# Consumer Opinion Survey to be conducted here

Almost 100 Iowa Park and area residents will be asked to participate in a Consumer Opinion Survey, sponsored by the Iowa Park Chamber of Commerce and conducted by Jim Mallett of the Community Resource Development Office, Extension Service, Texas A&M Univ.

Seven different groups of 12 persons will be invited to be interviewed by Mallett, either Jan. 9 or 10. Each session is to last

approximately an hour and a half. The questions will center on the topic of where people shop, how often, why they shop where they do, etc.

Directors of the Chamber decided to have such a survey in an attempt to understand shopping habits and how changes and improvements locally might influence more shopping in Iowa Park.

During the interviews, Mallett will

ask questions and seek responses from each of the participants. The interviews will be recorded on tape, but no one's name will be in the transcripts which will be furnished not only to the Chamber but to individual businesses identified.

Local merchants are being given an opportunity to submit questions Mallett will incorporate with his own professional questions.

Mallett in the past six months has conducted similar surveys in Henrietta and Burkburnett. Both were coordinated through the local Extension Service offices. Barbara Cornelius, Wichita County agent, is coordinating the effort here.

Letters will be mailed this weekend from the Iowa Park Chamber to almost 100 persons, making up a cross

section of the community, to participate. Members of the Opinion Survey

committee include Kenneth Via, Tommy Key, Phil Welch, Frank Gossett and Bob Hamilton.

## Hunter seeks judge's post

Wichita County Judge Tom Bacus submitted his resignation to commissioners' court Tuesday, and Iowa Park Mayor Tim Hunter wants to succeed him.

Bacus tendered his resignation, effective immediately, so he can be considered for appointment to the county's second court-at-law bench. State law prohibits him from holding one position while applying for another.

Hunter, who will complete his first term as mayor Iowa Park in April, said he filled out an application form Tuesday morning, so he could be considered to fulfill Bacus' term.

Because the Experiment Station here will be closed Feb. 1, Hunter, the manager, has been considering a move within the Extension Service and employment elsewhere. He had said he did not want to move from here.

Bacus' salary was raised to \$37,708 when the 1986 budget was prepared.

## Food, toy distribution for needy

Food baskets, including chickens, will be distributed at 10 a.m. Friday to 50 needy families by the Iowa Park Ministerial Alliance Food Pantry.

Those receiving the Christmas foods are families eligible for USDA commodities. Distribution will be at the First Christian Church.

In addition, the organization is to deliver at least two Christmas gifts to 91 children. Deliveries are to be accomplished by Monday.

Forty seven youths and adults collected over 1,000 staple food items over the weekend, while 15 more adults sorted and boxed the items for distribution.

The volunteers represented 10 local churches.

## Youth begins rabies shots

Iowa Parkan Greg Ross began a series of seven rabies prevention shots Friday, after having been bitten by a dog Dec. 6.

Ross, 17, was working as a sack boy at King's Food Store when he was bitten on the hand by a dog, described as looking like a German Shepherd. He went inside to wash the bite, but when he returned outside, the car and dog were gone.

He attempted to find the owner, through publicity, to determine when the dog last received a rabies shot. Unsuccessful, and his safe period expiring, he began his shots at Park Clinic.

Receiving three shots the first day, he received another Monday, will take another tomorrow, still another Dec. 27, and his final shot Jan. 6.

## Monday deadline for donations

Deadline for donations of canned foods and toys at the Iowa Park Police Dept., for distribution to less fortunate families, is Monday, according to Chief Bob Dean.

A box is located in the department entrance, which is open 24 hours a day.

The concert should last one hour with the junior high playing first. Admission is free.

## Library may be open to public in two weeks

Tom Burnett Memorial Library could possibly be open to the public in two weeks.

City administrator James Barrington said architect Don Daugherty was inspecting the renovation work yesterday, for the second "pass-through," to see if all the work has been completed.

Daugherty had made his first "pass-through" a couple of weeks earlier, but said he found only a few items that were to be completed or corrected.

Council members and Friends of the Library members all have said they wanted the structure to be

completely finished before any furniture or books are moved into the new facility.

The old library, the former home economics building across the street west from junior high school, has been closed to the public since Nov. 1, while preparations for the move were made.

A Wichita Falls moving firm has offered to do the moving work, using their own equipment and personnel.

Barrington said, pending Daugherty's approval of the building, the transfer "hopefully will be late this week." If so, he hoped everything could be ready to open the library to

the public by Jan. 2.

The old library building has been leased by the school district and is supposed to be vacated by Dec. 28.

Formal dedication of the new library is being planned during the spring.

Numerous inquiries have already been received by the city and Friends of the Library from groups and organizations wanting to use the upstairs meeting room. A policy was approved by the city council. It states:

Finger foods brought by the members were served with spiced tea to close the meeting.



Beat first five ingredients in small mixing bowl at high speed until smooth. Combine water and gelatin and let stand 5 minutes. Place over simmering heat until gelatin dissolves. Beat gelatin mixture into cream cheese mixture until smooth. Blend in sour cream, fold in whipped topping. Spoon 1 cup cherry pie filling into crust. Top with cream cheese mixture and refrigerate until set.

Top with remaining cherry pie filling. Garnish with additional whipped topping.

## APPLESAUCE NUT BREAD

- 1 cup sugar
- 1/2 cup salad oil
- 3 Tbl. milk
- 1 tsp. soda
- 1/4 tsp. salt
- 1/4 tsp. nutmeg
- 1/4 cup firmly packed brown sugar
- 1/2 tsp. cinnamon
- 1 (8 oz.) jar applesauce
- 2 cups all-purpose flour
- 1/2 tsp baking powder
- 1/2 tsp. cinnamon

1 cup chopped pecans, divided  
Combine 1 cup sugar, applesauce, oil, eggs, and milk; mix well. Combine flour, soda, baking powder, salt, 1/2 tsp. cinnamon and nutmeg; add to sugar mixture, mixing well. Stir in 1/2 cup nuts. Spoon batter into greased 9 1/2 x 5 1/2 x 2 1/4 loaf pan.

Combine brown sugar, 1/2 tsp. cinnamon, and 1/4 cup nuts; sprinkle over batter. Bake at 350 degrees for 1 hour. Cover loosely with foil wrap the last 30 minutes of baking time. Cool. Yield 1 loaf.

Whip 1 pint whipping cream with 1/4 tsp. cinnamon until stiff, fold in drained pineapple. Spread 1/4 filling over 1 layer. Peel and slice 1 banana and arrange on top. Add second layer and repeat until all layers are used. Refrigerate.

### MEETING ROOM POLICY AND APPLICATION

The updated memorial meeting room is available for use by civic, educational, service or cultural groups. It is not to be used for fund-raising or commercial activities. The room is primarily for the use of the Library itself for programs and conferences related to its cultural and educational services.

Regular established Iowa Park organizations may use the room for meetings under the following conditions:

1. Approval is granted for a SINGLE meeting only. The room is not available for the regular business or other meetings of organizations recurring at stated intervals and extending over a long period of time, as such meetings restrict the freedom of the Library in planning and scheduling its own activities.
2. Permission to use the meeting room will not be granted for the discussion of controversial issues unless the program provides for the presentation of both sides and the discussion assumes the nature of an open forum with the presentation of all view points.
3. Sponsors, Hosts or Hostesses are particularly warned of their responsibility to insure that no damage including food or drink stains are incurred.
4. Meetings held during regular Library hours will be charged a \$10.00 deposit, which will be refunded if the room is left clean and undamaged.
5. Meetings held at times other than when the Library is open will be charged \$20.00 for utilities plus the \$10.00 janitor fee and a \$5.00 key deposit. The janitor fee will be refunded if the room is left clean and undamaged; the key deposit will be refunded if the key is left in the book return depository upon leaving the building.
6. The sponsor of each group using the room is responsible for informing the Library Coordinator of the number of persons that attended a particular meeting.
7. Children's and young people's meetings must be sponsored by an adult over twenty-one years of age. At least one adult per ten children must be present.
8. Scheduling will be done on a first-come basis and no more than two meetings per week may be scheduled by any one group. There can be no continuous blocking of the room.

The promotion of "smokeless" tobacco products in recent years has really increased its use. Especially by the young people, who are not in style unless they have a worn round spot at the hip pocket.  
Professional athletes have found these television commercials a good source of additional income. These outstanding athletes are looked up to by the young and they take the attitude that "if it's OK for them to use it - then it's OK for me." The Federal government has not as yet forced the labeling of the product, but that does not mean that it is not harmful.  
Snuff has been associated with cancer of the jaw, teeth, tongue, and other parts of the mouth. It also has been associated with chronic periodontal disease and loose teeth. A few years ago "they" called it a bad habit, but now we know that it is not a "bad habit" - it becomes a true addiction.  
Recently one of my teenage patients came in because he was having "gum trouble". I could understand why. The area where he constantly kept the tobacco - between the lip and the lower front teeth - was white and looked like cauliflower. The gum and bone had been destroyed all across the front of the teeth nearly to the root tips. So far as I know he hasn't quit yet. It's a shame - he has a terrible price to pay that will last the rest of his life.

## Beware winter's health hazards

The temperature doesn't have to be sub-zero to cause two of cold weather's most dangerous health menaces: hypothermia and frostbite. Red Cross emphasizes that both hypothermia and frostbite can be prevented by wearing proper clothing and using common sense.

Hypothermia is the lowering of body temperature. As hypothermia sets in, the core of the body becomes too cold for its vital organs to function properly, often resulting in serious injury or death. There are two types of hypothermia which occur: accidental or chronic, and immersion or acute.

Accidental hypothermia is often experienced by the elderly, disabled, chronically ill, and infants. It can happen even in mildly cold temperatures, especially in elderly persons because their bodies produce less heat and thus give them less resistance to cold.

Immersion hypothermia occurs when body heat is lost rapidly after plunging into cold water. Water conducts heat 25 times faster than air, so the effects of immersion

hypothermia are felt much faster.

Extra caution should be taken by outdoorsmen during the wintertime. Any victim of hypothermia requires immediate medical attention, therefore, it is wise to have extra blankets and clothing on hand in case of an immersion accident. One of the simplest steps to take in preventing accidental hypothermia is dressing warmly in layers of protective clothing.

Frostbite is a condition which requires immediate action; for if not treated immediately, gangrene can set in, and amputation of the limb may be necessary.

All meetings of the board are open to the public.

# City council changes to monthly meetings

The Holliday City Council Monday night in its regular meeting voted to hold regular meetings once a month, instead of twice a month as has been done in the past.

Alderman Elizabeth Gorman brought up the point of the bi-monthly meetings being too short to justify both meetings. She asked the council to consider a monthly meeting.

Council meetings will now be held the third Monday of the month, beginning Jan. 20.

Ordinances calling for the installation of stop signs on the southwest

and southeast corners of Myrtle and Main and on the northeast and northwest corners of Myrtle and Walnut were passed.

Chief of Police Juel Colbert stated that although problems at these intersections had been minor, the potential for major problems was there. He said "I believe that anytime you have a city street going into a state highway, there needs to be a stop sign."

Glenn Woods, member of the Holliday Volunteer Fire Dept. addressed the council on the issue stating that the reason stop signs

were never placed on those intersections was so emergency vehicles could have the right-of-way.

The council passed a resolution authorizing City Administrator Brown Hudson to sign and execute necessary financial arrangements with Interfirst Bank to tentatively purchase a new police car.

The police car has been ordered and was due to arrive Monday, which it had not.

Other business included the council's consent of the utilization of IRA accounts for retirement purposes of the city's volunteer firemen. The City of Holliday does not participate in the fund and individual fireman's participation is optional.

Other items consented were the Water Works Banquet and Firemen's Installation banquet.

The Water Works Banquet will be held Jan. 16 at the Holliday School cafeteria and the Firemen's Installation Banquet will be Feb. 4 at a Wichita Falls restaurant.

## Council creates Parks/Rec Board

The City Council of Holliday recently created a Parks and Recreation Board which shall be responsible for providing the City Council with advice and recommendations on all policies, rules, and regulations to the administration of public parks and recreation programs.

The Board will provide advisory oversight of public playgrounds, athletic fields, recreation centers, and other facilities and activities on any of the properties owned or controlled by the City, or on other properties with the consent of the owners and authorities. The Board will conduct any form of recreation activity that will employ the leisure time of the people in a constructive and wholesome manner.

The Board will submit a proposed budget to the City Council each year, and will make complete annual and other required reports to the City Council.

The Board is authorized to solicit or receive any gifts or bequests of money or other personal property, or any donations to be applied, principal or income, for either temporary or permanent use for playgrounds or other recreational purposes.

The Board is also authorized to work jointly with other City Departments or political subdivisions such as Archer or Wichita Counties and the Texas Parks and Wildlife to provide and establish, operate, conduct, and maintain a supervised recreation system and to acquire, operate, improve, and maintain property, both real and personal, for parks, playgrounds, recreational centers, and other recreational facilities and activities.

Certain risks are inherent in furnishing parks and recreational services, and accidents are inevitable. The City is responsible for protecting members of the general public against injury, and when accidents occur due to the negligence of City personnel, the City can be held accountable. Therefore, City officials

are aware of the potential law suits by persons using parks and recreational facilities and strive to prevent accidents. Care will be taken in constructing, maintaining and repairing equipment and facilities, and periodic inspections will be made.

Protection of individual rights is an important factor, and the following considerations are crucial:

1. Equal access and protection - No person or group may be denied use of recreational facilities, nor will the City construct facilities in such a way that particular segments of the community are denied equal access.

Free speech and assembly - Within the constraints of local scheduling requirements, no group will be denied access to public facilities for the purpose of free speech or expression.

Since the City of Holliday will have a considerable investment in parks and recreation facilities, there is a need for an adequate maintenance program. Otherwise, deterioration will create costly problems.

Several principles will guide the development of a maintenance program:

1. Facilities will be designed with a view toward future requirements. Although a particular design may be creative or innovative, maintenance difficulties can lead to increased costs and deterioration. Therefore, ease of maintenance will be a major design factor.

2. Maintenance will be conducted on a systematic basis. The maintenance schedule will be designed with concern for frequency and amount of use and health, safety and attractiveness of areas.

3. Maintenance equipment must be tightly controlled to prevent theft and abuse.

4. Special attention will be directed to sites where problems have occurred, and efforts initiated to solve and prevent recurrences.

Recreational development principles are:

1. Recreation should be provided for all seasons of the year. Special

recreation programming will be needed during the summer months to absorb the amount of leisure time of children and family groups. However, the recreation needs, particularly of the adults of the Holliday Community, during the winter months, when outdoor activities are at a minimum should not be ignored.

2. Both active and passive recreation need to be provided. While organized sports such as baseball, football, and other similar activities are an essential part of the recreation program, they do not meet the total needs of the various age groups within the region. Many people do not have the interest, the physical capability, or the skill to participate in these more active forms of recreation. They can enjoy watching an exciting game, but they miss the gratifying sense of participation accomplishment experienced by participants.

3. Recreation should be programmed for all age groups. People of different age groups have different interests, abilities, and recreation requirements.

Should citizens of the Holliday region have interest or concerns related to parks and recreational activities, they should contact the Secretary of the Parks Board. The Secretary of the Board prepares the agenda for Board meetings. A copy of the agenda will be posted at City Hall and the Post Office in Holliday 72 hours in advance of any meeting. The Chairperson of the Board may call a special meeting for any purpose, and all meetings will be held in full compliance with the provisions of State Law, and City Ordinances. Any party in interest may appear in his own behalf or be represented by council or agent.

Every proposal submitted for Board action should be made in writing. When any applicant desires to withdraw his or her proposal, he or she may do so by filing a written request to that effect with the Secretary of the Board.

## Yule parade set Saturday

The Holliday Chamber of Commerce will sponsor Holliday's annual Christmas parade beginning at 2 p.m. Saturday at the school, according to Sharon Duke, president. The route for the parade from the

school will be west on South Ave. to Main, north on Main to Myrtle, west on Myrtle to Bois d' Arc, north to Hwy. 277, east on 277 to Main, south on Main to Myrtle, east on Myrtle to Cedar, then south to the school.

Santa Claus is expected to ride in the parade on a fire truck and afterwards, be on hand at the fire station to visit with the children and hand out candy.






