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
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

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Holliday resident calls for support

TERRORISM IN HOLLIDAY, TEXAS

I was awakened this morning, April 17, 1986, at 3:30 a.m. A friend was calling me on the phone. Realizing my interest in the local Holliday scene, he had called to tell me that Tanner's Kuntry Store was on fire again. Shortly I arrived at what had been Tanner's Kuntry Store. The flames were still shooting into the sky. Our volunteer fire fighters, the Tanners and Police Chief Jule Colbert were very much awake and engaged.

The citizens of Holliday, Texas would like to believe that their's is a safe little community, a fine place to raise their families, a great place to spend their golden years. The events of the past few months would seem to make this belief somewhat in error. The events that have occurred here this day, sometime in the early morning hours, should prove to any person willing to face the unpleasant facts that the small City of Holliday is at this moment anything but a safe place to raise families and spend those golden years. We do in truth have TERRORISM in Holliday, Texas.

The word slander and its derivations are defined above. The thing about this vicious and insidious activity is that while a person(s) can take responsibility for the wrongs they have done and about which others are making uncharitable remarks, they are in most instances unable to defend themselves against lies.

Judge Bettye O. Tanner can tell you what slander is and the effect it has had on her public and private life. Chief of Police Jule Colbert can tell you what slander is and how it has effected his life and the performance of his duties. City Administrator Brown Hudson can tell you what slander is and how it has effected not only him but the running of the City of Holliday.

Yes, fellow citizens, they could tell you but they won't. They will not become like those who attack them. They will just go on feeling the hurt and doing their jobs to the best of their ability regardless of the obstacles they encounter. The source of these insidious actions is a very small number in any community. The reason they are able to cause such disastrous effect is because "rumor mongers" pass these slanders on usually adding slanders of their own. The way to handle this is to get the other side of the story and make your own determination of the truth. If you find that the report was false, make the truth widely known. You will find that your elected public officials and public servants are more than willing to help you get at

On occasion, in spite of our best attempt at judging the candidates for public office, we make an error. If we find it was a serious enough error, there exists mechanisms for correcting errors in judgement.

Fellow citizens, you owe it to yourselves and your community to crush these slanderous actions as you would crush the head of a rattlesnake.

Public officials have received death threats. Public officials, public servants and private citizens have had their property damaged or destroyed. Public property has been damaged or destroyed. I consider threats and actions against my elected public officials and appointed or paid public servants as threats against me and each and every citizen of this community.

That this incident started sometime ago is evident. Since five "drug busts" were made in Holliday last year there has been an escalating series of what might at first appear to be unreleated events.

The first slanderous attack was on Justice of Peace Tanner. Two of the specifit slanders were: 1) Tanner had caused "No Parking" signs to be throughout Holliday on Seymour highway. 2) Tanner had caused the closing of the "Eagle's Nest" operated by Don Duke for the benefit of our teenagers. Investigation of these reports shows both to be "false reports."

The next target for slander was the Holliday Chief of Police Jule Colbert. Jule's offense was that he was doing what we, through our city Council, hired him to do very well under difficult circumstances.

The next target was City Administrator Brown Hudson. Brown Hudson is a public servant hired by the citizens of Holliday through the City Council. There is nothing in the records that does not demonstrate outstanding performance with very little to work with.

The next perhaps unrelated incident was the destruction of Bettye O. Tanner's Kuntry Store by fire on January 30, 1986. The fire was reportedly caused by an electrical overload. The lives of the volunteer fire-fighters were very much placed in jeopardy in this fire because of the ammunition stored near the apparent source of the fire.

The most recent happening, prior to today's incident, was attributed to vandalism. The electrical power at Allsup's turned off from the alley in the rear of the building. The resulting "fear" probably was a diversion for the action of throwing bricks through the windows of the Dairy Queen and Wanda's Restaurant. With this incident it appears that private citizens have now become the target for attack.

The attempts to get rid of Judge Tanner, Brown Hudson and Chief Colbert having failed, the next area of attack occurred this date with the attempted isolation of our city from outside help; with numerous tire slashings of public and private vehicles; with the fire bombing of Wanda's Restaurant and of Tanner's Kuntry Store and the hospitalization of three of our volunteer firefighters who fought the fires.

The thing about our elected and appointed officials and our volunteers is that they must do what has been done with or without our support. They must make the decisions that have to be made whether or not they have input from the citizenry. Your constructive input or criticism is always welcome.

criticism is always welcome. What you need to do is to tell them that you do care about your community and that you do support them in their task of making our city a safe place to live and accomplish our dreams. This is our duty. We can do no less.

This date in an "Emergency Session" your Mayor and City Council adopted a resolution authorizing your City Administrator, Brown Hudson, to request help from the State of Texas and other outside agencies. This request has been made and as most of you have seen is being provided. Your Police Chief, Jule Colbert, now has the outside help that he needs to handle the problem. He still needs your help and support. Some of you have the answers to the questions that will solve this situation. Come forward, you have nothing to fear but fear itself.

President Teddy Roosevelt said, "The American People are slow to anger, but once aroused their wrath is like an all-consuming fire." We, the citizens of Holliday, are the American People. Some say that it is public officials and law-enforcement that is being targeted. Sam Morgan and his wife Wanda are not public officials. The public officials hold their offices because we put them there to do a job. Judge Tanner has paid a heavy price for her dedication to her office. An attack on our public officials is an attack on each and every citizen of this community. We must support and protect these officials as they have sworn to support and protect us. The perpetrator(s) of these attacks against us and the very system which protects all of us will be brought to justice in the American way and face our wrath in the courts and system they attempted to destroy.

This is what I have observed happening in the community of Holliday over the past year or so. Please accept it with my sincere wish that it helps.

By the way, as many of you know I have been known to write letters to the President of the United States, the Vice President and Members of Congress. It is quite a coincidence that I have a letter to the President already written, dated today. In this letter I was expressing my support of his action against the source of TERRORISM. Perhaps two or three hundred of you might wish to sign this letter with me. You can stop by and sign it or you might catch me when you see me around town.

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

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



Weaver to lead group

Four Iowa Park High athletes qualified to compete in nine events at the Region One track meet May 3 at Odessa, by placing first or second Saturday in the Dist. 5-AAA meet.



COMBINED CLEANING AGENTS CAN CAUSE DEADLY LUNG INJURY

The common household cleaning agents, bleach and ammonia, are relatively safe when used separately.

But when these agents are combined, they can cause an acute, lifethreatening lung injury called toxic pneumonitis, according to Dr. George R. Reisz, of the University of Missouri School of Medicine in Kansas

Dr. Reisz reports he has treated three patients with toxic pneumonitis caused by mixing 5% sodium hypochlorite (household bleach) and ammonia while cleaning.

All three patients were treated with antibiotics and required prolonged hospitalization. After hospital discharge, all three suffered from increased shortness of breath upon exertion and lasting lung function impairment.

The physician said the combining of the two chemicals creates intermediary chloramine compounds which are far more toxic to the lungs than either of the chemicals individually

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
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

Tanner's Kuntry Store, still in the stages of rebuilding after a previous fire, was totally destroyed by fire after a person or persons entered the building through a window and put a homemade bomb, made with an aerosol hairspray can and matches, by one wall, threw another homemade gas bomb in the middle of the floor and saturated another wall with "flammable liquid," set each on fire and left the building, according to Bettye O. Tanner, owner. The building, which was declared a total loss, sustained

approximately \$175,000 damage. Another homemade bomb was thrown through the window of Wanda's Kuntry Kitchen, also located on Highway 277, just down the road

from Tanner's. Damage, which included a broken window, a destroyed booth and several chairs as well as smoke damage, resulted in an estimated \$1,500 damage, according to Sam and Wanda Morgan, owners.

The fire from that bomb extinguished itself before more extensive damage occured.

Wanda's Kuntry Kitchen was vandalized two weeks prior to the incident, when rocks were thrown through that business' window, as well as that of the Dairy Queen.

the two businesses, three vehicles, including a police cruiser parked at city hall, reported slashed tires. Mrs. Tanner's and George

As well as the damage done to

their residences, also sustained slashed tires.

Kriedler's vehicles, both parked at

Mrs. Tanner serves as municipal judge and Archer County Justice of the Peace. She is running for re-election as Justice of the Peace in May. Kriedler is ex-assistant fire marshal of Holliday.

Hudson, estimated that all of the damage occured between 2:30 and 3:00 Thursday morning, beginning at Mrs. Tanner's residence just south of the school on College Street, then to Kriedler's residence, which is two blocks south of the railroad tracks. then to city hall and on to the Kuntry Kitchen and Tanner's.

The fire at Tanner's was reported at approximately 2:55 a.m., just two hours after contractors had finished painting the inside of the building. The fire was brought under control shortly after 6:30 that morning.

The fire apparently started where the flammable liquid was spread on the walls, Mrs. Tanner said.

Holliday had requested assistance in fighting the fire from Lakeside City Fire Department, but that department was delayed in arriving when they found a tree blocking Ford Road, evidently the work of the same people responsible for the other damage.

Three Holliday volunteer firemen were hospitalized as a result of smoke inhalation in their efforts to fight the blaze. Leland Hart, Jack Monroe and Mark Owensby were admitted to a Wichita Falls hospital where they were kept overnight.

Mrs. Tanner was rebuilding the store after a fire on January 31 of this year partially destroyed the building. Investigaton of the previous fire showed that it was due to an electrical short in some equipment at the front of the store.

Contractors had been working on the store for about a month and Tanner reported that they were supposed to begin installing the refrigeration equipment Monday.

"I am building back," Mrs.

A state of emergency was declared at 10:30 Thursday morning when an emergency session of Holliday City Council was called. It was stated that "a state of emergency exists because of the burning of buildings, slashing of police vehicle tires, private and public officials vehicles tires, and blockage of highways to prevent the passage of

emergency vehicles." During the meeting, councilmen authorized Hudson to pursue every resource available, especially law enforcement agencies, until the prob-

lem was solved. The Holliday Police Department, consisting of police chief Juel Colbert and officer James Massey, recieved law enforcement assistance from the Department of Public Safety, Archer County Sheriff's Department and the Texas Rangers.

Until last Monday night, there were six law enforcement officers patrolling at all times.

The motive for the violence, although not iron-clad, has been put to a vengeance against some law enforcement figures and city officials.

Other than Mrs. Tanner's, Kreidler's and the police department's tie with city government, Sam Morgan, co-owner of Wanda's Kuntry Kitchen, unsuccessfully ran for Place Two on the city council April 5.

"All of it appears to be against law enforcement," Hudson said.

Hudson also said that Holliday is usually a quiet town. "Our crime rate is lower than anybody around here," he said.

The citizens of Holliday have rallied and raised some \$5,600 as reward for information leading to the arrest and conviction of the person or persons responsible.

Evidence from the fires have been sent to labs in Abilene, Wichita Falls and Garland for inspection.

The incidents are being investigated by the Texas Rangers, State Fire Marshal, and the Archer County Sheriff Department, as well as the Holliday Police Department. It was reported that the Federal Bureau of Investigation (FBI) was investigating the situation. That report was neither confirmed nor denied by city





UMW continues study

Mrs. Tom Compton gave the second study of "Stories of Survival" taken from conversations with native Americans and compiled by Emmett and Kathleen Hummelen, for the United Methodist Women Tuesday morning with 22 members in

attendance. The study concerned the native Americans in Alaska and Canada, and Mrs. Compton stated that their survival is a counterpart of the native Americans in the United States. Explaining, she said when the United States purchased Alaska from Russia, provisions were made for all the people to enjoy rights, advantages and immunities as citizens of the United States except the "uncivilized tribes." They were to be subjected to laws and regulations as the United States, from time to time, might adopt in regard to the aboriginal tribes of that country.

Mrs. Compton stated that in due time settlers moved in and the exploitation of Alaska's natural resources began. Reservations, treaties and the Bureau of Public Affairs was a repeat of the United States. The federal policies eliminated vast numbers of native people as legal entities of the land.

The speaker said that a restless peace has marked the decades since Indian wars ended. Treaties have been understood differently by the parties involved and wounds of betrayal and

loss have never been closed. Continuing, she mentioned that the elders among the Indians are frightened and see their way of life vanishing before them as their grandchildren capitulate to ways of

the immigrant. She brought the study to an impressive close by discussing the spiritual statue of the native Americans who believe that God's voice is the voice of nature. They have a concept for creation and have tried to live in harmony with it and not exploit it for individual profit.
