Council to consider work on Johnson Road

Among the topics to be discussed Monday when the city council meets are work on the project of rebuilding part of Johnson Road, and the parking lot created when some old buildings were razed.

The meeting is to begin at 7 p.m. in council chambers.

Aldermen will consider a proposal of a change order on the Johnson Road contract, to allow the contractor to relocate two sewer lines along the road, instead of the city crew doing the work.

Also on the project, aldermen will consider authorizing payment of part of the engineering fee on the project. Total fee is approximately \$40,000.

A cost estimate of \$4,700 to pave the parking lot west of city hall

will be considered for authorization.

Additionally, the city has been asked to share in the cost of cosmetic improvements of the bare wall left exposed when the structures were taken down.

Other items on Monday's agenda include:

- * consider awarding contract for ground maintenance of city parks;
- * nominate a member to the 911 (emergency telephone) advisory committee;
- * discuss with architect Don Daugherty plans for exterior improvements to city hall;
- * and discuss a proposal to exempt schools and churches from permit fees for construction inspections.

Car stolen, man jailed

A spree of car thefts by a young Wichita Falls man, which spread to Iowa Park, has apparently ended.

Ross Allen Sumpter, 17, remained in Wichita County jail yesterday facing at least two charges from here, and possibly more from Wichita Falls.

A white Camero Z28 was discovered missing Friday morning from Bates Chevrolet, and a report was put out on the law enforcement network.

Shortly before noon that day, Wichita Falls police called the local station to inform them they had the car and a suspect, Sumpter.

The suspect had reportedly been at the Wichita Falls station to see what trouble he was in, after being found in possession of another car, this one from Wichita Falls, which also had been stolen. It was a Z28.

The officer calling here said he had followed Sumpter to the police station door to see what he was driving, and it matched the description of the Bates vehicle.

Sumpter was taken before a justice of the peace in Wichita Falls on the theft charge, and placed under \$3,500 bond.

But he was taken before Justice of the Peace Virgil Hill here, on a charge of burglary, and another

\$10,000 bond was levied on that charge.

The burglary charge stems from a window at Bates building being broken out, and entry made to obtain keys to the stolen vehicle.

Also possibly involved in the series of thefts was a 1984 Thunderbird found abandoned in the Texas Electric parking lot, which is next to the Bates business. It also is reportedly stolen.

Herman Escue told police Monday a Honda dirt bike had been taken from his home.

Wednesday evening of last week, Wichita County Sheriff's Office informed the local police of having arrested Jerry Lynn Brasier on a felony warrant issued here.

The charge against Brasier, 30, is "possession of controlled substances: amphetamines."

All teacher contracts okayed

Besides renewing contracts for all teachers currently employed in the district, school trustees Tuesday night authorized hiring of three additional teachers, extended hours for some, and increased bonuses for 13 involved in extracurricular activities.

Contracts, added duties and bonus voting came after an hour and a half executive session.

Every teacher is to receive the district's above-state supplement as last year, including \$1,500 for those residing outside the district and \$1,800 for those living in the district.

Trustees approved a motion to hire an additional science teacher for the high school faculty, as well as two additional first grade teachers at

Kidwell.

In the same motion, they approved making the Kidwell music and physical education teacher positions full-time instead of part-time.

Band directors Greg Miller and Ed Hefti will be paid for 10 additional days work, to compensate for early starts in the fall. Also, Hefti's bonus was increased \$700 annually.

Elementary and high school librarians will be paid for an additional five days work next year (the same was offered for the junior high position, but reportedly was declined).

An additional \$800 bonus will be paid both vocational agriculture teachers, George Brandt and George Martin, trustees voted.

Ten junior and senior high foot-

ball coaches will be paid \$50 for each of the four additional days they spend preparing for next season at a local clinic.

Also, all coaches' bonuses were increased an additional \$700, it was voted.

Tim Clark, having been assigned an additional sports responsibility, was granted another \$500 bonus for next year.

BAND PURCHASES

Trustees approved a proposal to apply money budgeted for band uniform purchase not used to be applied on the purchase of instruments.

When this year's budget was approved, \$46,000 was to be for new high school band uniforms. How-

ever, when the bids were received, the actual cost was \$31,887, and trustees were asked to apply \$9,752 of the \$14,112 balance to buying instruments.

That amount, along with the \$10,000 already budgeted for instrument purchases, plus \$2,000 more donated by the Band Boosters, made up \$21,752 requested for new instruments and \$900 for repairs.

Board members did not approve, however, a proposal by cheerleader sponsor Carey Roberts to permit cheerleaders hold an additional fund-raising project.

Trustees said they wanted to stick with their policy of permitting only one such project per student organization.

It was suggested, however, that a study be made whether the school should fund cheerleader expenses in the future, instead of their having to pay their own uniform costs.

One trustee suggested if the school did fund the uniforms, six per cheerleader might be more than they wanted, even if five were "used."

Miss Roberts told the board each cheerleader spends approximately \$350 her first year and \$100 the second year. She said she feared some girls who wanted to be a cheerleader might not be able to afford such high costs.

Presently, cheerleaders are allowed to sell ads in the football program to finance their expenses for attending cheerleader school each summer.

A proposal to permit VICA members of the cosmetology department to have a fund-raiser to benefit the Humane Society was approved.

Dawna Bradford, VICA president, proposed in writing that her organization be allowed to hold a "Cut-A-Thon" April 12, charging a minimum donation of \$2.

Also approved was a proposal to permit seventh grade students take a trip to Ft. Richardson and Ft. Belknap, as part of the state's anniversary observation and as a history project.

Three buses would be required to carry the students. Dates of either April 11 or 25 were proposed, but not yet set.

Mirrors are to be attached to the front fenders of all school buses, to permit driver view immediately in front of their vehicles, Robert Palmer, assistant superintendent said.

He said the safety measure was prompted by a situation that took place recently in Wichita Falls.

Locals dominate show

Iowa Park's domination of the Wichita County Junior Livestock Show was even greater this year than last, according to animals placing in the annual premium sale.

Of the 179 animals sold Monday night, 90 were entered by Iowa Park area students.

This compares with 80 of 174 reported last year.

There actually were two more animals slated for the sale from here, but they and one other were withdrawn because of multiple entries by the same exhibitors just before the sale got underway.

Supporters of the premium sale were apprehensive about Monday's event, in view of the economic situation being experienced by the oil industry.

However, the auction crossed \$91,322, only about \$9,000 less than last year. And that figure will narrow, because the "add on" money

was reported in last year's total, and wasn't in the \$91,322.

Leading animals from Iowa Park in the sale included:

Jason Young's grand champion market pig, bought by Western Supply and Joe Neil Texaco for \$1,050;

Grand champion turkey tom shown by Susan Howell and purchased by the Wichita County Young Farmers for \$550;

Grand champion turkey hen shown by George Howell, bought for \$750 by McWhorters Meat Market;

Tammy Reitz' grand champion pen of broilers, sold for \$350 to Stanley Williamson;

Champion pen of fryer rabbits shown by Kristy Riggins, sold to the Bargain Bin and the Wichita Valley Rabbit Breeders Association for \$700;

Grand champion meat goat, shown by Monte Medina, sold to Vernon Savings and Loan Associa-

tion for \$400;

Sherry Holmes' reserve champion turkey tom, bought for \$500 by Raymond's Machine Co. of Electra;

And the reserve turkey hen shown by Roy Hollis that sold for \$550.

Prior to the start of the auction, the Wichita County Junior Livestock Show board of directors presented Stanley Williamson a plaque in recognition of his 17 years support of the show sale and the youth of the county.

Prior to the sale's start, prospective buyers were fed a free chili and bean meal by members of the Wichita County Young Farmers.

News in Brief

Railroad crossing work to begin

City work crews will begin a month-long project of rebuilding the street approaches at railroad crossings Monday, according to Administrator James Barrington.

The council voted to rebuild the crossing approaches on Victoria, Wall, Jackson and Bell, and paving with concrete instead of asphalt.

Each crossing is expected to take

two weeks, Barrington said.

So the Victoria crossing will be closed from Monday until April 4; Wall April 7-18; Jackson April 21-May 2, and Bell May 5-16.

Since Yosemite is a designated farm to market road, work on that crossing is the responsibility of the state, Barrington said.

Prices for the fund-raising event

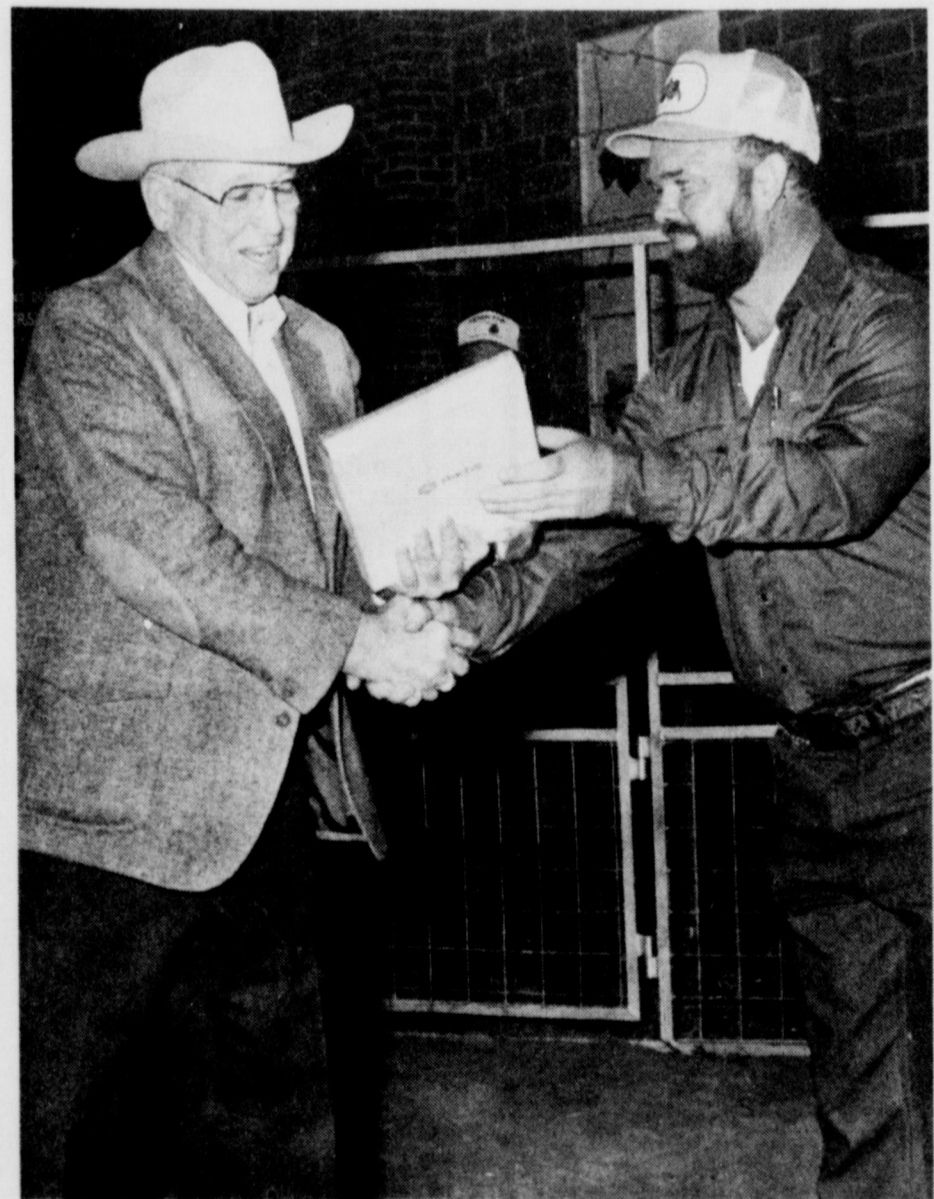
include \$2.50 for adults (11 up), \$1.50 for children five through 10, and children under four will be fed free.

Lightning damaging, but also beneficial

Mrs. Vernon Gilbert gave an interesting program on "Lightning" for the Iowa Park Garden Club in a meeting held Friday morning at the home of Mrs. Don Owens. The co-hostess was Mrs. Kathleen Hatten.

Mrs. Gilbert stated that lightning could be very dangerous but that it is also beneficial. She said that it is estimated to strike 100 times every second and cause 250 injuries and more than \$100-million damage each year.

As she told the benefits of lightning, she quoted Arlo Richardson, state climatologist at Utah State Univ. who said that the earth's surface receives the equivalent of about 12 pounds of fertilizer per acre each year. These nutrients act to green up lawns and fields and play a vital part in the growth of trees and plants in the forests and ranges.

Mrs. Gilbert said that ammonia dissolves in rain and becomes ammonia hydroxide. The oxides of nitrogen are carried to the earth by rainwater to form soluble nitrates. The valuable fertilizer "fixed" by the lightning process does the work of man-made nitrogen within limits of the amount brought to the ground by rain.

Mrs. Charlie Lee presided for the business meeting. Mrs. Jerry Reed, chaplain, gave the thought for the day. Members answered roll call with naming their favorite shrub.

Mrs. Michael Hodson brought an orchid plant for the horticulture specimen which had 14 or 15 blooms on it.

An executive meeting was held before the regular meeting to discuss by-laws pertaining to memorials.

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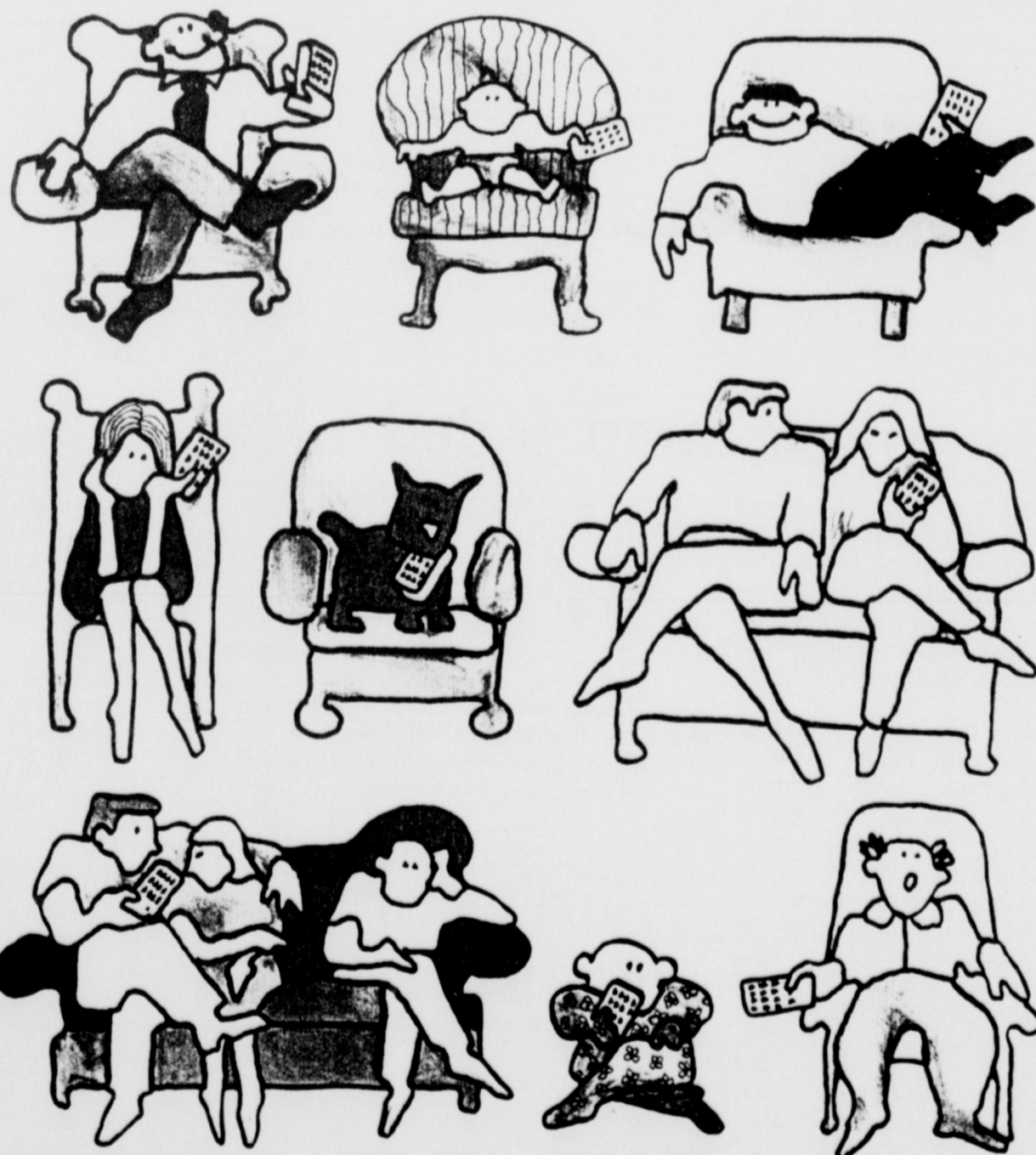
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Conservation UMW topic

Mrs. Betty Dyer gave the conclusion of the study "Caring for God's Earth" by Carolyn Englehardt, Tuesday morning for the United Methodist Women. She began the study by reading the following paragraph taken from an article "Healing a Damaged Earth" by Edna McCallion:

"We must work together to understand that the earth is a unity of its parts: water, wind, soil, animals and humans working inter-dependently. Today, the single great imperative for everyone is to realize that the universe is an interacting community of beings bound together in an inseparable relationship in space and time. If this is realized, healing the damaged earth can take place."

Discussing air, water and land, Mrs. Dyer gave graphic descriptions of the abuse and the damaging things being done to our land as she moved from one area to another. She said that excluding air, water is the most essential resource for sustaining life."

Of all life on the water surface of the earth, we human beings have been the least willing to preserve the supplies of water upon which we depend to sustain us," she remarked.

Continuing, she said that scarcity of water leads to conflict and that nations all over the world are in conflict over which waters belong to them. She also stated that under the existing circumstances, conservation of land, water and air is a necessary way of life, and that the people of this nation must realize the importance of conserving water.

Mrs. Dyer listed two major necessities as conservation of water in homes, factories and on farms, and regional planning. She warned that if water is not conserved that it may create problems which human history has not been confronted with before. Quoting Benjamin Franklin, she said "When the well is dry we know the worth of water."

The closing remarks were given to the discussion of the harmful effects of pesticides, especially in our foods and in the plague of acid rain.

Paris trip is program

Leon Biddy presented a travelog slide show of a trip he and his wife, Susan, made to Paris, France for the Philia Study Club program at a meeting held Monday evening at the Tom Burnett Memorial Library.

The slides began with Arc de Triumphe which stands at the western end of Champs Elysees. Emperor Napoleon I started building the hugh stone Arch in 1806, and it was completed in 1836. The Arch is in the center of Place Charles de Gaulles and the French equivalent of the "Tomb of the Unknown Soldier" is in its center. Twelve streets radiate from the Arch like spokes on a wheel.

Biddy said that viewing the lights of the lovely Champs Elysees at night, it is easy to understand why Paris has been given the nickname "City of Light." He said that floodlights shine on Paris' many magnificent palaces, monuments and bridges.

Continuing with the slides, he showed the Eiffel Tower, the symbol of Paris, which was built in 1889 for the World's Fair and that attracts over two-million people to the city each year; Notre Dame Cathedral which stands on an island in the Seine River. The cathedral was completed in the 1300s and is known for its majestic stained glass windows and intricate carvings.

The other slides includes those of the Louvre Palace, one of the largest in the world, dated about 1200 when it was built for a royal fort. It has been remodeled and extended by the many French rulers and houses one of the world's largest art museums. Another was Basiliqne du Sacre Cover, a cathedral that was built at the highest point in Paris and is unusual with its onion-shaped dome and bell tower.

The Biddys also made short tours

to Versailles, Fountainbleau and Dijon.

During a business meeting conducted by Mrs. Biddy, officers for 1986-88 were elected. These included Mrs. Thomas Johnson, president; Judy Spring, vice president; Mmes. David Springer, treasurer; Jim Rinehart, secretary; Jack Jordan Jr. historian; Raydean Mattis, parliamentarian.

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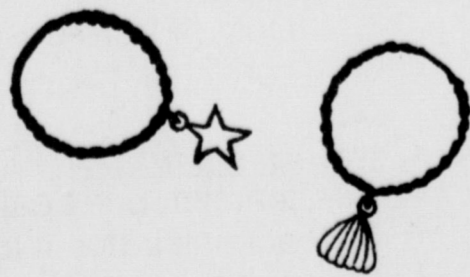

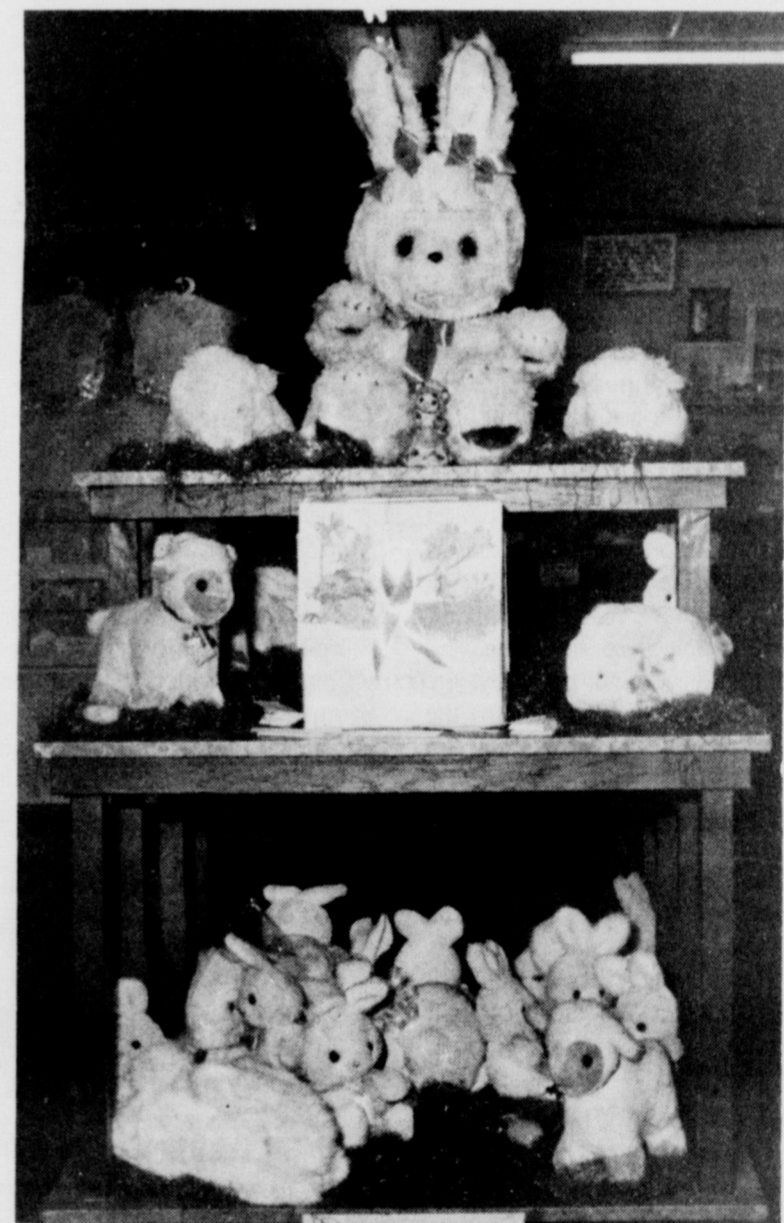

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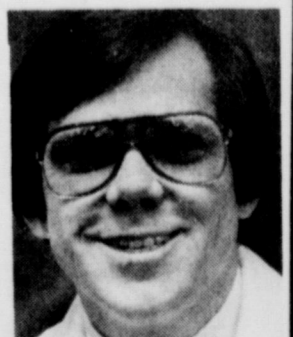
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As I See It....

Do you suppose this cold front that hit yesterday is the one we usually look for at Easter? We usually expect it to hit with 10 days before or after Easter, which is Mar. 30 this year.

Sure hope it doesn't get cold enough to damage any of the fruit. And I'm sure going to be upset if it

damages my asparagus, this being our first year of production after waiting three years since planting.

Boy, does it sound silly for me to be worrying about something like my asparagus plants, when we've got so many people either out of work or facing that prospect, due to the oil market situation.

I'm hearing some real horror stories from areas other than here, but based on those I've heard, I guess prospects for unemployment locally are just around the corner.

One man said recently he believed Jacksboro would be a ghost town in a year or so.

We can only hope something happens to improve the oil market in the near future.

And a bumper crop, with some decent prices for our farmers would also be appreciated, for a change.

Chamber pays old bill

Iowa Park Chamber of Commerce board of directors Monday voted to pay a three-year-old bill to the City of Iowa Park.

President Rip Smith said he had been informed at a recent city council meeting that the Chamber had not paid its pledged amount for roof repairs done to the overall building in 1983.

Smith told directors the organization still owed \$600 of a \$900 bill incurred when the city had a roofing crew rework the building.

The subject of the bill came up, Smith told directors, when he was asked to attend a portion of the council meeting dealing with exter-

ior work being planned.

While the Chamber building is attached to the city hall and is of similar brick and construction, the structure occupied by the Chamber belongs to the organization, not the city.

In other business action, board members approved a proposal to set the annual Clean-Up Day April 26, and to require organizations to pay a \$100 fee to have club signs put on the Chamber's welcome signs.

Date of the Clean-Up Day was chosen to coincide with state and national promotions. Carol Hayslip was named chairman of this year's project.

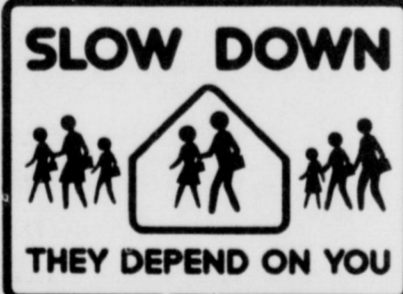
Directors voted to bill two organizations for signs put on the Chamber's welcoming signs, or they would be removed.

Worth Quoting

A week never goes by that our news desk isn't crossed by "news releases" from the Governor's office. We get'em from lots of politicians and people who want to be politicians (although it's hard for me to imagine anyone actually wanting to be a politician.)

You can always tell when a lower politician (state senator for instance) is looking to move up in the ranks...say to Attorney General or one of the State's judgeships. About a year before that office is up for grabs he will inundate newspaper editors across the state with "news release" on everything from his being elected a deacon at his church to his daughter's piano recital.

The latest release from Governor Mark (Whoop-T-Do) White (and listen teachers, I hate to say I told you so in 1982, but I TOLD YOU SO) is another example of how I

believe incumbent politicians use their office as a reelection tool and do it state expense.

The release concerns the recent Governor's Executive Order directing all state agencies and universities to reduce spending 13 percent for the current two-year budget period.

Okay, I'm all for any governor putting the clamps on spending. But, White goes too far. By the end of the first page of his "news release" he ends up telling us what a good job he has done.

We quote from the letter: "In my two sessions as Governor, we faced a \$7.2 billion revenue shortfall from earlier projections. Still, we achieved a balanced budget and kept budget increases over the four-year period to 38.2 percent compared to my predecessor, who in his two sessions increased state spending by 56.9 percent."

I might inject here, that White's "predecessor" could also be his main opponent in this year's general election, Bill Clements. Just a few days ago, reports from some re-search company splattered the pages of Texas newspapers stating that a recent survey showed former Governor Bill Clements was the "only candidate" which stood a chance at unseating Gov. White.

This seven page "news release" refers to Clements' administration graphically twice more. We might add this news release (which we personally see in another light) was printed on State stationary, mailed in a State of Texas envelope and stamped with "State of Texas Official Business Penalty for Private Use." The State's postage meter tallied 39 cents to mail this one letter.

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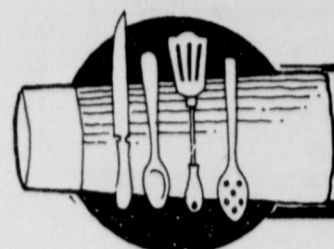
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Cook of the Week

Bread has perhaps influenced history more than any other food. It has played an important role in the rise and fall of civilizations, and each nation has its own distinctive bread developed to fit the customs and traditions of the land.

Even young homemakers with less experience in cooking know that the memory of a cozy kitchen filled with the warm fragrance of freshly baked bread is unforgettable. Today's homemakers can make it much more easily and quickly than ever before.

The methods of preparation, cooking, and the ingredients used in bread making have improved through the years. The bread of primitive man was unleavened, flat and hard and made by mixing pulverized grain with water and spread on hot stones. There is evidence that the Egyptians

2 cloves garlic, crushed
1/4 t black pepper
1 - 8 oz. box lasagne noodles
1 1/2 t salt
1/2 t oregano
1 1/2 lb. Mozzarella cheese
1/2 cup Parmesan cheese
1 - 16 oz. cottage cheese
1 pkg. spaghetti sauce

Saute meat and garlic. Drain fat, add tomatoes and spices. Simmer 30 minutes. Cook noodles for 15 minutes, drain. Butter casserole dish. Bottom layer noodles, then add Mozzarella cheese, sauce, and Parmesan cheese. Repeat, ending with cheese on top then bake 20 minutes at 325 degrees uncovered. (Feel free to add more cheese, as these amounts are minimum).

SQUASH CASSEROLE

Cook 3 lbs. yellow squash, cut in small pieces and mash lightly with fork. Add:

3 eggs, beaten
1 can evaporated milk
3 level T flour
4 t salt
3 T sugar
1 t pepper
3/4 cup onion

Pour into a 9x13 greased baking dish and bake 30 minutes at 425 degrees.

FLOUR TORTILLA APPETIZER

1 - 8 oz. cream cheese
3 T medium Pace Picante Sauce
1 t lemon juice
1 green onion, chopped
1 small jalapeno pepper
6 flour tortillas

Allow cheese to become soft. Mix all ingredients together. Spread on tortillas. Roll it up, chill over night, slice in 1/4 or 1/2 inch slices. Place toothpick in center so that they won't unroll.

CHOCOLATE PIE

(Double this recipe for a deep dish pie)
1 cup sugar
3 T flour
1 1/3 cup milk
3 eggs
3 heaping T cocoa
1/2 t vanilla

Mix dry ingredients. Separate eggs, reserving for meringue. Mix milk and yolks together. Pour liquid over dry ingredients, cook on low-medium heat until thick. Pour filling into a baked pie crust and top with meringue. Bake until meringue is golden brown.

MERINGUE

3 egg whites
6 T sugar
1/4 t cream of tartar

Beat until stiff in a glass or stainless steel bowl.

LASAGNE

1 lb. ground meat or more
1 8 oz. tomato sauce
2 1/2 cups stewed tomatoes

Old school building plaque returned

After being buried some 31 years and unearthed for nine, a heavy bronze plaque that originally hung in Holliday's old high school building is back in the hands of school officials and plans are being made to erect a historical marker.

When the old Holliday High School building, which was built in 1941, burned in 1946, a plaque bearing the names of school board trustees and superintendents of that time was buried in the clean-up process.

The enrollment at that time was somewhere around 300 students.

In 1977, 31 years later, the plaque was dug up by Jim Lynch, a

contractor, who was working on the site to build the present high school. Upon discovering the plaque, Lynch contacted school officials, who showed interest in the return of the plaque, but nothing further.

Three months ago, Supt. Dan Owen found out about the plaque by a school employee and actively sought to regain it. Owens said he plans to put up a historical monument close to the school sometime in July.

Those listed on the plaque include board members James E. Wood, president, A.B. Shields, W.J. Bingham, Chas. V. Lough, secretary,

Sam. R. Williams, Cletus J. Meyer and A.D. Walker. Also named on the plaque were W.S. Thomas, school superintendent, and I.Y. Slover, building superintendent.

Of those listed, W.S. Thomas and Cletus J. Meyer are the only ones living.

Thomas is living in Wichita Falls after being retired 16 years in July.

Ironically, Owen got his first job in education when he was hired by Thomas in 1957 to work for the Holliday Independent School District.

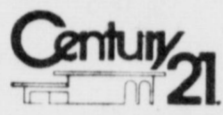

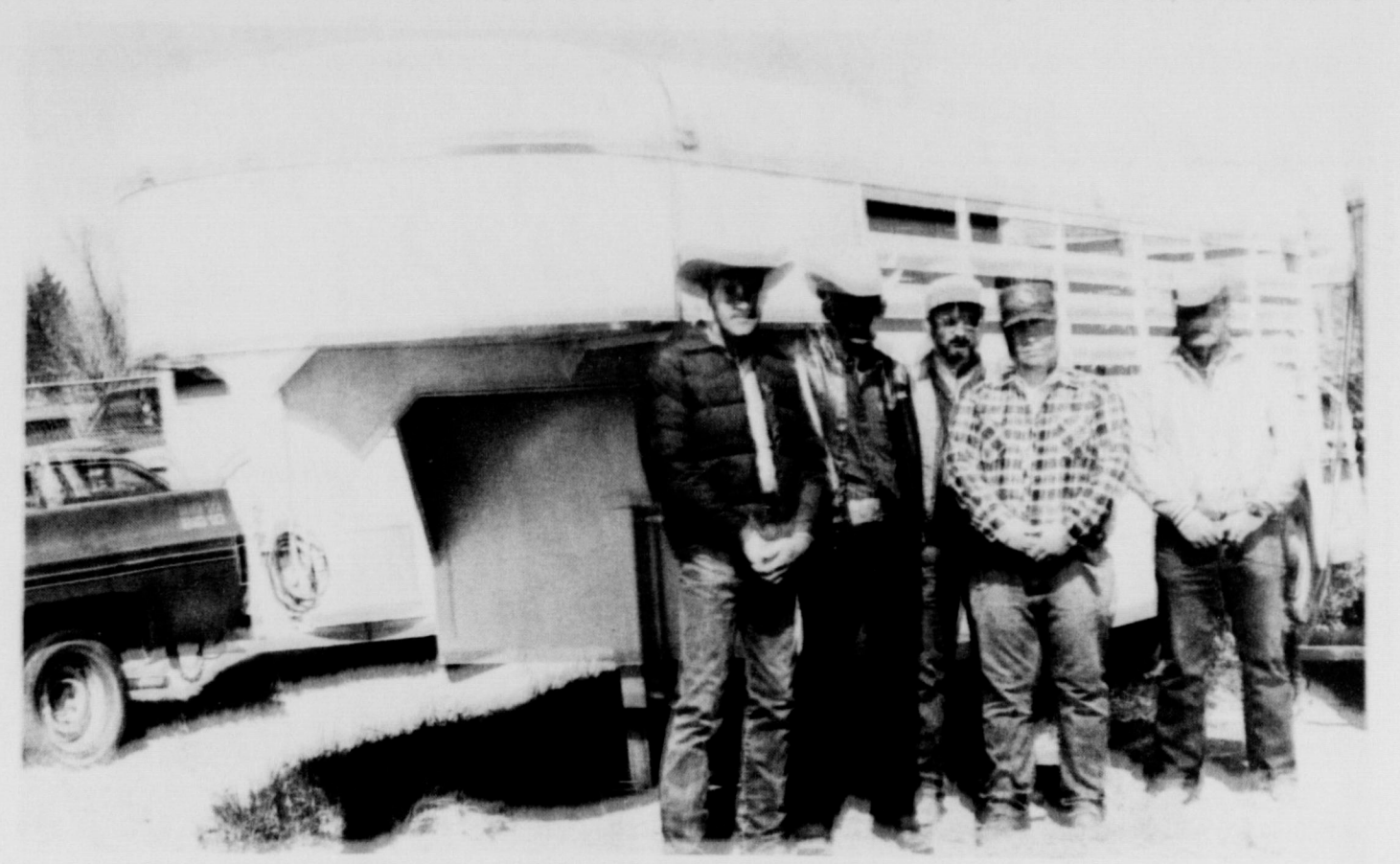
