TU Electric manager retiring in August

After more than 40 years' service with the Texas Electric Service Division of TU Electric, Wayne House will retire Aug. 1 as local manager of the company's Iowa Park and Electra

Born in Rosie, Ark., House came to Iowa Park at an early age. He was graduated from W.F. George High School, where he lettered in basketball and received a scholarship at the old Hardin Junior College, now Midwestern State Univ.

School days over, House joined the electric company as a serviceman at Iowa Park on Mar. 5, 1947, and nine years later was named manager.

He was given additional responsibility as manager of the Electra office in January of 1981.

Active in many local organizations, House is past president of the Evening Lions Club and served on

the boards of the Industrial Development Corporation, Chamber of Commerce and Iowa Park Library.

He was one of the key individuals responsible for encouraging the W.R. Grace leadership to locate the Cryovac plant in Iowa Park. It is now the community's largest employer, with more than 550 on the payroll.

He currently is a director of both the Iowa Park and Electra Chambers of Commerce and is vice chairman of

the Industrial Development Corp. House was named "Citizen of the Year" in 1963.

He has worked as a Scoutmaster, served as chairman of the Camp Fire

Girls and is a past president of the Little League Baseball program. House has worked in various

areas of the Iowa Park First United Methodist Church and is a past chairman of the board.

He and his wife, Geneva, have two children: a son, Wendall (who is in his first term as a trustee of Iowa Park schools), and a daughter, Betsy.

House said he has no plans for retirement. "We'll probably travel some, and I'll play a little golf. I'm just going to take it a day at a time."

He is sure of one thing, however. "I will not make any trouble calls and I'll sleep through storms," he said.

The full skirt of the gown captured attention with a deep hem of lace and pearls that extended to cathedral length train heavily appliqued with lace and pearls.



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
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As I See It...

There's a lot of talk nationally about whether or not morals should be taught in public schools.

I'm all for it, if one of the main chapters in that text is vandalism.

I can hardly remember what it was like to live in a community where there was no vandalism.

The first I ever saw, I must have been about 13 years of age. It was at Hereford, and the doors and roof of a restroom in a state park had been destroyed.

I couldn't understand why anyone would do it then, nor can I understand why it's done today.

I honestly believe the worst act of vandalism I've ever done was to put soap on business windows on Halloween night.

In times when I was tempted to do other, more damaging acts, my mind immediately tuned in to "The Golden Rule." And I wouldn't want someone to do to me what I thought I might like to do to them.

It's not hard to visualize what wonderful facilities we could have for the public, were it not for vandalism. Nor is it difficult to realize how little the costs would be to do more for our children and ourselves.

Let me give you some instances: just a couple of years ago, the Mule-Skinners spent dozens of manhours and lots of dollars, building a new concession stand and scorekeepers area at the Senior League field. And to make things even nicer, restrooms

Well, the locks and hasps didn't last the rest of the summer. They were replaced and again taken.

The same thing happened to the concession stand at the Minor and Major fields on West Magnolia. The doors were forced open and heavy damage inflicted.

Lights at the fields are shot out by BB guns or thrown rocks. That costs several hundreds of dollars each year, just to replace the bulbs.

The schools put up coin boxes for a while at the junior high tennis courts, so people could play at night. but not at taxpayers' expense. Well, it didn't take long for that box to be completely demolished.

Nets at the courts, wherever they are in the community, seldom last an entire season.

Restrooms are being constructed at the high school baseball field. Before they're completed, someone knocked down the building blocks, using a vehicle to do the damage.

Remember the heavy, concrete picnic tables that used to be in the city hall park? I don't know how it was done, but those things were totally destroyed.

We can't always blame the kids, though most of the minor acts are apparently done by them.

The city was told by a state office to not allow driving on any of the city-owned lake dams. Barricades

put up, always of heavy pipe, would not last an evening, most of the

We've got a choice: cut down on vandalism through education and by prosecution; or wind up without any public facilities to enjoy.

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Wichita County Commissioners' Notebook

Upon the Juvenile Board's recommendation the Commissioners Court took action to terminate the Child Welfare Unit contract with the Texas Department of Human Services effective Sept. 1.

One main concern of the Juvenile Board and the Commissioners was the liability exposure for various kinds of suits that might be involving Wichita County which will not be liability exposure for any of the other Texas counties.

In any event, the Council will continue funding various items for Child Welfare in order to assist them.

Juvenile Probation is out of money for residential care for probationers.

Family Court Services Administrator Bill J. Ballard informed the Court that in order to allow children who are currently in placement to remain there throughout their probationary period and in order to allow for some additional placements, the Court would have to create a new line in the 1987 budget.

As a result, the Commissioners Court declared an emergency and amended the 1987 Juvenile Probation budget creating a "Residential Care and Treatment" line funding it from within Family Court Services budget in the amount of \$43,050.

Commissioners approved modifications to the agreement with the Maskat Temple. Minor changes were made to this agreement which authorized the County law enforcement personnel to use the Provost Guard Firing Range to qualify.

County law enforcement personnel are required to have fire arms and night fire qualifications twice a year.

Other action taken by Commissioners Court was the opening of bids for road materials, which were taken under advisement until the June 29 meeting.



Work on FM 369 is announced

Two major projects are in the works for FM 369 next year, according to an announcement from the area State Department of Highways and Public Transportation office.

The farm to market road will be widened, construct surfaced shoulders and apply overlay from US 287 to FM 367.

Broken down into two phases, the stretch from the expressway to Loop 370 (Old Iowa Park Road), will cost an estimated \$122,900, and from Loop 370 to FM 367 an estimated \$172,000.

The program, known as 1988 Consolidated Rehabilitation Program, includes 325 projects covering more than 1,600 miles and costing an estimated \$300-million, according to Raymond Stotzer, engineer-director of the highway department.

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FAMILY HEALTH NOTES

Cancer of the Mouth

Probably no operation leaves a patient more psychologically devastated than that which disfigures the face. The face is said to be the initial focal point as the world looks at an individual.

Cancer of the mouth not only leaves a person with the spector of less than a 35 percent survival rate hanging over his head, but also the possible loss of part of the jaw bone, tongue, muscle and lymph nodes.

Better surgical management, early diagnoses and extensive use of plastic surgery have gone a long way toward eliminating much of the psychological stress victims of cancer of the mouth suffer. Still, in many cases it is a drastic operation, but one whose after-effects could be reduced still further if people would pay more attention to their mouths.

Approximately eight percent of all cancers detected are found in the mouth. The most common site for cancer of the mouth, unfortunately, is under the tongue. No one really knows why that area is so susceptible to cancer, but possibly it is because that is the part of the mouth where chemicals collect. It could also possibly be the type of tissue found in that area. Further, there is the plentiful supply of blood in the mouth

which furnishes a pathway for spreading of the cancer.

One of the main causes of cancer of the mouth is the use of tobacco, along with alcohol. When the two are combined the rate of mouth cancer increases significantly. While cigarettes are a prime cause, the use of chewing tobacco also contributes, with the damage being done by the temperature caused by smoking and the chemicals found in the tobacco. Any sort of chronic irritation can cause cancer. The healthier the condition of the mouth, the less likelihood there is of cancer starting.

Since it is relatively easy to see into your own mouth, regular self-checking is a good preventive method. Large, rough white patches, velvety red places or a mass (lump) of any color may indicate cancer and should be checked by your family doctor. As in the case of any form of cancer, the earlier it is detected the better it can be successfully treated.







Calcium and BP

Although there is still controversy about the value of dietary calcium in affecting osteoporosis risks, there is growing support for calcium's value in reducing blood pressure.

A report in the American Journal of Epidemiology summarized two different studies from the Netherlands which found that (in 2,300 people) the more calcium in the diet, the lower the blood pressure.

Another study showed calcium supplementation can lower blood pressure in young people with mild hypertension.

The Dutch scientists recommended people reduce risks for hypertension by obtaining proper amounts of calcium (800 mg/day) and by eating such foods as cheese, dairy products, broccoli and dark green leafy vegetables.


