## Food and Mood

You are what you eat is taking on more signifi cance in studies at the University of Chicago Medical Center.
According to Dr. John Crayton, certain foods were found to affect the mood (and immune system) of 23 persons with a history of food sensitivity.

When subjects ingested concentrated sources of food-sensitizers (such as milk, wheat or chocolate), 16 of 23 said they felt more anxious, depressed or irritable.
The same 16 also showed a temporary drop in levels of proteins involved in the immune system
