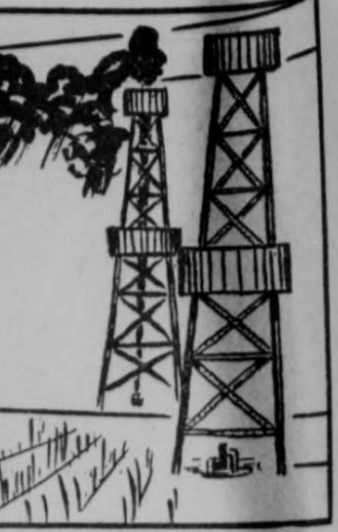

Home Decorations Reflect Intense Christmas Spirit

Do you have the Christmas spirit? If for some reason you do not, we suggest that you drive around over Our Town and feast your eyes upon the decorations that adorn both the exteriors and interiors of nearly every home. Iowa Parkans have gone all out in their efforts to spread cheer and to express sincere wishes for a Merry Christmas to neighbors, friends and strangers in our midst.

There is hardly a home in the vicinity where either a sparkling tree or electric candles cannot be seen through the windows. The wreaths that hang on doors range from evergreen boughs adorned with bows, pine cones and the like, to the most elaborate types, but each is suggestive of the welcome and cheer awaiting everyone who enters the wreathed door.

Some of the most unusual and attractive decorative effects on the outside are to be found at the following homes:

Mr. and Mrs. Ray Shook, 414 W. Texas, have covered their front door with a jolly old Santa. The pine panel to the right of the door has been covered with red olecloth on which appears in large white letters, "Merry Christmas." The scene is lighted at night to give a pleasing effect.

A vivid array of red, blue and green lights distinguishes the home of Mr. and Mrs. E. E. Wallis. The lights extend across the top of the front porch, on the dormers and around the tree on the outside.

Particularly beautiful are the entrance doors and the hurricane lamp at the home of Dr. and Mrs. Gordon G. Clark, which are ornamented with garlands. Underneath the wreath on the livingroom door the word "Noel" adds a joyful expression of the Yuletide.

Rev. and Mrs. M. C. Yeagan have an attractive front door which is framed with a combination of yellow, green and blue lights.

The home of Mrs. Nannie Smith certainly has a big share in reflecting the spirit of Christmas. Through the picture window in the livingroom a large Santa Claus is seen standing by a colorfully decorated tree. All the windows are adorned with especially lovely symbols.

Both front doors at the Floyd Busby home have taken on the appearance of gaily wrapped Christmas packages. On the highway entering Iowa Park from the east the three lovely new homes which belong to Mr. and Mrs. Jim Fish, Mr. and Mrs. Billy Fish and Mr. and Mrs. R. A. Ashton are tastefully decorated to reflect the beauty and solemnity of the season.

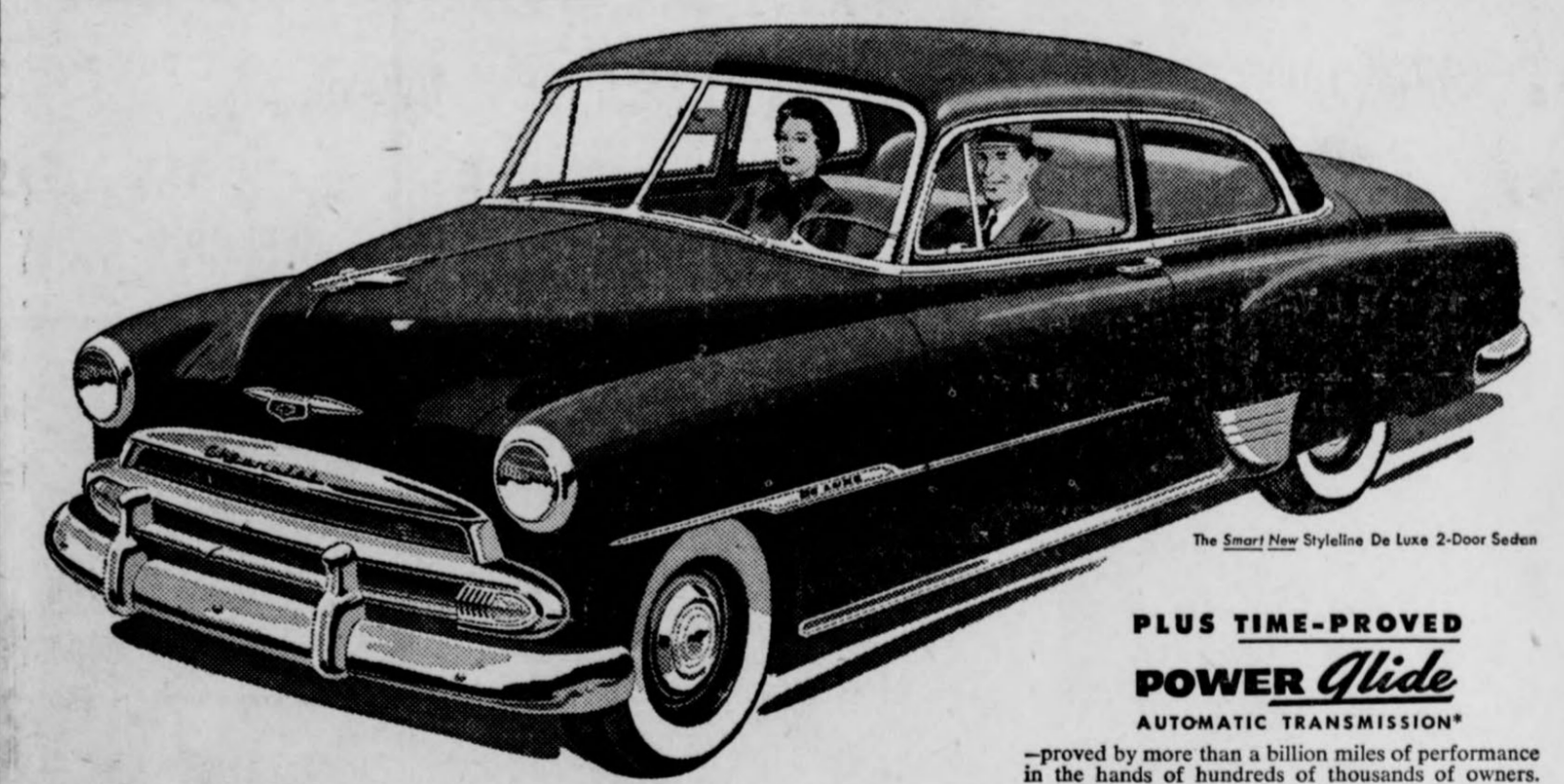

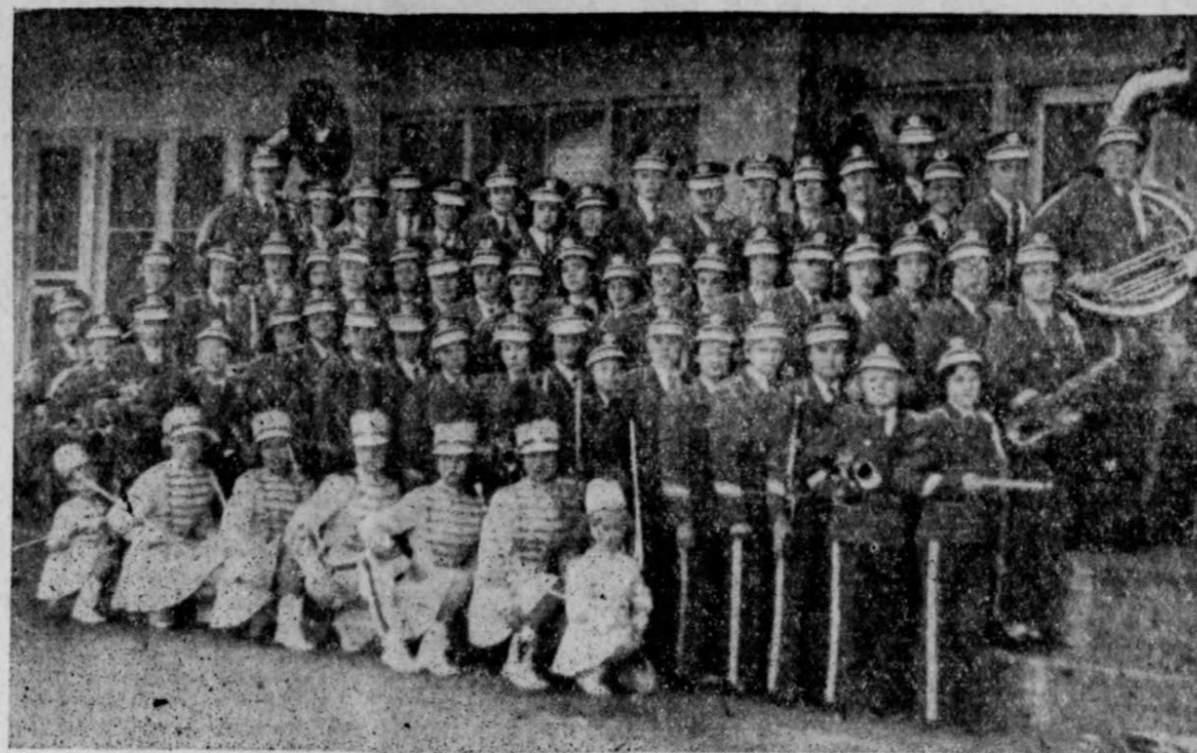
Eidon has been going with some girls at Wichita. He is one boy we would like to see with one of our own girls. He could if he would just get up the urge, couldn't he, girls?
