Teacher contracts, bids on school board agenda

Teacher contracts and bids for construction at the elementary campuses will highlight a meeting of the Iowa Park school board tonight.

The meeting, to begin at 7:30, will be held in the junior high school library.

Contracts for all teaching personnel, as well as reassignment of some staff members, will be the subject of an executive meeting, which will be followed by the board's voting.

Bids have been received for work on additions to Kidwell and Bradford elementary buildings, which will be funded by bonds approved last fall by taxpayers of the district.

Trustees will review the bids and possibly take action on them.

Another topic concerning personnel on the meeting agenda is a salary increase for cafeteria employees.

Assistant Superintendent Robert Palmer had told the board at an earlier meeting that the salaries of those workers is being effected by the recent legislation raising minimum wages.

The meeting will get underway following a special recognition by the board of booster clubs and the Parent-Teacher Associations in the community.

Prior to the regular meeting, board members will meet in the administration building to view school board training film. That gathering is to begin at 6:45 p.m.

Among the numerous other items on the agenda are:

- * action on bids on athletic fall billing orders;
- * adopt local textbook committee report for 1990;
- * consider tuition fee for an Iowa Park student attending the Wichita Falls Special Education Center;
- * consider revisions on board policies concerning attendance and employment requirements;
- * consider a student transfer request;
- * career ladder plan for levels two and three, committee, method and date of payment;
- * vote on Region Nine Service Center directors;
- * consider sale of excess equipment;
- * act on resolution to exercise option to tax "freeport" property values in district;
- * and various reports.

Council to consider bids for summer street work

City aldermen Monday night will get a look at bids received to re-pave North Colorado this summer.

The meeting is to begin at 7 p.m. in council chambers.

Council members selected Colorado as this year's primary project for street improvement. What's left of the asphalt pavement will be removed and replaced with concrete.

Also to be considered is a proposal to authorize installation of a new radio antenna tower, reportedly at a

cost of slightly less than \$5,000.

The tower was given to Iowa Park by Wichita Falls, after that city decided it had no further use of it.

Once in place, the antennas now atop the old water tower will be moved to the new tower, to serve the radios operated by the police and fire departments.

A resident on East Garden has asked for public appearance time to request help with drainage problems in his area of the city.

Home burglary reported

Four guns and a Nintendo system were reportedly taken sometime last week from a home in the 400 block of W. Clara.

The resident told police of leaving on a week-long trip and finding the loss upon returning Saturday.

Taken were a pistol, two rifles and a shotgun, as well as the tv game system and cartridges.

Two cases of criminal mischief in the northwest part of town were reported to police.

A vehicle owner in the 1000 block of Mary told police Wednesday of last week that someone had torn out his spark plug wiring.

Sometime Thursday night, the windshield of a vehicle parked in the 1300 block of N. Fourth was broken. It was the second time in two weeks for the owner's vehicle. Police are investigating.

Two men were arrested early Sunday morning following a traffic stop in the 200 block of S. Yosemite.

Simon Gonzales, 34, was charged with public intoxication, and Serrano Jose Nasario Gomez, 19, was charged with having no drivers license.

Both were released after paying their fines: Gonzales, \$69; and Gomez, \$54.

Youth seriously hurt with homemade 'gun'

A 13-year-old boy, Jeremy Sellers, lost a major part of his right hand Saturday afternoon when he attempted to fire a homemade pistol.

Sellers' life was reportedly saved by the alert assistance of a man who not only attended to his wounds, but also rushed him to Bethania Hospital.

The youth is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Mike Sellers, 501 W. Louisa, and is in the seventh grade at Iowa Park Junior High School.

Young Sellers, according to his mother, had gone fishing at Lake Gordon, where the incident occurred.

Iowa Park police were informed of the incident at 5:47 p.m., according to the police blotter.

Two friends, Chris Jones and John Blum, also were at the lake. They had a crude hand gun, reportedly made by the Jones youth, and had fired it more than once, eventhough there is an ordinance against the firing of any guns inside the city.

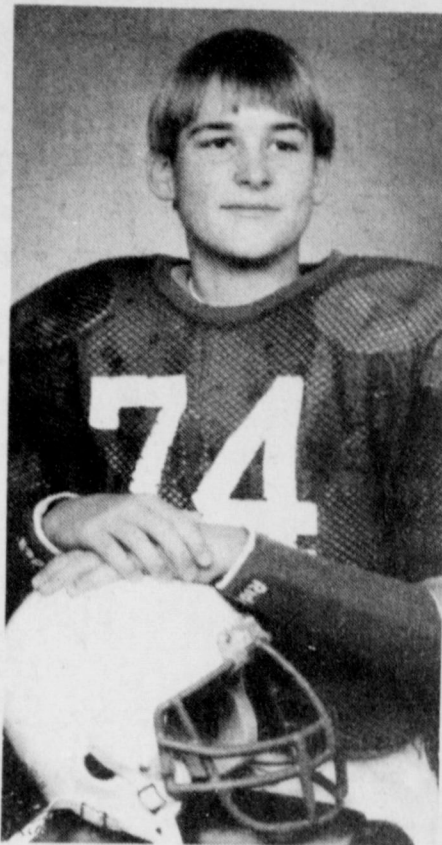
Sellers told his mother he accepted a challenge to fire the gun, which was made of a nine-inch section of 3/4-inch pipe and had another section of pipe as a handle, held by an elbow joint.

It had been loaded, police were told, by an undetermined amount of black gunpowder, paper wadding, some pellets, BBs, a .38 caliber bullet and a .44 caliber black powder ball.

A hole had been bored into the pipe into which more powder was poured, and set off by a match.

Sellers told his mother he had held the gun in his right hand, and out to the side, when it was fired.

There is some speculation that the earlier firings of the weapon had

weakened the metal, possibly causing it to explode in the youth's hand.

Seeing the youth was injured, the two friends reportedly explained they ran to the top of the lake's dam, calling for help.

That is when a man identified as Gilbert Stevenson, of Wichita Falls, rushed to the youth's assistance.

Stevenson wrapped a t-shirt around the injured hand, and then applied a tourniquet on his left arm to stop the hemorrhaging caused when a piece of metal pierced an artery in his left wrist.

The disfigured right hand was not bleeding profusely, because the searing of the gun powder apparently cauterized the flesh.

Surgeons at the hospital were able to save the ring and little finger of the youth's right hand. He remains in Bethania Hospital.

Police later went to the Jones home, at 205 W. Texas, and confiscated a second handmade gun described as six and a half inches in length, as well as more gunpowder, and .22 caliber bullets.

Young Jones explained he had learned how to fashion the weapons by watching television.

Police found the nine-inch barrel of the exploded weapon, lying in the edge of the water, but were unable to find any parts of the fashioned handle.

Chief Alan Sheffield said he was not planning to file any charges against the youth for fashioning the weapon, eventhough it could be classified as a homemade pipe bomb.

Curb-building work reported

Two blocks, on Rebecca and Louisa, will be closed to through traffic next week, while city workers construct concrete valley gutters for storm water drainage.

The Public Works Department has designated the 600 block of Rebecca and 1100 block of Louisa for the work, which is to begin Tuesday

morning and be completed by Friday afternoon.

The city has implemented a valley gutter construction program this year to improve problems in the asphalt-paved structures, according to Mike Price, director.

Fourteen areas have been designated for work this year.

First Baptist member 76 years

Grace Mills Reaves, a member of the First Baptist Church, has the distinction of having been a member of the church longer than anyone in the present membership. It follows naturally that she should be chosen to have her picture made with the plaque that will be dedicated to climax the 100th anniversary celebration of the church.

The daughter of the late Mr. and Mrs. George Mills, she was born in Iowa Park and joined the church in 1914. Her father was a deacon in the church.

Mrs. Reaves was graduated from Iowa Park High School. She earned a BS degree from West Texas State Univ. at Canyon and did graduate work at the Univ. of Boulder and the Univ. of Denver in Colorado.

Before retiring as a school teacher, she spent 52 years in the classrooms. Two of those years were spent at the Deep Creek School, two miles southwest of Iowa Park, 14

years at Valley View where she was principal, 29 years in the Iowa Park school system and seven years at Our Lady Queen of Peace in Wichita Falls.

Mrs. Reaves and her late husband, Bratton, did not have any children of their own. However, because of their love and interest in young people, they possessed extraordinary ability to attract and become close friends with a host of children and young people.

It has been often said of Mrs. Reaves that she was one of the few teachers "who could please all the students, all the parents, all the

time." She was anxious for each student to learn the lessons and principles that lead to successful living, aspire for the things that are healthy and good, perceive a better world and strive to attain it. She expended every effort possible to show them how an education could help them to achieve their goals.

She has every right to feel that she has played an important part in what many of her former students have done to make their marks in the world to improve the spiritual, moral, economic, educational,

Through study, travelling, visiting and working in antique shops, conversing with connoisseurs of the art, she has acquired a special skill in recognizing furniture, glass, silver, china and many objects belonging to antiquity.

Mrs. Singer answered the question asked by so many people, "How old is an antique?" She replied that it was any object made before 1830, when things were made by hand and not machinery.

She said many objects classified as antiques are fake and advised her listeners to buy from a reputable dealer when buying, check color, size and designs, and look under the bottom of furniture for tool marks. She also said that a good magnifying glass was a good tool to take when shopping for objects existing before 1830.

Mrs. Singer arranged an interesting display of antiques and explained the markings that identified them. They included coined silver spoons, pressed glass pieces, knife rest, mirror and brush set, depression glass, tin plating, a wood cutting board, cut glass, medicine bottles. She warned club members to be aware that things classified as real antiques could either be fake, fraud or genuine.

She showed a yard-long print of cats and dogs which she bought for a treasured antique only to find that it was a fake when she got home with it.

My third correction actually is intended for our state senators who are supporting that house's school reform bill. The authors apparently went to school while "modern math" was in vogue.

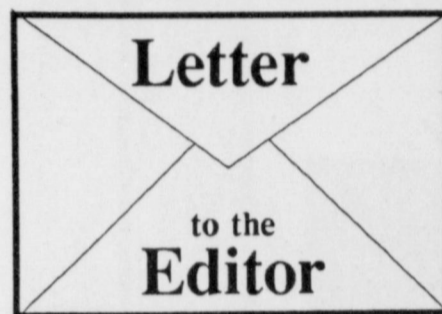
The bill calls for \$1.2-billion in additional funding, and at the same time would encourage schools to extend classes year-around.

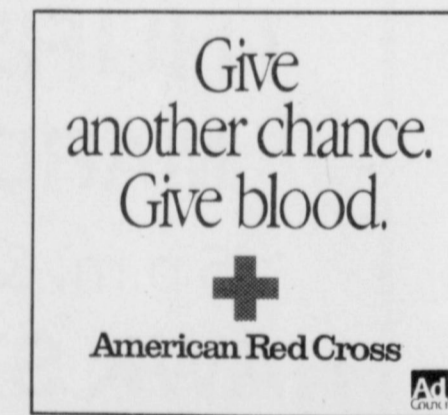

Dr. Travis Alden White

Funeral services for Dr. Travis Alden White, 81, father of Diana White Collins of Iowa Park, will be at 2 p.m. Friday at First Christian Church of Wichita Falls with Rev. John Muir, pastor, officiating. Burial will be at Crestview Memorial Park.

He died March 20 in a Wichita Falls hospital.

Born March 8, 1909, in Hammond, La., White was president of Midwestern State Univ. from 1956 until 1974, coming here from Atlantic Christian College in Wilson, N.C. During his tenure at MSU, White began an intramural athletic soccer program negotiated for the Fantasy of Lights display, and was president of Midwestern when it gained state funding in 1961.

He and Evalyn May Van Keuren were married Aug. 10, 1931, in San Antonio.

He was minister of Christian Churches in Dallas, Paris, Tex., Lubbock, and Little Rock, Ark. 71 years. After his retirement, he pastored seven church in Texas and Louisiana and was a youth summer camp director 25 years, and was national and state youth leader in the Christian Church.

White was graduated from Byrd High School in Shreveport, La. in 1926, and from Texas Christian Univ. receiving an associate's degree in 1932 and a bachelor's degree in 1934. He did graduate work at the University of Chicago Seminary in 1934 and graduated Union Theological Seminary in 1941, and Columbia Univ. Seminary in New York City in 1943.

He received an honorary doctorate of divinity degree, conferred by Texas Christian Univ. in 1961 and an honorary degree by Atlantic Christian College in 1964. White was named distinguished alumnus of Texas Christian Univ. in 1961.

White was a member of Wichita Falls Masonic Lodge No. 635 and was a 32nd and 33rd degree Mason. He was a life member of Shriner's Children's Hospital in Shreveport, La. He was a member of First Christian Church of Wichita Falls.

He was a member of the Downtown Rotary Club of Wichita Falls, the Wichita Falls Chamber of Commerce and the board of the Wichita Falls Symphony Orchestra. He was a past member of the board of directors of the Boys Club of Wichita Falls and a life member of the Lions Club of Lubbock.

White was awarded Outstanding Civilian for service to the United States Army, was cited for outstanding service to the community from the Altrusa Club and was listed in Who's Who in America and in Who's Who in American Education.

He is survived by his wife; a daughter, Diana Sue White Collins of Iowa Park; a son, Dr. Travis Albert White of Vernon; a sister, Jeanne Fitzgerald of Houston; and five grandchildren.

The family will receive guests in the family room of Lunn's Colonial Funeral Home from 6:30 to 7:30 p.m. Thursday.

They ask that memorials be made to Dr. Travis White and Ned White Ministerial Library Fund at Brite Seminary, Texas Christian Univ.; or the Travis A. White Scholarship Endowment Fund at Midwestern State Univ.

CHICKEN HAWAIIAN

- 1 or 2 garlic cloves, minced
- 2 cans cream of chicken soup
- 1 can (15 oz.) pineapple tidbits with juice
- 3 cups cooked chicken, cubed
- 2 Tbsps. toasted almond slivers
- 2 Tbsps. salad oil
- 2 Tbsps. soy sauce
- 3 cups cooked rice

In sauce pan, cook green peppers with garlic in oil until tender. Blend in soup and pineapple juice. Add chicken, pineapple and soy sauce. Heat over medium high heat. Serve over rice and top with almonds.

JALAPENO PEPPER SQUARES

- 16 oz. jalapeno peppers
- 10 1/2 oz. sharp Cheddar cheese, grated
- 4 eggs beaten

Cut peppers lengthwise and remove seeds. Place in ungreased baking dish (skin side down). Cover

COOL AND CREAMY FRUIT SALAD

Layer in glass bowl:

- 2 cups peach slices
- 2 cups blueberries
- 2 cups strawberry slices
- 2 cups green grapes

Combine 8 oz. cream cheese, 2 Tbsps. lemon juice and 1 tsp. lemon rind. Whip 1/2 cup whipping cream and 1/4 cup powdered sugar and fold in cream cheese mixture. Chill and then spoon this over fruit. Top with chopped nuts.

TORTONI SQUARES

- 1/3 cup chopped, toasted almonds
- 2 Tbsps. melted butter
- 1 1/2 cup finely crushed vanilla wafers

- 1 tsp. almond extract
- 1 - 12 oz. jar apricot preserves
- 3 pints vanilla ice cream, softened

Mix vanilla wafer crumbs, almonds, almond extract and butter. Press 3/4 of this mixture in bottom of 9x13 dish. Combine ice cream and preserves and layer on top of crumb crust. Place remaining 1/4 of crumb mixture on top. Freeze but remove from freezer several minutes before serving.

BAKED CHEESE GRITS

- 1 1/2 cups grits and 6 cups water
- 1 1/2 sticks oleo
- 3 eggs, beaten well
- 3 tsp. savory salt
- Dash of Tabasco sauce
- 1 small can chopped green chilies
- 1 lb. Cheddar cheese, grated

Bring water to rolling boil and slowly add grits. Cook until thickened. Add oleo, salt, cheese, green chilies and Tabasco sauce. Mix until oleo and cheese melt. Fold beaten eggs into grits. Pour into large well greased casserole. Sprinkle top with paprika. Bake one hour at 350 degrees.

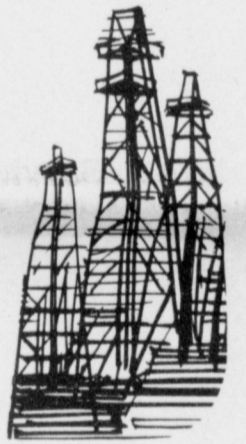

First Baptist Church celebrating 100 years

The First Baptist Church will celebrate her 100th anniversary this weekend with activities starting Friday night, three services Saturday, worship services Sunday morning and afternoon when a memorial plaque will be dedicated to climax the celebration.

Invitations have been mailed to former pastors, staff members, and out of town former members whose addresses were known.

A centennial committee composed of Billie (Mrs. Jack) Railsback, Ann (Mrs. Terry) Johnson, Cheryl (Mrs. Roger) York, Tommie (Mrs. Roy) Smith, Olive (Mrs. Homer) Blalock, Robert Palmer and John Brown was elected at a business meeting of the church during the early part of 1989 to be in charge of arrangements for the celebration. They met once a month during the rest of the year and have met nearly every week since the first of 1990 to make and finalize plans.

The church was organized March 14, 1890, at a meeting in the "Little Ole Schoolhouse" in the south part of town and it was called the "First Missionary Baptist Church of Iowa Park." Rev. J.S. Allen, one of the charter members, was called to be the fourth-time pastor. Other charter members were R.D. Rutherford, H. Abbott, Ira Flippin, Mrs. M.E. Lee, Mrs. Angeline Laning, Mrs. J.V. Reed and Mrs. H. Abbott.

Pastors who have served during the century have been Rev. J.W. Whatley, J.W. Morgan, J.B. Cole, Wm. M. Hays, J.W. Morgan (again), J.C. Clements, J.H. Heathington, M.L. Blankenship, W.H. McKenzie,

T.J. Deakins, McKinley Norman, J.L. Roach, J.T. Burnett, L.B. Owens.

Others pastors serving have been R.C. Hooper, J.C. Newman, Dr. G.N. Neafus, Revs. C.S. McClung, T.L. Kilpatrick, T. Hollis Epton, Alfred Grigsby, James N. Easterwood, H.M. Riek, Homer Thompson, Donald Wood, Kenneth Flowers, Howell Farnsworth, David Jones, and Dr. Derrell Monday, the present pastor, who came to serve in 1987.

The early members of the church erected a small building in which to worship just west of the present plant at 319 N. Yosemite. A south wing was added in 1898 and members continued to worship there until a two-story brick structure was erected in 1925 under the ministry of Rev. J.C. Newman. The name of the church was changed to The First Baptist Church at that time.

The building was remodeled into an educational building when the present sanctuary was built at a cost of \$250,000 in 1966. A Children's Building had been added to the building built in 1925.

The First Baptist Church saw the need for a mission in the south part of town in 1953 during the ministry of Rev. Easterwood. It has grown rapidly and is now one of the largest churches in Iowa Park.

Through the years, the church has put major emphasis on state, home and foreign missions, with special weeks of prayer each year set apart for study, prayer and offerings. The Woman's Missionary Union which was started in September 1890 has played an important part in the

emphasis on missions.

Many members have participated in "build-a-church" projects during the summers in the United States and other countries. A number of the members have been ordained to preach the gospel and serve as missionaries.

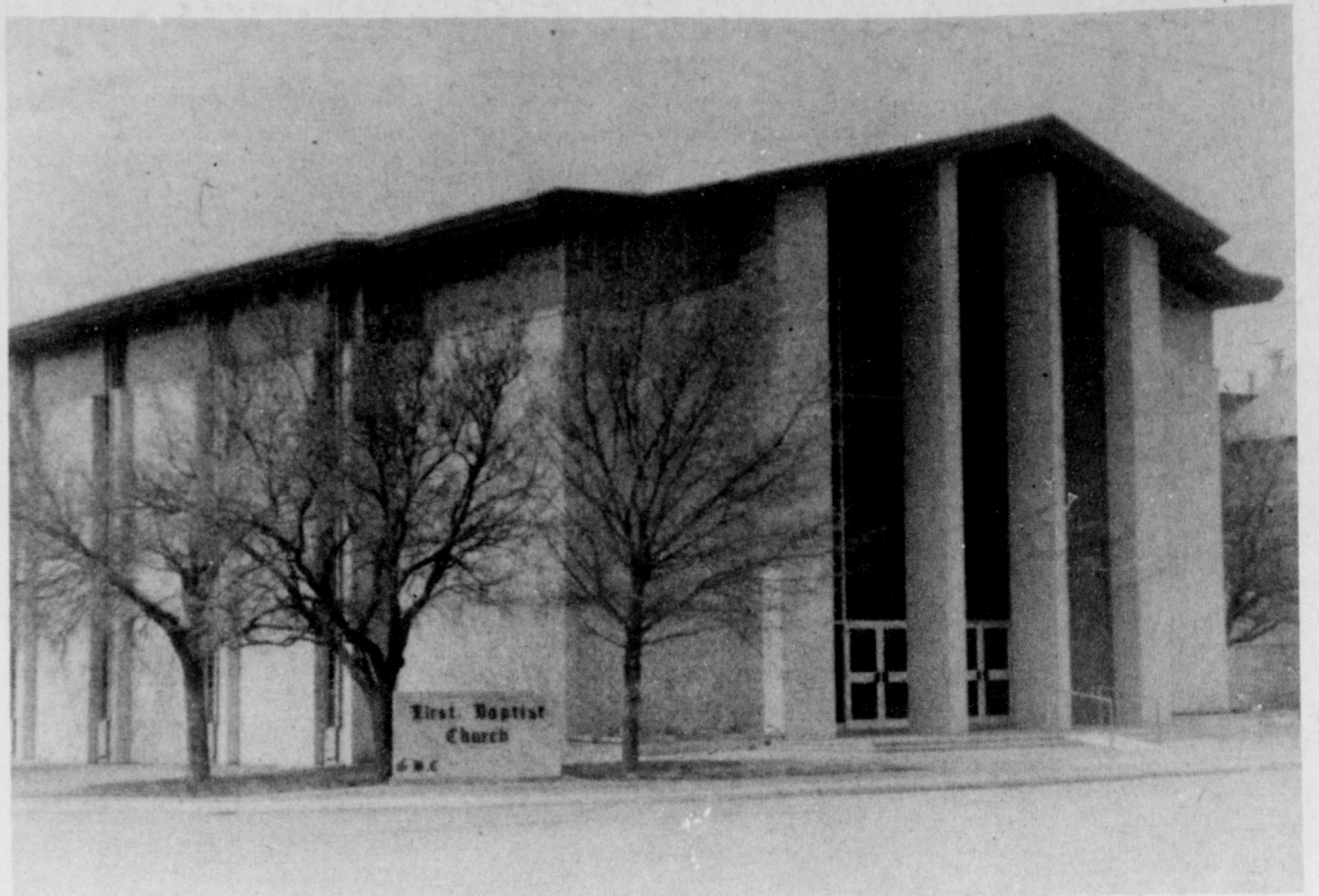
In making plans for the 100th anniversary of the church, a committee composed of Leon Bidby, Mrs. Howard Marl, Mrs. Glen Miller, Tommy Cantrell and Wayne Williams was elected to be in charge of refurbishing the sanctuary which has taken on a new look with new carpet, church pews and furniture removed from the church and refinished.

The building and grounds committee has been in charge of repairs on the exteriors of the building, recarpeting and painting the Fellowship Hall.

Other plans included the ordering of commemorative plates and mugs marked with pictures of the first church building and present sanctuary for mementoes of the occasion. In addition, Mrs. Rick Covington, Mr. and Mrs. Robert Palmer have compiled approximately 500 20-page books and had them printed for extra remembrances.

The inside of the sanctuary will be nostalgically decorated with large straw hats trimmed with ribbon and lace and hung at vantage points in the room supplemented with floral arrangements. Mrs. Howard Marl, Mrs. Roy Smith and Linda Hicks have been assisted by 20 women in the church to prepare the decorations.

Mrs. Joe Singer and Bill Curry have arranged a memorabilia display that promises to be a center of interest. The hospitality committee

S&J Operating of Wichita Falls has staked location for a 1,950-ft. developmental well in the Wichita Regular Field, 12 miles south of Iowa Park. The well will be known as the No. 1 J&J Waggoner "D." It is in a lease in the M.A. Willis Survey A-548.

Dallas-based Continental Exploration has filed for permit to drill the No. 2 Roller Estate "T," a 1,400-ft. developmental well in the Wichita Regular Field. Location is in the CTRR Survey A-50, about 3.5 miles south of Burkburnett.

Exmoor Oil and Minerals of Dallas has plugged and abandoned an unsuccessful developmental try in the Wichita Regular Field, seven miles north of Iowa Park. Designated as the No. 55 W.F. Ramming "E," it was located in the HT&BRR Survey and bottomed dry at 1,700-ft.

Operating out of Pittsburg, PA., JHR Corp. has completed a prolific oiler in the KMA Field, Wichita County, six miles southwest of Iowa Park.

The well pumped 98 barrels of oil with 1,05,000 CF gas per day on an open choke.

Designated as the No. 52 Fasset and Tuttle "E," it was perforated to produce at 3,993 to 4,043 feet into the wellbore.

A total of six new producers have been brought on line in the Wichita Regular Field by West Landrum Inc. of Burkburnett. They showed combined potential to pump 62 barrels of oil daily.

The wells are designated as the Nos. 1 through 5 Thom "C" and the No. 3 Munger "A." The Munger well is located one mile northeast of Kamay. The other wells are located from 1.2 to 1.5 miles south-southeast of Clara. The Munger is in the KWVFL Survey Section 19 Block 25. The Thom wells are in the HT&BRR Survey Section 5.

The Munger well will produce from perforations 1,218 to 1,222 feet into the hole.

The Thom wells will produce from perforations ranging from 1,686 to 1,737 feet into the wellbore.

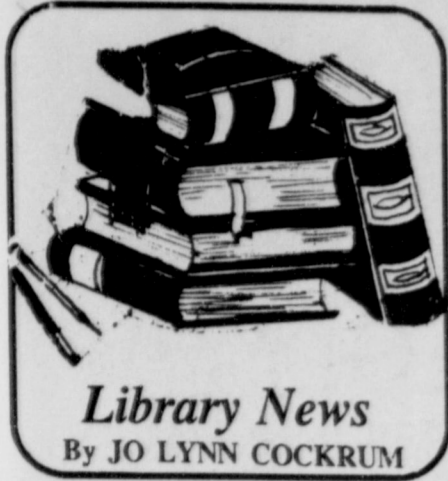
Singleton Production of Iowa Park has driven stake for the No. 1 Munger "F" in the Wichita Regular Field, about one-quarter mile northwest of Kamay. It will be 1,999-ft. test in the KWFVL Survey Block 25.

Continental Exploration of Dallas has filed for permit to drill the No. 1 Roller Estate "T," a developmental bid in the Wichita Regular Field, 3.5 miles south of Burkburnett. Total depth is projected to 2,000 feet. The lease is in the CTRR Survey A-50.

Singleton Production Co. of Iowa Park has filed first production figures for the No. 4 and No. 6 Munger "B," new producers in the Wichita Regular Field, about one mile north of Kamay.

The wells potentialized at 20 and 30 barrels of oil per day, respectively.

The will produce from perforations ranging from 1,741 to 1,748 feet into the wellbore.
