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Trustees fill posts open at high school

Iowa Park school trustees named a new assistant high school principal and is bringing back a familiar face to direct the choral department.

At a called meeting of the board Tuesday, trustees elected Randy Lovelady to succeed Donny Ickles as assistant high school principal.

And the new choir director will be the former director, Darrell Dick.

Lovelady, a 1970 graduate of Iowa Park High, has taught the past 12 years on the elementary level here. He replaces Ickles, who accepted the position of principal at Graham High School.

Dick taught here from 1966 to 78, before accepting the position of choir director at Duncanville High School.

He was replaced by Allan Andrews, who recently moved to become director of choirs at Irving High School.

Lovelady was chosen from a field of four applicants, including Tom Venhaus and Dennis Brooks. The other was from Henrietta.

Other action by the board, following a three-hour executive session that was closed to the public, was approval to continue the suspension of vocational teacher Kenneth Watts.

The motion was: "Suspension of Kenneth Watts be continued, with pay, until district court disposition of his criminal case or until October 31st, whichever occurs sooner; at which time the matter will be reviewed again by the board."

Watts has been charged of two counts of indecency with a child, and was suspended before the spring semester was completed.

Trustees got their first look at the proposed expenditures for 1986-87, which indicates the cost of this year, will be \$5,464,620.

The line item budget was reviewed by board members, who indicated they saw little or no fat in the figures. However, they'll take another look at it Tuesday, and hold at least one other hearing for the public on Aug. 18.

Supt. Glen Mitchell, explaining the amount of state aid probably will not be known until the special session of the legislature is ended, gave estimated revenues based on previous year funding.

In order to fund the expenditures, Mitchell's budget would call for an increase of four cents, from 71-cents to 75-cents, in the local tax rate.

Increase in expenditures, if that portion of the budget is approved, would be \$153,953 greater than the previous year.

New students should register

With the start of another school year just around the corner, Iowa Park administrators are anxious to register students who did not attend classes here last year.

Student who will attend high school and were not here at the end of the spring semester, and have not registered, are asked to report at the campus as soon as possible.

Principal Richard Davis said his office is open from 8 a.m. to noon, and 1 to 4 p.m. every weekday.

Students who have not enrolled and will be attending either of the other three campuses, junior high, Bradford or Kidwell elementaries, will be registered Thursday and Friday of next week, between the hours of 8 a.m. and noon and 1-3 p.m.

Kidwell Elementary handles all Early Childhood, kindergarten, first and second grades. Third, fourth and fifth grades attend Bradford Elementary.

The sixth, seventh and eighth grades are located at Iowa Park Junior High.

Administrators emphasize the importance of early registration by new students, explaining they must have the space for the students and the teachers required. This is all determined by the number of students enrolled.

Immunization records are required for all students enrolling in Texas schools. Students are not permitted to attend class until the records are presented to the principal's office.

Bus students need passes

All students who will be riding buses to school this year will need to pick up a bus pass at Iowa Park Junior High library, between 8:30 a.m. and 3:30 p.m. next Tuesday or Wednesday, according to Robert Palmer, assistant superintendent.

The student will be assigned a bus number, loading and unloading time, and a loading and unloading location, while picking up the pass.

Students unable to pick up passes on the designated days can get one at the school administration office until the first day of school.

All students riding buses will need a pass, Palmer emphasized.

Students who qualify to ride school buses are those who must cross FM 368, U.S. 287, or Old Iowa Park Highway when walking to school, or who live two or more miles from their campus.

Senior portraits slated next week

Iowa Park High School seniors are to have their portraits made Tuesday and Wednesday of next week, according to Judy Spring, yearbook advisor.

Seniors have been notified by mail of their appointment times. Anyone needing an appointment change should call the advisor Monday at 592-2144.

Iowa Park police arrested six persons during the past week, on charges ranging from traffic violations to indecency with a child to possession of drug paraphernalia.

Mary Arthur Beyer, 43, was arrested Thursday morning on a felony warrant of "indecency with a child." He was transported to county jail.

The first was Gary Ruff Steger, on an outstanding warrant from the Wichita Falls Department of Public Safety for speeding and failure to appear. He was released after posting a \$101 bond.

Schools told to hold setting of tax rates

Members of the state legislature may think they've got the world on their shoulders, as they meet in Austin to find a solution to the \$3.5-billion shortfall in the treasury.

But they should know they're not by themselves.

Every school board in the state is now watching the calendar, and the clock, trying to comply with state law in setting their 1986-87 budgets.

It's so bad, that the Texas Commissioner of Education, W.N. Kirby, has advised all districts to hold off on setting the tax rate portion of their budgets.

Glenn Mitchell, Iowa Park superintendent of schools, began meeting with his board Tuesday, presenting his first draft of the budget.

Iowa Park will apparently go along with most of the other districts in the state in finalizing the expenditure portion of the budget, but hold off on setting a tax rate.

Kirby's letter explains fully the timing regulations of the law. His letter states:

I am sure that all administrators are aware that Governor White has called a special session of the Legislature to be convened on August 6, 1986. The session will deal with the budget and revenue crisis facing the state. This situation presents a particular problem to school districts since there is a statutory requirement that budgets be prepared and possibly adopted before the session of the Legislature adjourns. It is possible that the Legislature may find it necessary to modify in some way the amounts and/or the distribution of state aid to school districts. For this reason, districts must proceed with

adoption of their budget, but I am recommending that they seriously consider deferring adoption of the tax rate to fund the budget.

The most significant portions of the Texas Education Code governing budgets are:

"Section 23.42. Preparation of Budget

(a) Not later than August 20 of each year, the president shall prepare, or cause to be prepared, a budget covering all estimated receipts and proposed expenditures of the district for the next succeeding fiscal year..."

"Section 23.45. Budget Meeting

(a) When the budget is prepared, the president shall call a meeting of the board of trustees, giving 10 days public notice and stating that the purpose of the meeting is the adoption of a budget for the succeeding fiscal year.

(b) It shall be the duty of the board of trustees, at the meeting called for that purpose, to adopt a budget to cover all expenditures for the independent school district for the next succeeding fiscal year. Any taxpayer of the district may be present and participate in the hearing.

(c) The budget must be adopted before the adoption of the tax rate for the tax year in which the fiscal year covered by the budget begins."

"Section 24.47. Effect of Adopted Budget; Amendments

(a) No public funds of the independent school district shall be expended in any manner other than as provided for in the budget adopted by the board of trustees, but the board shall have the authority to amend the budget or to adopt a supplementary emergency budget to cover necessary

unforeseen expenses..."

School boards shall proceed with the adoption of their 1986-87 budget based on their best estimate of anticipated state aid and the provisions of law above. In adopting a budget, the district shall be aware of the possibility that changes may be made by the special session of the Legislature; however, a budget must be adopted before the school year begins (See Sec. 24.47(a)).

Based on current law and the best information available at this time, a Summary of Finances for the 1986-87 school year will be mailed within the next few days. This will be an initial estimate of the amount of state aid the school district might receive. Also, based on the current information, a certificate of loss in state aid will also be mailed to appropriate districts. From time to time during the year, the estimate of state aid will be revised as current information becomes available. If the special session acts to reduce state aid, then the certified loss amount will also be modified.

Given the uncertainty caused by the impending special session, it may be advisable to delay adoption of a district tax rate until 1986-87 state aid levels can be more properly determined. Once a district adopts its tax rate, there is no statutory provision to change that rate, even if circumstances change. Whenever the rate is adopted, it must be done in accordance with truth-in-taxation requirements.

At this time, I am recommending that school districts delay adopting a tax rate until more definite information about state aid and district obligations is available. The Texas Property Tax Code, Section 26.05(a), states: "By September 1 or as soon thereafter as practicable, the governing body of each taxing unit

Season tickets now on sale

Reserved season tickets for Hawk varsity football games will go on sale today, in the high school principal's office.

Tickets will be sold each weekday, from 8 a.m. until noon, and 1-4 p.m.

Reserved season tickets are \$3.50 per game, when purchased in advance. With five home games this season, a book of tickets will cost \$17.50.

Reserved seat holders from last year have until Sept. 12 to pick up their season tickets, or lose their option on that particular reserved seat, according to Richard Davis, principal.

No reserved tickets will be sold at the gate during the season. All tickets at the gate will be \$4. Pre-game general admission for adults will be \$3, and pre-game student tickets \$2, Davis said.

Magazine is confused but picks Mean Green

How does Texas Football Magazine figure the Hawks will do this season?

Well, the authors indicate on one page the Hawks are favored to win Dist. 6-AAA.

But on another page they've listed Abilene Wylie, a school that's not even in the district.

The apparent confusion is the fact that, when the UIL realigned this year, Wylie and Ballinger were moved to Dist. 5 and Iowa Park from Dist. 5 to Dist. 6, and somehow one of the writers got caught. Ballinger is picked on both those pages to win Dist. 5 this year.

Anyway, The rankings of Dist. 6 this year by Texas Football is Iowa Park, Decatur, Breckenridge, Jacksboro, Bridgeport and Bowie.

According to the article: "District 6-AAA -- Realignment has created a dandy three-team race in

this North Texas district between Iowa Park and Breckenridge, last season's playoff representatives, and Decatur, which went to the quarter-finals three years ago. Iowa Park's defense and Decatur's offense make them the favorites, with rebuilding Breckenridge close behind."

About the Hawks, the magazine states, "Iowa Park where tradition runs strong, made the playoffs last season with a 7-4-1 mark, but now the Hawks face a question at quarterback. Coach David Baugh must choose among 3 good candidates: junior Jeff Huff and seniors Scott Davis and Brad Huff. Whatever the decision, the return of speedster Scott Weaver (6-0, 170, 800 yards rushing last year) and TE Scott Allen (6-1, 200) should keep the offense on the go. All-district NG Robert Adams (5-11, 210) and LB Dennis Phillips

should fortify the defense. Such seasoned players as end Wayne Oltman, tackles Greg Young (6-4, 205) and Charles Stamm (5-10, 205), NG Greg Feltman and DBs David Meissner and Danny Foreman round out the picture nicely."

Texas Football ranks the top AAA teams this year, in order, Daingerfield, Cuero, Ballinger, Port Arthur Austin, Crane, Kirbyville, Hillsboro, Hempstead, Navasota and University City Randolph.

Two former Hawks are mentioned in this year's edition of TF. Both are on the Texas Tech Red Raiders.

Charles Perry, listed as 6-4 and 260, is on the Raiders' two-deep chart as a backup to Danny Schwertner of Reagan County as a defensive tackle.

Jeryl Brixey, 6-1, 250, is backup to returning starting center Chris Tanner of Arlington.

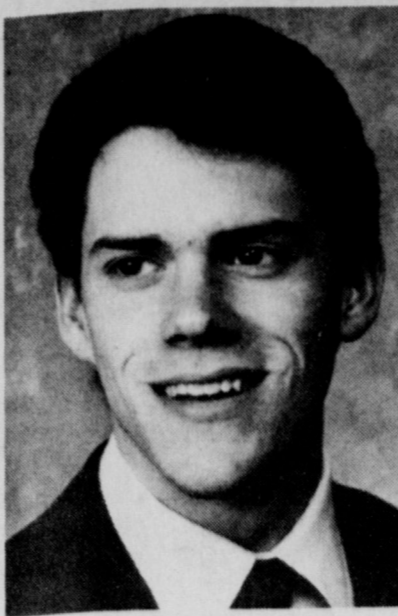


Birk to repeat recital

"Campers prepared their own dinner at an outdoor cookout using foil cookery," explained Oswald.

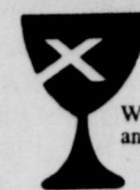

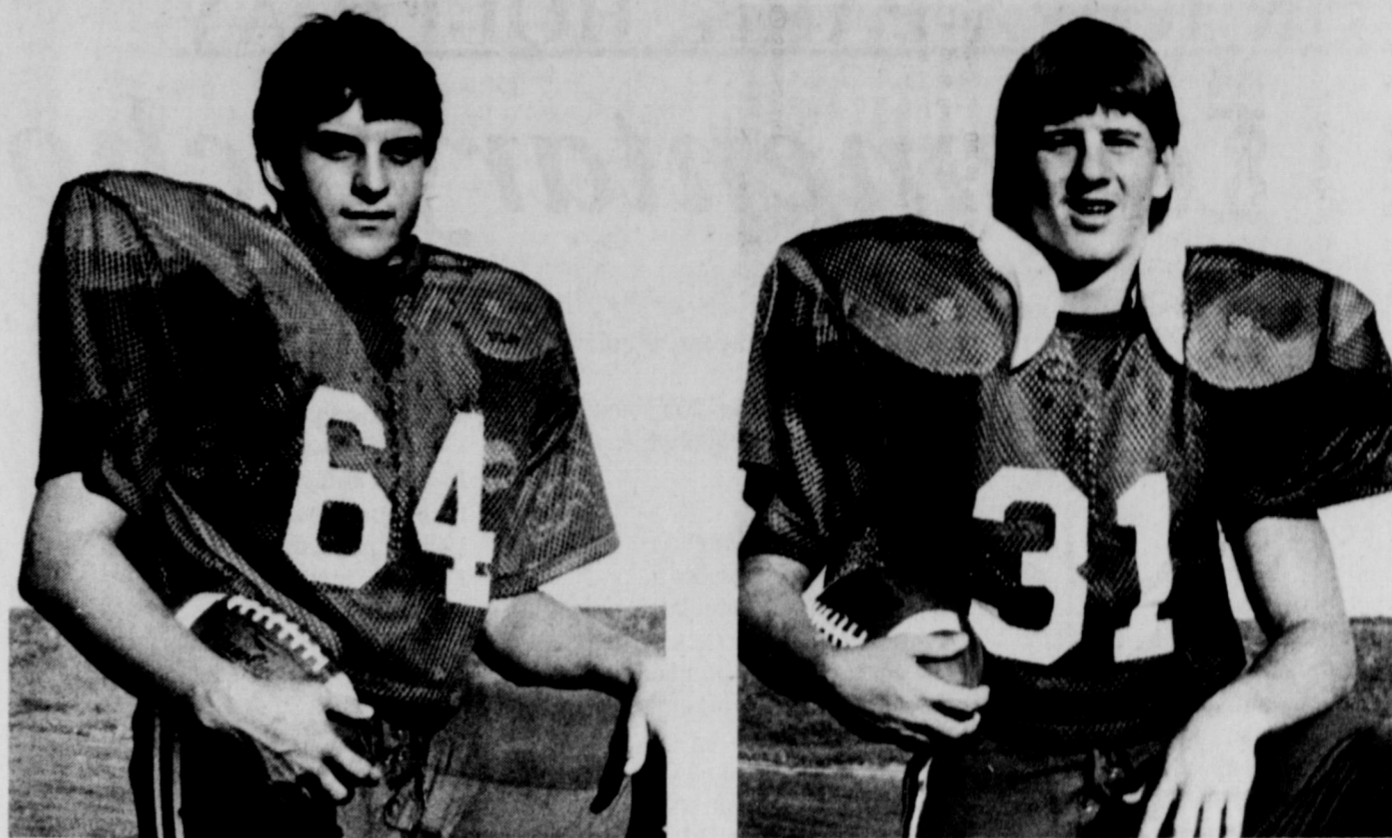
Backes recognized

Food and Mood . . .

You are what you eat is taking on more significance in studies at the University of Chicago Medical Center.

According to Dr. John Crayton, certain foods were found to affect the mood (and immune system) of 23 persons with a history of food sensitivity.

When subjects ingested concentrated sources of food-sensitizers (such as milk, wheat or chocolate), 16 of 23 said they felt more anxious, depressed or irritable.

The same 16 also showed a temporary drop in levels of proteins involved in the immune system.

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Cook of the Week

The art of good cooking is not a thing of the past even though many cooks have less time to spend in the kitchen. However, they still have a renewed interest in using recipes that have stood the test of time, those prepared by mother and grandmother, and passed down from generation. Two of Mrs. M.H. Teel's dessert recipes this week are proof of that. She shares three other dessert recipes that are made from scratch.

Most Americans have a "sweet tooth" and are known for their famous pastries, cakes and baked goods. American settlers liked desserts and devised some interesting confections reflecting their various backgrounds and existing conditions in the New World.

Modern housewives do not have to exert the effort the early Americans did to have tempting, tantalizing desserts, and their recipes do not sacrifice creative style or good taste.

Barbara Teel has been employed as a bookkeeper for the Iowa Park schools 10 years. Her husband is employed at Sheppard Air Force Base 3770th Technical Training Group as manager for instruction courses in civil service.

They have two children. John, their son, will be a senior high school student this year. He is a gifted musician and is currently serv-

ing as organist for the First United Methodist Church. They have a daughter, Jennifer, three years old.

Barbara has served as pianist of the University Park Church of the Nazarene in Wichita Falls six years. Her hobbies are cooking and gardening.

PECAN PIE FILLING (Mom's and Granny's recipe)

1/2 cup light syrup
1/2 cup dark syrup
1/2 cup sugar
3 eggs
1/4 tsp. salt
3 T. oleo
1 tsp. vanilla

Mix all the above ingredients with an electric mixer-probably about 2 minutes. Pour into unbaked pie shell.

Lay 1 cup of pecans on top of the mixture and bake 40-50 minutes.

Note: This is an excellent recipe that is not too sweet.

MOTHER'S RECIPE FOR CREAM PIE FILLING

2 1/2 cups milk
4 egg yolks
Beat egg yolks and add to milk. Mix well and warm over low heat.

Mix together:

1 cup sugar
4 heaping tablespoons flour
After mixing flour and sugar well, add to milk mixture. Cook until desired thickness. Add desired flavor (see below) and 1 teaspoon of vanilla. Pour into baked pie shell.

Flavor variations:

Drain small can crushed pineapple for "Pineapple Cream."
Add 3 heaping tablespoons cocoa to flour and sugar for "Chocolate Cream."
Add 1 cup coconut for "Coconut Cream."

Add 1 cup chopped bananas for "Banana Cream."
Add juice of 1 large lemon or small amount of lemon peel for "Lemon Cream."

Top with meringue:
4 egg whites, beaten to peak
Add 4 tablespoons of sugar and mix well. Spread over pie and brown in 350 degree oven.

COCONUT PINEAPPLE PIE

1/2 cup oleo
1 cup sugar
3 eggs
1/2 cup Karo
1 tsp. flour
1 small can crushed pineapple, drained
1 cup coconut
Preheat oven to 300 degrees.
Drain pineapple. Cream butter and sugar, flour, Karo, lightly beaten eggs, pineapple and coconut; mix well. Pour into unbaked 9-inch crust and bake until golden brown or until tested by inserting knife blade.

CHEWY OATMEAL COOKIES

1 cup flour
3/4 tsp. soda
1/2 tsp. salt
1 tablespoon cinnamon
1/4 tsp. nutmeg

3/4 cup shortening
1 1/3 cup firmly packed brown sugar
2 eggs
1 tsp. vanilla
2 cups oats, uncooked
1 cup raisins or nuts

Sift together flour, salt, soda, cinnamon and nutmeg into a bowl. Add shortening, sugar, eggs and vanilla and beat until smooth. Stir in oats and raisins or nuts. Bake on slightly greased cookie sheet at 350 degrees 12-15 minutes.

QUICK CHERRY CHEESECAKE

CRUST:
1 cube oleo
1/4 lb. crushed graham crackers
Mix together and press into 9x13 pan or dish.

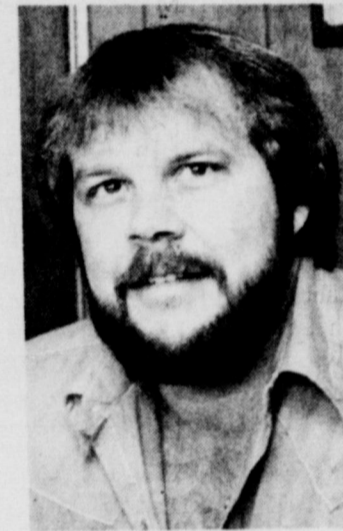
FILLING:

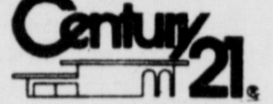

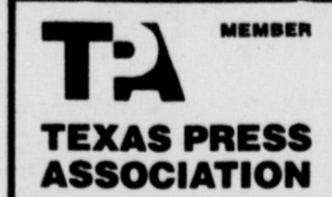
