School year starts Tuesday for students

Iowa Park school students will begin attending class Tuesday morning, and will probably be looking forward to their first holiday, which is the following week.

The following Monday will be a day out of class, as the schools observe Labor Day. And then it will be back to the books until the Nov. 26-29 Thanksgiving holidays.

Buses will run their regular routes and schedules as last year Monday, according to Robert Palmer, assistant superintendent.

But students will be let out of class one hour early Monday afternoon.

The entire high school student body is to report to the auditorium at 8:05 Tuesday morning, prior to going to class, Richard Davis, principal, said.

High school students will be picking up their schedules today and Friday, with seniors reporting this morning, juniors this afternoon, sophomores Friday morning and freshmen that afternoon.

Work scheduled on Wall St.

Two blocks of South Wall will be closed to traffic Tuesday, according to James Barrington, city administrator.

A crew from the Texaco Petroleum Co. will cut the street and do encasement work on an oil pipeline that crosses under the street at the Jefferson intersection.

The work is necessary before the state rebuilds Wall south from the railroad tracks, Barrington said.

The workers are to wait until most of the school traffic has passed before starting to dig, and will remain on the site until finished.

Barrington said he was told the project should be completed in only one day.

City budget calls for two-cent tax increase

Iowa Park's city council Monday night will vote on adoption of a \$2,468,000 budget which will require a two-cent tax increase and also raise the water and sewer rates.

Aldermen this week finished their work sessions to balance the 1987-88 budget, which includes

\$1,538,000 for the general fund and \$930,000 for the water and sewer fund.

A three-percent tax increase is called for, raising the rate from 77-cents to .80557 per \$100 value, according to James Barrington, city administrator.

Additionally, a 20-percent increase will be applied to both the water and sewer rates.

Barrington explained the tax increase was necessary to offset a lower property evaluation in the city this

Trustees approve \$6-million budget

Iowa Park school trustees Monday night approved a \$6-million budget for the 1987-88 school year, and will meet briefly next Monday to act on it.

Between the board's last two meetings, administrators whittled off \$330,000 from the budget, to insure a \$1,302,400 carryover at the end of the year.

The cuts were mainly capital outlay items, including \$200,000 in classroom construction.

Iowa Park's tax rate will be one cent higher than 1986-87. The one-cent extra on the tax rate, based on the district's values, will generate an additional \$25,910.

Based on the estimated carryover from this year, the budget actually has a deficit of approximately \$20,000.

The tax rate is broken down to provide 70 cents for the general operating fund and six cents for the inter-

est and sinking fund.

Expenditures include \$2,999,736 for instruction service (49.26%), \$456,878 for instructional related services (17.04%), \$1,045,196 for maintenance/plant service (17.16%), \$355,469 for general and tax administration (5.84%), \$168,845 for debt service (2.66%), and \$26,300 for swimming pool (4.3%).

The breakdown of revenue sources includes: \$2.8-million state (50.02%), \$2,718,208 local (48.55%), and \$79,859 federal (1.43%).

The per-pupil cost, including total budget except debt service, is \$3,289.44, trustees were told.

Payroll costs are 65-percent of the budget.

Per-pupil cost broken down by campus, but not including mainten-

ance, transportation, debt service, general administration, tax office or swimming pool, are: \$2,840.90 high school; \$1,961.01 junior high; \$1,652.43 Kidwell Elementary.

Comparing the new budget with the 1986-87 budget, the cost of operating the school next year will be \$515,221 greater.

Most of the increase, from \$5,464,620 to \$6,089,841, are state-mandated salaries and programs, according to Supt. Glen Mitchell.

Prior to working on their budget Monday evening, board members and administrators toured the three newly-installed temporary classroom structures at the Bradford campus, followed by a reception for the 15 new teachers and one new aide, held in the junior high library.

Robert Michael Largent, 22, was charged with attempting to elude an officer, his vehicle impounded, and he was lodged in county jail at 3:25 a.m.

Sunday evening, the local police received a call from the county sheriff's office to determine if a man in custody were wanted here. He was.

Jerry Reuben Ostby Jr., 22, had outstanding warrants from here for public intoxication, criminal mischief and two counts of failure to appear, with bonds totaling \$352.50.

After being booked in here, he was released following signing an order to appear in municipal court.

Police arrested Russell Jack Bettinger, 36, who was taken into custody at 5:43 a.m. yesterday after it was determined he was wanted on an outstanding warrant from the Wichita

Falls Department of Public Safety for speeding and failure to appear.

Bettinger was released after posting bond.

Bank's franchise taxes are received

The city and school coffers benefited from this year's second allocation of the state's franchise tax on banks.

The school has received \$10,899.21 thus far this year, an increase of 11.67 percent over last year, according to a release from the state comptroller's office.

Though the city's portion represents only a 1.41-percent increase over last year, it has received to date \$11,249.91 in bank franchise taxes.

Banks have paid franchise tax since 1984, when the legislature allocated receipts from the tax to cities, counties, school districts and other local taxing units where banks are located.

Banks are taxed at the same rate as other state corporations and the tax is prorated among local taxing units based on their tax rates.

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Cook of the Week

Annette (Mrs. Dwight) Parker is indeed a versatile and talented newcomer to Iowa Park. She and her husband, who is the minister of the Church of Christ, and their children, Geoff, age 10, and Jenny, two years old, moved here a few weeks ago from Leedey, Okla., where he was minister of the Church of Christ there.

She was graduated from a high school in San Antonio, attended Oklahoma Christian College at Oklahoma City where she was an art major and met her husband. She received a degree in library science and a master's degree in education from Southwestern Okla. State Univ. at Weatherford. She is currently attending Midwestern State Univ. majoring in English and minoring in journalism.

When the family lived at Leedey, Mrs. Parker was school librarian for kindergarten through 12th grade and taught junior high reading. She has served as an instructor for the Oklahoma City Zoo in the education department, and as a mud engineer during the oil field days. She has also been trained and worked as an emergency medical technician.

Mr. and Mrs. Parker are both involved in the Special Olympics and they have volunteered to help with the Red Cross Blood Drive here.

Annette likes to read, particularly old classics, do calligraphy, painting and photography. She plays the organ, violin and French horn.

According to her husband, she is a "kitchen artist" and merits a degree in cooking with summa cum laude honors. Her recipes today, two of which are foreign, speak for themselves.

Her Cone Cake recipe stirs up interest in the ice cream cone and its history. There are differences of opinions as to who created it. The dictionary of American Food and Drink states that a concessionaire at the World's Fair in St. Louis in 1904 ran out of ice cream dishes, and a Syrian worker quickly formed a cone using a recipe for a Persian pastry.

It seems that the first person to be awarded a patent on the ice cream cone was Italo Marchiony, an Italian immigrant, who got it Dec. 13, 1904.

FORFAR BRIDIES
(a Scotch recipe)
1 lb. round steak, pounded thin
1/2 onion, chopped
Salt and pepper
1/4 tsp. allspice
1/4 tsp. dry mustard
1 pkg. pie crust, mix for two pies
1/4 cup butter
1 egg beaten with 1 Tbsp. water
Cut steak in 1-inch strips.
Combine with onions and seasonings. Prepare pie crust mix as pack-

age directs. Roll out and cut into 6-inch rounds. Put an equal amount of meat on one side of each round, dot with butter. Brush edge of each round with egg mixture, fold pastry over meat and press edges together lightly. Cut a hole in top of each turnover, brush with remaining egg mixture. Bake in 400 degree preheated oven for 15 minutes; reduce heat to 350 and bake about 30 minutes longer.

CONE CAKES

Purchase the short, flat, colored ice cream cones, the 36-cup package is adequate. Whip up a box of any flavor cake mix. Fill ice cream cones half full. Place filled cones in muffin tins and carefully place in preheated 350 degree oven 20-25 minutes. The cones will remain the same color. When cooled, frost with frosting tinted with color to match the cones. Drizzle with melted chocolate chips, sprinkle with ground nuts and toasted coconut, and top with a cherry.

SOUTH OF THE BORDER ZUCCHINI

1 medium onion, diced
2 sliced zucchini
1/4 tsp. pepper
2 cups corn
1/2 cup water
1/4 cup olive oil
1 chopped tomato
2 green peppers, diced
2 yellow squash, sliced
1/2 tsp. salt

Saute onions and pepper in oil in a Dutch oven 2-3 minutes. Add remaining ingredients and bring to a boil. Cover, reduce heat and simmer 8-10 minutes.

CURRIED BEEF PITA
(a Greek recipe)

1 lb. ground beef
1 garlic clove
1 zucchini, diced
1 1/4 tsp. salt
1/4 tsp. pepper
Pocket bread
1 chopped onion
1 T. curry
1/2 cup water

1/2 tsp. sugar
1 tomato, diced
In skillet over medium-high heat, cook beef, onion, garlic and curry until meat is browned, about 10 minutes, discard garlic. Add zucchini, water, salt, sugar and pepper. Heat to boiling, reduce heat to low, cover and simmer 15 minutes. Stir in tomato. Cut bread in half and spoon mixture into bread.

SPICED CIDER MIX

1 cup orange-flavored drink mix
1 cup pre-sweetened apple drink mix
1 cup sugar
1/2 cup instant tea mix
1-6 oz. pkg. sugar-sweetened lemonade-flavor mix
1/2 tsp. cinnamon
1/4 tsp. cloves
1/4 tsp. allspice
Combine all ingredients in bowl. Mix well. For each serving, place 1 T. plus 1 tsp. mix in a cup. Add 1 cup boiling water. Yield 42 cups.

IMPOSSIBLE PECAN PIE

1 1/2 cups chopped pecans
3/4 cup brown sugar
3/4 cup milk
3/4 cup corn syrup
1/4 cup butter, softened
1/2 cup Bisquick
4 eggs
1 1/2 tsp. vanilla
Heat oven to 350 degrees. Grease pie plate. Sprinkle pecans in plate. Beat remaining ingredients till smooth. Pour into pie plate. Bake till knife inserted in center comes out clean, 50-55 minutes, cool.

Hearing set on landfill

Sunday is the deadline for the state to receive a request to hold a public hearing on a proposed solid waste site south of Iowa Park.

No hearing will be held unless a person affected has requested the hearing.

The proposed 60.32-acre Type IV landfill (brush, construction-demolition waste and rubbish) is approximately 1.7 miles north of the junction of US Highway 277 and FM 1634 and approximately .8 mile west of FM 1634 in Wichita County.

The application for permit was submitted by Bell Processing, Inc. for a municipal solid waste landfill, and its official notice was published in the Aug. 30 issue of the Leader.

A request for public hearing must be in writing and contain the name, mailing address and phone number of the person making the request; and a brief description of how the requester has or will suffer from granting the permit.

Requests for hearing should be submitted to Director, Division of Solid Waste Management, Texas Department of Health, 1100 West 49th St., Austin, 78756.

He also confirmed one report I read, that the nation's largest tribe, the Zulus, are actually against Tutu's attempt to take over, but are satisfied to let the already underway changes take effect.

Georgie Anne Geyer, in her syndicated column of Tuesday's Dallas Morning News, points out how leaders in nations not friendly to our's use our national media, by "creating and controlling 'news' and when we are simply their foolishly complaint vehicles."

And if you don't think Tutu is using our national media for his own benefit, I invite you to review news stores of the past couple of years, and then speak with someone in, or recently from, South Africa.

The reports we are seeing or reading about are of a very, very small minority of blacks in that country.

The termination reportedly was made last week, and Robertson will seek reinstatement on the force.

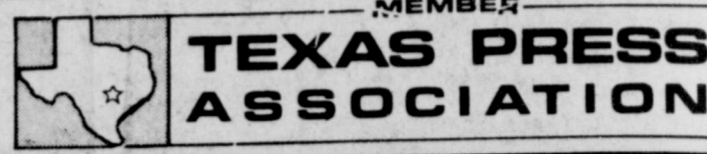
Mrs. W.A. George has requested a public appearance before the council, concerning a request from the Friends of the Library on landscaping the Will Burnett Memorial Library grounds.

Wichita County Commissioners' Notebook

County commissioners Aug. 24 approved a State Aid Agreement between the Texas Juvenile Probation Commission and the Wichita County Juvenile Board for state funds to be used solely for the provision of juvenile probation services. These state aid funds are for fiscal year 1988 and are to be expended in accordance to the Texas Juvenile Probation Commission standards.

A revision of the application for the Juvenile Probation Intensive Supervision Program Grant was approved by the commissioners. The grant in the amount of \$45,979 will assist in the establishment of an Intensive Supervision Program.

A change order on the remodeling of the existing jail project in the amount of \$4,743.66 was approved by the court. The change order was for work in the day rooms on the fourth floor of the jail.

Other action by the court included the abandonment of an easement on Horseshoe Bend Estates. The lots involved are being replatted and the utility easement will not be needed.

Also, Commissioners Gordon Griffith and H.C. Greer were authorized to travel to Austin to the State Auction and expend up to \$4,000 each to purchase equipment for the county. Greer mentioned that they can usually obtain equipment that is needed at a better price at these auctions when the equipment is available.

The next court meeting will be held at 10 a.m. Monday, Sept. 14, at the county courthouse.

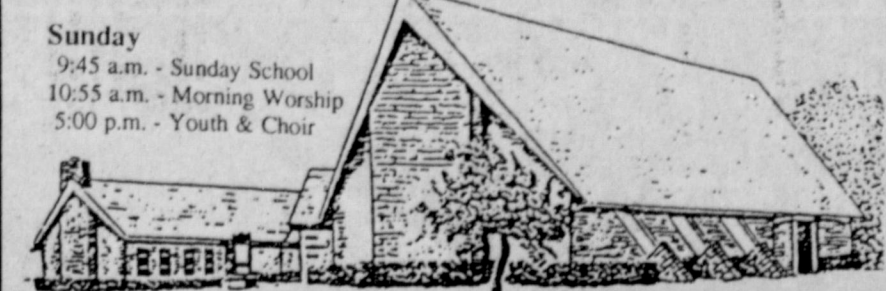

Hawks show strength in Friday Scrimmage

After a strong showing, both offensively and defensively, Friday in a scrimmage against a good Holliday club, the Hawks will hold their final pre-season scrimmage tomorrow at Olney.

The junior varsity teams are to hit the field at 6 Friday evening for about an hour, followed by the Hawks and Cubs.

The Hawks are slated to open the 1987 campaign here the following Friday in their traditional battle with the Bulldogs of Burk Burnett.

Though Coach Don Lucy's Eagles are not as large, team-wise, as most clubs in the past, their quickness and talent provided plenty of test for the young Hawks.

However, the depth of the Mean Green was apparent, especially when the second teams were on the field.

"We probably scrimmaged a little bit better than we usually do," commented Head Hawk David Baugh.

"We were fairly aggressive and didn't have a lot of really bad mistakes, except blowing pass coverage once."

George Story. The 230-pound senior guard injured a shoulder earlier in the week and will be out two or more weeks, it was reported.

The starting positions are not yet set by the coaches, but if the Hawks were opening season play tomorrow, instead of scrimmaging, five would be going both offensively and defensively.

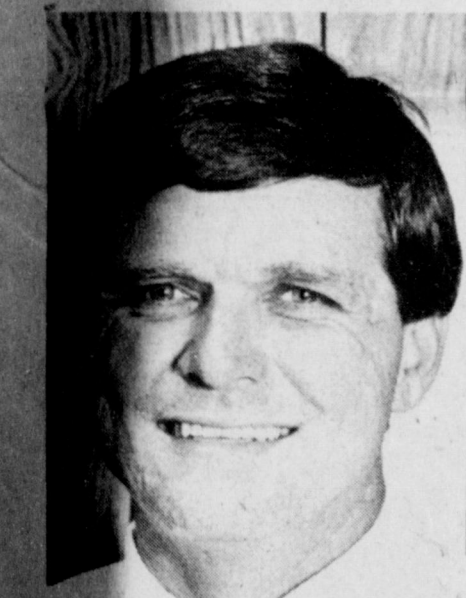

Oil Report

The Little Quintin Co. of Ardmore, Okla., has filed first production figures on two new oil wells in the Daves Field, Wichita County.

The wells are designated as the No. 4 L.R. Monaghan and the No. 3 R.B. Sisk. The Monaghan well showed ability to flow 105 barrels of oil per day, plus 100,000 CF casinghead gas on an 18/64-in. choke. It bottomed at 5,450 feet. The Sisk well flowed 121 barrels of oil per day, along with 160,000 CF casinghead gas on a 24/64-in. choke. Bottomhole was a 4,404 feet.

The wells will produce from perforations in the Atoka conglomerate Formation, ranging from 5,326 to 5,369 feet into the wellbore. Drillsites are four miles west of Wichita Falls in a 40-acre lease in the Denton CSL Survey, A-57.

The Monaghan well is located 467 feet from the north line and 600 feet from the west line of the lease, while the Sisk well is located 800 feet from the south line and 193 feet from the east line of the lease.

A 2,000-ft. developmental well is planned by Tom Swanson of

Electra at a drillsite two miles south of Fowlkes, Wichita County. The location is in a 300-acre lease in the

SA&MG Survey, A-271. Well's designation is the No. 11 Burnett "F". It will be in the Wichita

Regular Field.

Drillsite is 1,756 feet from the north line and 2,995 feet from the west line of the lease.

Tony Battista Operating of Wichita Falls has abandoned an

undrilled location in the Wichita Regular Field. The No. 3 Clark was to have been located three miles southwest of Burkburnett in a 142-acre lease in the S. Anderson Survey, A-3. The well had been under authority for 1,999-ft. TD.
