## Bridwell Awards to Be Made December 8

The first annual Bridwell Soil Builders Awards program will be limaxed December 8 with an awards banquet in the Woman's Forum in Wichita Falls. Paul H. Walser, chief of the state Soil Conservation Service will be principal speaker.

Approximately 500 are expected to attend. Cash awards and honors will be bestowed on winners in the first year's contest. The 1950 winners are among the area's most progressive farmers. They demonstrated that it was possible to maintain soil fertility while earning a cash income. None of their projects was a sacrifice financially.

John Williamson, John Wesley, E. G. Muller and Ronald Lattimer of Wichita County, and Ernie Bender of Archer county - will receive 150 each. Solon Downing, winner in the legume grass division, will get \$125.

Approximately 150 persons from this area have entered the 1951 program.

### THE STATE OF TEXAS

To: Ray Martin, defendant, greeting:

You are hereby commanded to appear before the Honorable 30th District Court of Wichita County at the Court House thereof, in Wichita Falls, Texas, at or before 10 o'clock a.m. of the first Monday next after the expiration of forty-two days from the date of the issuance of this citation, same being the 25th day of December, A.D. 1950 then and there to answer Plaintiff's Petition filed in said Court, on the 6th day of November, A.D. 1950, in this case, numbered 47990-A on the docket of said court and styled Marcy Lee Martin, plaintiff, vs. Ray Martin, defendant.

A brief statement of the nature of this suit is as follows, to-wit:

After alleging jurisdiction, plaintiff further alleges that she and defendant were married on or about September 4th, 1946, and continued to live together as husband and wife until on or about the 14th day of January, A.D. 1950, when by reason of the cruel, harsh and tyrannical treatment toward this plaintiff by the defendant without cause or provocation on the part of the plaintiff was of such nature as to render their further living together as in supportable; that there was one child born to this marriage.

Wherefore, plaintiff prays that defendant be cited by publication as required by law, to appear and answer this petition, and that on final hearing she have judgment for an absolute divorce and for the complete care, custody and control of the minor child.

If this citation is not served within ninety days after the date of issuance, it shall be returned un-served.

The Officer executing this process shall promptly execute the same according to law and make due return as the law directs.

### ORDINANCE NO. 259

State of Texas  
County of Wichita  
City of Iowa Park.

1. Be it ordained by the City Council of the City of Iowa Park, Wichita County, Texas, in regular session assembled on this 20th day of November, A.D. 1950, that the City of Iowa Park Police Commissioner is hereby fully authorized and empowered to place, and have placed, stop signs at such places and street intersections within the corporate limits of the city of Iowa Park as said City Police Commissioner may deem necessary to carry out the provisions of the laws of the State of Texas, for the safety of pedestrians, and other persons using the streets and highways within the corporate limits of the City of Iowa Park.

2. Be it further ordained that any person operating a motor vehicle upon any of the streets within the corporate limits of the City of Iowa Park shall, upon approaching any intersection where there is a stop sign erected, come to a full stop at least ten (10) feet back of the line of such street intersection before proceeding to enter such street intersection.

Be it further ordained that any person violating the provisions of this ordinance shall be fined not less than \$5.00, nor more than \$50.00, for each separate offense.

This ordinance shall become effective after its passage and publication, as required by law.

## Iowa Park Athletic Teams Put in 4-AA

The Texas Interscholastic League this week approved a reclassification of high schools for football and basketball competition. The plan is designed to equalize competition according to school enrollments.

The new setup abolishes the City Conference and creates two new ones to be known as AAAA and AAA. This means there will be six football conferences, the others being AA, A, B and six-man. For basketball, six-man football schools will enter Conference B as they do now.

The top four conferences will play to state championships in football, and Conference B and six-man will play to regional titles. The five basketball conferences all will play to state championships in the annual tournament at Austin.

Basketball will not be affected by the reclassification this season. The new plan will go into effect in September of 1951.

Under the new setup Iowa Park will be in Conference 4-AA, grouped with Burk Burnett, Crowell, Electra, Quannah and Seymour.

Oney has been moved to 12-AA and will be in with Bowie, Decatur, Jacksboro and Nocona.

District 9-A will have Archer City, Chillicothe, Henrietta, Holliday and Newcastle.

Conference B-11 consists of Alford, Bryson, Muenster, Saint Jo and Valley View of Iowa Park.

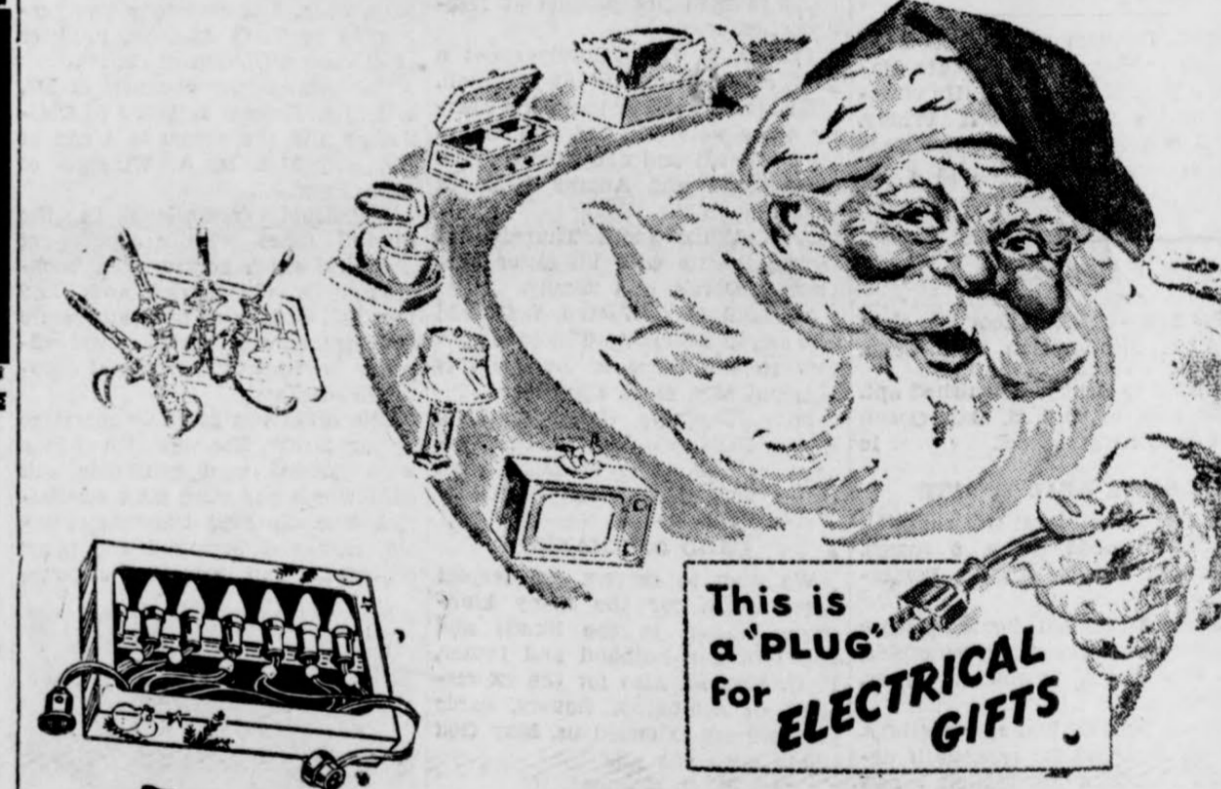

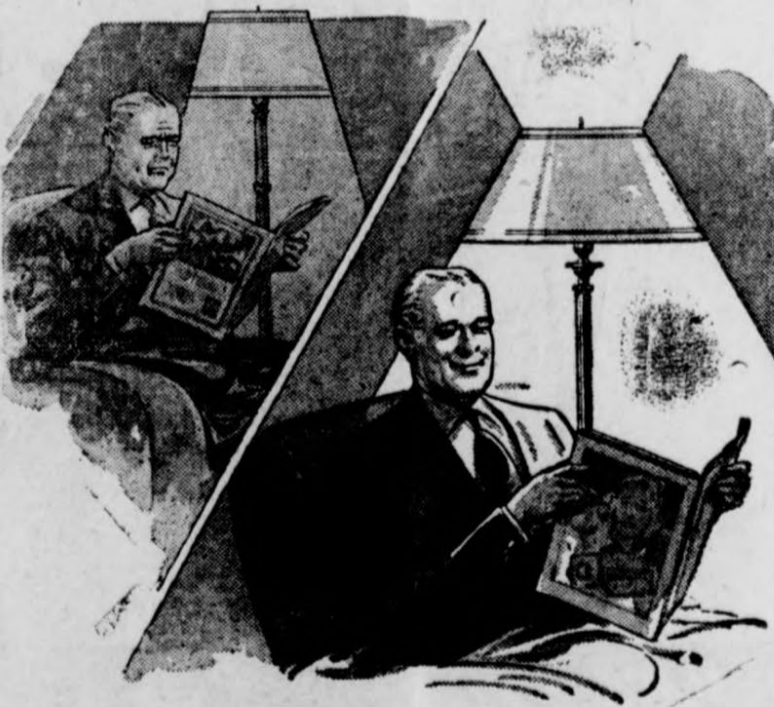

Interest on the money he borrowed at the bank was about \$5; so he just broke even on this deal, losing his labor.

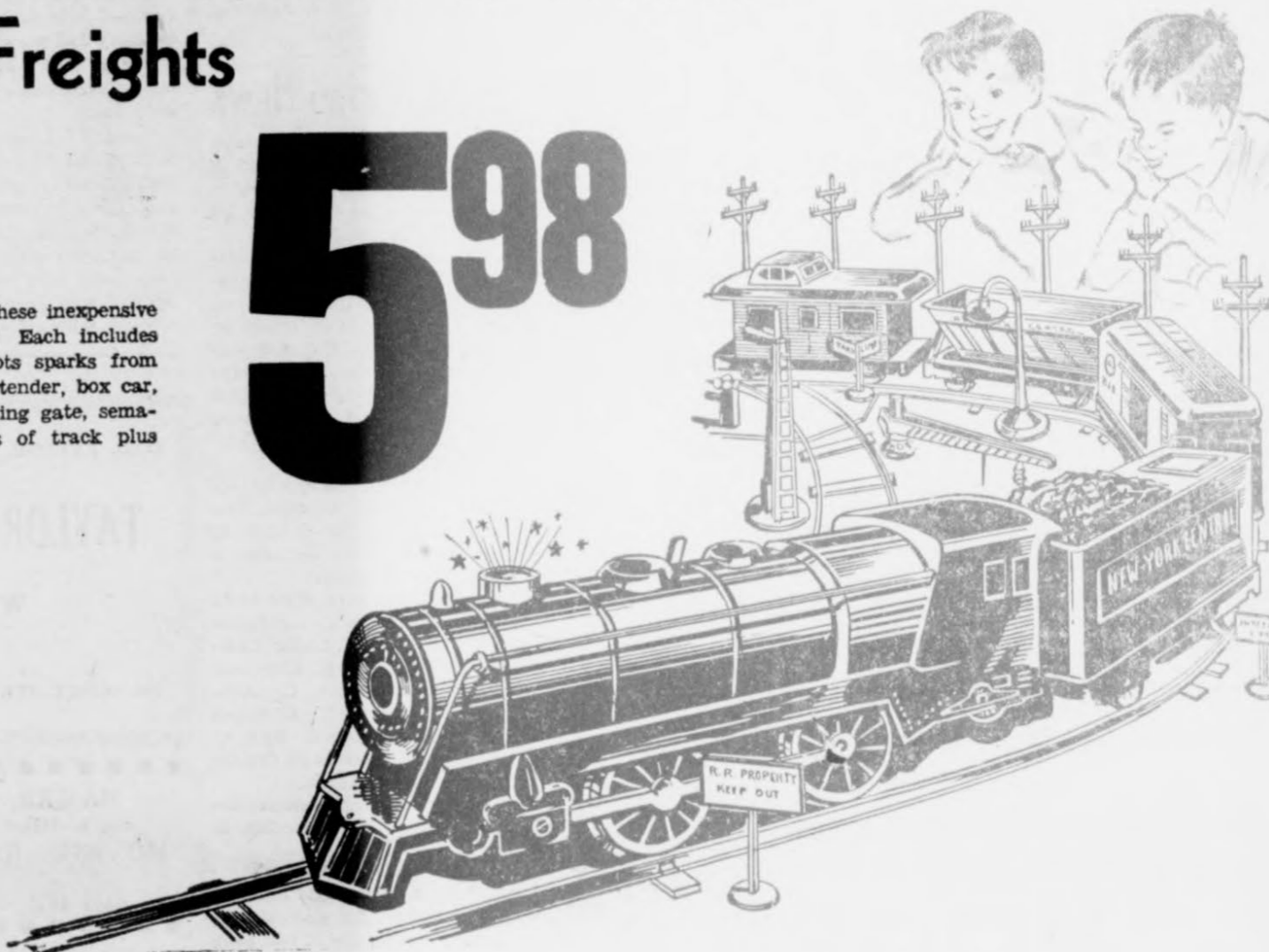

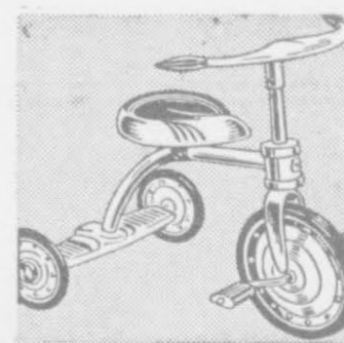

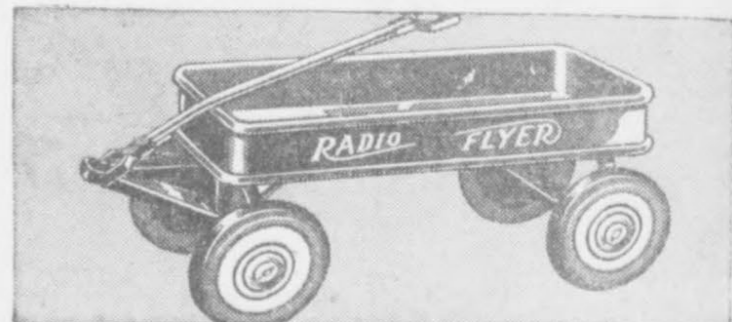
