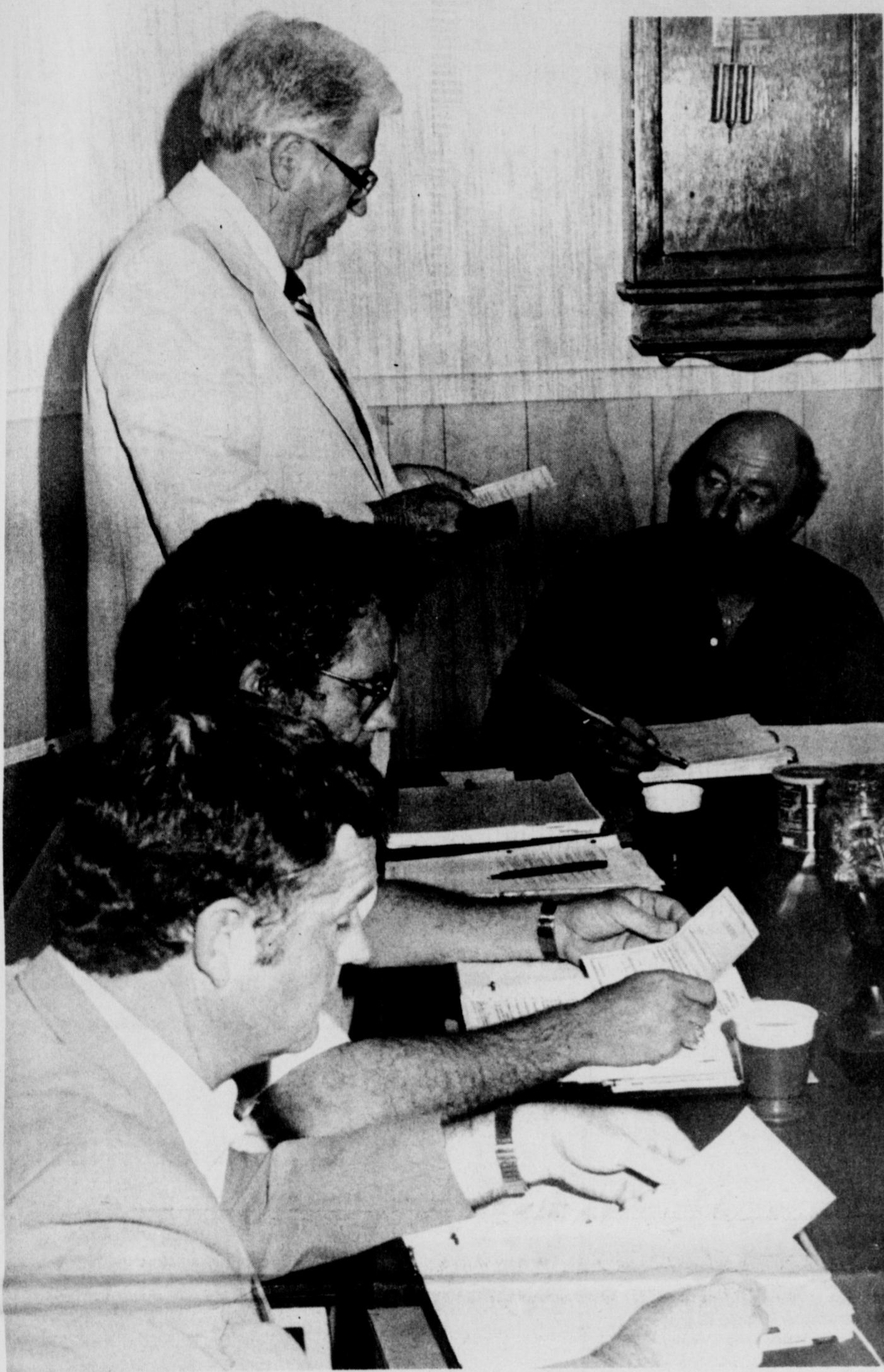

14 teachers added on career ladder

School trustees Tuesday night approved employment of auxiliary personnel for the 1986-87 school year, and added 14 new teachers to the career ladder.

The action followed the canvassing of Saturday's election results, which was followed by a reorganization of the board's officers.

Jimmy Howell, who was one of three trustees elected Saturday, was elected board president. He was nominated by Roy Boutwell, who has served in that capacity several years.

Rex Wells was voted vice president and Marilyn Hale secretary.

The 14 additional teachers added to the career ladder, which was created by House Bill 72, brings the total to 44 faculty members receiving additional salary, under the guidelines of the bill.

Voting on the auxiliary employee hirings and career ladder came after a 39-minute executive session.

Following those two votes, trustees also approved a proposal to delete from its policy a provision that gives all full-time employees a maximum of 15 days sick leave.

A major portion of the meeting duration was dedicated to explanation and eventual approval of a proposal to adopt a Gifted and Talented Program for students.

Assistant high school principal Donnie Ickles chaired the committee that drafted the program which, he explained, would eventually meet the needs of those students who needed to be challenged more than the curriculum available to the regular students.

One additional teacher will be required to administer the program, and a portion of that salary will be paid by the state, he explained.

Ickles pointed out the nation spent some \$3-billion last year for special education, but only a few million to meet the needs of the gifted and talented students.

The initial program would work with students from kindergarten through the fifth grades, and be expanded eventually through high school.

Cost of the teacher was estimated by Supt. Glen Mitchell at \$18,000, of which the state would pay approximately \$2,000.

Ickles suggested that the teacher applying for the position be interviewed by the administrators of all the local schools, as well as by his committee, which includes Jean Baugh, Pat Cravens, Pat Davis, Marilyn Hale, Julie Salley and Vickie Reed.

Tax collector Allen Shewmake discussed the district's tax situation with the board, and projected '87 is gonna be tough.

He said he doesn't expect this year's taxes, which will be billed next fall, to be as hard to collect as it will be the following year.

Oil values are down, he explained, but the district's total value is not as dependent on oil as it was a few years earlier. The appraised value is now 23 percent of the district, he said.

In recognizing students who have so far this year participated in contests at the state level, framed

certificates were awarded by the board chairman to 13 students and a teacher.

They included two vocalists, John Teel and Kyle Long; five cosmetology students, Dawna Bradford, Karen Moore, Natalie Morton, Cheryl Barker and Renee Sadberry.

The others were members of the mock trial team, Lisa Weed, Kirsten Sharpe, Scott Webb, Jana Coltrain, Randy Boutwell, Scott Boss and the teacher, Mrs. Jeanie Wilson.

The oath of office was administered to the board's two newest members, John Sibley and Jerry Reed, as well as to incumbent Howell, who were elected Saturday.

City offers opportunity to cut free fire wood

Want to cut some fire wood, free?

The city is making an entire block of mesquite available to the public, beginning Saturday.

The 800 block between Third and Fourth Streets has been acquired by the city, and the council has instructed its crews to clear it of all trees.

Prior to taking big equipment onto the land, council members decided to offer the public the opportunity of cutting down the trees for fire wood.

The offer ends April 24.

Those intending to take advantage of the offer must first go to city hall and sign a waiver, releasing the

Scott agreed to stand all costs of the tap, provide his own meter, and did not question what rate would be charged for the water.

The line to be tapped carries the water from Lake Buffalo to the pump at Lake Iowa Park, which pumps the water on into the city for treatment.

A proposal to permit a model airplane club to develop a landing field on the west side of Lake Iowa Park was tabled for study.

A spokesman for the club explained some 10 members of the 75-member club live in Iowa Park. The new site is needed because the strip that has been used at Jaycee Park in Wichita Falls is being displaced for new softball parks.

Aldermen set April 29 as the final date for the owner of a condemned building on West Park to either take action to make it safe, or start tearing it down.

Stanley Williamson, who owns the old structure at 105 W. Park, had met two weeks earlier with the council and said he would have a plan of action by Monday's meeting. However, he was not in attendance and had not sent a message of intent, Barrington said.

The structure had been ruled unsound and a threat to the public over a year ago, before Williamson bought it.

Also approved was a plan proposed by architect Don Daugherty for the remodeling of the city hall's

exterior, and the city will soon advertise for bids to have the work done.

Estimated cost of the project is \$65,000, which would be paid from Federal Revenue Sharing funds.

Estimated cost to the Chamber of Commerce for its share was set at \$11,000.

San Jacinto Day, April 21, was approved for employees' holiday, but it is this year only, due to the state Sesquicentennial observance.

Following a 45-minute executive session, Mayor Hunter explained personnel was discussed, but "...no action is coming at this time."

Also approved was a resolution setting April 21-25 as Clean Up, Fix Up Week, during which city residents can dump at the sanitary landfill without charge or dump permit.

Carrying on with their program of improving the appearance of the downtown area, the city council Monday night voted to do improvements on a wall exposed by demolition of some buildings, as well as completing the renovation of city hall.

Aldermen, discussing the exposed wall which faces city hall, agreed to have the wall resurfaced at city expense.

At the same time, Tommy Key, who owns the building and two adjoining it, said he would do the same with his buildings, using the same contractor.

Also agreed was that all the work would be similar to that done on the MuleSkinners' building, which is on the west end of Key's three structures.

Members of the council agreed with Alderman Bud Burch, that the city should do the work on the building's east wall, after he pointed out, "He (Key) wouldn't have had this problem (exposed wall), had we not had the buildings torn down. It wasn't his making."

Key's buildings all face the 100 block of West Cash Street.

The action took place after the council canvassed Saturday's election results, and the three uncontested candidates, Mayor Tim Hunter and Aldermen Burch and Bud Mercer, were declared winners.

Alderman Johnny Coker was again appointed Mayor Pro Tem, with the council's confirmation.

The council authorized Adminis-

Newcomers dominated Saturday's elections

Three political newcomers were elected to posts in Saturday's city and school elections.

John Sibley and Jerry Reed, both newcomers in school politics, won seats on the board, while Bud Burch was elected to his first term on the city council.

Burch had been on the council by appointment, serving out the term of Don Decker. But Saturday was his first time to be on the ballot.

Burch, alderman Bud Mercer and mayor Tim Hunter were all unopposed on the city ballot.

Jimmy Howell was the only incumbent on the school board seek-

ing re-election, and he was unopposed for Place 5. He drew 412 votes.

Sibley, a retired teacher and administrator, received 259 votes to win Place 1 on the board. He received strong competition from Gary Fielding, who drew 192 votes.

Eventhough Donna Chambers had withdrawn from the election a week earlier, her name was still on the ballot, and she received 26 votes for the Place 1 position.

Jerry Reed was easily the victor in the race for Place 4 on the board. His two opponents, Leo Thames and Dennis Brooks, broke even with 105 votes apiece.

As had been predicted, on the basis of a small absentee count, the turnout Saturday was low, with only 477 ballots being cast in the school election and 314 in the city's.

Official count indicates 310 votes were cast at the Kidwell box in the school election, 130 at Bradford, 28 at Valley View and nine absentee.

In city voting, 255 ballots were marked in Precinct 32, 57 in Precinct 33 and two were absentees, for a total of only 314.

This was the second year, instead of the first, that voters had cast ballots by places on the school board. It was previously reported to be the first.

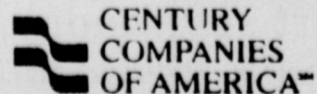
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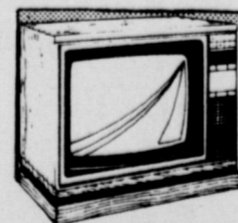
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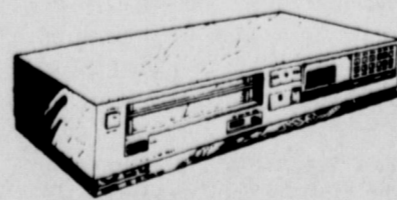
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Cook of the Week

Beef Brisket, the way Mrs. Delbert Catlin prepares it, is a favorite food of her family.

"Beef," wrote Marie Antoinette Cardene of the nineteenth century, "is the soul of cooking." George Buffon in the eighteenth century said, "without the ox it would be difficult to live."

More beef is eaten than any other kind of meat throughout the world, even taking into account the areas where religion forbids it, India where it is too expensive to eat, and the countries where beef cattle were introduced fairly recently and have never succeeded in wooing the natives away from their favorite pork.

The roast beef of England is proverbial, but Americans consume more beef per capita. It is a popular meat in France, Argentina, New Zealand and Australia.

References tell us that there were domesticated cattle in Egypt at least by 3509 B.C. There are innumerable references to cattle in the Bible, and the possession of cattle in ancient times was equivalent to the possession of wealth.

By the nineteenth century, the Englishmen had been outdone as beefeaters by Americans. As early as 1854, Harper's Weekly had noted that the commonest meal in America, from coast to coast, was steak. Today, it is difficult for Americans to find their favorite cuts of beef in foreign countries because no two countries cut the carcass the same way.

Mrs. Catlin, the former Noralene Moer, was graduated from Iowa Park High School. She is a member of Christ the King Catholic Church. She is a homemaker and keeps books for her husband, who is part of Catlin Drilling Co. He is also engaged in farming. Her hobbies are sewing, craftwork, gardening and working in the yard.

In large mixer bowl, beat the egg whites, cream of tartar and salt until foamy. Add second amount of sugar, tablespoons at a time, beating on high speed until meringue holds stiff peaks. Gently fold in flavorings. Sprinkle flour-sugar mixture, 1/4 cup at a time over meringue, folding in gently until flour-sugar mixture disappears.

Push batter into an ungreased tube pan, 10x4 inches. Gently cut through batter to remove large air bubbles. Bake at 375 degrees 30 to 35 minutes or until top springs back when touched lightly with finger. Insert tube pan on funnel; let hang until cake is completely cool.

If desired, glaze with your favorite glaze or frosting, but delicious served with frozen peaches or strawberries with whipped cream or ice cream.

MEXICAN SQUASH CASSEROLE

6 medium yellow squash
1 small onion
1 cup of 1/2-inch cubed Velveeta cheese
1/2 of a small can green chilies
Cracker crumbs (Ritz or regular saltines)
Boil squash and onion till tender. Stir and drain well; mix in cheese and green chilies. Pour into buttered baking dish. Cover with cracker crumbs. Bake at 375 degrees 15 minutes.

BEEF BRISKET

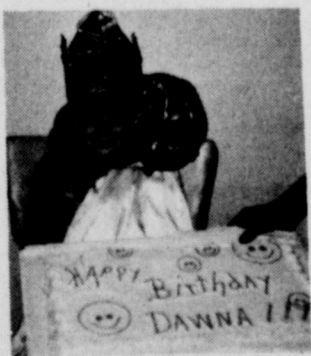
1 (3-5 lb.) brisket
Meat tenderizer
Onion salt
Garlic salt
1/2 bottle liquid smoke
1/2 bottle Worcestershire sauce
Sprinkle brisket with tenderizer and salts. Pour liquid smoke and Worcestershire sauce over meat. Cover with tin foil. Marinate in refrigerator 24 hours. Bake at 250 degrees 9 hours.

ANGEL FOOD CAKE (Her mother's recipe)

2 cups Softasilk cake flour
3/4 cup plus 2 Tbsp. sugar
12 egg whites (1 1/2 cup at room temperature)
1 1/2 tsp. cream of tartar
1/4 tsp. salt
3/4 cup sugar
1 1/2 tsp. vanilla
1/2 tsp. almond extract
Heat oven to 375 degrees. Sift together the flour and first amount of sugar; set aside.

RICE PILAF

1 stick oleo
1 1/4 cup rice (long grain)
1/2 cup chopped onions
1/4 lb. sliced mushrooms
Fresh parsley
1 can Swanson's chicken broth
1/4 tsp. thyme
Salt and pepper
1 cup water

Melt oleo in skillet, add rice and stir until coated. Add onions and mushrooms, cook 5 minutes. Add chicken broth, thyme, salt and pepper to taste. Cover and simmer 25-30 minutes until tender. Snip parsley and sprinkle over top.

GOURMET POTATOES

6 medium-sized potatoes
1/4 cup butter
2 cups shredded Cheddar cheese
1/2 cup cultured sour cream
1 tablespoon minced onion
1 teaspoon salt
1/4 teaspoon ground pepper
2 tablespoons butter
Paprika

Cook unpeeled potatoes until tender. Cool, peel and shred coarsely. Heat butter in saucepan, remove from heat. Add cheese, stirring until partially melted. Blend in sour cream, onion, salt and pepper; fold in potatoes.

Place in greased 2-qt. casserole dish; dot with 2 tablespoons butter. Sprinkle with paprika. Bake, uncovered 30 minutes or until nicely browned.

Note: Casserole may be assembled day before; if you do, cover and refrigerate and lengthen cooking time. Yield: 8-10 servings.

PECAN PUFFS

3 egg whites
Pinch of salt
1 cup brown sugar, packed
1/2 tsp. vanilla
1 cup chopped pecans
Beat egg whites and salt until stiff. Gradually add sugar to egg whites, beat for 5-8 minutes with electric mixer. Stir in vanilla and pecans, mix. Drop by well-rounded teaspoonfuls onto greased cookie sheet. Bake at 200 degrees 50-55 minutes or until firm to touch. Store in air tight container. Yield: 3 dozen.

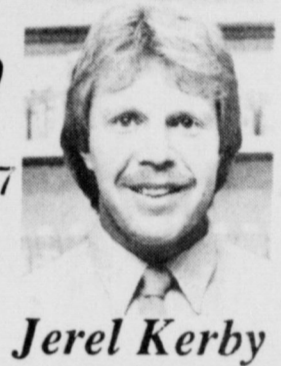

trator James Barrington to draft a contract for the sale of raw water out of Lake Buffalo to Lonnie Scott, who said he plans to build a home on Harmony Road.

Scott explained he intends to use the raw water for "household purposes" only, and would provide his own drinking water by hauling it.

When asked if he couldn't buy water from the Wichita Valley Water Supply Corp., which is serving two homes just south of Scott's land, Scott said that organization was actually already beyond its territory in serving the homes and refused to extend its lines further.

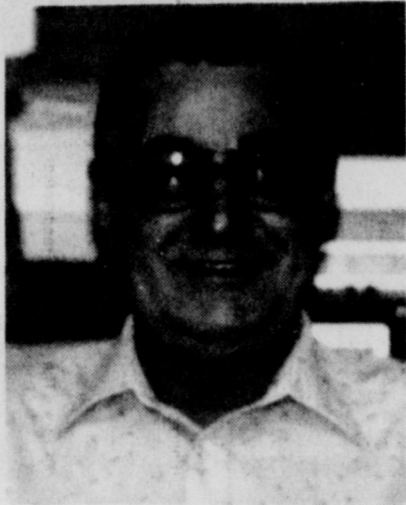

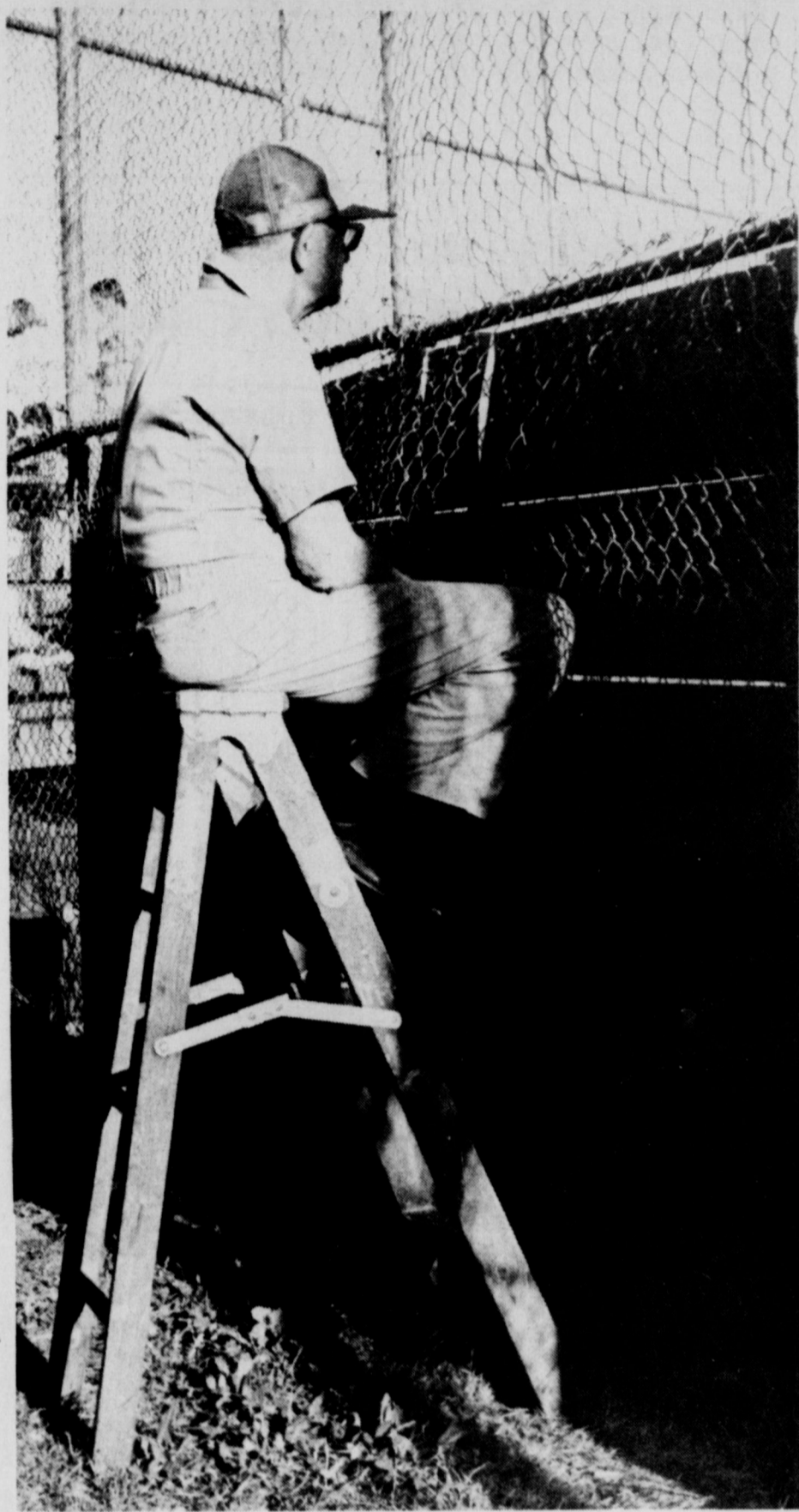
