## Soil Conservation

Farmers who are considering expansion of their cotton acreage in 1951, with the lifting of government restrictions, may undo much of the good conservation work they have accomplished unless they choose their cotton land wisely and take steps to protect it.

Some timely recommendations for farmers planning to increase their cotton acreage are:

1. Plant cotton only on land that is suited to cotton. Cotton land should be productive enough for a profitable yield, and not easily eroded.

2. Plant legumes or other winter cover if sufficient moisture is available on land to be planted to cotton in 1951. Such crops prevent erosion and step-up cotton yields from 25 to 100 per cent. Where sufficient moisture is not available for planting of cover crops, allow as much crop residue as possible to remain on top of the soil to prevent soil

3. Keep cotton off land where cotton root-rot is common.

Farmers co-operating with the Wilbarger-Wichita Soil Conservation district can secure information from the Iowa Park soil conservation office as to soils best suited for the growth of cotton on their farms.

On sandy soils easily subject to wind erosion, the growing of strips of corn or grain sorghums with the cotton greatly helps to protect the soil from wind erosion.

Naturally the idea of banding as insupportable; that there was Ridenour, C. E. Birk and Beverly, together local groups of students of vocational agriculture into a larger organization grew in the minds of progressive leaders in the field of vocational agriculture. Instead of each local group functioning to itself, why not have some actual contact and definite ties between them? Certainly, the interests and tendencies of the members were along similar lines. And so the idea of statewide organizations with each local group as an active unit was developed.

Between 1923 and 1928 a number of states formed organizations of vocational agriculture students. A splendid work along this line was done in Virginia, Tennessee, Arkansas, North Carolina, South Carolina, Oklahoma, New Jersey, New York, Ohio, Utah, California, Wyoming and certain other states.

It is interesting to note that such names as Junior Farmers Young Farmers, Future Farmers, and the like, appeared in various sections of the country. However the pioneer efforts of the Future Farmers of Virginia attracted the greatest attention nationally due to the excellent ideals, purposes, ceremonies and definite constitution, formulated by Henry C. Groseclose and his associates.

Two years after the FFV was founded, six states in the southern region had in operation similar organizations patterned closely after the Virginia setup.

By 1927-28 the goal of a national organization was gleaming in the distance in the minds of various leaders. The call came from various sections. The country was ready; the time was ripe. From the north Atlantic, north central, southern and Pacific regions came definite proposals to build upon the good work of the FFV and similar organizations, formulate a constitution for the Future Farmers of America and launch it as the national organization of, by and for boys studying vocational agriculture.

Accordingly, a temporary constitution, purposes and ceremonies patterned closely after that of the Future Farmers of Virginia and other states was drafted by the staff of the agricultural education service of the federal board for vocational education during the summer of 1928. The first national convention was held in November and since that time the growth of the FFA has been steady and rapid. extending to Hawaii and Puerto

Similar organizations patterned after the FFA are now found in several foreign countries.

#### Truck Men Scotch Railroad Criticism

Two spokesmen for the motor transportation industry, hitting back at railroad criticism, have revealed plans to fight for new regulatory laws at the next legislative session. Mike Duke, president of Texas Motor Transportation association. and Henry English of Dallas, chairman of the board of American Trucking associations, have loosed blasts at "railroad propaganda."

They referred to articles in national magazines and to recent remarks of Kenneth McCalla, secretar yof the Texas Railroad associa-

McCalla's statements were characterized by Duke as a part of the activity of a "vicious monopoly opposing independent businessmen in the trucking industry and the entire state's economy." Duke added:

"If the desires of McCalla and other railroad spokesmen are inflicted upon the people, we will again see wheat in West Texas, citrus in the Rio Grande Valley, and fruit and vegetables in East Texas rotting in the fields for want of transportation.

Freight rates would rise and the quality of service would suffer if the railroads could kill competi-

tion. That is their goal. "The railroads would like to have the public believe that trucks are destroying our highways, but the fact is that the legal weight per axle in Texas is that approved by the American Association of State Highway Officials."

Duke said the motor carrier industry will ask the next legislature for laws to set up regulations recommended by that association.

"The railroads are in an awkward position when they object to the loads carried by Texas trucks," Duke told his association's board of directors. "In other states the railroads are operating trucks that carry loads far in excess of the Texas legal limit of 48,000 pounds which they cry are ruining Texas highways."

Texas Motor Transportation's board of directors adopted a policy pledging "continued co-operation




