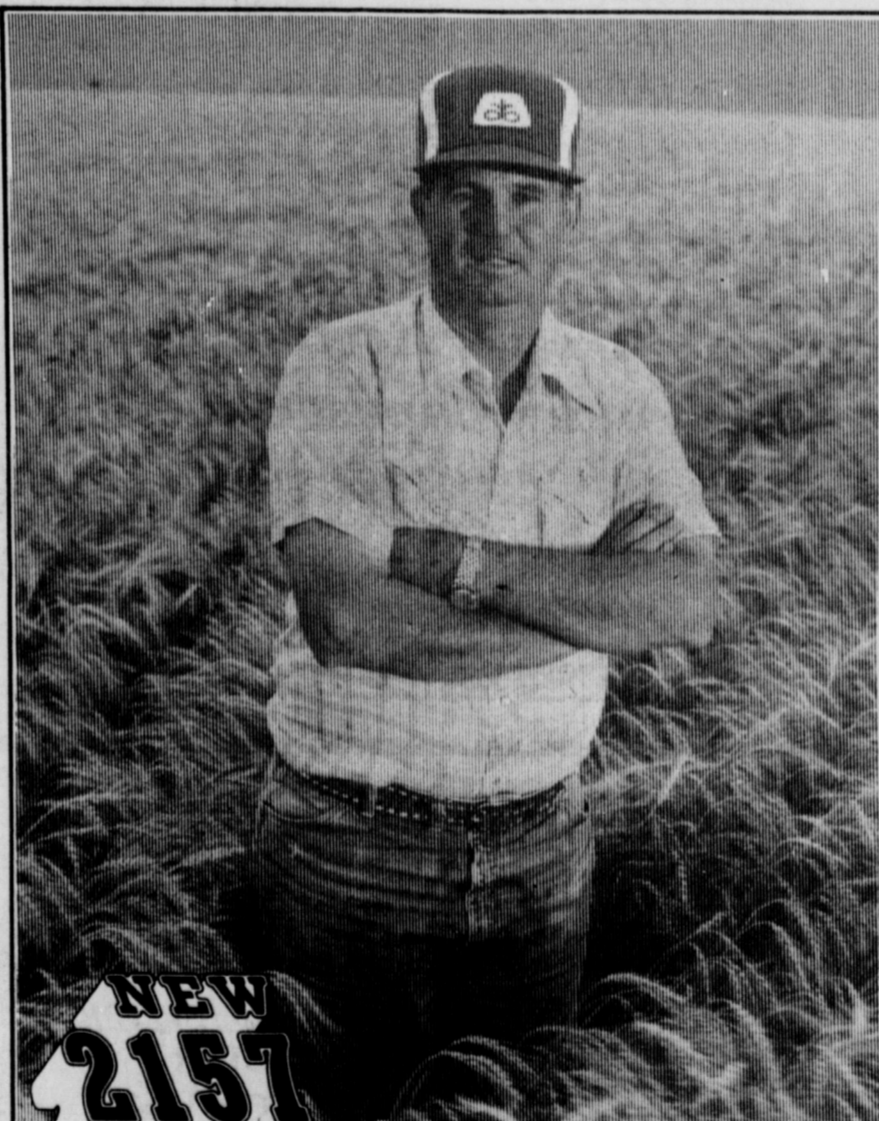
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Harbuck, McCormack wed in Wichita Falls

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Council approves bid for new police cruiser

Shaw Motor Co. of Iowa Park was awarded the low bid for purchase of a new police car for Holliday, in action taken Monday night by the Holliday city council in its first meeting of July.

The bid of \$11,705 from Shaw Motors was only one of two received by bid-opening time at the Community Center, and, in effect, the only official bid considered. The other bid was not considered because it didn't meet specifications as adver-

tised to contain a police package, or modifications required to make the vehicle streetworthy for law enforcement officials in the city.

Council approved the purchase of a 1986 Ford Crown Victoria from Shaw Motors containing the police package. No delivery date was announced. Holliday's two police officers are currently using one vehicle which was purchased for the city administrator's transportation, but was forced into action when the original police cruiser

was totalled in a 1984 wreck.

In other business during the short meeting, council approved a reorganization plan for city personnel presented by city administrator Gary Jones. Steve Johnson of Moore & Camp's accounting firm detailed his company's work done for the city, and council approved law enforcement liability insurance for the local officers.

Jones' plan for re-organization will place Mayor Don H. Duke at the helm

of the city's personnel structure, and all employees with the exception of Jones himself and police chief Jules Colbert under the city council's authority. The city administrator and police chief will be under the mayor.

Jones also narrated reports from various department heads including fire, civil defense, ambulance, street, water and parks departments, detailing current activity.

Johnson, speaking on behalf of

Moore & Camp, explained his disbursements and receipts records company's methods of obtaining for the city.

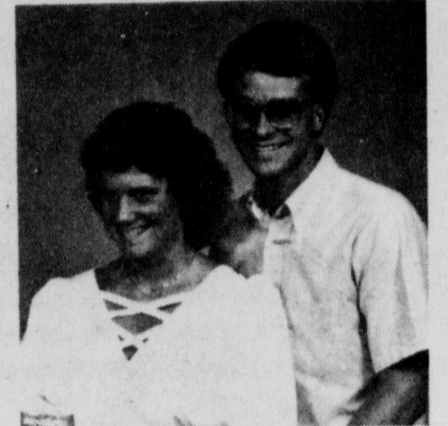

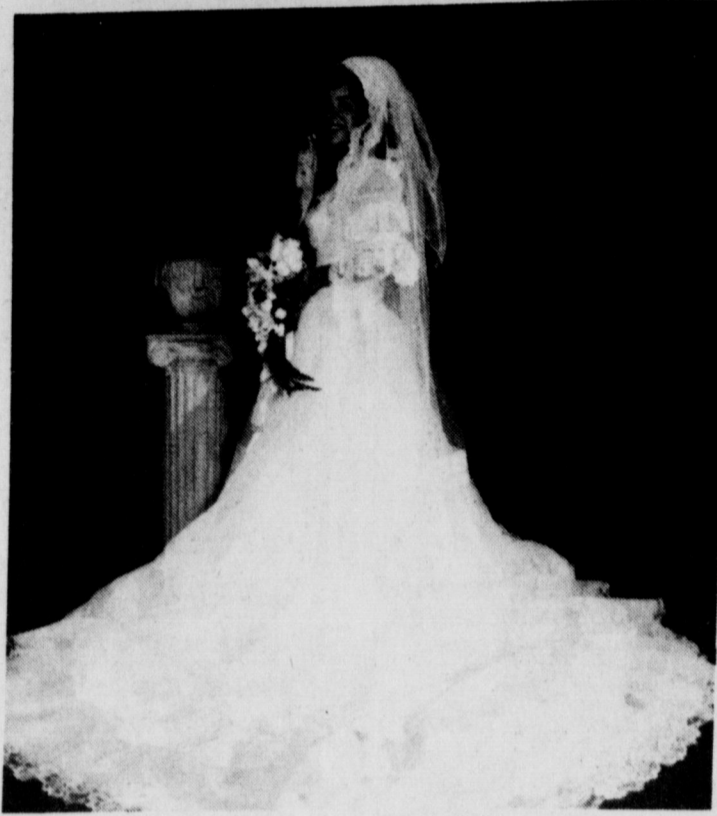

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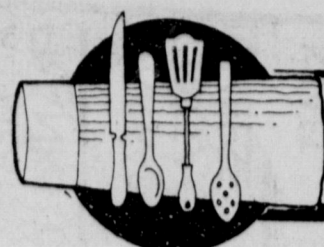
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Cook of the Week



Mrs. Glenn Gwinn

At least one family in the Iowa Park area, the Glenn Gwinns, is conscious of the nutritive value of the staple food, rice. Sue Gwinn's recipes for this week and her statements attest to that fact.

According to the Oxford Book of Food Plants, rice is one of the world's two most important food crops, the other being wheat. It is the staple food of more people than wheat.

Rosie Muriel wrote in her Dictionnaire des Aliments that a third of the world is nourished exclusively on rice, and Reay Tannehill, a careful researcher, said that rice is the main item on the diet for six out of every ten people in the world.

Until recently, it was thought that rice was a native of either China or India. However, in 1970 it was discovered that the grain had been found at an archeological site in northern Thailand dated 3500 B.C.

The important thing is not where it originated but its nutritive value. Today, the U.S. produces about 10 billion pounds of rice each year and is the world's leading exporter despite the fact that 90 percent of the world's rice is grown in Asia, where most of it is eaten by her people.

Mrs. Gwinn said that many people in this part of Texas think of rice as she and her family used to think of it, something to eat only with cream and sugar on it, as a cereal.

When her husband was in the Air Force, he learned to like it served with vegetables along with meat and other vegetables. She described rice as a nutritious food that can be served with only butter or margarine on it or as a white starch instead of potatoes.

The flavor goes well with any kind of meat, takes gravy well and can be used in casseroles or to add more taste and food value to any kinds of soup.

Sue said her family especially enjoys rice with German sausage links and ground beef. The first combination involves bringing canned or brick chili to a boil, adding the sausage and rice, and, if desired, canned or leftover pinto beans.

RICE AND BEEF

Brown 1 lb. ground beef in skillet; pour off grease, add:

1 pint tomato juice or 2 small cans tomato sauce
1 can water

Bring to a boil, add instant rice in same amount as liquid, canned pinto beans, if desired. Season with salt, pepper, onion salt, and a little chili powder, if desired. Simmer until rice is tender.

BASIC RICE RECIPE

Use any kind of regular rice, not pre-cooked or parboiled.

Measure 1 cup of uncooked rice for every 2 cups of cooked rice. Add twice as much water as rice (1/4 cup more for extra sticky rice), 1 tsp. salt per cup of uncooked rice. Bring rice and water to rapid boil, stir, reduce heat to minimum and cover pan. Cook approximately 20 minutes or until all water is absorbed. (Note: For more separated, less sticky rice, she recommended Uncle Ben's brand).

Sue said that her family likes

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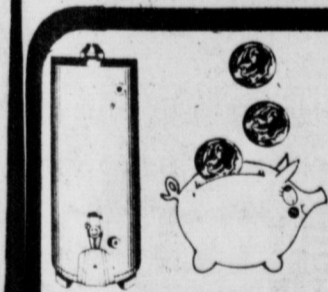
