## Teachers return to work tomorrow

The 1986-87 school year is just about to begin, and the large number of cars and people at Iowa Park High School campus tomorrow is a clear indication.

The entire faculty will report there Friday morning to begin in-service training.

The faculty will meet in the auditorium for a general session, beginning at 8:30.

Following a coffee and doughnut period, Supt. Glen Mitchell will welcome the staff and introduce all new members, as well as make special announcements.

Rule and curriculum changes for the year will be noted by Robert Palmer, assistant superintendent, and he will introduce the morning's guest speaker, Cindy Bradford, of KFDX television.

The teachers are to report to their respective campuses from 10:45 to noon, and meet at the high school cafeteria for lunch.

Faculty members will return to their campuses the entire afternoon for meetings with their principals.

Inservice continues through all of next week. Teachers will be at the high school auditorium Monday, Tuesday and Wednesday, and at their campuses Thursday and Friday.

Monday morning, the program will center on special education. That afternoon and all day Tuesday, the

subject will be Methods for Effective Teaching and Supervision.

Wednesday, teachers will meet at the high school and that afternoon at their home campuses, but the subject the entire day will be Texas Teacher Appraisal System.

### STUDENT SCHEDULES

Iowa Park High School students are to pick up their class schedules, locker assignments, home room assignments, parking permits and fill out required paperwork either Aug. 28 or 29, according to Principal Richard Davis.

Seniors are to report between 8:30 and 11:30 a.m. next Thursday,

and juniors between 1 and 3:30 p.m. Sophomores will report the same hours as the seniors, but on Friday, and freshmen Friday afternoon.

Any student who has moved into the district this year and not yet registered, should do so immediately, school officials say.

A student who will be in grades nine through 12 should report to the high school; grades six through eight at the junior high school; grades three through five at Breadford Elementary, and kindergarten through second grade at Kidwell Elementary.

All students will commence the 1986-87 school year at 8:10 a.m. on Sept. 2.

## City, school taxes subject of meetings

Both Iowa Park taxing entities, the city and school, will be acting on taxes at their meetings next week.

The city, which is to meet at 7 p.m. Monday in council chambers, is to set its budget and tax rate.

Tuesday, the school board is to hold its public hearing on the budget, but will not set the tax rate until a later date.

School trustees are to meet after touring the junior high building, which is to begin at 7 p.m.

City aldermen will be asked to authorize the city administrator to enter into a contract for group medical insurance, and also advertise for bids for sewer line smoke testing.

The council will consider a policy of enforcing a provision in the Standard Building Code to license building contractors.

Also to be considered is a request to authorize use of a portion of Lake Iowa Park waterfront for picnic area

and trap shooting.

The Volunteer Fire Department has submitted a request to replace the emergency vehicle, and action could be taken on that Monday.

A report is on the agenda concerning a proposal by the Texas Highway Department to rebuild South Wall, and another report on Enhanced 911 telephone service is expected.

An executive session is slated on the meeting agenda. One part is on "pending or contemplated litigation or settlement offers," and the other on "purchase of real property."

The agenda provides for action on either or both the topics once the meeting is reopened to the public.

Supt. Glen Mitchell said he will ask the board to tour the junior high building prior to Tuesday's meeting, to inspect the newly-painted interior and other improvements made during the summer.

Also on the agenda, besides act-

ing on the proposed \$5.4-million expenditure budget, are topics centered around the Texas Teacher Appraisal System, the superintendent said.

A list of appraisers will be submitted, as will setting a calendar beginning and ending the appraisal period.

The board is not expected to take action on setting a tax rate for the 1986-87 school year until after the special session of the state legislature, which in part is determining how much state money will be provided to local school districts to fund the coming year.

## 1100 block of Cornelia to be closed temporarily

The 1100 block of West Cornelia will be closed temporarily next week to permit construction of a 10-foot concrete valley gutter, according to Mike Price, public works director for the city.

The project is to correct a drainage and pavement problem.

Crews will close the street at 9 a.m. Tuesday, and reopen it the following Friday, Price said.

Residents south of 1116 and 1117 will still be able to reach their property from Corrine, but those north of the addresses will have to travel on the Access Road.

More work will be done the following week to correct potholes, which have been a constant problem because of poor drainage.

Price said the Johnson Road project could possibly be completed by the first of September, with pouring of concrete of the curb about the only work remaining.

Sealcoating of 64 blocks of pavement is to begin this morning and be completed Friday, Price said.

Residents of the blocks to be sealcoated are asked to not park on the streets either day, and not drive on the surfaces until the barriers are removed.

Price said a lot of workers' time is lost on this type of project when they have to locate the owners of vehicles parked on the streets, and ask that they be moved.

Blocks involved, and the order in which crews will be working, are:

- 100 through 400 blocks of South Jackson, from railroad tracks south to Lafayette;
- 100 through 400 blocks of South Colorado, from Daisy south to Lafayette;
- 400 and 500 blocks of West Chestnut, from FM 368 west to west side of Holder's house;
- 400 through 1100 blocks of South Texowa, from Ruby south to Garden;
- 100 through 1000 blocks of East Ruby, from Wall east to FM 1814;
- 100 through 700 blocks of East Jefferson, from Wall east to Hawthorne;
- 100 and 200 blocks of West Smith, from Wall west to Jackson;
- 300 through 1000 blocks of East Cash, from Bond east to Bell;
- 100 through 1500 blocks of North Victoria, from East Highway north to Access Road;
- 100 North Texowa, from East Highway north to Cash;
- 400 through 1000 blocks of East Pasadena, from Texowa east to Bell.

## Farm Bureau dedication set

Members of the Wichita County Farm Bureau will dedicate their new office building, at 105 N. Bond, with an open house between 2 and 4 p.m. Sunday.

Special invitations have been issued to all former county presidents or their widows, board members and secretaries.

S.M. True, Texas Farm Bureau president from Plainview, will be on hand for the 2 o'clock ribbon cutting.

The new building serves 1,450 members and offices three secretaries, two claims adjusters and six insurance agents.

The 51-year-old farm organization had its beginning in Iowa Park with 15 members. Surviving charter members include Loys Barbour, Mrs. Walter Scott, Swan Reeves and O.W. Prechel.

Fred Dwyer serves as president of the county organization.

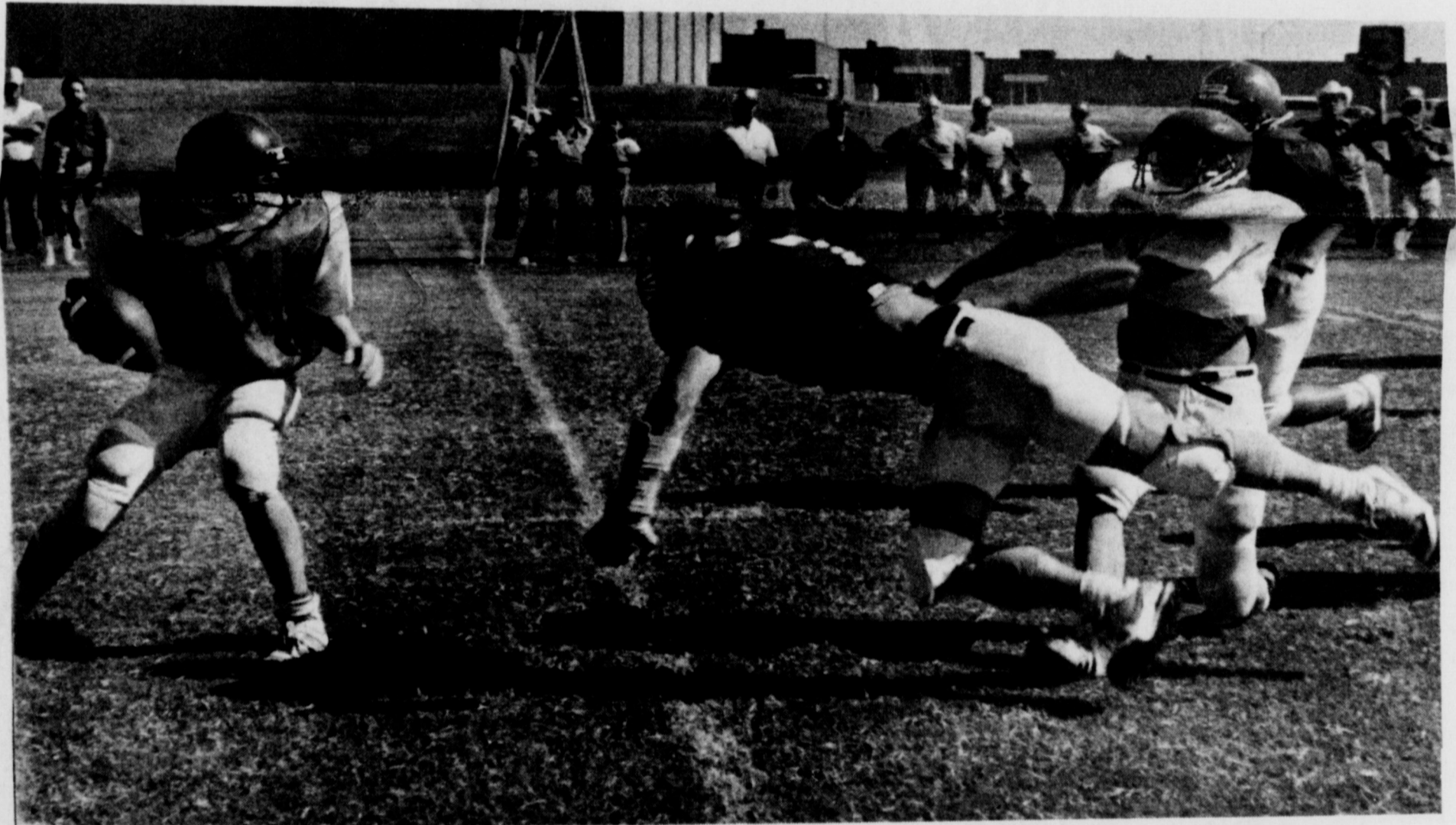
## Four drivers are arrested

## Chamber directors hear United Way drive report

Directors of the Chamber of Commerce Monday heard a report on this year's United Way fund drive, and learned a group of some 200 persons wants to make a walking visit here in October.

Ron Keeney, this year's chairman of the Greater Wichita Falls United Way, expressed optimism of reaching a goal of \$1,950,000, despite the loss of several known contributing businesses.

Keeney said nine percent of the budget was donated by businesses known to have closed their doors since last year.

This, with a three-percent increase in spending budget, makes a 12-percent "make up" needed in donations for the coming year, Keeney said.

Of the 30 agencies funded by United Way, two are located in Iowa Park. They are the Friendly Door and Iowa Park Recreational Activities Center.

Many of the other agencies also serve Iowa Parkans, Keeney reported.

Iowa Park joined the Greater Wichita Falls United Way in 1976. That year, Keeney said, the total budget was \$984,000.

More than 20 percent of this year's budget has already been pledged by a group of industries, one of which is Cryovac.

During the business portion of the monthly directors' meeting, it was reported a group known as Volksmarch wants to come to Iowa Park Oct. 25-26 and walk through the community.

Members set up a seven-mile route to walk at their gatherings, which are normally held in Wichita Falls. A route was not identified yet.

A meeting place mentioned from which to start the walk would be the park at city hall.

The board voted to design a certificate which could be presented to businesses and individuals who make significant contributions to the improvement of appearance in the business areas of the city.

A fund has been established at State National Bank to assist a young Iowa Park couple with hospital and medical expenses incurred in the recent loss of an infant son.

Donations deposited to the Mich-

ael and Christina Webb Fund will be used to pay some \$70,000 in bills.

Sunday will be the last day this season for the Iowa Park Bicentennial Swimming Pool.

When the pool closes at 6 p.m.,

it will not be re-opened until summer of 1987, according to Supt. Glen Mitchell.

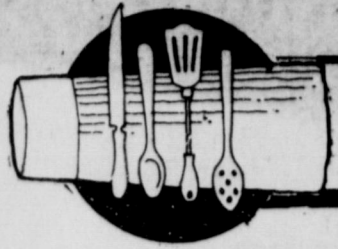
### Whoop-T-Do reservations open

## Cook of the Week

Friends of Cheryl (Mrs. Roger) York who have eaten her cooking know what a delicious experience it is, and those who have not eaten it are in for an enriching surprise when they do. Her recipes for this week sound like culinary delights.

The Sweet and Sour Sausage can surely wake up one's taste buds because of the combination of certain ingredients, one of which is apricot preserves.

The apricot grows wild in the mountains around Peking where it originated and is known to have been cultivated as early as 2200 B.C. Throughout its long history it has been slow to spread.

It was grown in the hanging gardens of Babylon. The Romans knew the apricot and some scholars argue that apricots were planted in Italy about the time of Nero. They were called "eggs of the sun" by the Persians.

The apricot seems to have been familiar to the French in the 15th century, but did not arrive in England until 1562. It has been stated that the apricot reached America in the 16th century, but it is more probable that it was introduced in the 18th century by the Mission Fathers of California. That state today produces the best fruit for eating and the third best canning.

The former Cheryl Horsky, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Vern Horsky, was born in Cedar Rapids, Iowa, and moved to Iowa Park when her father was transferred to the Cryovac plant here.

She was graduated from Iowa Park High School and took a nurses aide course at the Wichita General Hospital where she worked three years. She later worked in accounting and computers for G.H. Foster Cathead and in accounting for C.B. Christie Jr.

Roger is employed at Cryovac. He and Cheryl are members of the First Baptist Church. They have two children, Randy, five years of age, and Jennifer, 14 months old.

### CRUNCHY PECAN PIE

3 egg whites  
1 cup granulated sugar  
1 square Nabisco graham crackers finely rolled, about 1 cup crumbs  
1 cup finely chopped pecans  
1/4 t. baking powder  
1 cup heavy cream, whipped

Beat egg whites until soft peaks form, gradually add sugar beating until stiff peaks form. Combine next three ingredients and fold into egg whites. Spread in a greased 9-inch pan. Bake at 350 degrees 30 minutes. Cool thoroughly. Spread with whipped cream. Chill 6 hours or overnight.

### MY FRIEND'S EXCELLENT HOT CHICKEN SALAD

2 cups cubed cooked chicken  
2 cups sliced celery  
1 cup pecans, almonds or walnuts  
1/2 t. salt  
1/2 t. mustard  
1 cup mayonnaise  
2 t. lemon juice  
Potato chips  
Cheese

Mix the chicken, celery and choice of nuts together. In separate bowl, mix salt, mustard, mayonnaise and lemon juice, then add to chicken mix. Put into 2-qt. casserole dish and top with potato chips and cheese. Cook at 425 degrees 12-15 minutes. Serves 6-8.

### PINEAPPLE CREAM CHEESE BALL

2-8 oz. pkgs. cream cheese  
1-8 oz. crushed pineapple, very well drained  
1/4 cup chopped bell pepper  
2 T. chopped onion  
1/2 t. salt  
2 cups chopped pecans (1 cup chopped finer for inside)

Soften cheese, then add all ingredients except 1 cup chopped pecans. Roll in ball and freeze seven hours. Roll in pecans and chill.

### SWEET AND SOUR SAUSAGE

Cut in pieces and saute 1 lb. smoked sausage 5 minutes.

Combine:

1 Tb. cornstarch  
1/2 t. ground ginger  
1 Tb. vinegar  
1 Tb. soy sauce  
1/2 cup apricot preserves

Stir into sausage mixture and heat to thicken. Add 2 cups drained pineapple chunks. Heat. Serve over rice. Makes 4-6 servings.

### BLUEBERRY SALAD

2 small pkgs. blackberry jello  
1 can blueberry pie filling  
1 small can crushed pineapple  
1-8 oz. pkg. cream cheese  
1-8 oz. sour cream  
1/2 cup sugar  
1 t. vanilla

Take 1 3/4 cups boiling water and add to it jello, pie filling, pineapple (1/2 drained). Chill until it sets.

Topping: softened cream cheese, sour cream, sugar and vanilla. You may sprinkle chopped pecans on top if desired. Pour the first mixture in a 13x9 inch pan.

### BUSTER BAR DESSERT

1 pkg. Oreo cookies  
1 stick oleo  
1/2 gallon vanilla ice cream  
1 can hot fudge sauce  
1 jar salted peanuts  
1-8 oz. Cool Whip

Use 13x9 inch pan. Serves 15-20.

Crush cookies and soften oleo. Mix together and press all but 1 cup oreo mixture in pan. Spread 1/2 gallon soft vanilla ice cream on top. freeze until firm. On top, spread 1 cup hot fudge sauce. Make a layer of salted peanuts; on top of that spread 8 oz. Cool Whip, then 1 cup crumb mixture on top. Cover and freeze.

Note: when ready to serve take out of freezer a few minutes early so it has a chance to soften up a bit.

### Mrs. James leads review

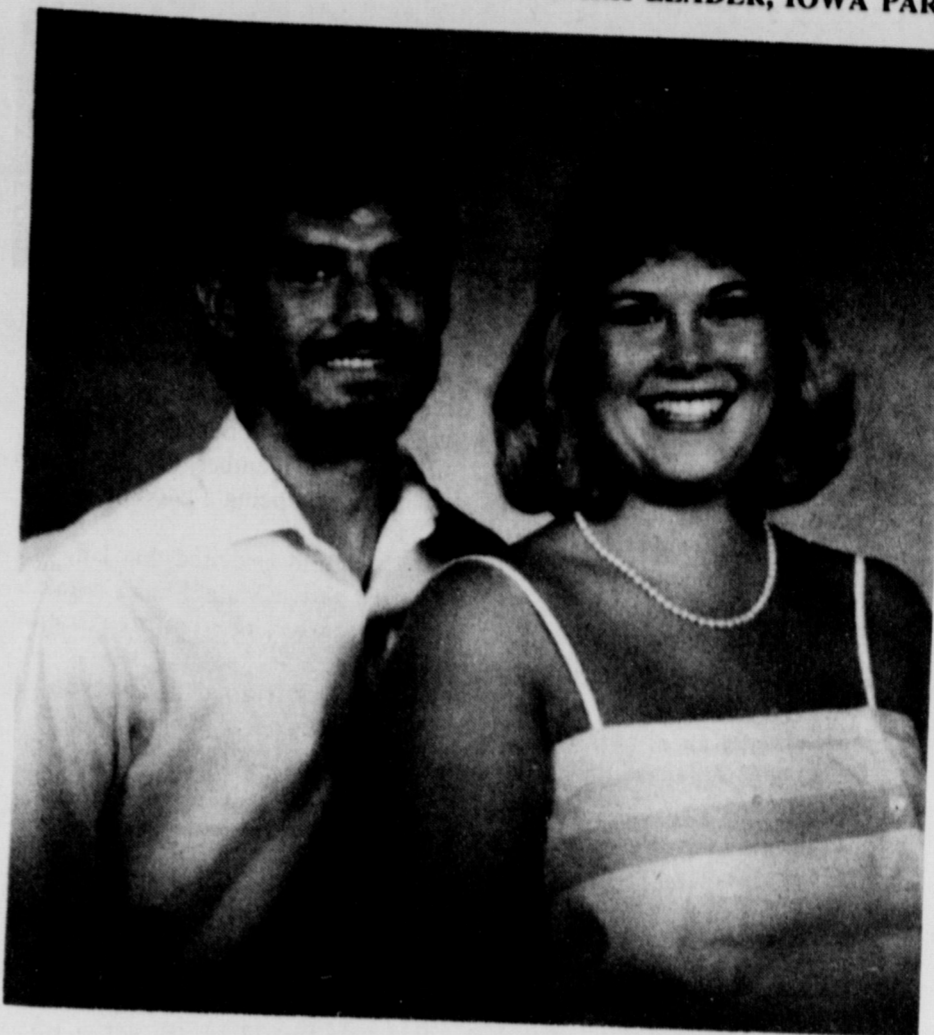

# As I See It....

You might compare this week and next with the old term that one shoe has been dropped and waiting for the other to fall.

## AREA OIL & GAS NEWS

V.C. Moore has announced plans to drill the No. 1 Vogel, a 1,999-ft. developmental well in the Wichita Regular Field. The operator has 20 acres leased, with drillsite in the RRVL S/D Survey, Blk. 74.

The venture will be drilled three miles north-northwest of Burkburnett.

Drillsite is 150 feet from the south line and 150 feet from the east line of the lease.

The No. 10 Parker Heirs "F" has been finalized by L.J. Miller and B.J. Parker.

It is a developmental well in the Wichita Regular Field, five miles south of Iowa Park. Drillsite is in a 320-acre lease in the Palo Pinto CSL Survey.

Daily potential of nine barrels of oil, plus 20 barrels of water was posted with the Railroad Commission. The well went to a 1,315-ft. bottom, and will produce from a set of perforations in the Cisco Sand Formation, 1,230 to 1,233 feet into the wellbore.

The No. 73 J.E. Roller, a 1,350-ft. developmental well, is scheduled to be drilled in the Wichita Regular Field. Gene Robertson Oil of Burkburnett is the operator.

The well will be spudded in an 84-acre lease in the C. Larbaletrier Survey, A-370. Drillsite is five miles southeast of Burkburnett.

The well will be drilled 400 feet from the north line and approximately 460 feet from the west line of the survey.

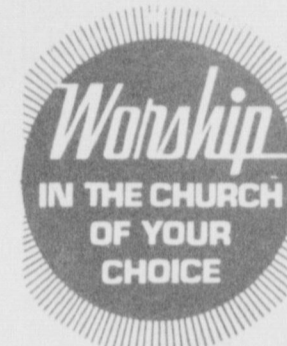

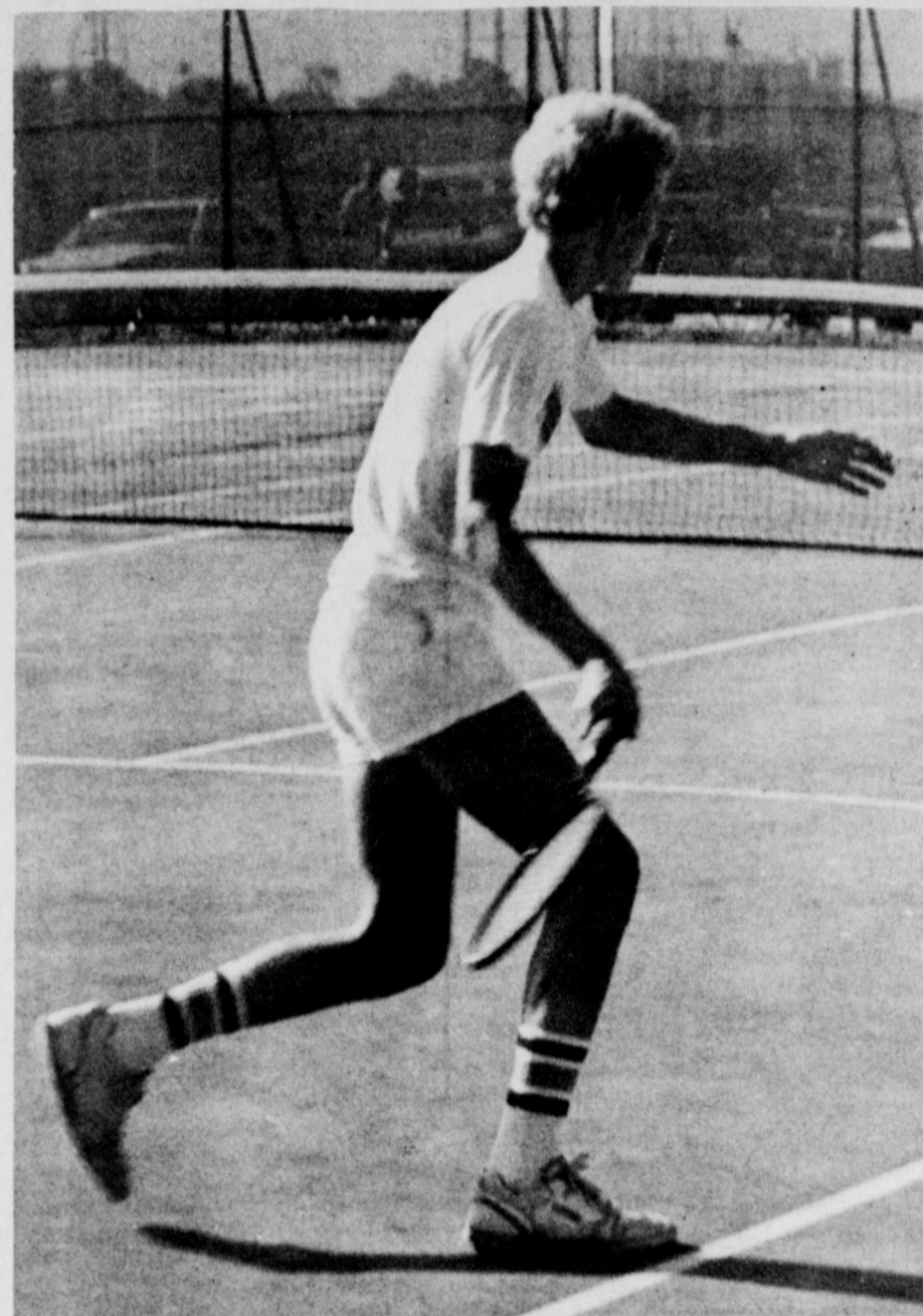

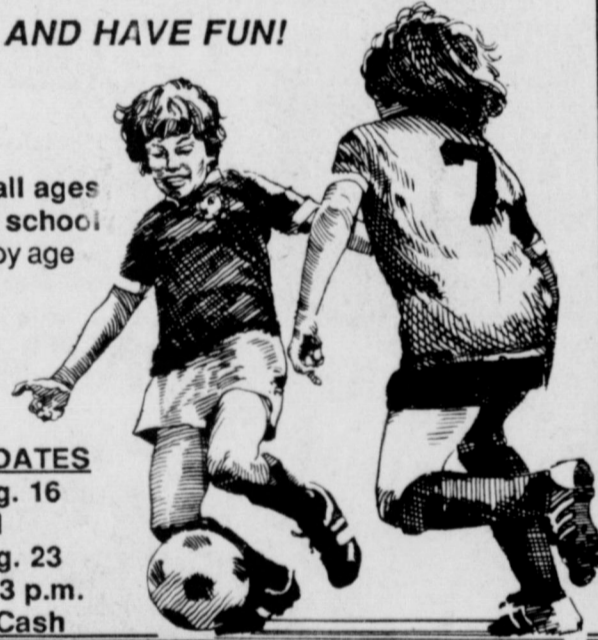

#### Texas rates among nation's lowest

# Holliday trustees adopt budget

**HOLLIDAY** - The Holliday School Board Monday night adopted budget expenditures for the 1986-87 school year but held off setting a tax rate.

Trustees adopted budget expenditures in the amount of \$2,488,090, a three percent increase over last school year.

Although the Commissioner of Education suggested that the school district not adopt a tax rate until after a special session of the Texas Legislature, Trustee Jack Parkey, member of the budget committee, recommended looking at a 85.9-cent tax rate, the same as last year.

Parkey did say, however, that any more cutbacks during the special session could result in a \$150,000 to \$200,000 deficit in the budget.

It was recommended by the budget committee and board that if more cuts were made during the special session, \$65,000 could be cut

from the school's budget before a tax increase would be necessary.

Areas approved to receive cutbacks include the tutorial program, teaching supplies, furniture, equipment and travel for administration.

Also a 20 percent cut in curriculars, including athletics, band and other literary programs; 20 percent cut in the agriculture budget and 10 percent in the maintenance program.

In other business, after executive session, board members accepted the resignations of four school employees and hired five.

Resignations accepted include Jerry Pink, English and journalism; Susan Sadberry, bus driver, Joene Kocks, health relations; and Jana Goforth, tax collections.

Hired were Nancy Astwood, English and journalism; Teresa Molina, teacher aid; Judy Schnedorf, music; Glenda Meyer, elementary teacher; and Sue Reagan, bus driver.

After accepting the resignation of Mrs. Goforth, the board voted to turn the tax collections over to the Archer County Appraisal District at a savings of approximately \$7,000.

## Governor sets special election

**HOLLIDAY** - Under a special proclamation by Gov. Mark White, the city of Holliday will be allowed to hold a special election Sept 20, to fill the positions on the council vacated by Linda Willis, Melvin Bills and Jim Virdell.

The three resigned their positions in June following a disagreement with City Administrator Brown Hudson.

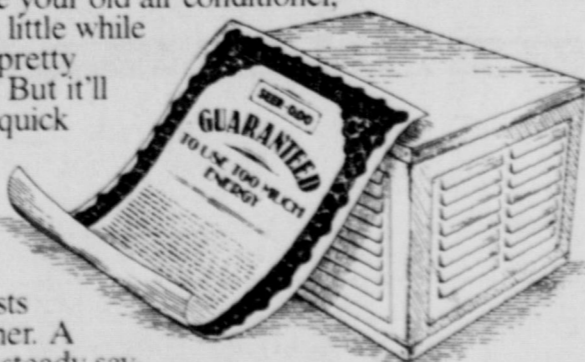

INCOME ELIGIBILITY GUIDELINES  
1986-87

Dear Parent  
or Guardian:

The Iowa Park Consolidated Independent School District serves nutritious meals every school day. Students may buy lunch for 75¢, 85¢, and \$1.00 and breakfast for 50¢. Children from families whose income is at or below the level shown on the attached scale are eligible for either free meals or reduced-price meals priced at 40¢ for lunch and 30¢ for breakfast.

**HOW AND WHERE TO APPLY:** A separate application must be filled out for each child you want to receive free or reduced-price meals. The completed application must be returned to that child's principal. One application form is attached, but you may obtain additional forms from any principal if you have more than one child for whom you want to apply.

**COMPLETE APPLICATION:** For an application to be complete, you must provide: the total household income listed by the amount received by each household member receiving income and the type of income it is (such as wages, child support, etc.) OR your food stamp case number if your household is on food stamps, the names of all household members, social security numbers of all household members 21 years or older or state that a household member does not have one, and the signature of an adult household member. Please answer all questions on the form. An application which does not contain complete information on household members and income cannot be processed by the school.

**VERIFICATION:** The information on the application may be checked by the school or other officials at any time during the school year.

**REPORTING CHANGES:** If your child is approved for meal benefits, you must tell the school when your household income increases by more than \$50 per month (\$600 per year) or when your household size decreases.

**REAPPLICATION:** You may apply for benefits at any time during the school year. If you are not eligible now, but have a decrease in household income, become unemployed, or have an increase in family size, fill out an application at that time.

**FOSTER CHILDREN:** If you have foster children living with you, they may be eligible for these benefits. If you wish to apply for these benefits for them, please contact the school and they will help you complete the application.

**NONDISCRIMINATION:** Children who receive free or reduced-price meal benefits are treated the same as children who pay for meals. In the operation of child feeding programs, no child will be discriminated against because of race, sex, color, national origin, age or handicap. If you believe you have been discriminated against, write immediately to the Secretary of Agriculture, Washington, D.C. 20250.

**FAIR HEARING:** If you do not agree with the school's decision on your application or the result of verification, you may wish to discuss it with the school. You also have the right to a fair hearing. This can be done by calling or writing Glen H. Mitchell, Superintendent, Iowa Park Consolidated Independent School District, P.O. Box 898, Iowa Park, Texas, 76367.

**CONFIDENTIALITY:** The information you provide will be treated confidentially and will be used only for eligibility determinations and verification of data.

**HELP WITH APPLICATION:** If you have any questions or need help in filling out the application form, please contact your child's principal. You will be notified when the application is approved or denied.

With the recent rash of farm accidents in the North Texas area, many farm families have started to deal with the real problem of farm safety.

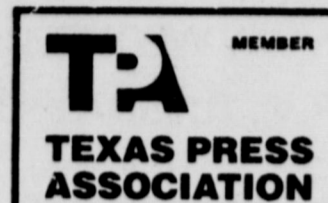
Several farmers and ranchers have lost arms, legs, eyesight and even their lives due to farm-related accidents recently, according to David Finley, Wichita County agent.
