Beginning in January year, the Texas State Legislature passed a law requiring courts to make income withholding as a part of current child support orders.

By this law, if a child support payment becomes one monur behind, he paycen fie an order to be sen

But for parents who divorced
before the first of the year, the problem still exists.

Payment of child support ideally should place the burden of supporting the children on equal parts to each parent, but often, by way of erratic payments or no payments at all, the purden of supporting the children is parent.
When court-ordered child support is not payed, there are a number of places the custodial parent can go for help. The best agency to go through the individual such as time, money, if the non-custodial parent needs to be located and other factors.

Most custodial parents in a situ tion where there are erratic or no child support payments don't know what to do or where to go, accordin to Bill Ballard of Family Court Ser-
