City, school voter turnout light

Voters Saturday filled vacated places on both the school board and city council, but the turnout, compared to the number of eligible voters, was considered light.

Wendall House, Don Decker and Gary Fielding were named the winners on the school board, while Virgil Woodfin joined uncontested incumbents Johnny Coker and Diane Robnett on the council.

Only 458 voters cast ballots in the two city boxes, including the 12 that were cast absentee.

And while only 629 ballots were cast in the school's election, that figure was still greater than the 477 that were counted in the 1986 voting.

While many expressed surprise at the low number of votes, because so many candidates had signed up in the trustee election, seasoned observers pointed out there were apparently no major issues or discontent on how the elected bodies were functioning.

House, a working partner in Spruiell Drilling, narrowly edged Jerry Gholson for Place 2 on the school board, drawing 182 votes to Gholson's 152. Jim Cooper ran a strong third with 93.

House's gain in the Kidwell box, 130-89, provided the margin of victory, because Gholson out-drew him in the Valley View box, 17-6. They were virtually even in the Bradford box, where House had 37 votes and Gholson 38.

Other Place 2 candidates and their votes were: Roy Don Wynn, 67; Ron Barnes, 61; Robert Morris,

40; Larry Ashford, 17, and Lester Rose, nine.

House was elected to serve the remaining year of Roy Boutwell's term.

Gholson's brother, Jackie, was also the runner-up candidate for Place 6 on the board. Decker, the winner, drew 157 votes to Gholson's 121, while Denny McCarthy polled 117.

Decker is an agricultural representative for State National Bank.

Other Place 6 candidates were: Sheri Kennedy, 92; Roy Reid, 57; Mark Raby, 51, and Beverly Cockburn, 33.

Fielding defeated Dee Blackwell, 314-290, in the Place 7 voting. They were the only candidates to file for that particular position.

Fielding is the director of the Chaparral Baptist Camp.

Only three write-in votes were cast in the school's election.

There were 427 school ballots cast at the Kidwell box, which is voting precinct 32. At Bradford, precinct 33, received 141 ballots, and 36 were cast at the Valley View poll. There were 25 absentee ballots cast.

School trustees met early Monday morning to canvass the ballots, a formality of the election code, and declare the winners.

Woodfin, the retired manager of the old Iowa Park Experiment Station, edged Keith Fisher, 199-156, in the only contested race on the city council. Charlie Brown, the third candidate for Place 1, received 95 votes.

Place 1 was vacated by George Hammonds, who declined to seek reelection because of health reasons.

Robnett received 384 votes in her uncontested bid to return to Place

5 on the council, and Johnny Coker, now the dean of the council in terms of years service, received 379 votes to return to Placer 3.

Voting records indicated only 367 ballots were cast at the Kidwell box, and 79 at Bradford, with 12 being case absentee.

Canvassing of the city ballots was accomplished at Monday's called meeting of the council, and the three winners were sworn into office.

Huff yard is selected

Long distance calls to be taxed locally

Long distance telephone calls will cost one percent more when initiated in Iowa Park, commencing in October.

The city council Monday night approved an ordinance repealing the exemption from local sales tax on long distance telephone calls.

Administrator James Barrington explained his office had received a notice from the state comptroller's office, stating the option of repealing the tax exemption was open, but must be done in time to notify his office by June.

To ignore the option would lose the opportunity in the future, he said.

The council approved the repeal, but with one dissenting vote, cast by Alderman Diane Robnett.

Another ordinance approved made changes in the office of the city fire marshal, taking away investigative duties from that office and turning them over to the police department.

Relating to the fire marshal's office, alderman confirmed the appointment of Gerald Frazier to the position.

Another ordinance approved raises the limits the administrator and department heads to make purchases from \$1,500 to \$3,000 for the administrator and from \$10 per item and

\$30 per order to \$100 and \$300 for department heads.

Barrington explained he felt the change would help streamline some of the city's purchasing needs.

Also approved was the wording of the ordinance concerning municipal judge, from serving the same term of office as the mayor to "at the will of the council."

Additionally, aldermen approved changing of frequency of municipal court, possibly twice a month rather than weekly, in an effort to save on expenses. Any change to be made would not be made until June, because of schedules already set.

Bids received from an auction of vehicles and equipment were approved, amounting to \$4,700.

A proposal to replace the carpet in the front entrance of city hall with tile received council approval.

Barrington explained having carpet in the entrance had been a mistake, because it cannot be cleaned of some materials which have been tracked in on shoes.

Approval was also given to advertise for painting and repairs on the interior of one ground storage water tank. Estimated to cost \$18,000, it is the same work as was completed on another tank last year.

Aldermen approved contracting

to have city grounds mowed until summer, at which time the city may decide to hire high school students to do the work.

However, it was also decided to allow Barrington to negotiate during the next two months a contract to do the work throughout this year's growing season.

The cost of the pavilion, which was approved earlier to be built in the park east of city hall, has grown from original estimates, as has the size of the structure, Barrington told the council.

He said the city has \$2,500 on hand to do the construction, but even with \$1,000 donated by the Rotary Club, is still some \$5,000 short of what it will take to complete it.

He asked permission to use money received from surplus item auctions to make up the difference, and the council agreed.

No action was taken following a 15-minute executive session on the topic of "exchange or value of real property," according to the meeting's agenda.

Warrant issued on jailed man

A warrant was issued Friday on a man already in custody in Montague County.

The felony theft warrant was issued on Phillip Ray Higbee after Sue Jacobsen, an employee of Park Ford, told police Thursday Higbee had issued the firm a check for \$1,400 on an account that had been closed.

Two acts of vandalism were reported on city property, apparently done over the weekend.

Betty Merriman, director of the Recreational Activities Center, told police Monday that someone had kicked in the door of the concession stand at the baseball field.

And Tuesday, a librarian said a panel in a door of the garage had been knocked in. A neighbor reported having seen the gaping hole Monday.

A female juvenile was taken into custody at 11:16 p.m. Saturday in the parking lot of Wal-Mart, on a charge of public intoxication.

She was released at 11:59, according to the police blotter, to her brother when police were unable to contact the girls' parents.

Participation key to Clean-Up Week success

Early indications are that this year's annual Clean-Up Week will be one of the more successful projects of its type in several years.

Organizations being asked to adopt areas to be cleaned have accepted, and none has yet declined, according to Bob Hamilton, chairman of the Chamber of Commerce committee.

A complete list of organizations and the areas they adopted to clean

during the week of April 19-25 will be published next week.

A proclamation read and adopted during Monday night's city council meeting by Mayor Tim Hunter coincided with the Chamber's effort.

According to the proclamation, the city will not charge "...for dumping of non-commercial rubbish or junk by citizens of Iowa Park at the dump grounds providing the dumping is done according to the instruction of the attendant."

FFA Boosters to meet tonight

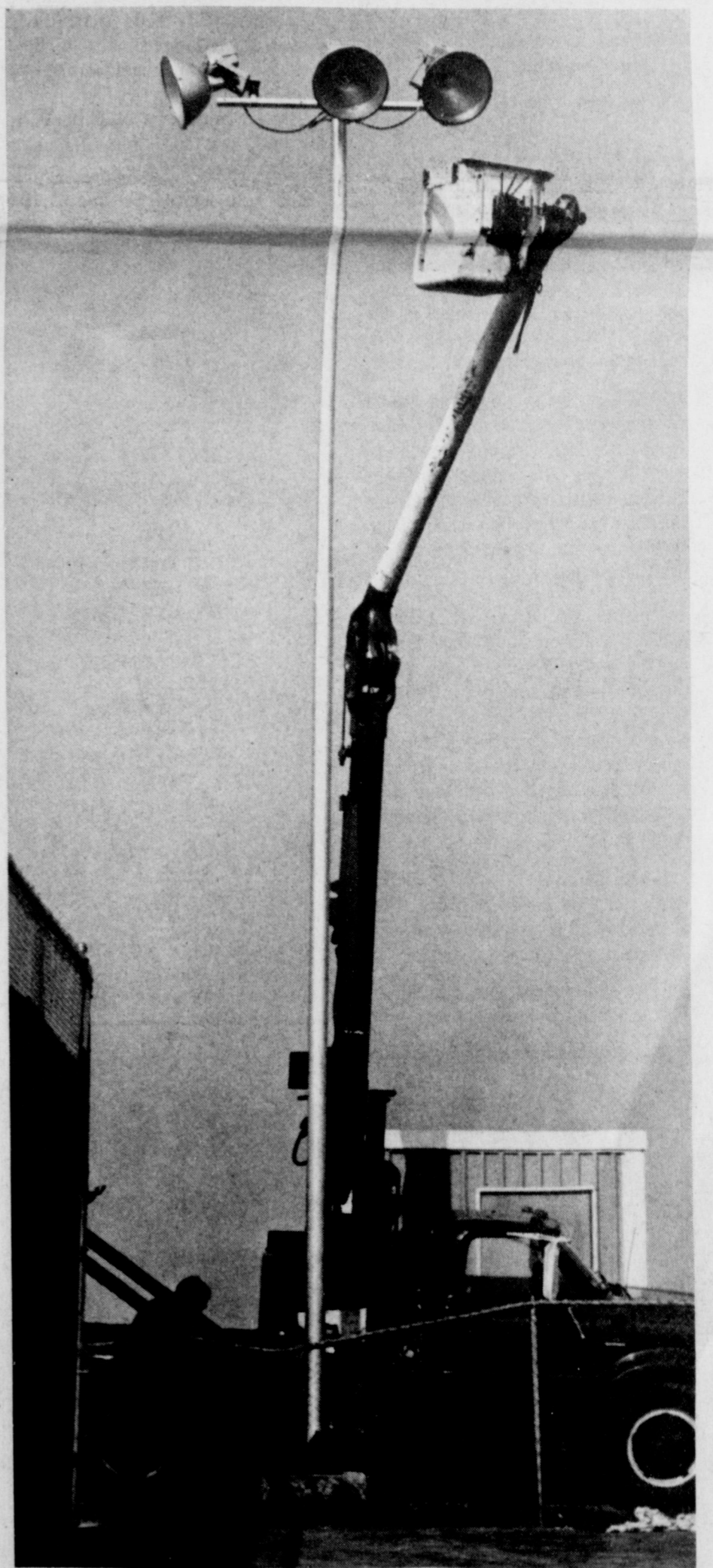
The Iowa Park FFA Booster Club will hold its regular meeting at 7:30 tonight in the Vo-Ag building,

One of the most insulting requests a community newspaper publisher can receive is when asked to give free publicity to an event someone is going to make money on.

And you won't believe how often it happens.

Like last week, for instance, when I received a phone call from a woman in Wichita Falls inviting me to a "press conference" concerning the closed circuit tv showing of Monday night's prize fight between Marvin Hagler and Sugar Ray Leonard.

The idea was for me to write a

story about where it would be held and how much the tickets would cost.

The fighters made something in excess of \$20-million, and they got a share of the closed circuit sales. Then those involved in the showing made a bundle as well.

But we're supposed to do stories about this for free?

We get a stack of mail daily from businesses, usually through "public relations" firms about new equipment, products, etc., asking that we let you buyers know about it....

free. I usually tell them that when they start giving their products and services away, I'll do the same.

Of course, as a community newspaper, we have an obligation to do free stories for our local non-profit organizations and their projects. We don't mind this one little bit.

Often, you'll see an advertisement on the project that the organization has paid for. This is usually because we do not run more than one story on the project and the group wants more than one week's notice in the paper.

Our fear of repeating stories about events in two or three issues is that people will tire of reading about the same thing more than once, and put the paper down without reading about those things they might not know about.

It's almost humorous how some commercial businesses will spend so much money to get free news stories. They hire people to do things that get their businesses mentioned in news stories.

I get my back up when one of these people contact me about doing a story concerning something their business is doing, and then see their ad on television or in a newspaper.

It may sound mersonary, but I don't know of a business in town that will accept one of my articles for a loaf of bread, a car, as payment on a loan, or something like that.

They want cold, hard cash, and the only way I have of making money to pay for those goods and services is by selling advertising.

AREA OIL & GAS NEWS

Williams Petroleum of Burkburnett is preparing to drill a pair of 1,100-ft. developmental wells in the Wichita Regular Field, both located about two miles southeast of Fowlkes.

Located in a 158-acre lease in the SA&MG Survey A-430, the wells will be known as the No. 31 and No. 32 Tidewater. The 31 is 2,060 feet from the north line and 2,088 feet from the north line and 1,810 feet from the east line of Block 4.

The No. 8 Beach "A" is scheduled to be drilled in the Wichita Regular Field 3.5 miles southeast of Burkburnett. Stray Oil of Burkburnett will be the operator. The 600-ft. test is in a 42-acre lease in the CTRR Survey A-443, 492 feet from the south line and 4,481 feet from the east line of Block 2.

Ronkarian Oil of Wichita Falls has staked location for a 1,295-ft. developmental try in Wichita County's Regular Field, about six miles south of Iowa Park. The venture will be known as the No. 7 cullum and Perkins. It is in a 180-acre lease in the Denton School Land Survey A-417 Section 5 Block 4. Location is 150 feet from the north line and 125 feet from the west line of the Section.

Ray Hatcher has given up on his efforts to make a producer out of the

No. 1 W.H. Hall in the Wichita Regular Field, 3.5 miles west of Burkburnett. The well was originally staked out in 1981, but the site was temporarily abandoned. Drilling operations were concluded in October of last year, with total depth of 1,951 feet and no commercial shows indicated. The well has been plugged and abandoned.

The No. 34 Burnett "AMI" is scheduled for spudding in the Wichita Regular Field with Tom Swanson Oil of Electra as the operator. It will be a 900-ft. test. Location is in a 280-acre lease in the W.W. Carroll Survey A-436 Section 16, 4.5 miles southeast of the Electra townsite. Location is 3,040 feet from the north line and 2,090 feet from the east line of the section.

At a location five miles southwest of Iowa Park, MackKnight of Wichita Falls is preparing to spud the No. 14 Roller in the Wichita Regular Field. With total depth projected to 1,300 feet, the well is in a 326-acre lease in the McK&W Survey, Wichita County A-238. Location is 800 feet from the north line and 700 feet from the east line of the survey.

EP Operating is nearing the 7,000-ft. drilling mark at a Hardeman County wildcat nine miles northwest of Qunah.

This among several other "Loony Laws" were featured in this month's issue of Texas Highways. Robert W. Pelton is the author of the article which was taken from a book by the same name.

Here are some additional "Looney Laws" which may or may not be in force today.

No woman is allowed to drive a car while "wearing a floppy hat" or other headgear that would "scare a timid person" in the city of Graham.

It's strictly against the law in Monahans for a woman to shave her legs while driving to work in the morning. Likewise, in Brady a law forbids a female to shave her legs in the backseat of a car while attending a drive-in movie, though she can presumably do the dastardly deed in the front seat.

Lamesa law makes it illegal for a husband to beat his wife if she kept him from going to work by filling the car's gas tank with water.

Be careful when buying an automobile in Silsbee. An old ordinance declares it to be against the law to leave crumbs in the vehicle or spots on the upholstery when taking a new car out for a trial spin.

Dalhart retains an old law that makes it illegal for a woman to operate an automobile while attired in a night gown. Similarly, in Wharton no female can operate a car while she's wearing a bathing suit.

Stern measures force drivers in Kerrville to avoid operating their vehicles with "flat wheels." Anyone driving an automobile in this manner may have to cough up \$2 for the fine and spend 24 hours in jail.

In Del Rio you really needn't worry about being caught in an embarrassing situation while being amorous in a parked car. No person, including a law officer, is allowed to walk up and peek in the window without loudly honking three times.

The community of Guthrie makes it taboo for a man to hold hands with a girl while driving down

the street -- but only if she is riding in another car.

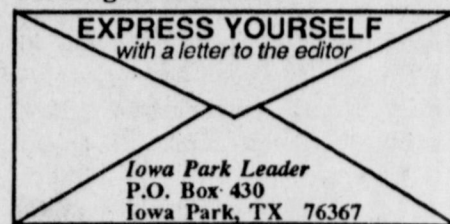

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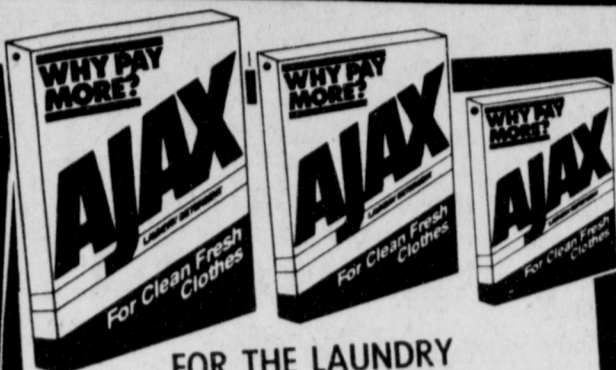
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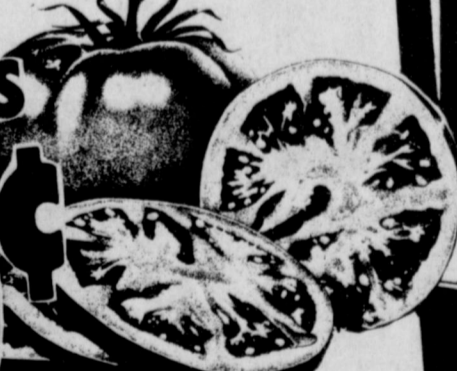

Mushrooms have many uses and are increasing in popularity to the extent that Americans consume many million pounds each year.

The mushroom traces its roots back to ancient Rome where it was believed to give soldiers strength in battle. At one point in ancient Rome, a reform government decided that people were living too richly and a law was passed that they must eat more vegetables, and the Romans remembered that the mushroom was a vegetable. However, the mushroom was also one of the fabulous foods set before Romans in Casar's day.

During the reign of Louis XIX, the French began growing the mushrooms in caves, and some of the caves are still used for mushroom caves.

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FAMILY HEALTH NOTES

ALZHEIMER'S DISEASE - A SILENT EPIDEMIC

We hear a lot these days about Alzheimer's disease. Why has this dreadful condition that causes some 50 to 60 percent of mental impairment in the elderly taken on such significance?

Part of the reason for the current focus on Alzheimer's is the fact that people live longer today and, therefore, there is more of a chance of an elderly person developing it. At the beginning of the century people lived to an average age of about 45, so many who might have fallen victim to Alzheimer's died first. The Federal government is now putting a lot of money into geriatric-related research in general, and Alzheimer's in particular, and that tends to focus attention on this disease. Also, the cost of taking care of the increasing number of people with Alzheimer's disease is truly staggering.

What is Alzheimer's disease? According to information from the National Institute of Aging, it is a little-known disorder of the brain causing of memory or serious mental deterioration. It is progressive, irreversible and, at present, there is no known cure.

Groups of nerve endings in the outer layer of the brain degenerate and interfere with the passage of signals between the cells. These areas of degeneration have a characteristic appearance under the microscope and are called "plaques." Changes also occur in the nerve cells of the cortex, leading to an accumulation of abnormal fibers called tangles. The larger the number of these two abnormalities - plaques and tangles - the greater the disturbance in intellectual function and memory.

The terms pre-senile and senile dementia are used to describe any kind of severe mental impairment in older individuals. Approximately one-half of such persons are victims of Alzheimer's disease; about another quarter have diseased blood vessels, and the remainder suffer from a variety of other conditions such as brain tumors, thyroid dysfunction and pernicious anemia.

Studies have shown that much of the senility that once was thought to be hardening of the arteries is not as frequent a cause of dementia (a condition of deteriorated mentality) in elderly people as was once thought. Most people who really do get what looks like true dementia in old age will have an Alzheimer-like dementia. In other words, it will not be the hardening of the arteries that once was written off as part of the aging process. Senility used to be accepted as part of the normal process of aging, but now it is being looked at more as a true illness that lends itself to research - something that is hopefully treatable and a process whose course may be changed in the future.

The symptoms of Alzheimer's disease in the beginning are minor and very subtle. Many times they are attributed to other illnesses. Gradually, however, the person becomes more forgetful. As memory loss increases, changes also appear in personality, mood and behavior. Judgement, concentration, speech and physical coordination may also be affected. Some victims show confusion and restlessness and require special assistance.

There are many patterns in the type, severity and sequence of mental changes in Alzheimer's disease. But the symptoms are usually progressive and there is great variation in the rate of change from person to person. In a few cases there may be rapid decline, but, more commonly, there are long periods with little change.

Some progress is being made in research into Alzheimer's disease, but the treatments that have been tried have side effects to the extent that they are not practical. Exact diagnosis of the type of senile and pre-senile dementia is very important since some types, other than Alzheimer's disease, can be effectively treated. Proper guidance is important to the person suffering from Alzheimer's disease, as well as for the family coping with the illness.

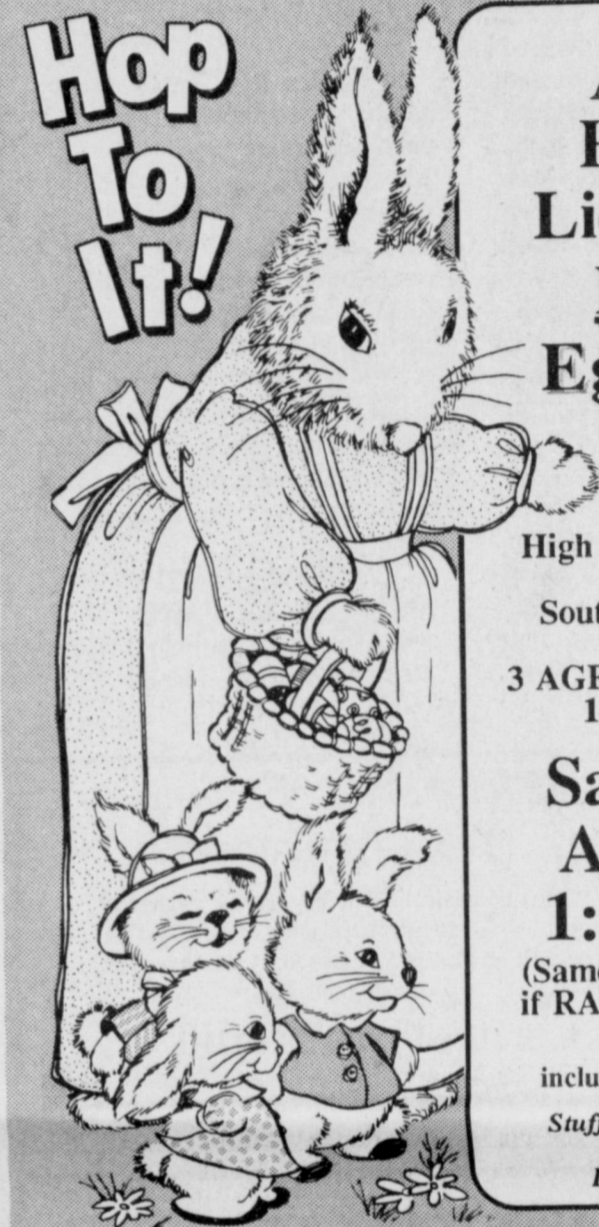

The Hawk varsity and junior varsity track teams both finished second to Childress in Saturday's meet at Electra, and the Lady Hawks finished in fourth position among 13 teams.

The two varsity teams have only one more meet in which to prepare for their assaults on the Dist. 6-AAA championships.

They will be competing Saturday at Seymour. The district meet is slated April 18 at Bridgeport.

Scott Weaver and David Meissner, as they have all season, earned the lion's share of the Hawks' 77 points.

Weaver, the area's leading long

Vernon was the 1986 champion.

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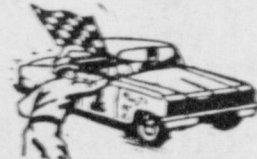
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Host of friends, relatives observes Good's 90th birthday
