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James Street was reportedly struck by an automobile, the driver apparently unable to see him due to heavy rain.

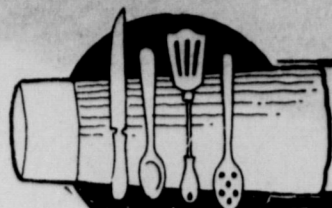
Emergency Medical Technicians attending the youth while awaiting an ambulance said he apparently suffered a broken leg.

## Cook of the Week

Many people consider the microwave the greatest boon to modern cooking. Patricia (Mrs. David) Sheppard, the cook for this week, is one that appreciates its merits. Her children share the same feeling with her, so she has purchased Kids Cook Microwave, a book by Janet Emal and Barbara Kern, especially for them. Four of Mrs. Sheppard's recipes this week are for microwave cooking.

Patricia was reared at Loveland, Okla. and was graduated from high school at Grandfield, Okla. She attended Oklahoma Univ. at Norman and Cameron Univ. at Lawton.

She and David, who is an aircraft mechanic at Northrop Worldwide Aircraft Services, Inc., have lived in Iowa Park two years. They have two daughters, Shawnta, seven years old, and Amanda, five. They attend the Church of Christ.

Patricia is manager of the Home Place on West Park St. that handles novel gifts and crafts. She is enjoying showing the new china patterns and glassware that they have recently added to the shop. Her hobbies are bicycle riding, playing soccer, swimming and skiing.

The first four recipes today are for microwave cooking. One of these is Tuna Bake, which is a reminder of the versatility of tuna and that the demand for it is constantly increasing. In fact, the world consumption has doubled within the last 15 years.

Man has been eating tuna since prehistoric times. Its bones have been found in kitchen middens dating from the Paleolithic to Iron Age times in Northern Europe. It may have been the most important fish in the classic world in terms of volumes, at least.

Homer tells us that it was a favorite food of the Greeks, who consecrated it to Diana. Pliny suggested the Golden Horn was so called because its abundance of tuna gave it wealth. Representatives of the fish were carried on many Byzantine

coins, and tuna was served at Carthaginian wedding banquets.

### TUNA BAKE

1/4 cup butter  
1-13 oz. canned tuna fish  
1 1/2 cup grated Cheddar cheese  
10 3/4 oz. can cream of mushroom soup  
3/4 cup milk  
1 can French fried onion rings  
4 to 5 medium-sized raw potatoes, peeled and sliced

Melt butter in baking dish about 10 seconds. Arrange potatoes in bottom of dish. Bake covered with paper towel about 10 minutes, potatoes should be about done. Combine soup and milk in 4-cup, microwave 1 to 1 1/2 minutes.

Spread tuna and cheese over potatoes. Pour heated soup mixture over tuna. Top with onion rings and micro-cook uncovered 5 to 7 minutes or until casserole is heated through and cheese is melted.

### MEATY MACARONI

1 pound ground beef  
1-15 oz. can tomato sauce  
1 1/2 cup elbow macaroni, uncooked  
1 cup water  
1/2 tsp. Italian seasoning  
1 cup Cheddar cheese

Cook beef 4 to 5 minutes on high. In a large casserole, combine ground beef, tomato sauce, uncooked

macaroni, water and Italian seasoning. Cook on high 12 to 14 minutes. Stir halfway through cooking time. Sprinkle cheese on top.

### S'MORES

2 graham cracker squares  
1/2 of a plain chocolate candy bar  
1 large marshmallow

For each serving, place 4 squares of chocolate bar and 1 marshmallow on a graham cracker. Microwave on high power 15 to 20 seconds or until marshmallow puffs. Top with graham cracker. Eat S'mores like a sandwich.

### 2-MINUTE FUDGE

1 (1 lb.) box powdered sugar  
1/2 cup unsweetened cocoa  
1/4 teaspoon salt  
1/4 cup minus 1 teaspoon milk  
1 tablespoon vanilla  
1/2 cup butter or margarine

In a 1 1/2 quart casserole, stir together sugar, cocoa, salt, milk and vanilla until partially blended. Put butter or margarine over top in center of dish. Microwave on high power 2 minutes. Stir well until smooth. Pour into a greased 8-inch square dish. Chill about an hour. Makes about 36 squares.

### BROCCOLI RICE CASSEROLE

1 cup rice, cooked  
1-10 oz. pkg. frozen broccoli  
1-8 oz. jar Cheez Whiz  
1 can mushroom soup

Mix cooked rice and drained broccoli. Combine Cheez Whiz and mushroom soup. Mix rice and broccoli with cheese mixture. Pour into buttered baking dish. Bake at 350 degrees 30 minutes.

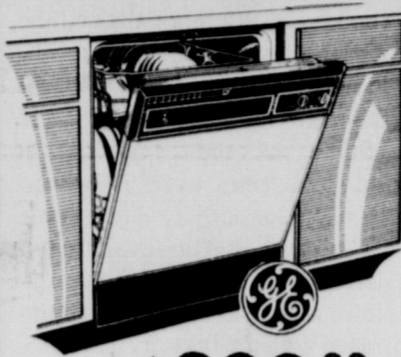
### SUPERB POT ROAST

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# As I See It....

When you Democrats go to the party primary polls Saturday, you should remember your (and my) governor is the one who promised no new taxes during his last campaign, and then spearheaded the biggest tax increase in the history of this state.

And as that was going on, he was leading the effort to pass the school reform that passed on to local sources built-in costs that don't reflect directly to the state.

The survey confirms what I've known for many years: a great percentage of people who move here do so because of our schools.

I've talked with a lot of new residents who told me they could have lived anywhere in the area, but opted for Iowa Park because we simply have the best school system.

## Campaigning at 70

Seldom does one wait until she's 70 years old to enter politics, but that's exactly what Mrs. Margarete Archer of Iowa Park has done.

She's one of 19 candidates in the Nortex District running for a post on the Silver Hair Legislature.

Voting will be held May 30 to elect four delegates from this district. The polls, with voters required to be 60 years of age by the first of this year, will be at the senior citizen centers or at the Nortex office in Wichita Falls.

Two of the other candidates have strong ties to Iowa Park. They are former resident Euell Spruiell of Petrolia, and former superintendent of schools Faris Nowell, now a resident of Nocona.

Other communities represented by candidates include Wichita Falls, Graham, Bowie, Jacksboro, Burk Burnett and Childress.

Created by an act of the legislature in its last session, the Silver Hair Legislature will be comprised of 116 delegates from over the state.

The Legislature is to meet in Austin next fall for a study period, to learn legislative procedures, and again next spring for its first regular session.

Mrs. Archer, widow of the late

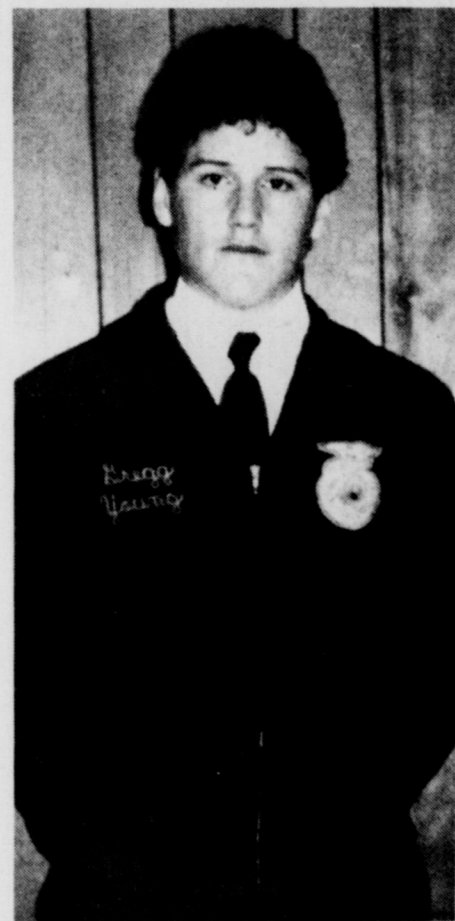

had called for abandonment of a contract with O.L.D. Company for work on a ground storage tank, because the contractor had not started work within the prescribed time.

The contractor, Obie Dowell, appeared at the meeting to explain his delay and request he be allowed to start work.

Dowell said he had experienced problems obtaining bonding. He said he felt that had been corrected, but if not, he would put up a cash bond to meet city's requirements.

Under those provisions, and noting Dowell had already moved his equipment onto the site, aldermen gave their approval.

Virgil Duffy asked the council for permission to purchase water for a home he proposes to build on the road from US 287 to Lake Iowa Park.

His request to extend the line from once owned by the city on Quail Valley was approved. His home would not be in the city.

Aldermen also approved a proposal by Stacia Brown, library activities coordinator, to undertake a summer theater program for children. A play, "Tom Sawyer," would be performed at First Methodist Church and proceeds go to the library.

### Lioness Club program is Iowa Park history

Mrs. Lita Watson gave a brief history of Iowa Park for the Lioness Club program Thursday evening.

"Picture in your mind, if you can, what Iowa Park looked like in the early 1880s before there was a town: there were no mesquite trees, buffaloes and other wild animals roamed the land," she said. This was the case until the railroad was completed at Harrold in 1885.

Mrs. Watson described some of the early-day settlers and their efforts to get the town started and growing. One of these was General Dodge, an interesting man, who laid a large amount of railroad tracks in several states and bought 85 acres of land in this area in 1888.

Another was D.C. Kolp, who platted the town, and E.R. Kolp, his brother, who platted the first addition. Their brother, A.L., married one of the Dimmitt girls and her father organized the first church in Iowa Park.

Mrs. Watson said that the Cameron Hotel was the first hotel built in Iowa Park. Col. Specht, a German, who came to the area from Iowa, platted the Texas Addition of the town, and the town of Clara. He encouraged German settlers to come to the Clara community and many of their descendants still live there.

Iowa Park was incorporated in 1891 by Judge Kennedy. Other early settlers mentioned by Mrs. Watson who played an important part in making the town what it is today included Tom Corridon's father, John

Hirschi, who dealt in land, property and mortgages, and Mr. and Mrs. C. Birk.

During roll call, club members told how long they had lived in Iowa Park. Mrs. Riley Thompson read "One Perfect Rose" for the devotion.

Mrs. D.O. James conducted the business when it was voted to assist with refreshments for the Clean-Up workers. An auditing committee composed of Mmes. V.I. Woodfin, L.A. Thurlo and Riley Thompson was appointed.

The hostesses were Mrs. Frank Gossett and Mrs. Thurlo.
