## 'Victim' admits shooting a hoax

A man who told police he was shot during a Feb. 4 robbery at the office of Woodbriar Apartments has admitted he falsified the report.

Herman Smith, 56, accompanied by his attorney, turned himself into police here Thursday evening.

Smith was charged with felony theft over \$750 and is alleged to have taken the money while working as manager of the apartment complex.

He was taken before Justice of the Peace Bill Robinson after the arrest, and released on a personal recognisance bond.

Police were called to the apartment office Feb. 4, where they found Smith with a bullet wound in his left shoulder. He was transported to Wichita General Hospital by ambulance.

Smith told police he had met a man in the office who wanted to rent an apartment.

However, during their investigation, police discovered a revolver in a

housecoat hanging in a closet near the office.

When the suspect turned himself in Thursday and was asked about the shooting, he reportedly admitted the wound was self-inflicted, explaining he was cleaning the gun when the telephone rang, and it discharged.

Following his discharge from the county hospital, Smith reportedly registered in Red River Hospital in Wichita Falls, where he remained until Thursday.

During the time he was hospitalized, an audit of the apartment's books was initiated, and a significant amount (reportedly in excess of \$1,500) was found to be unaccounted for.

The warrant was issued for his arrest after the accountant's findings of unexplained losses exceeded the minimum for a felony charge, according to Chief Alan Sheffield.

## Cryovac employees lauded for safety

Bill Sturgis, the president of Cryovac Division, returned to Iowa Park Wednesday and presented the first annual President's Award for Safety to the employees of the local plant.

The award recognizes the Iowa Park facility's safety improvement over the previous year.

Only three of the seven Cryovac manufacturing facilities in North America earned the honor for last year's performance.

The award was accepted by a group of employees in special ceremonies.

The award is based on Cryovac's Standardized Analysis of Facility Experience, known as their "S.A.F.E. Index Program," which compares the overall record of each plant to the previous year and to Bureau of Labor Statistics data.

Iowa Park's S.A.F.E. score, an effective formula based on injuries and lost workdays, reflects a local safety record of significant improvement when compared to industry and other Cryovac facilities.

Sturgis praised the local employees for their personal acceptance of responsibility in this important phase of their total performance.

During his visit, he met with all employees in small groups to permit interaction on a personal basis.

As part of the discussion, he also reviewed the strategic plan for the next seven years.

Sturgis reinforced the importance of the Iowa Park plant in Cryovac's overall plan for the future and also praised the employees for their significant contribution to the overall quality of product and service.

Cryovac is a world-wide leader in the highly specialized business of flexible plastic packaging. The company manufactures and markets a

wide range of sophisticated packaging materials and equipment systems which are used in packaging a variety of perishable foods and consumer goods.

Cryovac is a division of W.R. Grace & Co.-Conn., a multi-national company with world headquarters in New York City.

From its humble beginning in the 1980s, the company has grown into a major U.S. corporation ranked in the Fortune 500. World-wide, total Grace packaging operations exceed \$1.2-billion in annual sales.

Cryovac North American headquarters is in Duncan, S.C. The facility also houses a research center, where many breakthroughs for the packaging of foods and non-foods have been created.

Cryovac is international in scope, with European headquarters in Switzerland and a research division in Italy. Manufacturing plants and sales offices are also located in Europe, Australia, New Zealand, Central and South America, Africa and Canada.

## New business beefs permits with building

Building permits took a big jump during February, almost doubling January's total and raising the year's sum to \$204,671.

Two permits accounted for almost all February's \$129,464 total. They were for a new business building and repair to a fire-damaged home.

Construction was begun on the C&L Service Center building at the corner of Colorado and Park, after a permit for \$70,000 was issued. That was only \$5,207 less than the entire total for January.

It is the first commercial building construction permit issued by city hall since the summer of 1988, when Catlin Quick Change was built.

C&L has been operating several years in a small building at the corner of Coleman Park Road and FM 368.

## Police seek vandals shooting pellet gun

Police are on the lookout for someone with a BB or pellet gun who caused considerable damage to vehicles and homes over the weekend.

Four vehicles and two homes were reported as being damaged, all in the same area of the city.

Three of the reports were filed Sunday morning: a pickup window in the 500 block of W. Magnolia, reported at 5:43; the driver's side window of a vehicle in the 500 block of W. Rebecca, reported at 8:21; and a pellet hole in the siding of a home in the same block of Rebecca, reported at 11:05.

Monday evening, the resident of a home in the 1300 block of N. Fourth called police at 7:41, and said someone had just shot out a front window.

As police were investigating, windows of two vehicles in the same block were found to have been shattered, apparently by someone driving past and shooting at will.

Police Chief Alan Sheffield has issued an appeal to the public to be on the lookout for anyone who may be seen driving in neighborhoods and possibly shooting a pellet gun, to report their sightings to police.

As a result of investigating the shootings Monday evening, a man

was taken into custody for allegedly being absent without leave from the U.S. Marine Corps.

One of three males in a car stopped at 11:20 p.m. in the 1000 block of East Bank was Freddy Ray Holloway, 18. Police determined the Marines had issued a warrant for his arrest.

He was transported at 1:15 a.m. Tuesday to county jail, according to the police blotter.

Two entries during the past week in the blotter concerned juveniles.

The first entry, at 8:05 a.m. Thursday, concerned a small fire being started in a small building behind the Methodist Church by some males who were reportedly smoking.

The fire was extinguished without major damage, and one male was transported to the junior high school.

Then, at 12:23 a.m. Saturday, two female juveniles were picked up while walking on Bell Road, carrying beer.

They were taken into custody on charges of juvenile in possession of alcohol and also for violating curfew.

The girls were taken to the police station and turned over to their parents at 3:30, according to the blotter.

## Party primaries slated Tuesday

Democrats and Republicans will hold their primary elections Tuesday here and over the state.

Possibly the two most hotly-contested races facing area voters are for governor and for district attorney, but the ballots will be full of other local, district, state and federal places to be filled.

Voting polls are to open at 7 a.m. and close at 7 p.m.

Democrats in the Iowa Park area will have six polls, depending on their designated voting precincts, which are noted on their voter registration cards.

Area precinct polls and places are: Precinct 32, Wichita County Agriculture Building, 220 W. Park;

Precinct 33, Faith Baptist Church, 411 S. Wall; Precinct 34, West Wichita Co-Op Building at Valley View; Precinct 35, City View Baptist Church; Precinct 53, Pleasant Valley Church, and Precinct 60, Chaparral Baptist Assembly Camp.

Local Republicans will cast their ballots at the First Christian Church.

Absentee voting period has been extended through Friday, and Precinct 32 and 33 voters can vote absentee at the school tax office, located on the campus of Kidwell Elementary.

## Second race develops for city council place

A second race has developed for the city council election, but as of Wednesday only one candidate had filed for the two positions opening on the school board.

Charlie Helms, a long-time employee of the city and now retired, has filed as a challenger against incumbent alderman Bud Mercer, for Place 2.

Incumbent mayor Tim Hunter is being challenged by Wayne House.

Thus far, only Ira Hambricht has filed as a candidate for Place 4 on the

council, being vacated by Bud Burch.

Neither Hambricht, House nor Helms has ever served in an elected office.

Keith Fisher has filed as a candidate to serve a full term on the school board. He was appointed to complete the unexpired term of Gary Fielding.

No one has filed for the seat of Don Decker, whose term also expires this spring.

Deadline to file for a place on either ballot is March 21. The election will be held May 5.

Co-hostesses were Ward, Hamilton, Annetta Reusch and Rita Worthy.



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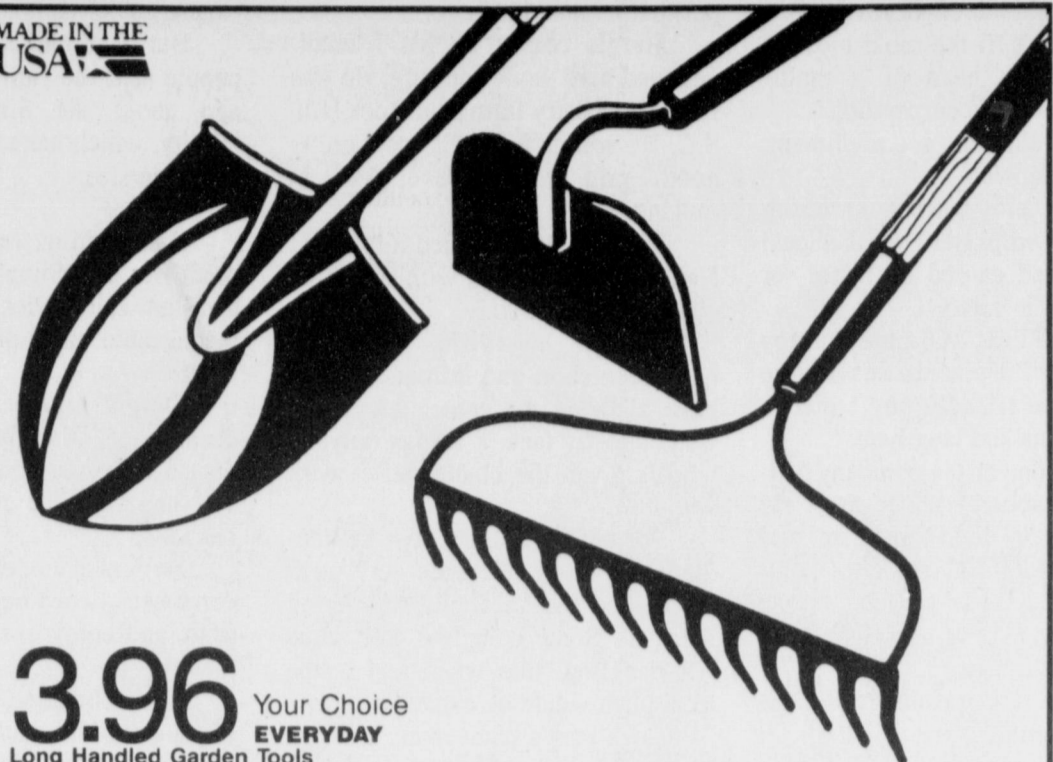
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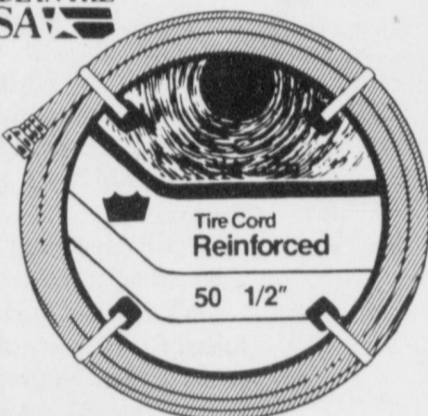
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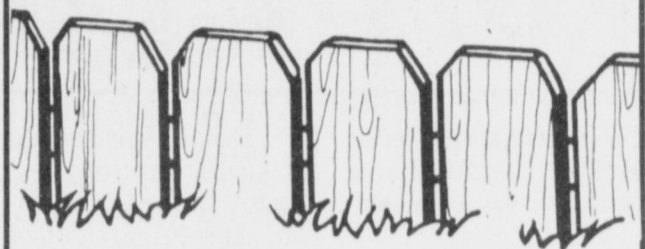
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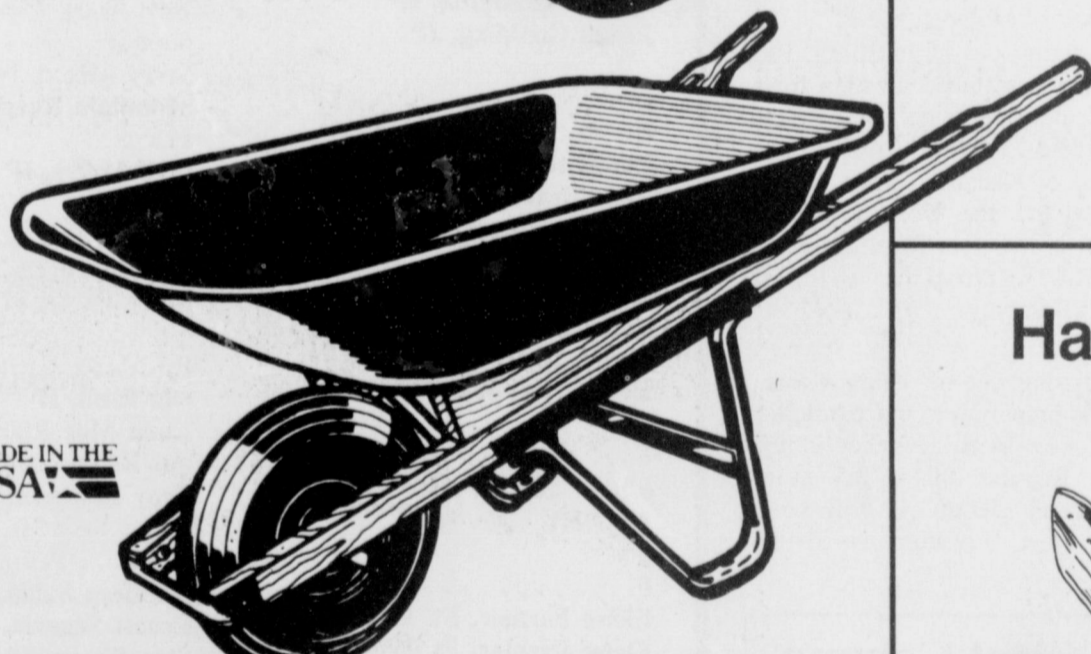
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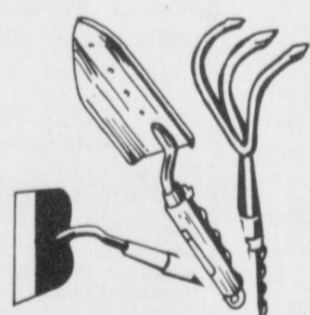
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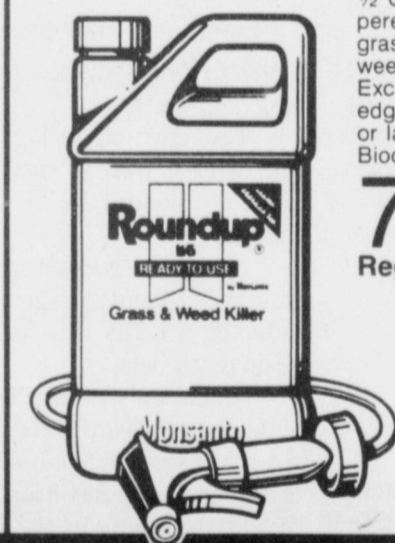
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# As I See It...

The president of Cryovac, Bill Sturgis, doesn't fit the mold most of us expect of a head of a multi-billion, multi-nation corporation.

I mean that as a compliment, and not a putdown.

He was here yesterday, meeting with all the employees of the local plant who had earned an honor for improvement in safety.

Maybe a little more grey on top and possibly 10 pounds heavier, he was the same friendly guy I met in South Carolina and later here.

He was one of the company officials being wooed back in the early 1970s to locate their plant here, and he was here for the Chamber of Commerce banquet when we honored the company for making the right decision -- to build here.

But he wasn't president in those days. Not until April 1, 1984. It took him 24 years of hard, dedicated work with the company to reach the

position he now holds.

Sturgis comes by his friendliness and hard work honestly. He was raised on a dairy farm near Rock Hill, S.C. He admits he's still got a pretty good grip that's developed in milking.

His hard work earned him a 4-H National Scholarship, with which he entered Clemson Univ.

Though my visits with him have been short and infrequent, they have all been the same: warm and welcome. In fact, I admire anyone who is given the challenge to work with him.

For an old country boy, he handled his press conference very well. He fielded the questions, answering them all. Some complete, and some left dangling, like when and if the local plant would be expanded again.

Iowa Park's plant likely will not be expanded, in a major way, in the future. He described it as being very

"manageable" as it is.

But I reminded him company people said the same thing 15 years ago about the Simpsonville S.C. facility, which has since almost been tripled in size.

His smiling response was to point out that Simpsonville was the basis on which a decision of which is manageable and unmanageable was made.

Sturgis' time here was cut short because of other plants he had to visit. He flew in on a company plane and had no time for anything but business.

He was extended an invitation to come back, when he had a little more time, and enjoy our Iowa Park hospitality.

I hope he does, and feel he will. Getting together with friendly people isn't always easy for a big corporation man these days.

# Worth Quoting

The sad news about the special session in Austin this week concerns what is not being said by our legislators.

As the first week of trying to cope with the Supreme Court ruling on public education in Texas comes to an end, all the talk has been of money. Nothing has been said about quality output of public schools.

A growing body of research on public schools in every state in the nation over the past several decades reveals that there is virtually no relationship between the amount of money we spend and the performance of students in public schools.

In the eighties, the amount of money spent on public schools in Texas doubled. Yet the best word to describe the quality of student performance statewide is still mediocrity.

And we can throw billions more into the till, and until we change the way we're educating public school children, the result may be equality in spending but with mediocre results in quality.

Consider the fact that in Texas, there are only four percentage points difference in the passing rate for freshmen between students in school districts that spend less than \$3,296 per student and in districts that spend more than \$4,708.

Some of the highest-spending school districts in Texas are at the bottom of the performance list, and some of the lowest-spending districts are at the top.

Public schools cannot be legislated into being better. Money cannot make schools better per se.

wide variety of products and is considered one of Cryovac's most efficient operations.

The local facility started production in 1975 with 168,000 square feet and has grown extensively.

It now has more than 430,000 square feet and employment is approximately 600. Sam Laird is the general operations manager for the plant.

During 1989, the Iowa Park facility paid \$876,000 in local property taxes, with 60 percent of that amount going to the local schools.

The annual payroll now exceeds \$19-million.

Most of things that really matter in public education are outside the control of legislators and the Supreme Court. Most of the things that have been done in Austin have probably made the situation worse.

Texas teachers are enduring more harassment from the educational bureaucracy than at any time in the history of our state. In fact, most of our teachers are probably spending more time filling out forms and complying with red tape than they spend preparing for class.

There is a growing national consensus, backed by an impressive body of research, that some of the solution lies with principals and teachers. The principal and the teacher must be given more autonomy, must be given freedom from interference by politicians and bureaucrats, and parents must get deeply involved and committed to education.

More money may help brother Kirby and the Texas Education Agency. It's doubtful that it will help the Edgewood Independent School District or improve the quality of student performance.

water to fire hydrants, in case of a structure fire.

The cost of laying a six-inch line would, over a short period of time, by savings in the city's "key fire rate."

A key rate is one basis on which insurance premiums are based, not only for the city but for home and business owners.

Aldermen will also be asked for authority to advertise for bids to construct a new Recreational Activities Building, which has been the subject of a lengthy study by the council.

Two public hearings also are on the agenda.

One concerns a proposed study by the U.S. Corps of Engineers on the designated floodway area, which is in the northeast part of the city.

The other is to be a request by Brad Teplicek for permission to hold training sessions for operators of All Terrain Vehicles at the city's landfill site.

A discussion also could be held concerning a possible application by the city to the state for a grant to improve city parks.

# AREA OIL & GAS NEWS

A 2,500-ft. Wichita County wildcat is planned by Commonwealth Production of Dallas 5.5 miles northwest of Burkburnett. It will be known as the No. 1 King and will be located in the Red River Valley Land Subdivision Block 65.

Location is 736 feet from the north line and 1,626 feet from the east line of the survey.

Fina Oil and Chemical of Oklahoma City has staked location for a 4,000-ft. developmental well in the KMA Field, Wichita County, five miles southwest of Kamay. It will be known as the No. 2 Cypridge Mangold Unit and is in the P. Castleman Survey Block 35. Location is 330 feet from the west line and 1,250 feet from the south line of the survey.

Wildcat drilling action is planned in Hardeman County by Trio Operating Inc. of Wichita Falls. 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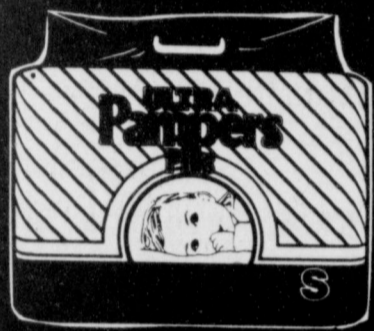

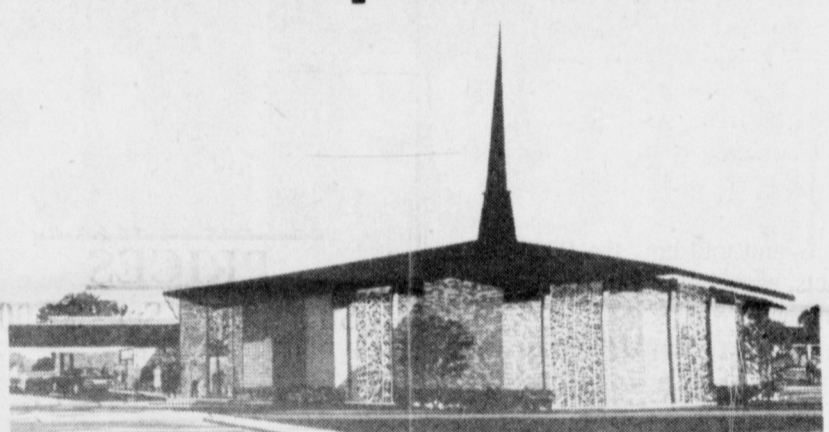

## THE ACID OF ANGER

A little boy, who had been punished for an angry outburst, said his prayers, "Dear God, please take away my temper and while you are at it, take away my mother's temper, too." If we lose our temper-either in the sense that all the fight goes out of us or because we are out of control we will be less than God intended for us to be.

When do you get angry? Do people think you have a short fuse? We talk about losing our temper, but of course that never actually happens. You cannot really lose your temper but it can be influenced, conditioned, controlled, and changed. Anger is not a sin. It is a God-given emotion. Of course, like all other emotions it can be expressed in sinful ways, but that is just a distortion of a powerful impulse that God planted deep in life. Anger has been called a sinew of the soul, and it is a powerful force intended by God for constructive use.

God does not expect that you will never get angry. Of course, you will. Unexpressed anger is an acid eating away our insides. If we get anger boiling up in us like acid and not willing to face the cause of our anger and get rid of it, it's the same as saying, "I'm going to kill myself and enjoy every minute of it." You may attempt to bury your anger but you won't bury it dead. It will be alive and work and eat and burn and destroy you! What's the cure for anger? BE ANGRY, but BEWARE-you are never more vulnerable than when in anger. Self-control is at an all time low, reason decreases, common sense usually forsakes you. BE ANGRY, BE AWARE - That anger quickly turns bitter, it sours into resentment, hatred, malice, evil temper, and even violence unless it is controlled in love. BE ANGRY, but ONLY TO BE KIND - Only when anger is motivated by love of your brother, by love of what is right for people, by what is called from you by love from God, is it constructive, creative anger.

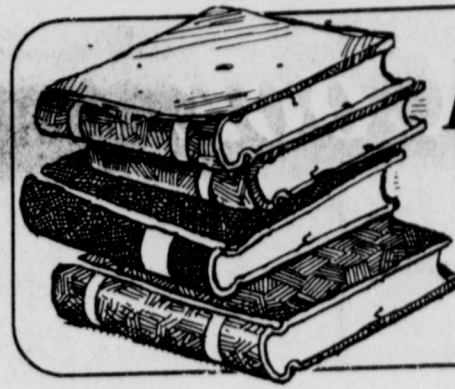
## Iowa Parkans are recognized

# Cook of the Week

Denise said all of the recipes she submitted are easy to prepare. In fact, 12-year-old Cory likes to make the recipe for "Chili Rellenos" and does a good job, according to his mother.

### DIRT CAKE

- 1 pkg. Oreo cookies
  - 4 T. margarine
  - 1 (8 oz.) pkg. cream cheese
  - 1 (8 oz.) pkg. whipped topping
  - 2 pkg. vanilla instant pudding
  - 1 cup powdered sugar
  - 3 cups milk
- Crush cookies. Cream margarine and cream cheese; set aside. Mix

pudding, milk, whipped topping and sugar. Combine with cream cheese mix. Layer cookie crumbs and mix starting and ending with cookie crumbs, in a 12-inch clay pot. Put a silk flower in the cake and serve with a garden trowel.

### CHILI RELLENOS

Prepare 2 small cans green chilies by halving lengthwise and removing seeds. Place in bottom of 9x13-inch baking pan.

Mix in bowl: 2 eggs, 2 cups milk, 1/2 cup flour, 1 tsp. salt and dash Tabasco. Beat well and pour over chilies. Cover with grated cheese (Monterey Jack) Bake 45 to 50 minutes at 350 degrees.

### APPLESAUCE AND GINGERBREAD

1 #2 can applesauce  
1 pkg. gingerbread mix  
4 T. margarine  
Cinnamon to taste

Melt margarine in Dutch oven. Pour in applesauce with cinnamon and beat. Mix gingerbread according to package directions. Pour gently over applesauce. Bake about 30 minutes until gingerbread is done.

### DUMP CAKE

1 pkg. cake mix (white or yellow)  
1 large can peaches  
3 T. margarine

Pour fruit in Dutch oven. Sprinkle cake mix over fruit. Dot with margarine on top of cake mix. Cook until topping is lightly browned.

### ENCHILADAS

1 1/2 lb. ground beef, browned  
8 ozs. Cheddar cheese, grated  
1 large onion, chopped

Mix together and roll into flour tortillas. Heat oven to 350 degrees.

### Topping:

1/2 stick butter  
4 tsp. flour  
1 cup green chilies, chopped  
8 ozs. Velveeta cheese

Mix and cook until it starts to thicken. Pour over tortillas and cook 20 minutes.

### MEXICAN MEATLOAF

1-8 oz. can tomato sauce  
1/2 cup chopped onion  
2 eggs, beaten  
2 T. chili powder  
1 t. salt  
1 small clove garlic  
1 t. red pepper  
2 1/2 lbs. ground beef

Combine first seven ingredients. Add beef and mix. Bake in loaf pan 1 hour at 375 degrees.

### VINEGAR COBBLER

Crust:  
1 1/2 cup flour  
1/3 cup butter  
1 t. baking powder  
1 t. salt

Mix flour, butter, baking powder, salt as you do pie dough and add 1/4 cup water or skim milk. divide dough in half. Roll out and place half in bottom of baking dish.

Filling:  
1 cup sugar  
1 1/2 cup water  
2 T. flour  
5 T. vinegar  
1 t. lemon extract  
2 dashes nutmeg

Mix flour and sugar. Add remaining ingredients and mix well. Pour into pan and place remaining dough, rolled out, on top. Sprinkle with sugar. Cook at 350 degrees until done.

Hankhaus is a graduate of Texas A&M Univ., and is working on an MBA at Midwestern State Univ.

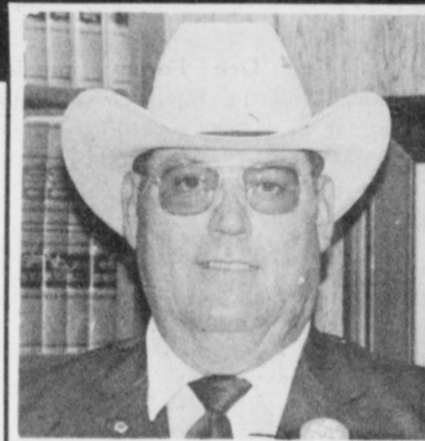
