Mrs. Lita Watson gave a brief
history of Iowa Park for the Lioness Club program Thursday evening.
"Picture in your mind if can, what Iowa Park looked like in the early 1880s before there was a
town: there were no mesquite trees, buffaloes and other wild animals roamed the land," she said. This was the case until the railroad wa
completed at Harrold in 1885 . Mmpleted at Harrold in 1885 . Watson described som
Mrs. the early-day settlers and their efforts to get the town started and growing. One of these was General Dodge, an interesting man, who laid a large
amount of railroad tracks in several amount of railroad tracks in severa states and bough
this area in 1888
Another was D.C. Kolp, who platted the town, and E.R. Kolp, his addition, whe platted the first one of the Dimmitt girls mand her father organized the first church in lowa Park.
Mrs. Watson said that the Cameron Hotel was the first hotel German, who came to the Specht, a Iowa, platted the Texas Addition lowa, platted the Texas Addition of
the town, and the town of Clara. He encouraged German settlers to come to the Clara community and many of their descendants still live there. Iowa Park was incorporated in
1891 by Judge Kennedy, Or 1891 by Judge Kennedy. Other early
settlers mentioned by Mrs. Watson settlers mentioned by Mrs. Watson
