City, school meetings scheduled next week

Early agendas indicate short meetings next week for the school board and city council.

The council is to meet at 7 p.m. in council chambers, and trustees will start their meeting at 7:30 p.m. in the administration building.

Though drawings are not yet ready for seeking bids on the storm drainage project in Country Hills Addition, a resolution will be considered to authorize Administrator James Barrington to advertise the intent of the city to issue certificates

of obligation to finance the project. One of four ordinances to be considered will have an effect on all new housing in the city. It would require a fire alarm smoke detector protecting every bedroom in homes to be built.

Barrington explained one detector could service as many as four bedrooms, depending on the floor plan.

Another ordinance would raise the fee for electrical examinations from \$30 to \$50. This would also include re-examinations, Barrington said.

A change in electrical installation standards is covered in another ordinance to be considered. It would raise service drops and heads from 10 feet to 12 feet.

The fourth ordinance on the agenda amends the code pertaining to removal of junk cars, dropping a requirement for owners to appear before the council. Another portion of the existing ordinance gives the owner the option for an appearance.

Also on Monday's agenda, the council will consider purchase of a police car, and consider authorizing work to make Gordon Lake a constant level.

Supt. Glen Mitchell said his early agenda would include three topics, other than the usual monthly reports. They are:

- * consider leasing the old homemaking cottage;

- * consider allowing high school students enroll in certain night courses offered at Midwestern State Univ.;

- * and hear a long-range report on the school's band program.

Juvenile males arrested on sexual assault charges

Two local juvenile males were arrested Friday afternoon on a charge of sexual assault of two juvenile females.

Iowa Park police received a call at 4:36 p.m. Friday from a parent concerning the alleged rapes. The males were arrested at 8:17 p.m., according to the police blotter, and

turned over to juvenile court officials. The offense reportedly took place in a residence. All four are believed to be 14 years of age.

In an apparent accident, Jerry P. Williams, 1017 Cornelia, was wounded in the right ankle when a .22 cal. pistol discharged.

Police received notice at 3:39 p.m. Nov. 27 from a local physician who treated the wound.

Daniel Milner told police his vehicle was struck by a green and white pickup while parked Wednesday at 801 First St.

More than \$500 worth of jewelry, clothing and other items were reportedly taken from 306 S. Yosemite. Kay Leach, the owner, said the incident took place some time Nov. 26. Police are investigating.

Officers arrested David Lee Hill, 38, in the 300 block of Lafayette at 10:32 p.m. Saturday on a charge of DWI in repetition. He was released to Wichita County Sheriff officers at 12:25 a.m. after bond had been set at \$1,500, according to police blotter.

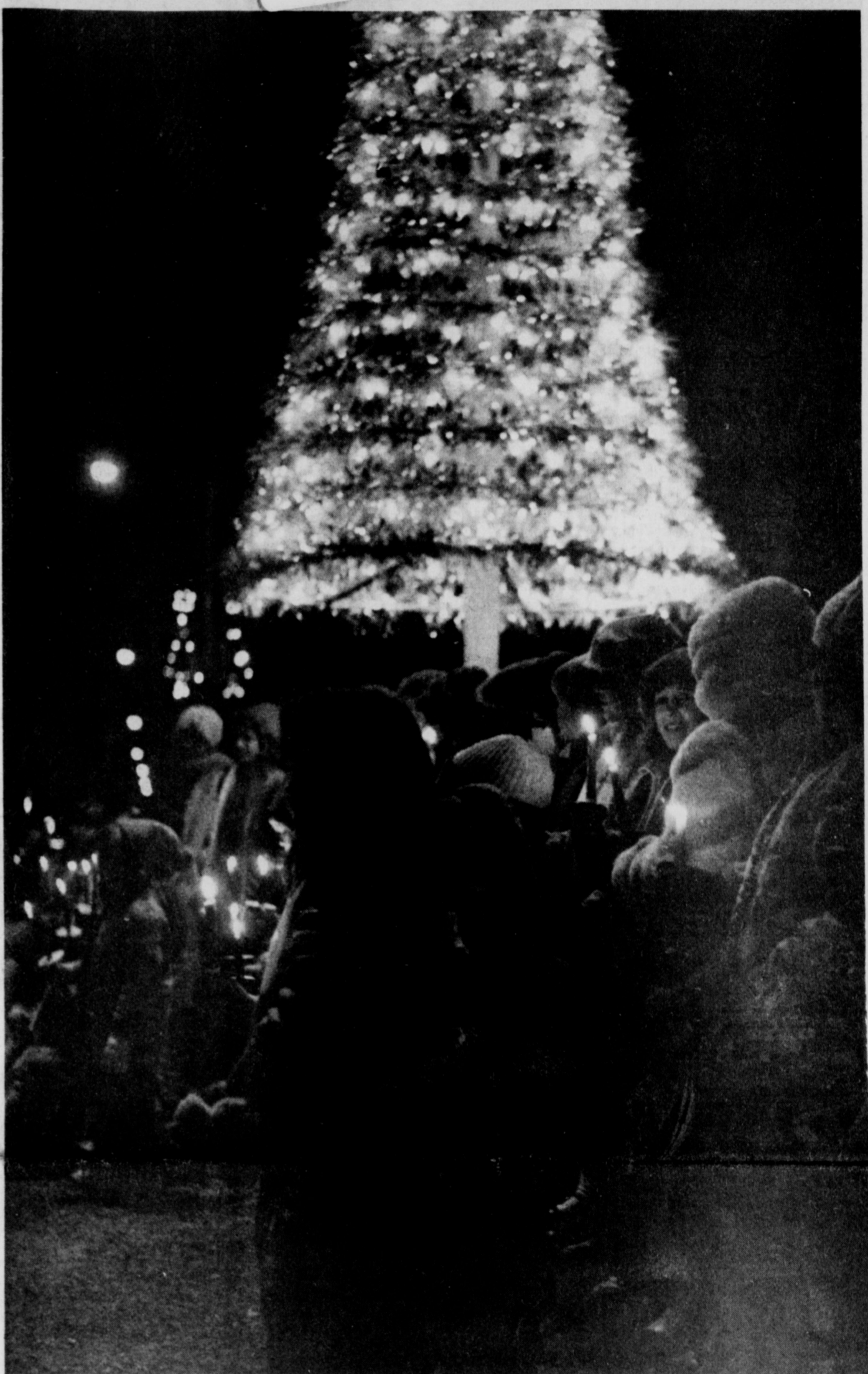
Benefit game set Saturday

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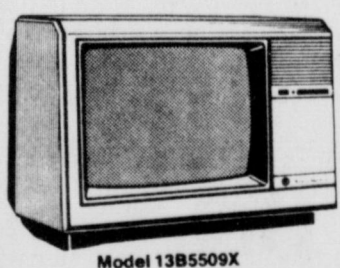

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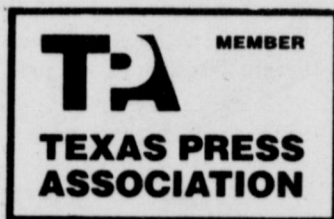

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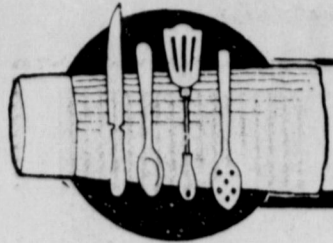

Cook of the Week

The crowning touch to a dinner is a sumptuous dessert, and for many people that spells Coconut Cream Pie, whether it is for a holiday meal or everyday eating.

Coconut, the fruit of the coconut palm, is a very important crop. It is not known where coconut palm comes from. Scientists believe that the nuts from the tree have been carried by ocean tides, as well as man, from one tropical country to another.

It seems to have been impossible to find the original home of the palm since it was already growing in every tropical land at the dawn of history.

Confectioners and bakers make good use of the meat of the coconut palm. They use shredded coconut, either dried or canned in its natural milk, and it is a very popular ingredient in making pies, cakes, candy and cookies.

Madline Davis likes to make Coconut Cream Pie because it is a favorite of her husband, Leonard "Jug". Her recipe today should appeal to cooks who prefer microwave cooking.

A native of Clinton, Okla. where she was graduated from high school, she has lived in Iowa Park 20 years. During that time, she has worked for Iowa Park Florist, Petal Pushers, Wal-Mart Pharmacy and Picture Perfect. She and Jug, a local mail carrier, were married in September and attend Faith Baptist Church.

Madline's hobbies are cooking, flower arranging, and she is very enthusiastic about her newest hobby, oil painting. She has one son, Mike Waddell of Wichita Falls; four stepsons, Bubba Davis, Rodney Davis of Dallas, Kevin Davis of Houston, and Jackie Davis of Wichita Falls; a stepdaughter, Vonda Rogers of Dallas. She and Jug have three grandchildren.

COCONUT CREAM PIE

- 1 9-inch pie shell
- 3 cups milk
- 3/4 cup sugar
- 5 T cornstarch
- 1/2 tsp. salt
- 3 egg yolks, beaten
- 1 1/2 cups shredded coconut
- 2 T margarine
- 1 1/2 tsp. vanilla

Bake pie shell - set aside. Place milk into a 4-cup glass microwave dish. Put into microwave on level eight 5-6 minutes or until scalded.

Mix together: sugar, cornstarch and salt in 2-quart dish. Stir hot milk slowly into mixture. Stir 3/4 cup of hot milk into egg yolks, stirring constantly and add this to mixture.

Return to microwave and cook at level eight, 3-4 minutes or until thickened. Stir with wire whip often during cooking. Add coconut, margarine and vanilla; stir until margarine is melted and pour filling into pie shell.

With mixer, beat egg white until stiff, add 7 T sugar, 1 tsp. vanilla, 1/2 tsp. cream of tartar. Place on top of

cooled pie, top with 1/2 cup coconut and brown in 400 degree oven.

3-BEAN SALAD

- Dressing:
- 1/2 cup salad oil
 - 3/4 cup sugar
 - 2/3 cup vinegar

Combine:

- 1 medium onion, chopped
- 1 bell pepper, chopped
- 1 small jar pimientos
- 1 tsp. salt
- 1/2 tsp. pepper
- 1 can green beans
- 1 can kidney beans
- 1 can wax beans

Pour dressing over and marinate.

CHEESE ROLL

- 2 lbs. Cheddar cheese, grated
- 1 large pkg. cream cheese, softened
- 1/8 tsp. garlic powder
- 1/2 cup finely chopped pecans

Mix thoroughly and shape into long rolls. Roll in following mixture:

- 1/2 tsp. red pepper
- 1 1/2 tsps. paprika
- 2 tsps. chili powder

Refrigerate.

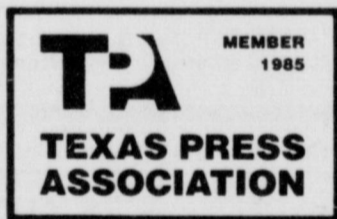
GREEN BEAN CASSEROLE

- 2 (16 oz.) cans green beans
- 3/4 cup milk
- 1 (10 3/4 oz.) can cream of mushroom soup
- 1/8 tsp. black pepper
- 1 can French fried onions

Combine beans, milk, soup, pepper and 1/2 can onions; pour into 1 1/2 quart casserole. Bake uncovered at 350 degrees 30 minutes. Top with remaining onions and bake 5 minutes longer.

MAGIC COOKIE BAR

- 1/2 cup (1 stick) margarine, melted
- 1 1/2 cups Graham cracker crumbs
- 1 cup walnuts, chopped



- 1 cup (6 oz. pkg.) Nestle's semi-sweet chocolate morsels
- 1 1/2 cups (3 1/2 oz.) can flaked coconut
- 1 1/2 cups (15 oz.) can Eagle Brand milk

Pour Eagle Brand milk over top. Bake at 350 degrees 25 minutes or until lightly browned on top. Cool 15 minutes; cut into bars.

- 1 medium head lettuce
- 1 cup thinly-sliced onions

- 1 can (6 oz.) water chestnuts, sliced
- 1 (10 oz.) pkg. frozen peas
- 2 cups mayonnaise
- 1 tsp. sugar
- 1/2 tsp. salt
- 1/2 tsp. pepper
- 1 cup shredded Mozzarella cheese
- 1/2 cup grated Parmesan cheese

Shred lettuce and place in bottom of a 9x13 dish. Top with layers of onion, celery, green pepper and water chestnuts. Sprinkle with layer of frozen peas; spread with layer of mayonnaise. Sprinkle with mixture of sugar, salt and pepper. Top with the cheeses. Cover tightly with plastic wrap and refrigerate 24 hours or overnight.

Student checking wheat

There will be someone checking wheat for insect and disease outbreaks across Wichita County this year. That person is Kevin Meinzer of Iowa Park.

Kevin is the 18-year-old son of Mrs. Ann Meinzer. He works for Fred Dwyer, a large wheat farmer in Iowa Park.

I had talked to George Brandt, FFA teacher in Iowa Park, earlier in the year and asked him if he might know someone that would be interested in the job of wheat scout for the county. He told me that Kevin would be a good choice, if he wanted to do the work.

I told Kevin that Emory Boring, Extension area entomologist from Vernon, would teach him how to check wheat the right way and what insects can damage it. He will be able to use that knowledge even when he is not scouting for money. That time might be next year or 10 years

from now. Whatever the case, once he learns what a greenbug or a winter grain mite looks like, he'll always remember it.

Kevin will be scouting 6 fields in the county. He will be doing this mainly after school and sometimes on weekends. The information that he reports will be used by Emory Boring. Emory will publish this information, and it will be sent to all the county agents across the Rolling Plains.

I will also receive the information. It will be used as an early warning system for wheat producers in this and surrounding counties. The data will give some idea as to the number of greenbugs across the county and the damage they are causing.

Supplemental counts will be taken on the winter grain and also the brown wheat mites. Other aphids, such as the corn leaf and oat bird cherry aphid, will be counted.

In addition to destructive insects, beneficial insect numbers will be reported. Emory Boring and I have worked with Kevin to show how to distinguish these insects. Plus, we have "schooled" him on how beneficial

insects can reduce greenbug and mite numbers to the point where insecticidal spraying can be avoided.

Money for this position comes from the Texas Wheat Producers' Board. There are two other positions like this in Knox and Wilbarger Counties.

Kevin won't make a lot of money scouting wheat this year. He will, however, help us out by providing information on numbers of destructive insects occurring in wheat. My hope is that he will learn some things that will make him a better farmer in the future. If he does this, the most beneficial result of his job as wheat scout will be achieved.

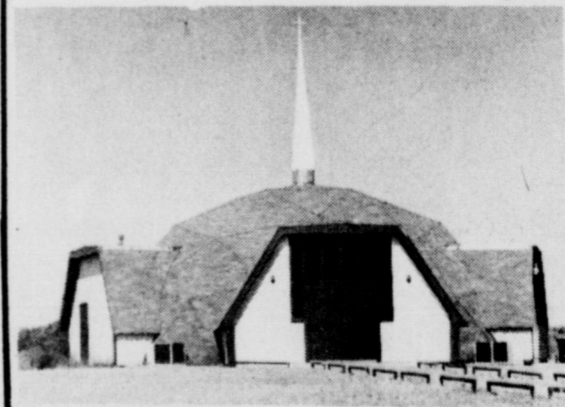

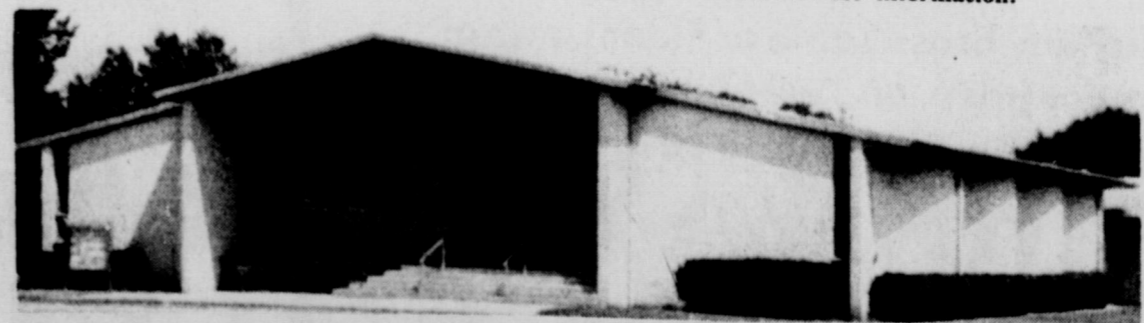

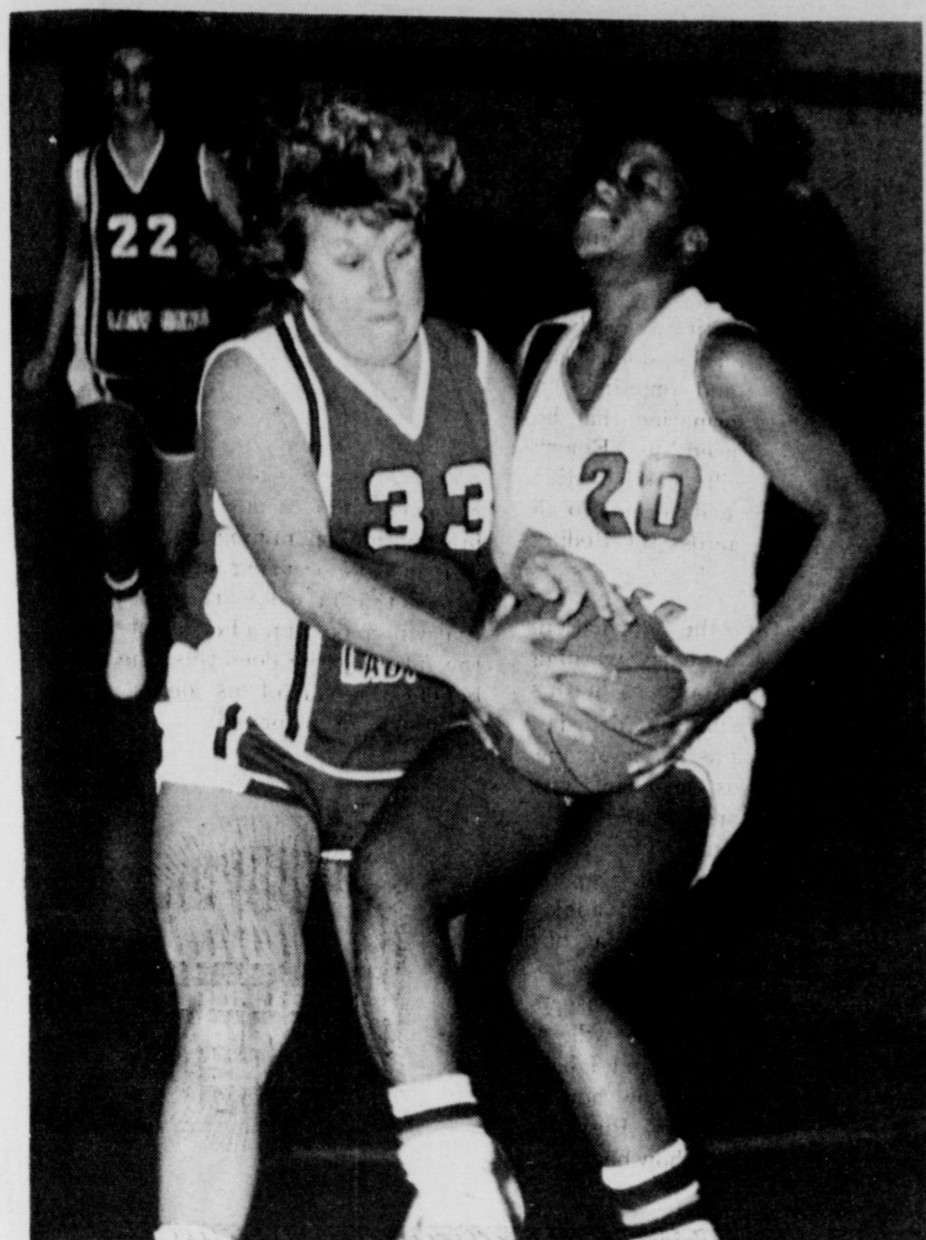

Seat belt law now in effect

Enforcement of the new seat belt law started Sunday, and within a year positive results are expected in the form of reduced fatalities and injuries. If Texas' program is

effective, large reductions are expected.

Motor vehicle crashes are the leading cause of violent deaths for people between the ages of six and 50 in the United States. In 1984, 44,241 people lost their lives in vehicle crashes in the nation.

It is expected that safety belts could prevent 40 to 50 percent of the traffic fatalities and reduce the number of serious injuries by 45 to 55 percent.

The current economic losses, nationwide, resulting from traffic crashes exceed \$65-billion each year. . . these losses come back to citizens in many forms including higher insurance premiums.

The New York seat belt law has an impressive record. A survey in New York in October, 1984, before the law went into effect, showed only a 16 percent usage rate by drivers and their front seat passengers. In March, 1985, after the law had been in effect only three months, the use rate jumped to about 60 percent. More important, the state reported an 18 percent decline in occupant fatalities during the first six months the new law was in effect when compared to the same period in 1984.

As of September, 1985, 13 states have enacted seat belt laws, following New York's lead. Many other states are expected to enact similar laws during their 1986 legislative sessions.

Most of the opposition to such laws come from individuals and groups who raise the question of infringement on personal freedoms. However, states have always exercised powers relating to the health and safety of their citizens, including regulation of motor vehicle operation. In short, the driver's freedom of choice must be balanced against the rights of other people. . . the right, for example, not to be burdened by the over \$65-billion annual social cost of motor vehicle accidents, deaths and injuries.
