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
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Cook of the Week

Many people consider the microwave the greatest boon to modern cooking. Patricia (Mrs. David) Sheppard, the cook for this week, is one that appreciates its merits. Her children share the same feeling with her, so she has purchased Kids Cook Microwave, a book by Janet Emal and Barbara Kern, especially for them. Four of Mrs. Sheppard's recipes this week are for microwave cooking.

Patricia was reared at Loveland, Okla. and was graduated from high school at Grandfield, Okla. She atttended Oklahoma Univ. at Norman and Cameron Univ. at Lawton.

She and David, who is an aircraft mechanic at Northrop Worldwide Aircraft Services, Inc., have lived in Iowa Park two years. They have two daughters, Shawnta, seven years old, and Amanda, five. They attend the Church of Christ.

1/4 cup butter 1-13 oz. canned tuna fish 1 1/2 cup grated Cheddar cheese 10 3/4 oz. can cream of mushroom

3/4 cup milk 1 can French fried onion rings 4 to 5 medium-sized raw potatoes, peeled and sliced

Lioness Club program is Iowa Park history

Mrs. Lita Watson gave a brief history of Iowa Park for the Lioness Club program Thursday evening.

"Picture in your mind, if you can, what Iowa Park looked like in the early 1880s before there was a town: there were no mesquite trees, buffaloes and other wild animals roamed the land," she said. This was the case until the railroad was completed at Harrold in 1885.

Mrs. Watson described some of the early-day settlers and their efforts to get the town started and growing. One of these was General Dodge, an interesting man, who laid a large amount of railroad tracks in several states and bought 85 acres of land in this area in 1888.

Another was D.C. Kolp, who platted the town, and E.R. Kolp, his brother, who platted the first addition. their brother, A.L., married one of the Dimmitt girls and her father organized the first church in Iowa Park.

Mrs. Watson said that the Cameron Hotel was the first hotel built in Iowa Park. Col. Specht, a German, who came to the area from Iowa, platted the Texas Addition of the town, and the town of Clara. He encouraged German settlers to come to the Clara community and many of their descendants still live there.

Iowa Park was incorporated in 1891 by Judge Kennedy. Other early settlers mentioned by Mrs. Watson who played an important part in making the town what it is today included Tom Corridon's father, John Hirschi, who dealt in land, property and mortgages, and Mr. and Mrs. C.

During roll call, club members told how long they had lived in Iowa Park. Mrs. Riley Thompson read "One Perfect Rose" for the devotion.

Mrs. D.O. James conducted the business when it was voted to assist with refreshments for the Clean-Up workers. An auditing committee composed of Mmes. V.I. Woodfin, L.A. Thurlo and Riley Thompson was appointed.

The hostesses were Mrs. Frank Gossett and Mrs. Thurlo.


There will be a course for all riders regardless of experience. A 100mile scenic ride through the
