## Hawks in rematch with Ballinger for bi-district

Ever since Nov. 22, 1985, Hawk football fans have been wanting a rematch with the Ballinger Bearcats, and they'll get their wish tomorrow evening in Stamford.

Fifty-one weeks ago, Ballinger edged the Hawks 21-14 for the area title, and Friday the two clubs will meet for the bi-district title.

While the matchup between the two teams are very similar to last year, there are some differences.

The Hawks went into the game with a 7-3-1 season record and a share of the Dist. 5-AAA crown. This year they carry a 7-2-1 record, but are the runners up of Dist. 6-AAA.

Ballinger entered the 1985 contest with a 9-1-1 record, but this year the Bearcats, champs of Dist. 5-AAA, are undefeated and ranked third in the state by the Associated Press.

While recognizing the fact that Ballinger has an impressive offensive and defensive record this year, Coach David Baugh observed the Bearcats have not played as tough a schedule as Iowa Park.

And while the 5-AAA champs are big, especially in the line, they don't appear to have the quickness and speed of the Hawks.

A mistake-free game, similar to the way the Hawks played Vernon, could well propel Iowa Park into the area contest against the winner of the Marble Falls-Waco Robinson game.

It was mistakes that ended the

season for Iowa Park last year, when the Hawk rally almost won the game anyway.

Besides turning the ball over four times in the first half with pass interceptions, Iowa Park fumbled the ball on the Bearcat one yard line to kill an important drive and lost momentum, a secondary assignment was missed and Ballinger got an uncontested 30-yard TD pass completion, and a motion penalty on a quick kick that put the opponents deep in their own territory was followed by one of the interceptions that gave the 'Cats possession on the Hawk two yard line.

Ballinger, this year, has rolled up an impressive string of victories, but against Class AA teams and being in a very weak conference.

The Bearcats shut out Winters, 35-0, and Hamlin, 22-0, in their first two games, and wound up non-conference with a 49-6 win over Coleman. None of those teams have made the playoffs in their classification.

In district play, the Bearcats shot down Colorado City 32-7, Clyde 33-7, Sonora 27-0, Wylie 43-13, Merkel 26-0, Coahoma 33-0 and Brady 29-7.

With their quarterback, Eric Lugo, and runningback, Terry Strambler, returning from last year's team, the Bearcats have averaged 32.9 points this season.

And with linemen like Tommy

Sauceda, 260, Bud Halfman, 251, Pat Brown, 220, Ron Connor, 218, and Phillip Lugo, 210, Ballinger has allowed its 10 opponents thus far an average of only four points per game.

Ballinger runs primarily out of the wishbone. They will use double tight ends, double split receivers and

### Facts about Friday's game

Kickoff of the Iowa Park-Ballinger bi-district football game will be 8 p.m. at the Stamford High School stadium.

Iowa Park will sit in the east side of the stands.

Ticket prices are \$3 for students and \$4 for adults. If bought in advance, at the Iowa Park High School principal's office. Tickets will remain on sale until 4 p.m. Friday.

All tickets, adult and student, will be \$5 at the gate.

To find the stadium: when entering Stamford from the north, drive past the courthouse to the first intersection on the south side, turn left and continue until passing under the railroad, turn right at the first stop sign, and road leads to stadium.

## Hawk Band places second at Austin

At their first attempt, the Iowa Park High School band brought home the second place trophy from the UIL Class-AAA State Marching Contest held Monday in Austin.

The "Mean Green Marching Machine" came in behind Denver City.

Iowa Park High School principal Richard Davis summed up the feelings of most everyone in the school and community when he described the band's second place performance at state contest as "Great!"

The band's performance on the field has been justly praised by those who attended the contest and no one is turning their noses up at second place. Band director Greg Miller said Denver City is a former winner of state marching contest and is deserving of first place status this year.

Miller said, "There are no sour grapes. We are very pleased with the band's performance and second place."

To earn a trip to the state contest, the Hawk Band, which is 105 strong on the marching field, first had to receive a first division rating at district competition then be named one of the top two bands at regional competition, which qualified them for the preliminaries at state competition.

To participate in the finals a band must rate in the top five of its class in the preliminaries. Iowa Park did, along with Denver City, Pearsall, Waco Robinson and Atlanta.

Other than Iowa Park and Denver City, Pearsall won third place, Waco Robinson, a former state winner, took fourth, and Atlanta, fifth, in the final judging.

Miller said that the band performed very well in the preliminaries. He said, "I was pleased with the preliminary show and didn't think we could do any better, but the band had an even better performance in the finals."

More than 100 Iowa Parkans attended the contest, and Davis stated that when Iowa Park was announced as one of the top five in the preliminaries, the Iowa Park crowd excitement was so high, the group didn't know who the other two advancing bands were until much later.

"They really never expected to do as well as they did. They wanted to. But, making second was highly unexpected," Miller said.

Davis agreed, saying, "One of our goals was to get to the finals. Anything more than that was just icing on the cake."

School supt. Glenn Mitchell, while presenting a recognition award to the band Tuesday at the school board meeting, said, "I would not have been disappointed if you (the band) had not made the top five. But when it got down to two (announcing results), I got greedy and felt we were number one."

Davis said he was "extremely proud of the band for two reasons. First, for being second in the state. And second, for being well-behaved and representing the community and school in such a manner. . . (they were) the best behaved group of kids I've ever been with."

Miller echoed Davis' feelings when he cited how well the band represented the school and community. He said, "That is worth just as much, if not more, than earning second place."

## Chamber elects new officers

Officers and seven directors were elected by the Chamber of Commerce Monday at the organization's annual all-member luncheon meeting.

Frank Gossett, who has served half a year as president after Rip Smith resigned the position, was elected to a full term of office.

Robert Palmer was voted first vice president and Kenneth Via second vice president.

Five directors were elected to serve another three-year term. They were Dr. Richard Carver, Glen Mitchell, Allen Gilstrap, Tommy Key and Phil Welch.

Two new directors named by the

membership were Danny Coffman and Joe Hughes.

Speakers for the meeting were staff members of the Wichita Falls Board of Commerce and Industry, Tim Cowden and Jim Johnson.

Cowden said Wichita Falls, because of its diversification in recent years, does not have an economy in as much trouble as numerous other cities of comparable size in the state which have not diversified by attracting varied industries.

He said the BCI in 1983 decided to recommit itself in seeking more industries to bolster the community's payroll.

The BCI has a staff of 13 and an annual budget of \$987,000, he said.

Johnson said working to attract new businesses and industries to a community is important, but taking care of existing businesses and industries which will expand and grow is extremely important.

The main method of attracting payroll growth is for a community to seek out its weaknesses, and work to improve them.

Eighty percent of new job growth in industries today come from expanding existing plants, Johnson said.

## Trustees turn down swim team proposal

Iowa Park school trustees took no action on a request to start a swim team program this year, and approved applying for a waiver of maximum class size.

A major portion of the meeting Tuesday evening was consumed by a discussion with Dr. and Mrs. Robert Morris, who were requesting the school register with the University Interscholastic League to participate in a swimming program.

The family moved here last spring, and asked the school to let their two sons participate in UIL swim competition.

They explained this could be accomplished the same way a female student from Burk Burnett participates, by joining Wichita Falls students in a swim club and providing a full-time local employee only when the student was competing in a UIL event.

They offered to pay any expenses incurred, and the school's participation would be only a formality.

The board's response was that no study as to desire of the student body had been made, and a program would not be initiated for one or two students.

It was also pointed out that no program could be initiated after Sept. 15, unless unanimous approval was given by the district's governing body, according to the UIL rules handbook.

The couple was complimented for their interest in their children and their activities, but the board said no action could be taken this late into the school year, without it having been studied and budgeted.

Because of the unusually high increase of enrollment at Kidwell Elementary, especially in the first grade, administrators asked the board to approve an application of variance from the 22 pupil per teacher policy, on a temporary basis.

Eventhough four new classrooms were added onto Kidwell last summer, any additional students in the first grade would violate state requirements on class size, trustees were told.

The first grade has 179 students and eight teachers, which puts the grade three pupils over the limit set by House Bill 72.

The second grade averages 22 pupils for each of the six teachers. Kindergarten, by attending half day classes, is averaging 18 pupils per teacher, with 145 students and four teachers.

The school estimates nine teachers will be required for the second grade next year, and seven teachers to handle the 145 pupils anticipated.

Kidwell's enrollment of 469 is 39 pupils over the 430 reported Nov. 14, 1985.

Other campus enrollments reported as of Nov. 10 were: 404 at Brad-

ford, down one from last year; 401 at junior high, no change, and 534 at high school, up eight.

Overall enrollment is 1,808.

In other business, trustees accepted the lowest of four bids, \$12,030 by M&F Litteken, to install metal siding and other work on the east side of the junior high building.

The board approved appointment of Bud Mercer to the Wichita County Tax Appraisal Board, succeeding Stanley Williamson, who has represented Iowa Park since the board was formed.

The resignation of Kenneth Watts as vocational teacher was accepted, and Dennis Brooks, who was hired temporarily to fill Watts' place, was given an extension of his contract to complete the school year.

Also hired was Betty Sue Cash, to replace Rita Stowe as second grade teacher.

**Cook of the Week**

At the first sign of mealtime preparation, the question most asked is "What's for dessert?" If Michelle Robertson, our young cook for this week, should be asked she would probably reply, "Just anything that calls for cherries."

Her recipes indicate how cherry pie filling can glamorize desserts and that good eating need not be expensive.

The cherry tree has an interesting history. It arrived in Italy about 100 B.C., and within the century cherry trees were found growing throughout the Roman Empire. The Romans took the cherry tree as far as Britain, but it seemed to disappear from there in the Dark Ages. However, it was introduced again by Henry VIII.

English settlers brought the cherry tree to America as early as 1629, and today they are grown in practically every state. Many people remember the song that their grandmothers used to sing "Can she bake a cherry pie, Billy Boy?" A question probably asked to judge her ability as a good cook.

- 1/2 cup brown sugar, packed

- 1 tsp. salt
- 1 1/2 cup oats, uncooked
- 6 oz. pkg. semi-chocolate chips
- 1 cup pecans

Cream margarine and sugars till light and fluffy. Blend in eggs and vanilla; add combined dry ingredients, mix well. Stir in oats, chocolate pieces and nuts. Drop by rounded teaspoonfuls of dough onto ungreased cookie sheet. Bake at 375 degrees 10-12 minutes.

**CHERRY DUMP CAKE**

- 1 can cherry pie filling
- 1 small can crushed pineapple
- 1 stick oleo
- 1 box yellow cake mix
- 1 large sack crushed pecans

Butter bottom of pan. Pour in and spread around cherry pie filling and pineapple. Cover with dry cake mix and dot all over with chunks of butter and cover with pecans. Cook at 375 degrees 1 hour. Double recipe for large pan.

And also adding to Iowa Park's place on the map is the return of the Hawks to the football playoff scene.

I can hardly wait for the rematch tomorrow night with Ballinger. I'm firmly convinced that, if the Hawks play the type of ball they're capable, we'll knock off the third-ranked team in the state and continue.

A win at Stamford would reunite a couple of bands that were in the finals of the state marching contest, Iowa Park and Waco Robinson. The latter is playing Marble Falls this week, and the winners will meet next week.

Wouldn't that be great, to have two of the top Class AAA bands in the state appearing on the same field at halftime.

Yesterday morning, a large delegation left here for the national Future Farmers of America convention in Kansas City. You can expect some good news to come out of that trip, also.

And speaking of good news, we should have some coming out of Abilene Saturday, because Iowa Park's delegation of vocalists will be competing at the regional level.

As is the custom of our outstanding choral department, Iowa Park has the largest number of singers qualified to participate of any area school, regardless of classification.

And to top it all off, Iowa Park schools got a perfect grading this week when the state made its "compliance monitoring visit."

This is a check of administration records to see if our people are doing all that is expected of them, and a perfect grading is unusual at any school.

Oh, and I would be guilty of a major omission if I should leave out the fact that our Hawk Junior Varsity team went undefeated against all the other Dist. 6-AAA teams. This helps the outlook of football in the future.

And speaking of future outlook,

I think it's amazing that the band was able to accomplish as much as it has this year with only a dozen seniors in the organization.

Why should a newspaper make such a big to do about the town's school?

Well, Iowa Park would not be the community it is, were it not for its school system. We have one of the most outstanding schools anywhere, when one compares scholastics, extracurricular activities and lack of problems among the student body.

Breckenridge was trailing 17-10 with 25 seconds remaining in the game, and had fourth down and 12 yards to go on the Decatur 21.

The Buckaroos completed a diving catch of a pass in the corner of the end zone, and then a two-point pass to make the score 18-17.

But, when the clock ran out, the Eagles were on Breckenridge's 37 yard line, and no times out to stop the clock. And the Bucks won.

A Breckenridge loss, coupled with Iowa Park's win, would have thrown the district into another three-way tie. But Breckenridge and Iowa Park would still have represented the district, as they will tomorrow night.

## IP only community with sales tax increase

Though Iowa Park's sales tax receipts slipped considerably during October, it is the only community in Wichita County to show an increase over this time last year.

According to the monthly report by the state comptroller's office, sales tax rebates to the 1,033 cities in the state are down 1.7 percent.

Iowa Park's rebate check for October was \$14,161.12, down from \$19,964.22 received this time last year.

But the \$142,131.35 received is

4.72 percent above the \$135,730.41 reported through the 10th month in 1985.

Electra is down 32.86 percent, Wichita Falls 3.51 and Burkburnett 3.1 from this time last year.

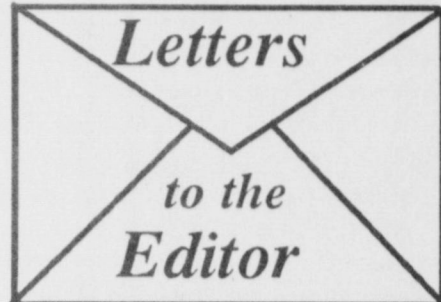
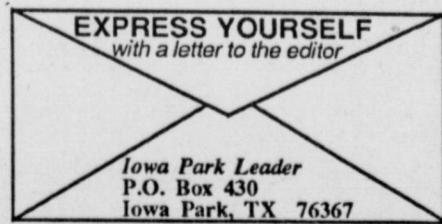
Like Electra, Holliday is also showing a slowing in the economy, with sales taxes for the year down 32 percent.

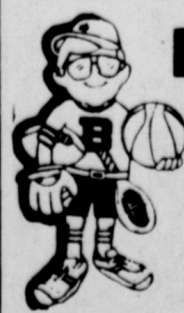

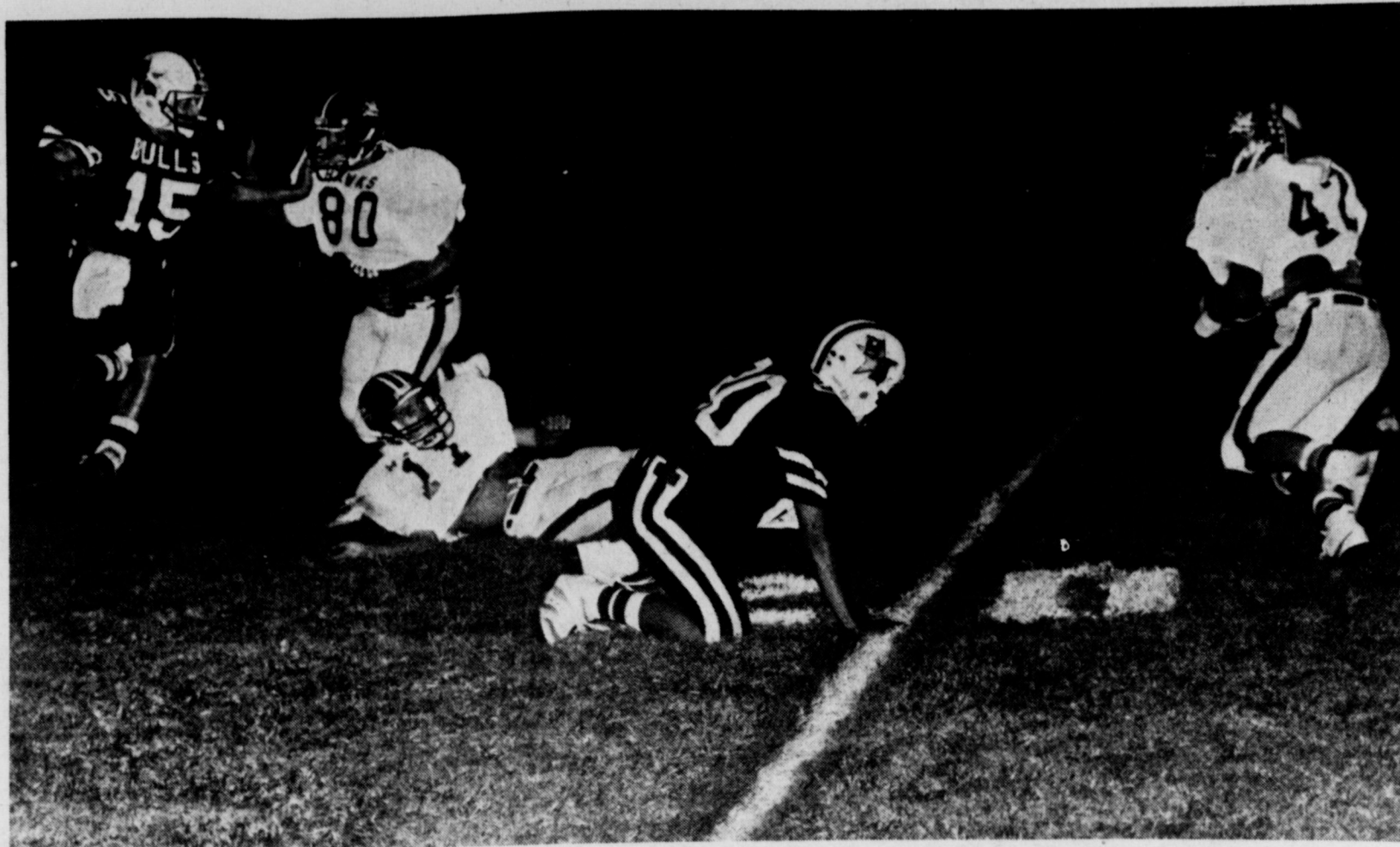

# Hawks edge Bulls, 35-28

Iowa Park's Hawks, as expected, defeated Bridgeport's Bulls, 35-28, Friday night to wind up the regular season schedule for both clubs. But it was a game almost as wierd as the weather.

As the game was getting underway, ground fog moved onto the north end of the field, and remained there, about three feet off the turf, throughout the contest. And during part of the third quarter, additional, high-level, fog moved over the field from the east, making visibility difficult both for players and fans.

Bridgeport wasn't supposed to have much of a team, based on having only one district win and two others against non-conference clubs. But they were about all the Hawks could handle that night.

While the host Bulls were playing for pride, the win was a must for the Hawks, in order to gain a place in the state playoffs.

Iowa Park held Bridgeport to only three yards on the Bulls' initial possession, and then scored the first time the Bulls had the ball on what appeared to be an easy, 66-yard drive.

But Bridgeport roared back, scoring just before the end of the first period and then taking the lead early in the second, 14-7.

Iowa Park returned the following kickoff to knot the score again, but Bridgeport went ahead, 20-14, the next time the Bulls got their hands on the ball. But Iowa Park reclaimed the lead before the half ended and held on the balance of the game, scoring twice more in the fourth period.

Fullback Danny Forman not only scored two of the Hawks' touchdowns, but gained 152 yards on 18 carries to surpass the 1,000 mark for the season by eight yards.

Wingback David Meissner was handed the ball only twice, but he scored touchdowns both times, on

runs of 23 and 34 yards.

Tailback Scott Weaver accounted for the other TD, returning a kickoff 81 yards. He crossed the end zone again in the fourth, on a 40-yarder, but it was nullified on a clipping penalty.

Though the Hawks were flagged "only" six times in the game for "only" 46 yards, their first possession looked like it was going to be "another one of those games."

Taking Bridgeport's first punt on their 49, the Hawks drew a 15-yarder on the first play, and had another five-yarder five plays later.

But with Forman and Weaver alternating carries, and Forman picking up 17 and 25 yards on a couple of his, the senior fullback capped the drive with a two-yard plunge over right tackle.

Kicker Robert Adams then sent the first of his five extra point shots of the evening through the uprights, and Iowa Park had a 7-0 lead only 5:15 deep into the opening period.

But the Bulls tied the score with 36 seconds still showing on the clock, capping a 78-yard drive with a 23-yard sprint over left tackle.

On the first play of the second quarter, Forman had the ball stripped from his grasp, and the Bulls were in business on Iowa Park's own 26 yard line. Seven plays later, they scored from the five and took the lead, 14-7.

Weaver answered the challenge on the following kickoff, however. The Hawks formed their famous "starburst" kickoff return setup with the senior back taking the ball from Brad Huff. He found the sideline on Bridgeport's side of the field, and raced 81 yards to the end zone.

Virtually everybody on Iowa Park's side of the field was carefully scanning the route he had taken, to see if there were any penalty flags lying on the grass.

There wasn't, and the score was tied at 14-14.

The Bulls returned the favor, however, requiring only 10 plays, two of them passes for 12 and 24 yards, to take the lead once again on a two-yard run.

But the kick for extra point was missed to the left.

The fourth touchdown of the period came with 1:03 left in the half. The Hawks covered the 75 yards to the end zone, helped by a pair of five-yard penalties against the hosts and a 24-yard run by Forman. Meissner scampered 23 yards over left tackle and Adams kicked the point to give the Hawks a 21-20 lead before the teams took their mid game rest stop.

Each team had possession of the ball three times during the third period, without scoring. But Iowa Park's third possession carried over into the fourth quarter, and two plays after the teams switched ends of the field for the final time, Meissner scored again.

A 17-yard pass from Scott Davis to Forman on the first play of the quarter set up Meissner's TD. On the play, Meissner raced untouched into the end zone from 34 yards out, and players on the sideline commented that because of the fog, they didn't think the Bull defenders could see he had the ball.

Runs of 14 and 33 yards by Bridgeport following the kickoff took the ball to the Hawk 17. But on the next three plays, tackles by Jim Cummings, Adams, Steve Allen and Davis set the hosts back on the 33 yard line.

Then, on fourth down, Bridgeport tried another passing play. Safety Jeff Huff intercepted on his eight yard line and returned it to the 17. He said later he caught the ball by instinct, and realized it was fourth down as he was running with the ball.

But the Hawks mounted a sustained, 83-yard drive which was capped by Forman's 29-yard run with 4:04 remaining in the game.

The drive had two highlights: Stan Coker's on-the-ground catch of a 29-yard pass, and Weaver's apparent 40-yard touchdown being called back to the 37 yard line because of a penalty.

Bridgeport, trailing 35-20, mounted a drive based primarily on passing, and scored on a two-yard plunge. The drive was assisted when Meissner was charged with interference at the three yard line. But it took three plays to get the ball across the goal line from that point.

Weaver finished the game with 57 yards on 10 carries. Davis had his finest night of the season as a passing quarterback, completing four of six attempts for 65 yards.

Iowa Park had to punt the ball only once, and Weaver got off a 44-yarder.



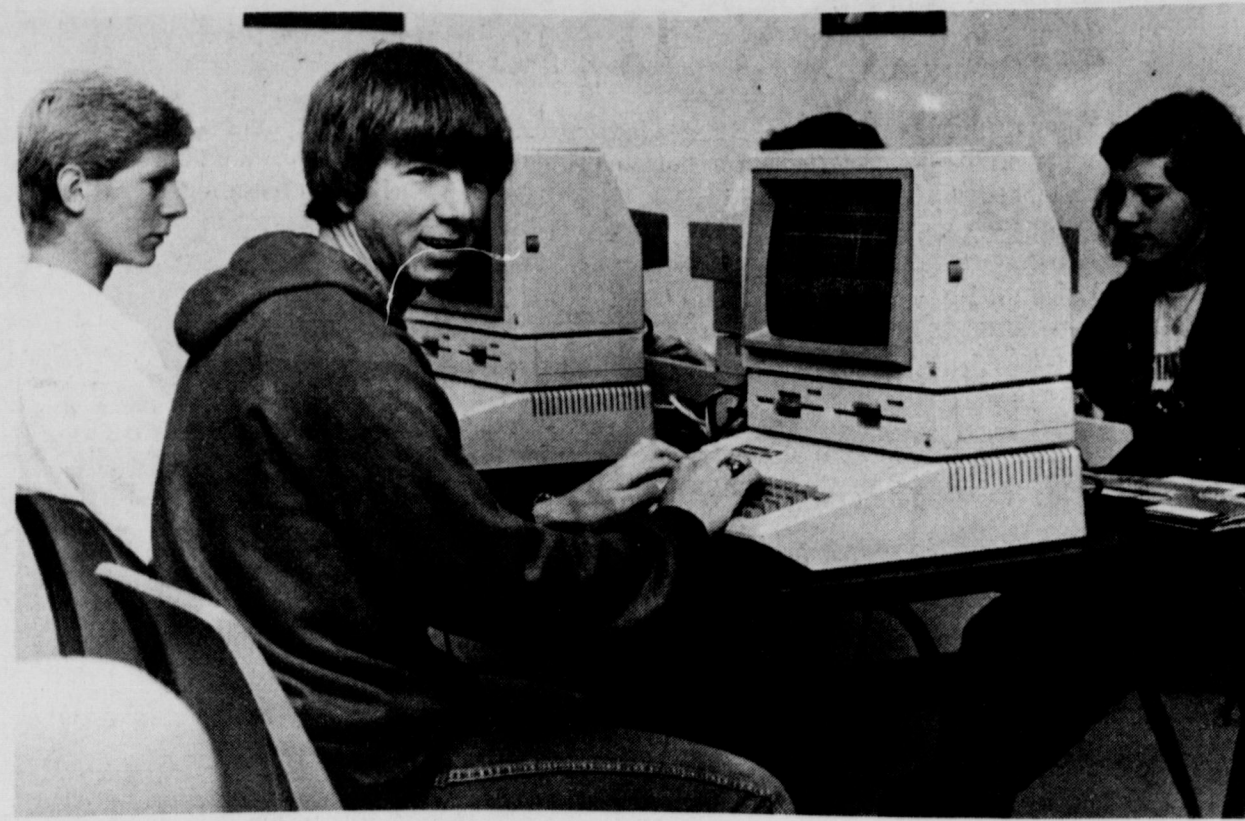

# AREA OIL & GAS NEWS

Pumping 172 barrels of oil per day, plus 27 barrels of water, the No. 47-L Hugh Reilly was completed in the Wichita Regular Field by Landrum West.

Dillsite is five miles southwest of Burk Burnett.

The well was drilled to 1,697-ft. total depth and will produce from perforations in the Gunsight Formation, 1,605 to 1,613 feet into the wellbore. Location is in a 2,114-acre lease in the DR&K Survey, A-714.

The well is located 710 feet from the south line and 1,410 feet from the east line of the survey.





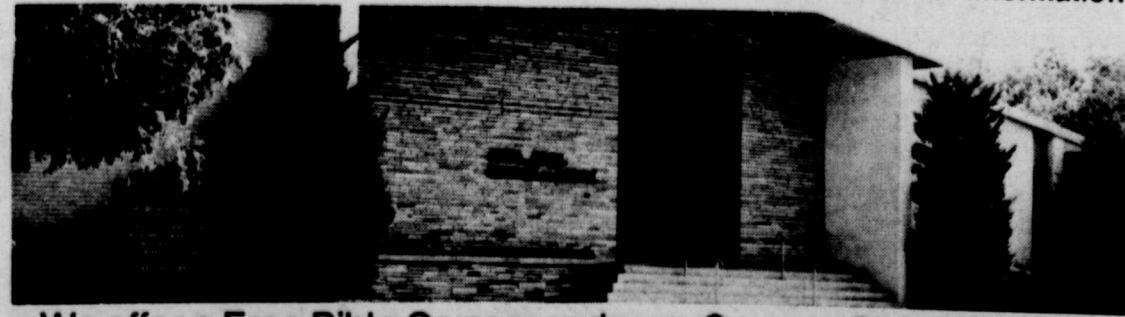

come of its game with Hirschi for the district title this week.

Springtown, which had to come from behind to tie the Hawks, 14-14, has won its district and this week was rated 10th in the state by AP.

Seymour, the only AA club on the Hawk schedule, was state-ranked most of the season, until losing out last week.

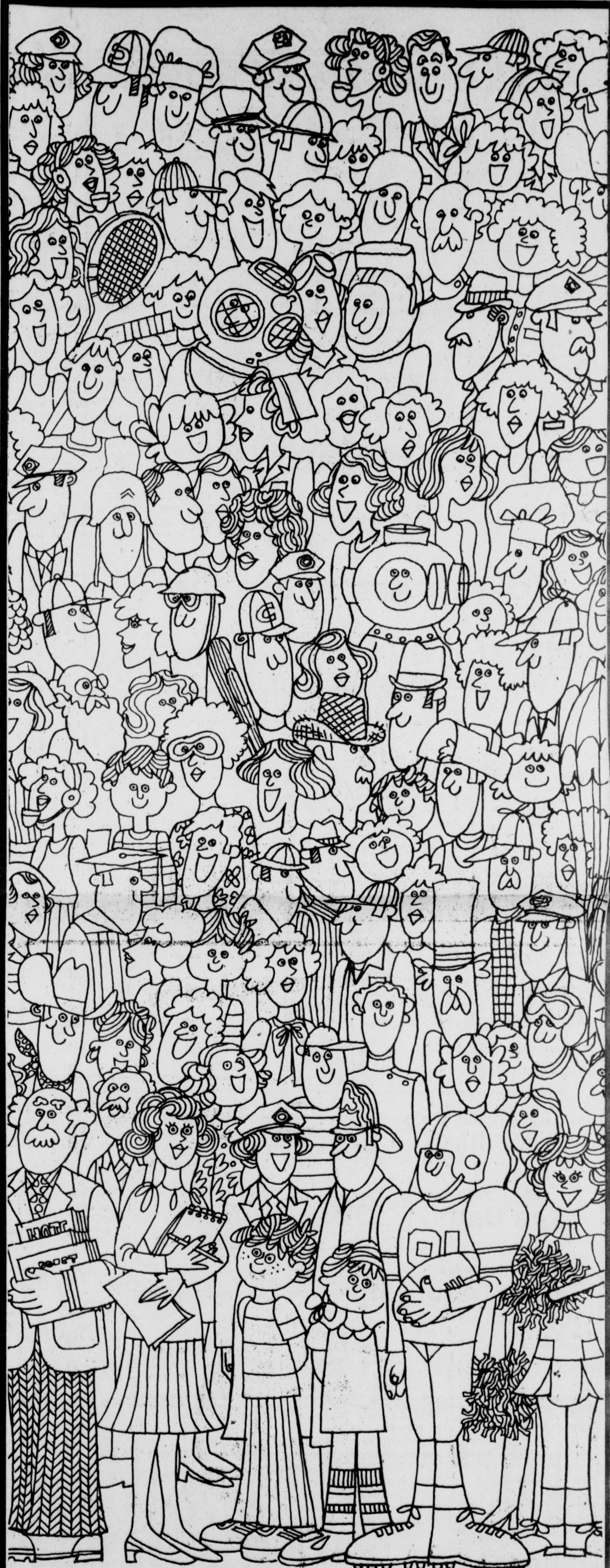
