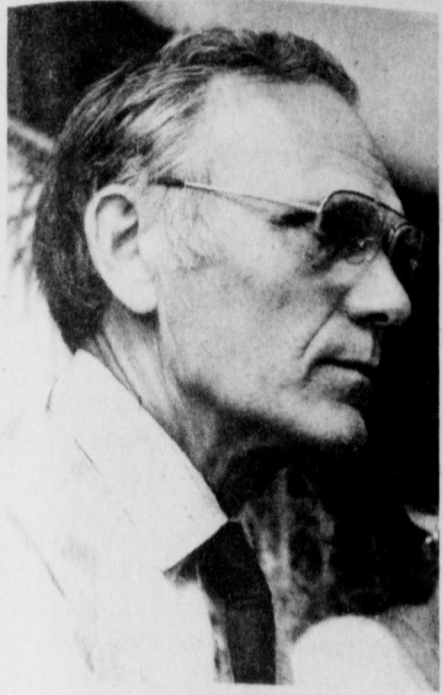

Frank Gossett elected to fill Chamber's post

Frank Gossett was elected to fill the unexpired term of Chamber of Commerce president Monday, when Rip Smith submitted his resignation.

Gossett, manager of the local Cryovac plant, was serving as first vice president.

The Chamber's board of directors also voted to move Robert Palmer up from second to first vice president.

Smith's resignation was presented in the form of a letter, but he made an appearance before the board's decision and explained his resignation was due to a "possible conflict of interest with some merchants in town."

He also said later that he possibly will not continue to reside here through the full term of office.

Wayne House showed the board a sketch of a proposed new brochure of the community, to replace one that has been used almost 20 years.

The brochure layout was done by Earl Blair and would feature information about the community and feature several full-color photographs.

More restrictions on outdoor watering

Additional restrictions on outdoor watering have been imposed on all communities and organizations that purchase water from Wichita Falls.

The original restriction of odd-even outside watering is now prohibited between the hours of 5 p.m. and midnight, accorded to Mike Price, Iowa Park public works director.

Included among those under the restrictions are Iowa Park, Holliday, Pleasant Valley and all customers of Wichita Valley Water Supply Corp.

While Iowa Park is not experiencing a shortage of water, because the water it purchases from Wichita Falls supplements what it produces from

its own lakes, the city is under a contract to impose whatever restrictions are imposed on residents of Wichita Falls.

When Iowa Park entered into a contract in 1971 to purchase water from Wichita Falls, it received the

assurance of being delivered water as long as residents of Wichita Falls could receive water, whether Iowa Park was producing any water or not.

The purchasing contract came about when all three lakes from which Iowa Park takes water were

empty following a severe drought, and residents were forced to use the high-salt content water from Lake Diversion, via the irrigation ditch.

When Wichita Falls announced its voluntary restrictions on outdoor watering two weeks ago, Iowa Park

doubled its water treatment shifts on weekends.

Price said Monday, when Wichita Falls announced additional restrictions, that the local tanks were actually gaining in storage, both because of restrictions and additional water treatment.

Price said residents had cut their water consumption almost in half during the odd-even restriction, from six-million gallons a week to three-million.

Price complimented both residents and treatment plant personnel, for the cut in consumption and gain in water availability.

As to the practice of sending out personnel to check on compliance with restrictions in Wichita Falls, Price said that was not being done here.

"We feel our people are doing a good job of complying, and as long as we're not taking an abnormal amount of water from Wichita Falls, we will rely on our citizens and their honesty," he said.

Wichita Falls has not given a date to terminate the restrictions.

City to pay school more for tax work

The city council approved an increase in the charge for collecting taxes, removing concrete parking blocks from the downtown area, and a change in holidays for employees, during Monday night's regular meeting.

Aldermen also gave tentative approval to a proposal that a skeet range be developed, along with a park area, at Lake Iowa Park.

The school tax office has been collecting city taxes several years, for a fee of \$5,800 annually or one percent of collections, whichever was higher.

The contract which was approved by council members calls for the fee to be increased to \$8,500 annually or 1.5 percent, whichever is higher. According to figures provided the council, the city would have paid \$9,989 this year under the new rate, based on collections of \$665,970.

Aldermen agreed the city could not hire an employee to do the tax work for the amount being charged, and could not collect the taxes without hiring additional personnel.

Because of the mounting claims being paid by the city for damage allegedly caused by the concrete parking blocks in the downtown area, council members voted to have them removed and parking spaces outlined both by paint and small reflectors.

An amendment added to the motion calls for any future repairs of similar nature to citizens' vehicles to be done only in Iowa Park, if the city is to pay the bill.

The motion, as presented, carried by a 3-1-1 vote, with Bud Burch vot-

ing against it and Bud Mercer abstaining.

Employees gained an annual holiday. They had been given six regular holidays, plus their personal birthdays off each year.

The birthday policy was removed, and official holidays for city employees are now Texas Independence Day, Christmas Eve and Day, New Years Day, Memorial Day, July 4th, Labor Day and Thanksgiving.

Billy James proposed to the council that an area northeast of the dam at Lake Iowa Park be developed as a park and a skeet range, but asked that the city give assistance in some of the site preparation and maintenance.

He said the area had some posts and cable already in place. It has been a park project by the American Legion, but never completed.

A large open-air structure would be erected for public use in the area, and skeet shooting would be out over the body of water to the north, James explained.

Final action on the proposal was not taken, but Alderman Johnny Coker told James, "This council supports it."

The council approved appointment of Dan Tompkins as judge of the municipal court, for the duration of Judge G.A. Benesh's recovery from surgery.

No action was taken on a change for group medical insurance for employees, but aldermen said the only agencies (three) to be considered would be those officed in Iowa Park.

Iowa Park, Holliday school expenses less than over state

In the two years since the legislature enacted House Bill 72, local school budgets have grown by \$2.7-billion. This higher spending level has been funded as much by local property taxes as by record-setting increase in state taxes.

Over the past two years, an added \$1-billion in state aid was matched by a \$1-billion increase in local school property taxes. Last year trustees in the 1,063 local school districts levied the largest school property tax increase in history -- \$551-million -- for a total tax bill of \$4.6-billion.

Locally, the Iowa Park Consolidated Independent School District's tax levy last year increased by 31.1 percent for 1985-86, and Holliday Independent School District's by 16.9 percent, as compared to a 13.3 percent increase for the average school district in Texas.

The figures come from the latest issue of "Bench Marks for 1986-87 School District Budgets in Texas," an annual publication of the Texas Research League, an Austin-based, educational cooperation engaged in governmental research.

School budgets adopted last year called for spending \$3,346 per student for current operations. Iowa Park's budget provided for \$2,949.60 per student based on 1,600 students in average daily attendance in 1984-85. Holliday's budget per student was \$2,896.74.

Four dollars in five were spent for salaries. Statewide, payroll expense averaged \$2,705 per student, as compared to \$2,144.84 in Iowa Park and \$2,052.10 in Holliday. Payroll expense is a combination of salary levels and staffing positions.

The average salary for classroom teachers paid by Iowa Park schools in 1984-85 was \$21,766, and by Holliday, \$20,673. The average among all school districts in Texas was \$23,281 per classroom teacher. While the legislature and local school trustees focused discussion on classroom teachers' salaries, statewide only two-fifths of the 1985 budget increase was used for that purpose.

In Iowa Park schools the average salary for administrators was \$33,221 and Holliday \$39,459, and the average salary for other professional support employees (librarians, counselors, nurses, supervisors, etc.) was \$24,910 by Iowa Park and \$25,640 by Holliday.

Taxpayers provided one teacher for 16.9 students in Iowa Park and 19.2 in Holliday, compared to a statewide pupil-ratio of one to 16.3. Because of small classes, especially at the high school level, and abbreviated teaching schedules, many classes have more than the average number of students. House Bill 72 requires no more than 22 students in kindergarten, first, or second grade classes next year, but one-fourth of the districts obtained a waiver from that restriction last year.

The average district imposed a property tax at the rate of 76.3-cents per \$100 of appraised value, which value averaged 89.2 percent of market value (selling price). The "true tax rate" was 68.1-cents (76.3 times 89.2%) statewide. Locally, the rate on market value in Iowa Park was .689 and in Holliday was .749.

The tax on a house in these districts that would sell for \$80,000 would have been \$550 in Iowa Park and \$560 in Holliday. If a homeowner were eligible for homestead exemptions, the tax would have been \$516 in Iowa Park and \$526 in Holliday, and if owned by a person 65 years or older, the tax on an \$80,000 house in the districts would have averaged \$413 in Iowa Park and \$456 in Holliday, or less if subject to a tax freeze.

Revenue lost from exemptions totaled \$915-million, which was \$135-million more than the previous year. To balance school budgets, the revenue loss from exemptions was imposed upon other taxpayers in the school districts.

Local property taxes plus state aid was \$2,631 per student in the Iowa Park district and \$3,102 in the Holliday district, as compared to \$3,299 statewide. The primary purpose of state aid is to equalize state and local tax resources among schools. In 1985-86 tax resources ranged from less than \$2,500 per student in 10 districts to more than \$10,000 in 12 districts.

Trustees hire five new employees here

School trustees, meeting for the first time since June, held a called session Tuesday to accept resignations of four personnel, hire five new personnel, and set up a series of meetings in August for action on the 1986-87 budget.

Resignations of Donnie Ickles,

Allan Andrews, Peggy Rogers and Kathy McBeath were accepted.

Hired were Nancy Bauer, first grade; Martha Harris, Kidwell special education; Rebecca Lovelady, aide at Kidwell; Patsy Jordan, half day

School bus routine changes announced

Major changes will be made in the in-town bussing of school children this fall, according to Robert Palmer, assistant superintendent.

Students living in town and qualify for bus transportation will be required to have cards.

And the number of stops the buses make in the city will be cut drastically.

The changes were primarily brought about following a study by a representative of the Texas Education Agency transportation department,

Palmer explained.

Students were mailed letters several weeks ago, explaining the changes that will be made to simplify the cross-town bussing system, Palmer said.

During the past year, buses made 81 stops in the city which Palmer said resulted in a dangerous loading and unloading system.

One student was run over by a bus during a tornado threat and heavy rain last spring.

The number of stops will be reduced to about 10 this year.

"In order to avoid confusion the first day of school, parents are asked to pick up a bus pass for their students prior to the opening of school," Palmer said.

The passes will be available at the junior high library between 8:30 a.m. and 4 p.m. Aug. 12-13, and after that at the school administration building.

County bus routes will remain essentially unchanged from last year, according to Palmer.

Five-year-old musician studies Suzuki method

Emma Moser, five-year-old daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Willie Moser, spent last week at the 1986 Fort Worth Suzuki Institute and workshop for violin, cello, piano and flute students at Texas Christian Univ. She was accompanied by her mother who attended all of the sessions with her.

Approximately 300 students and 300 parents attended the workshop conducted by noted Suzuki instructors.

Emma is a violin student of Gail Key in Wichita Falls, with whom she has studied three years. At the workshop, she attended three classes each day. One was for three to four students, another was for a group of eight to 10 students, and the other was for a class of 20 students. She also attended a specialty class each day.

During the afternoons, the students and their parents attended concerts, recitals and musical programs. One of the special

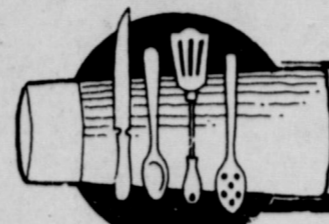
programs was given by the Chester String Quartet.

The Suzuki method of study is based on learning from listening before music reading is learned. To learn in this manner, a child must listen to the pieces he/she is studying until they become a part of him. Then, when the child plays the music, it comes from the inside rather than off a printed page.

The fundamental skills must be mastered before a child can progress. Having a good tone, accurate intonation, correct posture and proper bow hold (with the violin) is stressed.

For the first few years studying the Suzuki method, a parent is required to attend all the student's lessons, taking notes to aid in practice sessions.

The Suzuki method stresses that all music concepts are begun through listening.



Cook of the Week

Dried beans are an American food tradition with good reasons. Besides being tasty, they are rich in vitamin B, iron and protein.

To most people, corn bread must be served with the beans for them to taste their best. Corn bread, still a southern specialty, has been the major bread in America several times when wheat was a scarcity.

Without corn, how could there be corn bread? How long has corn been a part of America? No one in Europe knew about corn before Columbus sailed to America in 1492. When the early explorers arrived from Europe they found the Indians growing it from Canada to the tip of South America.

It became of first importance in the lives of pioneers. Early Americans often used it as money, paid their rent, taxes and debts in corn, and even traded it for marriage licenses.

The pioneers had corn husking parties to brighten settlement life. After the corn was husked it would be ground into meal. Grinding corn in those days was often the job of the boys in the family, and one type of mill they used consisted of two stones.

The pioneer woman made various kinds of corn bread, such as ashcake, hoe cake, Johnny cake and corn pone. Milling today is quite different, and so are some of the recipes for corn bread, one of these is Cheesy Corn Muffins, a recipe that comes from the kitchen of Wendy (Mrs. Charles) Chandler this week.

Wendy, one of the waitresses at the 3M Cafe, and her husband, who is a welder for Natco at Electra, have lived in Iowa Park since 1976. They have a son, Matthew, five years of age, and a daughter, Aimee, 13 months old.

Wendy was graduated from high school at Phoenix, Ariz. She worked as a waitress for several years, and the customers that she serves now attest to her efficiency. Her hobbies, when she has time, are macrame, needlepoint, hooked rugs and ceramics. One of her favorite sources for trusted and tried recipes is the Lily Wallace New American Cook Book published in 1941. Some of her recipes for this week are taken from the book.

CHEESY CORN MUFFINS

- 1 cup flour
- 3/4 cup yellow corn meal
- 1/2 tsp salt
- 2 T sugar
- 1 T baking powder
- 1 beaten egg
- 1 cup milk
- 1 cup shredded American cheese
- 1/4 cup cooking oil or melted shortening

In mixing bowl, stir together the flour, corn meal, sugar, baking powder and salt. Combine egg, cheese, milk and cooking oil. Add to dry ingredients, stirring just till corn meal mixture is moistened. Fill well-greased muffin pans 2/3 full. Bake at 400 degrees 20 to 25 minutes. Makes 12.

CHILEAN BEANS

- 2 medium onions
- 1 lb. ground beef
- 5 pieces bacon
- 2 tsps. salt
- 1/8 tsp. pepper
- 3 shakes Mrs. Dash
- 1 tsp. mustard
- 1 tsp. chili powder
- 1 1/2 cups stewed tomatoes
- 16 oz. pinto beans
- 1 tsp. flour

Cook beans in large pot of salted water. Approximately 1 hour before beans are done, start frying bacon in separate skillet. Chunk bacon into pieces, reserving fat in skillet. Chop onions, cook them and beef in the fat until lightly browned, stirring occasionally.

Drain grease, add seasonings, flour, tomatoes and simmer gently one hour. Drain beans to desired water consistency before adding meat mixture. Combine and simmer several minutes for flavors to blend.

CHICKEN ALA MARYLAND

1 chicken cup up, season with salt and pepper. Roll in flour. Dip in well beaten egg diluted with a little water. Roll in cracker or bread crumbs.

Put in greased baking dish. Dot heavily with butter or cover with slices of bacon. Bake in hot oven (450 degrees). If bacon is used remove last 10 minutes.

FRUIT COCKTAIL CRUNCH

- 2 eggs
- 2 cups sugar
- 2 1/2 cups sifted flour
- 2 tsp. baking soda
- 1-2 1/2 lb. can fruit cocktail with juice
- 1 tsp. cinnamon
- 1 tsp. lemon extract

TOPPING:
1 cup brown sugar and nuts
Beat eggs with sugar. Add flour, soda, cinnamon, lemon extract and fruit cocktail with juice. Mix thoroughly and pour into lightly-greased 9x13 inch glass baking dish. Sprinkle with brown sugar and nuts. Bake at 350 degrees 35 minutes. Serve with ice cream or Cool Whip.

HAMBURGER PATTIES

- 1 lb. hamburger
- 2 eggs
- 1/2 cup bread crumbs
- 1 tsp. salt
- 1/8 tsp. pepper
- 2 T. chopped onion
- 2 T. flour
- 1/3 cup milk

Beat eggs and mix with meat, bread crumbs, milk, salt and pepper. Brown onions in fat and add to meat mixture. Mold into small patties and sprinkle with flour. Fry in small amount of fat until well browned on both sides. Thicken juices left in pan with flour paste made with cold water for gravy. Serves 4.

Pre-Marathon Diet


(Suggestions for those planning to participate in the Hotter 'N Hell 100 bicycle race)

In preparing for marathons or other long distance runs, the British Medical Journal suggests, reduce your protein (meat) intake and eat more carbohydrate (potatoes, bread, pasta, cereals, rice and sweet things) for the last 3 days before the race.

Unless you reduce your protein intake at this time, you will be unable to take in enough carbohydrate.

The idea is to build up your muscles' energy stores of glycogen (a natural carbohydrate), which cannot be so easily formed from protein. Also, during the 3 pre-race days, you should rest more and run less in order not to burn this energy store.

Extra vitamins are not needed at this time if you have been eating well-balanced meals.



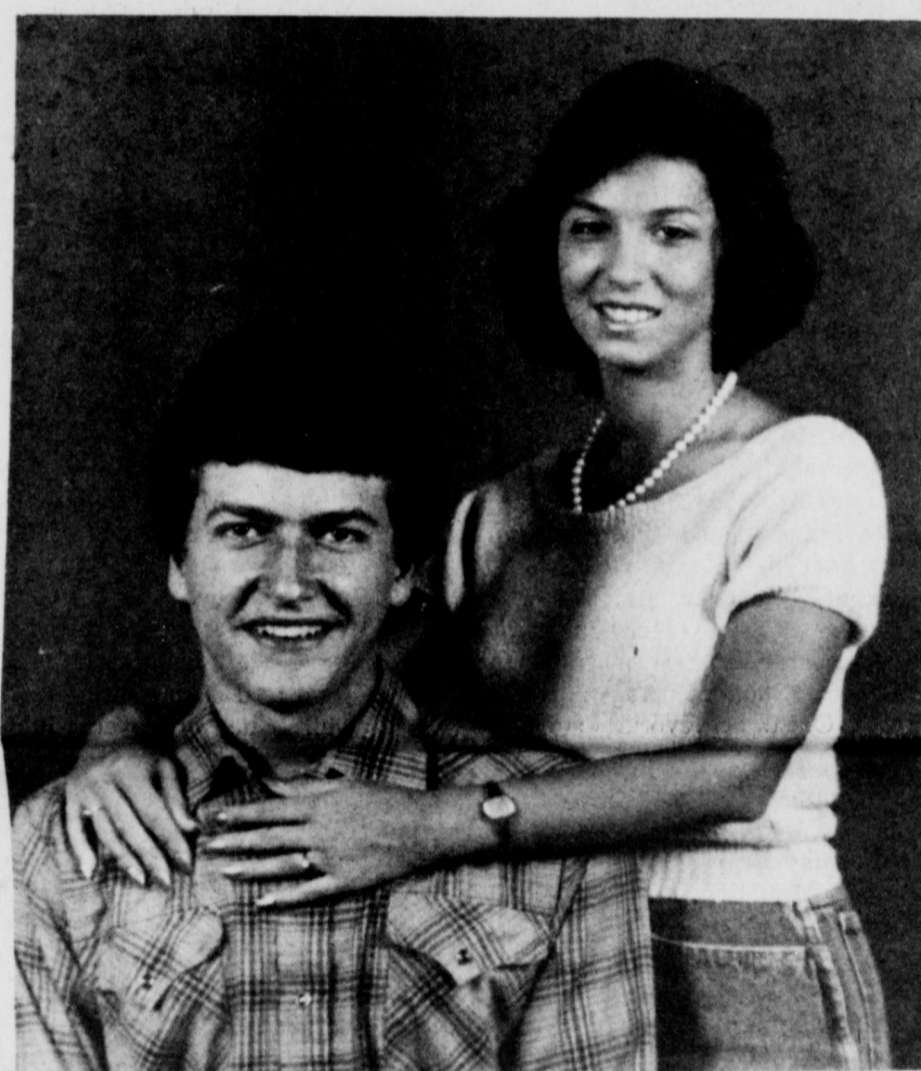

As I See It....

On the front page of this issue, you will find a report on the increased cost of public education in Texas, as a direct result of House Bill 72.

The report indicates public education costs have increased more than \$2-billion since HB 72 was passed.

I'm remembering reports from two school superintendents, Harold

Cowley of Iowa Park and Dan Owens of Holliday, about being chewed out for comments both made, quoted in this paper, about how the cost of education was going to rise.

As soon as the stories were run, each was accosted over the telephone by a woman who identified herself as Sen. Ray Farabee's secretary, and she proceeded to chew each of them out

and tell them how little they knew of the overall program and how irresponsible they were to make such statements.

Farabee, you will recall, was one of the big supporters of the bill.

I don't know if the secretary is still in Farabee's office, if she was at the time of the telephone calls. Whether she is or not is of no importance. She owes these two guys a major apology.

And there's another problem concerning education and another Wichita Falls man. This one is up at West Texas State Univ. at Canyon.

Back in 1984, WTSU board members approved construction of a house for the school president. It was to be 6,122 square feet and cost a mere \$494,900.

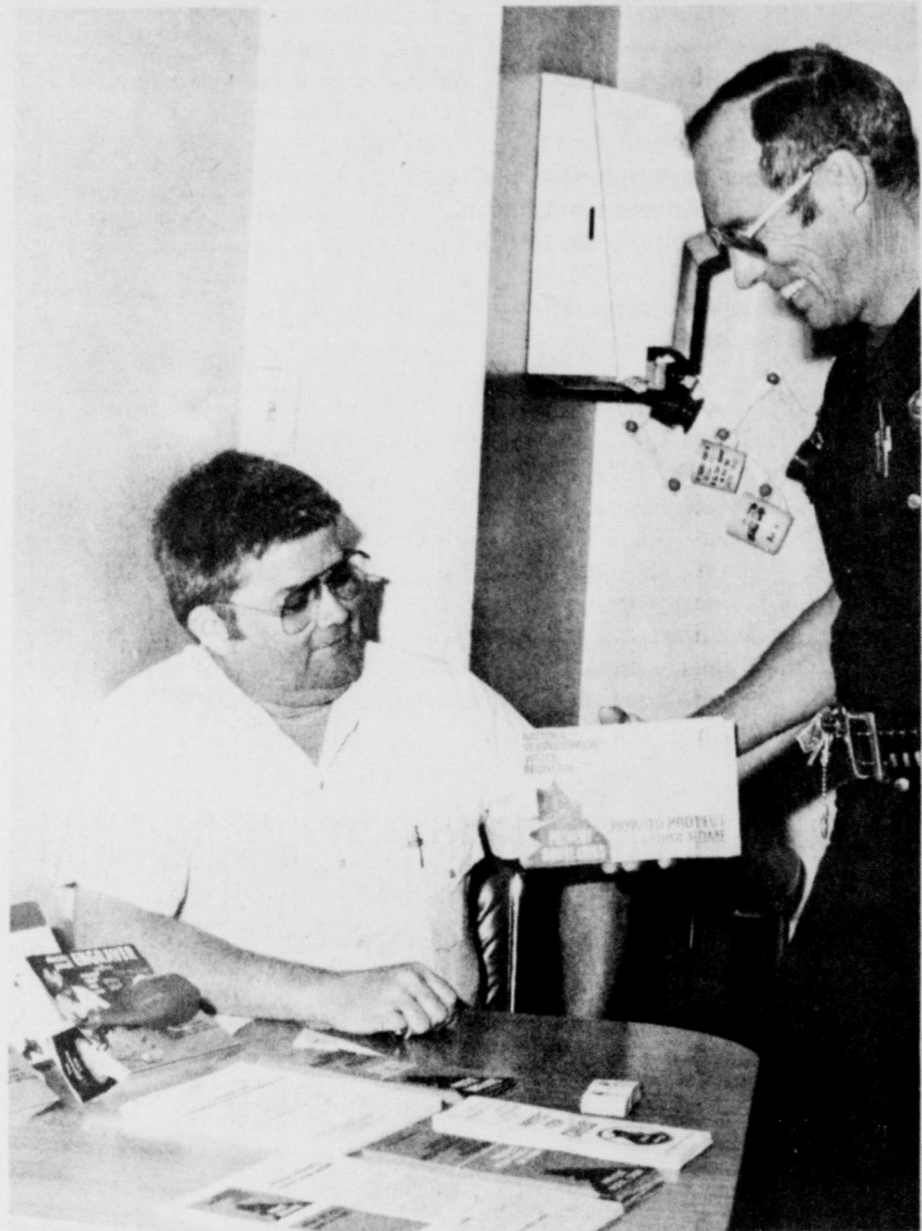
Well, Wichitan Ray Clymer, who is chairman of the Campus Planning Committee, told the board recently that the project now is estimated at 7,300 square feet and will cost \$850,000.

"We have not blatantly overrun the limit as we understood it," Clarence Thompson, WTSU vice president for finance and administrative services, is quoted in a recent issue of the Canyon News.

I guess that "slightly" larger house was a trade-off for the one the school was going to get for its president.

Only a few years ago, the school had put down a bunch of money on an option to buy a big, beautiful house for several hundreds of thousands of dollars, also.

Problem was, that house was already built. And it was located in Amarillo, about 25 miles from the WTSU campus!

AREA OIL & GAS NEWS

Two producers have been brought on line in Wichita County's K-M-A Field, with Sage Energy as the operator.

Located three miles southwest of Kamay, the wells are in a 4,640-acre lease in the W. H. Spillers Survey, A-257. They are designated as the Nos. 360 & 362 KMA Southwest Waterflood Unit.

The wells showed potential to pump oil at the combined rate of 74 barrels per day, plus a combined 1,023 barrels of water. Total drilling depths were 3,920 and 3,940 feet into the wellbore. Production is from perforations in the Straw Reef Formation ranging from 3,801 to 3,838 feet into the wellbore.

The No. 360 well is located 3,000 feet from the south line and 330 feet from the east line of the survey.

Drillsite for the No. 362 well is 1,100 feet from the south line and 330 feet from the east line of the survey.

The No. 15-A Earle Denny "A", a 250-ft. developmental well, is scheduled to be drilled in the Wichita Regular Field, D.D. Strange of Wichita Falls is the operator. The well will be spudded in an 82-acre lease four miles northeast of Kamay in the H.B. Balch Survey, A-12.

The well will be located 2,350 feet from the north line and 1,200 feet from the east line of survey.

Ray Craighead Petroleum of Wichita Falls is planning to conduct a re-entry operation at the No. 3-A Mrs. E. D. Collett, a developmental well in the Wichita Regular Field. The well is located five miles south of Electra in a 251-acre lease in the GC&SF Survey, A-767.

O'Donohoe & Fouts was the well's original operator. It was completed Nov. 17, 1965, and produced from Canyon Formation perforations at 1,808 to 1,904 feet into the hole. Well's original total depth was 2,610 feet. Craighead will be seeking pay at approximately 2,000 feet.

Location of the well is 1,200 feet from the north line and 660 feet from the west line of the lease.

The Wichita Regular Field gained a producer when Ronkaran Oil completed the No. 1 James Cullum five miles east of Kamay.

The well indicated ability to pump 12 barrels of oil per day, plus 14 barrels of water. It bottomed at 1,840 feet, and was plugged back to 1,271 feet. Production is from perforations in the Cisco Formation, 1,212 to 1,228 feet into the wellbore.

The operation is located in a 20-acre lease in the Denton CSL Survey, A-417.

Drillsite is 420 feet from the south line and 200 feet from the east line of the lease.

At a location six miles east-southeast of Electra, Tom Swanson has finished an oil producer in the Wichita Regular Field.

The well is designated as the No. 66 Burnett "C", pumping ten barrels of oil per day.

Location is in a 10-acre lease in the T&NO Survey, A-316. Bottomed at 1,774 feet and plugged back to 1,546 feet, the well produces from perforations in the Cisco Sand Formation, 1,378 to 1,384 feet into the wellbore.

The well is located 4,710 feet from the north line and 3,490 feet from the east line of the survey.

An 8,200-ft. wildcat well is planned by Kadane Oil of Wichita Falls at a drillsite 5.5 miles south-southeast of Medicine Mounds, Hardeman County. The location is in a 40-acre lease in the H&TC Survey, A-1408. Well's designation is the No. 1 Cato-Holmes Unit.

The well will be drilled 148 feet from the north line and 25 feet from the west line of the lease.

The W. T. Waggoner Estate has issued plug-and-abandon orders for the No. 2 W.T. Waggoner Estate "AM", a developmental well in the

Wilbarger Regular Field. It was spudded March 4, and bottomed with no commercial prospects at 2,000 feet.

Drillsite was 12 miles south of Harold in the H&TC Survey, A-39.

Drillsite was 1,960 feet from the south line and 1,170 feet from the west line of the lease.

W.C. Winfrey has filed production figures on an oil well in the Wichita Regular Field. The No. 1 Lilyan Chilson showed ability to pump 15 barrels of oil per day, plus 25 barrels of water.

The operator has 55 acres leased, with drillsite in the Denton CSL Survey, A-417. The well is located seven miles south of Iowa Park.

Production will be from Cisco Formation perforations, 1,145 to 1,155 feet into the wellbore. Total drilling depth was 5,123 feet, and the well was plugged back to 1,228 feet.

The well is located 330 feet from the south line and 235 feet from the east line of the lease.

Carl Catlin has given up on his efforts to make a producer out of the No. 27 Birk "A-1986". It was a developmental venture in the Wichita Regular Field, two miles south of Iowa Park.

Spudded Jan. 15, the well bottomed at 804 feet with no commercial prospects.

Drillsite was 1,250 feet from the south line and 400 feet from the east line of the survey.

Lawyers are vital for their "training in the law" but no where do I see that the law degree automatically qualifies one as a leader of men without "just dues" backing it up.

Low-interest mortgage funds available in state

Approximately \$73-million in low-interest mortgage loans became available to Texas homebuyers as of last week, a Texas Housing Agency official announced Thursday.

The FHA-insured loans will be offered to eligible low- and moderate-income borrowers at a fixed payment rate of 8.70 percent over 30 years, with a three to five percent maximum downpayment, said Dan A. McNeil, Acting Executive Administrator of the Texas Housing Agency.

The housing agency has established maximum income limits and a ceiling on home prices to direct the program more effectively to households least able to afford conventional interest rates, McNeil said.

To qualify for the program, an individual applicant must have an adjusted gross income for the preceding tax year of \$33,000 or less; the combined income ceiling for a family is \$42,000.

In addition, for homes in most areas of the state, borrowers must be first-time homebuyers or not have owned their principal residence in the past three years.

The board will hold a regular meeting Aug. 18, at which time trustees hope to adopt the budget and set the tax rate.

To Mr. Andrews, I thank you for all the help and support you have given, not only to my daughters, but to all the students you have worked with and join in others wishing you the best of luck.

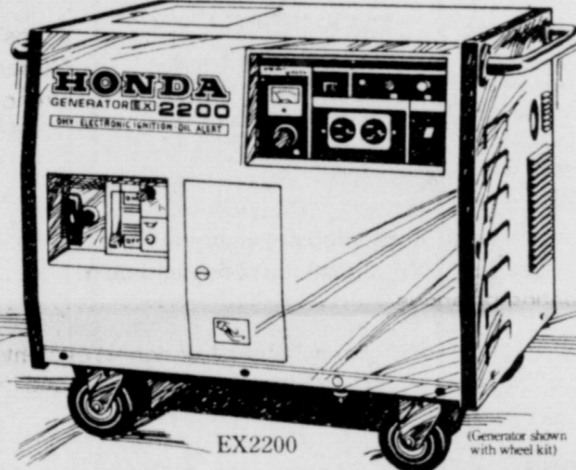
