



## WINFORD HOGAN NAMED HEAD FOOTBALL COACH AT CLYDE

After receiving the resignation of Ed Ammons as head football coach of Clyde High School, the Board of Trustees voted unanimously to employ Mr. Winford Hogan as head coach and athletic director, effective next school year.

Mr. Hogan has been employed in the Clyde Schools for the past nine years as science teacher, assistant coach, and Junior High School Principal. The past four years he has served as Junior Hi Principal along with his coaching duties. His coaching assignments have included five years as Junior Hi

coach. During these five years his football teams have won the district championship three times, finished third once, and second once.

Mr. Hogan is highly respected in the field of education and athletics in this area. He has served as chairman of the Little Oil Belt District and as an officer in the Callahan Co. Unit of TTA.

Mr. and Mrs. Hogan live at Oakview Addition and are members of the Baptist Church. They have four sons, three of whom are in Clyde Elementary School.

## Edward Ammons Resigns As Football Coach At Clyde HS

Mr. Edward Ammons, head football coach at Clyde High School for the past four years, has submitted his resignation to the Board of Trustees, effective at the end of the current school term. This ends a six year association with athletics in Clyde High School.

Prior to coming to Clyde, in August 1963, Mr. Ammons had coached at Rotan and at Weatherford. He served as assistant football coach under Mr. Jon Tate for two years, taking the head coaching job when Mr. Tate went to Albany as High School Principal. During his tenure at Clyde, Mr. Ammons has served as a history, math, and driver education teacher in addition to his coaching duties.

Mr. Ammons stated his plans are not complete at this time, but that he probably would stay in some phase of coaching.

The Board expressed their appreciation for the six years of service and for the dedication to duty which Mr. Ammons gave to the Clyde school and community.

AUSTIN — Thwarted in one effort to keep down the size of the 1970-71 tax bill by school fund diversion, Gov. Preston Smith took a new approach.

He called on Atty. Gen. Crawford Martin to rush an opinion as to whether income from state-owned submerged lands (bays, river banks, etc.) can be used for current school spending.

Martin earlier held unconstitutional the governor's plan to get \$71.6 million in state land revenue bound for the sacrosanct permanent school fund for educational financing during the next two years. Only investment income from the permanent fund can now be spent.

Smith accepted Martin's original opinion, but noted that revenue from submerged lands was not dedicated to the school fund by constitution but by statute in 1939 and 1941. So, if the Legislature can dedicate money from those oil-rich land, Smith feels it can "undedicate" as well.

"If 72 and a half per cent of the royalties involved were utilized, it would mean approximately \$52 million which the taxpayers would not have to produce to meet anticipated revenues needed to finance state government during the coming two years," Smith maintained.

He asked Martin for an early ruling in preparation for a supplemental message the governor will deliver to the Legislature, in which he will spell out alternative sources for the \$71.6 million item invalidated by the attorney general's March 3 opinion.

Smith first said he has two alternatives: budget-cutting or a reinforced revenue plan. He decided he didn't have much fat left to trim in his budget and settled on alternative money raisers.

LEGISLATURE ACTS — Legislature finally reached its full complement, with the election of Rep. John H. Poerner of Hondo, a Republican, to fill the vacancy created by the death of Rep. D. C. Howard of Uvalde. And the lawmaking process continues.

Legislators have completed action on the workmen's compensation reform bill which raises benefits to injured workers from \$35 a week to maximum, \$49. Measure went to governor for his signature following House passage 146 to 1. (Senate acted earlier).

One of the session's most important measures, a proposed constitutional amendment raising the water bond ceiling to \$3.5 billion to finance the states share of the \$10 billion Texas water plan, passed the House 131-15 and went to the Senate.

In their liveliest action, both houses voted out a bill to provide maximum fines of \$200 and jail sentences up to six months for disruptive activities on school and college campuses. Bill went to conference committee for adjustment of differences.

Another bill cleared by both houses would permit Texans to buy rifles, shotguns and ammunition in adjoining states despite the federal gun law. Similar legislation is being considered in other states.

Senate passed a variety of bills including a Texas Meat Inspection Law (which is necessary to prevent federal regulation of meat), a trailer house uniform standards act, a 45-minute daily planning break for school teachers and extension of time for homecoming Vietnam servicemen (90 days after return) to renew their drivers' licenses.

House approved bills allowing persons between 19 and 21 to be licensed as cab drivers, protecting the rights of developers of new varieties of cotton, and requiring the labeling of eggs as to their state or country of origin.

BILLS INTRODUCED — Leg-

islators kept dropping more and more bills into both the House and Senate hoppers, including:

A bill to require telephone companies to maintain a business office in every county seat where it provides telephone service.

Creation of a 50-member Governor's Committee on Human Relations "to recommend programs of action designed and intended to promote and obtain a better understanding and relationship between the various groups."

Establishing a Texas Board of Examiners in the Fitting and Dispensing of Hearing Aids to license and regulate all persons in that business.

Allowing haulers of agricultural products to get a permit to operate without having to prove their service would fit the "public convenience and necessity" which other truckers must show.

Creating the Legislative Modernization Committee to study and improve the legislative process.

Closely regulating when and how and for what purpose state law-enforcement agencies can use electronic eavesdropping or "bugging."

Requiring all elections in Texas to be with the use of voting machines, which the state would furnish but which would be stored and maintained by the counties.

Allowing school districts to increase the length of their school terms from nine to ten months.

Increasing the penalty for the crimes of rape, armed robbery and murder.

Providing state support for kindergarten programs voluntarily operated by local school districts for five year old children.

Requiring door to door salesmen to return a customer's money, if the customer demands it within three days after buying something which he did not solicit.

Establishing a Texas presidential primary to replace the existing system of a series of conventions and prorating the state's national convention delegates votes according to the returns in the primary.

APPOINTMENTS — Former State Rep. Joe Burkett Jr. of Kerrville was named by Governor Smith to the Texas Liquor Control Board for a short term extending until November 1. He succeeds O. R. Crawford of Jasper who resigned.

Smith named Leslie R. Neal of San Antonio to succeed William E. Berger of Hondo on the Texas Water Rights Commission.

Governor appointed Tommy V. Smith of Austin as Commissioner of the Bureau of Labor Statistics.

Governor Smith appointed Dr. Albert B. Spires of Taylor to the State Board of Medical Examiners; James W. Throgmorton and Daniel J. Bromley Jr. of Port Arthur as branch pilots for Sabine Bar, Pass and Tributaries.

He reappointed Laurence R. Melton, Dallas, as chairman of the Committee for the Employment of Handicapped.

COURTS SPEAK — Supreme Court listened to arguments of two banks over which bank is entitled to administer \$300 million estate of Sarita Kenedy East pending a decision on which will of the South Texas ranch owner is valid. Will contest itself will be heard in Kenedy County district court near Kingsville.

A 19 year old San Antonio youth, hit by a taxi while trying to help a girl hurt in a previous traffic mishap, is not entitled to damages awarded him by the trial court, says the High Court.

A merchant seaman seriously injured when he fell on an unsecured plate on a catwalk should recover \$54,264 judgment, the Court found.

ATTY. GEN. RULES — To nobody's great surprise, Attorney General Martin declared unconstitutional Gov. Smith's proposed diversion of money earmarked to the permanent school fund for current education spending.

Martin said legislation making air and water pollution misdemeanor offenses is unconstitutional as applied to associations and firms in that the constitutional reference applied only to individuals and private corporations. A variance by state agencies would be complete defense to prosecution.

Attorney General held as not qualified an applicant for registration as a professional engineer who hold only an agricultural degree from Texas Tech College prior to 1962.

## Attends Federal Land Bank Meet In Houston

R. O. Nichols of Baird has just returned from Houston where he attended the annual Stockholders' meeting of The Federal Land Bank. The meeting was attended by representatives from 73 Federal Land Bank Associations located across Texas. About 450 persons attended.

Delegates, alternates, and guests heard President Herbert H. Decker give the annual report, and addresses by Mr. W. R. Poage, Representative from the 11th Congressional District of Texas, and Mr. Arthur Smith, Senior Vice President and Economist with the First National Bank in Dallas.

The Federal Land Bank of Houston makes long-term loans on farm and ranch property at the lowest interest cost consistent with sound business practices. Five times in the 52-year history of the System the billed interest rate on loans outstanding has been voluntarily reduced.

The Federal Land Bank Association of Coleman makes and services loans in this area. Members of the board of directors are Johnnie I. Henderson, President; R. O. Nichols, Vice President; W. R. Hickman, Ralph M. Edens and Hadden Payne.

Wilbanks & Tidwell of Albany completed two regular field wells three miles southeast of Putnam. Both are on the S. M. Davis lease.

No. 12 Davis spots 893 feet from the north and 1,350 feet from the east lines of Section 8, BOH Survey.

Daily potential was three barrels of 39.5 gravity oil, plus 10 barrels of water. It is pumping from perforations at 502 to 522 feet with 10 sacks of sand and 60 barrels of water. Operator set the 4 1/2-inch casing at 550 feet, total depth.

and 1,350 feet from the east lines of Section 8.

**PUBLIC NOTICE OF THE REQUIREMENT FOR RECORDATION AND LIMITATION OF CERTAIN CLAIMS OF WATER RIGHTS.**

Notice is here given as required by Section 4 of the Water Rights Adjudication Act of 1967 (Article 7942a, Vernon's Civil Statutes) that all claims of riparian water rights, all claims under Article 7500a, Revised Civil Statutes of Texas, 1925, to inapound, divert or use public waters for other than domestic and livestock purposes for which no permit has been issued, all claims of water rights under the Irrigation Acts of 1889 and 1895 which were not filed with the State Board of Water Engineers in accordance with the Irrigation Act of 1913, as amended, and all other claims of water rights other than claims under permits and certified filings, must be recorded with the Texas Water Rights Commission. Section 4 does not apply to use of water for domestic and livestock purposes as the same is defined by Commission Rules.

On or before September 1, 1969, every person claiming any water right to which Section 4 applies shall file with the Commission a sworn statement setting forth the nature of the claim of water right. Claims to which the Section applies shall be recognized only if valid under existing law and only to the extent of actual application of water to beneficial use without waste during any calendar year from 1963 to 1967, inclusive. However, in any case where any claimant of a riparian right has prior to August 28, 1967, commenced or completed the construction of works designed to apply a greater quantity of water to beneficial use, such right shall be recognized to the extent of the maximum amount of water actually applied to beneficial use without waste during any calendar year from 1963 to 1970, inclusive; provided an additional sworn statement is filed on or before July 1, 1971. Failure to file the sworn statement or statements in substantial compliance with Section 4 shall extinguish and bar any claim of water right to which the Section applies.

## Vehicle Usage On Upward Trend

AUSTIN — There will be approximately a quarter-million more vehicles on the State's streets and highways this year, State Highway Engineer J. C. Dingwall, has announced.

During the 1969 registration year, indications are that more than 7.2 million motor vehicles will be registered in Texas, Dingwall said. That compares to almost 7 million registered in 1968.

Texas license plates this year have black letters and numerals on a white background. For the first time this year, all Texas license plates are reflectorized as a safety measure.

Registration began February 1 at the county tax office and sub-stations throughout Texas. Motorists have until midnight, April 1 to register and affix license plates to their vehicles.

"But we urge everyone not to wait till the last minute," Dingwall said. "By registering now motorists can avoid waiting in long lines during the last few weeks of the registration period."

State law requires each owner to register his vehicle in the county in which he resides and to present his title as evidence of ownership.

The vehicle title is one of four items motorists will need when registering. The others are last year's registration receipt, current residence address and correct ZIP Code.

Making certain that the correct resident address appears on 1969 registration records can mean a big plus in conveniences to vehicle owner next year.

Texas motor vehicle registration records are being computerized, and a new registration system for 1970 will speed up the registration process considerably.

Next year, vehicle owners will be mailed a special pre-prepared registration form. Owners will have only to bring the form to the county tax office or registration station, pay the fee and have the form validated with new license numbers.

Fees are the same this year as last year. Minimum fee for all vehicles including small trailers such as boat trailers, is \$5.30.

Rates for passenger cars are: Up to 3,500 pounds, \$12.30; 3,501 to 4,500 pounds, \$22.30; 4,501 to 6,000 pounds, \$30.30; More than 6,000 pounds, 0.55 per 100 pounds.

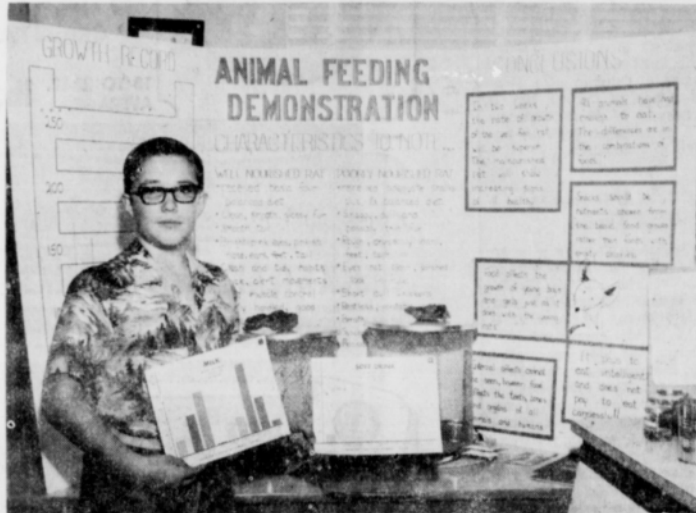

### Clyde Science Class Conducts Nutritional Experiment on Rats

Betty Rhoten's Junior High Science class at Clyde school demonstrated the Value of Milk using white laboratory bred rats contrasting a desirable diet which includes milk against a diet of the same foods but no milk. The foods used are typical of those recommended for a well fed child.

Bobby Wayne Scott, son of Mrs. and Mrs. J. T. Scott, used Value of a Well Chosen Diet, contrasting a desirable diet against one unbalanced by excessive sweets, starches, fats, and little milk, fruit or vegetables other than potatoes; soft drinks were substituted for milk. It demonstrates to young teenagers the bad effects of careless food choices often made by young people.

Rat feeding demonstrations are an effective teaching device in stimulating awareness of food in relation to growth and health. The demonstrations are designed to help boys and girls realize the need for a well chosen diet. It can be hard for boys and girls, and even adults, to recognize the real importance of food. They are told that certain foods are important but they cannot see the effects readily. A demonstration with young animals is one way to show that foods work together to promote healthy growth. The most observable difference between young rats fed contrasting diets is in the rate of growth. They will eat approximately the same foods that people do and respond to various diets in much the same way. They have a short lifespan and grow so rapidly that pupils may observe in a few weeks of rat feeding, results that might take years to observe in humans.

Delma Scott, Program Director for Dairy Council, serving the Central West Texas Area, a branch of the National Dairy Council, which is a non-profit research and education organization, promoting national

health through a better understanding of dairy foods and their use, placed the laboratory bred rats for the nutrition study in the Clyde School.
